Exciting New Project For Ring

**RINN Ó gCUANACH -
CÉIM AR AGHAIDH!**

An Rinn has succeeded in attracting an exciting new development in cultural tourism. An application has been lodged with Waterford Co. Council for outline planning permission for a socio/cultural complex comprising: sea-food restaurant, art and craft outlet with national heritage display rooms, Irish language T.V. studio, auditorium, 2 conference rooms, research library with tea room, function room, seanos bar and guest accommodation.

It is understood that the development which should employ at least thirty people is financed by local business people in association with Udaras na Gaeltachta and the M.F.G. Leader Company.

Dr. Fidelma Ní Mhaoláin who, at the behest of Udarás, has returned from an assignment in Paris to take charge of the project, regards this as a prototype for Gaeltacht areas. "I can only marvel", said Fidelma, "at the resilience of this small community; the only area outside the West of Ireland never to concede victo-

ry to the overwhelming pressure from foreign cultures".

She believes that there is a huge untapped source of latent interest on the European mainland in the living culture of Ireland so closely interwoven with historic and prehistoric Europe and Asia. "Having a living unbroken tradition with linguistic roots stretching from Iceland to the Himalayas is no less a phenomenon than Newgrange, the Céide Fields of Mayo (oldest farming settlement in Europe) or the Iceman of the

Disappointment As V.E.C. Appoint Dublin Architect

The successful applicant for the prestigious position of architect for the proposed £1 million - plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College has been revealed as Dublin based Shay Cleary.

The Dublin architect was appointed at the July meeting of Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee following a report by the architect selection panel which clearly recommended Mr. Cleary.

The panel which com-

prised of C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan, V.E.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne, Cllr. Lar Hart, Paudie Geary, (T.V.I.) and a senior member of the department of Education, met on July 1st to interview seven applicants which had been shortlisted by the de-

partment of Education from a total of 15.

DISAPPOINTMENT

The initial reaction of various V.E.C. members to the panel's recommendation, however, was one of disappointment that a local archi-

tect had not scooped the prestigious position. Far from criticising the sub-committee's decision, Mr. Jimmy Byrne said that nevertheless he was very disappointed, especially he added

Tragic Death Of Ballyduff Footballer

Tragedy struck the West Waterford village of Ballyduff last Saturday, July 16th with the sudden death of 32-year-old Michael Quirke in what can only be described as truly sorrowful circumstances.

An impressive football player, Mr. Quirke was captaining his local club, Ballyduff in a Waterford Junior Football Championship

game against Tallow in Lismore. Five minutes into the game, the Inchinleamy man collapsed after taking a free kick.

He was pronounced dead at the scene shortly afterwards by a local Lismore doctor.

Member of a well-known Waterford G.A.A. family and former inter-county

I would be grateful if you could publish the following letter in your genealogy section, or the letters column:

I am trying to discover Irish relatives. My great-grandparents, Daniel O'Brien and Ellen (Helen) Begley (Megley) arrived in New Zealand

in 1878. They were married in the parish of Clashmore in 1874. Ellen was the widow of Maurice Byrne of Ragh (Rath) (married 1869 in Ardmore parish).

Daniel (born 1837?) lived in Cladagh before his marriage. His parents were John O'Brien (farmer) and Mary

McCarthy. Ellen was christened and presumably born, in Ardmore parish in 1838, the daughter of John Megley (Begley) and Mary Connors (O'Connor) of Ballinamona. She had two brothers (Michael 1835, William 1839) and three sisters (Mary 1842, Brigid 1844, Honor 1845).

Three of Ellen's four children were born in Ireland: Ellen Byrne (Clashmore 1870), Mary O'Brien (Piltown, Ardmore parish 1875) and John O'Brien (1877). Surnames of witnesses and sponsors repeated in the entries of marriages and births are Connery, Tracy (Treacy), Hallinan, Keily, Mansfield.

HAIRDRESSING AND BEAUTY CARE

Where are you working at present?

I am presently a trainee at Jacqui's Hair Salon in Main Street, Dungarvan.

When did you complete the Hairdressing Course in Dungarvan Technical College?

Well, actually, I had just started the Hairdressing and Beauty Care Course in September last year, when Jacqui Henley contacted the course co-ordinator, Maura Kelly, looking for an assistant. It was very much a case of being in the right place at the right time. I was cho-

sen from among the students on the course and I have been with Jacqui since.

Do you feel that that course is beneficial?

Well, it certainly was of benefit to me. Seriously, I chose the course because it gives a good grounding in basics like hair structure, salon hygiene, the tools of the trade, styles and styling techniques, the principles of colour, highlighting, cutting techniques and so on. Definitely, but for the contacts the College has about the town, I could still be looking for a Salon to take me on as a trainee!

What are your future career plans?

My boss is very encouraging — one hears of apprentices spending a year sweeping floors and another washing heads without getting a look-in! Proposed Development At Spring Marquis

Members of Dungarvan Urban District Council were informed at their recent meeting of proposals regarding an exciting new housing development at Spring Marquis.

