In the course of the July monthly meeting, many glowing tributes were duly accorded to the retiring Town Clerk as Council members united in their praise.


The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne expressed sadness on the occasion and spoke of

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — My wife died recently. We were each getting our own pensions. Am I entitled to her pension for six weeks?

Answer — When a person getting a social welfare payment dies and their payment included an increase for an adult dependant, that dependant will continue to get the benefit for six weeks after death. This six week payment is given even if deceased was not getting a payment for an adult dependant but would have if the spouse/dependant was not already getting a Non-Contributory Old Age Pension, Blind Pension or Carers Allowance, in their own right. So, for six weeks after the death the surviving spouse will get their own pension plus that of the deceased spouse. Since November 1986 when equality was introduced either spouse can claim the other spouse as a dependant if the spouse has income below a certain limit. This limit is now £60 per week. This means that if your pension is a non-contributory one, then you would be entitled to the six week payment. If your pension is a contributory pension, then I am afraid you would not be entitled to this payment since you don't satisfy the above requirements. You should apply for the payment anyway and let the Dept. of Social Welfare decide if you are entitled to it.

Question — Is an employer entitled to deduct till shortages from a shop assistants wages?

Answer — Under the Payment of Wages Act, 1991, an employer is allowed to make certain deductions from an employee's wages. These are:

- Any deductions required by law (e.g. PAYE or PRSI).
- Any deductions required or authorised by the terms of an employees contract (e.g. Superannuation or particular till shortages or breakages).
- Any deductions agreed to in advance in writing by the employee (e.g. trade union dues or VHI subscriptions).

With regard to till shortages and breakages, an employer can only deduct them from wages with your consent and where:

- This is provided for under contract of employment and you had received written notice of this provision before the shortages/breakages occurred.
- You had received particulars in writing of the shortages/breakages and amount to be deducted at least one week before the deduction is made.

- The deduction must be reasonable and should be made within 6 months. If a series of deductions are to be made the first deduction must be within 6 months.

You can advise your employer in writing that you are not agreeing to any deductions (keep a copy of the letter). Where an employer is in breach of the Act, an employee can make a complaint in writing to the Employee's Rights Section, Dept. of Enterprise and Employment, Davitt House, 65a Adelaide Road, Dublin 2. Telephone (01) 6765861.

Question — I took early retirement at age 58. As I wasn't entitled to Unemployment Assistance when my Unemployment Benefit ran out I have just been signing for "credits". I was turned down recently for Optical Benefit because I didn't have 13 weeks PRSI paid in recent years. I thought the cuts had been removed. Can you clarify my position?

Answer — The requirement that you have 13 weeks PRSI paid in a recent year which was introduced in July 1992 had been removed for the following groups:

- People on Disability Benefit for 12 months.
 - People on Invalidity Pension.
 - People on long-term Unemployment Assistance.
 - People on Pre-Retirement Allowance.
 - People on Retirement Pension.
- It still remains for those like you who are only getting credits. However, if you qualify for Retirement Pension at age 65 you will come back into benefit for Treatment Benefit if you meet the other PRSI requirements.

As you continued signing on for credits, you have the option to claim Unemployment Benefit at age 65 instead of Retirement Pension. Because Unemployment Benefit is not taxable many people avail of this option.

An administrative decision has now been taken which will allow people like yourself who have been signing on for credits to come back into benefit at 65 if they are getting Unemployment Benefit.

Rwanda Fund Appeal By Dungarvan Sister

A Dungarvan-born nursing sister has appealed to people in Waterford and South Tipperary to be generous in their response to next Sunday's church collection in aid of Rwanda.

Sr. Leonara Queally, from Abbeyside, Dungarvan, is a member of the Trocaire/Medical Missionary of Mary medical team in the town of Cyanika in Southern Rwanda where over 80,000 are living without adequate supplies of food and clean water and are without proper sanitation.

