## Cllr. Dillon Pushes U.D.C. On Urban Development Sites

Popular local architect, Cllr. Damien Dillon called on Dungarvan UDC last week to acquire and develop sites in or around the urban area which would firstly allow individuals, couples or families to build their own house to their own individual design, and secondly, for the purpose of attracting industries to the town.

### FEW OPPORTUNITIES

Moving the first motion regarding housing at the July monthly meeting, Cllr. Dillon (Ind) said he came across this particular problem on a daily basis in his capacity as a local architect.

"There are very few opportunities available to buy a site in the urban area", he declared, adding that the Council should acquire land and service it, 'in the interest of providing once off houses for once off situations', at no profit to the UDC.

Cllr. Dillon went on to say, "if you want to build your own house, you have to move outside the urban area to such places as Ballinacourty".

Supporting Cllr. Dillon's motion, Cllr. Austin Deasy TD, felt the acquisition and development of housing sites was a good idea and a necessity, which would help towards decreasing the Council's housing list.

Expressing her reservations, however, Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) said there was

## Dungarvan Oyster Farm Attracts French Mayor

Oyster production has become the fastest growing industry in the Dungarvan-Ring area of Co. Waterford where there are now more than one hundred people employed in it.

The biggest of a number of oyster producing companies is Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm which this year alone will produce four hundred tonnes of oysters - mainly for export.

Set up in 1984 by Ring farmer Jim Harty and Dungarvan businessman Michael Queally, Dungarvan Shellfish Oyster Farm presently employs fourteen people full time together with another sixteen part-time.

Last week the company hosted a reception for a visiting French delegation headed by the Mayor of Marenes, Monsieur Roger Hattabe, and his wife Madam Annie Hattabe. The visit has now thrown up the possibility of the twinning of Dungarvan with Marenes in Southern

France, towns which share a similar culture and which produce oysters of the finest quality.

Present at the reception in the Cliff House Hotel, Ardmore, were the Waterford County Manager Mr. Donal Connolly, Dungarvan Town Clerk Mr. Bertie White, and Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mayor Hattabe presented Mr. Harty with a bronze medallion embodying the official crest of Marenes, and he paid tribute to the major contribution Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm is making to the local economy.

The Mayor, whose Marenes region produces 65,000 tonnes of oysters annually and is considered to

# Spring Marquis Project Agreed In Principle

The proposed Spring Marquis voluntary housing project which calls for the construction of a 33 unit residential development on Council land at the back of Dunabbey House, was last week agreed in principle by members of Dungarvan UDC.

### ACCESS ISSUE RESOLVED

Owing to the popular demand of a separate entrance to the Dunabbey site by residents of bordering estates, various Council members had earlier expressed grave reservations in endorsing RESPOND's proposed development.

At the July monthly meeting however, such reservations were laid to rest, following a report by Town Planner John Reid and an agreement by the South Eastern Health Bord to provide a separate access on

the Hospital Road.

In his report, Mr. Reid states there is an adequacy of public open space and a good variety of 'house-types', well distributed around the site. With regard to the relationship of the proposed housing with adjacent existing housing, the report continues... "there appears to be proper positioning and adequate spacing of houses so as to avoid injury to existing and future residential amenities".

### RECOMMENDATION

Welcoming the proposed residential development, Cllr. Austin Deasy TD described the project as a tremendous boost to the town. Managed by the RESPOND agency, the 33 voluntary housing unit, Cllr. Deasy added, would certainly help decrease the Council's housing list.

With the contentious issue

of a separate estate access resolved, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said he welcomed the project "with an open heart", while Labour Councillor, Paddy Power submitted that the Council should proceed with the proposal in principle.

Newly appointed County Manager, Donal Connolly, recommended the Council to accept the proposal.

On the strength of this recommendation, Cllr. Deasy (FG) proposed to accept in principle, RESPOND's proposals regarding the housing development at Spring Marquis. His proposal was subsequently seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne informed members that further details of the proposed project would be 'fine tuned' at a later stage.

# Maximum Sentence For Local Man

A 23 year old local, was given the maximum sentence permissible under a District Court when he appeared in custody before Judge Michael Pattwell at last week's sitting of Dungarvan Court and pleaded guilty to a total of 49 charges of uttering forged cheques, criminal damage and burglaries.

The defendant, Willie Whelan formerly of Childers Estate and Lower Main Street, but now of no fixed abode, faced a series of charges dating from May to July of obtaining goods and cash to the value of £1,850, causing criminal damage of £4,200 and stealing approx. £1,500.

### ON TEMPORARY RELEASE

Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Supt. Ray McAndrew in-

formed the court that Whelan had first embarked on the criminal escapade while on temporary release from Cork prison where he had served four and a half months out of his 15 month sentence. Thirty-nine of the charges were later committed while on bail.

The defendant had uttered the cheques, which he stole from various local businesses, in stores around the Southeast - Fermoy, Dungarvan, Callan, Co. Kilkenny, Youghal, Wexford, New Ross and Waterford city.

Supt. McAndrew outlined that in one incident alone, Whelan had broken into the premises of Waterford Foods where he caused £4,000 worth of damage to the electronic entry system and had stolen 300 blank cheques.

£20 cash and a calculator

was the total amount recovered from the crime spree.

Whelan's previous convictions include burglary, malicious damage, larceny, criminal damage and assaulting Gardai.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Joe Lavan Solr., made a strong plea for leniency for Whelan, stating that the defendant was 'not of full intellect' and had a substance problem. Mr. Lavan therefore felt Whelan needed treatment rather than a sentence.

On hearing the evidence, Judge Michael Pattwell dealt with each charge separately which amounted to a 31 year sentence. As the vast majority of sentences were made concurrent however, Whelan was sentenced to two years imprisonment. Recognissances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

## Dungarvan Technical College Student Profiles

These students represent various courses on offer at the College such as Secretarial Courses, Hairdressing and Beauty Care Course, Cert Course, Engineering Course, Health Science Course and the Accounting Technician Course.

**What work experience do you get on the course?**

Throughout the year we get a total of four weeks work experience — two weeks in the first term and the remaining two weeks later on in the year.

Each person is given the opportunity to choose where he/she would like to go on work experience and it is then organised by the course directors.

**What are your career plans?**

Well, thanks to the course I have been offered a place in Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital in Drogheda and begin training in October 1994.

On completion on this three year course I would like to pursue a course in Midwifery; thus improving my job prospects — but that is a long way down the line!

**Is the course of benefit to you?**

Yes, I believe that the course is of great benefit to me; not only has it given me a valuable insight into both the working routine of a hospital and the nursing profession as a whole, but more importantly, it has helped me in achieving a training position.

