# "Five Star Performance" By Labour

## Disaster For Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael

A five-star performance by Labour which yielded the party a maximum return of "three for three" in terms of seats, and disastrous setbacks for both Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael, best summarise last Thursday's Dungarvan Urban Council election which, in many ways, was one of the most sensational ever held.

When all the counting was completed at the Sports Centre on Friday evening, Labour had established itself as political "top dog" in the county town with a massive 911 first preferences and three Council seats. It was, by some way, the party's best-ever performance in a Dungarvan UDC election.

With Billy Kyne — as was confidently expected — their "anchor man," outgoing Cllr. Paddy Power

and County Councillor Lar Hart also polled heavily, and as early as that first count the election of all three Labour candidates was a certainty.

In stark contrast, Fine Gael, despite its pulling in just half a dozen "number ones" less than Labour and providing the impressive poll topper in Deputy Austin Deasy, wound up with its poorest representation on the Council — one seat.

Fianna Fáil, through the mystifying vagaries of proportional representation, somehow retained its two seats from a first preference vote that was less than one and a half quotas. The 499 votes garnered by the party's three candidates was — by the proverbial mile — the major Government party's worst ever performance in Dungarvan.

Superb vote-management was the key to Labour's spectacular "hat-trick,"

while in stark contrast, Fine Gael's inability to carefully manoeuvre its vote cost the party at least one seat and possibly two.

If Fianna Fáil on the other hand is to take any solace from what was by and large a catastrophic election for

## "Eyesore" In Lismore Town

Calls for some action to be taken about the dilapidated conditions of the former railway station building in the Heritage Town of Lismore, were made at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. William McDonnell said he had raised the matter as far back as a year ago but nothing had been done in the interim. A fine building with a beautiful stone facade had been allowed to fall into virtual total disrepair and is now the worst eyesore in "this beautiful town."

Cllr. McDonnell, without going into specifics, said there is public concern about what is happening there from time to time, and he believed the Council should move under the increased powers given to it under the Derelict Sites Act.

Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, said the Council, as a first step, will endeavour to prevent access to the building.

# Flair Back In Full Production In August

A management spokesman at the Flair (Ireland) Ltd. factory in Tallow, Co. Waterford, which has temporarily closed, has pledged that it will be back in full production on August 8.

The adverse weather conditions which most of Europe has been experiencing for months past has forced the early summer close-down of the Tallow plant,

which manufactures plastic garden furniture mainly for export markets.

Almost forty employees have been laid off four weeks earlier than would normally happen, but management is confident they will be "up and running" with a full staff compliment in early August.

"We are essentially in a seasonal business, and this year the weather all over Europe has been something else", Flair's production manager Mr. Mike Durkin, said.

# Cork Communications "Under Blistering Attack"

Cork Communications Ltd came under blistering attack at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council when the company was accused of causing serious disruption to RTE 1 and Network Two television reception in many homes in the town of Cappoquin.

Before the meeting was a letter from RTE stating that the poor reception of RTE 1

and Network Two in the Cappoquin area was due to a poor signal on the cable

system — owned by Cork Communications — feeding the town. The RTE letter went on: "We have been speaking to them about the problem and they now propose to improve the system. The RTE services are available in Cappoquin from the Dun-

garvan transmitter, but an external aerial would be required. MMDS does not transmit the RTE service and is not required to do so."

Cllr. Nora Flynn accused Cork Communications of

# Don't Let Everything Overheat

June sunshine is a mixed blessing for gardeners. We want heat to encourage growth and allow enjoyment of the garden, but too much sun can damage plants and scorch the lawn.



And frequent hosepipe bans don't make it easy for gardeners to step up watering to compensate for the dry weather. Nevertheless, 'heatstroke' can be minimised with a little effort.

In particular, make time to work on the lawn each week — far better than breaking your back patching, raking and re-seeding or even laying an expensive and time consuming new lawn.

## KEY TIPS

- Mow frequently if the lawn is growing fast, but never cut close so that the grass is easily scorched by the sun.
- Fork, spike or slit the lawn so rain and your watering can get to the roots before the sun evaporates the moisture.
- Water at sensible times — early morning or dusk — to minimise evaporation.
- Install a rain butt fed from a downpipe on your house or an outbuilding — If it's the garden shed or another outhouse it should be closer to where you need the water.
- Be sensible about wear and tear on the lawn during hot weather. If it is dry then running feet or laden wheelbarrows won't help.

But don't forget other gardening chores while caring for the lawn — there's lots more watering to be done elsewhere and if you have to use a watering can then a garden butt is a boon. Use a fine nozzle on the can to emulate the effect of summer rain and avoid battering down the growing plants.

Again, water at the ends of the day to make more of the water and your work. Use just enough to wet the surface of the soil without causing puddles.

Mulching will ease the burden: use pulverised bark, chopped straw or — plentiful by now — lawn clippings. This will keep dampness in the soil even if it doesn't always make for a beautiful looking garden!

Attack weeds as soon as they appear, preferably by hoeing or catching them early and yanking out by hand.

If they become established and you risk leaving part in the ground — a problem with dock and dandelion — then 'paint' on weedkiller using a paintbrush to minimise risk to surrounding flowers. In the case of the lawn, you could also water in a selective weedkiller.

Another strong grower now is likely to be the hedge, especially if it is a privet. Trim now and expect to give another 'haircut' in a month's time. If you don't feel too overworked on watering you might also consider sowing and raising vegetable seedlings this month.

French and runner beans, and spring onions for the summer salads are options and you could also sew carrots for autumn, broccoli and sprouts for winter, and cabbage for the spring.

# MAJOR BOOST FOR LIBRARIES



# START YOUR MEAL IN ITALY-STYLE



## ITALIAN FISH SALAD

**Ingredients**  
8oz (225g) thinly sliced smoked halibut fillet, fresh or defrosted  
1 bunch watercress, rinsed  
3 medium tomatoes, sliced

**Dressing**  
2 tbsp (30ml) olive oil  
1 tbsp (15ml) white wine vinegar  
salt and pepper  
chopped fresh tarragon, to garnish

**Method**  
Arrange the watercress around a plate. Add the tomato slices. Top with slices of smoked halibut.  
To prepare the dressing: Place the ingredients into a screw topped jar and shake well.

Pour the dressing over the salad and sprinkle over the tarragon. Serve as a starter with sliced Italian bread. Serves 4.

