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Labour Reigns Supreme As Hart Chairs Co. Council

The Labour Party now reign supreme at both County and Urban Council level, following the election of Cllr. Lar Hart to the prestigious seat of Waterford County Council Chairman at last Monday's annual meeting.

This successful Labour election comes hot on the heels of last weeks Urban District Council election where Labour poll topper Cllr. Billy Kyne was unanimously elected to the chair.

With a maximum return of three for three at the recent local elections it came as no surprise to see the Labour Party clean up and take the leading role on both authorities.

UNDERFUNDING AND DETERIORATION

Commenting on his period of office which had spanned the past 12 months, outgoing Chairman Cllr. Con Casey (FG.) hit out at what he described as the "ongoing failure of central government to address in any meaningful way the underfunding of local authorities", which he added, had been making it harder for Waterford Co. Council "to maintain an acceptable level of service to the public or to prevent a serious deterioration in the condition of our County road network".

Thanking the members of Fine Gael and Labour for his successful election to the chair in 1993, Cllr. Casey referred to the past 12 months as one of the "less auspicious years in the recent life of the Council".

COMMITMENT TO TOURISM

Defending the cash-strapped Council's decision to open and maintain the county's public toilets, Cllr. Casey stressed that had that decision to overspend not been taken, the Council would have dealt "a hammer blow" to the tourism industry.

On a more optimistic note, however, the Fine Gael

Councillor praised the Council's commitment to tourism which he believed was aptly demonstrated by its generous investment in Splashworld in Tramore. This was an excellent example of how the Council can help those who help themselves, said Cllr. Casey who hoped that the Council's involvement in Lismore would be equally beneficial in due course. He also said he was pleased to note that the year had been marked by a significant improvement in the Council's new housing allocation. "Central government had allowed a serious build-up of our housing lists for some years and I hope that this trend is now halted for one and for all", he urged. In conclusion, the outgoing Chairman thanked the ex. Co. Manager, Dan Hurley for his co-operation during his tenure, Acting Co. Manager Brian McNally who 'stepped into the breach' in January, officials, Co. Engineer, Co. Secretary, Finance Officer, Librarian and their staffs for their help during

the year. He then paid special tribute to their unstinting efforts to manage the Council's affairs in what, Cllr. Casey deemed were very 'unfavourable conditions'.

"CREDIT TO COUNCIL"

There followed a chorus of praise and congratulations from the various party members on what had been described as an excellent year of Chairmanship by Cllr. Casey.

DUNGARVAN YOUTH RESOURCE CENTRE

The Youth Resource Centre, Friary Street, Dungarvan, is a special project of Waterford Regional Youth Service and is funded by the National Lottery. The Resource Centre aims to cater for the needs of young people who do not tend to get involved in mainstream activities provided in Dungarvan. Some of the programmes we run include various sports i.e. badminton, volleyball, soccer, outdoor activities including hiking, orienteering, treasure hunts, camping, issue based programmes such as drugs and alcohol abuse, aids, social problems and many other subjects. These programmes help the young people to take on responsibilities, build up their confidence and deal with social issues affecting their lives. There is also an information service provided by the Centre.

We will be using these notes each month to highlight the work of the many groups operating from the Resource Centre.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind Leaders that Annual Assembly is being held in Dungarvan this year and we expect a good turnout from all the volunteers.

GET UP AND GO

This group caters for young women aged 15 - 20 years and meet every Tuesday night at 7.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. in Cathal Brugha Community House. This is a community based group, which have been together for four years. They take part in many recreational and educational programmes and also they get involved with other younger groups in their own community. There are three Leaders involved in the group and the latest programme to date was the production of a newsletter which was to commemorate the blessing of the refurbished houses by Bishop William Lee and the unveiling of a plaque by Cllr. Tony Wright.

HOMEWORK CLUB

This group was set up in January 1994. There are ten Leaders which cater for 5 - 8 year olds with learning needs. They meet three nights per week, Tuesday and Wednesday from 6.30 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. The children receive help with their homework and the Leaders bring a sense of enjoyment into learning. They usually finish off the nights with a treat for the children. This group are enjoying their summer break at

the moment and will re-commence in September.

LITERACY GROUP

The Literacy Group takes place in the Resource Centre in a confidential way and caters for young people. This group works closely with the Adult Learning Centre. The literacy is carried out in two ways — one to one and group literacy.

KYNE PARK

This is the latest venture for the Resource Centre. Earlier this year a profile of the area was carried out and at this stage we would like to thank all the residents of the area who co-operated with us fully. At present a group of adults from the area have just completed their induction training to help with preparations for work to begin with young people in the area.

CATHAL BRUGHA PLAYGROUP

The playgroup operates from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, Monday to Thursday, catering for 10 to 14 children from the area. The age group ranges from three years old to school-going. The Leaders are I.P.P.A. trained (Irish Pre-School Playgroup Association). The aims of the group are to prepare the children for

"big school" learning, developing "social skills", sharing, co-operating independence, finding out that the freedom to do what one wants must be balanced against the needs and wishes of others, and inter-relating with their peers and the leaders in a secure and friendly environment. The parents co-operate at all times with the leaders, helping out in many ways.

NEWLINE YOUTH GROUP

This group caters for 8 - 13 year olds and have two club nights, each night catering for different ages in smaller groups. Each group has three leaders and one extra leader to help out. Both groups meet in the Community House and their programmes are activity and educational purpose. Activities include collage, candle making, quiz and nature walks to name but a few and the educational programmes include discussions on school, free time, bullying as well as trips to the library and the museum.