**Where did you hear about the course?**

Mr. Buckley called to the school last year, in sixth year and told us about it.

**Could you describe the course briefly?**

The course consists of a wide range of nursing based subjects such as Practical Nursing, Anatomy and Physiology, Pathology, Psychology, Micro-Biology and Nutrition, all of which provide a firm basis for anyone wishing to pursue a career in nursing.

Also included in the course is a foreign language (French), basic Computer Skills and Career Guidance, which I believe are essential requirements for the modern nurse.

**Do external lecturers visit the college?**

Yes, so far we have had a physiotherapist and a beautician in, speaking with us about the various aspects of their careers, and how their work interacts with ours in the nursing profession. We have also had people from various groups such as the Samaritans and Cura visit the college.

**Would you recommend the course to prospective Pre-Nursing students?**

I would definitely recommend the course to prospective Pre-Nursing students. I believe that it would give them a valuable insight into the world of nursing. It would improve their interview techniques, as it did mine, and in doing so, increase their chances of being accepted for nurse training.

# Local Night Club Licence Re-Instated

At last week's sitting of Waterford Circuit Court, Mr. Paddy McCarthy B.L., instructed by Mr. David Burke Solr., Dungarvan appealed the order made by Judge Michael Pattwell on July 13th at Dungarvan District Court revoking the

dance licence of local nightclub "Club 200", at Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan.

After hearing the evidence of Sgt. Humphrey O'Leary and submissions made by Mr. McCarthy, Judge Diarmuid Sheridan decided to

re-instate the dance licence for a probationary period of one year, subject to the lodgement of £1,000 for charity and also instructing that a matter of this nature should not come before him again in the next 12 months.

## Neighbours Opt For Trial

Two next door neighbours both opted for trial by judge and jury when they appeared before Judge Michael Pattwell at last week's sitting of Dungarvan District Court.

Nicholas O'Riordan of 19, Childers Estate, Dungarvan and Keith Hoggart, 20, Childers Estate pleaded guilty to charges of assault on March 18th last at Childers, thereby occasioning each other actual bodily harm.

Both O'Riordan and Hoggart were remanded on continuing bail to a sitting of Dungarvan Court on September 28th.

not enough land available for private housing in the urban area as it was.

# Tips of the trade will help improve

It should be perfection now for gardeners — high summer and the garden at its best.

Unfortunately, it tends also to show up something about the garden plan that doesn't quite work.

It might be a shrub or

clump of plants outgrowing those behind, at best screening them from view or, at worst, killing them by blocking the light.

Or there might be a plant installed as a background which has turned out to be so big and colourful that it is dominating the border in front.

Sometimes the problem is even more basic — perhaps the shed or an eyesore such as an old tree stump jarring the overall effect or foreground features distracting the eye from the rest of the garden.

Finally, of course, there is that restlessness in the gardener that sees fault is what others regard as perfection.

Whatever the problem, now is the time it will show and when you should plan to deal with it before next year's growing season.

Autumn is the most likely time for new planting or moving shrubs, whether needed for screening or simply out of place where they are.

Winter is the time for digging new borders or areas for the re-modelling and planting of next year.

You will also find more gardening time in winter for major projects such as building a rockery or laying a path.

But, whatever you plan, map it out month by month so you know exactly how much work is required and by when.

## Try these tips:

- Long narrow gardens can be 'shortened' by distractions to the eye placed in the middle distance, such as a flower bed, pergola or stonework — a bird bath or small statue would be ideal but avoid cluttering the view with figures or decorations that re out of scale.

- A shortening effect can also be achieved using side borders with lower varieties while making the border at the bottom deeper in size and using a greater range of height, starting with low flowering annuals and rising to bushes, shrubs and even trees.

- Disguise the harshness of concrete paths and steps by using free-standing pots of geraniums and other flowers.

- Functional items such as sheds or compost heaps can be masked by a trellis carrying a climbing rose or honeysuckle.

- Hide eyesores such as old tree stumps or brickwork with cheap and cheerful ramblers — nasturtiums are ideal as they should have poor soil to produce lots of flowers.

- Try not to leave gaps in the heights of border plants either remove varieties creating the extremes or try to plant something in between.

- Cut a few curves in your borders and avoid laying arrow-like paths — a meandering walk through the borders is best and cheaply and easily created using gravel.

# Concern Over Town's Green Spaces

Expressing concern over Council policy regarding the provision and development of green areas in Dungarvan, Cllr. Austin Deasy, T.D., stressed at last week's UDC meeting, that open spaces for both young and old were urgently needed in the town's urban areas.

"We're consistently building from the centre out", claimed Deputy Deasy, adding that it was not a problem of land shortage but rather a 'lack of planning' that had caused the urban build up.

Calling on the Council to provide municipal playing pitches, Cllr. Deasy strongly criticised the lack of even a children's playground in the town.

The Dáil Éireann member pointed expressively at such areas as Caseyville and St. Patrick's Crescent and strongly urged Council members to devise a strategy for the provision of green spaces whereby people could avail of recreational facilities.

## GONE FOREVER

Re-echoing the sentiments of Cllr. Deasy, various Council members also voiced their opinion, with Cllr. Austin Flynn warning that "...once green areas are used, they are gone forever".

Cllr. Paddy Power submitted that such open spaces need not be excessively large and even small green areas should be taken into consideration.

Also sharing Cllr. Deasy's concern, Cllr. Damien Dillon said an overall map of the urban area, including all existing and potential green spaces should be made

available to Council members.

On the basis of such information, Cllr. Dillon added that members could then devise a 'masterplan' for the area.

## COUNCIL NOT NEGLIGENT

Reacting to her fellow members concern, Cllr.

Nuala Ryan claimed that houses should take priority over green areas. The Fianna Fáil Councillor said that the Council should provide for small green spaces only at the actual time of building Council estates.

Although supporting the idea of targeting 'oasis' in and around the urban area, UDC Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne stated however that the Council had not been negligent in its policy on green areas.

"We have encouraged clubs to take over land and create playing areas", he added.

Recently appointed Waterford Co. Manager, Donal Connolly, informed members that green areas were 'reasonably well provided for' in the Town Draft Development Plan in which, he added, a policy is set out to devote 10% of land used in the construction of estates to open spaces.

It was then agreed by Council members to address the matter of open spaces at a later meeting when dealing with the Draft Development Plan.

