# Official Opening Of Dungarvan Field And Complex

Saturday next, August 13 will see the realisation of a life-long dream for the Old Boro club when their spacious grounds and complex will be officially opened by Association President Jack Boothman.

The beautiful grounds at Clogherane on the edge of Western Bay comprises two full playing pitches and a juvenile playing area also. There is a very modern clubhouse with every imaginable facility for players and members and has the advantage of being situated within easy walking distance of the town.

The cost of the entire project, including purchase and development was approximately £310,000. This sum was raised by different club projects, mainly through their own co-op draw and the very hardworking people who laboured for years to achieve this, have every reason to feel proud of the developed grounds and complex. It is now the best laid out and equipped club

ground in the county and can compete with the best in the country.

I suppose it is only fitting that a club with such a proud and distinguished record of service and achievement should have such a 'home' for their players and members.

This progressive club's beginning dates back to the days before the G.A.A. was founded in Thurles on November 1, 1884 and many are the stories told about some of its legendary characters, about the days when the rival town teams, the Hopes and the Rovers competed for recognition as the leading lights in Gaelic sport in the locality and, of course, about their achievement in 1898 when the 'Hopes' represented the

county in our one and only football final.

Their proud record of achievement includes the 23 football titles won at senior level as well as championships won at all levels

Yes, it certainly improves job prospects, after that it's up to the individual — competition for jobs is fierce, you have to be flexible, be prepared to travel to get work — for me that's not a problem.



# Waterford Craftmakers Launch Innovative Guide

Currently on exhibition at the First national Building Society, Grattan Square, Dungarvan, is a newly published guide to several of the county's more renowned quality studio workshops, which boast of some of the most talented hands in Ireland.

Organised by a group of eight West Waterford craft businesses, the comprehensive guide includes a well detailed map of a scenic trail which takes the visitor along rugged coasts by great rivers and through ancient woodland, to experience, at first hand, the rich history of the Deise.

Clearly marked along the route are the eight various craft businesses which officially form the Waterford Studio Workshops. Visitors along the trail are invited to drop in and watch the craft-makers at their intriguing work, producing the many fine crafts and ware on offer at quite reasonable prices.

**MEET THE INNOVATIVE IDEA**  
The innovative idea of

launching a guide to Waterford Studio Workshops first emerged last March and all the intervening hard work and diligent organisation has now finally culminated in the successful two-week exhibition at the First National which will certainly receive a positive and welcome response from interested craft buyers and tourists alike.

The eight astute craftmakers forming the Waterford Studio Workshops are all members of the Craft Council of Ireland and are full-time professionals, which is clearly evident in their unique handmade products.

**MEET THE CRAFTMAKERS**  
Located in a converted

fisherman's cottage in the historic seaside village of Ardmore is Mary Lincoln's Ardmore Pottery. Here, the famous craftmaker produces her large range of pottery and the cottage is also home to her personally selected display of craft-work of the highest quality from over 60 Irish based craftmakers.

In Youghal Anne O'Leary, a resident of West Waterford, has a shop in the Main Street where her complete range of hand-painted silk products are available. Anne has also assembled a beautiful collection of distinctive Irish crafts in the "Silk Purse" Shop.

In the Lismore area are located three of the studio workshops. Alison Trigg creates her unique hand-painted plasterwork in the beautiful surroundings of her restored 18th century house.

The Glencairn Pottery School between Tallow and Lismore is a wonderfully restored farmhouse and garden, where Marcus O'Mahoney, an experienced teacher, offers residential and non-residential courses in all pottery techniques.

In Main Street, Lismore is where Eleanor Howard produces her wide range of decorative earthenware pottery for table use.

Perched on a cliff overlooking the Blackwater is the historic Dromana House where resides puppet and marionette maker, Corina

Duyn.

In the Gaeltacht area of An Rinn is situated the seventh member of Waterford Studio Workshops, Eamon Terry. Eamon individually designs and hand-cuts crystal giftware in the traditional way in his workshop of Criostal Na Rinne.

Secretary of the recently formed craft industry group is Ben Brittain of An Sean Phobal. Ben and Bridie Brittain's Irish Wildlife Mobiles is located at a restored farmhouse and country garden. The surrounding unspoilt rural landscape has inspired their attractive wildlife and farm animal mobiles. They also make a range of Nursery Rhyme Mobiles.

**"NEAT TOUR"**  
Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader," Mr. Brittain said the recently launched map entailed a "neat" tour around West Waterford and invited all members of the public to come to the various work shops to see the crafts being made at first hand. The opening hours of each craft centre is also shown on the map, together with each telephone number and address.