BOYZ 'N THE HOOD

This teenage group was started in November 1993 and caters for young men between the ages of 15 - 18 years from Childers Estate.

They meet on Wednesday nights from 7.30 p.m. to 9 p.m. Their programmes at the moment involve recreation but are branching out to issue based programmes in the near future. There are five Leaders involved with this group. Their recent claim to fame is the winning of the boys under-18 soccer final of the Regional Games held recently in Waterford. Well done boys.

SUMMER PROJECTS

Work is at the moment being carried out with the many volunteers who are busy making preparations for our Summer Projects with different groups and communities in the area. There will be more about this next month.

GIRLS ON THE MOVE

This is a centre based group for young women aged 15 - 18 years. They meet on Monday nights in the Resource Centre. Their programmes are recreational and educational. Girls on the move also took part in the Regional Games and Regional Quiz recently.

Some of the summer programmes will also involve the Boyz in the Hood Group.

CHILDERS ESTATE JUNIOR GROUP

The Junior Club commenced three years ago and cater for boys and girls aged between eight and twelve. They meet on Thursday night at 7 p.m. until 8.30 p.m. in Dungarvan Youth Club. This group helps to teach the children to have a sense of pride in their area. It provides them with a club of their own where they can enjoy themselves in safety, help them to mix in a happy environment. Their programmes involve art and crafts, indoor and outdoor games, drama. The leaders provide guest speakers for the children. They also like to visit other clubs outside the area and visit places like the Fire Station, Garda Barracks and the Cinema. Their annual outing is a weekend away in Woodstown, more about that next month. There are 6 leaders involved with this group, 4 of which are parents from the estate.

Also speaking at the press reception, Chairperson of the Oireachtas committee, Íte Ni

Chionnaith, said she was expecting an excellent Oireachtas in Dungarvan.

"The local committee have done excellent work and we have had a lot of support so far", she reported. She went on to say, "the Oireachtas caters for everyone, young and old, and is aimed at the local community as well as those visitors who will come to Dungarvan/Ring especially for the festival".

DEICH LA DEN SCOTH

"Deich Lá den scoth a bhíonn ann i gconaf, a dúirt an Cathaoirleach who further added that with the full support of the local community, including business people, shopkeepers, publicans and local schools etc., Oireachtas na nDéise 1994 would rank among the best Oireachtas festivals and would leave its mark on the Dungarvan/Ring area.

Patron for the festival will be none other than R.T.E.'s Ciarán Mac Mathúna who regards his Earlamh role as a great privilege.

LITERARY COMPETITIONS

As well as the ten day festival, there are other important aspects of

Oireachtas. The Oireachtas Literary Competitions influence all aspects of writing in Irish and cover short stories, poetry, novels, plays, journalism and translations. Oireachtas recognition is the most coveted honour for up and coming as well as established writers. Celebrated prizewinners include: Pádraic Ó Conaire, Alan Titley, Máirtín Ó Cadhain and Muireann Ní Bhrolcháin etc.

A £25,000 prize fund is offered for original work in prose, poetry, plays, journalism, television and video production, translations and music composition.

An Rinn regional winners in the Comhaortas Liteartha an Oireachtas 1994 were later announced at the reception. Catherine Ní Chrotaigh claimed first prize with her essay on Sean Treacy and received a gradam to go on

to the National Finals to be held during the Oireachtas period. Second prize went to Bríd de Faoite for her essay on iománaíocht while third place was awarded to Neasa Ní Cheilleachair for her essay on Dr. Croke.

ART EXHIBITION

Each year, the Oireachtas Art Exhibition features the work of major and emerging Irish artists. This year's exhibition will be held in the Guinness Hopstore, Dublin from 12th to 25th October. The Douglas House Gold Medal is awarded to a work of outstanding merit.

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

Ways To Keep Weeds Down

Intrusion by weeds can make gardeners psychopathic by the time July comes round.

But the 'final solution' - a hefty dose of weed-killer - is not quite so acceptable in these 'greener' times. Many gardeners have responded by wielding the trusty hoe more frequently and vigorously to lop the heads of weeds before they become established.

You can also use a mulch - something organic, such as garden compost, pulverised bark or lawn clippings - which will deprive the weeds of light and help keep moisture in the ground too. But there is another method of weed control which is often overlooked; ground cover plants.

Many can cover so densely that they starve weeds of light and offer the double bonus of masking an eyesore and producing a bright display.

You do need to prepare the ground thoroughly first and remove all weeds so that they don't get a chance to establish before the 'ground huggers'. Most varieties are best planted in Winter so, either make a note for later, or buy container grown plants for planting now. Some to consider are:

HYPERICUM - also known as Rose of Sharon, this is a good all-rounder that thrives particularly in shady spots. It comes in bushy and ground covering forms and can quickly colonise open spaces to provide lots of attractive yellow flowers.

IVY - another tough customer, it can quickly cloak a scruffy wall, tree stump or other eyesore.

HONEYSUCKLE - perhaps surprisingly, there is a variety (*Lonicera Pileata*) of this delicate and fragrant plant family which can be used to cover the ground. However, it does prefer shady spots.

PACHYSANDRA - this evergreen is another durable option and looks particularly attractive in its variegated form. Unfortunately, it does not like chalky soils.

LAVENDER/HEATHER - excellent for sunny spots and attractive and fragrant too.

SANTOLINA - also known as Cotton Lavender, is an aromatic evergreen producing small yellow flowers but more popular for its fine silvery leaves. It likes sunny well-drained soil and must be cut back hard in Spring to ensure that it keeps a neat and low profile.

