Kyne Takes U.D.C. Chair

Labour poll topper Cllr. Billy Kyne was officially presented with the U.D.C. Chairman's chain of office last Monday night at the first annual meeting of the newly elected Dungarvan Urban District Council.

The popular Abbeyside man was unanimously elected to the Chair on the proposal of Cllr. Lar Hart (Labour) and seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan (Fianna Fáil). Outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright (D.L.) welcomed the members of the new council and in particular Waterford County Council members Cllr. Austin Flynn (F.F.) and Cllr. Lar Hart (Labour) who were making their urban council debuts. Cllr. Wright then gave a special welcome to newcomer Damien Dillon (Ind.) who had successfully contested his first ever election as an Independent. While congratulating the new council members, Cllr. Wright also offered his commiserations with those candidates who had failed the difficult hurdle of local elections. On this note Cllr. Michael O'Riordan expressed his regret that Mary Dixon had lost her seat. "I'm sorry to see her lose her seat", he added, "as she was one of the most outstanding councillors".

VICE CHAIR FOR RYAN

Fianna Fáil's Cllr. Nuala Ryan was then unanimously elected Vice Chairperson on the proposal of Cllr. Austin Flynn (F.F.) and seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Ind.). Thanking the council members for their unanimity Cllr. Ryan said she would be

"willing, able and available" during the year to represent the council when the Chairman so wished.

V.E.C. NOMINATIONS

Third item on the new council's agenda was the nomination of 2 members to the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee. The first member to be nominated was Cllr. Paddy Power who was returned to represent the U.D.C. on a proposal by Cllr. Hart and seconded by Cllr. Ryan. The

strong presence of Labour and Fianna Fáil was certainly evident on the night as both parties continued uncontested to capture all top positions in the council. Fianna Fáil's Cllr. Nuala Ryan was not only selected to represent the Council on the V.E.C. on a proposal by Cllr. Kyne and seconded by Cllr. O'Riordan but she was also nominated as the Council's sole representative on the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisa-



tion.

The two delegates nominated to the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland were Cllr. O'Riordan (proposed by Cllr. Ryan and seconded by Cllr. Wright) and Cllr. Kyne (proposed by Cllr. Hart and seconded by Cllr. Ryan).

Robbery At Mooney's Ring

The festive mood over last week-end was marred for Gaeltacht residents by a robbery at the well known Mooney's pub in Ring last Sunday June 19th. A substantial amount of cash and jewellery were taken from a safe in the private quarters of the building between 6.30 p.m. and 7.15 p.m.

Proprietor Ann Gough said the pub had been very busy at that hour of the evening and they had, therefore, noticed nothing untoward until she had looked in the safe for cash later in the evening.

Dungarvan Gardaí are currently investigating the robbery and are appealing to

anyone with information regarding suspicious vehicles or persons seen in the area on that night to contact the Dungarvan Gardaí at Tel 058/42370.

CHURCH DOOR FORCED

Dungarvan Gardaí are also investigating a break-in at the Protestant Church on

Convent Street which was reported at 9 a.m. on Sunday June 19th and believed to have happened on the night of 18th/19th. No damage was reported except for the forced door and no goods were stolen.

A further crime was reported over the week-end when a car was broken into at Western Terrace in the early hours of June 18. The crime is believed to have happened at 3.25 p.m. and some tapes were stolen. Dungarvan Gardaí are following a definite line of enquiry.

Successful Year For Technical College

The director of the Health Science course at Dungarvan Technical College, Paudie Geary, has reported yet another successful job placement year for the college's Health Science/Nursing studies course.

Having ended earlier this month, 27 of the original 49 students have successfully been placed in nurse training positions and the course director is confident that many of the remaining students will be successfully placed in the next few months.

In relation to the Pre-Nursing course, three most significant developments occurred during the past year.

Students on the course sat for the new National Vocational Certificate examinations in Health Science organised by the N.C.V.A. (National Council for Vocational Awards). Dungarvan Technical College students did exceptionally well in these examinations and this will further enhance the outstanding reputation of the Pre-Nursing Course.

The Regional Health Boards this year announced that students applying for nurse training in the public

hospitals will now need only to make one central application. This is a sensible and welcome development as it will cut down on students having to make multiple applications to ten different health boards. It is now to be hoped that the private hospitals will follow this good example by establishing a National Central Applications System for nurse training.

The 3rd significant development in relation to the Pre-Nursing Course is that An Bord Altranais have agreed to continue the practice whereby students can combine results from two Leaving Certificates to obtain the necessary qualifications for entry to nurse training.


Finally Mr. Geary reports that Carl O'Dalaigh is leaving the post of Chief Executive of the N.C.V.A. having been promoted to the post of Deputy Chief Inspector with responsibility for Post Pri-

mary Education. "We would like to take this opportunity to congratulate him and to thank him for the excellent work he has put in over the past two years in establishing the N.C.V.A. and developing a significant and exciting new development in Irish Education. Over the next couple of years Ireland is going to see the results of his hard work and dedication in the development of a truly national system of certification for Post Leaving Certificate courses", Mr. Geary stated.

Co. Waterford V.E.C. Meeting

NEW MEMBER WELCOMED

Attending his first Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee meeting last Monday was the newly selected Ring man, Liam O Suipeil who was warmly received by the 16 member strong committee.

