Overgrown Hedges Put Lives At Risk

Cash strapped Waterford County Council is to dig even deeper into its already over stretched coffers, following last Monday's agreed amendment to incur between £50,000 to £70,000 overexpenditure to cut all hedges the Council is legally liable for.

Under the 1993 Act, all hedges/ditches on their land, while grass verges come under the authority of

the Council.

LIVES AT RISK

Earlier at the monthly County Council meeting, Cllr. Nora Flynn (F.G.) put forward the original proposal whereby the Council would incur overexpenditure to cut all road verges and ditches irrespective of the landowners legal responsibility. Her proposal was seconded by Cllr. Tom Cunningham.

Strongly hitting out at the dangerous hedge growth situation, Cllr. Flynn said the Council's low finances were putting people's lives at risk.

"It's physically impossible to keep the road clear with the workforce we have", de-

clared the Cappoquin Councillor adding that she hoped the Council would not be passing a vote of sympathy at their next meeting, to families of bereaved individuals who had died as a direct result of the dangerous roads.

County Engineer John O'Flynn informed the meeting that the cost of clearing up the entire county road network would lie in the region of £50,000 - £70,000, which, he added, would put the jobs of the outdoor staff further at risk. In reply, Cllr. Flynn stressed it was a matter of lives over jobs "and the proposal is that lives be

Wright Slams Rent Increases

The recent differential rent scheme, which saw the introduction of sudden, massive rent increases for Council tenants, was stinging attacked by Cllr. Tony Wright (D.L.) at last week's meeting of Dungarvan U.D.C.

Implemented since May 7, the revised rent scheme called for increases of up to 136% for lower income tenants while decreasing rent for those in the higher income bracket.

Examples of rent under the revised scheme include:

Each rent is calculated as a percentage of the principal earner's income without any allowances for earnings of children. At present there are 51 tenants assessed under the hardship clause. This clause applies only in exceptional circumstances where, in the Council's opinion, payment of rent would give rise to hardship. The Council may then agree to accept a lesser sum from a tenant for a specified period.

Knockanore Lights Crisis

The following is the reply by Waterford County Engineer, John O'Flynn to a recent letter from Brendan Kenneally, T.D., who had written on behalf of the people in the Knockanore area concerning the lack of public lighting:—

"The existing public lighting at Knockanore consists of one light only near the church entrance. Four additional lights, at least are

considered to be necessary in the area at the following locations — (a) near the Health Centre, (b) near the National School, (c) opposite the pub, (d) at the top of the Village (past the shop). The approximate cost of 4 new 55 Watt SOX Lanterns on existing poles would be about £650.00. Of the foregoing, the priority areas would, we feel, be near the school and opposite the pub.

"I regret that no funds have been provided in the Council's estimates for the last few years for any new lighting and in the absence of any budget for the purpose I am unable to provide lights anywhere in Co. Waterford in 1994. Knockanore is but one of many towns, villages and settlements throughout the county in need of new lights or upgrading of existing lights." — Signed: John O'Flynn, County Engineer.

GLENMORE MOTORIST AWARDED DAMAGES

An early morning incident in 1990, in which a car spun 180°, somersaulted and landed on its roof, was recalled before Judge Diarmuid P. Sheridan at the Trinity sittings of Dungarvan Circuit Court last Wednesday.

Plaintiff in the civil action, Mary Donnelly of Glenmore, Dungarvan claimed for damages in excess of £5,000 against Eamonn Foley, Grange, Youghal, whom, she claimed, had caused her to crash on December 16, 1990, when he pulled the handbrake of her car while she was driving it.

DIDN'T FEEL THREATENED

During lengthy evidence it was claimed by the plaintiff that on the date in question, she had gone to a night club in the town. At the end of the night, at around 2 a.m., Miss Donnelly had met the defendant who was a friend of her brother.

She said Foley had been insistent that he accompany her back to her car which was parked at Davitt's Quay. She described him as being drunk but said she did not feel threatened as he had only asked for a lift to a take-away in Grattan Square where she was to collect her brother.

On arriving at the take-away, the plaintiff asked Foley on two occasions to call her brother but the defendant could not find him and subsequently sat back in the front passenger seat of the car. Only later did she find out that her brother had met with some friends.

On a ruse to get the defendant out of her car, Miss Donnelly told the court that

she then drove to another take away where she again asked Mr. Foley to get out and call her brother. Her plan failed however and the defendant got back into the car before she could close the passenger door and drive away.

At that stage the defendant told her he didn't have a lift and that he lived at Kiely's Cross. Deciding that the defendant was drunk though not obstreperous, Miss Donnelly said she'd give him a lift.

MADE A PASS

Continuing her evidence, Miss Donnelly said she had taken the 'back way' home via a secondary road which knocked 1/2 mile off her journey. When driving around a roundabout, the defendant had suddenly made a pass at her by lunging himself across her. She became irritated and he sat back in his seat but kept asking where the handbrake was. At this Miss Donnelly grew nervous and kept her hand down by her side to protect the handbrake. She was driving at about 35 m.p.h. along an S bend.

"VIOLENTLY PULLED UP HANDBRAKE"

"Totally violently and unexpectedly Foley pulled up the handbrake as far as he could", said the plaintiff, explaining that the car subsequently spun to the left and rebounded off the ditch to

land upside down on its roof, facing the opposite direction. Miss Donnelly was uninjured in the crash and saw that the defendant had passed out.

On exiting the car, the plaintiff panicked and went into shock. About one minute later a car came on the scene. "I went berserk and started screaming - 'he pulled the handbrake'", Miss Donnelly told the court. Her car, which was some 6 months old, was a write-off and was later scrapped for salvage.

HAD VOLUNTEERED TO PAY

Also giving evidence was retired Garda Michael Dolan who had interviewed Foley later that same day. Ex Garda Dolan informed the court that when asked if he had pulled the handbrake, the defendant said he couldn't remember and stated "why should I do it". He admitted having consumed 7/8 pints of beer that night. The ex-Garda went on to say that Foley had volunteered to pay Miss Donnelly £5,000 compensation by the following Thursday.

CONFLICTING EVIDENCE

Also giving evidence, the defendant denied the plaintiff's claim that he had left the car on three occasions to look for her brother. He claimed that both himself and Miss Donnelly had left the night club together and had spent half an hour in her car before she offered to drive him home. The defendant claimed they were driving at 50/60 m.p.h. and denied grabbing the handbrake. The next day, Miss Donnelly and her two brothers had called to his house and had accused him of causing the crash. "She demanded £5,000 off me...I was shocked", Foley told the court, "she said she'd give me until Thursday".


The defendant denied that he had told Garda Dolan he would pay the £5,000 compensation.

DECREE FOR £5,425

In relation to Foley's denial of Garda Dolan's evidence, Judge Sheridan said the court "does not take lightly to allegations of this nature". The 'touchstone' on which the Judge relied on, was Garda Dolan's evidence shortly after the accident. "I couldn't imagine that Foley would volunteer the money if he thought he wasn't guilty", Judge Sheridan declared. Miss Donnelly was subsequently awarded a decree for £5,425 and costs. A stay was put on the order in the event of an appeal.