These proposals by the voluntary housing agency RESPOND, are concerned with the construction of a 33 unit residential development on the Council's land at the back of Dunabbey House. The proposal consists of 23 three bedroom houses, 10 two bedroom apartments and a community building. This community building would be at the disposal of the estate residents and the services it provides would also be available to residents of adjoining areas. Tenants from these houses would be selected from the housing applicants of Dungarvan U.D.C. and Waterford County Council with an annual income level of not more than £8,000.

The estate would be managed by the RESPOND agency which operates in Waterford and throughout the South East under the capable hands of Fr. Pat Cogan. Discussions between the two parties were previously held some years ago regarding the availability of land for such a community of houses under the auspices of the voluntary housing agency.

The cost of the Spring Marquis site to the Council was estimated by Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney, at £52,800 which, he explained, would be recouped by the U.D.C. over a number of years through the Council's annual housing allocation. Funding for the entire project will come in the form of Exchequer grants under the rental subsidy scheme. The Council's only contribution to the project would be the provision of the land at the reduced rate of £100 per site.

MASSIVE BOOST

Welcoming the proposed development as a massive boost to the town, Cllr. Austin Deasy T.D. (F.G.) spoke from experience in deeming Fr. Cogan to be an 'exceptional' individual. RESPOND, he added, had done 'wonderful work' in Tramore for Waterford County Council.

Although strongly welcoming the proposal, Cllr. Deasy however expressed concern over the U.D.C.'s penchant to build on 'every

available open space in the town.' The Dail Eireann member urged that areas be left for recreational purposes such as public parks, green spaces, playgrounds etc. Sharing Cllr. Deasy's concern for the retention of open spaces, Cllr. Austin Flynn (F.F.) nonetheless, welcomed the community aspect of RESPOND's proposal to be both innovative and a 'great asset'.

Raising the issue of local labour, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Ind.) said he hoped that local contractors and workers would be taken into consideration during the construction of the proposed residential development.

SEPARATE ENTRANCE NEEDED

While reaction to the proposed 33 unit development was positive, some members however expressed their reservations due to the demand of a separate entrance by residents of various estates which border on the Dunabbey site.

Speaking on behalf of these concerned residents, Cllr. Tony Wright (D.L.) explained how the Council estate of Lismore Avenue and the private estates of Comeragh Crescent and Hillview Drive are accessed by the same entrance on the hospital road. "Their views should be taken into consideration," Cllr. Wright urged, warning that a lot of 'hassle' could develop, if a separate access was not available to these estates should RESPOND's proposal come on stream.

Echoing Cllr. Wright's concern, Cllr. Nuala Ryan (F.F.) submitted that representatives of the various estates had previously approached the Council to voice their dissatisfaction over the entrance issue.

Local architect, Cllr. Damien Dillon (Ind.) complimented the overall layout of the Spring Marquis residential development but suggested that another access on the hospital road for the estates would be a good idea. Addressing the Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney, Cllr. Dillon urged that the possibility of a separate entrance be looked at first, before arriving at a decision.

MORE INFORMATION

On a proposal by Cllr. Wright and seconded by Cllr. O'Riordan, it was unanimously decided to investigate the situation and gather more information before endorsing the proposal of the 33 units at Spring Marquis.

It was also decided to put the issue of open spaces on the agenda for the next monthly meeting, as requested by Cllr. Deasy.


20 HOUSES FOR STRANDSIDE NORTH

Meanwhile, U.D.C. members unanimously agreed on a proposal for a material contravention of the Town Development Plan to enable the construction of a private development at Strandside North, Abbeyside. This development will see a construction of 20 houses at the rear of the Texaco station by Cyril Healy & Son. The purchase of the land is currently under transaction.

Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney, informed the Council that a material contravention of the 1989 Town Plan was needed, due to the land in question being zoned as a commercial area, thereby preventing the construction of a residential development. Under the Draft Town Plan, however, the area is zoned under services and such a development is permissible.

Let your taste-buds grow

APART from colours pleasing the eye and scent exciting the nose, the summer garden can tickle the taste buds.

A collection of cooking and salad vegetables and some herbs can all be grown easily in a compact area of the garden.

The secret is to grow what you can easily care for and gain from in terms of cost and freshness when compared with what you can buy in the shops.

If space and time is tight, ignore carrots and lettuce, for instance — quality examples can be bought cheaply enough and homegrown lettuce, in particular, can often be badly battered and fly-blown.

Onions too would be a waste, though I am always tempted because they can be plaited into attractive strings and hung in the kitchen until needed.

Those which are recommended are — summer broccoli or calabrese, a few courgette plants — they take up space but crop heavily — tomatoes, spring onions and radishes.

Most use space effectively, save money and offer fresh produce when needed and taste best when fresh from the garden.

You can go one step further with a cold frame or small unheated greenhouse to raise cucumbers, tomatoes and melons. The greenhouse can also be used to start flower seeds early in the year.

You can also find space in your plot for a few strawberry plants and raspberry canes. However, your patch could not justify the term 'kitchen garden' unless you have a few herbs ready for quickly adding to a bubbling pot.

Favourites which are easy to grow would include: chives — ideal for hot and cold dishes and a producer of attractive mauve puffball flowers, marjoram, parsley, fennel — popular for its lace-like foliage and aniseed flavouring — and mint.

Mint needs special treatment or it will take over the whole herb garden — 'fence' it off in its own tub or pot.