## TOMATOEY BEEF STEW

### Ingredients

3 slices of bacon, cut in small pieces  
4 tbsps Flour  
1/4tsp pepper  
2lbs lean beef, cut in chunks  
1 large onion, chopped  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
1 tin of tomato soup  
1 cup beef broth  
1 cup dry red wine  
1 bay leaf (optional)  
1 pinch thyme  
4 carrots, cut up coarsely  
10 to 12 mushrooms, sliced  
4 large potatoes, peeled and quartered.

### METHOD

In a large pot or casserole dish, cook bacon until light



brown. Combine the flour and pepper in a bowl, dip the beef in the flour mixture to coat completely. Brown in bacon fat, turning often. Add a little vegetable oil, if needed. Add onion and garlic and brown them a little. Add tomato soup, broth, wine, bay leaf and thyme.

Cover and cook slowly for about 1 1/2 hours. Add carrots and celery, then potatoes and mushrooms. Cook, covered, for another 1/2 hour, or until the vegetables are tender.

If desired, serve with hot Italian bread and a large salad.



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CAROLE WILEY HUMANITARIAN AID

Kept Alive On Seven-Up!

This weekend a food appeal on behalf of the refugees of Rwanda will be conducted in the shops and stores of Dungarvan and West Waterford on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 4 to 6. The appeal will be conducted by the group which last Friday filled the two containers of aid for Bosnia and they expect that the response on this occasion will at least equal that of their previous effort.

The food collection will once more be organised under the auspices of Carole Wiley Humanitarian Aid and this African trouble spot is one of the locations to which she has been sending aid this year.

"The Seven-Up in the container kept alive countless babies until further aid arrived. For God's sake, keep sending us whatever supplies you can, we need everything possible for the children." These were the poignant words which Sr. Patricia of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart wrote back to the Sisters of her convent in Blackrock in Cork recently, after she and her fellow Missionaries had fed starving child refugees of the Rwanda conflict on the popular fizzy drink for several days in the absence of clean water and until further supplies arrived at their aid station.

The consignment of Seven-Up was part of a container of badly needed supplies which had been despatched some four weeks previously from Cork, arriving at the Sisters' Mission in Lasaka just as the first refugees arrived from Rwanda, telling tales of death, horror and destruction, the like of which the Sisters had not heard before.

The relief supplies which contained foodstuffs, medicine, blankets and clothes, had been put together by the Sacred Heart Sisters and Carole Wiley, the Carrigaline mother of four who for the last two and a half years has been sending vital aid to the suffering people of Bosnia. The aid had been collected in Cork by the Sacred Heart Sisters and in various other locations around Munster by the volunteers of Carole Wiley Humanitarian Aid. Earlier this year, Carole joined with the sisters to send a contained load of humanitarian aid to each of their Missions at Mbala, Indola and Chingola, and they have since co-operated in gathering aid for the two needy countries.

"It was wonderful to be able to share our supplies with people so badly off," Sr. Philomena told us from her convent in Blackrock this week, "and the people of Ireland continued to be extremely generous, not only to the people of Africa,

but also to Bosnia and many other needy areas of the world. I am sure that the person who arranged the sponsorship of these drinks could not have known how valuable they would turn out to be on arrival."

This week, heroine of the Goradze siege, Cobh born Dr. Mary McLoughlin flew out to lend her considerable medical skills to the refugees of Rwanda and spoke with Carole Wiley before she left. She told her that she hopes to be in a position to assist with the Sacred Heart Rwanda aid when it arrives.

Carole Wiley is experienced in assembling container loads of aid and she offered to help the Sisters increase the amount of

badly-needed supplies which they were sending to their Missions in Africa.

TOO WEAK

Sr. Philomena emphasised that the local people are too weak to work, have no resources of their own and are totally dependent on what comes in from outside.

Last weekend the two crusading groups held a food appeal in Dunnes Stores in Ballylovene where an enormous amount of food and medical supplies was collected. Carole and the Sisters are now inviting people to give to Africa as generously as they gave to Bosnia when their needs were also great.

"For the moment at least, the emergency is over in Bosnia," said Carole, "and a

great deal of international aid is now being distributed there. Life for the people of Bosnia — for the moment at least — is getting back to some sort of normality and now this new horror in Rwanda has to take first place in our priorities. We appeal to everyone to be generous when they see volunteers in the shops over the coming weekend, and I know that we only have to be there for the people to react."


"Everything is needed, everything will be accepted and everything will be appreciated," says Sr. Philomena, "and despite what other international aid gets through, our Sisters will see that everything which is donated will get to the neediest of the people in their area."

A lucky Rwandan refugee happily sits on a knee dressed in Irish clothes.



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

LAUNCH OF NEW URBAN RENEWAL SCHEME

# DUNGARVAN ECONOMY TO BENEFIT GREATLY

The major new urban renewal scheme aimed at regenerating the cores of cities and towns across Ireland was officially launched on Thursday, July 21st last at Dublin Castle by Michael Smith, TD, Minister for the Environment and Emmet Stagg, TD, Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal.

Among the large number of guests attending the conference which included representatives from the construction industry, professional bodies, TD's, Senators, local authority elected members and officials, were Dungarvan UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, Acting Town Clerk, Ray Moloney, Town Clerk, Bertie White, Waterford Co. Manager Donal Connolly and Waterford Co. Secretary Brian McNally.

**WELCOME KICKSTART**  
Speaking at the July meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Cllr. Kyne, described the new scheme as a welcome kickstart to much needed development and building in the town.

The Labour Councillor further stated that Minister Smith had been most adamant in his non-support of fragmentation under the scheme, whereby only parts of streets would avail of the various scheme incentives.

This concern had earlier been raised by Cllr. Kyne who previously felt that existing Dungarvan rate payers would be at a disadvantage against new developments getting rates and tax breaks under an urban renewal scheme.

**PREVIOUS SCHEME**  
The incentives available under the scheme are weighted more in favour of residential development than in the previous urban renewal scheme which ended on July 31st last.

This previous successful

scheme was first introduced in 1985 and attracted £1,400m of private investment in areas designated for tax breaks, capital and income relief, but too much investment was concentrated on building commercial and office developments.

The new scheme however, promises a better mix of social housing and commercial and is more residential orientated.

**PURPOSE OF SCHEME**  
The primary purpose of the scheme is to promote the redevelopment and upgrading of run-down urban areas. The term 'urban decay' embraces all types of dereliction, run-down buildings, low grade uses, poor environmental conditions etc.

The new scheme came into operation as from Monday 1st August last and will run for three years, to July 31st, 1997.

