Threat Of Closure To West Waterford Post Offices

Following the recent controversial proposals made by An Post concerning the downgrading of postal delivery routes in the Mallow postal district, the company has found itself under a nationwide critical microscope as rural communities make a public outcry against the new 'Recovery Plan'.

The latest threat to the fabric of rural P.O.'s came in the form of an official letter from Mallow Head Postmaster, Donal Aherne, to seventeen postmasters/mistresses of sub P.O.'s served from Mallow, informing them that they will cease as delivery offices.

In his letter, dated May 6th, Mr. Aherne states that under An Post's 'Recovery Plan', it is proposed to make fundamental changes in the sub office delivery network, reducing the delivery offices from 29 to 12. Should this proposal be implemented, Ballyduff Post Office will cease to be a delivering office and will be relocated to Lismore, Aragon to Fermoy and Conna and Curraglass to Tallow.

Having been in the capable hands of the Bolgers since the turn of the century, it came as a major upset to the Ballyduff community to hear of An Post's recent proposal. Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Ballyduff Postmaster, Eamonn Bolger, revealed that should the company go ahead with their planned proposal, the village P.O. would lose both its postmen to Lismore.

These postmen, Mr. Bolger stressed, also act as social workers for many isolated and elderly members of the community who rely on their regular visits for a chat and some company.

After attending the first meeting of the newly formed CORPO, (Conserve Our Rural Post Offices), Mr. Bolger said the threatened rural communities were determined to fight to the bitter end An Post's decision to downgrade 17 rural P.O.'s. The meeting he said had been attended by a large contingent of highly determined representatives of small communities from the Cork/Kerry border to West Waterford, including

those from Muintir na Tire, farming communities, concerned villagers and worried An Post employees.

Outrage was expressed at the meeting as it was plainly seen, that this is only the first step towards the eventual closure of the 550 P.O.'s countrywide designated for closure in the 1991 Viability Plan. Officers and an executive committee under the chairmanship of Rev. Fr. Patrick Griffin, C.C., Kiskeam were elected with the unanimous support of all present.

SAVINGS OF £5 MILLION


The cost of servicing rural Ireland has been estimated by An Post at £20 million a year, while delivery routes in rural areas alone amount to 60% of delivery costs. The planned Recovery Plan will save the company about £5 million a year and the down grading process has already begun in Galway and Monaghan.

Public reaction has come both swift and furious. Already leaflets have been handed out to all people of the Ballyduff postal district, urging residents to voice their strongest disapproval of An Post over the new plan and to demand that the service be left as it is. "We have no hesitation in saying that there has been an excellent mail delivery service from this office and the people of this area are quite pleased with the very high standards of service provided year in, year out", reads the petition which also urges readers to protest to all local politicians regarding the scenario.

Four serious effects of the closure of Ballyduff P.O. on the village would be;

These students will represent various courses on offer at the College such as Secretarial Courses, Hairdressing and Beauty Care Course, Cert Course, Engineering Course, Health Science Course and the Accounting Technician Course.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARIAL



Name: Triona Wright

Address: Mitchel Street, Dungarvan

What Course are you pursuing?

I chose to take this Secretarial Course because it is an intensive course, which covers a lot in one year. The job prospects are excellent, judging by the employment record of past pupils.

Why did you decide to take this Course in Dungarvan Technical College?

I chose to go to D.T.C. because its near home! Seriously, it has the same content as similar course in colleges in Dublin and Cork — the only difference is that I'm saved additional costs such as college fees, transport, rent, etc. To be honest, the added advantage of home comforts is a further incentive to stay local. Some colleges require you to have your own typewriter, which is a large financial outlay for any student. In D.T.C. we have the use of modern typewriters and computers free! I have friends who did this course in past years and they now have very satisfying careers — that's very encouraging!

Now that you are doing the course in D.T.C., are you glad you made that decision? Why?

I'm delighted I chose D.T.C. because I'm progressing rapidly. I can now take down shorthand at high speeds, which will be useful in the future and of course I've learned to type, something I've always wanted to do. We do a lot of computer work — word processing and spread sheets. I'm taking Spanish as an extra language. (I already have good conversational French from Leaving Cert.) I

feel that I've learned a lot about the work that goes on today in offices. Through the course I'm gaining experience which I know will be valuable in the not too distant future.

Do you think that you will obtain employment in secretarial work at the end of the course?

I'm sure I'll get secretarial work in the summer, as lots of employers in Dungarvan recognise this course as being excellent in the training it provides. I'll have high speeds in keyboarding and shorthand, as well as good interpersonal skills on completion of the course. I'm confident that I will be very employable leaving D.T.C.

Where do you expect to be employed?

My ambition would be to work in the Bank, But I'd love to work for a legal firm / solicitor, i.e. be a legal secretary. The possibility of further education in Banking or legal studies would be foremost in my mind — I want to progress in whatever field I find myself in.

Why are you so confident?

I'm well trained in shorthand, typing, computing, languages, office procedures — I feel ready to take on a job. Shorthand is a skill which is making a comeback. So I'm glad that D.T.C. continued to offer a comprehensive course in shorthand. It is necessary if you want to work in the Council, for example, and it is a major advantage for anyone wanting to become a private secretary. As regards computers, I am especially happy to have gained skills in using "Word Perfect" (a word processing package), as it is popular in many modern offices.

What do you think you would do if you were unfortunate enough not to get employment?

I like to think positively, but if I was unemployed, I'd come back to D.T.C. to do a retraining course to keep up my speeds. Previously, girls in this position subsequently got work through employers contacting the college, looking for secretaries and receptionists, either permanently or to cover sick leave, maternity leave, etc., so I would not worry about unemployment.