Many herbs can also be dried easily for use throughout the winter or to scent your kitchen. Some may say this is all very well, but it won't look very pretty will it?

Admittedly, that is the downside of a 'working' section of the garden, but its impact can be softened by screening. Some of the options are:

THE SHED — rather than siting the trusty tool store at the bottom of the garden, bring it closer to the house to act as a screen. The facing side of it can be used and softened by a trellis and climbing plant such as clematis or honeysuckle. You may also feel that this more central position is better than the traditional end site.

TRELLISING — climbers can be trained over this to provide colour, scent and some height to the back of a flower border, while effectively screening the rows of vegetables.

FENCING — a slightly antiseptic approach to the problem but, in windy areas, it can protect your vegetables. Broccoli, for instance, becomes rather top heavy and can be damaged by sudden gusts.

Locals Charged Under Wildlife Act

Two local goldfinch breeders appeared before Dungarvan District Court last week, charged under the Wildlife Act while attempting to catch live goldfinches at Ballinacourty on January 23 last.

Pleading guilty to the charges before them, the defendants, Tony Crotty of 16, Congress Villas and Bernard Flynn of 25, Kilrush Park had been trying to catch fresh birds for breeding purposes.

Outlining the facts of the case, Supt. Ray McAndrew told the court that on the date in question, the duo were observed by Garda Sean McMahon and Garda J. J. Duggan in a field at Ballinacourty.

Three bird cages containing the particular bird species were found covered in a hedge, while bird trapping equipment including 2 large nets and bird line were also seized. Some goldfinches were discovered tied to the ground by means of wire and elastic and a dead goldfinch was also found on the scene.

— Appearing for the defendants, Mr. Joe Lavin Solr., told the court that the duo had always taken good care of their birds which they legally kept in aviaries. Mr. Lavin added that through

breeding these goldfinches, the defendants had 'helped the growth of the species'.

Convicting the defendants under the Wildlife Act, Judge Michael Pattwell subsequently fined Crotty £150 and Flynn the sum of £50.

the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins TD. The measures will have a particular focus on those living in the Gaeltacht areas.



Cheese & Apple Omelette



Ingredients
5 tbs. butter
2 cooking apples, cored and thinly sliced
1 tbs. honey
1 dozen large eggs
Salt and pepper
110g (4oz) Cheddar cheese, thinly sliced

Method
Melt 1 tbs. butter over medium heat. Add apples; cook until softened. Stir in honey; remove from heat and set aside.
In bowl, beat 3 eggs with salt and pepper to taste. In omelette pan, heat 1 tbs. butter over medium-high heat until bubbly. As soon as the butter stops foaming and begins to brown, add eggs to the pan. Cook until the bot-



tom of the omelette begins to set, less than 1 minute. Lift the edge with a fork to allow uncooked egg to run to the bottom. Cook until the omelette is nearly set, about 1 minute more. Put 1/8 of the cheese

over half of the omelette; top with 1/8 of the apple mixture. Fold the omelette and slide onto warm plate. Top with more cheese and apples. Repeat to make 3 more omelettes.

Meeting With An Post Urgently Required

An Post was again the target of a stinging attack by angry West Waterford Councillors, following the failure of company officials to attend the July meeting of Waterford County Council last week, for the purpose of outlining the company's proposals in relation to the threatened downgrading of postal services in the Mallow postal district.

'PREMATURE AT THIS STAGE'

In a letter to the Council dated July 8th, Chief Executive of An Post, John Hynes, revealed that the proposals in question were "merely discussion documents" put to the staff for consideration, under a recent agreement with their union. "The exercise is part of an ongoing process of reviewing delivery arrangements", he explained, "to provide a more efficient and cost effective service".

Disclosing that a meeting with the Council would be 'premature at this stage', Mr. Hynes said it was company policy to hear the views of the unions and the associations representing those involved, before finalising details, which, he added, would be available when proposals have been

agreed and finalised.

"There is no question, however, of closing Ballyduff sub Post Office" concluded Mr. Hynes and then advised the Council to contact Mr. Donal Ahern, Mallow Head Postmaster, whose district encompasses the West Waterford area.

'FIGHT TO BITTER END'

Speaking out at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Ballyduff Councillor, Jim Quirke slammed An Post's negative response to the Council's request and declared that an immediate meeting with the postal company was urgently required.

"This issue will be fought to the bitter end", warned Cllr. Quirke, thereby expressing his utmost concern at the proposed relocation of his village P.O. deliver-

ing office to Lismore.

"There is no way that the planned proposals are going to improve the postal services in the area", continued the Fianna Fáil Councillor, stressing that "rural Ireland will be finished" should the seventeen threatened sub P.O.'s be closed.

Sharing his fellow member's concern, Cllr. Willie McDonnell (FG), dismissed An Post's reply as putting the problem 'on the long finger'.

Cllr. McDonnell then called on the Council to contact the company immediately 'to see when a representative will come down' thereby ensuring a reply by the end of the meeting. "I don't want this prolonged", he further insisted.

MAJOR UPROAR

Supporting both West Waterford Councillors, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain referred to An Post's nationwide 'Recovery Plan', and deemed the proposed Ballyduff closure as 'only the tip of the iceberg'.