**TIP**  
There is a wide range of smoked fish that can be served in a similar way. Look for a smoked tuna, sword-

fish, monkfish or eel. Alternatively serve a selection as a platter with some smoked shellfish and a variety of dips.

# LISMORE FESTIVAL OF EARLY MUSIC

## MUSIC A GREAT SUCCESS

Last week-end Lismore took a step back in time with the 2nd Annual West Waterford Early Music Festival.

With fine weather from Friday to Sunday the town was alive with visitors all enjoying the many musical events and concerts in St. Carthages Cathedral, St. Carthages Church and Glencairn Abbey. Music in the streets and pubs was the order and young and old had something to suit all ages and tasks.

Cries of 'Long Live The King, Long Live The Queen' echoed throughout the streets on Sunday as the royal pair were crowned King and Queen of Utopia outside the ornate gates of St. Carthage's Cathedral.

The colourful afternoon pageant, involving hundreds of locals and visiting Early Music groups, was a highlight of the Festival, the only festival of its kind in the Republic.

Streets were thronged with visitors hours before the pageant, the Fair On The Mall, the art exhibition, and numerous lunchtime concerts transformed the heritage town into a mediaeval oasis of music and song.

Locals stepped back in time donning old fashioned costumes, musicians played on the street while visitors

just enjoyed the warm sunshine, the open air food and the festival atmosphere.

Sundays programme commenced with a sung Latin Mass with Cois Cladaigh Madrigal Group, Galway, in St. Carthage's Church and the same choir performed at a choral Evensong at St. Carthage's Cathedral.

The final major concert attracted a capacity audience with the performance of Handel's Oratorio Judas Maccabaeus by the East Cork Choral Society, vocal soloists and orchestra under the baton of Colin Nicholls in St. Carthage's Cathedral.

Lismore now reverts to

the present century but the memory of a highly successful second West Waterford Festival of Early Music will remain for many months.

Tony Baron of the York Waits, a mediaeval town band from York in England who were paying their first visit to Ireland, summed up the visitors. "We don't want to leave. It has been fantastic - an unforgettable experience".

As musicians and revellers sang and danced into the wee small hours on the main street of Lismore on Sunday night, one question was uppermost — would a third festival be organised and if so, when?

The highlight was Sunday afternoon with the pageant from Lismore Castle through the Main Street to the gates of St. Carthages Cathedral where the King of Utopia was crowned.

On Sunday the crowds came in their thousands to the town with the fair on the Mall, the pageant, art exhibition, concerts the attractions. Old Fashioned costumes were the order and everyone got into the spirit of the occasion.

As this was the 2nd Festival let us hope the dates for the 3rd Festival will be announced soon. Congratulations to the hard working committee and all their helpers for making the week-end the renowned success it was.

- Reprogramme telecommunications equipment including PABX's, faxes and automatic dial telephones. Contact your telecommunications equipment supplier for advice.
  - Change your stationery, promotional literature and advertising.
  - Advise your callers, particularly those outside the country, of the change.
- The change is simple and just means adding one extra digit in front of the existing number. Check if your number is affected by these changes.

### THE BOOLEY HOUSE

In olden times, when the winter winds had subsided and the first growths of spring had begun, it was time to move off. The crops had been sown in the tillable land in the valley, if the family had any, and then, sometimes the young people, but more often the whole family moved with their cattle, sheep and pigs to the summer pastures in the hills and the summer dwelling that existed there. This was the Booley House.

The Booley House was a simple, even primitive, building normally built of

sods of turf and roofed with branches and heather and often having more accommodation for animals that it did for humans. Booleys were normally built in clusters lending themselves to the form of co-operative endeavour so typical of Irish agriculture.

One other major aspect of the Booley House was the ancient Gaelic Tradition of hospitality. Travelling musicians plied their way along hill-side walks from Booley to Booley receiving the same degree of respect and courtesy that from Celtic times was bestowed on such artists. Oftentimes the evening milking was followed by dancing to the music of an itinerant piper, the recounting of old tales and the creation of new ones. Many a song drifted its way downward towards the valley. Thought the lifestyle was simple, the balmy summer days of the Booley House were without doubt the happiest of the year.





the party, it was in the way the FF votes plumped solidly for the three party candidates.

In the end it was the near perfect transfer of Frank Browne's votes that ensured the election of his colleagues Nuala Ryan and Austin Flynn on the crucial 12th and final count. Going into that count, Fine Gael's Mario Flavin held a 13-vote advantage (228-213) over Flynn, but with the FF

transfers sweeping in vast numbers within the party the two seats were — miraculously — saved. The Flavin defeat meant his stay on the UDC had lasted a mere two months.

With the quota set at 353, expectations were realised when Deputy Deasy (728) and Billy Kyne (476) were elected on the first count for Fine Gael and Labour respectively.

There was however a third candidates also elected on that same first count, and

therein lies one of the real fairytale stories of the election.

Michael O'Riordan, standing as an Independent following his much publicised resignation from Fine Gael earlier in the year, polled an outstanding 358 votes which left him with a quota and a surplus of five. If ever the electorate was expressing its anger at the way an individual within a political party had been treated this was the occasion.

The outgoing UDC Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright (DL), who had been expected to gain a first-count victory was just two votes short of achieving that distinction, and was duly elected on the second count.

The second Democratic Left candidate, Christy Power, did reasonably well with 121 first preferences and remained in the race to the 10th count when he was eliminated with 192 votes.

For newcomer Damien

Dillon contesting his first election as an Independent, it was a hugely successful election. He commanded a very significant 173 first count votes, and benefitted probably more than any other candidate in the subsequent transfers. He was eventually elected on the 12th and final count when on the 282 vote mark to officially take the eighth seat.

Cllr. Mary Dixon's nine year tenure on the Council came to an end when she polled a somewhat disap-

pointing eighty-five votes. That left her with far too much leeway to make up and in truth there was never a realistic hope that she could do so.

An excellent public representative since 1985, she is owed a deep debt of gratitude by a community she served so well during that time.

Next best of the Independents was the colourful Joey O'Sullivan, described aptly by one political commentator as "the joker in the pack."

Joey did exceptionally well to pull in eighty-three number ones and the great pity was that when he was eventually eliminated on the 7th count, his 117 votes were just one short of the tally that would have saved his deposit.

The remaining Independent, Dan Dineen, was expected to do better than he did and his forty-three first preferences must have left him a very disappointed man on completion of the first count.