Dungarvan is one of 12 Irish towns to be granted Urban Renewal Status by the Government for the first time

These areas include sections of Cork, Limerick, Waterford, Dublin and Galway. The scheme will also cover towns which are currently designated, including Tralee, Ennis and Clonmel, in Munster. The new towns to be designated for the first time will include Dungarvan, Ballinasloe, Enniscorthy, Monaghan, Mullingar, Navan, Newbridge, Roscommon, Wicklow, Mallow, Killarney and Nenagh.

As can be seen from the map, all areas of the town on the right of the black line are designated under the scheme. This includes the right side of Mary

Street, Parnell Street, Carberry Lane, a section of Davitts Quay, Thompson's Lane, Castle Street, the section by the Leather factory, Bath Street, the upper part of Church Street, Emmet Street and the former boarding school section of the Mercy Convent, Parnell Street, Augustine Street and back up to Emmet Street, incorporating the car park area at Mary Street.

In all, the total area in the Dungarvan town centre to be designated under the scheme is 10.5 acres.

**PACKAGE INCENTIVES**

The new package of incentives is geared towards attracting employment back into urban areas and encouraging people to return to live in town and city centres.


The incentives available are;  
★ The existing owner-occupier allowance for residential development will be retained at 50% but will be increased to 100% for refurbishment works.

★ Allowances for the provision of private rented accommodation will be retained at the present level.

★ Capital allowance for commercial developments will be available at 50% in all urban areas. This allowance will not apply at all to office development unless as an ancillary part of a commercial development.

★ Remission of rates will be available for ten years on a sliding scale.

★ A new initiative under this scheme is a new accelerated capital allowance which will be provided for industrial units - 50% for owner-occupiers and 25% for lessors in the first year. This will encourage the development of small enterprise units.

**PEOPLE NOT BUILDINGS**

Speaking at the recent launch of the scheme, Minister Smith stressed the importance of encouraging the concept of living towns. Minister Smith said "it is people, not buildings, that make up a town or city".

It was the Minister's hope "to see people moving back into town, families growing up in town, communities living in town". "To that end, an attractive package of incentives is being made available to people to purchase houses or apartments in the specially designated areas.

As well as encouraging residential development, Junior Minister Emmet Stagg underlined a need to promote the refurbishment of existing buildings wherever possible. He said that "we owe a duty to those who have gone before us, as indeed we do to those who will come after us, to preserve our urban architectural heritage".

Mr. Stagg went on to say

that we "can't preserve all our old buildings in mothballs or turn them all into museums, it would not make economic sense". The Minister added these buildings must be brought into everyday use and to give them a "commercial viability that will guarantee their usefulness and ultimate survival". To encourage restoration of existing buildings, an owner occupier allowance of 100% is available for the refurbishment or conversion of premises for residential purposes.

Minister Stagg said that "one of the most difficult tasks we had was choosing the areas". Decisions on the areas followed much investigation "including inspections by officials of the Department and in many cases by Minister Smith and myself. There were extensive consultations with the local authorities and consideration of development plans together with hundreds of reports and submissions made on behalf of various areas".

**BOOST DUNGARVAN'S ECONOMY**

In a recent speech by the Minister for Finance, Mr. Bertie Ahern TD regarding the positive effects of the urban scheme, the Minister said that the extension of the scheme will give a substantial boost to economic activity in Dungarvan.

Mr. Ahern said "apart from the obvious shot in the arm to the building industry and to jobs in construction, the scheme tends to improve the general appearance of the town area, and to lead to improved shopping and service facilities for the public".

The Finance Minister continuing said that by the end of this year, total investment in urban renewal work over the 8 years of the scheme would reach £1.2 billion. This provided work for many thousands in the construction industry even during a time of recession.

**£12M IN RETAIL SPENDING**

Also welcoming the granting

of urban renewal status to Dungarvan, was the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry which believes the scheme to be a "life-line" to the Deise capital.

The Chamber feel that a well coordinated and integrated plan involving commercial, retail, industrial and tourist interests will be needed to attract further shopping and tourist revenue to the town and to win back market share from neighbouring urban centres. It is believed that up to £12 million in retail spending could come to Dungarvan if a proper plan is now put in place.

**PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING**

In acting as a catalyst for the new urban scheme, UDC Chairman Cllr. Kyne has called for an open public information meeting to be held on August 29th, where the Urban Council will give a forum to members of the public, local auctioneers, the Chamber of Commerce, development companies and all interested parties to obtain further information and to discuss the new development.

"We must be seen to stimulate and encourage the public in the selling of the project", stressed Cllr. Kyne.

Sharing the Councillor's views, Waterford Co. Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly said a lot of responsibility now rests with the urban authority for the success of the venture.

"It's opportune that the scheme has come along at the time of the Town Draft Development Plan", he added.

The Co. Manager then strongly advised the Council to put together an attractive package to potential developers. "The urban Council must be seen as one of the driving forces behind the success and development of the scheme", Mr. Connolly concluded.

## Snippets From Dungarvan Urban District Council

### SHANDON CROSSING

At the July meeting of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan raised the issue of the dangerous crossing at Shandon, beside the Park Hotel.

The Independent Councillor claimed he had witnessed 32 children all under 12 years of age, trying to cross the particular road stretch recently, under the supervision of two adults.

"When will something happen there", Cllr. O'Riordan asked, stressing that the number of pedestrians had increased steadily with more people availing of the facilities in the Park Hotel.

### QUAY JUNCTION

Under the item 'any other business' on the July agenda of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Austin Deasy (TD) informed members of the 'inadequate' junction at the crossing of Davitt's Quay and Bridge Street.

"The junction needs urgent attention", Deputy Deasy declared, adding that even the installation of a roundabout or traffic lights could be looked at.

### SLURRY-LIKE TAR

The recently tarred surface at Boreenatr  was the subject of strong criticism last week by Cllr. Tony Wright who informed Council members that the overall result did not 'look healthy' and in fact looked like 'slurry'.

The Democratic Left Councillor then urged that the road in Boreenatr  from Kelly's shop to the back of the Ard Scoil also needed urgent attention.

Reacting to the Councillor's remarks, UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that he too had not been happy with the initial tarring at Park Lane, Abbey-side, but insisted that the tarred surface had to be weathered out, driven on and hoovered.

Agreeing with the Chairman, Co. Manager Donal Connolly said that in time the tarred road at Boreenatr  would 'weather out'.

### PLAY SIGN OBSTRUCTED

Also under the item 'any other business', Cllr. Nuala Ryan raised the issue of a 'Children At Play' sign at Skehacrine Court, Abbey-

side, where a tree, planted by a tenant, had actually obstructed the sign, hiding it from all oncoming traffic.

Submitting that the tenant's tree should not be cut down, Cllr. Ryan asked the Council to move the sign, thereby making it visible to the public.