Are you glad you chose to do this course in Dungarvan Technical College?

I am very happy with this particular course in Dungarvan Technical College. The teachers are excellent and they give us great personal attention. The course includes work experience, arranged for us by Mrs. Begley, the course co-ordinator. This helps eliminate the "Catch 22" situation — you know, "can't get work without previous experience, can't gain experience if you are not employed!" We also have the benefit of Career Guidance, which increases our awareness of the number of options available to us with the secretarial and administrative skills we've required. They also treat us like young adults which gives us great independence. There is also a very friendly atmosphere in the college and this is very important as it let's every student feel welcome. Therefore, I would recommend this course to any person interested in Secretarial studies.

Lismore Amalgamation Now Certain

It now appears certain that the hotly debated amalgamation of the Christian Brothers and Presentation Convent in Lismore is set to go on stream.

For the local community of Lismore, the amalgamation issue has long been the subject of much detailed and at times acrimonious discussion. This discussion came to an end, however, when at recent separate meetings of the boards of management of both schools, it was decided to

entrust the ultimate decision to their respective trustees.

Now "after long periods of consultation and taking all views into consideration", the trustees have confirmed their decision in a letter to the chairpersons of the parents councils of the C.B.S. and Presentation Convent, the Lismore amalgamation is about to become a reality.

IN BEST INTEREST OF EDUCATION

Signed by Sr. Imelda Carew and Bro. Conny Horgan, the letter confirms that the amal-

gamated school will be on the site of the Presentation Convent and that the trustees decision is "in the best interest of primary education in Lismore".

Objections to the proposed amalgamation had mainly been raised by those locals concerned with the provision of adequate playing facilities for C.B.S. students such as a correct sized field for hurling and football activities.

Moving to allay such fears, the trustees state that

the playing field, provided by the Sisters, will be the present hockey field together with additional ground to the east of it.

The letter from Sr. Imelda and Bro. Horgan continues; "The present Convent School will need an extension of 4 classrooms, ancillary, and a general purposes room, and also some renovation. There will be a local contribution, but because of

the complexity of the situation it has not been possible, to date, to get any clearer estimate of the cost other than the one given to you on the night of our meeting".

The trustees decision has been communicated to the Department of Education which is to proceed with the merger implementation as soon as possible. The newly amalgamated school will have an approximate enrolment of 300 students.

COMMUNITY SCHOOL

Meanwhile, the official go-ahead for the establishment of a Community School in

Lismore was given by the Minister for Education, Niamh Breathnach, earlier this year. This new Community School will incorporate the local C.B.S. and Presentation Convent Secondary schools and the St. Anne's Mercy Convent Secondary School in the neighbouring Cornerstone town of Cappoquin.

Expected to be in place for the start of the 1996/1997 school year, the Community School will be the biggest second level educational institute in the county with an enrolment of around 700 students.

cards for cattle), will then be unable to do so at this office.

2. Those who wish to have letters retained at this office, if going away or for some other reason, will then no longer be able to do so.

3. Registered mail and C.O.D. items which cannot successfully be delivered cannot be collected then at this office.

4. Certain parts of this postal district will then receive their mails much later than at present.

BEGINNING OF THE END

In an exclusive interview with the Dungarvan Leader, Tallow Councillor Willie McDonnell (FG) stressed that should Ballyduff P.O. lose the sorting of post to Lismore, it would mean the 'beginning of the end' for the entire post office service in Ballyduff.

Cllr. McDonnell warned that the proposal would immediately incur the loss of 2 jobs, one in Ballyduff and one in Lismore. The entire West Waterford postal service, he explained, would be streamlined in a way that post would be delivered (by van only) along main road routes to post boxes and collected at centre points by a member of each household.

He went on to say that Ballyduff had suffered in recent times in terms of its railway service, Garda station manpower, cessation of its creamery as a collection point and suspension of banking services two years ago.

"The loss of the postal service would be the greatest loss of the decade", the Fine Gael Councillor declared.

"A rural parish such as Ballyduff which has a population of around 800 people would see this government proposal as the death knell of community services", Cllr. McDonnell added, and then echoed the sentiments of the Ballyduff Postmaster in stating that the village P.O. provided a social service for

people of the area.

As a member of Waterford County Council, Cllr. McDonnell has requested a representative of An Post to attend the next monthly council meeting, where a full discussion of An Post's controversial proposal will ensue with a view to having the proposed cutback in service retracted.

"We need to protect and not destroy the services which are part and parcel of our everyday living and on which we have such an understandable dependence", he adamantly concluded.

JOB LOSSES SLAMMED

To many, it would seem as if An Post's failed 1991-1995 Viability Plan, which called for the closure of 550 sub post offices nationwide, has been resurrected to once again haunt the country's tightly knit rural communities. That plan was quickly abandoned 2 years ago due to public outburst.

So, what is on the cards this time round? Will An Post give in, as before, to public pressure or is the familiar rural postman to hang up his hat and abandon his bicycle, while An Post favour larger and more central facilities.

Although An Post and trade union officials claim that there are to be no redundancies, members of the Communication Workers Union apparently signed a productivity agreement which, in effect, gives An Post carte blanche in its dealing with the postmen. It is well known that many job losses are on the line, with the estimate being given as 19 in the immediate future.

Slamming An Post's proposal as 'deplorable' Fianna Fáil Councillor, Ollie Wilkinson told the Dungarvan Leader that should the Recovery Plan receive the green light, four/five jobs would then be eliminated in

the Lismore/Cappoquin area alone. "This is yet another blow against rural Ireland", declared the concerned Councillor, who then strongly called on An Post to cry halt to the proposals for these downgradings and job losses.