GORSE - the Spanish variety (*Genista Hispanica*) makes excellent ground cover. It is tough and impenetrable.

WILLOW - if the weed problem is caused by the site being too damp to grow anything else then the aptly named Prostrate-Willow should be a durable colonist.

FERNS - again, a good and elegant solution for a damp site.

BRAMBLE - the ornamental type is a tough contender for sites which are shady and dry.

MAHONIA - another lover of dry and shady conditions, it produces fragrant yellow flowers in abundance.

ADD some instant sunshine to your cookery with these dishes from the island of St. Lucia.

UPSIDE DOWN HAM LOAF

Ingredients
 1oz (25g) butter,
 1/4tsp. (1.25ml) ground cloves
 3-4 Slices pineapple
 1 1/4lb (700g) lean ham, minced
 Fresh-milled black pepper
 1/2pt (150ml) milk
 6tbs (90ml) brown sugar,
 1/2tsp. (2.5ml) dry mustard
 6oz (175g) fresh bread crumbs

2 eggs, beaten
 2tsp (10ml) dry mustard.
Method
 Melt butter in the bottom of a 2lb. (900g) loaf tin. Add brown sugar, cloves and 1/2tsp. (2.5ml) mustard. Arrange pineapple slices on top. Combine remaining ingredients; press down into tin. Bake at 350 deg. F., 180deg. C., gas mark 4 for about 1 1/2hrs.

COCONUT JELLY


Ingredients
 2 coconuts
 1 3/4pts (1 litre) boiling milk
 2 x 4oz (11g) packets powdered gelatine
 4tbs (60ml) water
 4oz (125g) castor sugar
 1tsp (5ml) Angostura bitters
Method
 Pierce two 'eyes' of coconut, pour away milk. Place coconuts in hot oven, 450° F., 230° C., gas mark

8, for about 10 mins. until outside shells cracks open. Remove shell and brown skin from white flesh. Grate flesh, then pour boiling milk over it. Cool. Dissolve gelatine in water in basin over hot water. Cool. Squeeze milk and coconut out through muslin cloth and make up to 2pts. (1.1 litre) with extra milk. Mix in sugar and bitters until dissolved. Whisk in the gelatine, then pour into jelly mould. Set in fridge. Decorate with cherries. Serve with chocolate sauce and fruit. Serves 6-8.



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

EXTENSION TO SCHOOL HOUSE

Ballymacarby Central School which opened its doors in 1972 is to get two additional class rooms, as for some years one classroom has been in a corridor without any natural light or ventilation. The Board of Management, Parents Association and teachers have been campaigning for this extension for a number of years. Plans are already drawn for the two classrooms. There are now 223 pupils in the school. From September 1994 a remedial teacher has been appointed on a shared basis with Newcastle N.S.

BADMINTON

Admits 'Shabby'
Robbery**

Local man Daniel Nagle of 29, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at last Wednesday's sitting of Dungarvan District Court to a charge of burglary at Rich Rags Boutique, O'Connell Street on Friday, 18th March last.

Nagle, whose previous convictions include common assault, burglary, criminal damage, possession of an offensive weapon and Misuse of Drugs Act, was charged with stealing ladies clothing to the value of £714 after he had trespassed the shop through the front window.

Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Inspector Michael Blake told the Court that the defendant had been arrested as a result of enquiries made by Garda Lacey. On his arrest, Nagle admitted he had put his hand through the Boutique's front window, which he claimed had already been broken.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Niall King Solr.,

said that Nagle had been on his way home on the date in question after having some drink taken. On seeing the broken Boutique window the temptation had been too strong and Nagle was now very penitent and sorry for what he had done. Mr. King stressed that all items of clothing had been returned intact, with no loss or destruction.

Addressing the court, the defendant said the robbery had been on the spur of the moment and that he had taken the clothes for 'no particular purpose'. He then admitted that the crime he had committed had been 'very shabby'.

The case was subsequently adjourned to October 12th, during which time Nagle was ordered to pay a weekly sum of £10 towards his legal expenses bill.

Commenting on the case, Judge Mary Martin asked the defendant what right he had to interfere with other people's property. "I certainly have a 6 months sentence in mind for this case", she added.

The Credit Union and You

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


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


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
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Cappoquin Notes

We mentioned Brendan Kiely's book "The Connerys" in last week's issue. The work was officially launched at a very pleasant function in Halla Brid (Convent of Mercy) on Friday night last. World Cup interest notwithstanding a very fine crowd turned up and were entertained to light refreshments on arrival.

Vice Principal of St. Anne's Secondary School Mr. Billy Arrigan was Mas-

ter of Ceremonies and he first introduced the author who was a former pupil of his, albeit for a short time. Brendan spoke first in Irish and showed an excellent mastery of the native tongue. In his well chosen words in English he gave a brief outlining of what life was like in this country and in Australia a century and a half ago. As far as New South Wales was concerned he emphasised the great difficulty faced by Irish Emi-

grants at that time even in the matter of religious practice and delighted the audience with his quotations from that well known book by John O'Brien "Around the Boreelag".

The actual launch was carried out by Dr. John B. O'Brien of U.C.C., himself an expert on Australian history. He gave an outline of the mammoth task undertaken by Brendan and revealed that his research on The Connerys formed a thesis prepared as part of his studies at U.C.C. Dr. O'Brien gave us an insight on faction fights which played a big part in Irish life in the earlier part of the nineteenth century and in which the heroes of the book were deeply involved. He admitted that it was not clearly understood why such factions existed or even what (if anything) they hoped to achieve but there is little doubt that they were the main reason for the transportation of the brothers from Bohadon.