The Fianna F il Councillor went on to congratulate Tom Keith and his staff at Dungarvan Sports Centre for the excellent Summer Camp for 6-12 year olds, he had provided for 4 weeks. Cllr. Ryan said her own son had attended the camp and had fully enjoyed every moment.

### TROLLEY NUISANCE

Supermarket trolleys were deemed a cause of public liability at last week's UDC meeting as Cllr. Lar Hart raised the problem of trolleys hitting off cars and obstructing footpaths.

UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, called for contact to be made with the various town supermarkets. In response, Town Clerk, Bertie White, said that contact had previously been made with the L&N, who had agreed to install 'pay trolley racks', but the idea had never since progressed.

## Four Months Imprisonment For 'Look-Out' Man

Thirty year old John Cawley of the Halting Site, Shandon, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court last week, to charges of burglary and trespassing at Shaws Department Store, Lower Main Street and an unoccupied dwellinghouse at St. Martins Terrace in June last.

Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Supt. Ray McAndrew told the court that on June 9th,

Cawley entered a deserted house at 13, St. Martins Terrace where he stole a Hoover valued at £35.

Supt. McAndrew continued that on the night of June 14/15th last, the defendant had acted as the look-out member of a three man gang that broke into Shaws and stole assorted clothing to the value of £165.

Cawley's previous convictions include larceny and assault.

Pleading for leniency, Mr. Joe Lavan Solr., told the court that Cawley was a deserted husband who had to care for a 7 year old son. He had cooperated fully with the Gardai and had received no gain from the property taken at the break in at Shaws.

Judge Michael Pattwell however imposed a one month sentence for the burglary at St. Martins Terrace and a three month sentence for the Shaws burglary to run concurrently. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

## Local Fined For Criminal Damage

Local man, Cyril Barry of 73, Springfield, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court last week to a charge of criminal damage to the front door of a local shop in the early hours of the morning.

Outlining the facts of the case, Supt. Ray McAndrew informed the court that on April 7th last, the defendant had smashed a stone through the front door glass of Michael Kelly's shop at Emmett Street in an attempt to obtain cigarettes. A total of

£75 compensation had since been paid.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., told the court that Barry was currently attending a day care centre where he was under psychiatric care. Mr Gordon added that the defendant had no previous convictions and had no real reason why he had committed the crime.

On hearing the evidence, Judge Michael Pattwell imposed a fine of £50.


## Abbeyside Fisherman Successful In Yoplait 3-Day Gold Medal Event

# TALLOW NOTES

## TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

All In The Game - Did you enjoy the Leinster Senior Football Final last Sunday? A few from Waterford were at it, I'm sure but most of us relied on television to see what over 50,000 of an attendance saw. In fact we saw more than anyone present because the camera brings us close to the action throughout the field and allows us to view incidents in detail. That's an advantage because sometimes, in a fast and furious game, the speed of the action blurs our impressions and we can, in fact, err in regard to details. Slow motion action replays elucidate the grey areas and give credit or pass censure as the case might be.

Even the winners, afterwards anyway, could hardly withhold sympathy for Meath goalie Mickey McQuillan. His up-to-then impeccable display was spoiled only by one error which conceded a goal to Dublin. No matter how outstanding his goalkeeping - he had saved splendidly throughout that match as he had consistently done for Meath over the last eight years - that one blemish which the camera focussed on with such cruel immediacy will be remembered for quite some time. By himself mostly. Blaming him for defeat is grossly unfair. What about his teams very many missed chances from frees and from play, enough to secure victory. Yet we will be

told ad nauseam that the cause of defeat, the turning point of the game was the goal which slipped to the net off his hands.

Tough on such a thoroughly dependable chap as Mickey but Meath mentors deserved no better after their disgraceful treatment of Donal Smyth. A star of their League campaign, Donal performed brilliantly, even to saving a penalty, in the final before the championship saw his form dip. A goalie, or any other player, doesn't become good or bad overnight and to drop him from the panel completely was astounding and unjust and Meath were punished for it.

Were I to give an honest answer to that question at the start I would have to say that I didn't enjoy what I saw. The meanness, the tension, the intimidation, the clear intention to inflict physical damage on the opponent, the foul intent implicit in most tackles made me fearful that a serious injury would be inflicted/suffered. Only God's providence and the superb fitness of the combatants enabled them to survive relatively unscathed. Which is not good enough.

There were 54 frees, we learned. Too many some would say. Not nearly enough I say. Among the unpunished misdemeanors we saw frontal charges, body checking, holding and drag-

ging, jersey-pulling, kicking at the player attempting to lift, liberal use of the fist to dispossess, misuse of elbow and knee and one attempted strangulation (of Ger Regan in the second half when the culprit wasn't even mildly censured).

We saw the long-established custom of holding the opponents hand or jersey as he tries to play the ball. Several perpetrators of this foul escaped detection/punishment. All in the interests of continuity of play, we'll be told, as if ignoring foul play was something desirable and beneficial to the game. Brian Stynes second half point while his "tackler" struggled to remove his jersey from his back was magnificent. Only that Brian is endowed with splendid physique and is super-fit the "tackle" would have borne fruit. The correct penalty for such a tackle is to allow the score, book the opponent and award a 13 metre free from in front of the posts. This practice of allowing the advantage in circumstances such as the above is a fallacy because soon the foulers realise that pulling and dragging, pushing and shoving before, during and after the arrival of the ball, pay rich dividends. The player who is given advantage while being pummeled, held or obstructed illegally is not getting a fair deal. "Play on" means, in effect, "get killed" in a further dirtier tackle.

You may wonder was there any referee. There was, of course, there always is. Brian White was no better, no worse than most of his colleagues but failure to take firm action in the light of a crude or snide or vindictive tackle is simply opting out. Before the match finished he seemed to have abdicated his responsibility and allowed the war to continue until the seventieth minute brought a cessation of hostilities. What a disservice to the game of Gaelic football.

The kernel of the problem is the element of close physical contact in football and the tackle of which there is no clear definition. All tackling attempts are left to the referee's judgment. Hardly fair to the referee imposing an enormous responsibility on him given that the game is inherently foul-ridden. No need to remind ourselves that all footballers aren't saints; neither are they all psychopaths and bullies. But every team has its quota of "hard men" because it pays to have them. Being athletic, skilled and stylish won't, on their own,

get you to a final. Most team managers know that and need to plan accordingly. What a pity.

Could I ask you this: would you like your son to play in a match similar to last Sunday's? Would he enjoy the experience (games are meant to be enjoyed)? Do you think participation would promote his physical well-being and development? Can you say that you would have no feelings of anxiety watching such a game? It's about time we bit the bullet.