The special collection will be taken up at all Masses in the diocese of Waterford and Lismore next week-end for the Trocaire/Medical Missionary of Mary medical team in Rwanda.

Most of those at Cyanika have been forced to flee their homes and land as a result of the conflict in the central African country in recent months.

Sr. Leonara has been working in South-West Rwanda since the middle of June. Over 80,000 people had fled to Cyanika seeking safety from the fighting and massacres that are feared to have claimed up to a million lives in Rwanda since early April.

According to Sr. Leonara, the displaced people are living in temporary shelters stretched over the green rolling hills in the vicinity of Cyanika. There is an acute shortage of food and clean water in the camp which has a population of almost twice the city of Waterford. There is no proper sanitation and the smell of excrement is everywhere.

"We are treating people for a range of serious health problems including malaria, dysentery, respiratory problems and tick fever", says Sr. Leonara. "But we are now very worried about the shortage of food and clean water in the camp. While we do what we can for people in terms of medical care, it is very difficult for us to watch people slowly fade away for want of proper nutrition".

"When we arrived here we were treating about 300 people a day but now we are treating over 1,200 a day", says Sr. Leonara. "The camp is growing in size all the time and we believe that

the presence of the Trocaire/MMM team here is reassuring people that as long as we're here they will be safe".

Sr. Leonara said that with most of the attention on the town of Goma in Zaire, there was a danger that people still living inside Rwanda would be forgotten by the outside world. Due to the remoteness of Cyanika within the French-controlled zone of Rwanda, very little news is getting out of the region, but there are fears that over a million people are under serious threat of starvation in South-West Rwanda.

The other members of the Trocaire/Medical Missionary of Mary team are Dr. Genevieve Van Waesberghe, Sr. Josephine Keane from Kilmaine, Co. Mayo, Sr. Joan Corkery from Coachford, Co. Cork and Stephen Jackson of Trocaire from Sandymount, Dublin.

A Garden Job List For You



It's nice to relax in the garden when the results of your hard work and the weather are at their best — but most gardeners soon find something to be done!

Here are just a few jobs to keep you busy this month.

CUTTINGS

Some jobs are naturally more inspiring than others and taking cuttings is one of them. Not only is it creative because you are providing a supply of plant stock for next year's pots, boxes, baskets and beds, but also a great money saver.

To take a cutting from a suitable variety, make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and strip off the lower leaves before neatly firming into a tray or pot of cutting compost.

You don't need to use rooting compound but beware of over-watering and moist conditions — mould and rot can soon set in.

Place cuttings in a sunny and airy spot and they should soon take root.

CLIPPING

Keep hedges neatly trimmed and end the month with a final neat cut before autumn.

AUTUMN PLANTING

Prepare sites and locations for autumn planting. Non-container grown shrubs and trees will need thorough site work.

BULB PREPARATION

Spring bulbs need to go in soon, so prepare the ground as you lift hippeastrum and lily bulbs at the end of their flowering season.

VEGETABLES

Planting of brassicas — brussels, broccoli and cabbage — should be completed. Onions should also be about ready for lifting and, once thoroughly brushed clean of soil and dried, can be plaited and hung in the kitchen until needed.

HERBS

Start gathering on dry days for bunching. Dry first by laying on newspaper or hanging in an airing cupboard.

COMPOST

You need plenty of good well-rotted compost for the winter digging to come so make sure your compost heap is "stewing" nicely with a good supply of plant material — lawn clippings, flower heads, non-woody plant stems and so on — from a rampant garden.

Keep turning outer edges inwards so that they have more chance to break down in the warm centre of the heap where bacteria are at work.

DEAD-HEADING

Cut away spent blooms on roses, dahlias and chrysanthemums to ensure a constant supply of new buds and blooms.

LAWN

Repair the lawn either by patching or cutting and turning damaged sections, or by re-seeding bad sections.

A new lawn can also be seeded providing the area has been broken up, laced with well-rotted compost or manure, and then raked thoroughly a few weeks before sowing.