After the official proceedings there was a general chat among the audience and anybody that we spoke to expressed their delight at what was a rare opportunity to be present at such a function.

Aquaculture Developments In Dungarvan Harbour

Dear Sir,

I have been asked by the committee of Dungarvan Bay Amenity Protection Association, a recently formed group comprising watersport interests, wildlife groups and residents from Dungarvan, Abbeyside and Ballinacourty to write to you regarding recent developments in aquaculture in Dungarvan Harbour.

The Department of the Marine are currently considering up to eight licence applications for shellfish cultivation projects on the Northshore of Dungarvan Harbour — the area North of a line from Abbeyside Church to Ballinacourty Pier. Little detail of these applications are available as of yet but it is known that the first three of them are for an area in excess of 150 acres. If the other applications are similarly sized the entire proposal will cover approx. 400 acres of beach.

You will be aware that there is an extensive and established aquaculture area on the Whitehouse Bank on the Southern side of the harbour and this group believes that sufficient area within the harbour has now been allocated to aquaculture and we wish to advise the general public of the situation and our objective of maintaining the Northshore of Dungarvan Harbour as a public amenity area free of aquaculture projects.

The area subject of the licence applications is bounding the Abbeyside shore of Dungarvan Town an established residential area with a large population which regularly uses the beach for recreation purposes. The areas all along the foreshore are all zoned residential and public open space and the beach is in fact an extension of this public open space. Abbeyside beach is an area of immense amenity value to the residents of and visitors to Dungarvan Town, its proximity to such a large residential area makes it accessible to those who do not have any form of transport. In summer large numbers of people swim from this beach and it is used all the year round by many who wish to walk in solitude in the pleasant atmosphere found by the seashore. Aquaculture developments on the scale proposed would destroy the character and attractiveness of the beach and must not be allowed.

It is not fair to allow a commercial development of this nature and scale alongside such a large residential


area and if the decision were based on present planning standards it would not be entertained at all. Existing aquaculture projects on the South side of the harbour mean many service vehicle movements across the beach, if this situation were to obtain on the Northshore it would create a major hazard for all who use it, especially small children. Servicing of projects also takes place at night and this will be an unacceptable intrusion into the peace and quiet of the area.

There is a major tourist development at Ballinacourty Pier comprising hotel, self catering accommodation, golf course and leisure centre. It is totally illogical to promote and encourage tourist development and attract tourists to the area, and then allow commercial development nearby detract and spoil the very asset which attracts the visitor.

In addition there is an internationally recognised boardsailing club operating from Ballinacourty and the recent expansion of aquaculture on the South side of the harbour has confined their activities to the outer and Northern areas of the harbour. Safety considerations dictate that the preference is for the Northshore and boardsailors regularly transit the area and the development will be a hazard to them and mean a further restriction of their activities.

The area subject of the proposal is widely used by sailing dinghies and water skiers. Any obstruction such as the nursery trolleys and other structures will present a serious safety hazard to these watersports.

This is a major feeding area for a variety of wading bird species. Bird counts rank the numbers of Brent Geese, Black-tailed Godwit and Bar-tailed Godwit as internationally significant. Numbers of Shelduck, Widgeon, Red-breasted Merganser, Oystercatcher, Ringed Plover, Golden Plover, Grey Plover, Lapwing, Knot, Sanderling, Dunlin Turnstone and Redshank are nationally important. Grey Cormorant, Heron and Teal are also recorded here. The Oystercatcher is regarded as a major predator of clams and once he discovers that there are clams in his feeding area he becomes very persistent in his efforts to feed on them. To prevent this the clam farmer covers the beach with netting which prevents the birds not only



feeding on the clams, but also on anything other naturally occurring food present in the area. This netting cannot be allowed to sink into the sand or it will affect clam growth also it must be kept free of weed and this is achieved by means of a large mechanical brush towed by a tractor. Most of the birds feed at low water which coincides with the time of greatest aquaculture activity, the reduced feeding area and the increase in human and mechanical activity associated with the farming operations will scare the birds away.

The area for the proposed operation is within the designated Special Protection Area in Dungarvan Harbour. The Irish Government is obliged by EU law to protect SPA's. Given the other points raised here it is our view that licensing of the proposed operations would not be compatible with this obligation.

The foreshore along the Abbeyside shore is used by shore anglers. Crabs are one of the principal baits used by anglers, they are also predators of clams, consequently their numbers will be significantly reduced by aquaculture operations and in turn this will have an ef-

fect on the food chain and the ecology of the area. Tackle used by anglers will foul the netting and the operator will seek to exclude them from the area.

The holders of aquaculture licences are obliged by condition 2 m of the licence "to indemnify the State, the Minister, his officers, servants, or agents against all actions, loss damage, cost, expenses . . ." any underwriter will insist that the risk is minimised by preventing public access to the project area. The Department of the Marine has been asked several times to clarify the situation regarding the developers right to restrict public access across the beach. To date this has not been done.

The promoters of one of the projects subject of a licence applications have paced seed trolleys on the beach already without a licence and without permission. They forced an access route onto the beach across a childrens playground, at a point where none existed previously. The route chosen also runs alongside the local soccer ground before passing through the village of Abbeyside. Beach materials will drop off the vehicles all along the route and

detract from the general tidiness of the area. This type of traffic will endanger the children who played nearby and on the beach.

In the course of the recent election a letter from the Minister for the Marine was published in the local papers stating that the promoters of this project had been instructed to remove it forthwith. This has not been done. In defying the Minister they are insulting him, the State, and the general law abiding public. By their actions they appear to have nothing but contempt for the process of law and order and this is before they have even been granted a licence. There can be no confidence that they will operate within the law if they are granted a licence and their blatant disregard for the democratic process must disqualify them from ever holding a licence.