V.E.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne welcomed the Colaiste na Rinne manager and spoke of the wealth of experience the Manann resident had to offer the V.E.C. committee and the important linkage his Gaeltacht seat represents.

The date has now been set for the meeting of the architect selection panel, the group which is to appoint a suitable architect for the proposed £1 million - plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College.

PADRAIG O FIANNUSA SCHOLARSHIP

The first winner of the recently established Scoilreacht, i gCuimhne Padraig O Fiannusa was disclosed by C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan at this month's meeting of the Co. Waterford V.E.C.

A pupil of St. Declan's Community School in Kilmacthomas, Eilish de Barra

was awarded the memorial scholarship in due recognition of her excellence in the Irish language at the committee's school.

This annual scholarship to the Ring Gaeltacht was founded by the Co. Waterford V.E.C. earlier this year to commemorate the work done for the Irish language and culture by one of the committee's longest serving Irish teachers, Padraig O Fiannusa.

OUTMODED COMPUTER SYSTEM

In his monthly report to the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee last Monday, C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan informed members of the 'obsolete' computer system currently operating at the committee's school in Kilmacthomas.

Vice-Principal of St. Declan's Community School, Sean Ahearn, has been in touch with the C.E.O. stating that the schools Parents Council had agreed to raise the £21,000 amount needed to bring the schools 12 year old computer system into the 90's.

Described by the C.E.O. as a dedicated and hard working committee, the Parents Council already raised £30,000 in a previous venture to finance new playing facilities for the Kilmac School. It was then unanimously agreed by the V.E.C. members to allow the Parents Council to proceed with their fundraising efforts and to accept the new future computer system as a gift to the V.E.C. which they in return will install and maintain.

It pays to keep the garden tidy



BY mid June you will remember that summer is a double-edged sword, sharpening garden growth but making pests and disease keener.

So you must strike the first blow by keeping the garden tidy — debris lying around or dead foliage and flower heads left on plants not only looks scruffy but encourages pests.

In any case, dead-heading flowers before blooms go to seed will usually encourage the plant to channel more energy into fresh blooms.

The best known beneficiaries are roses. Check your stock at least weekly and use secateurs to snip away dying blooms and trailing twigs down to the next buds — you will soon get fresh blooms.

Heath species such as lavender and heather even benefit from a light trim with shears, but only new growth — avoid cutting established material or a 'short back and sides' will take time to grow back.

Trimming fading flowers from annuals can also help prolong flowering, as in the case of marigolds, and will keep rot and disease from your growing stock.

While it is late in the season for them now, flowering azaleas and rhododendrons also benefit from old blooms being removed: a practised twist of the wrist allows new buds below to come through.

Still on a tidiness theme, you may be 'browned off' at the sight of tangled and scruffy brown foliage left by spring bulbs.

While you don't have to lift them unless you want to use the same beds for summer plants, it is sometimes worth doing so if they have been in the ground for several years and become overcrowded.

Wait until the leaves are good and brown and then gently lift with a fork before:

- removing dead top growth
- laying the bulbs to dry somewhere warm, dry and aired — a greenhouse is ideal
- rubbing off sticky soil and teasing away loose skin from the dried bulbs
- trimming root
- storing for planting in the autumn — but make sure they are all completely dry or rot may spoil the whole batch
- placing in trays, sacking or paper bags with holes punched in them. These should be placed in a cool, airy spot but not so dry that the bulbs shrink and crumble away.

Turning back to the current season, you may see some plants racing away in the summer warmth and looking a little ragged. Taller ones can only look scruffy, but may be seriously damaged by sudden gusts.

These must be supported before they soar too high: use a cane for each or surround a clump with several sticks and draw them in securely using twine. If the job is done early, such aids will soon be obscured by foliage.

Oh Yes, To Pork Au Vin



PORK AU VIN

Ingredients

450g (1lb) pork cubed
4 rashers rindless back bacon chopped
3x15ml sp (3tbsp) plain flour
1x15ml sp (1tbsp) oil
1 clove garlic, crushed
300ml (1/2 pt) red wine
450ml (3/4 pt) stock
1 bouquet garni
20 button onions, whole salt and black pepper

225g (8oz) button mushrooms, whole

Method

Coat the pork in the flour. Heat the oil in an oven-proof casserole and brown the pork. Add the bacon and garlic and cook for 2-3 minutes. Stir in the wine, stock, bouquet garni, onions and seasoning. Cover and cook in a preheated oven (Gas mark 3, 170°C or 325°F) for 1 hour. Add mushrooms, cover and cook for a further 15 minutes, or until meat is tender and sauce has thickened. Serve with boiled potatoes and green vegetables. Serves 4.



PUBLIC CONCERN FOR CONSERVATION

United Farmers Association in conjunction with O'Sullivan & Co., Agricultural Consultants, Carrick-on-Suir, held a well attended public information meeting in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Monday, June 13th last.

The purpose of this meeting was to set out the parameters and implementation rules of the recently launched Rural Environment Protection Scheme (R.E.P.S.). Mr. Martin O'Sullivan and Mr. Edmond

Connolly spoke on all aspects of the scheme and gave further clarification by way of answers to questions from farmers present.