QUESTION OF PUBLIC TOILETS

The current condition of Dungarvan's public toilets at Davitt's Quay was the subject of a notice of motion moved by Cllr. Tony Wright (DL) at the Dungarvan UDC meeting last week.

While canvassing for the recent local elections, one of the many issues Cllr. Wright had encountered was the relocation of the town's public toilets.

"People are just not happy with the condition, location and level of vandalism at the public toilets", Cllr. Wright informed the meeting.

Sharing the Councillor's concern, Cllr. Nuala Ryan suggested the possibility of leasing the toilets to interested parties or of investigating the possibility of a modern 'Superloo'.

Agreeing with the idea of a 'Superloo' as opposed to an alternative site for the toilets, Cllr. Paddy Power said such a modern toilet would be practically vandal free and would blend in easily with its surroundings.

There followed many suggestions from the various members.

Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney said the cost of purchasing new toilets would be £40,000, while to lease the building would cost £12,000.

It was unanimously decided that the Town Clerk look at all possibilities such as leasing, purchasing, an alternative location, 'Superloo' etc. for the next monthly meeting of the Council.

A MONTH FOR THE LITTLE JOBS

July is a month when gardeners need to do a little of a lot of jobs despite a temptation to sit back and enjoy the fruits of labour.



WATERING — hot sunshine means you must make the most of the chore by watering when it's cool — either early in the day or, even better, at the end.

This causes less shock to plants, cuts evaporation and helps water reach the roots.

Mimic the effect of light rain by using a tight sprinkler setting or, if you have a hose ban, a fine rose on the watering can.

A ban is also an encouragement to acquire a rain butt — it's natural water and, if you are on a water meter, it comes free!

COMPOST — there will be plenty of garden clippings for the compost heap providing they are free from weeds and non-woody.

They will soon decompose in warm weather, particularly if you keep the heap well-wetted and stewing nicely.

You can help further by adding a branded compost maker to each layer and regularly turning sides inwards so that the heap rots evenly.

MULCH — grass cuttings can be used as mulch, albeit a rather scruffy one, to keep weeds down and soil moisture in around less glamorous areas of the garden such as the vegetable patch.

LAWN — with the lawn growing fast there is a temptation to mow it short, but it scorches in bright sunshine. So, ease off the blades and keep it as well-watered as possible.

ROSES — these will be coming into their prime and dead-heading spent or wilting blooms will maintain a vigorous supply of colour.

Non-hybrid tea varieties yield healthy cuttings about now. Pick out strong shoots about nine inches long and plant them in good firm soil.

As you work, check roses for pests such as aphids/greenfly and signs of mildew or black spot. Cut away infection early and spray if necessary — use sparingly, protect your skin and never spray in a breeze.

HEDGES — these may be getting out of hand and it is better to trim a little regularly rather than give varieties such as privet a 'short, back and sides.'

VEGETABLES — think about planting Savoy cabbage, leeks and sprouting broccoli.

STRAWBERRIES — Pick these as soon as they ripen and don't leave any of the crop which are over-ripe, mouldy or diseased as they may spoil others. Pull up plants about four years old as they will not crop well from now on. You are better off using the space for fresh plants and these need not cost anything — simply tie down some healthy runners into pots of compost set in the ground. Once rooted, they can be cut away, dug up and brought on, ready for planting in August.

Potato-Artichoke Soup & Marinated Courgette & Apple Salad



Here's a tasty low-fat soup paired with a zippy salad — enjoy!

Ingredients

Soup:

4 cups chicken broth
1/2 medium onion, diced
2 medium potatoes, pared and cubed
3 medium artichokes, cut in half
1/8 cup unsalted butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups low-fat or skim milk
1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce
salt and pepper to taste

Method

Heat chicken broth in large pot. Add artichokes. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Remove artichokes and broth. Melt margarine and saute onion five minutes in medium saucepot. Add to broth along with potatoes and simmer 15 minutes. Remove leaves, stems and thistle from artichokes and discard. Keep the heart or bottom and add to the soup. Cook 10 minutes. Add milk and Worcestershire sauce.



Simmer five minutes. Remove from heat. Puree mixture until very smooth. Serve hot or cold.

Ingredients Salad:

1 red pepper, thinly sliced

3 large courgettes, cut into thin rounds
1 medium onion, sliced
1/4 tsp salt
2 large tart apples, thinly sliced
creamy blue cheese

salad dressing.

Method

Combine all ingredients in large bowl. Pour on the dressing and toss gently. Serves 6.

Call For Improved Wheelchair Access

UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) has called on the Urban Council to devise a strategy in the Town Development Plan to encourage and achieve improved wheelchair access for the public.

In moving his notice of motion at last week's meeting of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Kyne urged that the Council be more active in trying to encourage such ac-

cess to both proposed and existing developments, buildings and public areas. Should these proposals be included in a specific section of the Town Plan, Cllr. Kyne felt the Council could then 'open up dialogue' with owners of existing buildings such as the cinema etc.

Bank, the TSB and the Bank Of Ireland for providing excellent wheelchair access.

Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney submitted that a policy regarding access for the physically disabled in the design of new buildings was already included in the Draft Town Development Plan.

Judge's "Loathing" For Receivers Of Stolen Property

A Circuit Court Judge has spoken of his "loathing" of those who received stolen property.

Judge Diarmuid P. Sheridan made his comment at Dungarvan Circuit Court when an unemployed father of six, Francis Kerrigan, Halting Site, Shandon, Dungarvan, appealed against the severity of a six month prison sentence in the District Court for receiving stolen property.

The court heard that Kerrigan paid £30 for property valued £420 which had been stolen from a local stainless steel manufacturing plant.

When told that the appellant had no previous convictions, Judge Sheridan adjourned the issuing of the prison warrant for one year to see how he behaves in the interim.

County Cork Girl Awarded Damages

A seven year old Co. Cork girl, who was injured when the car in which she was a passenger was involved in a head-on collision with another vehicle on the main Dungarvan-Youghal road last year was awarded damages of more than £11,000 by Judge Diarmuid P. Sheridan in settlement of her civil action at Dungarvan Circuit Court.

Eilish Delaney, suing through her mother, Mrs. Josephine Delaney, Lissarda, Macroom, brought a claim for £30,000 damages

against Michael Harty, Ballynamona, Old Parish, Dungarvan, arising from the accident at Newtown, Grange, Youghal, on August 7th, 1993.

The court heard that the child sustained lacerations on the inside of her right leg and a laceration on the inside of her thigh. She had, however, now made a full recovery.

Judge Sheridan approved of a settlement of £10,000 damages to the plaintiff together with agreed special damages of £1,056.

£250,000 TO RESTORE HISTORIC CHURCH

One of the historic churches in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore, the 150 year old Parish Church of St. Mary's in Clonmel which featured in a recent series of RTE Programmes and was admired by viewers all over the country, is in need of a huge £250,000 repair job.