"We as public representatives should stand up and say this is not acceptable to the people of rural Ireland", he exclaimed, warning that it was time to 'say stop' to the postal company.

Proclaiming to have witnessed major uproar over the downgrading proposals, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said the more 'sinister aspects' of the company's proposals was the resultant threat of job losses. Should the Recovery Plan go ahead, 4/5 jobs, Cllr. Wilkinson explained would then be eliminated in the Lismore area. "This is not a joking matter", he warned.

Acting Co. Secretary, Tom Cunningham, later informed the meeting that Mr. Ahern was on annual leave from the Mallow Post Office and was due back this week.

As a result of the great urgency conveyed by the various members, it was unanimously agreed to request a meeting between An Post and the West Waterford Councillors as speedily as possible.

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
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RECENT DEATHS

Youth Stole To Survive

An 18 year old youth pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court last week to a spate of 25 offences relating to breaking and entering private dwellings in the Dungarvan/Clashmore area, uttering forged cheques in Waterford,

Dungarvan and Clonmel and obtaining goods and cash in excess of £600.

Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Chief Supt. Ray McAndrew told the court that the defendant, Tony Condon of

Carriglea, Dungarvan had no previous convictions and was currently in receipt of unemployment benefit. The bicycles which Condon had stolen in the course of his exploits, had since been recovered, but the cash was still outstanding.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Joe Lavin, Solr., told the court that Condon had committed the break-ins for the sole purpose of obtaining food. The youth came from an 'unstable background' and had been expelled from the family home at Carriglea last February.

Unable to sign for the dole for a period of three months, Mr. Lavin said that Condon, having no visible signs of support, had subse-

quently gone 'on a rampage'.

Admitting to the court that his crime spree had 'not been worth it', the defendant said he had learned his lesson.

"I did it purely to survive at first... I had to get something to eat", claimed Condon, adding that he had spent the stolen cash on food. The defendant stated that he now had a place to stay and had recently received his first dole.

On hearing the evidence, Judge Michael Pattwell remanded Condon on continuing bail to September 14th, for a full Welfare Officers report on the defendant's suitability for community service.

Mercy Sisters Unite

The largest meeting of Religious Sisters ever to take place in Ireland was held on July 14th last when 2,600 Mercy Sisters came together at the National Basketball arena in Tallaght, Dublin to form one Mercy Union of the Sisters in Ireland and South Africa.

Catherine McAuley, now called 'Venerable', founded the Mercy congregation in 1831 to serve the disadvantaged poor of the time. Hundreds of Mercy convents were set up over the years in every town and county in Ireland and in 55 countries abroad. The followers of Catherine now number 3,615 in Ireland, approximately 16,000 worldwide. They respond to a wide range of local needs in education, medical and social care, and pastoral work. Up to now, each diocesan group was administered separately.

If every village in Ireland has its own ethos and tradition, it is no surprise that each Mercy group in the

country had its own heritage and values. Seven years ago the idea of a Mercy Union first emerged. Over hundreds of meetings at every level, a common vision for the Mercy sisters in Ireland and South Africa gradually emerged.

The commitment to union had to be agreed by every Mercy convent in Ireland, then it had to be set up in legislation and finally approved by the Holy See. The Tallaght meeting was the result of a consensus, sometimes painful, that the needs of the Irish and South African churches were best served by a strong Mercy Union.

Present at the ceremony were representatives of Mercy Sisters from the United Kingdom, U.S.A., New Zealand, the Philippines, Latin America, Canada, and many African countries. Laity closely associated with the work of the Mercy Sisters in Ireland and South Africa were also present.

The Tallaght ceremony of union was a creative celebration in music, song, dance and reflection. These captured the huge variety of Mercy work and expressed its hopes for the future.

The Declaration read by the Sisters, expressed their commitment to solidarity with the most vulnerable in society. They promised to work as bridge-builders respecting the dignity of all. The Declaration confirmed the Congregation's corporate thrust toward those who are weak and marginalised.

The Declaration stated (full text)

"We are Sisters of Mercy
We gather today
To celebrate a creative moment
In our story

We are people who have heard
The same music
Through the call of God
The charisma of Catherine
And the lives of Mercy women gone before us

Aware of our own woundedness

And the need for conversion

We draw daily from the wells of God's Mercy

We women of Mercy
Called and gifted by God
and each other

Today formalise new bonds

And new relationships among us

Enlivening and strengthening us for mission

Out of the vibrant waters of our time

The pain of humanity calls us

To be bridge-builders in a broken world

And so
We commit ourselves anew

To serve the poor, sick and needy

To work for justice and peace

And to further the dream of God in our world"

(end of full declaration)

There are 200 Sisters of Mercy in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore.

One hundred and sixty of them travelled to Dublin last Thursday to participate in the celebrations.

The work done by the Sisters will continue as heretofore, but, with an even greater impetus for the future.

Abbeyside Scout Notes


VERONIQUE DEBRUYN

OUR LOCALITY

This week we return to giving a description of some of the townlands in our area not covered in previous articles. In those articles we gave you the names of all the townlands south of the main road from Barnawee Bridge to Clonea Hotel.

The Staing is to be found in Kilminion South adjacent to the main road. It was a division of land roughly the equivalent of a perch.