Sow the seed to the recommended density of the mixture you have chosen and then lightly rake soil over them.

Most seed is treated with bird repellent but foil strips and netting are advisable.

Having for years attended Gaelic games in West Waterford and enjoyed most of them, it always made it worth extra effort to go to games when Rinn Ó gCuanach teams were on the field.

One of the reasons that particularly attracted me to An Rinn's games was that I could hear our native language being spoken as their means of communication between the sideline mentors and players.

The importance of this to me cannot be overstated as it epitomizes what the C.L.C.G. should be about. Our organisation is supposed to be committed to the promotion of our language and culture, as well as our games.

It is with the greatest sadness, therefore, that I record having sat in the magnificent new Árdán na nDéiseach at Páirc Uí Fhearchair on Saturday 25th June last to hear that "an Ghaeilge" has now been dropped as the language by which the selectors issue their instructions to the An Rinn players.

I suppose it is easy to understand the pressure that the Gaeltacht is under in these modern times, but surely it wouldn't be that difficult to retain this little symbol of our cultural identity. In fact, would it not be more than a token gesture, with little relative effort for all teams to adopt our language for this task.

For too long we have paid only lip-service to Irish in C.L.C.G. and I hope that this has nothing to do with the reason why An Rinn has ceased to use it.

Perhaps even at this late stage I could appeal to those in charge of the Gaeltacht team to look again at the value of what they have discarded.

A Big Meal In One Pan



ONE PAN SUPPER


This quick and tasty chicken and vegetable dish is an ideal choice for a mid-week meal. Cooked in one pan, it can be done on a single gasring in a bedsit, or even a calor gas cooker — so keep it in mind when camping time comes round again.

Ingredients

2oz (50g) butter
1 tbs (15ml) oil
1 onion, chopped
8 chicken thigh portions, thawed
1 packet frozen stir-fry vegetables
4oz (100g) mushrooms, quartered
15oz (425) can new potatoes, drained
1/4pt (150ml) apple juice
salt and pepper

Method

In a large frying pan, heat butter and oil together. Cook onion until lightly coloured.



Remove the bone from each thigh portion and cut meat into slices. Add to onion, cook covered for 10 minutes. Add vegetables, mushrooms, and potatoes. Stir in the apple juice and whist stirring, bring to the boil. Serves 4.

Fun And Craic Galore At Ring Oyster Festival

The scenic Gaeltacht of An Rinn is where the action will be this Thursday July 28th, straight through to the August Bank Holiday when the famous Oyster Festival 1994 gets underway, organised by popular local publican Frank Cooney of Tigh an Cheoil.

A Garden Job List For You



It's nice to relax in the garden when the results of your hard work and the weather are at their best — but most gardeners soon find something to be done!

Here are just a few jobs to keep you busy this month.

CUTTINGS

Some jobs are naturally more inspiring than others and taking cuttings is one of them. Not only is it creative because you are providing a supply of plant stock for next year's pots, boxes, baskets and beds, but also a great money saver.

To take a cutting from a suitable variety, make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and strip off the lower leaves before neatly firming into a tray or pot of cutting compost.

You don't need to use rooting compound but beware of over-watering and moist conditions — mould and rot can soon set in.

Place cuttings in a sunny and airy spot and they should soon take root.

CLIPPING

Keep hedges neatly trimmed and end the month with a final neat cut before autumn.

AUTUMN PLANTING

Prepare sites and locations for autumn planting. Non-container grown shrubs and trees will need thorough site work.

BULB PREPARATION

Spring bulbs need to go in soon, so prepare the ground as you lift hippeastrum and lily bulbs at the end of their flowering season.

VEGETABLES

Planting of brassicas — brussels, broccoli and cabbage — should be completed. Onions should also be about ready for lifting and, once thoroughly brushed clean of soil and dried, can be plaited and hung in the kitchen until needed.