The battle-scarred St. Marys Parish Church in

Clonmel whose parish extends into Co. Waterford where it bounds Fourmilewater, battered by weather and time over a century and a half, looked none the worse for wear when it was the star of the Easter Ceremonies broadcast live from there by RTE.

But behind the beautiful stained glass windows, ornate plasterwork ceiling and

the magnificent altar, are serious problems of dry rot, wet rot and other deterioration. And last week the priests of the parish launched a weekly envelope collection to raise the funds needed to put these right.

"We are appealing to everybody to be as generous as they can in giving to the envelope collection," said Parish Priest, Rev. Fr. Martin Slattery, P.P. He paid tribute to the sacrifices, faith and generosity of the parishioners which helped to build the church way back in 1850 and which helped improve and maintain it up until now. And he is confident that 7,000 parishioners living in St. Marys this day will not be found wanting. Together we hope we will be able to leave the church in a sound condition for those who will worship in it in the years to come.

The present St. Mary's Church dates from 1850 when the erection of walls and roof was completed, although the church did not then have a ceiling and had only a rubble or sand floor.

The impressive stucco ceiling was made possible by a legacy from the estate of a local whiskey vendor, granted in 1854. The great high altar was completed in 1867, the year in which Rev. Fr. John Baldwin, P.P., died after spending 32 years as parish priest, building the beautiful new church and caring for the needs of his flock through times marked by strife and famine. He died on June 2, 1867. He was replaced by Rev. Fr. Thomas English, P.P., on September 26, 1867.

WEEKEND COURSING NOT ON

Members of coursing clubs throughout Ireland have rejected a proposal; to move the National coursing finals held in Clonmel from a midweek to a weekend date. They voted overwhelmingly in favour of keeping the traditional midweek date for the National Coursing finals.

Mr. Garry Desmond, Irish Coursing Club Secretary, confirmed this week that the finals would take place next year on a midweek date from Monday, Jan. 30 to Wednesday, Feb. 1. The proposal to change to a weekend date was met with considerable opposition from the Clonmel District Open Coursing Club.

The finals have been held on a midweek date since they began in Clonmel in the early twenties. Some members of the Executive of ICC felt a weekend date would be better and it was decided to float the idea among members throughout the country. "I don't think there will be any change now in view of the reaction of the members."

The Secretary said that the Connacht Provincial Committee supported the weekend date while the other three provincial committees voted against changing to a weekend date. He said the members of Clonmel and District Open Coursing Club would be very perturbed if the finals were moved to a weekend date.

The main reasons given by members who voted against the idea of moving to the weekend date was the current success, and a change to a weekend could have a detrimental effect on attendances because of other sporting fixtures.

As a Garda, Tadhg served in a number of stations and prior to his promotion in 1973 was District Clerk at Dungarvan. On promotion he was transferred to Rathgormack and after a short time to Kill where he spent nine years as Sergeant in

Charge before returning to Dungarvan. His nine years in Kill were perhaps the most fulfilling years of his service. An example of his integration with the community was his involvement in, and total commitment to the building of the Kill Community Centre.

The entire community wishes Tadhg and Maura many years of happy retirement.





TALLOW NOTES

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

Inquest in Quest of Answers — We who have become inured to disappointment over the last 46 years - with the honourable exception of 1992 - left Semple Stadium on Sunday philosophically shrugging shoulders and accepting defeat when the buoyant hopes of a success-starved County were once more dashed. We can, of course, console ourselves that Cork were a good team, that the winners had all the luck, got all the breaks and that we fought gallantly to the final whistle. We can also take pride in the splendid goal-keeping of Pat Dunphy and the outstanding display of Tom Flynn whose bravery and defiance were inspiring. Clare and ourselves shared a similar fate: defeated by better opponents, who were made to look better by our deficiencies. No wonder the heads were down, the flags limp and the blue and gold/white and blue hats pressing heavily on our tortured heads. From our point of view our weaknesses were glaringly exposed by the well-prepared Corkmen who, after the first ten minutes, were never seriously threatened.

Those who saw Waterford dethrone Munster minor hurling champions Tipperary in the semi-final last week tell me that this Thurles display didn't do us justice; that we are far better than Sunday's showing. Perhaps, but some of the weaknesses revealed by Cork were basic and must have lain dormant. We were very slow at centre back and at full back. The first two balls that our centre back contest-

ed, in the air, went clean over his hurley as he sought to keep in front of the centre forward. He misjudged both putting pressure on himself and on the full back line who struggled to contain their own immediate opponents. Soundness in a back-line is more important than spectacular play. A back who gets to a ball, airborne or on the ground, first, stops it and tips it away before clearing to his team's advantage, fulfills the basic requirements.

We tried to catch almost every ball around the mid-field area. A good opponent won't allow you to do this; he'll know where to stand under the dropping ball so that you won't gain possession. Clearly we didn't know how to deal with the airborne ball, forward or back. Only in certain circumstances are you certain to catch a falling ball so you have to think of another stratagem, something simple and practical. The coach should suggest options which are effective.

It is necessary to say again that the hallmark of great teams, past or present, was missing on Sunday: ground hurling? We saw little of it and what we saw was laboured and ineffective. It seems a complete waste of time to keep going on about a skill which it seems, has a low priority rating among all Waterford teams just now. Where we should have seen the ground ball used a lot, at midfield and in the half forward line, that was a surfeit of the poke-pick-handle-kick or pass regime including there sublimest of fatuous strategies: the pass to no-

body/anybody. Possession, therefore, was impossible to use profitably.

Tackling was another area of embarrassment, just as it is with the senior team. There are legitimate tackles which may be employed without having recourse to a mild form of briar cutting, attempted strangulation or keeping a firm grip of opponents hurley, jersey or family jewels. An essential ingredient of the good tackle is patience. By good footwork and timing the opponent can be disadvantaged, his target reduced, and his stroke hindered. We saw one good example of the inept tackle during the first half. A Cork forward in possession bursting between two Waterford defenders was confronted by Waterford's No. 6 who flattened him with a full blooded shoulder to the chest. Cork, of course, pointed the ensuing free. The Corkman had used three of his permitted four steps and had O'Meara waited a fraction longer the forward would have been forced to play the sliotar risking almost certain dispossession.

Really this lesson from Sunday (if we wish to compete at this level) is that we need to quicken up everything - our thinking, getting to the ball, on the ball, shifting ourselves and taking the correct option! The main element of Cork's display, to my mind, was the speed at which they performed each of those things. That quickness and alertness enabled them to turn the half chances into full chances: scores. We could train our teams to reach that standard if we gave it the time, the hundreds of hours necessary. Tom Cashman and Jimmy Barry-Murphy did it for their county. Why should we aspire to anything less?



SCHOOLS AMALGAMATION

Since the news of the amalgamation of both the Primary Schools of C.B.S. and Presentation Convent broke in the national and local papers last week many questions have been asked by the parents.

We ourselves did say in these notes last week we would keep our readers informed. Unfortunately we have been unable to get answers ourselves.