The district north of the main road in this area is generally referred to as Ballinroad particularly that area adjacent to the Church. In earlier times Ballinroad, with Dungarvan and Abbeyside made up the Union or Manor of Dungarvan. The townland today consists of a few fields westward from the Church cross-roads.

The other townlands here are:

Ballyrandle (Homestead of the Rundale); Ballinaskeha More (Homestead of the

Whitethorn); Carnageragh West (Garden of the Sheep) and Kilminion (St. Minnin's Church).

The road northward from Barnawee Bridge leads to "Powers of the River" and "Droichead an Uisce" (The Bridge of the Water), now called "Droichidim". Here the Deelish Stream flowing southward, has the townland of Cloncoskoran to the east and Ballinaskeha Beg to the west, with Knocknagranagh (New Home of Dungarvan Golf Club) further west to the Glendine Estuary.

Below Cloncoskoran is Dunsalagh, a marshy thicket not bordering any road. The Douglas Stream runs from here into the Deelish River. Locals call this stream the "Seana Garrdha" (Old Enclosure). The enclosure was probably part of the Cloncoskoran Castle compound, which is situated nearby. "Fort of the Willows" is an apt translation

for the marsh called Dunsalagh. "Coscran's Meadow" and "Hill of the Sows" would indicate that Cloncoskoran and Knocknagranagh were also part of the castle land where livestock were grazed.

Nobody could anticipate or provide for such an unexpected occurrence and yet it was strangely apposite that Michael should take leave of us surrounded by his beloved Ballyduff team mates, wearing the jersey he loved and prided in and taking on Tallow in a championship match.

The Michael I recall was a fine hurler, tall, strong, positive and totally committed. His great club displays brought him to the notice of the county selectors who quickly placed him at right half back for Waterford. Endowed with fine physique this speedy spirited son of Ballyduff looked set for a long tenancy of that position

until illness forced him to abandon field games completely. His passion for hurling, football, soccer - any game in a Ballyduff jersey - was such that he was impelled to pull on the red jersey once again. And so he did.

We are all upset to witness the passing of a young man like Michael. Tallow and Ballyduff are the keenest of rivals and over the years shared many tense occasions when all was not sweetness and light but behind all the rivalry there is a mutual regard and appreciation. Our thoughts are with his family, his neighbours, his friends and the whole community of Ballyduff of which he was a valued member. We would like them to know now at this traumatic time how genuinely we share their sorrow as we tender our sincere sympathy.

Lenister Final — What did you think of Sunday night's showing of the Lenister Hurling Final? Impressed by Offaly? Sorry for Wexford? Pleased with the referee? Offaly performed well I thought with superior striking on the ground or from the hand. Do I detect the Cregan influence on them? Even from the throw-in we saw the quick ground stroke - three in fact - to send the sliotar into Wexford territory. One notable exemplar of that quickness and alertness was John Tory, seen at his best in the lead up to Billy Dooley's goal.

Daithi Regan, too, made good use of the ground ball. His main weakness is under the air ball, puckouts principally. He also expects to be allowed to catch every ball in his hand, something which he, big a lad as he is, won't find easy when the Galwaymen are around the next day.

Eamonn Cregan, their coach is a firm believer in basics, simple ordinary skills done quickly. He is trying to ensure that his team don't slavishly adhere to any one gambit; that while lifting, catching, solo-running and passing have their uses in the modern game they should be selectively used. In the end unless players are taught to think deeply about their game and to judge for themselves which skill suits a given situation the team will not make any significant progress. Ultimately, of course, the result hinges on which team scores the most, which team can turn its chances into scores. To score the ball must be struck by the hurley (or kicked) which brings us back once more to striking. Offaly were undoubtedly the better strikers but to claim as some newspaper accounts did that "Offaly crushed the tissue-like challenge of Wexford" (Cork Examiner) or that "Wexford were decisively beaten by Offaly" (Irish Press) does less than justice to the Model County who were only kept out late in the game by some fine saves by the Offaly goalie David Hughes. Imagine how one goal at that stage would have inspired Wexford, never mind a possible two or three. Seven points (in hurling) was little enough between them at the call of time and is not "decisive" or "crushing".

All honour to Offaly. I know personally how much they love and promote hurling. Any success they achieve is richly earned. A word of advice for Wexford: get the basics right, you're not too far off at all. The referee, Mac Suibhne from Dublin was quite good. He should,

however, be far more severe on dangerous personal fouls such as the strangulation - with - the - hurley - round - the - neck attempt on Brendan Kelly in the second half. Kelly got a free but the punishment didn't fit the crime because the perpetrator escaped without as much as a mild reproof.

Monumental Tribute To John Treacy

Villierstown pride of joy and many times national hero, John Treacy, returned to his roots last Thursday for the 'Dromana 5' road race to retrace his schoolboy route from Villierstown to Cappoquin.

The tall, lean figure of the famous athlete, seen on numerous occasions by thousands of proud Irish t.v. fans cut a familiar pose in front of the tumultuous reception in the small West Waterford village, just yards from the

Treacy family home.