If one operator is seen "get away with it" it can only be a matter of time before all the other applicants will soon be following the same route with disastrous consequences for this beach and valuable ecology it supports.

Licence applications are processed by the Aquaculture licence vetting com-

mittee of the Department of the Marine. They consult with such bodies as the Wildlife Service of the Office of Public Works, Commissioners of Irish Lights, Board Faighte, FORFAS, Department of the Environment, Regional Fishery Boards, and Local Authorities. A decision on this application was deferred when the committee met on June 10, 1994. The next meeting is scheduled for mid August when these licence applications will again come before the committee. It is important that the Department of the Marine is aware of the weight of local public opinion against these proposals and Dungarvan Bay Amenity Protection Association recommends to anyone who has an interest in preserving this beach in its present condition to write to the Aquaculture Licence Vetting Committee of the Department of the Marine, Leeson Lane, Dublin 2.

IN MEMORY OF MOSS

"THE COOPER" CUNNINGHAM

This week I would like to pay a special tribute to a man I deeply loved, admired and respected, a man I was proud to call my father - Moss "The Cooper" Cunningham who departed this life on Monday morning June 13th, following a brave fight against illness.

All too soon the life has ended of one of Clashmore's most loved sons, a man whose years here on earth were filled with colour and adventure despite having endured much hardship and pain throughout his life. No man ever loved his native area more than he did and with his death we have lost volumes of local history, tales and stories.

"The tall man with the cap and gentle smile, always relaxed enjoying a fag and plenty of time to chat to everyone". This is how all of us will remember Moss "The Cooper".

Born in 1919 he and his late brother Paddy and sister Mary (Curran) endured the death of both their parents when he was just 14 years of age. With the help and support of good neighbours and friends they overcame those difficult war years. Moss was a man of many talents and ability. In the field of sport he was unequalled. He excelled in the high jump with a personal best record of 6' 3" and he also won many trophies in the 100 yds. The following tribute was made to Moss by fellow Clashmore man and well known sportsman Eddie Mulcahy. It sums up Moss's sporting career "He was one of the nicest men in Clashmore. I think I would be safe in saying in athletics he was before his time. I am going back to 1944, I remember winning the 100 yds in the Under 12's, and Moss won the senior 100 yds a few minutes later and I can still hear myself saying to him you nearly passed yourself out there Moylan (he was called Moylan on account of having similar hurling skills to that of Waterford's greatest hurler Christie Moylan). Moss was a great footballer and hurler but will be better remembered for his high jump ability. I saw him jumping 5' 6" in Clashmore that day before he took off his hat".

Though he was a man of many skills, handed down to him from many of genera-

tions of Coopers, it was from the land he earned his living. He seemed to be in harmony with nature growing crops successfully for many decades. Milking cows he was equalled by few, he shared a special bond with the animals and with just the gentle command of his voice they would obey him. His work skills with a team of horses would not be matched by modern machinery. Though he had the ability to do great things in life he never wished for more than enough and he was always content and happy with his lot in life. He accepted all his illness and pain over the past twenty years as his cross in life and he never complained. Just days before his final trip to hospital he was out enjoying his greatest love in life, a game of 45.

Anyone who ever played cards with him will know him as a great card player. He seldom made a mistake and he was always there to take the final trick.

One of nature's gentlemen everyone who knew him have very special memories of him, he will be deeply missed by all of us.

Neighbours and friends joined with us his family in celebrating the Rosary with Fr. O'Connor, C.C., on Monday evening at Egan's Funeral Home.

On Tuesday evening friends came from far and near to accompany Moss as he made his final journey from Egan's to Clashmore Church. Among the huge congregation which overflowed from the church into the yard were Cllrs. Patsy Kenneally, Richard Power and Garry O'Halloran. The prayers were recited by Very Rev. Gerard O'Connor, C.C., assisted by Very Rev. Billy Meehan, C.C., and Very Rev. Tom Flynn, C.C.

On Wednesday morning Fr. Gerard O'Connor, C.C., celebrated Mass. Members of his family officiated during the ceremony and following Requiem Mass Moss was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. The final prayers at the graveside were recited by Very Rev. Gerard O'Connor assisted by Very Rev. John Treacy. May the sod of your beloved Clashmore rest softly on your gentle breast. May the God whom you so dearly loved in this life take you now to His right hand side. - Kate.

When a match is lost it is easy to criticize. The referee is high on the list for critical assessment and his performance is put under a far from objective microscope. Any lapse of his, especially late in the game, is seized upon to nurture our natural eagerness to protect our collective ego at all costs and divert attention from that area of our own responsibility: the team management, the group with the power to shape a team's destiny.

I was casting my mind back to Thurles, Waterford v. Limerick, and the loss of a game we could/should have won. Ignore the pleas of hard luck, unlucky breaks and misfortune; let the management examine its conscience.

Was Fintan O'Shea the best winger we had, after Billy O'Sullivan? Was he for example, better than Paul Prendergast? Was Paul Flynn, and other forwards instructed to lift and run ad nauseam? If not, did they do it to indulge themselves?

A significant weakness in Waterford play was the lack of good ground hurling. If you watched Kilkenny v. Offaly and Wexford v. Laois on television you would have seen some sparkling ground striking. It is obvious that it got plenty of attention on the training grounds of Wexford and Offaly. Mick Kinsella is now Wexford Co. Secretary and has a major influence on the training content. He is a firm believer in the value of good ground striking and we know Mick was not surprised at the good mix of the Wexford game plan.