At the General Meeting of Parents in Lismore Hotel on April 12th all were led to believe that another meeting would be held to inform the parents of what decisions the

trustees would be making. The decision to amalgamate has been made by the trustees without consulting the parents. The chairpersons of both Parents Councils received a letter informing them of the decision on Friday 1st July 1994.

The timing of the letter leaves a lot to be desired as the school children had only started their holidays 2 days previously. Can one imagine management in a company making a decision that would effect the workforce when the company had closed for holidays? It does not happen in present day

management.

The trustees have made this decision without proper consultation with the parents. We do understand the decision to amalgamate is a matter for the trustees, but surely they can consult with the parents, more especially as there was no demand for the amalgamation from the parents. Both primary schools are in the "black" thanks to many fund raising events. A local contribution (15%) will have to be made when the amalgamation takes place. At present there is a lot of fund raising taking place in the town and area and how much more can parents be expected to pay out of their pockets.

A suggestion to alleviate the local contribution - when the Primary School at the C.B.S. is sold to the Department of Education, could not this sale offset the local contribution - this is strictly personal opinion. And finally who will be the trustees of the new school - the parish, The C.B.S. the Presentation Convent?

Some of the above questions were asked of us last week and as we said at the outset we do not have the answers. Hopefully they will be answered in the next couple of weeks.



SOCIAL HOUSING PUBLIC MEETING

A public meeting will take place next Monday evening at 8.30 p.m. in Clashmore Hall to consider the possibility of building a number of dwelling houses in both Clashmore village and in Piltown.

And ad-hoc committee has been working on the project for the past few months with "Respond" on the feasibility of such a scheme and on Monday evening they will present their findings.

It is possible for local communities to build houses in their areas principally for the elderly and young or single parent families who would normally qualify for Local Authority housing.

Significant grants are available to voluntary housing associations, (up to 100% in some cases) who build houses in their own areas. "Respond", based in Waterford city, is an umbrella organisation that looks after community housing and they are willing to assist the project in Clashmore and Piltown.

The simple reality of rural life is that unless communities work together to build houses and create jobs, rural life as we know it will cease to exist. Only a few short years ago Clashmore had a four teacher school To-day it barely has the numbers to be a three teach-

er school. Looking forward three to five years, unless the community takes it upon itself to tackle the declining population Clashmore could end up with a one teacher school.

Similarly many of our old folks are living in fear (and a number in poor conditions) out the country. Some have left and gone to live in Youghal or Dungarvan. By providing proper housing in the village area we could give some elderly the choice of moving into the village and be among their own, rather than into town.

On the agenda for last Wednesday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, was a bathing water quality report for Abbeyside beach. The report by Mr. Ted Casey was based on a sample taken on May 30th of the centre of the bathing area at Friar's Walk Beach.

The report shows no visible film on the water surface and no odour, no tarry residues, floating materials etc., and no abnormal change in colour.

Mr. Casey's report proves beyond doubt, the excellent bathing water quality of the beach. The total coliforms per 100 ml was 4, while faecal coliforms per 100 ml was also 4. As the limit for such coliforms is set at 500, Abbeyside's mark of 4 is recognised as an excellent result.



Wright Slams Rent Increases

which the revised rent had resulted in extreme hardship, Cllr. Wright slammed the Council's responses as "far too harsh" and added he was disappointed in the 6 week delay it took to process them.

The Democratic Left Councillor was moving the motion that Council members "consider many aspects of the recent revision to be excessive as the huge increase demand will in many cases cause great hardship to our tenants. We therefore request Management to be far more sympathetic in its implementation and that any increases be kept in line with inflation."

Calling on the Council to treat these 22 cases far more sympathetically, Cllr. Wright declared that the type of increases implemented by the Council resulted in a 'tremendous shock' to tenants whose incomes are very small and who are struggling to keep abreast with the current 2% inflation. He continued, "95% of Council tenants are in receipt of welfare payments which are to be increased by 3-5% at the end of this month."

"Are we to take double the rent and more off these people" the indignant Cllr. Wright asked, warning that the increases would cause 'great hardship' among Council tenants. Urging that an element of sympathy be introduced as regards the rent increases, Cllr. Wright voiced the opinion that the increases should have been implemented on a phased basis with the normal increase in rent being .20 to .50p at the maximum.

"JUST CRAZY"

Supporting Cllr. Wright, Cllr. Paddy Power (Labour) said he had always held reservations concerning the rent increases of May 7. Pointing to the example of an old age pensioner on £60 a week, Cllr. Power submitted the weekly rent is now increased by £3 while his/her pension will only receive a £1 increase from the State. "It's just crazy", he declared.

Also supporting Cllr. Wright's motion, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Ind.) said the old age pensioners were the most vulnerable group at risk from these latest increases. On this subject, Cllr. Austin Deasy said he had met many pensioners in St. Garvan's Terrace during his election campaign, who, he stressed, were deeply disturbed by the huge increases in their Council house rent. Also voicing her concern, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, informed members that she had received many complaints from worried Council tenants.

port of Cllr. Wright's motion against the sudden 'excessive' rent increase, were U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) who said it was obvious that the members "resented" the lack of positive response to their representations, Cllr. Austin Flynn (F.F.) who warned that the figures were significant to the people who had to pay them, and a concerned Cllr. Lar Hart who described the revised rent scheme as a 'scandal'.

LOWEST IN MUNSTER

Responding to the members stinging criticism of the recently implemented

rent scheme, Acting Co. Manager, Brian McNally, stated that Dungarvan U.D.C. boasted the lowest rents in Munster.

"Every member of this Council was caught on the hop about these new rents", submitted Cllr. Kyne, who then proposed that each member make his/her representation to the Town Clerk and the Acting Co. Manager within the next fortnight, who will then review each case and provide a speedy response to the Council.

It was further agreed that a discussion on the subject be held at the next meeting on July 25.

Alzheimer Awareness Week

"Remember those who cannot" is the simple yet effective logo of the Alzheimer Society of Ireland, based in Stillorgan, Dublin. Termed "the living death," Alzheimer's Disease has no known cause and no effective treatment.

Initially, victims experience increasing memory loss, confusion and a tendency to wander and become lost in familiar surroundings. This is followed by physical deterioration, incontinence and eventually, complete helplessness. Alzheimer's destroys the personality and identity of its victims, it renders them immobile, unable to recognise even closest family members and eventually leaves them without speech.

There are more than 25,000 Irish men and women with Alzheimer's Disease, approximately 6% of the total population over 65 years and 20% of those over 80 years.

Although mainly a disease of older people, it can and does occur in people of 50, 40 and even 30 years of age. The youngest Irish suf-

ferer of Alzheimer's is 12 years old.

DUNGARVAN CONTACT

There are presently more than 1500 members attached to 21 branches of the Irish Alzheimer Society. In addition, there are in excess of 80 support groups nationwide where carers meet on a regular basis for exchange of problems and solutions.