The objectives of the Scheme are to establish farming practices and con-

trolled production methods which reflect the increasing public concern for conservation, landscape protection and wider environmental problems, to protect wildlife habitat and endangered species of flora and fauna and to produce quality food in an extensive and environmentally friendly manner.

Farmers who wish to avail of the scheme will have to submit a detailed plan drawn up by Teagasc or other approved agencies. An annual payment of approximately £50 per acre to maximum £5,000 will be paid for five years to applicants who implement specified conditions.

Mr. Paddy Phelan, Nat. President U.F.A., who chaired the meeting, expressed disappointment that farmers share of commonage could not be included when calculating eligible acreage for the scheme and said that U.F.A. would be asking the Minister to align the scheme with Area Aid acreage.

MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP

Most if not all of our members travelled to Thurles last Sunday for the Waterford v. Limerick Senior Hurling Championship. Not for the first time we came home disappointed. AN INTERESTING BOOK

Over the week-end a friend kindly supplied me with a copy of a new book by local man Brendan Kiely. Brendan is son of Alice and the late Danny Kiely, Green Street. He is a graduate of U.C.C. and is at present employed in Dublin.

His attractively bound paperback is entitled "The Connery's" and deals with the exploits of the three brothers in the early part of the 19th century. The legend of the Connery's is fairly well known, especially so in their native Bohadon and the Touraneena area. To his credit Brendan doesn't attempt to over glamorise them or their exploits. Instead he has attempted to obtain some historical detail from the meager supply available. This, of course, involved painstaking research, for instance he quotes from three Waterford Newspapers of the time i.e. Cronicle, Mail and Mirror -

"The fame of the Connery's rested mainly in their efforts at trying to achieve better conditions for the tenant farmers but also in their extraordinary ability to evade arrest even though they were being hounded day and night with substantial rewards being offered for information as to their whereabouts".

While on the run they were known to have been in Cappoquin several times and were finally captured at Kilclogher a few miles on the Dungarvan side of the town. They may or may not have been betrayed, the author can only speculate but on balance it would seem that somebody was tempted by the reward money. Their trial, such as it was, took place in Waterford where the judge handed what he considered to be a lenient sentence — fourteen years transportation to New South Wales.

In this short review we can only give the barest details. There is so much,

much more to it. It will give a great insight to those interested in local history as well as those whose hobby is reading.

We would like to congratulate Brendan for compiling such a valuable work before all traces of such an amazing story disappeared for ever.



CO. WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

Mr. John Cusack, County Chairman, said that ICMSA have called for the immediate introduction of a new Programme for the Control of Farmyard Pollution. He said it is ludicrous that on the one hand the REPS Scheme has been launched while on the other there is still no Farmyard Pollution Scheme in operation.

"Unless a new Programme for the Control of Farmyard Pollution is introduced, farmers will not be able to maintain the current level of pollution control, let alone make more progress under the REPS Scheme.

"The greatest obstacle standing in the way of farmers participating in the REPS is the inadequacy of pollution control facilities on many farms. One of the principal measures which farmers must put in place

under the REPS is a waste storage and management plan. The fact that the Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme was suspended in April 1992 and has not been reintroduced is a major stumbling block in this respect," said the County Chairman.

He added that without a new Scheme for the Control of Farmyard Pollution, most farmers cannot proceed with necessary buildings. The Chairman said ICMSA have called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, to provide the necessary funding to relaunch the Scheme for the Control of Farmyard Pollution as soon as possible. It is also important that the new Scheme should provide a higher grant rate for smaller farmers as the cost of the

necessary work could be prohibitive.

Meanwhile, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, to make payments of the first two advances to the ewe premium for 1994 available to farmers in one single payment.

"Farmers have experienced one of the worst winters in living memory and ewe and lamb losses have been high on many farms. Coupled with this, the very late Spring has resulted in sheep farmers running up large bills for concentrate feed and for additional winter forage.

"Payment of the first two advances of the ewe premium as a single payment, as was the case in 1993, would

be an enormous benefit to farmers in helping to cover these costs.

"The payment of the first two advances of the ewe premium in a single payment is entirely within the discretion of the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry. Payment would be a recognition of the extra hardship endured by sheep farmers as a result of the bad weather and would be much appreciated by all sheep farmers," concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

IFA Call On Lamb Factories To Resist French Price Pressure

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan, has called on the Irish lamb factories to unite in holding out against negative lamb price pressure from French importers at a time when UK prices are still significantly above Irish levels.

Mr. Coughlan said that with UK lamb prices the equivalent of 125p/lb IR, the only real competition in France is among our own factories. "With a strong united approach our factories should be able to resist lower prices from France in the pipeline for next week."

Mr. Coughlan also expressed concern regarding the number of underfinished lambs being sold. "To maximise returns farmers should be targeting a live weight of between 37 to 41 kg. for a carcase weight of 17 kgs to 19 kgs.

IFA Man Clarifies Revenue's Attitude to 1% Reduced Rate Stamp Duty

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has said that the Revenue Commissioners had confirmed to IFA that they will accept any documents of transfer of land for stamping under the new 1% reduced Stamp Duty rate for young farmers even though they have not yet issued formal guidelines on the operation of the new scheme.

The IFA man said he had found it necessary to seek such a clarification from Revenue because it had been brought to his attention that some solicitors were not forwarding land transfer documents in the

absence of the formal guidelines. The Revenue Commissioners have given me an absolute assurance that, subject to verification of the details, they will accept documents for stamping under the reduced rate scheme for young farmers. There is no reason for young, trained farmers under 35 years of age at the date of submission to delay any further in forwarding the appropriate legal papers to the Revenue."