As the various counts proceeded, it was becoming increasingly evident that the huge gulf between Deputy Deasy's vote and those of his three party running-mates, Mario Flavin, Cissy O'Mahoney and Peter Hayes was going to cost Fine Gael a second seat. The party's whole election strategy had suddenly come under scrutiny, and subsequent events confirmed that it failed to pass the test.

Paddy Power's election on the 11th count followed the elimination of his namesake in the Democratic left, and the remaining four seats went to Hart, Ryan, Dillon and Flynn on the 12th count without reaching the quota.

The official order of the election of the candidates was: (1) Austin Deasy FG; (2) Billy Kyne Lab.; (3) Michael O'Riordan Ind.; (4) Tony Wright (Democratic Left); (5) Paddy Power Lab.; (6) Lar Hart Lab.; (7) Nuala Ryan FF; (8) Damien Dillon Ind.; (9) Austin Flynn FF.

The overall result represents a Labour gain from Fine Gael, based on the 1985 election outcome.

The count was completed around 7.30 p.m. and that is a tribute to the ultra efficiency of the counting staff under Returning Officer, Mr. Bertie White.

This, incidentally, was the last time for Mr. White to fill the role of Returning Officer as he retires from his post as Town Clerk next month.

# Concern About Work Force Expressed

Concern about cash strapped Waterford County Council's ability to retain its entire workforce this year was expressed at a meeting in Dungarvan on Monday.

Members were discussing a detailed 1994 Road Works Scheme presented by County Engineer Mr. John O'Flynn, when the question of sustaining a full staff compliment to the end of the year surfaced.

Mr. O'Flynn, in layman's language, told the meeting that there will be a problem about maintaining all the workers. The Manager would come back to a meeting in July with more de-

tails of the situation.

Cllr. Billy Kyne expressed his grave concern that the employment situation of staff should be considered precarious, while Cllr. Nora Flynn said that surely the Department of the Environment should wake up to the fact that jobs are there to be created through proper maintenance programmes on their national and non national roads.

Cllr. Flynn said that if the roads aren't properly maintained it would cost them more money at the end of the day. "The maintenance work is there to be done, that work can create a lot of jobs, and why cannot someone in Government wake up to that fact," she said.

"To reduce our workforce when there is so much work to be done would be a disgrace," Cllr. Flynn added.

In the presentation of this year's road works scheme, the County Engineer disclosed that a total expenditure of £5.99m will be expended on the roads this year. Some 47% of that will be on national roads and 53% on county (non national) roads.

Mr. O'Flynn said the programme on county roads will be substantially up on last year, and if that momentum is maintained for a four or five year period — as he hoped it would — it

should make a major difference to their overall county roads structure.

The County Engineer said that in the current year strengthening and surface dressing of more than eighty miles of county roads will be undertaken and that would be double the work carried out last year.

Many tributes were paid to Mr. O'Flynn on the comprehensiveness of the road works scheme which was then adopted on the proposal of Cllr. Dan Cowman.

## FARMING LEADER

# Call For More Green Tourism

"The potential for green tourism is far greater than has yet been realised in Ireland and marketing is essential if this potential is to be fulfilled," Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, Mr. Maurice Harvey, said today.

Mr. Harvey said that bookings for farm house holidays for this year are almost double 1993. According to Bord Failte, approximately 30,000 people had farm house holidays

in Ireland last year.

### TOURISM — ONE OF THE FEW AREAS NOT QUOTA BOUND

These figures illustrate what can be achieved, even with limited marketing. These statistics also prove that there is a market for what we have to offer in the Irish countryside — in particular our heritage and hospitality.

"Agri tourism is one of the few areas which has not

been restricted by quotas or super levies, therefore it is essential that this potential be developed", said Mr. Harvey.

### REPS HELPS TOURISM INDUSTRY

He added that new Schemes, such as the Rural Environment Protection Scheme, are designed to enhance the countryside and that rural Ireland's appeal as a holiday destination is there-

fore being strengthened considerably.

"Green tourism, linked to genealogical research holidays are extremely popular with American and Australian visitors in particular and they are not time sensitive. Therefore I urge Bord Failte and the other rural tourism agencies to promote farm based holidays on a year round basis and to continue to develop this market", concluded Mr. Harvey.

## County Waterford ICMSA News

The County Chairman, John Cusack, welcomed the work done by ICMSA and the Chairman of the National Sheep Committee, Eamonn O'Rourke, in the decision of the EU Commission to allow farmers who are taking the Retirement Scheme to lease their quota without

fear of any loss of the national reserve.

The normal rule stipulates that the maximum duration of a lease is three years, with the onus on the quota owner to use the quota in full for two consecutive years, or else lose the quota to the national reserve.

"It was essential for this rule to be relaxed in order that farmers could participate in the Retirement Scheme without fear of losing quota," said Mr.

O'Rourke, Chairman ICMSA National Sheep Committee.

"Sheep farmers who were granted extra quota free of charge from the National Reserve in 1993, but who were unable to utilise them because they had already purchased or leased quota, will now not lose any quota back to the Reserve," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He complimented the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry for pursuing this matter with the

Commission and for securing what he called a sensible decision.

ICMSA had raised this issue with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, some months ago and had put forward suggestions for resolving the issue. The problem arose because of a delay in notifying farmers about allocations from the Reserve.

ICMSA had suggested that where farmers had leased, or purchased extra quota to qualify for ewe premium on all their ewes, before they were notified about allocations from the National Reserve, that they should not suffer any loss of quota back to the Reserve because of failure to fill the entire quota.

"It would have been ludicrous if farmers were penalised for delays in notifying about quota allocations from the National Reserve," said Mr. O'Rourke.

Farmers who reduce stocking rates in order to comply with the new Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS) will have their quotas suspended without any loss of quota to the national reserve. The Commission decision has exempted such producers from the normal rules relating to the use of quota.

Mr. O'Rourke concluded by saying that ICMSA was in constant contact with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry on these important issues over recent months and he said the ICMSA policy position had been clearly taken on board.

## IFA Seeks Extension of TB Compensation

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy, has asked the Department of Agriculture to extend the higher rates of reactor compensation to a small number of farmers forced to depopulate their herds in the last two months of 1993. IFA has brought this case to the minister for Agriculture, pointing out that the farmers involved were debarred from restocking until after April 1, 1994, but did not benefit from the new rates of compensation which commenced on January 1 this year.