HERBS

Start gathering on dry days for bunching. Dry first by laying on newspaper or hanging in an airing cupboard.

COMPOST

You need plenty of good well-rotted compost for the winter digging to come so make sure your compost heap is "stewing" nicely with a good supply of plant material — lawn clippings, flower heads, non-woody plant stems and so on — from a rampant garden.

Keep turning outer edges inwards so that they have more chance to break down in the warm centre of the heap where bacteria are at work.

DEAD-HEADING

Cut away spent blooms on roses, dahlias and chrysanthemums to ensure a constant supply of new buds and blooms.

LAWN

Repair the lawn either by patching or cutting and turning damaged sections, or by re-seeding bad sections.

A new lawn can also be seeded providing the area has been broken up, laced with well-rotted compost or manure, and then raked thoroughly a few weeks before sowing.

Sow the seed to the recommended density of the mixture you have chosen and then lightly rake soil over them.

Most seed is treated with bird repellent but foil strips and netting are advisable.

ONE PAN SUPPER


This quick and tasty chicken and vegetable dish is an ideal choice for a mid-week meal. Cooked in one pan, it can be done on a single gasring in a bedsit, or even a calor gas cooker — so keep it in mind when camping time comes round again.

Ingredients

2oz (50g) butter
1 tbs (15ml) oil
1 onion, chopped
8 chicken thigh portions, thawed
1 packet frozen stir-fry vegetables
4oz (100g) mushrooms, quartered
15oz (425) can new potatoes, drained
1/4pt (150ml) apple juice
salt and pepper

Method

In a large frying pan, heat butter and oil together. Cook onion until lightly coloured.



Remove the bone from each thigh portion and cut meat into slices. Add to onion, cook covered for 10 minutes. Add veg-

etables, mushrooms, and potatoes. Stir in the apple juice and whist stirring, bring to the boil.

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TRAGEDY IN RWANDA

A Message From The Four Archbishops

The world has been shocked by events in the Central African State of Rwanda. Our television screens have carried the appalling images of genocide, as hundreds of thousands of innocent people have been systematically slaughtered. Men, women and children alike, none have been spared.

In a territory of roughly the same area as Munster, with a population of eight million, as many as one million people are feared to have died in a period of three months. Two million more have been left homeless and destitute. People in Ireland ask if there is anything that can be done? Today we wish to offer some answers to that question for truly, as Christians, we cannot remain silent in the face of such evil.

The Church in Rwanda has courageously witnessed to peace and reconciliation and done all it can to give refuge to displaced persons. But the Church has paid a heavy price for its courage. We now know of over 70 church personnel who have been victims of the slaughter, including three bishops, amongst them the Archbishop of Kigali. In addition to the murders, the traditional sanctuary of church missions has been violated, people dragged from them at night and murdered in front of family and friends.

Meanwhile the world is still awaiting the offer of funds from the richer nations to support the African UN force. We urge our Government to do all in its power to bring about the implementation of the United Nations resolution on the peace keeping force.

However, in the meantime, there is much that we can do as Christians to help the Rwandan people. We know that the church in Rwanda continues to work tirelessly and courageously to bring help to the hundreds of thousands of homeless people crammed into camps within the borders of the country. In the south of the country, only the church continues to provide this service as the major international agencies have had to flee.

We Irish Catholics can help in two ways. Firstly, we must pray for Rwanda. We urge that on a Sunday appointed in each diocese special prayers for Rwanda should be included in the Mass in each church.

SOLIDARITY

Secondly, we can help the efforts of the local church

showing our solidarity with them by contributing generously to a special collection on their behalf. Already, the Irish church is making its own unique contribution to this great local effort. Trocaire and The Medical Missionaries of Mary have sent four missionary sisters into Rwanda. The sisters, a doctor and three nurses are based in the bishop's compound at his mission in Gikongoro, 80 miles from the Barundi border. There, they are working with local hospital and health staff to try to re-establish basic health services for the large local population. Their work needs and deserves our generous support. Cardinal Echeagaray has visited Rwanda on behalf of the Holy Father and he has since written to Cardinal Daly expressing his admiration for Irish aid efforts in Rwanda and for the work of Trocaire and for the Medi-

cal Missionaries of Mary.