The IFA man pointed out that the reduced rate of 1% Stamp Duty, which applies only to qualified young farmers, applies from January 7, 1994 onwards.

Delay In Payment Of Headage —

ESTABLISH APPEALS PROCEDURE

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan, recently said that the delay in headage and premia payments to farmers is a national disgrace. He said that some farmers are still waiting for payments on foot of applications made in January 1993 — one and a half years ago. How can the Minister continue to sit idly by and preside over a Department with such a poor payment record, says Mr. Ryan.

"For the Minister to say that all but a handful of cases with problems have yet to be paid is not acceptable. If there are problems, and I'm not saying that all unpaid cases are problem cases, it should not take 18 months to resolve even the most complex cases.

"I am aware of applications for premium made in January 1993 which were only submitted to the payment office in January

1994, and now some six months later further queries have come back to local offices. If a professional person/body took six months to register a query on a file then they would not remain in business for very long. I believe the Minister has some serious questions to answer about the efficiency of his Department", said Mr. Ryan.

ESTABLISH FORMAL APPEALS PROCEDURE NOW

Mr. Ryan called on the Minister to honour the Government commitment in the Programme for Competitiveness and work to establish a formal appeals procedure to deal with individual complaints which had exhausted existing procedures.

"The Minister should now establish this appeals procedure without further delay as there are many cases which remain unresolved," concluded Mr. Ryan.

Occupiers' Liability — Many Problems To Be Resolved

"There are still many problems to be resolved in the area of Occupiers' Liability", said Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA, after a meeting recently with Mr. M. Taylor, T.D., Minister for Equality and Law Reform.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that two principal areas remain unresolved. Under the Law Reform Commission recommendations an unacceptably wide definition applies to 'visitor'.

The second main area of concern is the proposed special duty of care which farmers would have to persons who have rights to enter farmland — these would include persons

using rights of way.

Mr. O'Dwyer continued, "the ICMSA objective is to reduce farmers liability and not to increase it. Under the recommendations from the Law Reform Commission, the definition of visitor is so wide that it is difficult to describe a person who would not be included in the 'visitor' category, if the recommendations form the basis of the legislation.

"I am pleased that Minister Taylor acknowledged our concerns and that he undertook to take account of these when formulating draft legislation."

Minister Taylor informed the ICMSA delegation that

the treatment of child trespassers will depend on the advice from the Attorney General which he is awaiting.

"While the ICMSA impressed on Minister Taylor the desirability of introducing the new Bill without undue delay, the most important issue was that its contents would confine the occupiers special duty of care to a clearly identified category of persons whom the ICMSA proposed would be described as 'invited'.

"The last thing we want is a result which would require continuing court cases to clarify the legislation," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

pointment. However he was appointed (democratic procedures hadn't a great deal to do with it) a great day's work was done because he has certain qualities which the manager of any team (any Waterford team) must have. Those who sanctioned and supported him have shown us the pathway to success.

If you think that I'm about to canonize Jack you're wrong because I don't like Jack Charlton, the man, very much. He's gruff, autocratic, tetchy, over sensitive, impatient and downright rude at times. But Jack the manager is a role model for anyone who aspires to his job or to a similar position within our country or county - the county team manager for instance.

If we in Waterford had one of Charlton's calibre in charge of even one of our county teams we could look forward to happy days. We would have a man (any chance a woman?) of frankness and honesty, highly organised; a man who loves the game, knows it thoroughly, knows what he needs to do, who to select, where to place them most advantageously, a man of clear vision who doesn't waste his time with mindless waffle. He wouldn't suffer fools gladly or even patiently and he would be utterly honest, loyal and truthful with his players. He couldn't operate effectively without support, of course, support and co-operation from the County and Divisional Boards in matters of understanding, resources and materials. Above all he would be spared from the disruptive interfering busybody or know-all. The Boards' attitude to him would be: what does he need and how can we help him to fulfil his mission. Nothing is more certain to

fail than the good manager burdened and frustrated by two or more bone-heads, encumbrances which will undermine his enthusiasm, his status and credibility.

The G.A.A. hierarchy has always been deeply suspicious and uneasy about anyone given power, some of their power as they see it. That is understandable because they are entitled to wish to exercise control over selectors, a sub committee of the Board after all.

What is equally clear is that the well-tryed system of allowing County Board to nominate selectors/managers, with all the attendant canvassing and infighting, has failed. The Dublin/Derry/Donag/Kildare system is far more likely to be effective and the results are there to see.

Notice how Meath have regained their former place at the top despite the loss of most of the stars of 1987-1991 team. Their manager. Who else but Sean Boylan, proven winner. Who is with him? Two of Royal County's brightest stars, All Ireland captains, experienced knowledgeable. There's creditability there and integrity. Is it any wonder that Meath are impressive National League champions with a well-balanced team comprising a sprinkling of seasoned campaigners and young, fast maturing lions like Giles, Murphy, Geraghty and McGuinness. Those of Meath's management trio are comrades-in-arms of many a stern test, are good friends and are on the same wavelength. They enjoy the full confidence of their county and more importantly, of their County Board. Compatible souls.