In a letter to the Minister for Agriculture, IFA pointed out that during the months of November and December 1993, a total of 24 farmers

had 316 cows depopulated due to TB and a total of 19 farmers had 836 cows depopulated because of Brucellosis. He appealed to Minister Walsh to ensure that this small group of 43 farmers, who were forced to pay high prices for replacement breeding cattle but didn't get the higher rate of reactor compensation, be treated fairly to ensure that the impetus to eradicate TB and Brucellosis continued.

"The higher level of reactor compensation negotiated by IFA through the TB forum earlier this year is a vitally important lifeline to this group of farmers who have suffered severe financial losses because of the diseases in their herds," said Mr. Murphy.

## Waterford ICMSA And Teagasc Launch Family Farm Environment And Safety Competition

Waterford ICMSA has this week launched the 1994 'ICMSA - Teagasc Farm Environment and Safety Competition.

This successful competition, which began in 1991, is going from strength to strength, according to Waterford ICMSA Spokesperson, Tom Hickey.

According to Mr. Hickey, last year's winners, David and Nora Fitzgerald from Modeligo, illustrated the high standard set by the competition.

### UNIQUE TO WATERFORD

"They and the other finalists really made a great impression on the judges. One of the judges, Monica Car, alias Mary Norton, was publicly lavish in her praise of the work undertaken by all the participating families. ICMSA is delighted with the response to the competition, which is unique to County Waterford," said Mr. Hickey.

The competition is not so much efficiently orientated as to encourage farmers to

promote a quality image of their farm houses, their farmyards and more importantly their farm products.

The overall appearance of the farm, particularly the farmyard and entrance, are important considerations for the judges when selecting an overall winner. Factors such as the maintenance of farm buildings and the care taken to protect any historical buildings or field monuments, as well as the safety aspects of the farm will be taken into account.

### DETAILS OF COMPETITION

The competition is confined to family farms in County Waterford, there will be one county winner and the winner will receive a specially commissioned trophy plus £500.

## Serious Question Marks Over Slow Down In Cattle Slaughtering

The current slow down in cattle slaughtering at a time when farmers have finished stock available for sale raises serious question marks regarding the commitment of the industry to supply and hold on to commercial market outlets on a consistent basis, said Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan.

Mr. Donovan said: "Steer slaughtering since the end of April this year have been running at less than half of last year's level. On average in 1993 we slaughtered over 5,500 steers per week during the first three weeks of May. This year, the kill is down to only 2,500 head per week for the same period. The question must be asked, what has happened to the market outlets we had last year or alternatively is there a price related motive

in the slow down in slaughtering at present."

The Aglish livestock farmer said that some farmers had retained cattle after the Slaughter Premium, a move that would ensure adequate supplies to the processing sector during the month of May. These farmers now find that they are having major difficulty in getting cattle into factories. This does not make sense at a time when the industry, along with the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh, has consistently complained about the lack of raw material to supply and retain commercial market outlets.

Mr. Donovan added that the last three weeks indicate the delicate balance of the beef market and clearly demonstrate the need for the Irish industry to exploit every market opportunity in full.

### Cattle Farmers' Leader Welcomes Computerisation To Speed Up Payments

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, has welcomed the announcement by Minister Joe Walsh, of the second phase of investment in computer technology in the Department of Agriculture to bring on-line the speedy payment of Premium and Headage entitlements to farmers.

Mr. Donovan said that, with the additional staff resources and computer technology allocated to the Premium and Headage area, there can be no more excuses for delayed payments. "The first acid-test of the Minister's commitments in this regard will be the prompt payment of all the 1994 Slaughter Premium in July/August of this year as agreed with IFA," he said.

A record breaking performance by Davy Whelan, the election of Dick Canning and two candidates deadlocked on the 12th and final count were the main talking points in one of the most interesting Town Commissioners Elections ever held in Lismore.

Fifteen candidates battled it out for nine seats. As the count unfolded it became clear that the people of Lismore sought new faces, leaving some of the outgoing commissioners pooling poorly and others losing their seats.

Polling over two quotas Davy Whelan (F.G.) was more than 60 votes ahead of his nearest rival in the first count with many wondering

how he captured such a high vote. However, Davy Whelan is steeped in Fine Gael tradition, he is a top-class sporting enthusiast and he gained valuable experience in recent elections working with the McDonnell machine in Lismore.

Mary Fenton Morrissey (Ind.) has an excellent record of achievement in Lismore, especially in her involvement with the old

District Hospital, now St. Carthage's House. While she was elected in the first count and polled well she must feel a little disappointed with her overall support.

Owen Madden (F.G.) who was elected on the first count should be proud of his achievement in his first bid for office. He was helped, no doubt, by his long established family background. He is the ener-

getic youthful type that many people in Lismore looked for.

The election of Dick Canning (Ind.) was a big surprise to many. Dick is an employee of Waterford County Council. He is seen by the public as an excellent worker especially in keeping the town tidy. He also put in a tremendous canvassing campaign.

John Heneghan, Chairman

of Lismore District Executive Fine Gael was another new face to be elected. His excellent teaching record in Lismore C.B.S. and his involvement in G.A.A. pushed him up to a respectable 52 first preference votes.

There was a sensational climax at the end of the count as three candidates were locked together on the same vote. At that point the transfer of Peter Dowd's (F.F.) 5 surplus votes gave Joe Roche (F.G.) 2 votes putting him just ahead of Mary Ryan (F.F.) and Donie Coughlan (F.F.). On the 12th

and final count as both of these remaining candidates were on an equal vote and only one seat to be filled, the Returning Officer Mr. Eric Flynn deemed Coughlan to be elected because he had two votes more than the outgoing commissioner Mary Ryan after the second count.

In the overall situation there was no change in Party representation. However, Fine Gael received 50% of the vote, making Lismore a stronghold for the party.

## TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

### UMPIRES — Were You Ever An Umpire?

I mean a real umpire, at a game of importance, a championship game. Well, I was, often. Seems an easy job. Just stand there - even on one leg - and wave your arms for a wide, a flag for a score, or waggle one upright arm above your head for a 45 or 65.

That's the theory but reality is somewhat different sometimes. Those are the times when real decision making obtrudes its unwelcome head, when a scrap of cop-on or intelligence or acute observation must be used and where an apparent conflict of evidence exists. Not easy then as an adjudication and decision are awaited. Of course, it could be that the other umpire with you hadn't a clue and instead of wearing a white coat should be waiting for men in white coats to escort him to safety - his own safety.