In promoting the Alzheimer Awareness Week the Dungarvan Support Group held a free coffee morning last Friday from 10 a.m. to 12 noon in Lawlor's Hotel. Various informative leaflets were on hand to the public and the morning proved a tremendous success. Present at the coffee morning were UDC Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne, Acting Co. Manager Brian McNally, Town Clerk, Bertie White, Waterford County Council Chairman Cllr. Lar Hart, Fr. G. McNamara, Canon Gregory Power, P.P. and many other interested parties.

Now in its fourth year, the Dungarvan-based Support Group was first founded following an informative talk by a representative of the Irish Alzheimer Society at St. Joseph's Hospital. From there the group grew rapidly and extended its support network well beyond Dungarvan to encompass the West Waterford region.

A key figure in the group is Sr. Máiréad, Matron of St. Joseph's Hospital, whose boundless energy and motivation have made her a shining example and inspiration to all carers in the group. Other dedicated members include Bonnie Garcia, Mary Gorman, Paula French and Ann Healy. All work is done on a voluntary basis and the group meets every month at Lawlor's Hotel.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" Bonnie Garcia

said out of the successful coffee morning she hoped to create more awareness about Alzheimer's Disease and that many more members would join the support group. "All information is kept very confidential," she added, "and if anyone is in contact with a sufferer and feel they need support they are most welcome to contact the group at 058-41103." Alzheimer's Disease is a private illness and people are reluctant to come out and claim it," said Bonnie.

Thanking everyone for taking time off to drop in during the coffee morning, the group praised Michael Burke, proprietor of Lawlor's Hotel and his staff for their "unstinting support throughout the year."

The support group were loud in their praise of Dr. Maurice O'Sullivan (Medical Officer), the staff of the 10 bed Alzheimer Unit in St. Joseph's Hospital, Dr. Gibbon (Consultant Geriatrician), the staff of the South Eastern Health Board, the clergy whose regular visits to the hospital are greatly appreciated and everyone who has contributed so generously over the years in helping the support group effectively care for and improve the lives of so many sufferers in the area. COUNTY BOARD MEETING

TWO MONTH SUSPENSION FOR O'GORMAN!

After two hours of heated debate at last Monday night's meeting of the Waterford County G.A.A. Board, the Chairman Eamonn Murphy imposed a 2 month suspension on Lismore man Jimmy O'Gorman, outgoing Chairman of the county senior hurling selection committee and one of Waterford's two representatives on the Munster Council.

The debate was punctuated by verbal clash after verbal clash and the affairs of the Board have now, sadly, reached new levels of bitterness and acrimony.

The suspension is a sequel to the adjournment of the April Board meeting when O'Gorman launched a blistering attack on what he regarded as a character assassination of a fellow clubman of his.

The county chairman insisted the unless O'Gorman apologised to him and the Board for the disruption of that meeting that he would follow through with a motion of censure.

However, O'Gorman, while expressing regret that the incident has resulted in the adjournment of the April meeting, refused to go beyond that and apologise.

"I was doing nothing other than defending the character and reputation of

an esteemed G.A.A. man", he said. "I have no regrets for that".

The chairman, however, said he would not accept anything other than an apology. Anarchy could not, and would not, be allowed to prevail at their meetings and he was not prepared to see the authority of the chair flouted. "A simple apology will end it all", he said.

Mayhem

What followed was close to mayhem. There were fiery verbal exchanges, and the chairman of the East Waterford Board, Mr. Frankie Cullinane, said they were complaining about the banner headlines the affairs of the Board have been receiving but they should ask themselves if these headlines are deserved.

"Are we blaming the wrong people for them", he asked.

The chairman repeatedly asked O'Gorman if he would apologise, and there was an intervention by Tourin delegate Ollie Wilkinson who charged the chairman with wanting the Munster Council delegate to crawl all the way along the floor to the top table.

Finally there was a proposal by former county chairman Nioclás MacCraith (Ring), seconded by Sean O'Regan (Kill), that O'Gorman be suspended for a minimum period of two months.

REFUSED AMENDMENT

Amid further controversy the chairman refused to accept an amendment from another former county chairman, James Tobin (Shamrocks), that no action be taken against O'Gorman.

Central Council delegate Seamas O'Brien said the chairman was completely out of order in refusing to accept the amendment.

Mr. O'Brien then proposed a second amendment that County Board accept the expression of regret tendered by O'Gorman. Again the chairman refused to accept it.

Finally he confirmed a two-month suspension which Jimmy O'Gorman has already intimated he intends to appeal before Munster Council.

Ironically, the only apology tendered to the meeting came from the county chairman to Lismore delegate Chris O'Brien whom he had accused of "lying" at the last meeting.

SENIOR HURLING SELECTORS

The new senior hurling selectors, ratified by the meeting are Joe Carlton, Peter Power and Tony Mansfield. The other County selectors will be picked at a special meeting of the County Board on Monday night July 25th.

John Treacy Returns To Ireland

In August 1974 a youthful John Treacy left his native Villierstown to commence a four years athletic scholarship in Providence University, Rhode Island, having completed his Secondary education in St. Anne's School, Cappoquin. In the following years the tenacious Treacy scaled the world's athletic heights, culminating in the winning of an Olympic silver medal and two world cross country championships. Now twenty years down the road and in the autumn of a super athletic career he returns to Ireland with his wife Fionnuala and his four children, Caoimhe (12), Deirdre (10), Sean (6) and Conor (5).

The people of Villierstown and West Waterford will have the opportunity to welcome the Treacy family home on this Thursday, July 14 when an inscribed stone will be unveiled in John's honour in the village green and this will be followed by his participation in the Dungarvan Athletic Club's second annual Villierstown to Cappoquin Dromana five

miles race in aid of the West Waterford Hospice Movement.

POPULAR FIGURE

John Treacy has enjoyed immense popularity over the years. This is not just because of his achievements but also because of many other qualities including his constant modesty in the heat of National, World and Olympic successes and his loyalty to his grass roots, his native Villierstown and Waterford, the county he helped place on the national and indeed the World athletic map.

Prior to his world successes in 1978 and 1979 John Treacy had already won himself into the hearts of the sporting public as he drew massive crowds to the Irish inter county championships in Kilbarry, Waterford. The 22,000 people who travelled to Limerick race course on a soaking wet Sunday for the 1979 World Cross Country Championship were magnetized there by the unassuming Treacy who gave them all value for money and whose catch me if you can enthralling winning display left the punters wondering afterwards was it raining or not during the race.

John's Olympic medal winning performance in 1984 was typical Treacy — grit and graft with his last lap effort at the end of the marathon producing what was probably R.T.E.'s Jimmy Magee's best commentary ever of a sporting event. As John hobbled up to the winners' podium, millions of Irish people all over the world would have gladly shouldered him up on to his rightful position.

UNVEILING OF STONE

Ten years down the road and coinciding with John's and his family's return to Ireland, Villierstown and the local athletic scene will honour his achievement at 7 p.m. on this Thursday when a four foot stone will be unveiled by Rev. Fr. Michael Enright P.P., Ballylooby, who gave so much encouragement to John in his athletic career.