To mark the historic occasion of Treacy's homecoming, a magnificent stone monument was unveiled in his honour by Mr. Fintan Walsh, PRO of the Waterford County BLE Board. It was a truly emotive evening for the twice world cross-country champion and Olympic silver medalist, who clearly experienced at first hand, the depth of respect in which the athlete was held by his fellow

County Waterfordians.

Sponsored by Dungarvan based David Kiely, the monument features the national and Olympic flags and, etched in stone, are details of some of Treacy's most spectacular athletic achievements spanning almost quarter of a century to date.

"DEEPLY HONOURED"

Speaking at the damp, overcast venue, where hundreds of devoted fans had gathered, including family members, his wife Fionnuala and their four children, Caoimhe, Deirdre, Sean and Conor, Treacy said that once again he had been humbled by the people of his native Villierstown.

"I am deeply honoured", acknowledged Treacy, "it is a lovely tribute, and I am so proud that the monument is here in my native village of which I am so proud".

Before the impressive monument was unveiled to the eager crowd, Fintan Walsh recalled John Treacy's illustrious career, from

it's infancy in 1970 when John ran his first race in the colours of St. Nicholas (Ring) and culminating in his four Olympic Games for Ireland in Moscow, Los Angeles - in which he achieved silver in the marathon - Seoul and finally Barcelona. There was much to recall along Treacy's star spangled road to fame. In 1979, he was bestowed the honour of Freeman of Waterford, the first sportsman to be so honoured.

"Every country has its sporting legends, and in John Treacy, Ireland can rub shoulders with the best", Mr. Walsh declared.

A WINNER EVERYTIME

On conclusion of the speeches, the Dromana road race commenced. True to form Treacy did not disappoint his fans, romping home to victory in every sense of the word, recording a splendid time of 23 minutes and 49 seconds.

SNIPPETS FROM DUNGARVAN V.E.C.

MASSIVE GROWTH IN V.T.O.S.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Vocational Education Committee, C.E.O., Kieran Heffernan reported a 'remarkable' uptaking of the college's V.T.O.S. Scheme - Vocational Training And Opportunities Scheme.

This scheme is run by Co. Waterford V.E.C. and the courses are held at an out-centre in the Presentation Convent. The V.T.O.S. is intended for persons over 21, and who have been unemployed for 6 months or more. Courses currently on offer include tourism and heritage studies, marketing, business studies, languages, secretarial studies, computer courses and book-keeping and accounts.

Mr. Heffernan stated that in 1991 a total of 18 students participated in the scheme, which, he said had now grown to 60. Retaining a policy of expansion the C.E.O. announced the new addition of a further course to the scheme - computerised accounts.

Nine local teachers are employed by the scheme under the V.T.O.S. co-ordinator Tonya Lineen.

Describing the scheme as a 'vital part of the V.E.C.'s operation', Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne then invited Tonya Lineen to the next monthly meeting to address members on the subject.

Pointing to the significant employment created by the nine teaching positions alone, Cllr. Kyne stressed the importance of expanding the role of the V.T.O.S. thereby promoting the role of the college in the future.

KILMAC' REFURBISHMENTS

Members of the Co. Waterford V.E.C. unanimously agreed last Monday to proceed with the refurbishment of a computer room in St. Declan's Community School, Kilmacthomas at a cost of £1,667.

The Parents Council of the Kilmac' School hope to raise sufficient funds to have the new computer system in place by the start of the 1994 term in September.

Cllr. Con Casey's proposal to proceed with the urgent refurbishment was subsequently seconded by Cllr. Lar Hart.

NEW MEMBER WELCOMED

Attending her first Co. Waterford Vocational Education meeting last Monday was Dungarvan Urban District Council member, Cllr. Nuala Ryan (F.F.)

Cllr. Ryan was earlier nominated to the V.E.C. at the June U.D.C. meeting on the proposal of Cllr. Billy Kyne and seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan. Also selected to represent the U.D.C. was Cllr. Paddy Power (Labour) who was returned to his V.E.C. seat on the proposal of Cllr. Lar Hart and seconded by Cllr. Ryan.

V.E.C. Chairman Cllr. Kyne welcomed the Fianna Fáil Councillor and said she would make a "telling contribution" to the V.E.C. as she had done in the U.D.C.

CLASS FEES 'GOOD VALUE'

The new class fees for 1994/95 for adult education courses were approved last Monday by Co. Waterford V.E.C. members. C.E.O., Kieran Heffernan described the new fees as 'competitive' and 'good value'.

A six week adult education course, Mr. Heffernan explained, cost £25, and an 8 week course is to be increased to £30, while a course lasting nine weeks will cost £40. The duration of each class is 2 hours. Recording almost a three fold increase in students in the past few years, Mr. Heffernan said there had been an 'exceptionally high pick-up on adult education courses at Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas'. The 1994/95 class fees were proposed by Cllr. Con Casey and seconded by Mr. Jimmy Byrne.

Commenting on the adult education courses, V.E.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said the courses formed a significant part of the V.E.C.'s activities. "It is of crucial importance to enhance the role of the V.E.C." continued Cllr. Kyne, "and we must, therefore, work to keep the numbers on these courses as high as we can".