A referee has to have four umpires. Even his personal choice of officials might not possess one or more of the qualities needed to discharge their duties on the match day but as long as four persons are available the referee can proceed with the game. Not alone does the ref. have difficulty in finding four, he often fails to find even one. So he drives to the venue intending to locate a few honest

men (why never a woman) who will come to his assistance. At times he is forced to press in to service one or two from the competing teams on the general principle that beggars can't be choosers. This creates a fraught situation because club interest's often conflict with a referee's needs. A good referee with bad umpires is like a hurler with only one side if the game is close his difficulties increase.

I remember nearly forty years ago when I was given the umpires job at a match in Fraher Field, Dungarvan on a sunny summer Sunday. Jim Bailey, go ndéana Dia trócaire air, had the whistle. With me was a chap (long since gone to that Happy Venue where umpires are redundant) whose zeal and single-minded devotion to duty led to the disallowing of two Kilrossanty goals. He persuaded me in those cosy conspiratorial chats that umpires in doubt have behind the net that a Kilrossanty forward was standing in the square before the ball arrived. I was doubtful but he was positive. As it happened the game later developed into a free for all and was abandoned. I was (you guessed right) always going to be unavailable for duty when the replay took

place.

No indeed, it's not easy unless both officials with the flags are clear about their duties in all situations and are properly instructed by the referee. An instance of things going wrong is easy to see if you watch the Sunday game regularly and way back in 1959 when Tom Cunningham was the referee of the Munster Football final I was one of his umpires. Umpiring duties were shared by a football colleague of ours who died some years ago. John Dowling, powerful Kerry midfielder, shot from the fifty yard line and was convinced he had put the ball between the uprights. My co-umpire hadn't a clue because even though the attempted score was at his side he stood in the worst possible position: right beside the post rather than behind and in the line of flight of the ball. I got a quizzical look from him. I shrugged my shoulders and he waved wide. John unleashed a string of uncomplimentary remarks to my friend the gist being that his mother wasn't married when he was born and that the services of a guide dog for him were urgently required, if you know what I mean. Kerry's comfortable win over Cork saved our bacon.

The poor umpire is scarcely alluded to except when some controversial goalmouth incident puts him in the limelight. Only two years ago the Munster Senior Hurling Final gave us a glaring example of umpires failing to help the referee. In full view of the two white-coated beauties Tomas Mulcahy fouled the ball (he threw it up in the air in front of him and grabbed it) took five steps and kicked a goal. It was flagged by on the the umpires thus taking the heart out of Limerick.

Going back a few years when Waterford met Limerick in Cork in 1963 we beat them by a couple of points and went on to the All Ireland after beating Tipperary in the Munster Final. I have happy and amusing memories of one umpire whom I befriended early in the first half. He was made for me: dark and dour, and most susceptible to suggestions from me. I had already cooperated with him in having two seventies become wides when Liam Moloney of Limerick gained possession on the 14 yard line and smashed a power shot through the roof of the net for a great goal. "Aw, another lousy point", I observed, just loud enough for

my friend's ears. He promptly bent and raised the white flag indicating a point. The puck out was never quicker. A few moments later we were once more in friendly conversation after the poor umpire had recovered from the barrage of obscenities courtesy of Moloney. "Isn't it hard to please some people", I essayed mildly by way of reference to the little earlier contretemps. "Oh God it is," said the poor man with his eyes firmly fixed on the gaping hole in the roof of the net. Ah, he was a good one, a right good one and I'll never forget him. Wonder is he still exercising his umpiring skills?

Umpires are important people. After all it is they who decide whether a score be recorded or not and only if they disagree may the referee intervene. Of course, that didn't stop one prominent Waterford Inter-county referee from demeaning his umpire and overruling his decision in a Munster Hurling Final in Thurles, Cork versus Limerick, much to our amazement. But then that same referee was a man of whom it could be said: "there but for the grace of God goes God!" When will the umpires job get due recognition? Do umpires get any training? From whom? Is any monitoring done on their performance? It would well repay our association to seriously consider those questions.

# Threat To Small Gaeltacht Community

A Fianna Fail member of Waterford County Council has warned of a threat to the very future of a small Gaeltacht community unless the Local Authority addresses itself to the chronic housing situation there.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally told Monday's Council meeting

that not one local authority house has been built in the Old Parish area for twenty years. There was land readily available for housing, he said, but many people had given up applying to the Council because they believed it would be a waste of time.

He claimed that people are

Cllr. Billy Kyne supported his colleague and referred to the falling numbers attending the local national school.

Mr. Brian J. McNally, Acting County Manager, undertook to pursue the matter and present a report to a future Council meeting.

# Irish Permanent Members In Waterford To Get Free Shares

More than 4,000 shares with a value expected to be in excess of £1,400,000 will be distributed in the Waterford area following Irish Permanent's announcement that Free Share Claim Forms have been posted to qualifying members.

Flotation will enable Irish permanent to raise capital to develop further the range and quality of customer services.

Irish Permanent's members in Waterford are being assisted in the Free Share Claim Form exercise by a regional advertising campaign, the reestablishment of Irish Permanent's national Helpline (1 - 850

678500) and by staff at branches in the county.

The Free Share Claim Form shows that there are four options available to members in Waterford who qualify for Free Shares:

### 1931: Hard Time For The G.A.A.

The hard time of the 1930's had now begun to bite hard. The collapsed Stock Market, the ruined business concerns, the deepening world-wide slump made the struggle of the new Irish State tougher. Unemployment was rife. Abbeyside was grievously hit.

It was found impossible to enter any team in 1931. There were more team members in the London area than in the Village.

Ballinroad too was severely weakened but entered a junior football team as usual. Though the grading system was abandoned in hurling this year, it was kept in football and Ballinroad were graded

"A" again.

They drew Kilrossanty in round 1 and had to concede defeat; in turn Kilrossanty were beaten by Kilgobinet who won the Western championship that year.

Kilminion entered junior football again and again failed to make progress.

1932:

#### STRUGGLING

After the blank year in 1931 Abbeyside affiliated again in 1932 and entered football and hurling teams, for Ballinroad had disappeared from the scene at the end of the previous year. But Abbeyside was only a shadow of its former strength and failed to survive the first round in either game.