It is intended that Bishop John Kirby of Clonfert and Chairman of Trocaire, will travel to Rwanda in the month of August, to express in person the concern of the Irish Church for the people and church there. We urge all the faithful to join in this special effort of Christian witness of solidarity on behalf of the people of Rwanda.

Your assistance will be channelled through Trocaire, the church's own agency for the support of the developing countries, directly to the Rwandan people.

We remind ourselves today of words of the first Letter of St. John: "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother and sister in need and yet refuses to help." (1 John, 3:17).

Big Tom For Goatenbridge

The story of Tom McBride from the small rural village of Oram, a few miles outside Castleblayney, is one of the greatest stories in Irish entertainment. Like so many young lads of his generation, Tom was an early emigrant. He worked on a hydro scheme in Scotland, laid cables in London, and picked tomatoes in the Channel Island. He even spent some time in Wall's Ice Cream factory in London.

The Mainliners started out on the local scene in Monaghan back in the 1960's. They were playing at an INTO social one night when a man named John McCormack was present. He owned the Maple dance hall in nearby Rockcorry. John liked what he heard and became their manager. He thought the name Big Tom would go down well in the country. It was a stroke of genius...and Big Tom and the Mainliners were on the road.

The band comprised of Tom McBride, Henry and Seamus McMahan, John Beattie, Ginger Morgan, Ronnie Duffy and Cyril McKeivitt. Ginger Morgan was the 'lead' singer in the early days and was featured on the 'A' side of their first single in 1966.

On the 'B' side was a song by Big Tom McBride... "Gentle Mother". He performed the song on the RTE Show...and the Station was inundated with requests for the man from Castleblayney. It gave Big Tom and the Mainliners their first Top 10 record. One of the most successful bands in the history of Irish entertainment had arrived on the scene.

Between 1966 and 1975, Big Tom and the Mainliners established box-office

records the length and breadth of Ireland. They were phenomenally popular with country audiences and in Dublin City.

The Mainliners adopted the slogan "The Band with the magic beat". And it was true. The Mainliners were always, and are to this day, the band with the most distinctive sound of all. The guitar style of Seamus McMahan, the organ playing of John Beattie and with Ronnie Duffy on drums, created a unique sound which has delighted dancers down through the years.

The huge crowds that packed all Mainliners dances in those early years were not just confined to this country. Big Tom appearances in the Irish centres in London and Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds, Birmingham and other venues, were enormous affairs. On one famous occasion in London, such were the crowds that turned up for a dance that the police had to be called to 'marshall' the fans as traffic congestion was leading to chaotic back-ups.

Between 1975 and 1989, Big Tom fronted another band and again enjoyed huge success on both sides of the Irish Sea. He recorded an album in Nashville during those years.

Those who yearned for that great 'combo' of Big Tom and the original Mainliners had their prayers answered five years ago when after 14 years apart, the great reunion took place in Co. Monaghan. Over 3,000

fans from all parts of the country travelled to Monaghan for the reunion gig.

Big Tom is set to break all attendance records when he appears at the Glenview Lounge, Goatenbridge on Wednesday August 3rd.

£875,000 RAISED FOR CANCER SOCIETY

The Irish Cancer Society would like to thank all who contributed so generously to Daffodil Day 1994.

This year the campaign brought in IR£875,000 as a result of the hard work and great effort of thousands of volunteers in communities all over Ireland.

Since the first Daffodil Day was introduced in 1988, almost £5 million has been raised for cancer care. This funding has made a very real difference to the quality of care which cancer patients in this country receive.