MUCH NEEDED SERVICES

Also voicing his protest Labour councillor Billy Kyne urged that any moves to remove much needed and appreciated services in rural communities be strongly fought against.

In making a case to the government against An Post's Recovery Plan and Mallow postal district proposals, Cllr. Kyne said it was important to highlight the loss of employment and much needed facilities.

"Many proposals have been put forward", he continued, "espousing to create new jobs which don't always deliver, either in number or in quality created". This, he believed, made it all the more reason that services and jobs be protected.

The UDC Chairman went on to say; "Again many government members and interested parties are stressing the importance of both urban and rural development as a strategy for job creation, how then", Cllr. Kyne submitted, "can it be entertained, that rural P.O.'s, who are delivering a vital service to many communities, are being targeted. These two strategies are just incompatible", he concluded.

As is clearly shown, the blame does not lay entirely at An Post's feet. After all, as Mallow Postmaster Donal Aherne said, "An Post is a commercial company with no State subvention and has to pay its own way".

This of course is in total contrast to the £7.3 million profit that the company made last year. Whatever unclear motivations or, as many believe, machinations, the 'rape of rural Ireland' has begun in earnest and it is up to us all to say 'enough is enough' to the powers that be.

Plan garden changes now!

YOUR garden should be blooming fully by now and highlighting just what features are working — and which are not.

While cooler months allow time and effort to make major changes, now is the time to identify the work involved.



Simply map out the garden on a sheet of squared paper on a clip board and then ask yourself whether the existing design fulfills your needs:

- Must it be labour-saving?
- It is costly — do you have to rely on help or regular planting of expensive stock?
- Is it suitable for the plants you prefer, both in condition and position.
- Quite simply, is it attractive? You may be happy to leave it alone or streamline its looks with varieties of plant giving new colour. However, if the questions raise doubts, here are a few solutions:

GRASS — providing you have a decent mower, a bigger lawn will reduce labour. Early July is the time to prepare the ground, with a view to seeding six weeks later so that the grass establishes before winter.

Dig over to one spade-depth, working in well-rotted compost and avoiding any compacting of the soil. Rake to a fine consistency and keep the new site weeded until you seed.

GREENHOUSE — even a cheap and cheerful unheated or cool greenhouse will help cut the cost of plant stock. Use it early in each year to raise plant and vegetable seeds.

It will also allow you to save money by growing vulnerable plants and crops such as begonias, squashes and tomatoes during the summer.

HEIGHT — gardens are often wonderfully symmetrical and interesting in a horizontal plane, but no thought has been given to the vertical — in short, they have no height! This is a particular risk if you have already taken the 'big lawn' route to save labour.

Fortunately, you can enjoy the best of both worlds by planting shrubs — these shouldn't require too much extra work, but can raise the profile of borders and beds around a big lawn.

You could also opt for cheap yet high rising plants at the backs of borders — sunflowers being an extreme example — or add features such as pergolas or trellising to encourage climbers.

A COTTAGE APPROACH — dissatisfaction may arise from the present garden being too geometric while quickly looking scruffy at the slightest neglect. A cottage garden is informal and should integrate closely with the house — roses or honeysuckle against the walls and around the door if possible. Planting up old pots and containers can add to the rambling effect. Scent also plays a part — roses, lavender and honeysuckle are most popular. But don't be too taken in by the informality — it can quickly degenerate into a jungle if neglected!

A Delicious Vegetable Flan

Savoury Flan

This delicious vegetable flan makes a light and nourishing meal. Serve hot or cold.

Ingredients

Dough

1lb. 5oz stoneground wholewheat flour
1 level dsp salt
1 level dsp sugar
1/2 oz vegetable fat
3 1/4 pts (plus a little) warm water (110°F)
3 level tpsps dried yeast
1 level tsp sugar
1x50mg Vitamin C tablet, crushed

Filling

1 small onion, chopped
1 small green pepper
1 aubergine
1 courgette
2oz mushrooms, all sliced
8oz tomatoes, skinned


and chopped

1 clove garlic, crushed
2 tbs vegetable oil
salt and pepper
1 egg beaten

Method

Dough — Stir dried yeast, vitamin C and 1 level tsp sugar into 8 fl oz of the warmed water. Leave in warm place for 10-15 mins until foam forms. Place flour, salt, sugar and fat in large warmed bowl and pour in yeast mix with remaining water. Turn out and knead 10 mins until smooth. Use 1 lb for flan; leave, covered, 20 mins. Shape remainder into rolls; leave 20-30 mins to rise. Bake with flan.

Filling — Fry garlic and onion in oil until soft. Add



remaining vegetables, simmer 15 mins until soft, stirring occasionally. Season. Cool. Roll dough on floured surface. Line greased 8 in. loose-based flat tin or ring. Fill. Cut remaining

dough into lattice strips. Brush case edges with egg, lay on strips, brush with remaining egg. Bake at 400° F, 200°C, gas mark 6, for 20 mins — leave rolls 5-10 mins longer.

Traffic Hazard To Ring Children

Imagine the quiet, picturesque village of Baile na nGall, located in the heart of the Ring Gaeltacht, stretching from Joe Foley's white house at the crossroads and gently sloping down to Ballinagoul pier.

Imagine small children playing on the roadside, enjoying the abandonment of Summer holidays, oblivious to all but their carefree antics.

Into this peaceful setting

comes the threat of speeding cars, each careening through the village, many of whom are Summer holidaymakers, unaware of the considerable danger they present to the village and its numerous young residents.