## Know Your Rights

**Question** — My husband is disabled due to an accident. What benefits would he be entitled to as a disabled passenger?

**Answer** — If a motor vehicle has to be specially constructed or adapted to accommodate him as a disabled passenger and if he meets the medical criteria and the Director of Community Care has signed the necessary medical certificate he would be entitled to the following: Repayment of VAT and Vehicle Registration Tax (VRT) on the vehicle and on the adaptation. (Where the cost of the adaptation is less than 20% of the value of the vehicle excluding VAT and VRT the refund is limited to the VAT on the adaptation).

The maximum refund of VRT and VAT in any 2 year period is £9,000 for a disabled passenger. Vehicles with an engine size in excess of 4000 cc do not qualify.

If the model is specially adapted from a standard model the same relief is given, subject to the cost of the adaptation being at least 20% of the value of the vehicle.

Where to apply: Disabled Driver's Section, Central Vehicle Office, Customs & Excise, Rosslare Harbour, Co. Wexford. Tel. 053/33750.

### PETROL AND DIESEL REFUND

A disabled passenger will be entitled to a refund of excise duty on up to 600 gallons of petrol or diesel per year. This refund can be claimed every 4 months. A disabled passenger only qualifies for this relief if the adaptation costs at least 20% of the value of the vehicle excluding VAT and VRT.

If the disabled passenger qualifies for the refund of excise duty and VAT she/he will be exempted from paying Road Tax and Parking Fees. Show your medical Certificate from the Director of Community Care and the Report from the Gardai confirming that the vehicle was specially adapted to your local authority.

The Waterford Crystal Perpetual Trophy for the best overall club was presented to club Chairman, John Dower by Tom Power, Chairman of the Waterford County Board and fellow member of Ring/Old Parish A.C.

Before Christmas, this West Waterford club was presented with the Babs Connors Memorial Trophy for the best overall club during the cross country season for the fourth year in a row and it has now completed the season's double by receiving the Track and Field trophy for a fantastic five years in a row. Great credit is due to all the athletes concerned, their trainers and the club officers for the high position currently enjoyed by this green vested club.

**ST. NICHOLAS A.C.**

For many decades there has been many fine individual athletes in the Ring area but it was in the winter of 1969 that the seeds for a successful club structure in the area was formed when St. Nicholas A.C. was established. Prior to this, Ring athletes competed as part of the Deise A.C. which was an amalgamation with St. Mary's A.C., Dungarvan.

The new St. Nicholas A.C. quickly made its mark on the Waterford and national athletic scene. The 'finding' of John Treacy helped in this while the overall strength of the club can be credited to such as Jimmy Costin and John Harty with the involvement of local curate Fr. Michael Enright being particularly significant. Fr. Enright gave much of his time to the youth of Ring and later with Bally A.C. in the Ballylaneen and Kilmacthomas areas and he contributed greatly to the development of athletics in Waterford.

**GOOD TEAMS**

St. Nicholas A.C. enjoyed many successes in the early

1970's. John Treacy won his first All-Ireland in 1971 and many more followed. The club achieved a much cherished Munster Novice Cross Country title in the same year with Jimmy Costin, John Harty, Ray Treacy, Seamus Drummy, Jimmy Walsh and Paddy Kelly starring for them. In 1972 the club possessed a brilliant youths team and a mere two points deprived them of the National title at Clonmel, snatched from them by the all conquering Cork City club Lee-vale A.C. The scoring team members were John and Ray Treacy, Seamus Drummy and Paddy Kelly. St. Nicholas won the county senior mens championship for the first time in 1972. Held on home ground the scoring members of the winning team were Ray Treacy 2nd, Jimmy Costin 7th, John Harty 8th and Seamus Drummy 9th. The ladies made it a double on the day with Elizabeth Treacy, Breda Moloney, Kathleen Kelly and Siobhan Drummy winning their senior team championship.

**SUCCESSFUL YEARS**

The Ring club enjoyed many successes up to the mid 1970's but the transfer of Fr. Enright was a great loss. The club produced many fine athletes including Brid and Rita Costin, Kevin and Lisa Curran, Michael, John, Breda and Thomas Manahan, Richie, Liam and Sean Walsh, Eamonn and Pat Terry, Tommy Costin, Breda, Kay, Pat and Mattie Moloney, Siobhan and Maura Drummy, Alice and Mary Ann Foley, M. Donovan, Kevin Kenneally, Sean Lenane, Liam, Patrick and Sean Kelly, Bernard McGill, Linda Curran, Siobhan and Paudie Crotty and Bernadette and Paudie Prendergast, Matty Curran (Friary), Tom O'Donoghue (Lismore) and Michael Brackett also completed with St. Nicholas A.C. The 1970 Waterford Novice Cross Country title was won by a complete dark horse (now grey) when Richie Harty surprised Tom O'Riordan (Dungarvan A.C.) and Paddy Costelloe of Butlerstown to win the county crown. St. Nicholas also hosted many open and championship sports and cross country events up to Munster level.

**NEW ERA**

St. Nicholas A.C. fell into decline in the mid 1970's and this lull lasted for about ten years. Then, in the mid 1980's the present Ring/Old Parish A.C. made its appearance and what an impact it has made since then. Its successes have ranged from

county to national and indeed international level and hundreds of athletes have passed through its ranks.

The modern system used in some clubs is to acquire athletes from a wide ranging area and this is a feature of Ring/Old Parish A.C. who have athletes from Grange and Ardmore, Touraneena, Clashmore, Dungarvan, Abbeyside and Kilmacthomas. The disadvantage here is, that to some extent, a totally local identity is lost while the major and important plus is, that children who would not normally receive the opportunity to take part in athletics, can do so through the interest and hard work of individuals outside their area.

**WALKING STRONGHOLD**

Following on the fine race walking tradition of Cappoquin/Ballinameela A.C. and earlier by Dungarvan A.C. through Jim Sheehan and Michelle and Tina Mulcahy, Ring/Old Parish A.C. have established themselves as the leading juvenile race walking club in Ireland. 



# Motion Of Censure Deferred

Eamon O Murchu, chairman, presided at Monday night's meeting of the County Board which was held at Lawlors' Hotel, Dungarvan.