The bulk of the money raised this year will fund the Society's free home care nursing services for people with advanced cancer.

Demand for the home care service has grown steadily and Daffodil Day now funds or part funds the salaries of 33 home care nurses working on home care teams in 24 counties.

Other services financed by Daffodil Day include a free night nursing service for patients with advanced cancer, the cancer helpline, cancer nurse education and cancer treatment units in Dublin, Cork and Galway.

Daffodil campaign. This was achieved through the generosity of a wide cross-section of the community — businesses, schools, local clubs, the media and individuals who all contributed to the success of

the day.

Measures To Speed Up Election Counts

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., has announced measures he intends taking in order to speed up the counting process at elections.

"The complexity of our voting system means that it will inevitably take longer to ascertain the results of our elections, compared to

other countries," the Minister said, "but this does not mean that we cannot aim to improve our performance. I have therefore been viewing counting procedures to ensure that we get election results as quickly as possible."

Arising from this review, the Minister is initiating the following measures—

- Removal of the statutory time constraints which apply in relation to vote counting at elections (e.g. under existing law, the procedure cannot begin at a Dáil election until 9 a.m. on the day after polling day);
- Development of computer programmes to assist returning officers in conducting counts; and
- Standardisation of count procedures with a view to adoption of "best practice" procedure in every constituency.

"I am satisfied that measures such as these can significantly reduce the time taken to produce election results," the Minister said.

The Minister expressed disappointment at the response to his request that, as far as practicable, employment at elections should be offered to persons not in paid employment. "I recognise that people who have previous experience of election work, and who may already be in other employment, are needed for certain election tasks. But there are many tasks at an election for which direct previous experience is not essential—and I see no reason why unemployed people could not be engaged for these. I am arranging for consultation with returning officers with a view to removing any obstacles in this area well before the next polls."

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



12 Month Sentence For Limerick Woman

UNITED FARMERS ASSOCIATION

Battle For Right To Grow Grain

A joint delegation from United farmers Association and Landowners Grain Quota Protection Group (LCQPG) recently met Department of Agriculture officers in Agriculture House, Dublin, to voice their outright opposition to the concept of individual Base Areas for grain quotas.

UFA National President, Paddy Phelan and Paddy Boyhan, Leinster Vice President said that their organisation was fully behind the LCQPG in their battle to retain the right to grow grain with EU assistance for family farms.

If the proposed Individual Base Areas are put in place, grain quotas will become the property of large con-acre growers in many cases leaving

family farms with no quotas. Hardest hit would be widows, young farmers taking over family holdings and farmers who had to let their land on account of financial difficulties. If those categories had not grown their own grain in the quota base years, no quota would be allocated to their farms. All farmers who traditionally let part or all of their land for tillage would also lose out.

The A.G.M. of the Nire Valley Gun Club and Fisheries Protection Association took place on Monday night July 18th.

All of this activity served them well on Sunday when conditions were warm and demanding. Yet it was only in the last ten minutes that fitness reaped its reward on the scoreboard.

The present league style championship must be deemed a failure. Exciting games were few. One of the rare good games involved last year's county finalists Lismore and Passage, which on the day of a double-header drew a fine crowd. Attendances otherwise have been poor with an absence of excitement and the keen edge of interest blunted by the

Even watching that match on television it was easy to identify with their pride and passion and relentless pursuit of their goal. Conceding a goal of ridiculous simplicity in the first minute when the full back and goalie went for the one ball together, they were rocked back on their heels. We saw a similar goal in a league final (was it two years ago) when Derry won the final after a Tyrone back clashed with his goalie, handing Derry the crucial score.