URGENT REQUEST FOR SPEED RAMPS

Understandably, there has been growing concern in the Baile na nGall camp over this particular traffic hazard. In a letter to the

County Engineer, John O'Flynn, dated 10th May, the residents state they are "strongly of the opinion that speed ramps would substantially reduce the danger of children being knocked down". A total of 38 signatures accompany this letter which, as yet, has not received a reply. Various councillors have also been lobbied by the anxious village residents, resulting in a 'Children At Play' sign being erected at the top of the village.

A spokesperson for the Baile na nGall residents told the Dungarvan Leader, that although the sign represented a small breakthrough in the residents' efforts, nevertheless, residents believe that such a sign is "highly insufficient" to highlight the danger of speeding to all oncoming traffic.

At present there are no speed limit signs in the village and drivers unfamiliar with the area are liable to gather speed, unaware that the road ends at famous Ballinagoul pier.

The spokesperson went on to say that there are presently 17 children under the age of eleven in the six new council houses in the village. Most of these children

are under the age of seven and have therefore very little road sense. Added to this, the spokesperson further reported 17-20 other children in the village. These children are particularly at risk during the Summer season when the population of Ring is increased by almost threefold with the influx of tourists, Ring College students, visiting families etc.

Not surprisingly, parents have had their hearts in their mouths at times when children have strayed onto the roadside while cars sped past oblivious. Many now feel that it is 'high time' that something be done to remedy the situation and have therefore made the urgent request to Waterford Co. Council to construct speed ramps in the village.

With the majority of the children most at risk being in the 6 council houses, it is commonly felt among the Baile na nGall residents that the onus is on the County Council to provide for the safety of these children. The bleak question most forefront in their minds is - will it take for a child to be knocked down before some action is taken? The residents can only wait in hope.



The residents of St. Finnans Avenue, Ardfinnan, were surprised and angry recently to see County Council workers removing the swings and other playing equipment from the local playground, as they had no prior knowledge that they were being removed. It was the residents themselves, with the help of local T.D.'s and County Councillors, who had been successful in obtaining the playing equipment from the County Council many years ago. Theresa Ahearn, T.D., M.C.C., and Michael Ferris, T.D., M.C.C., who made representations to the County Council on their behalf have been informed by the County Secretary that the reason for the removal was the problem of insurance

coverage and that some time prior to the removal all area councillors affected by the removal in Ardfinnan and other towns were notified of the position in which the Council found itself. In the case of Ardfinnan Community based groups such as the Community Council, the Tidy Towns Committee and the local G.A.A. club were also notified in the hope that it may have been possible for some of these groups to secure insurance coverage with regard to the playing equipment through the extension of their own policies. None of the groups concerned was in a position to provide the relevant insurance coverage. It was only when these avenues had been exhausted that the Council found it had no op-

tion but to remove the equipment. It was with great regret that the County Council took this decision but it must be appreciated that they could not continue to allow the equipment to stay in place in the absence of proper insurance coverage.

CALL FOR RETHINK ON GRAIN QUOTA

United Farmers Association calls on Agriculture Minister, Joe Walsh, to have a rethink on grain quota allocation.

The proposal to base grain quota on individuals rather than on the land where the grain has been grown is most unjust and exposes the brass neck of the larger farmer lobby once again. Many family farms, where grain growing would be the only option open if the owners are to remain in active farming, would be denied a quota under the penal proposal.

Many farmers are forced to let their land for periods, very often for reasons outside of their control, and it is legally and morally wrong to deny such farmers the right to a grain quota.

The Minister has but to look at the affect that the greedy large farmer lobby had on milk quota allocation to find his right direction in the matter of grain quotas. It is high time that our democratically elected government set up a Land and Quota Authority, as originally called for by U.F.A., to regulate land use and quota allocation.

U.F.A. fully supports family farmers in their fight to gain their fair share of any grain quota allocation and will support them in any legal battle that ensues if the unconstitutional and illegal Individual Base Area is foisted on them.



“Remembering Other Days”



In this week's Remembering Other Days feature we go back over 90 years to witness Mr. Andrew Carnegie lay the foundation stone of the new Waterford Free Library at Lady Lane, Waterford on October 19th, 1903. Among the attendance in the photo are the Librarian John J. Morrin, also the Lord Mayor, the Town Clerk and members of the borough staff, all in full-dress uniform.

This photo is only one of the many interesting period photographs on exhibition at St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas, dating from the middle of the last century to the 1950's.

HISTORIC PHOTOGRAPHS FOR KILMACTHOMAS

The National Library in conjunction with Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee are bringing a most interesting photographic exhibition to Kilmacthomas.

The exhibition will be on display in St. Declan's Community College for the months of July and August;

this is a case of making good use of the school facilities during the holiday period. The exhibition has been compiled by the National Library with the assistance of Kodak Ireland Limited. It features over one hundred period photographs illustrating many facets of Irish life which

have now disappeared. They date from the middle of the last century to the 1950's; some of the more recent items would be within the recall of people aged about forty and upwards.

The National Library has a quarter of a million photographs in the form of albums, individual prints and glass-plate negatives. Best known is the famous Lawrence Collection which is noted for the quality of the photography and for the fact that it includes views of practically every city, town and village in the country. While Lawrence is the best known collection, it is not the largest - this distinction belongs to the Poole collection which was generated by the family firm of A. H. Poole of 34, The Mall and 134, The Quay, Waterford. It amounts to 70,000 photographs taken over seventy years, from 1884 to 1954. The majority are portraits taken in the studio but there are also many group photographs commissioned by schools, religious orders and business concerns taken on site. The firm also acted as press photographers and the collection records many historic occasions. For instance, there are several views of the famous pig strike involving the dealers and the bacon factories which took place

in Waterford in the 1890's. The factories tried to bypass the dealers by buying directly from the farmers, a move which the dealers stoutly resisted.