## IFA Questions Minister's Power To Dictate Harvest Prices

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Pat Murphy has supported the President of the Association, John Donnelly, who has said that the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Walsh, was not empowered to dictate this year's harvest price by the release of intervention stocks as the Minister has indicated in his statement of Wednesday, July 20.

Mr. Donnelly said the Minister's statement had

caused confusion and disruption of this year's harvest pricing pattern. The IFA President said "that the EU regulations were extremely specific in setting down what the Minister could or could not do with intervention grain stocks. The intervention rules are quite clear — intervention stocks can only be released at intervention price or at a price equal to the market price in a Member state.

Mr. Donnelly said: "All indications now are that grain in most Member States of the EU is trading above the intervention price this harvest. Therefore, it is the market price and not the intervention price that will dictate the price merchants will pay for green grain in Ireland in 1994."

Mr. Donnelly said that IFA would pursue this matter with Minister Walsh with whom he was seeking an early meeting.

## COUNTY WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

Mr. John Dowley and Mr. Tom Hickey, National Council representatives for the County Waterford Executive ICMSA attended a National Council meeting in Limerick recently.

The main items for discussion at that National Council meeting included TB eradication, progress report on programme for work and competitiveness, livestock quota leasing rules, national

reserve and the importation of livestock.

On the question of imports of livestock, the ICMSA is not advocating the total prohibition on the importation of animals into the country, and they would suggest the following controls:

1. — Animals other than animals for immediate slaughter imported into the country should meet the following requirements:

(a) Are from a Member State or Region which is free of the noticeable diseases;

(b) Are bred from or were part of the herd of origin for at least six months prior to exportation;

(c) Undergo a period of holding for rest and examination to enable the health and disease status of the animal to be properly assessed and to allow the relevant documentation with regard to animal identification, herd of origin and herd of destination to be verified;

(d) Movement from the herd of destination to be prohibited, except for immediate slaughter, for a period of 6 months and to be subject to veterinary inspection during this period.

2. — Owners of herds contiguous with the herd of destination to be officially notified of this fact similar to the present notification system under the disease eradication programme.

3. — Animals for immediate slaughter may be imported without the restrictions at 2 above provided they meet the conditions laid down in the EU rules on certification and identification and provided they do not mix with animals of domestic origin.

4. — The system of identification, certification and recording of movement needs to be improved and strictly implemented by all Member States.

The winner of the County Waterford family farm Environmental Conservation and Safety Award for 1994 was The Hahessy Family, Kiballyquilty, Carrick-on-Suir. This was announced at the Dungarvan Show

which was held on Thursday, July 28 last.

This award which is promoted by County Waterford ICMSA and Teagasc has brought a great deal of awareness of safety and environmental issues to farmers.

The County PRO, Tom Hickey said he would like to thank Billy O'Keeffe, Roadstone, who sponsored the winning trophy and the other sponsors, which included ACC Dungarvan, AIB Dungarvan, Norris Brothers, Stradbally, Waterford Foods and the Department of the Environment.

Finally, the County Secretary, Anne Kirwan said that without the help of Teagasc it would be impossible to run the award.

## Pig Farmers To Meet Feed Compounders

The Representative of Waterford IFA Pigs and Pigmeat Committee, Ian Tierney, has said that Pigs Committee representatives were seeking urgent meetings with the main feed compounder suppliers to the sector to get an immediate reduction in the price of feed.

Pig producers have been under severe economic pressure for almost 2 years now and production cost reductions promised by CAP Reform must be delivered and implemented immediately. Compared to a year ago feed raw material costs are down substantially. Soya Bean Meal is down over £40 per tonne, Maize is down £35 per tonne and

cereals are back £15 to £20 per tonne.

Mr. Tierney exhorted all pig farmers to tackle their feed suppliers for an immediate price reduction in order to ease the severe financial pressure on the sector.



# Liam O'Brien Wins His 50th Five Miler

The Nike/Ballycotton Summer Road Race Series reached a historic milestone in Churchtown South last Thursday evening when East Cork athletic, Liam O'Brien from Midleton won his 50th race from fifty-five starts, the first of which date back to 1979.

## REMARKABLE ATHLETE

Now nearing his fortieth birthday, Liam O'Brien is undoubtedly one of the top athletes ever to come on the Irish running scene. Only last Sunday week he won his eleventh National 3000 metre steeplechase title in facile fashion in Santry Stadium in Dublin. Over the years it is easier to count the races he hasn't won than those he has. He has been training competitively since 1967 and he is still capable of holding his own with the best, as the recent Cork City Sports showed when he broke fourteen minutes for 5000 metres. In 1984 he competed in the Los Angeles Olympic Games where he reached the semi-finals of the 3000 metres steeplechase.

## BALLYCOTTONS' BEST

The Midleton school teacher has proved to be Ballycottons' top performer over the years. In addition to the summer series, Liam O'Brien has won the major event there — the Ballycotton Ten four times. He won in 1980, '81, '88 and '90. He has never finished outside the top six since the beginning of the event and his fastest time for the ten miles distance is 47 mins. and 57 secs.

## NEVER TO BE BROKEN

The odds are very much against Liam O'Brien's fifty 5 mile wins being equalled let alone bettered. If this is to happen the earliest it can be achieved is the year 2007 and that means the same athlete must win every race between now and then.

The Nike/Ballycotton Summer Series consists of four races each year in the following venues: Ballyandreen (May), Shanagarry (June), Churchtown South

(June) and Ballycotton (July). There has been sixty-three races since 1979 and Liam has won fifty victories from fifty-five appearances. He has won Ballyandreen on all fourteen occasions that the race has been held, he won Shanagarry thirteen times, Churchtown South twelve times and Ballycotton eleven times.

His list of victories is as much a tribute to his loyalty to local running in East Cork as to his consistency and his unequalled ability. The likelihood is that he will increase his number of wins in the month (August) and years ahead.

## PROVEN TACTICIAN

There have been numerous races over the years that Liam O'Brien could have won by two hundred yards or more. However, relying on his finishing speed, he has done only what was required to win and perhaps this is the key reason why he is so good for so long. He also has early and middle race pace and so victories over the East Cork athlete are few and far between.

## DUNGARVAN 10K

Liam O'Brien has won the Dungarvan 10k three times, in 1978, 1988 and 1989. He holds the course record at 29 mins. 50 secs. from 1989 when he defeated Waterford's Gerry Deegan by four seconds. Everybody connected with athletics in the Dungarvan area congratulates him on his latest and brilliant achievement.