This matter of compatibility of selectors was one neatly encapsulated by a local character at a meeting in Tallow one night when the matter under discussion most certainly wasn't hurling. Dan's statement was as valid and applicable to our subject as it was to the particular topic before the meeting. "Mr. Chairman", he intoned, "you can't put a pigeon and a cat in one cage".

Would it be any harm to

remember that principle when selection committees are being formulated for next year?

PUBLIC LIGHTING

Cllr. W. McDonnell has received the following from County Engineer John O'Flynn.

I refer to the Notice of Motion moved by you at the Council Meeting on 13th inst. "At the request of the Knockanore/Glendine/Kilwatermoy Community Council that Waterford Co. Council erect public lighting at Knockanore and Ballydasoon, Lackaroe, Youghal".

KNOCKANORE

The existing lighting at Knockanore consists of 1 No. light only near the Church entrance. In our view 4 additional lights are necessary in the area at the following locations, (a) near the Health Centre, (b) near the National School, (c) opposite Pub, (d) at the top of the Village (past the shop). The approximate cost of 4 no. new 55 Watt Sox Lanterns on existing poles would be about £650. Of the foregoing the priority areas would we feel be near the School and opposite the Pub and the cost of these two would be £325 i.e. £163 per light.

BALLYDASOON

There is no existing public lighting at Ballydasoon. The location consists of a cluster of about 10 No. houses, some situated on the regional road R.634 from Tallow to Youghal and the remainder on and adjoining the county road. There is no Church, School or Shops at this location although there is a sharp bend on the regional road and the road junction. To light this location would take 4 new 135 Watt Sox Lanterns at an estimated cost of £1,120.

I regret that there is no

funding for either location in the 1994 Council Estimates and even if there was I feel that Knockanore merits priority over Ballydasoon. As stated at the Council Meeting the only way that these lights can be funded is by way of local contribution towards the capital cost of same. If this is forthcoming the lights will be provided.





MUNSTER HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP SEMI-FINAL

Wasted Chances Prove Costly

**LIMERICK 2-14
WATERFORD 2-12**

Waterford's battle for a place in the Munster senior hurling final failed disappointingly at Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday last when we lost by just two points to a battling Limerick side, who had obviously benefitted a lot from their first round match against Cork two weeks earlier.

Our forwards wasted some fine chances, particularly during a 20 minute period in the second half when our defence held Limerick scoreless, but ironically, it was through a defensive error on our part, that Limerick's Gary Kirby was allowed in for a goal, which proved a killer, just on half-time. In the opinion of many at the game, this score made all the difference between winning and losing, as it came within a minute of our first goal which was sent in by Billy O'Sullivan in the 33rd minute.

Waterford controlled the game for a long period in the second half, but with only four points to show, our control was worth far less than it deserved. During this period we had Lim-

erick on the run and our failure to capitalise proved our undoing in the end.

Although the standard dropped somewhat in the second half, it was a period of tremendous excitement as the two very evenly matched sides battled for the score that would send the winners to the provincial final. A relieved Limerick were the winners on the day, but Waterford showed how little there is between any of the Munster teams. Fullback, Damien Byrne said after the game that we have a young team well capable of improvement and we will be back. This statement echoed the sentiment of all Waterford people present at the game on Sunday.

PLAY

Waterford played against

the strong breeze and within a minute Tony Browne was wide but a minute later Ger Harris made no mistake and opened the scoring with a splendid point. Both sides had wides, before T. J. Ryan equalised for Limerick in the 4th minute. Billy O'Sullivan put Waterford back in front a minute later, but Frankie Carroll had the sides level again in the 6th minute. Paul Flynn had two wides before Mike Galligan sent Limerick into a point lead.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Footballers Well Beaten

CLARE 4-14 WATERFORD 1-6

Waterford junior footballers travelled to Ennis grounds on Wednesday evening last and were very well beaten by a well-prepared Clare side who had the match well and truly sewn up when the three-quarter stage was reached.

Because of certain circumstances, it was good that Waterford were able to field at all as up until the previous Wednesday no selectors were in place and, therefore, there was no organised training and the side which did eventually represent us was hastily assembled and the selectors were not familiar with a number of the players who lined out.

Coisde na Peil were unable to get a committee to act. They in fact had declared themselves in favour of withdrawing because we were not allowed to field our second best team, which we had been allowed to do in previous years. Only six days before the game, Coisde Gnotha requested Michael Burke, Dungarvan, Michael Harney, Newtown, and Kevin Curran, An Rinn, to act as selectors and having agreed they set about mustering a side drawn from all junior and intermediate clubs.

In the circumstances they did very well to have a side ready for the Ennis game. Limerick who had ex-

pressed their annoyance at not being allowed to field second best, withdrew from the Munster championships. For the same reasons, Clare withdrew last year. This year Clare defeated Tipperary, rather surprisingly and qualified for a semi-final game with us.

Despite the circumstances, Waterford did not do all that badly and were still in the game with a chance at half-time. Waterford were first to score when Carthach MacCraith pointed a 20 metre free in the first minute. Carthach, in fact got every one of the Waterford scores, including the goal from a second half penalty. This is not altogether unique that a player would get all our scores in an intercounty game. It was also achieved by Eoin O'Brien in a football league game. Interestingly enough, while doing some research on our football records for an upcoming event, I recently came across an account of a championship game (which was also against Clare) and in which Carthach's father Nioclas MacCraith scored a

total of 1-7. I think he came on as a sub on the occasion.