The stone, sponsored by David Kiely, Monumental Works, Dungarvan, was put into place last Wednesday and it will be a lasting fitting tribute to our greatest distance runner ever. Following the unveiling, patrons intending on viewing the finish of the road race are requested to travel to Cappoquin ahead of the runners as, considering the narrow nature of the route, vehicles will not be in a position to following and pass the participants. Co-operation in this area will be very much appreciated by the organisers.

TREACY CAPTURES THE NATION (1979)

John Treacy, the twenty one year old wonder athlete from Villierstown, Co. Waterford became the first man ever to win the World Cross Country Championship in successive years when he left the champions of twenty five nations floundering behind him in the mud at Greenpark Racecourse, Limerick on Sunday last (March 1979).

In doing so he captured the hearts of the nation and he ran a gauntlet of ecstatic fans who almost mobbed him in the final half mile of the gruelling seven and a half miles race. This was the greatest ever achievement by an Irishman on native soil, and, long before Treacy came into the finishing tunnel, the crowd knew it. The big Polish runner Malinowski came through with a sprint to relegate Antipov of Russian to third position, Donegal's Danny McDaid finished 11th and Waterford's Gerry Deegan was a member of the Irish team that won the silver medals.

JOHN TREACY WINS SILVER (1984)

John Treacy bridged another gap yesterday (August 1984) when he gave Ireland its first Olympic track medal since 1956 when he finished second to Carlos Lopes of Portugal in the Olympic marathon at Los Angeles. Bitterly disappointed after finishing down the field in Monday night's 10,000 metres final, he put his problems behind him yesterday when he ran 2 hrs. 9 mins. and 55 secs. to snatch the silver medal from Britain's Charlie Spedding.

It was the performance of a lifetime from the twenty seven year old Villierstown man who had spent the last four years struggling to overcome a serious back injury, followed by knee trouble. One hundred and eight athletes started the race, held in intense heat, with seventy eight of them completing the 26.2 mile distance. The race finished at 3 a.m. Irish time ensuring a sleepless night for thousands of Irish people at home.

Former Tributes To John Treacy In Villierstown

AUGUST 1974

One the eve of his departure to Providence University, Rhode Island, where he was taking up an athletics scholarship, John Treacy was the recipient of a beautifully inscribed wrist watch as well as his air ticket to the United States from the people of the locality of Villierstown. The presentation was made by Brian Browne, Treasurer of the committee set up to honour the youth, while the Chairman Mr. Jack Cullinane thanked John for the honour and glory he had brought to Villierstown and the West of Waterford.

MARCH 1978

Mr. Michael Keating, Chairman of the local G.A.A. club, presented John Treacy with a Waterford Glass vase on behalf of the people of Villierstown on the occasion of the local man's victory in the World Cross Country Championship in Glasgow. In a packed Villierstown further presentations were made by Billy Arrigan, Vice-Principal St. Anne's Secondary School, Cappoquin and Tom Burke, Chairman of Grange-Fermoy A.C. Tributes were paid by Gerry Deegan (team mate), Brian Browne (Chairman organis-

ing committee), Fr. William Treacy (John's Uncle), Fr. Michael Kelleher, parish priest of Aghlish, Villierstown and Ballinameela, Fr. Fitzgerald, C.C. and Jim Joe Landers, National Community Games P.R.O. The Dungarvan Brass and Reed and Pipe Bands were in attendance.

AUGUST 1984

John Treacy's home comings reached a new high following the Los Angeles Olympics when the Government put a helicopter at his disposal. M.C. for his biggest home coming to date was Francis Hackett. The speakers included the parish priest Fr. William Callanan, curate Fr. Pat Fitzgerald, Chairman of the Waterford County Council James Aidan Walsh, Miss Mary McGrath, former headmistress at Villierstown National School and Sr. Margaret Mary, headmistress at St. Anne's Secondary School, Cappoquin, Waterford County Council, through their Chairman James Aidan Walsh, made a presentation to John. The Dungarvan Pipe and Brass and Reed Bands were present. Chairman of the organising committee was Mr. Michael Mernin.

Villierstown Athlete A World Beater (1978)

John Treacy scaled the glorious heights to the pinnacle of cross country running at Bellahouston Park, Glasgow on Saturday (March, 1978) when he left an illustrious field of Olympians, former champions and bright young hopefuls in his wake en route to a World Championship victory that gives Ireland its most outstanding success since Ron Delaney's Olympic 1500 metres victory in Melbourne in 1956.

No one will dispute his right to the crown, won over one of the most gruelling and testing cross country courses ever. In what turned out to be a three man race involving the Irishman, Antipov of Russian and Lismond of Belgium, John Treacy struck for home when it really mattered and a great Irish roar signalled the country's first victory since Clareman Tom Smyth won it in 1931 at the now disused Baldoye Racecourse in Dublin.

With the above scoreline, it was understandable to find a huge crowd of supporters of both sides leaving the venue well in advance of the final whistle which saw Limerick take their seventeenth Munster title, rather easily and deservedly.

For 25 minutes or so it was a cracker of a game played at a very fast pace, but as the game neared the halfway stage Limerick began to assert their authority on the game and led by 0-11 to 0-7 at the break.

In the second half Limerick took complete control and scored points from all angles to go into an 0-21 to 0-10 lead before Clare's two compensatory goals came in the dying minutes of the rather one-sided final.

ATTENDANCE

Although the stadium looked to be quite full the attendance announced for the final was 43,638. This was up by over 2,000 on the figure for last year when 41,557 fans attended the Tipperary v. Clare final played in Limerick. The question of the total capacity of Semple Stadium has been asked many times over the past weeks and on enquiry I was informed that a full stadium (all tickets for stands and terraces) would hold almost 60,000. I found this a little difficult to believe and having made further enquiries was informed that the official attendance at the Cork/Offaly senior and Limerick/Kilkenny minor hurling finals in 1984 was 59,814 (all ticket).

Sympathy

Our deepest sympathy is extended to Declan and Mrs. Walsh and family, Modeligo on the very sad and unexpected death of Mary, which occurred recently. Mary, as well as being an athlete of tremendous promise, was a budding star on the ladies football scene and only a couple of days before her untimely death, she had played championship football.

Her death cast a gloom over West Waterford and the massive crowd which turned up for her funeral was clear evidence of the great popularity of this young lady. May she rest in peace.

Three Inter County Games In Eight Days

Forced Curtailment Of Club Championships

With three important Munster championship games listed during the next eight days, a number of club championship fixtures have to be put on hold until these are decided one way or another. All our remaining championships in Munster are in the underage grades and players on these teams play in the adult club grades, hence the problems with fixtures.

TONIGHT

We should have a huge crowd over at Fraher Field tonight to see our under-21 team battle it out against the red-hot favourites, Cork, in the Munster final. The selectors are expecting massive support after the way their followers travelled in horrible weather conditions to Tipperary town for their first game and then to Askeaton for the semi-final against Limerick.