The motion of censure by the county chairman against Munster Council delegate Jimmy O'Gorman, was not moved as the chairman announced that he was deferring the matter, because Jimmy O'Gorman, who is a senior hurling selector, was required to be in Walsh Park for the finalising of the hurling team to play Limerick on Sunday. Jimmy O'Gorman, protested and said he wished to have the matter disposed of to-night as it had already been deferred from the previous meeting. When the chairman insisted that the matter be deferred, several dele-

gates protested very strongly. Christy O'Brien, Lismore said he had a right to demand that the matter be dealt with as it was properly on the agenda. He accused the chairman of having threatened to 'nail' Jimmy O'Gorman and this brought a denial by the chairman and further argument. Several other delegates continued to protest, and after the matter had gone on for over half an hour, the chairman insisted on moving to the next business.

The meeting ended on a highly controversial note when an argument developed between the chairman and Phil Fanning, Mount Sion. The chairman complained that Mount Sion team had moved out to play a match against another team under the proposed

experimental rules and took away players who were required by the selectors to attend County training on the night. He said Mount Sion did not seek permission to play the challenge game and were, therefore, in breach of rule. He took grave exception to an article in the Waterford News and Star on the same week, which was critical of the County fixtures committee's running of the championships. Phil Fanning, in response, said the two matters were not related and said his club, who had a record of always having put the County first, were responding to a request from Croke Park to take part in an experimental rules match. He accused the chairman of hypocrisy in that he had told the meeting in the Jimmy O'Gorman

case that he did not wish to have anything done to hinder the County effort at Thurles on next Sunday. He challenged the chairman to take whatever action he felt might be appropriate under rule. The matter eventually fizzled out just as the meeting ended at 11.30 p.m.

# Hurling v. Football

In the article dealing with the above subject last week, I made the point that football was perceived as being more popular than hurling and for that reason it was understandable that a sponsor would opt for football.

Since last week, I have been supplied with official figures for 1992 which give clearly the difference in the affiliations of hurling and football.

In Leinster there are 3,132 football teams, all grades and only 1,707 hurling teams; In Connaught there are 1,076 football teams and 309 hurling teams; The figures for Ulster are 1,872 football and 363 hurling; In our own province we have 2,606 football and 2,143 hurling.

County by county the figures are:

Kerry	386	91
Cork	1010	758
Waterford	226	250
Clare	237	289
Tipperary	419	426

The national total of teams is football 182,406, hurling 96,894, making an overall total for the 32 counties at 279,300 teams.

The figures are for all ages down to under 14 years. With a huge percentage of players playing both hurling and football and a very big portion of the number playing in more than one grade, it would be almost impossible to figure out the actual number of players involved.

## Experimental Rules

When the experimental rules to be introduced for the coming National Leagues were being discussed recently by Central Council, delegates voted against the proposal that players be permitted to lift the ball off the ground with the hands. A couple of delegates made the point that the 'lift' is one of the few remaining skills in the game at the present. Quite a number of people have made the point that lifting the ball is no longer a skill as it is not being executed in accordance with rule. In other words, it is already being lifted off the ground with the hands in the majority of cases and this is being ignored by referees, who are satisfied enough to see a player throwing a foot close to the ball before the pick-up. I believe that there would be nothing wrong with trying it out as an experiment in the league and then allowing Congress to decide on whether it should be adopted for the 1995 championships.

It was interesting to find some strong football counties in favour of picking the ball off the ground, and also to see Martin McHugh, who captained the Donegal team to an All-Ireland victory in 1992, coming out strongly in favour of it.

None of the experimental rules can be tried out in the championships unless Congress 1995 so decides.

## Championship Progress

Because the county senior hurling and football teams will be in action over the coming two week-ends, no games are scheduled until the weekend of July 3. There can be further cancellation of matches, depending on inter-county progress. As the league section of the championships are due to be completed by July 24, it will be necessary for the county fixtures committee to refix a number of the unplayed matches in the league.

In football, for instance, where some clubs have played four rounds, others have played only two or three. Clashmore, who have not been out for almost ten weeks, have played only two games to date in the championship. The play-offs are scheduled for July 31 and there is quite an amount of leeway to be made up if this deadline is to be met.

# Munster Senior Hurling Semi-Final At Thurles

## Waterford Are Outsiders Against Limerick

With both Tipperary and Cork gone out of the Munster championship, the competition is wide open and as a result there is unusual interest in the prospects of Limerick, Clare and Waterford taking the provincial title this year.

With Clare having taken care of Munster champions Tipperary and Limerick having beaten mighty Cork, in first round matches, Waterford must take the role of outsiders. Having to beat both of these before becoming Munster champions is certainly a daunting prospect and we would be very foolish, at this stage, to perceive of it happening, unless we are all completely misreading the form book. It is also wrong, I'm sure, to write about the Munster final at this stage when we have something of a mountain to climb at Thurles next Sunday, before even qualifying for that decider.

When we go to examine the reasons why we are the outsiders against Limerick, we find that they are plentiful enough. Limerick have been showing far better form this year and were pipped for a place in the knockout stages of the league, which they won in 1992. They have beaten us in our last three meetings this year and they have beaten Cork, in the Munster championship first round. By comparison, Waterford who were beaten by Kerry in the Munster championship last year, did very poorly in the league and finished by being relegated. Also according to reports, our preparation has not been going all that well and there has been chopping and changing of the panel since it was first announced. In the last two weeks things have improved in this respect and now an average of 22 are presently at the sessions which are held twice weekly. All this may sound like a sob-story, but we would be foolish not to accept the situation as being a fact.

In working with the panel, the problems facing the selectors were finding replacements for players like Johnnie Brenner, who for reasons explained to the County Board, had opted out of inter-county hurling. Sean Daly emigrated to London and obviously did not de-

clare for Waterford, Jimmy Beresford has decided to retire from inter-county hurling and Stephen Frampton is out because of an ankle injury sustained playing football. Readers will appreciate how difficult it is to replace players of their quality. It might be argued, of course, that of the quartet, we didn't have Brenner, Beresford or Daly when forcing Limerick to a 1-13 all draw in the final match of the National League in Walsh Park on March 20.

Understandably there has been great interest in the selection of the team for Sunday and as usual with so many rumours abounding, there is quite an amount of speculation going about. The selectors announced over the weekend that the team would not be finalised until after training on Monday night. I understand that they were hopeful that Stephen Frampton might be sufficiently recovered to line-out. In nearly all such cases where selectors are awaiting the final report of the fitness of a player, the particular player is found to be fit and the public suspect that the whole idea was just an excuse to delay the announcement of the team. It happens at club level to a lesser extent.