The National Library casts its net widely and is not concerned exclusively with the work of professional photographers. Indeed, many of its most evocative pictures were taken by amateurs, including some by members of the landed gentry, a class which generally had the resources in terms of time and money to pursue a hobby which was formerly expensive, slow and cumbersome. Among the more interesting examples from that source are photographs from a Co. Galway landed estate taken by members of the aristocratic family of Dillon, Lords Clonbrock, from about 1860 to 1930.

A notable feature of the exhibition is a video by the late Kieran Hickey, The Light of Other Days. This review of life at the turn of the century was compiled from a selection of several hundred Lawrence photographs. Most of the photographs in the exhibition have been published in a book which is on sale at a discount price for the duration of the exhibition.



IFA Welcome Positive Decision On Ewe Premium

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan has welcomed the recent decision by the EU Sheep Management Committee to fix the first and second advances of the 1994 Ewe Premium at £11.55 per ewe, with an additional Rural World Premium payment of £4.83, bringing total payment to £16.38 per ewe in Disadvantaged Areas.

Calling on the Department of Agriculture to ensure that this badly needed income injection, worth in total over £70 million, is paid out swiftly to the country's 52,000 sheep farmers Mr. Hogg said: "over the last two weeks IFA made a strong case to the EU Commission in Brussels and the Department of Agriculture in Dublin to have both the first and second Ewe Premium advance fixed and paid out together, along with the maximum level of Rural World Premium. Our campaign has delivered the required result following last Friday's announcement, and this will provide a much needed boost to flock owners who have endured se-

vere losses because of the extreme weather conditions earlier this year and recent low market returns."

The Kinsalebeg sheep farmer said that Friday's announcement setting the level of Ewe Premium payment at £16.35/ewe in Disadvantaged Areas and £11.55/ewe in Non/Disadvantaged Areas compared very favourably with last year's figures of £16.57 and £11.47/ewe respectively. "Considering that lamb prices in Europe are running at between 5%-6% ahead of last year's level for most of the Spring, we did very well to hold the level of premium payment so high."

The Waterford Sheep Committee Chairman also welcomed the recent positive decision and said that following IFA's consultation with the Department of Agriculture, he was confident that payments would be made without delay during the month of July. "It is essential that the EU Regulation governing this decision is published immediately, clearing the way for the Department to proceed with payment to farmers."

Waterford ICMSA News

ICMSA representatives from the Waterford, Wexford and South Kilkenny areas met with Waterford Co-op personnel, Michael O'Neill and Pat Coady last Wednesday, June 29 in the Bridge Hotel, Waterford.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss circulars sent out to milk suppliers/traders/shareholders in relation to investment stock options.

The Waterford representatives which included John Cusack, John Dowley, Tom Hickey and John Skehan felt that farmers were confused with the circular and they welcomed the opportunity to discuss this issue with the Co-op personnel.

In future, the ICMSA delegation suggested that a simplified cover note should be attached to circulars which have to be worded in a long legal fashion.

The options open to farmers at the moment are either to take a cash return on their investment stock or buy Plc shares.

It was agreed at the meeting that anybody opting to buy shares would be contacted by the Co-op in order to fully explain the consequences of their decision.

At present it could be more beneficial to take the cash option.

Milk prices were also raised by the ICMSA delegation and the difference in prices across the country.

The Waterford Co-op personnel, informed the ICMSA group that there would be a

subsidised milk restructuring scheme which should be announced by the Department at the end of July. Also grants available for work on the new Dairy Directive should also be announced by the end of July.

Bulk tank grants are still available for suppliers under 30,000 gallons and anyone interested should contact the Co-op immediately. The quota position with Waterford Co-op is that they are on quota.

The meeting concluded with a discussion on the effects of Butter Fat increasing and thus increasing ones milk quota. As this is a very complex area, ICMSA will be covering it in their area meetings later in the year.

ICMSA Calls On State Bodies To Keep Countryside Clean

While farmers are playing their part in preserving the rural environment, the view of the chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, Mr. Maurice Harvey, is that the State, County Councils and some individuals are far from playing theirs.

Mr. Harvey said to-day that farmers take their role as guardians of the environment seriously, as is evidenced by the amount of expenditure which farmers have put into the farm improvement programme and as stated by the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Smith, who last week said that the number of cases of farm pollution have been significantly and successfully reduced.

"Litter dumped in the

countryside, crooked telephone poles, unsightly E.S.B. pylons, overgrown hedgerows and pot holed roads are unfortunately all common sights around the country", said Mr. Harvey.

LAW GOVERNING UNOFFICIAL DUMPING NEEDS TO BE STRENGTHENED

In his view the law governing unofficial dumping needs to be strictly enforced as a deterrent to would be offenders. The ICMSA is calling for the enforcement of stronger legislation to actively discourage dumping through severe fines and a strong anti litter campaign from the Department of the Environment.

DRUNKEN TELEPHONE POLES

Mr. Harvey said that the

sight of "staggering, drunken telephone poles dotted throughout the countryside" are a blight on the environment. He said that the least Telecom Eireann should do is to ensure that these unsightly, but necessary telephone poles are maintained in an upright position.

"What sort of an image do we want to portray to foreign visitors? As it stands the vision of our clean, well managed farms is marred by rubbish strewn hedgerows, lopsided telephone poles and ugly pylons. The Department of the Environment, County Councils and the State Bodies must work together to ensure that the countryside looks its best, not only for visitors but for all individuals who enjoy this great natural resource," said Mr. Harvey.