Cork are the raging hot favourites to win this one as they are a very highly rated side after their performance in beating Kerry.

Efforts to obtain the line-out for the game when writing these notes on Monday morning failed and I was informed that the team would not be announced until Monday night, even though it was selected.

Very few people can commend the policy of withholding the announcement of a team which is due to play in the Munster final only two days later. The County Board directive on this matter seems to be ignored by practically all our selection committees.

The team, if available, will be published hereunder.

CLUB

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The senior football championships are due to resume over the coming weekend but with the possibility of postponements due to the playing of the under 21 hurling provincial semi-final, patrons will need to check before travelling. A number of these games will not be affected and will go ahead as scheduled.

ST. SAVIOURS v.

BALLINACOURTY

This is scheduled for Kill venue on Saturday and unless a major upset is on the

cards, Saviours will pick up another two points to keep them happily in contention. Ballinacourty ran the same team to five points last year, but are now a far weaker side and can have little hope here.

AFFANE v.

BUTLERSTOWN

Here the sides are only fulfilling a fixture which makes little difference to the course of the championship as neither will be in contention at the end of the day. Only four points divided the teams at the end of a well contested game at Abbey-side venue last year and if it is as close again, it will keep their supporters entertained for the hour at Bushy Park on Saturday evening.

KILMACTHOMAS v.

CLASHMORE

Kilmacthomas are closely in contention for a place in the knockout stages and may yet come out on top of division 2 on the league table. They were surprisingly caught by Tramore and ended up with a 13 points beating in their last game, but are not likely to be runners-up in this contest even though Clashmore did show an improvement of form in their recent match with Affane.

DUNGARVAN v.

STRADBALLY

This is the big game of the weekend and it will attract the biggest crowd of the championship so far to Fraher Field at 7.30 p.m. on Sunday evening next. Games between the sides have been among the best that have been played in senior football championship over the past several years. Both are likely to qualify, but prestige, placings on the league table, etc., are all important to the teams involved.

Dungarvan, undoubtedly very keen on recovering the title this year, gave evidence of their determination when beating the current champions, Nire, at Cappoquin, with an understrength team last month and if they play the same brand of football here, with a number of their players back in harness, they will beat Stradbally.

Even though they are unbeaten this year, Stradbally

have not been over impressive and will have to improve before convincing anyone that they will be the 1994 county champions. Nevertheless this will be a splendid game and one that no football followers will want to miss.

NIRE v.

RATHGORMACK

The county champions, the Nire, have already been beaten by Stradbally and Dungarvan and another defeat will leave them with only an outside chance of staying in the race to hold on to their title. Two points from play over an hour against Dungarvan, made them look a very poor team and a lot more will be expected of them, if they are not to be regarded as just a flash in the pan when taking the title last year.

Rathgormack, too are showing signs of having slipped back a bit as their defeats by Gaultier and Kilrossanty would seem to indicate. They had an unimpressive win over Ballinacourty before beating Saviours in their last game, so they too need a win if they are to keep their championship hopes alive for a while longer.

After their nightmare game against Dungarvan, the Nire people proclaimed that they would never again be as bad, and if this is so, then we might see the real Nire in action here. It may be a close one and a game that can go either way.

KILROSSANTY v.

GAULTIER

This will be the big one of the weekend at Walsh Park and while both seem sure to qualify, even at this stage, the game is important in that it will decide on their placings on the table. I saw them play when they met last year, and I would regard the clash as being one of the better matches of that championship. Kilrossanty (0-12), were a bit lucky that day to hold out against Gaultier (0-10), who were unlucky not to have scored a goal in the closing stages. Kilrossanty played good football when losing by a point to Dungarvan already this year and had a six points victory over Rathgor-

mack before that, so that kind of form will put them in here with a good chance. Gaultier slipped against St. Saviours last week and the Passage side will, no doubt, go all out to atone for that defeat and will be dangerous. Still Kilrossanty are given the vote.

SLIABH gCUA v. NEWTOWN

There cannot be a whole lot between these teams, but of the two, I fancy the chances of the Touraneena team to beat the 1993 intermediate county champions. Tramore inflicted a big beating on Newtown and then Sliabh gCua beat Tramore, so on that basis Newtown must take the role of outsiders in this one.

JUNIOR

FOOTBALL

The three matches due to be played in this championship are all very attractive ties and with the competition still a very open affair, all six teams have a lot to play for.

Kilgobinet, who drew with Tallow in their last match, play Modeligo who scored a surprise win over Lismore in the previous week. Modeligo would seem to be the form team here.

Emmetts are 'motoring' along nicely in this championship and with no hurling worries, have time for proper football training. They were the only side to inflict a hammering on Lismore (0-12 to 1-2) last year, so the Colligan side would seem to have the measure of Lismore.

Ballyduff and Tallow are also listed and if this is a repeat of their meeting last year, Ballyduff would be expected to win, but Tallow's good display against Kilgobinet recently puts a different picture on things. They certainly won't lose by six points as they did last year.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Games that are due for the weekend in the intermediate football grade are Ring v. Brickeys and Ballinameela v. Ardmore. Both will produce splendid contests and will have a bearing on shaping the closing stages of the championship.

Minor Football v. Clare

Our record in minor football is probably the worst in the province and is certainly our most unsuccessful grade. We remain the only county in Munster not to have won a title since the championship was introduced back in 1929. Strange to relate, we did qualify for the very first final and were beaten by Clare (1-6 to 0-4) and for three others in which we came off at the losing end.

In 1934 we lost to Tipperary by 3-10 to 0-5, in 1958 we were beaten by Kerry, by 3-11 to 0-4 and in our last appearance in a final we were defeated in 1941 by Kerry on a score of 7-5 to 2-1 and this was the only occasion in a final in which we scored a goal.

Over the years, and particularly in the last twenty or so, great strides have been made in coaching at juvenile level, but somehow it does not appear to have paid off in the matter of matches won. In the last ten seasons we have won only one championship game in minor football. So it is with such a background that we face 1994 and hope for a real breakthrough.

We have already met and beaten Tipperary at Stradbally. This was a big disappointment to Tipperary and the boost that we needed before moving on to challenge for our first title.

Waterford played very well and showed tremendous spirit against Tipperary in a game played in bad conditions in Stradbally on May 11. The feeling after the game was that we should be good enough to take care of Clare who will be playing their first match this year, they have received a first round bye. The last time that the teams met was also in Tipperary two years ago, when Clare gave us a ten points hammering, but as none of the same players are involved, that result is of

no importance now. Kerry and Cork meet in the other semi-final on the previous night and if there is a draw in either of the matches, the replay goes ahead two nights later (Sunday, July 17). This will be a bit rough on everyone, including the patrons, if it happens.

The Waterford selectors have gone to great pains to ensure that everything humanly possible is done for the panel. By way of challenge games, training sessions, etc., but like the other selectors (or most of them) they believed in keeping their line-out a secret for as long as possible. I was informed on Saturday that the team was not being released until tonight, Wednesday.