DECIDED

The halftime score at Ennis on Wednesday last was 1-9 to 0-4 and at the end of the third quarter Clare were 2-13 to 0-4 in front and the semi-final was decided. Of last year's team, only Pat Dunford,

Emmetts and Eamonn Crotty, Ring, were on the team.

COMMENT

Less than half the counties play in the junior football championship and there is a strong volume of support for those who wish to have it abolished altogether. Limerick pulled out this year and have declared themselves in favour of staying out. Clare might adopt a similar policy after they have been hammered by Kerry in the Munster final. Waterford would need to take a serious look at their position and take an early decision about their future in this very low profile championship. It certainly looks to me to be a complete waste of time, energy and money having a team in the championship while the

likes of Kerry can play all senior players on their junior team, because of the system they have for playing their championships. (Players who field on divisional teams in the Kerry senior football championship, are eligible to play in Munster junior football championship).

If we decide to persevere and remain in, then I believe that we should forget about the home and away agreements and play our matches at a neutral venue. Ennis is well over 200 miles of a round trip for some of our players and having to endure this kind of hardship to play a mid-week match (at 8 p.m.) is a form of madness.

Post Match Comments

Mickey Byrne (former Tipperary defender) "Waterford beat Waterford to-day"; Murty Ryan, (brother of famous 'Sweeper' Ryan, former Tipperary great) said "Ye had it for the taking, but ye left it behind"; Tom Cheasty "We shouldn't have let them get that goal before half-time. It was that, that beat us and the referee didn't do us any favours". Tommy Boland (Limerickman and chairman of the Munster Council) "The four-leaved shamrock was with us today. We were poked". Con. Murphy, Cork; "Waterford had their chances of winning and didn't take them". Limerick team-manager Tom Ryan, told John A. Murphy of the "Cork Examiner" "Waterford had the winning of the game right up to the final whistle. They came at us as we expected they would. It was the excellence of our defence which saw us through. Some of our star players were neutralised to-day. This Waterford team cannot be too far away from a major breakthrough".

Western Board Meeting

The Western Board will meet at Lawlor's Hotel, on to-night, Wednesday at 8.30 p.m. The meeting will deal with a number of referee's reports and review championship progress.

Munster Semi-Final Tickets

A limited number of stand tickets for the Cork versus Kerry football semi-final, at Pairc Ui Caoimh on Sunday next, are available for those wishing to travel. Many people regard this game as being the Munster final. Application for tickets should be made to Western Board Treasurer, Tony Morrissey before Friday.

County Board Meeting

Eamon O Murchu, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the County Board. It was another long session, taking four hours to dispose of the business listed for attention.

The matter of the censure of the Munster Council representative, Jimmy O'Gorman, was not dealt with as I reported last week, even though about 35 minutes was devoted to the Chairman's decision to defer the matter.

ADMISSION PASSES

Michael Mernin, Geraldines, asking about the issue of official passes to the games, said that he had umpired 82 matches last year, had done considerable travelling at his own expense and was now expected to pay £30 to have his pass renewed. He also spoke about a recent problem experienced by referee John Kelly and himself in getting into Walsh Park to officiate at a senior hurling game.

The County Chairman stated that the Board had taken a decision on the matter of admission passes and that officers as well as all others would be expected to pay the £30. This was an effort to get the message across to people that there would be no free entry to our games in future.

FRAHER FIELD

Nioclás Mac Craith reported on progress with the development programme and said that the drainage of the showgrounds and other work would soon be undertaken. He told members that the sale of stand seats was being examined by the Field Committee and this matter would be discussed

with an Coisde Gnotha before making a final recommendation to the County Board.

He said that Munster Council were aware of these discussions and looked favourably on the idea. He said it was hoped to have the scoreboard in place for the Munster under-21 football final on July 13.

Christy O'Brien, Lismore complained about the loss of hurling balls at matches because the protective netting was not in place behind the goals. He was informed that this was also in hand and the work would be done as soon as possible.

James Tobin complained about players from his club being charged to go into a match at Fraher Field after they had returned from playing a championship match in Abbeyside. He said that the second game at Fraher Field was in progress and they were expected to pay the full admission fee. He pointed out that he was not blaming the stilemen, but he thought that in such circumstances an arrangement should be in place to facilitate players.

Nioclás Mac Craith outlined problems relating to availability of Fraher Field for county team training and said the Field Committee found themselves in a dilemma in trying to accommodate all applicants. With the number of games being played there and county teams requiring the grounds for challenge matches, there was no room for training sessions. He said the field committee wished to know if they, or the County Board, were the authority in the matter of deciding when and under what conditions the

field would be made available to applicants.

The County Board decided that as the Field Committee were the caretakers on behalf of the Board, they would have the authority to decide on such matters.

Another matter relating to control at Fraher Field was also discussed and this concerned the control of young children in the stand area and also of people running up and down the sideline during matches and sometimes making unauthorised incursions onto the field. The Field Committee and Coisde Gnotha will have discussions on the subject and come back to County Board with recommendations.