In conclusion, the athletics correspondent for WLR FM welcomed John, his wife Fionnuala and their four children home to what he stated was the greatest country on earth for the life style we love and he wished them many years of enjoyment back in their native Ireland. He then unveiled the stone in the unavoidable absence of Fr. Michael Enright, P.P., Ballylooby.

PROUD OF VILLIERSTOWN

In reply, the man of the moment, John Treacy said that he had purposely not viewed the stone before-

hand as he wished to wait for the official unveiling. Jokingly he quipped that a liberty was taken in stating on the stone that he was a four times Olympian.

On a more serious note he stated that he was humbled once again by the people of Villierstown. "I always make a point of stating where I am from. I am proud to be from Villierstown. Though uncomfortable in such situations, as this evening, I appreciate the honour bestowed on me. When people pass by they can see that Villierstown can produce a world champion," he added.



Squandermania more than anything else cost us a place in the minor football provincial final at Pairc Uí Caoimh next Sunday, when we virtually handed the semi-final to Clare on a plate. A total of sixteen wides as against six for lucky Clare, shots rebounding off the upright, crossbar and goalkeeper and the concession of two very soft goals to the opposition, were all contributing factors in losing a match that we clearly should have won deservedly and decisively at Tipperary Town on Friday evening last.

A crowd of less than 300 attended the game and the vast majority of these were Waterford supporters who had made the journey in the hope that the result would show a change of luck for the county who had suffered two Munster final defeats in the under-age grades in the previous five days.

With so much territorial advantage and so much possession of the ball in the second half which had begun with the teams all square on the scoreboard at 1-5 apiece, supporters were gearing themselves for a win until disaster struck in the 35th minute and all against the run of play, when a high ball lobbed into the Waterford net to give Clare the 'lift' they needed to restore their composure.

In spite of this, Waterford fought back and 'camped' in

the Clare defence for most of the half, during which they kicked a total of nine wides, that, more than anything else, cost us the game.

Special County Board Meeting

A special meeting to appoint county selectors in the grades other than senior hurling, will take place at Lawlor's Hotel on next Monday night. No other business will be taken at the meeting. It is expected that Coisde na Peil will nominate selectors in all the football grades.

A proposal that the outgoing junior hurling selectors be reappointed was made to the last meeting of the Board, following the reading of a submission made by the members of the panel of players who were involved this year. Clubs, if they so wish may nominate members for this and other committees.

As the Under 21 hurling selectors will be still in office until their team goes out of the championship or until the championship is over, it is unlikely that they will change here.

At the last meeting, Nioclás MacCraith proposed that guidelines, or terms of reference for all selectors, be drafted and approved by the County Board, before all the committees were appointed. Many delegates held the view that while there was great merit in having terms of reference clearly defining the duties and responsibilities of county selectors in all the grades, approved before the new people take office, the need to have the senior county hurling selectors put in place as soon as possible took precedence and the drafting of such directives was deferred. In drafting guidelines many people will have opinions of what these should involve and many members will have different views as to how control in all areas of team management should be exercised.

I presume that these guidelines will be based on the experiences gained in the conduct of affairs by the various selection committees, over the years. Some of these matters have become an issue at Board level and they were not always resolved to the satisfaction of everyone. The areas in which regulations, etc., will be involved can relate to finance, discipline, control and communication.

While nothing that would impede or hinder the plans and programme for inter-county success, should be considered, or at no time should selectors feel that they are under scrutiny, the county must look at the matters listed above.

At an annual average cost of £80,000 on travel, etc., of intercounty teams we must, in view of our financial situation take a look at costings and see if savings can be made. From time to time, it has been stated that players, based in the same area, do not travel together

to training sessions. It is a fact that from time to time, county teams preparing for the championship have involved expenses in travelling long distances to play challenge matches that often prove worthless. Are some of our teams too long in training? Is it a waste of money, fielding a junior football team in the inter-county championships, while the present structures are in place? What can be done to educate players about the folly (and silly practice) of swapping jerseys after a game. These cost more than £400 a set and when even only a few are swapped, the full set must be replaced. The matter of costly fines for breaches of the match regulations, etc., and I am sure that there are other areas in the financial side of things that will be looked at when terms of reference are being discussed with the new committees. The £80,000 cost of travel is reduced considerably when we take into consideration the share of the National League, hurling and football pools and the money received from Munster Council for travel to the championship games. Still a very serious look must be taken at the cost factor and savings must be effected if we are going to turn our finances around.

which require selectorial attention with some of our committees including the selection of teams in accordance with general rule and in time of publication and in some cases not having them published at all. The matter of seeking the postponement or refixing of club championship

matches for a period of longer than the nine days agreed with County Board asking to have games cancelled because a player deep down on the substitute list is involved. I'm sure that these and other matters will be discussed long before any of our teams go into action.

TRAGIC DEATH OF MICHAEL QUIRKE

The entire county was shocked on Saturday evening last when news of the sad death of well-known Ballyduff hurler and footballer Michael Quirke, who died suddenly while playing a junior football championship game against neighbours Tallow at Lismore, became known. This game was in progress for about five minutes when the very popular player who was in his 32nd year and who had assisted the county senior hurlers in the mid eighties, collapsed and died very shortly afterwards. Both teams and the groups of spectators present were numbed into silence when Michael was pronounced dead after medical examination.