EU FUNDING INADEQUATE

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy has described the provision of IR£1.5m. as only a first step in the introduction of EU funding for the TB Eradication Programme which was first identified and pursued by IFA. Mr. Murphy was referring to the decision last week by the EU Standing Veterinary Committee to provide 5ECU (IR£4m.) to fund Ireland's TB and Brucellosis Eradication Programmes for the period July

1 to December 31, 1994. The Animal Health Committee Chairman said, "The Government must continue to pursue their commitment under the PCW to fully implement the agreement with the EU Commission of October 1992 which provided for IR£20m. in EU funding a year for four years for the Eradication Scheme."

Mr. Murphy said that IFA will be insisting that Brussels funding secured this week is used to ease the burden of animal health levies on Irish farmers.

Practice — I enjoyed myself in our neighbouring county, Kilkenny last week from Tuesday to Sunday. Mount Juliet was my precise location, a beautiful wooded place near Thomastown on the placid Nore. Hurling country. Home of Ollie Walsh, friend and foe of ours in those heady days when Waterford bestrode the hurling scene like a Colossus. I renewed acquaintance with a host of hurling "greats" like John Connolly, Pat Hartigan, Joe McKenna and Mickey Kelly (who scored the winning point against us in 1957).

The purpose of my visit was to savour and see that other game played with a small ball smaller than a sliotar: golf. And I wasn't disappointed. It was a fascinating experience to see close-at-hand how those professional practitioners prepared for every day's golf. All of us - hurlers, footballers, camogie players - could learn from them.

I watched Faldo, Langer, Daly, Ellis and the other stars of world golf many times prior to teeing off. They all spent at least two hours in the practice area (Mt. Juliet has probably the finest practice facilities of the whole European circuit). A minimum of 200 balls each were struck — drives, long irons, chips, pitches and putts - under the shrewd eyes of their coach. They constantly strove for perfection, a perfection which, in fact, is unattainable. They set their sights at mastery of a game which has always

defied even the most dedicated and gifted. If it were possible to maintain the highest standard indefinitely we could confidently nominate each week's winner. Faldo, for instance is fastidious in his approach to practice and is singleminded in his dedication to the elimination of faults. With his highly-respected coach, David Leadbetter, he has put down a marker for all others as his record of successes verifies. But he didn't win last week-end. Or the week-end before. Yet his devotion to practice never wanes.

We hurlers know how hard it is to master our game. Do you know that there are 125 individual skills in hurling. No hurler yet has mastered all, and very few players, except those at the very top, invest sufficient time and effort in training and the acquisition of skills. Any hurler naive enough to think that 90 minutes twice a week is sufficient to get him to the top should think again. At any session only seven or eight skills can be practiced and sometimes the game's most important skill - striking the ball - gets far too little time whereas that skill

should get priority. In golf hours of practice are devoted to striking the ball from a variety of positions in rough, bunker or on fairway not merely before the start of tournament play but each evening after their round has been completed. You only do in any game what you have practised hundreds of times.

The point is that with our great game, hurling, only a fraction of the time needed is invested in skill training. In some cases the wrong skills - solo and handpass for example - get most time. Being an amateur game with the players needing to work for a living and having to restrict their leisure hours on the hurling field, the development of hurling has been severely curtailed. Unless and until some support scheme is devised which will alter this situation the standards will continue to decline and we will live to rue our complacency or indifference or ignorance or whatever it is. We will be ignoring the lessons taught by Rafferty, Clarke, Olazabal, Ballesteros and the rest and become accessories of the slow demise of our greatest national game.

(Continued)


Last week we wrote about Mrs. Maher who spent the best part of her teaching life in Ballinacourty and that she retired in 1934. During her time a problem existed because the maps in the school were outdated as Europe changed a lot after the 1914 - 1918 war. The cost of a new map was £11. This was quite a sum of money

in these days as the people were very poor. So Mrs. Maher and her assistant decided that the best way to get a new map was to run a concert and have a few plays to raise the money to pay for it. Everything was organised for November 1930. The plays and concerts were produced by Nell Power and Mrs. Maher and they also made the costumes as they were gifted at needlework. Many cattle and sheep grazed the land around the school. The pupils were able to pick wool off the bushes where the sheep had sheltered. Tom Burke fed the cattle with hay in the winter time and when they were eating the hay one pupil cut the ringlets off their tails and these were made into wigs for the plays. If the part of an old person was being played, then the wool also helped in making the wigs.

When they were producing Cinderella the ringlets from the cows tails made ideal wigs for the nobility. When the time for the play came round Dick Joy and John Elstead got the donkey and cart from Tom Burke and went down to Ballinroad to get the platform for the play from Tommy and Yank Morrissey. They then went around to the houses to borrow a chair or a stool to seat the crowd. The names of the owners were written with chalk underneath so that no mistakes would be made when the time came to bring them back.

The play and concert were a great success. It was decided to stage the concert on another Sunday night in Ballinroad old school and this was also a big success and a number of people walked out from Abbeyside to see it. They made enough money to buy two maps instead of one. One was a map of Ireland with the names of the places written in Irish. The other was a new map of Europe.

MUNSTER HURLING SEMI-FINAL

Waterford Qualify For Munster Final After Terrific Display

WATERFORD 2-10 TIPPERARY 0-15

The ecstatic Waterford supporters who gave vent to their feelings of joy and delight at the end of this tremendously exciting Munster minor hurling semi-final, was like a play-back to Pairc Ui Caoimh in 1992, when after a nerve-wrecking draw, we went back there to beat the then champions by two points in a game that no Waterford hurling man is likely to forget.