The player facing the approaching ball should go for it, alone, and not a team mate facing his own goal or one some distance to the left or right. Pity John Kearns didn't remember that straightforward ploy last year in the All Ireland Football Final and advance from his goal line to catch or punch before Downey tipped in the golden goal as both full back and goalie left it to one another. But I digress, back to gallant little Leitrim the poorest county in Ireland, ravaged by migration and emigration, beset by economic, educational and social deprivations, fated to subsist on a small allocation of good land. Beautiful, yes, and anyone who ever drove through it would admit but destined always to lose its finest men and women to Dublin or Liverpool, New York or Melbourne. Our joke, of course, was that in summer Loch Allen was in

Leitrim while in winter Leitrim was in Loch Allen. Just now they are all afloat on cloud nine such has been the impact of their triumph on all of their 24,000 population in the county and the large numbers of ex-patriots scattered abroad.

They absorbed the huge shock of that early goal and bracing themselves for hard work proceeded to dominate the match for the next 50 minutes, not allowing Mayo any score from play until Kieran McDonnell pointed ten minutes from time. Lucky you if you have a Leitrim relative. I'd love to be there and share the ecstatic reaction to the final whistle which ended a 67 year wait. Alas, the nearest I got to "lovely Leitrim" was to pass through the champion county last week and to savour the keen anticipation of their supporters as they awaited the Connacht Final.

Leitrim are a reproach to all of us whose faith is fragile. They are an inspiration to all who doubt the substance of dreams and there is a message there for Waterford, for our hurlers and footballers. Like Leitrim we need a good manager, one who is dedicated, honest, trustworthy, sincere, knowledgeable and organised; one who has a clear vision of his targets and how to achieve them with the capacity to pull all of the many strands together to harness a united effort. John O'Mahony did it for Leitrim. Tony Mansfield with Peter Power and Joey Carton can put Waterford on the map too. Don't have any doubt about it. They are entitled to our patience, support and understanding. Le cúnamh Dé we are going to enjoy watching Waterford senior hurlers in action once again.

His heroes in this tough professional sport were of course the great Sean Kelly and Stephen Roche, and he never tired of reading about their exploits on the roads of Europe and he followed their progress avidly as they took on the world in the Tours, notably the Tour de France.

Michael's commitment to sport and to the clubs he played with was total. His dedication was absolute and he gave 100% whatever the challenge. He died in the red jersey that he loved so well and which he wore with distinction and brought so much honour to.

Michael was one of nature's gentlemen and a true friend. The clubs he served so well will miss him as



will his grieving wife Catherine, son Ciaran, father Michael, mother Biddy, his brother John, sisters Gretta, Myra and Breda and all his relatives to whom the GAA Club extends its deepest sympathy on their tragic loss.

At a special meeting of the club a sincere vote of sympathy was extended to all.

As was only fitting, the GAA Club and Soccer Club came together to pay their respects at the funeral Mass and burial.

Guards of honour were formed, club members acted as pall bearers and at the Requiem Mass brought a hurley, football and his GAA and soccer jerseys to the altar with the Offertory Gifts.

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



The 1991 midfield partnership of Bernie Ryan and Marie Crotty has found a new lease of life and should they gain the upper hand, it could prove decisive. Both players look sharp and fit and while they will need to be at their very best, they are capable of providing the launching pad to victory.

Matches are won by getting scores and if's and but's don't count. The Waterford attack have the ability to cause Kerry's defence plenty of problems.

Our featured photograph this week shows the panel and the mentors of the Eire Og side who won the last County championship title for the club by beating the group side from the city in a rip roaring final at Fraher Field. Many questions have been asked about the team, the subs., and the result of the historic win. JUNIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP



Senior Football Situation

They have played 6 matches and their results are two wins and two draws to give them 6 points. Their outstanding match is against the Nire and if they win, they will be involved in a play-off. If they lose against the Nire they are out, as they will be if they beat the Nire and lose the play-off.

RATHGORMACK

They have played 6 matches, winning three and losing three. With only 6 points they will have to defeat Stradbally in their only remaining match if they are to have a chance of surviving.

DUNGARVAN

They have played 6, winning three and losing three to give them a total of 6 points. In their only remaining match they meet Ballinacourty and assuming that they win this, they will finish with 8 points, which almost guarantees them a play-off for a place in the knock-out stages.