Do you think that Brian Greene is a centre forward, our best centre forward, playing in his best position? Do you think he had any realistic chance against Limerick's tallest player Ger Hegarty?

One other major weakness was, literally and figuratively, a striking one. Our striking was overall, poor. Four clear chances of a point offered themselves in the last five minutes and were missed because the ability to strike the ball properly was lacking. 

OUR LOCALITY

BALLINACOURTY SCHOOL

The following is a personal account of life in Ballinacourty school through the eyes of a young girl who was a pupil there in the twenties and thirties.

When I first went to school we wrote on slates with slate pencils. These slates were kept in school and given out before class each day. If we did not have rags to wipe off what we had written, we spat on them and wiped them with our sleeves. Slates were done away with in the late twenties and half penny jotter were used instead.

Mrs. Maher lived in

Abbeyside during her term as teacher in Ballinacourty. Her maiden name was Treacy and she was a relation to Tom Treacy a former pupil who still lives in Ballinacourty. He is presently treasurer of the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty G.A.A. Club.

Before being appointed to this school Mrs. Maher taught in Tramore. Her husband was an ex-policeman named Michael Maher. She cycled the three miles to school each day and if the weather was wet or very windy, Michael drove her out in a jennet and trap. The jennet and trap were always kept in immaculate condition. Having spent the best part of her teaching life in Ballinacourty, Mrs. Maher retired in 1934.

An old alarm clock in the school was always set for 12 o'clock and no matter who was in the school when the clock went off all the children went on their knees and said the Angelus. Mrs. Maher didn't have a family but all her pupils were like

her children and when they left school and went out in the world she continued to take an interest in them.



Munster Senior Football Semi-Final

WATERFORD SUFFER HEAVY DEFEAT IN ONE-SIDED SEMI-FINAL

TIPPERARY 5-14 WATERFORD 0-15

I remember leaving Semple Stadium, Thurles after Waterford had suffered their biggest ever beating by Tipperary before a huge crowd, exactly ten years ago last Sunday. They had been given a fifteen points beating (4-13 to 0-10) and all Waterford people felt awful. Last Sunday was the tenth anniversary and it was marked by a fourteen points drubbing, that made our supporters feel desolate and despondent again. Here on Sunday before a very much smaller attendance we had no excuses and no hard luck stories. Our bewildered backline had allowed Tipperary forwards through for four first half goals and they having played against the strong wind, were sitting pretty and comfortable at halftime when leading by 4-7 to 0-10.

Ten points in 35 minutes, is something new as far as Waterford senior football is concerned and some of the scores were splendidly taken, but so much had been conceded by our shaky defence, that this all went for nothing. Our attack did miss a few goalkoring chances late in the game, but so did Tipperary at an earlier stage when they were in full flow. It is a game that much might be written about, but in the end it would just tell the story of our defeat by a much better side. Having seen the Cork/Kerry semi-final on telly after coming back from Thurles on Sunday night, we saw what a huge mountain Tipperary are left to climb in the Munster final at Pairc Ui Caoimh on July 24th.

PLAY

Waterford played with the very strong breeze and P. P. Ferncombe had a point from play in the 4th minute and this was followed by a Liam Dalton point in the 5th. A free kick was converted by P. P. Ferncombe to leave us three in front by the eight minute when Tipperary opened their scoring with a point from a converted free by Brendan Cummins. The cheer which greeted this score showed us how outnumbered we were in the stadium. Jim Maher sent

over a splendid point and leading 0-4 to 0-1 after the 10th minute the chances of a surprise win looked to be there. Derry Foley pointed for Tipperary in the 12th minute before their marksman, Peter Lambert shot for a brilliant goal in the 13th. Brendan Cummins had a point again and a minute later Tipperary had one of their amazing misses in front of goal. Jim Maher and Mark Sheehan exchanged points, as did Davy Hogan and Dereck Wyse. In the 21st minute Peter Lambert skated through our open defence for his second goal and three minutes after this Tipperary team captain Brian Burke had their third goal from a penalty. Peter Queally and Dereck Wyse had points to bring our tally to nine by the 29th minute before full-forward Eamonn Maher sent in a rocket to our net for their fourth major score of the first half. Liam Dalton had our final score of the period and points by Lambert and Costello left Tipperary in front by 4-7 to 0-10 by the 33rd minute before goalkeeper Philly Ryan saved a rasper of a shot from P. P. Ferncombe before the break.

FIFTH GOAL

John Costello had Tipperary's fifth goal in the 6th minute of the second half and their total had stretched to 5-13 before Peter Queally had our first score of this period in the 19th minute. P. P. Ferncombe and Jim Maher added on points. Substitute Chris Coen and Eoin O'Brien exchanged points before Peter Queally had the final score of the semi-final in the 28th minute. Waterford continued to press and were unlucky not to have scored at least twice, but nothing that might have happened at this stage would have taken from the magnitude of Tipperary's deserved victory.

Nine of their players which included all six forwards, both midfielders and their only substitute, shared in the scoring. Peter Lambert with a combined total of 4-7 from their two games becomes top scorer in the province. Since Coen was their only substitution (he

came on for the injured David Hogan), it seems that they are satisfied with the performance of the team which is now likely to be given a vote of confidence.



COUNTY SELECTORS

Since our match against Limerick, the matter of the selection of a new selectorial team has been raised in many places throughout the county. Because the present committee have been in place for three years, the expectations are that new selectors will be elected/appointed at the July meeting of the County Board.