FINANCE

County Treasurer, James Walsh gave an update on the financial position of the Board and reported that gate receipts were up and improving. Having given a team-by-team costing of preparation for the Munster championships, he advised that expenses, or some aspects of them, should be carefully monitored and without interfering with training, etc., be kept in check.

He thanked the clubs for not pressing for monies due to them at the moment and said their co-operation was appreciated. Our share of the National League was overdue and should shortly be received.

SPONSORSHIP

The Chairman informed the meeting about the Tedcastle Oils sponsorship of the county hurling teams for the coming year and having thanked the firm for their interest and generosity, he

paid tribute to P. S. O Riain, Chairman, Western Board for his role in the negotiations which brought about the agreement. He also thanked Waterford Crystal for their generous sponsorship and for donating the trophies which were awarded on the occasion of the opening of Fraher Field. He impressed the importance of supporting our sponsors in every way possible.

In reply to a delegate the Chairman stated that Waterford Foods had informed the Board that they would not be sponsoring the county teams in the present year, as they had done during the past two. It was pointed out that Waterford Foods are still engaged in sponsorship with the Western Board and with aspects of underage activity.

ALL IRELAND TICKETS

When the meeting was informed that there will be a 25% reduction in our allocation of stand tickets and a 10% reduction of terrace tickets for this year, because the Cusack Stand is not finished, it was decided to set up a select committee who will devise a formula for distribution to clubs and members. Their recommendations will be submitted to the July meeting of the Board.

There should be a considerable increase in our ticket allocation for 1995. The reduction of terrace tickets is because of a decision of the Dublin Fire Officer and Safety Committee who felt that the "spill-over" of patrons on to the sideline for last year's football All Ireland was due to overcrowding of the Canal End terrace.

MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Munster Council delegate told the meeting that our minor hurling semi-final championship match against Tipperary will be played at Fermoy as part of a double-header on Wednesday, June 29. It will be played at 8 p.m. after the Cork versus Limerick semi-final which will be played at 6.30 p.m. at the same venue and will be refereed by Pat Moore.

Kerry have withdrawn from the minor hurling championship and allowed Tipperary through while Cork have beaten Clare in their first round match. Some delegates were not happy with the starting time of our match, while others thought it a good idea to play both semi-finals on the same programme.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

This report told the meeting that there will be an increase of £500 to all counties from the National League sponsorship and that the minimum amount paid from the sponsorship to all counties will be £2,000.

Also, all counties are to receive a special promotional grant of £500 for underage activity including summer camps, etc.

APPEAL

There was an unusual background to an appeal lodged by Kill club against a decision of the Eastern Board in ordering a replay of a junior hurling game involving Kill and Ferrybank and which was played at Kill. The circumstances, as outlined in the appeal, stated that with time running

out, a free was awarded to Ferrybank and in response to a question by the taker of the free, the referee said Ferrybank were a point behind. When the free was scored and the match over, the referee informed both teams that the match was a draw.

Fifteen minutes later, the referee, having rechecked his notebook, found that Kill had won the match by a single point.

When the report came before the Eastern Board it was adopted after some discussion, but subsequently on a vote of the delegates at the meeting, a replay was decided on.

The submission made by Kill was the referee's report named them as winners and the report was properly adopted, therefore they were within their rights in claiming the game. Kill were represented by Tom Power and John Regan, Chairman and Secretary respectively, and the Eastern Board represented by Frankie Cullinane, Chairman and Denis Hanrahan, Secretary. After some discussion on the matter, the Chairman ruled that he had no option but to uphold the appeal and award the match to Kill.

REFEREE'S REPORT

The referee's report of the intermediate hurling championship match between Ballydurn and Ballysaggart which was played at Leamybrien in April was a very lengthy document and gave rise to an amount of discussion before it was deferred to the next meeting to allow both clubs to be represented. Quite a number of players were named in the report by referee John Murphy.

Senior Footballers Take On Tipperary At Thurles

The Munster championship meeting between Waterford and Tipperary at Semple Stadium on Sunday, overshadows all other activity in the county and while the footballers do not expect the same support that was given to the hurlers on last Sunday, they are nevertheless hopeful of having a big following at the venue when they take on favourites, Tipperary whose football base has in recent times, shifted from Clonmel to Thurles.

The activities of the footballers have been obscured by the hurlers over the past several weeks and while the big ball men have been doing their own thing quietly and with very little publicity, I understand that preparation has been moving along nicely. Before this the footballers, players and selectors were having quite a rough ride and were beset with all kinds of problems. Throughout the winter and the national league they did not get the degree of co-operation that they were entitled to. Having to play a national football league game against Wicklow on the same afternoon on

which we played our county senior football final, created problems for them and the occasions on which certain players did not make themselves available, were also contributing factors. In the last several weeks, things have improved and the attendance at training has been satisfactory. A number of practice and challenge games have been played and they have also had a couple of trials against the County under 21 team. On Wednesday evening last the squad travelled to Pairc Ui Caoimh where they were very decisively beaten by Cork, who play Kerry on next Sunday

in Cork.

The team is not expected to be selected before Monday or Tuesday of this week and if available, will be published elsewhere in this issue.

Tom Brennan, our regular 'keeper, is likely to be the choice again, but the County Under 21 goalie Kieran Cullinane, who is playing brilliantly at the moment is on the panel and may be considered.