NIRE

CLASHMORE

They have played 6 and with just one victory, have by 2 points which leaves them well out of contention. They have Newtown to play in their final match.

NEWTOWN

The new intermediate champions began in style with a win over Affane, but won no other games. They have 3 matches, Dunhill, Butlerstown and Clashmore left to play and even if they were to win all, they would still be out.

AFFANE

From 6 matches they have one point from a draw with Sliabh gCua last Sunday. If near-misses counted they would be further up on the scale. They have Kilmacthomas left to play.

QUALIFIERS

Tramore are through and my money will be on Kilmacthomas to join them in the quarter finals.

Promotion Hopes?

It is very early days to be writing or talking about the football and hurling leagues which are scheduled to commence on October 9th., but now that the two senior county selectors are in place, the formulation of panels is likely to commence within the next few weeks or so and then, I presume the hurlers and footballers will set about getting ready to win their way up to higher divisions in the league. This will, without the shadow of a doubt, be the prime objective of both groups as the championship is still almost a year away.

The football committee have declared that all their efforts will focus on getting up from division 4 in the league and winning the McGrath Cup in the late Spring of next year. They will also have a 'go' at winning the 'B' All Ireland championship which is confined to the sixteen teams beaten in the first rounds of the provincial championships and which is due to begin next month.

The other eight teams in division 4 with Waterford are London, Kilkenny, Carlow, Sligo, Monahan, Sligo, Westmeath and Wicklow.

The hurlers probably face a more daunting assignment having to battle their way out of a group which include such top-class teams as Offaly (who may be the new All Ireland champions) Dublin (who defeated us on our last visit to Croke Park), Wexford (who pipped us in last seasons league in a game with a controversial finish at New Ross), Down (with whom we drew in the league, but who subsequently ended up with twice as many league points as we did), Laois (who are an

improving Leinster side) and Kerry, who beat us in the championship last year in Walsh Park.

There is certainly something of a mountain to climb here if we are to get ourselves back into the lucrative division 1 of the league.

The biggest, or one of the greatest impediments to success in these, is the late finish to the championship. Last year things went particularly tough for the football selectors who had to content with all sorts of

problems, like playing a National League match against Wicklow on the same day that the county senior football final was being played and having to play London with the Stradbally and Rathgormack players who were involved in the county intermediate-hurling final. I recall the hurlers having to travel also without selected players, because they were club-tied. It is hardly fair to blame the clubs in these instances and the Boards' positions must be understood as well.

July or early August is the time to begin discussing these problems, which are about to happen again this year if we have to stick to our schedules which lists county finals for October 9th and 16th - the dates on which we are due to start the leagues, we are bound to have player/club problems

 On the front page of this weeks edition of "The Dungarvan Leader" you reported that a Dublin architect was appointed for the proposed £1 million plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College by Co. Waterford V.E.C. "following a report by the architect selection panel which comprised of C.E.O. Mr. Kieran Heffernan, V.E.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne, Cllr. Lar Hart, Paudie Geary (T.U.I.) and a senior member of the Department of Education, and which interviewed applicants of July 1st.

I wish to put on record that I was not a member of the above selection panel and I was out of the country on the date in question, having been seconded by Co. Waterford V.E.C. to work in the European School in Brussels from June 20th to July 8th as an external ex-

aminer for the European Baccalaureate examinations.

Furthermore, at the monthly meeting of Co. Waterford V.E.C. held on Monday July 18th I, along with several other members of the V.E.C., expressed my disappointment that the selection panel had not recommended any one of the several, excellent local architects for the position.

Records of V.E.C. meetings show that I raised this issue a number of times over the past two years, because, where all things are equal, I believe local appointments of this level, have distinct advantages, including; access, ease of communications, possible savings on expenses, and most importantly the promotion of local employment opportunities.