This had all the hallmarks of a repeat performance as Tipperary, the present reigning Munster champions had to give best to a brilliant Waterford team who had run the hot favourites into the ground in the first 20 minutes and at which time were not at all flattered by their eight points lead.

Our lead was seven points at half time and eventually whittled away completely when Tipperary drew level with six minutes remaining. They then mucked up a chance to go ahead and a Waterford free was directed dead straight between the posts by Dave Bennett for the winner.

Both teams fielded as selected and both had been without a championship game up to this stage, as Kerry had withdrawn from their first round match with Tipperary. I'm sure that the selectors in doing their post match analysis of the game will express great concern at the fact that we were kept scoreless for 24 minutes of the second half and allowed our opponents to take control and rifle over eight points in succession. An inquest is needed on that one.

The only other worrying feature as far as we were concerned was that of our 13 wides, eight should have been scores. Tipperary had 15 wide, but far less were from scorable positions. On the credit side it must be clearly emphasised that they were a great side to go far enough in front to give themselves a respectable amount of leeway in the event of a Tipperary resurgence. Our half time tally would have been far greater had we not squandered two splendid scoring chances in the first quarter.

Anyway we beat the Munster champions fairly and squarely and that is really what matters in the end. A lot of work has been done with the team and they have responded magnificently and taken us to the final. What more could a body want from them?

PLAY

Tipperary sharpshooter and the game's top scorer, Johnny Enright, opened for Tipperary with a point from play in the second minute, but Dave Bennett equalised from a free a minute later. David Byrne's 5th minute goal was the result of some

splendid hurling outfield and the keeper was left with no chance from Byrne's rocket. Barry Walsh had a Waterford point in the sixth minute and Michael White had another in the 8th, and the score after 10 minutes of exciting play was 1-4 to 0-1 after Dan Shanahan had sent in our fifth score.

Tipperary's corner forward had a 12th minute point and between this and the 14 minute, Waterford had two awful misses for goals. Two goals at this stage would have put the game out of reach for Tipperary. However the pressure was maintained and a 16th min. Dan Shanahan goal was followed by a brilliant goal by clubmate Dave Bennett to open up a nine points gap by the 17th minute. Some obvious anxiety on the Tipperary sideline brought about a substitution and a number of switches and this repair job resulted in their being brought back into the game. They had points by Enright, Cahill and Horgan to reduce the leeway to just two goals by the 24th minute. Ray McGrath pointed before the break to leave the score 2-6

to 0-5. Waterford had seven first half wides and Tipperary had eight.

SECOND HALF

Waterford faced the breeze and strong sun and had their lead rescued to just four points within two minutes as the accurate Enright pointed twice. Back came Waterford with points by Ray McGrath and Barry Walsh. Waterford went further ahead with a Michael White point in the 37th min. but Enright brought two back to keep them in contention. At this stage Tipperary's midfield came strongly into the game with the result that their forwards got a better supply of the ball and consequently more scores. In the final ten minutes they were in control and points by Moloney (2), Enright (2) and Cahill (2) brought them level with us in the 54th minute and Waterford, not have scored for 23 minutes, looked out of the game.

Johnnie Enright missed from a scoreable free in the 56th minute and this chance of luck for us was greeted with a great cheer. The sides were still deadlock in the 60th minute and in time added on we were awarded a free which Dave Bennett rifled over with delightful accuracy to leave us winners and into our second Munster final in two years.

Tipperary were understandably very disappointed as they had made no secret of their confidence before the game. They conceded afterwards that Waterford's brilliant first half display won them the match.

Minor Hurlers Play Cork In Final At Thurles

Under 21 Footballers In Final Against Cork At Fraher Field

The last occasion on which two Munster finals involving Waterford teams, were previewed in the same issue of this paper was back in 1948. This week, we write about our two matches against Cork and we will have precious little time to recover (one way or another) from the result of the hurling final at Semple Stadium, before going back into action against the same county in Under 21 football at Fraher Field on Wednesday. A few nights later we play Clare in minor football and probably within a week of this we play Limerick/Tipperary in Under 21 hurling, somewhere. So now things are coming fast and furious and understandably many of the club championships have to go by the board for a while. Some that should not have been postponed, have gone off because of unfair pressure by the selectors. I will refer to this matter later.

Four Munster championship games within the next two weeks is going to mean a very busy time for players, officials and mentors, while clubs sit around waiting and wondering how the results of these matches will affect them. Regardless of what inconveniences may be caused to clubs or individuals, everyone will be rooting for the teams in all their matches. Whatever else happens, the county comes first with everyone and that is one of the better things about attitudes in Waterford.

Judging by the number of enquiries being made for tickets, we are going to have a huge following at Semple Stadium on Sunday to cheer the minors in their bid to reverse the result of their meeting with the Rebels at Pairc Ui Caoimh last year when they beat us by 2-12 to 0-12 in a thriller. It was reckoned that on the night, Waterford supporters outnumbered

Cork at their venue. That was a splendid game of hurling that we might have won, but at least we showed in the game that we had no fears of Cork. Their only survivor from that game is their goalkeeper Brian Hurley while Waterford have Barry Walsh, David Byrne, Derek McGrath and Dave Bennett, who was a substitute last year.

In their semi-final against Limerick they had a run-away victory over a poor side that made Cork look good.