When a selection committee comes to the end of their term and are going out of office without having won a Munster title or better, or reached the knockout stages of the National League, they are deemed to have been unsuccessful and

invariably become the object of criticism and blamed for our lack of success. We are a great people for burying the good with their bones and remembering only the failures or the bad results that happened when they were in command. Unfortunate things, or bad things, if we wish to describe them so, while the present committee were in charge, like our defeat by Kerry (I'm told, by the way, that very many people in the Kingdom are a little angered at our defeat by them being treated as a kind of stigma) and being relegated in the National League.

To do some justice to the committee we should remember that it was a result of faulty refereeing that we lost to Wexford, who had played three games again before losing the league final, we were unlucky to lose to Tipperary by a single point at Cappoquin in a vital league match and we did play a draw with Limerick who are now in the Munster final and maybe destined to go places in the championships this year.

These are a few of the occasions where hard luck more than any other factor kept us from success — or at least a small measure of it.

Anyway, someone must be blamed when things go wrong and after all the selectors are the most convenient targets. They are up

there to be knocked and they know that only too well. My view is that these men are great people, performing a great and often a thankless service to the county. They seldom, if ever, get the credit that is due to them.

When new selectors take over there is generally an air of expectation around and fresh interest abounds around the county. Who ever takes over for the next term, will have as the immediate objective, the restoration of Div. 1 status for the county and then winning the provincial title next year. Both objectives will not be easily achieved, but this is what is going to be attempted.

Understandably there is speculation and rumour about and this is likely to continue until the new members are appointed.

It is confirmed that the three men, Tony Mansfield, Peter Power and Joe Carton, who managed the under 21 hurlers who won the All-Ireland title in 1992, are very interesting in taking over from the retiring committee. Their 'hats' are now in the ring and having proven themselves with the under 21 squad it is certain that many members will feel that with the same selectors and panel, that further glory may come about. We await the outcome of things with interest.

Big Drop In Attendance

The attendance of 28,884 at Pairc Ui Caoimh showed an amazing drop from the previous year when the teams met in Killarney and 42,874 patrons paid at the turnstiles. The figure on Sunday last was the smallest in eight years. When Cork and Tipperary met in the Munster senior football final at Thurles last year the official attendance was 22,140. Tipperary qualified for three provincial football finals last year and lost all three to Cork.

Whatever the reasons given for the drop in attendances, from within the confines of the G.A.A., very many members of the public are adamant that the cost factor in going to matches at all levels now, is becoming a deterrent. There were complaints about the admission prices last Sunday and perhaps this is a matter that needs to be closely examined.

Senior Football Championship Resumes

Divisional Football Championship Continues

Next week-end will decide the fate of many clubs in all three adult football championships and now that we as a county, are out of all four intercounty adult championships for another year, clubs should have very few problems about the availability of players.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Gaultier v. Ballinacourty

My only reason for listing this first, is that it will be the first match of the senior list and will take place at Walsh Park on to-morrow, Thursday evening. Gaultier, who are so far unbeaten will be hot favourites and are expected to win decisively.

Tramore v. Clashmore

Clashmore had a nice win over Affane recently, but their more difficult days are ahead. Friday evening in Abbeyside will be one of them when they play Tramore in round four. Tramore are no world beaters either, but they are sitting nicely on the league table and if they win this one could make it to the K/O stage. I believe they will win here.

Sliabh gCua v. Butlerstown

This game will take place at Fraher field on Saturday evening and will give the Touraneena team a chance to recover from their big defeat by Dunhill recently. The teams both have four points, so this result will make a big difference and may squeeze the winners into the K/O stages. Sliabh gCua might just shade it.

THREE GAMES AT FRAHER FIELD

This will be the first big football championship programme since the official opening of the grounds. The afternoon programme will provide reasonable entertainment, but the evening match which features, Kilrossanty and Stradbally may prove to be one of the highlights of the present championship.

Stradbally were recently moved from the top spot on the table by Dungarvan and will be very anxious to remain in close touch with the top. Kilrossanty have only three points from three

matches and another defeat would prove very costly and might see them out of contention.

All their meetings have been splendid contests, even though not always producing top class fare. This is of great importance to both and is likely to be played with the same fervour of a knock-out game, so it should be some contest. Stradbally led by Tom Gough, Fintan and Conor O'Brien, Pat Curran, Paul Foley, Paul Mullaney and company may start slight favourites to hold on to their place near the top of the table against their old rivals whose effort will be spearheaded by Jim Maher, Pierrie Whyte, Roger Power, Ger Walsh, Michael Fitzgerald, Pat Brazil, Willie Cusack as well as some newcomers from their 1993 Under 21 winning championship side. It will be a close one for sure.

AFTERNOON GAMES

Kilmacthomas and Affane kick-off the programme of the day when they meet in the opening game of the afternoon. Affane are still without a point after four matches and are unlikely to beat Kilmac' who suffered an unexpected heavy defeat at the hands of Tramore recently. If they are at full strength and in form, Kilmacthomas will win this one.

Nire v. St. Saviours

Still reeling from their unexpected defeat by an under-strength Dungarvan side at Cappoquin, the county champions will be eager to get back into winning form and will go all out here to beat St. Saviours, who like themselves are struggling through the championship at the moment. Already beaten by Stradbally and Dungarvan and showing indifferent form, the champions will find themselves in serious trouble if they lose here. They certainly won't retain their title in 1994 if they don't show a big improvement on form against Dungarvan. St. Saviours, have won no game yet but have drawn two which gives them the same number of points as the Nire. If they stretch themselves to their limit, the Nire could be in for another shock here. This is the feature game of the afternoon programme.