Derek Hayes, who was one of their better players against Tipperary, will not be available for the semi-final. He will certainly be missed from our attack and not easily replaced.

Conor Fitzgerald, who performed very well in goal in the Stradbally game will be the keeper and P. J. Dunphy, who is the minor hurling county goalkeeper, Liam Curran and Andy Hubbard, who is also on the hurling team will form the back-line. Richie McDonald, Jonathan Moore and Shiel Costello are the likely half line of defence. Tom Flynn, also on the hurling team and Aidan Ahearn, who was a substitute against Cork last Sunday are the likely mid-

field partnership, but there were changes around this sector in the match against Tipperary and there may be one change here.

In attack there are sure to be a number of positional changes and maybe a couple of changes in personnel. Gavan Keane, Niall Brennan, Stuart Barry, Stephen Cunningham and Ciaran Curran, also a minor hurler with the county team, are all certain to be in contention for places on the first fifteen. The selectors will note, I'm sure, that our forwards kicked twice as many wides (15) as scores against Tipperary in the first round.

The final score in that game was Waterford 1-7 Tipperary 0-6. Our goal was by Derek Hayes, who won't be with the team on Friday evening as he is due to run for Ireland in Scotland.

I would see our prospects as being reasonably good. If something is done to overcome the reckless shooting and if they play with the same spirit that helped them to overcome Tipperary, we could beat them and book a place in the Munster final against Cork or Kerry on Sunday week.

It will be noted from the above that we have a very poor goalscoring record, having scored only twice in ten matches.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Shamrocks v. Faha

When these sides met in the championship last year, Faha just scraped through with a point win in a very low scoring game. It was 0-5 to 0-4 in their favour after a tough contest that saw both teams waste numerous chances.

A big improvement on their form against Ardmore two weeks ago will be needed by Shamrocks if they are going to turn the tables here. Faha, too, will need to start picking up the points and will need to do better here than they did against Ring at Leamybrien a fortnight ago.

It will be played at Walsh Park if Tipperary are our opponents and we must travel to Limerick if the Shannonsiders win.

The county selectors in that grade were the county minor selectors when we became the provincial champions in 1992 and they have been working quietly and very earnestly with the panel which includes several of the 1992 players of the minor grade.

Both Tipperary and Limerick will have had the advantage of two tremendous contests, they having played a draw in their first meeting. However, two years ago when Waterford were in full flight, neither Tipperary or Limerick came into the reckoning in the minor grade.

Waterford's panel of players in training consists of the minor panel of 1992 and in training, much of the spirit which saw us out of Munster then is again evident in training. The panel have played a couple of worthwhile challenge matches against Limerick and Tipperary and the selectors were pleased in both cases with the performance of the panel.

Players on the panel include — Patrick Harnan (goalie), Tom Morrissey (Dungarvan), John Joe Ronayne (do.), Paddy O'Donnell and James O'Connor (Lismore), Anthony Kirwan, Ger Harris and Fintan O'Shea (Portlaw), Tom Feeney (Ballyduff), Tom Kiely (St.

Patrick's), John Byrne (do.), John P. Fitzpatrick and Raymond Ryan (Naomh Brid), Derek McGrath (St. Saviours), Paul Foley (Stradbally), Paul Flynn (Ballygunner), Brendan Ormond (Lismore), Alan Robinson (Mount Sion), Brian McCarthy (Fourmile-

water), Gary Gater (Mount Sion), etc. etc.

Practically all of the above players are involved in adult competition with their clubs and are maturing very well, so hopefully we can survive here and qualify for yet another Munster final.

PROGRAMME

A match programme on sale at Fraher Field for tonight's final will be the first programme for an inter-county game since the reopening and will therefore be a souvenir item for interested patrons. The programme produced by the field committee, is in aid of the Field Development Funds.

All-Ireland Sponsorship

As recently announced, Bank of Ireland have undertaken to sponsor the All-Ireland football championships and as expected all counties have been given a basic payment of £5,000 from the fund. This money was distributed at Limerick on Friday evening last.

This is the first time in the history of the association that sponsorship had been accepted for our inter-county championships. No sponsor has yet been agreed for hurling.

The total amount of sponsorship given by the Bank of Ireland has not been revealed, but the sum is thought to be close enough to one million pounds. If this figure is even nearly right, counties will be disappointed at the small share out at the initial stage.

The matter of the distribution of the sponsorship money had not yet been discussed by Central Council and it will be interesting to see how they decide on the share-out of the remainder of the sponsorship money.

The acceptance of sponsorship does not mean that counties cannot take other sponsorship for their inter-county teams, provided this is not accepted from a rival financial institution.

Overgrown Hedges Put Lives At Risk

saved", she heatedly added. **DESPERATE SITUATION**

Supporting Cllr. Flynn, Cllr. Jackie Fahey (F.F.) slammed the 'desperate situation' of the County's overgrown roads and stated he honestly believed the Council had no choice but to borrow the amount required to enable a thorough clean-up job. "It's an action we have to take", he urged.

Also voicing his concern, Nire Valley Councillor Ciaran O'Riain said the by-roads in his area were nearly completely closed. The Fianna Fáil Councillor went on to say the T-junction should be cleared or accidents were very likely to occur. Appealing to the Co. Engineer to see that as much work as possible can be done on the roads, Cllr. O'Riain declared it had been a 'major blunder' not to have made a provision for hedgecutting in this year's estimates. Representing the Stradbally area, Cllr. Tom Cunningham reported that new cars were being seriously damaged by overgrown briars and thorns while tourists in the area were also greatly at risk due to reduced road visibility.

Speaking for the Clashmore area, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran warned it was inevitable that serious accidents would occur unless the grass verges and ditches were cut. "The verges are the responsibility of the Council", he insisted.

ONUS ON LANDOWNERS
Stressing that although the onus of hedgecutting was on the landowners, Cllr. Pat

Coffey (F.G.) claimed that none were being cut. "Pedestrians have to walk 3 feet out from the fence", he further informed the meeting. Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson (F.F.) stressed the hedge growth was almost double this year due to a further lack of scarting last year. Responding to various criticisms, Mr. O'Flynn reported that over the past 2 years the Council had been cutting and trimming those roadways leading to major beaches such as at Tramore, Ardmore, Stradbally the Coast Road etc. This work included cutting around dangerous bends and signs. "We're trying as best we can, with the workforce available", he promised. Responding to queries raised by Cllr. Willie McDonnell regarding the threat of redundancy to the Council's outdoor staff, Acting Co. Manager Brian McNally disclosed there was not a sufficiency of money at present and that further discussion would be held on the subject at a later date.

AMENDMENT PASSED

Proposing an amendment to Cllr. Flynn's proposal, Cllr. Tony Wright (D.L.) said he was not paying taxpayers money "to subsidise landowners to do their own job". "We're already £600,000 plus in the red", Cllr. Wright stated and he proposed that they cut only what the Council was responsible for and "nothing more", ie (grass verges).

The amendment was subsequently seconded by Cllr. Gary O'Halloran and passed on a majority vote.