At the same time they have some great hurlers and are particularly strong in defence where Kevin Egan, Pat Walsh, Brian McSweeney and Sean Og Halpin will cause problems for us. Still, I'm told that Tipperary having watched Cork beat Clare in the first round, were happy enough that they could take care of them in the final. Waterford having taken care of Tip-

perary and believing in themselves can beat Cork. We have a splendid team with a very good panel of substitutes and if they can be tuned up to approach the final in the proper frame of mind, we must, at least stand an even chance of taking the title.

In the semi-final, the line-out underwent an amazing number of positional changes during the hour, but the team which was announced on Monday is the same as that which lined out against Tipperary.

Patrick Dunphy who played splendidly in goal against Tipperary will again mind our net and Eoin Sullivan, Andy Hubbard and Michael Murray, with Tom Flynn, Jas. O'Meara and Kieran Curran will again form our defence while Michael Molumphy and Roy McGrath again fill the mid-field berths.

Derek McGrath who played against Cork last year and who captains the side was the only forward not to score against Tipperary, but he played a substantial role in our victory and is on at centre forward. Dave Bennett, our top scorer, David Byrne, Dan Shanahan, Michael White and Barry Walsh are also retained and will combine well to make a formidable attacking machine. Cork will start favourites but if we go in with the right attitude we could find that we are good enough to beat them. What a wonderful result that would be for the county.

MUNSTER UNDER 21 FOOTBALL FINAL

Fraher field will see its biggest crowd since it reopened when Waterford play hosts to Cork on Wednesday evening of next week for the provincial final. This will be the first big championship crowd at the field since Waterford beat Limerick in a first round on the eve of the closure in May last year. What a wonderful way it would be to celebrate our first

final in the field, by beating Cork who are the hottest of favourites and are being tipped in some quarters to take the All-Ireland title, which they were sure of doing last year, before Kerry shocked them. Cork made sure that this would not happen again this year and travelled to Tralee on the last Wednesday in April for a show-down that resulted in one of the greatest Under 21 football spectacles since the championship was inaugurated in the early sixties. Cork won on a scoreline of 2-12 to 1-10 after their scoring machine of Kavanagh, Harrington, O'Sullivan (who scored 2-3 in the number 15 jersey) got going.

Many of our football people reckon that we have a better team than that which lost to Kerry (1-21 to 3-5) in the final at Walsh Park last year. Kerry eventually lost to Meath in the All-Ireland final.

We have taken care of Clare and Limerick (in reverse order) already and with a team who have prepared very well, who continue to improve and who can be made to believe in themselves, we must have a chance. Conditions and the setting for the game are ideal for Waterford who are certain to give of their very best before a huge home following. The team will be published in next week's issue.

MUNSTER UNDER 21 HURLING

The first round match between Limerick and Tipperary ended in a draw at Limerick on Thursday evening last and the replay has been fixed for next Wednesday, July 13th. This is the date on which we were due to play the winners of that game so our game is now likely to take place on the following Wednesday July 20th. If Tipperary win, we will play them at Walsh Park, while we must travel to Limerick, if Limerick survive the replay.

The Gaeltacht team led by to 1-3 at halftime and with some well taken scores in the second half, were able to stay well in front until the final whistle to give them a deserved win.


REFEREES

Austin Deasy Raises T.V. Transmission Issue

Newly elected member of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Cllr. Austin Deasy T.D. raised the controversial issue of the continued interruption of R.T.E. 1 and Network 2 transmission signals in West Waterford at a recent adjournment debate in the Dail on Thursday, June 30.

Particularly affected by the transmission interruption are the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow.

The following is the response given by the Minister for Transport, Energy and Communications, Brian Cowen T.D.:

"I want to point out once again, in this House, as has been previously stated here, that investigation of problems with the reception of R.T.E. 1 and Network 2, is a matter for R.T.E. itself, in the first instance. R.T.E. have the technical expertise and the local resources to investigate such complaints effectively. If, following those initial investigations, there is evidence of interference from another frequency spectrum use, R.T.E. will inform our Department, which then takes responsibility for the matter and liaises directly with R.T.E. Indeed, where interference is brought to the attention of our Department, it will initiate such liaison directly. In general, where there is an issue, which relates to R.T.E. reception, which involves the local cable or MMDS operator, both parties work together to sort out such problems, and they keep the technical staff of our Department informed on progress.

"The towns of Cappoquin, Tallow and Lismore receive Multi-Channel Television via a cable system, which is owned by Cork Communications Ltd., the local cable franchisee. Last Christmas Cork Communications Ltd. made some changes to the systems in the towns of Lismore and Tallow, in order to

increase the number of T.V. channels, available to their subscribers.

"I understand that difficulties with the frequency settings for the new channels resulted in interference to the reception of R.T.E. 1 and Network 2. Following investigation of the matter, some adjustments to the frequencies involved were made and this solved the problem.

"Last week Cork Communications Ltd. requested R.T.E. engineers to examine the quality of R.T.E. reception in these areas, i.e. Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow. The Company wishes to ensure that R.T.E. reception was not affected in any way by the operation of the local cable systems. As the issue involved more than one user of the frequency spectrum, our Department was informed. R.T.E. engineers have been working in the area during last week. They investigated the quality of the reception and found that there was no question of interruption of service as such. They felt however that reception quality was not satisfactory and that it would benefit from some adjustments to the local cable system. I understand that they made these recommendations to the Cable Company, which is currently carrying them out.

"I understand that these adjustments are expected to bring the quality of the reception up to the standards, which will satisfy R.T.E., and the liaison between R.T.E. and Cork Communications Ltd. will be ongoing. Our Department will be kept informed of developments.

"I also believe that there may be other reception problems in the area relating purely to the quality of the R.T.E. signal, involving R.T.E. Radio 2, and these are being addressed directly by R.T.E.