Dungarvan v. Rathgormack

The records and the memories of their three famous meetings in the 1992 championship finals, stand out in the minds of all football people in the county and whenever they will be drawn together again for years to come, fans will want to see the clash. There should be a good crowd at Kilmac' for this one on Saturday evening. Rathgormack, like the Nire have only two points so far and will be in trouble if they lose, which I think they will.

Dunhill v. Newtown

One could hardly call this a local derby as this will be their first ever meeting in the senior championship. Dunhill have four points, but Newtown who are the 1993 intermediate county champions, have a match in hand. Dunhill will be the fancied team here, but they won't get the points without a stiff fight.

WESTERN CHAMPIONSHIP PROGRAMME

Both the intermediate and junior football championships are now sure to provide close and tremendously exciting finishes and as of now there are several in contention for both and it would be a wise person who could forecast the outcome of either with any confidence.

We have splendid games in both championships over the week-end, beginning with the Emmetts versus Modeligo junior football tie at Fraher field on Friday. Modeligo are moving along very nicely and so were Emmetts until their surprise defeat last Saturday in Cappoquin when they went under to Tallow, having shot a total of 22 wides. This is too close to call. It can go either way.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Ring v. Faha

They are both down two points and will be anxious to show a return to winning form here at Leamybrien on Saturday evening. Ring, will be fancied and may just pull it off.

Ardmore v. Shamrocks

Shamrocks have a number of matches left to play, while Ardmore have already played three, winning two. Shamrocks gave Ardmore a hammering when they clashed in last year's championship. It won't be that easy for them this time as Ardmore with victories over Faha and Geraldines, are a much improved team this year, even though losing to the Brickeys last week.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL

In this grade, the game between Kilgobinet and Ballyduff at Lismore will be close and one that Kilgobinet will badly need to win if they are to stay in contention. Ballyduff just might surprise here.

Lismore v. Old Parish

When they met last year, Lismore had a goal to spare at the finish (2-9 to 1-9), but the form book has shown a change in favour of Old Parish who are now bang in form and probably capable of turning the tables on Lismore who won the divisional title last year.

Costly Defeat

Tipperary County Board, who last year were given £30,000 in sponsorship, were this year given £27,500 by National Irish Banks, who are the sponsors of the Tipperary senior hurling team. The team wore the N.I.B. logo against Clare. Tipperary were to be given an additional £10,000 if they qualified for the All Ireland final and a further £15,000 as a holiday fund for the players if they won the All Ireland.

Munster Minor Hurling Semi-Final

Tipperary are the reigning Munster champions, having taken over from Waterford who took the title in 1992 after beating Tipperary in a replay. Tipperary will field seven of the team which lost by 0-10 to 3-10 against Galway in the All Ireland semi-final.

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

P. S. O Riain, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board, which was held at Lawlor's Hotel.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Quite a number were before the meeting, but only a few reported matters of a contentious nature. The report of the Clashmore v. Tourin junior hurling match which had been deferred from the previous meeting, was discussed, and Donal O'Brien, Clashmore, was suspended for two months for dangerous play. The player was exam-tied and unable to attend, but wrote to the Board expressing regret at the incident reported.

Arising out of the report of the Dungarvan v. Kilrossanty junior football match and in which Chris Gough, Dungarvan and Kevin Lonergan, Kilrossanty were named, it was decided, because of some ambiguity, to leave the matter to the chairman and secretary, who having looked into the matter, will report to the next meeting.

Permission was granted to a number of clubs to play tournament games and correspondence from the Ladies Football Board requesting free dates at the Fraher Field in July and Au-

gust was given a favourable response.

CHAMPIONSHIP PROGRESS

Quite a lengthy discussion on championship progress and team withdrawals, etc., took place and involved many speakers.

The chairman referred to the major difficulties with which the Board secretary was confronted since the previous meeting. He said that the demands of a number of clubs for postponements or changes of fixtures from one night to another was making the job of the secretary and the fixtures committee very, very difficult. He referred to the application for postponements by clubs who had a player on the substitute list for an inter-county game and reminded the delegates that it was declared Board policy to allow a deferment of a game only when a player was one of the first fifteen on a county team. If we continue as we are, he stated, we will not be finished by Christmas.

The secretary outlined a number of the unreasonable requests which he had received for postponements and said that too many clubs were taking it upon them-

HART WINS 12 VOTES

First item on the agenda of the Council's annual meeting was the election of a Chairman which subsequently saw two candidates nominated, Cllr. Lar Hart of Labour and Cllr. Austin Flynn of Fianna Fáil.

In proposing his labour colleague, outgoing Co. Council Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan said Cllr. Hart had served both the people and the County well since his election in 1991 and this had been exemplified in Cllr. Hart's recent success in the U.D.C. elections. The pro-

posal was seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey (F.G.).

On a subsequent role calling vote, Cllr. Hart was elected by 12 votes to 10 with Cllr. Tony Wright abstaining. "I hope to work with every Councillor in this Council", Cllr. Hart said, "no matter what party they are in".

NARROW WIN FOR COFFEY

Vile Offences Condemned By Judge

Four locals were charged at last Wednesday's sitting of Dungarvan District Court with urinating in a public place. The 4 separate incidents which occurred on April 6th last, were described by Judge Mary Martin as a 'vile' offence. One such occasion involved a public telephone box, while another defendant was apprehended in the laneway between Lawlor's Hotel and Moloney's.

In each case the defendant was ordered by Judge Martin to pay £100 to Aiseárlí and failure to do so would invoke a prison sentence the Judge further stressed.

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