Tom Walsh, Nire, who was full-back in the game against Tipperary at Walsh Park in our first round game, is not with the panel in training, so his place will likely be taken by one of the regular defenders, such as Don Mahon, Darrell Donnelly, Michael Fitzgerald, each of whom has played at full back on the team during the national league. Michael Fitzgerald may be the ultimate choice. Others in defence will be Martin Sheehan, Michael O'Brien, Pat Walsh, if available, Fintan O'Brien, Bobby Lyons and Liam Dalton, if not played in attack. Ger Walsh and Dan Casey were our midfielders against Tipperary at Walsh Park last year, but throughout the league they have experimented quite a lot in this sector and we have seen Eamon Cullinane, Liam Dalton, Ian Kiely and one or two others perform there

from time to time. In attack, Waterford will have players like Jimmy Maher, Pierric Whyte, Roger Power, Eoin O'Brien, Tom Gough, Peter Ferncombe, Morrie Ferncombe, Joe Murray, Ger Power, Derek Kiely, etc. to choose from.

The panel of players has been so unsteady throughout the league, that our speculation about the likely line-out, can be proved to be very wide of the mark. Tipperary, on the other hand have been able to persist with practically the same panel of players that played in the championship last year, for the entire league.

In fact on May 15th last when they defeated the hot favourites, Clare by 2-8 to 0-13, they fielded 12 of the team which defeated us in the championship at Walsh Park last year. Ten were played in the same position.

Peter Lambert, who plays his club football with Nemo Rangers and who has been a thorn in our side on more occasions than we care to remember will again be relied upon by Tipperary to lead them through to a Munster final and compensate in some way for the failure of their hurlers this year. Lambert scored 2-4 against Clare in the championship. Anthony Crosse, newcomer B. Cummins, John Owens, and John Costello are among the other Tipperary players

whom we will have to worry about on Sunday. With the efforts of people like former referee John Moloney and others, football has taken on a new image in Tipperary and their county team have begun to attract a big following, where ever they play, so with this added to the fact that they have home advantage, they will certainly

outnumber us in the stands. We should have good support as well, in spite of the problems that we have had to contend with in this code over the past nine or ten months. Anyway there should not be any traffic problems like we had after the game last Sunday when it took some motorists an hour to get back into the town from the stadium.

van U.D.C. should continue to be held on the 3rd Monday of every month. The usual 8.15 p.m. start, however, was strongly criticised by both Cllr. O'Riordan and Cllr. Wright who agreed that a 7.30 p.m. start would be a more sensible and businesslike time to begin with the urban proceedings.

GREAT HONOUR

Concluding the inaugural meeting of the council, the newly elected Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne predicted a lifetime of at least 5 years for the new Urban Council, which would he said, see them on the verge of the new millennium.

Proudly taking up his new position, Cllr. Kyne said it was a great honour for him to be elected Chairman, a position he last held in 1985. The Labour councillor them complimented outgoing Chairman Cllr. Wright on his "successful and busy year of office".

KICKSTART DEVELOPMENT

With the advent of the Urban Renewal Programme in August, Cllr. Kyne believed that this announcement will kickstart necessary development and building in

the town. Important as it is to encourage such progress, he said, it must be ensured at local and national level that the downstream effect of job creation is monitored. Cllr. Kyne also said that it is now time for job target figures to be checked, to see where these jobs are created. Of even greater importance, was that job quality should be further prioritised, he stated.

He added, "too many jobs created are highly exploited jobs - poor with no security and low pay". He went on "Dungarvan has a proud trade union tradition and it's time those workers, at the mercy of poor conditions are recruited into trade union labour". Hoping to add considerably to the progress already made regarding Dungarvan Technical College and St. Josephs Hospital, during his chairmanship Cllr. Kyne also spoke of the town Clerk's impending retirement and the arrival of a new County Manager. As Chairman, he promised to do his utmost to uphold the standard of council services during the transition period. "We will face all challenges united together for the good of all" he promised.

Call For E.C. Recognition Of Irish

Comhairle Pobail na Rinne, one of the community development groups based in the Waterford Gaeltacht has added its weight to the demand that Irish be accepted as a full working language of the E.C.

In 1973, when Britain, Ireland and Denmark joined the E.C., Irish did not receive the same status as Danish, due mainly to our own fault, in not realising at the time the positive effect such recognition would have on the language.

Many, including government members now admit that folly of not pursuing the issue at the time and now support a change in policy.

There exists now a completely different outlook towards our culture and the economic power of the language is now also taken fully into account. Over 3,000 children are attending Gaelscoileanna in Cork City and suburbs and up to 750 attending all-Irish schools in Co. Waterford - outside of the Gaeltacht areas.

That is an immense upsurge in commitment to the language in a seventy-mile-radius area.

Despite the important eco-

nomie and employment reasons for Irish being adopted as a full working language of the E.C., equal status with the other languages of the E.C. is just as good a reason.

Irish is the oldest written language in Western Europe, it is an integral part of European heritage and thus it is only fair to ask that it enjoys the same status as all the other communities languages.

It is certain that none of the other E.C. countries will object to Irish being adopted as a full working language of the community and the benefits to Ireland will include further enhancement of our Irish/European identity and culture, and will, of course, create hundreds of new jobs both here and in Brussels for Irish school leavers.

Full recognition for the Irish language in the E.C. is available, all we have to do is ask for it.