The Quirke family's very close association with the games going back for generations, need not be recounted as there are very few who are not aware of the wonderful contribution made by the family to both the Ballyduff club and the county teams. Needless to mention, the family, the club and the huge circle of friends and acquaintances, were shattered by the awful news.

P. J. Ryan, chairman of the Western Board paid tribute to the family and expressed the sincere sympathy of the division and said that the sad event would cast a gloom over all the championships. The Ballyduff club paid their final respects in a very meaningful way and all the Boards and most of the clubs were represented at the funeral and burial.

Through these columns we express our heartfelt sympathy to his wife Catherine and his young son Kieran as well as to his parents, Michael and Biddy, to his brother John and his sisters Gretta, Myra and Breda. May he rest in peace.

Nothing would be achieved now by rehashing the lengthy and acrimonious debate on the matter, as the case is in the hands of the Munster Council by way of appeal, which will be heard probably within the next few weeks.

The motion of censure which carried a minimum of two months suspension, was introduced after a letter from the Lismore Club on three points relating to the matter, were read and very strongly supported by Christy O'Brien, Club Secretary who defended the actions of his club colleague, Jimmy O'Gorman.

REPORTS

There were reports from practically all the selection committees and all the outgoing selectors were thanked by the Chairman for their input into the effort to bring success to the county.

The outgoing football selectors was one of particular note and commented on for its clarity and for putting things in proper perspective.

Having dealt with the defeat by Tipperary and the blunders which contributed to our defeat, the report stated: "There are many lessons to be learned from the defeat. Players must be prepared to give 100% commitment and dedicate themselves to get their fitness and skills levels to the required standard. Players cannot do this if they are being pulled one way by their clubs and another way by the county selection committee. Players become disillusioned with this state of affairs and who can blame them?"

"Clubs are under pressure with vital championship games coming up, but if we are to have a winning senior county team, clubs will have to release their best players for county training.

If they refuse to do this, County Board will have to take action as they should when players refuse to make themselves available for the county team. Personalities should be kept out of the issue. The wearing of the county jersey should be of paramount importance in a player's career."

The above report is quite obviously a sequel to the great lack of co-operation given to the county selectors at times during the year. Those who made life a bit difficult for them have a lot to answer for.

HANDBALL

The Kilgobinet Handball Club who organise all the intercounty competitions in which the county is involved, wrote seeking financial assistance. Their letter pointed out that the club have to bear the brunt of the expense involved in sending out players to represent the county in the various grades, which are now increasing. The application will be dealt with by An Coisde Gnotha.

OTHER BUSINESS

Eddie Cunningham, who was one of the principal speakers on the motion of censure debate, moved that the County Secretary, Seamus Grant act as second delegate to the Munster Council during Jimmy O'Gorman's term of suspension. This was agreed without a division.

P. S. O Riain, Chairman of the Western Board announced that he intends being a candidate for the county chair at the next convention, when Eamon O Murchú stands down.

Following a report on the recent sponsorship agreement reached with the Bank of Ireland, the Central Council representative reported that very little information was given to the Central Council delegates on the subject. He further stated that a basic payment of £6,000 for each of the 32 counties had been officially announced, and he was unable to explain at this stage why the amount was suddenly reduced to £5,000.

The delegates expressed their gratitude to the Bank of Ireland for their generous gesture, but at the same time expressed disappointment at the amount of the share-out. The Central Council representative was instructed to make the feelings of the Board known at the next meeting.

A championship progress report from all three Boards was given.

Tribute was paid to the late Mary Walsh, brilliant member of the Ladies Football Minor team which recently took All-Ireland honours and who died very suddenly recently. A moment of silence was observed in her memory.

Alps whose direct relatives have been lately traced to Cork city by D.N.A. testing. Fionán Ó Dobhthaigh and Máire Ní Dhubthaigh, who have recently opened an office in Dublin having worked out of Paris for some years, have designed the project. They have a particular interest in the seashore and water related landscaping.

Máire Nic Craith, Solr., a native of Ring and co-ordinator of the project at local level feels that the function of the complex should be to provide a focal centre for the community to establish a clear recognition and propagation of the genuine elements of Celtic culture, refined and tested over thousands of years. "The youth of Ireland or indeed fellow Europeans should not be divorced from such a glorious past", says Máire.

The picturesque site overlooking the bay and spanning two townlands is also an auspicious choice. Receptive to unobtrusive building and served by three roads, it is steeped in the lore of the area. Adjacent to a Fairy Fort it was in olden days before the present road was built, crossed by a path from Baile na nGall to Sean-Chluain

Church and thence to An Coinnigéir, and Dungarvan. On this path lived the writer Micheál Turraoin and the famine poet Máire Ní Dhoma with her 'gairdín na miorúiltí' (The Garden Of Miracles). The families of Turraoin and O Cionnfhaolaidh, outstanding folklorists, writers and sean nós singers also lived here.

Páirc na Claise was formerly owned by Ailiff 'Chuipeána, bean chroí mhór, the matrona conjugula of the Ó Faoláin, Ó Griobhtha and MacCraith families of an Rinn to day. The reception area to the south is situated in a small field called "An Bansa" a parsonage to Ring Parish but was acquired by Aindrais Ó Faoláin in the 19th century.