## O'BRIEN'S C.V.

Liam O'Brien has represented Ireland on track, road and cross country. He reached the semi-final of the 3000m steeplechase at the LA Olympics in 1984 and also took part in the same event at the World Championships in Rome three years later. He has won the National Steeplechase title eleven

times and is the holder of at least one national medal for each year since the formation of BLE in 1967.

He has won Cork County Championships at 400m., 800m., 1500m., 5000m., 400m. hurdles, 3000m. steeplechase, 10k road, novice and senior cross country. He was also a member of the Cork Orienteering Club that won the National Relay in 1989.

# Brilliant Waterford Defeat Fancied Tipp In Exciting Munster Semi-Final

**TIPPERARY 2-8**

This was the third and by far the most impressive victory by a Waterford team over rivals, Tipperary in the under-age grades of the Munster championships this year. More than 3,000 supporters came to Walsh Park expecting to see a very close game, that would likely see the favourites Tipperary survive to play Cork who were the fancied ones to beat Clare in the other semi-final at Limerick on the same evening.

Things did not turn out that way in either case as Waterford having opened in brilliant fashion against the breeze, took the game to the favourites and helped by two great goals by the dynamic Paul Flynn, led by that margin at halfway. A further eleven second half points as against 2-3 for the visitors, ensured our place in the provincial final against Clare who had shocked the hot favourites, Cork in the other one at Limerick.

Cork and Tipperary had each won the Munster Under 21 title on no fewer than 13 occasions and it had been generally expected that this would be the odd one out to break the duck and give one or other the tag of leadership in the grade. It's a season of big shocks and here at Walsh Park on a glorious evening, a delighted crowd of home supporters saw another surprise unfold as Waterford hitting top form from the start, never allowed Tipperary to settle. The game looked well decided at the three-quarter stage when we led by 2-10 to 0-7 and our halfback line were leaving nothing through. Tony Browne playing what must have been his best ever display and flanked by Tom Feeney and John J. Ronayne were a rock solid line and what was getting through found another bulwark on the other side where Ger Harris, Brian McCarthy and James O'Connor, Capt., were holding out very well against the much vaunted Brian O'Meara, David Burke and Kevin Tucker.

Paul Flynn stole the show in attack and was man of the match, in the judgment of most supporters. He received splendid assistance from Anthony Kirwan, Gary Gater, Brendan Ormond, who was sent off with the Tipperary fullback Mark Rabbite in the 45th minute, Paul Foley, Timmy Cronin and Eoin Crowley who came on as a substitute for Paul Foley. Fintan O'Shea and Tom Kiely more than held their own in the middle of the field and

Pat Haran in goal was brilliant and did his share to inspire confidence in the side.

## PLAY

Tipperary won the toss and played with the breeze, but Waterford were first to score when Fintan O'Shea pointed in the 1st minute. Paul Flynn made it two in the second minute before John Doughal had a point for the visitors in the 6th.

In the 9th minute a beautifully placed ball by Anthony Kirwan found Flynn who sent a rocket to the Tipperary net. At this point Tipperary made a substitution and brought on Thomas Keane for Aidrean Hogan. Paul Flynn and David Burke exchanged points as did Kevin Tucker and Paul Flynn some moments later. Tipperary were awarded a '65' which was hotly disputed, before being sent wide. In the 26th minute Paul Flynn showed his true class when scoring his second brilliant goal to leave us seven points clear. To end the first half scoring,

Doughal had 2 points and Flynn had one to leave the state of play at 2-5 to 0-5.

On the resumption, points by Fintan O'Shea (2) and Paul Flynn (2) left the score 2-9 to 0-5 before O'Meara had Tipperary's first score on this half in the 41st minute Flynn and O'Meara exchanged points in the 45th and 46th minutes before Robbie Tomlinson, who had been very well held by Tony Brown all through, broke through for Tipperary's first goal in the 47th minute. Strangely the score didn't have the strong motivating effect, as expected and Waterford were to register the next five scores. These came from Timmy Cronin, Tom Kiely, and Paul Flynn (3). In the 55th minute the score stood at 2-15 to 1-7 and it was beginning to drag a little until Tipperary's David Burke had their second goal in the 58th minute but this was a case of too little too late. Flynn had the final point

before the final whistle in the 61st minute.

It must not be forgotten that Tipperary's amazing inaccuracy was a factor in their defeat as over the hour they shot 17 wides (a couple unbelievable) to Waterford's total of six.

# Waterford Play In Their Third Munster Underage Final

## CLARE STRONGLY FANCIED TO REVERSE 1992 THURLES RESULT

Those of us who saw Clare minors hammer Waterford in the first round of the 1991 championships at Tipperary town on April 17 of that year are bound to feel at least a bit uncomfortable about our prospects of reversing the result three years later when many of the same players have graduated to under 21 and will be in opposition at Fermoy on to-night, Wednesday.

Neither side has been given much opportunity of celebrating their respective victories over Tipperary and Cork on last Wednesday evening and after a day or two of deserved rest, it was a case of back to the business of preparing for the game that will see the winners enthroned as the 31st holders of the title. There are sure to be some sore bones on both teams, but neither county have complained about injuries serious enough to force replacements on their respective teams. Waterford have announced an unchanged team, except that Brendan Ormond, who was sidelined in the match against Tipperary will be replaced by Eoin Crowley who came on as a sub for Paul Foley on Wednesday last.

Clare too, have announced full confidence in the team which defeated their hotly fancied opponents, Cork by 3-13 to 2-10 at Limerick, also on Wednesday last.

This win by the Banner county did something to relieve the anguish of the awful Munster final defeat by Limerick some weeks ago and likewise for us, our big beating by Cork in the minor final on the same day,

was forgotten in the euphoria that erupted at Walsh Park when we beat Tipperary last week.

But unlikely to be forgotten is the fact that Waterford shattered a Clare dream at Thurles two years ago when they came to the stadium as clear favourites and with what was regarded in their county as a star-studded team, only to lose by 0-17 to 1-12, they having shot some amazing wides. That was their sixth appearance in a Munster under 21 hurling final and their sixth defeat. In fact it was the third occasion on which they were beaten by just two points. It is also an interesting fact that on the two occasions on which Waterford won this title, Clare were the unfortunate runners-up in both.

At Limerick Gaelic Grounds last week, Cork had no answer to the sparkling hurling of this talented young Clare side who have been in training since November and have played several counties in challenge matches. These included a match with Waterford and a game in which they came off a poor second. Our selectors are being sensible in not reading a lot into that result as

invariably challenge matches prove worthless as a guide to the true merit of a team and apart from being useful as a workout and giving players experience, the final scores should never be taken seriously.