The good news from the camp is that there has been a full turnout of players for the past ten days and the spirit is great, with confidence growing by the hour. This is very heartening news for supporters, very many of whom feel that we can beat Limerick if we 'peak' at the right time. This now seems to be happening with the panel of players available fiercely determined to give it a 'go' at Semple Stadium on Sunday.

One selector said to me that we should forget about the players who are not available and place our confidence in the men who will wear the jersey on Sunday.

For the goalkeeping position, it is down to two players. Ray Sheridan, who was our goalie when we lost to

Kerry by 4-13 to 3-13 in the championship last year and Ray Barry, who was keeper when we drew with Limerick at 1-13 apiece in the league. In defence Damien Byrne will be full-back and he will have Mark O'Sullivan on one side and maybe Frampton, Pat Tobin or Eamon Cullinane on the other. Sean Cullinane, maybe Fergal Hartley and Tony Browne, could be in the half-back line, but Tom Feeney and one or two others could be in contention for places here. Tom Fives will be at centre field and could have Fintan O'Shea or Ger Harris as a partner. Pat Walsh is also a likely contender for a mid-field berth. Paul Flynn, who scored nine points against Limerick in the league, will be given special attention in attack where he will operate with players like Billy O'Sullivan and Brian Greene while Martin Murphy, Kevin Walsh, Mossie O'Keeffe, Paraigh Fanning, John Meaney are others who will be considered.

Limerick's win over Cork has really set Limerick aflame and having achieved their victory in one of the most enthralling Munster first round matches in recent times, they are justifiably fancying their chances of disposing of Waterford en route to a show-down with neighbours Clare in the provincial final in July.

Before giving a final assessment of the Cork/Limerick game, it might be well to ponder on a couple of pertinent questions about the match. In asking ourselves how good were Limerick we must also ask how bad were Cork. My humble opinion is that unless Cork were at least twice as good as they were when they played Wexford in Dungarvan in the opening of the field, they were anything but great. Reportedly it was a great game between the two, but when standards are more or less even in that grade, games are bound to look good.

I write this without taking

from the performances of skillful players like Gary Kirby, who at centre forward contributed a personal total of 2-5, Pat Heffernan, who took a couple of good goals, Mike Galligan, who also figured in the scoring (all their six forwards scored against Cork). Joe Quaid, who was savouring this kind of atmosphere for the first time, brought off three remarkable saves and looked to be as good as his cousin Tommy Quaid, who many times denied us goals that proved costly. Ciaran Carey at mid-field was the player who proved unmanageable for Cork and will also be a thorn in our side as will Dave Clarke, Mike Houlihan and other Limerick players, if allowed the scope which they enjoyed against Cork.

### THE RESULTS?

We are not going out on a mission impossible, as a few of the national scribes seem to believe. On the other hand we are challenging Limerick with a team fiercely determined to win and being convinced that they can win if they all give of their very best for the seventy minutes, who knows what the outcome will be. There is the possibility too that Limerick may have 'peaked' for the game with Cork and a possibility that Waterford, putting all their mediocre form of the last year behind them, will play one of their occasional 'blinders'. If this is the case, we could be going back to Thurles on July 10, for a final against Clare. Who knows!

### PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Going back to 1912 Waterford and Limerick have met on no fewer than 25 occasions and Limerick have won sixteen of these and we took the honours on nine occasions. Our last win was achieved after a hectic finish at Thurles on June 13, 1982, when we held on to a 2-14 to 2-13 lead in one of the most exciting semi-final games played at the famous venue for quite some time. Subsequently we took a hammering from Cork in the final.

In a ten year period after 1933 we met Limerick on six occasions and were beaten on each occasion. In a nine year period from 1957

we met on four occasions and Waterford won all four.

The records of matches involving the counties are interesting. Over our 25 meetings, eight of them were decided by a single score.

There are stories told about a number of our meetings and there are still a few old timers around who can relate the details of these epics.

In 1920 on June 13 we were humiliated in a first round match at Dungarvan when Limerick scored 10-3 and Waterford didn't raise a single flag. That was our greatest hammering in hurling. In 1974, before they became champions, Limerick beat us by a single point (3-12 to 3-11) and eight years later we beat the Shannonsiders by a single point (2-14 to 2-13). One of the famous stories told relate to the 1940

saga when, after playing a draw, Limerick 4-2 Waterford 3-5, they met in Clonmel, they beat us by 3-5 to 3-3 in a game that went way beyond normal time — (someone wrote at the time that the game was well into the fifth quarter before the final whistle was blown) — Waterford had been leading before Mick Mackey's 65th minute free went all the way to the Waterford net, to send our supporters home in a very angry mood.

In 1957, on our way to the All-Ireland final we beat Limerick by 4-12 to 5-5 at the Athletic Grounds, Cork and in 1963, also on our way to Croke Park, we beat them by 2-15 to 3-6 in the semi-final played at Cork.

So despite the statistical imbalance in the records over the years, we did have some splendid victories over Limerick.

# Council Increases Contribution To SERTO

Despite its own financial difficulties, Waterford County Council is to increase from £8,000 to £10,000 the current year's contribution to the South East Tourism Organisation.

The decision was taken at Monday's meeting when the members considered a letter from SERTO's regional manager Mr. Joe Palmer, who disclosed that it would require increased funding from all local authorities in the South East Region if a decision not to operate a tourist information office at Rosslare Harbour this summer was to be reversed.

Mr. Palmer confirmed that there had been widespread and growing dissatisfaction with that decision within the tourist industry. He further confirmed SERTO's own serious financial position with a present accumulated deficit of £160,000.

Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, said that if the Council is to approve the additional funding it would have to come from next year's budget. However if the Rosslare Tourist Office was not opened then a lot of people in Waterford would be wasting their time

trying to promote the industry in the county.

Cllr. Pat Coffey insisted that an extra £2,000 wouldn't "make or break" the Council, but Cllr. Tony Wright warned that next year's budget is already under pressure and it would leave them starting from a very dubious financial base for 1995.

Cllr. Wright said there are a relatively small number of people benefitting greatly from what is known as the "tourism drive", but those very same people were proving to be very bad employers. "I believe the investment in SERTO is a damn bad one", he added.

Finally after other members had expressed reservations, it was agreed to provide the additional £2,000 to SERTO.

However the Council also wants full details as to how the organisation's £160,000 deficit has been accumul-