Their 3-13 to 2-10 win over the Rebels was achieved by superior skill, fitness and fierce determination. Playing with tremendous confidence they were able to overpower Cork in several sectors, and particularly at midfield where their duo Ronan O'Hara and Brian Madden were supreme over McCormack and Hosford. That Clare pair were members of their minor side which hammered us by 2-11 to 0-5, three years ago. Brendan McNamara their goalkeeper, too, was brilliant and his several top-class saves were a factor in the results.

Waterford, who have twice won this championship in Munster, will have an enormous following in Fermoy to-night in the hope of being third time lucky in our effort to win a provincial title this year. Our minor hurlers and under 21 footballers have already fallen at the finals and our followers would regard this as some measure of compensation, if we succeed.

We certainly do have a chance and another sparkling performance like the one against Tipperary, could help us to overcome

Clare whom we have defeated twice before in under 21 finals.

The team all played well against Tipperary, but the manner in which the players eased off towards the closing stages and allowed Tipperary back into the game, is something that must be looked at as must the fact that our inside forward line stayed too far out for a long period in the second half and allowed the Tipperary keeper all the latitude in the world to clear his line.

The players, who did a light training stint at Fraher Field on Monday, will have seen a video of the match and will have seen for themselves, what little mistakes were made. While having a healthy respect for our opponents, they must not line out without the kind of confidence that is needed to win matches at this level. I'm sure that players, selectors and all concerned will see this as a fine opportunity to salvage something out of a season of disappointment and that everyone will throw himself fully and wholeheartedly into the battle for our third title in this grade.

Clare will be reminded over and over again what happened when we met at Thurles in this final two years ago and they will seek full atonement for that result which really shattered them beyond description.

Waterford, again in the role of outsiders, can once again rise to the occasion and with thousands of loyal supporters there to shout encouragement, we must have a chance of this title.

# County Board Meeting

Although it was meant to be a very quiet affair with nothing more than the naming of new county selectors to be dealt with, it turned out to be quite argumentative with a number of issues relating to team preparation, being introduced. The appointment of a county coach to train all football teams was proposed by Níoclás Mac Craith before any appointments of selectors were made. It was seconded by Tommy Hennessey and a long discussion ensued. Points were made about lack of interest by players and problems about clubs not wishing to make players available for training sessions with the county teams, etc. When the Coisde na Peil submissions were read to the meeting, it pointed out that their nominees for the selection committee, would, if appointed, enlist the services of a coach from outside the county. The argument then followed that the appointment of a coach would be a matter for the County Board. It was finally agreed that coaches being appointed would have Board approval. The matter of the naming of a member of selection committees as 'manager' was also discussed and Phil Fanning made the point that the media will call him manager, whatever

the Board decides to call him. The junior football committee was not appointed. The Coisde Peil reported that they were waiting until Central Council decided if there is to be a junior football All-Ireland in this grade next year, before submitting nominations.

The football committee did not submit names of the minor football committee as their meeting to pick selectors was held only a couple of days after the minors had lost to Clare and they did not have an opportunity of speaking to the outgoing committee of selectors.

## EXPERIMENTATION

The much publicised experimental rules which are due to be tried out in the National Football League this year, may yet undergo another change if a notice of motion before Central Council on Saturday next is successful.

Down County Board are not satisfied with experimental rule number 1. This is 'that a player who takes a handpass from a team mate shall not be permitted to play the ball away with his hands.'

They also object to experimental rule number 3 which states that all kick-outs shall be taken from the 13 metre line.

They are seeking to have both these rescinded.

# Dungarvan Oyster Farm Attracts French Mayor

be the top oyster producing region in the world, said the fact that the Dungarvan company has found French markets for more than 80% of its export business is testimony to the absolute quality of its product.

Waterford County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly, spoke of the major contribution the oyster producing industry is now making in the Dungarvan-Ring area, and he pledged whatever possible support the County Council can give to it at all times.

Dungarvan U.D.C. chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, welcomed, in particular the jobs the industry has created in recent years and the spin-off benefits that have accrued to a number of business concerns in the area.

Cllr. Kyne also undertook that his Council will explore the possibility of twinning with Marennes.

The French delegation subsequently paid a courtesy call to the headquarters of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan where they were officially welcomed by the County Manager.

### A FRENCH CONNECTION

Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm was set up in 1984 and in the intervening decade has enjoyed remarkable success. Today the company is producing oysters in an area embracing fifty four hectares in Dungarvan harbour.

Its breakthrough into the lucrative French markets came about entirely by chance, but it has set the company up for an even more successful future.

French visitors to the Ardmore area in 1990 included a director with a major Banking institution and she acquainted herself with the oysters being produced by Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm. On her return to France she passed on the "news" to one of the country's largest distributors of oysters, Tafforet SA.

After assessing the Dungarvan company over a period of two years, Tafforet SA paid Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm the supreme tribute by offering

to make a financial investment in it.

The deal was successfully concluded and today Tafforet SA are the main source of supply and distribution of Dungarvan produced oysters in France.

According to Jim Harty, Dungarvan Bay is now producing oysters equal to the finest oysters being produced anywhere in Europe.

"Thirty growers are now involved in an oyster producing co-op in the area and in all there are more than 100 people employed locally in the industry", says Jim Harty. "In fact the Dungarvan-Ring area has now firmly established itself as the biggest oyster growing area in the country".

Jim Harty is insistent that much of the credit for the development and growth of the industry in the area is down to the practical and financial support that has been forthcoming from Board Iascaigh Mhara. "B.I.M. have been absolutely brilliant", he said.

He is also generous in his praise of Fas which, he acknowledges, has been of considerable benefit to his company.

When Dungarvan Shell Fish Oyster Farm was set up Jim Harty and Michael Queally found marketing an initial problem. They journeyed on a widescale around Europe in search of markets that weren't exactly easy to find by a fledging company.

Gradually, however, they began to come on stream, and following the successful business liaison with Tafforet SA many major markets were secured and quickly consolidated. This in turn has since created ready made European markets for the other growers operating out of Dungarvan and Ring.

"We don't see ourselves as being in a rivalry situation with the other growers", Jim Harty says. "We are all in oyster production together just like dairy farmers in milk production for the co-ops".

"The top quality oysters being produced in Dungarvan Bay guarantees that markets are available for every grower", he added.

More specifically, however, Jim Harty's company's links with France, and Tafforet SA in particular, guarantee major markets for Dungarvan-produced oysters for the foreseeable future

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