Overall, the guide and map is an excellent result of co-operative action and good marketing strategy. The brochures will now be distributed to hotels, guest houses and tourist offices in the area as well as the National Craft Council and Waterford Regional Airport.

Mrs. Galloway, now living in Annewstown, is the last living relative of Rev. Alcock and will be an honoured guest at the commemoration where prayers will be said by Church of Ireland and Catholic clergy.

A lecture on James Alcock will be delivered by Séamus Ó Cuillín, An Rinn, in the Colaíste, 2 p.m. on the same day, August 21.

## Neighbours Opt For Trial By Jury

Two next door neighbours both opted for trial by judge and jury when they appeared before Judge Michael Pattwell at a recent sitting of Dungarvan District Court.

Nicholas O'Riordan of 19, Childers Estate, Dungarvan and Keith Hoggerth, 20, Childers Estate are charged with assault on March 18th last at Childers Estate, thereby occasioning each other actual bodily harm.

Both O'Riordan and Hoggerth were remanded on continuing bail to a sitting of Dungarvan Court on September 28th.

It was stated that the parties involved pleaded guilty to charges of assault, when in fact they were charged with assault and opted for trial by jury. We regret this unintentional error and wish to apologise to Mr. O'Riordan and Mr. Hoggerth for it.

# Do's and don'ts with water

WE used to take it for granted that we could give the garden a thorough soaking with a hosepipe during a hot summer spell.

But hosepipe bans, water metering and a 'green' conscience now make us think twice about pulling out the reel and turning a tap.



Yet we need to water more than ever at this time: our Augusts have been particularly dry lately and downpours quickly run off parched ground, concrete and rooftops and into the drains before doing much good.

The answer is a water butt — sturdy plastic ones are available from DIY centres or by mail order.

Most have been used to import fruit juices or other bulk products and may seem expensive at around £30, but it is a sensible recycling of containers which would be difficult to dump or burn without causing environmental problems.

Try to buy one with a cover or be ready to make a top from wooden slats, for children's safety and to keep water clean and free from algae and leaves.

Then find a gutter or downpipe to tap into — even a garage or shed can collect enough during a downpour to keep an average garden well-watered.

Once the site is chosen, fit a tap on the butt if it does not have one already — it will make life a lot easier. Then check that you can get a bucket or watering can under the tap.

If not, build a plinth able to bear the weight of the many gallons of water. A wooden one is easier but needs a frame of two-inch square timber with tough slatting to match.

Better to make it of bricks on hard core and filled with solid garden debris — pebbles, broken concrete and so on — topped by an old paving slab.

If the butt does not have an overflow you need to cut a hole near the top and fit an exit pipe.

Run this into a nearby drain, downpipe or a garden soakaway — a pit filled with gravel or pebbles. At a pinch you can also disperse it onto a well-drained lawn.

Once the butt is in place you will find that the watering can is really hard work unless you make the most of the water you carry:

**DON'T** water in the heat of day — it quickly evaporates and may also shock the plants.

**DO** water at end of the day when it is cooler and water has all night to reach the roots.

**DO** use a watering can with a rose to imitate the effect of rainfall.

**DON'T** use tap water if water in the butt gets low — household waste water can be used before you have to use fresh tap water. It needs to be reasonably free from muck and detergents. If in doubt, let it stand for a while and draw clearer water from the top before pouring the rest down the drain.

"We love the friendly people of Dungarvan and Abbeyside — they make us feel so welcome." This was the general reaction of the sixty Spaniards who spent four weeks in our midst. Living with local families, whom they fondly describe as "my Irish parents, brothers and sisters", the students, aged from twelve upwards, attend formal English classes at Abbeyside National School. Grouped according to previous attainment at Academies of English in Valencia, they are taught by local teachers for four hours each morning.

The afternoons are variously spent, at the Dungarvan Sports Centre, Clonea Strand Hotel Leisure Complex, or on short trips to Ardmore, Clonmel, Toura-

neena Heritage Centre, etc.; and in the evenings the students often organise their own activities, including walks, football matches with locals, and attendance at sporting events and discos, and there's even an occasional romantic encounter! On Fridays the group goes on longer trips, this year visiting Fota/Cobh, Kilkenny, Wexford and Cork.

During the month the students fully enjoy Irish hospitality, they feel "at home" with their Irish families and they swap ideas on cooking, music and life in general. No effort is spared to cater for the students' needs and the 'proof of the pudding' is that home-sickness never arises.

Local shops, factories, churches and places of in-

terest are visited and discussed in an effort to expand the students' use of English through experience. And there's homework! While the month is during school holiday time, the students must take an exam and complete a project on some facet of Dungarvan life. Successful students take home a highly prized certificate and reach a further milestone on their journey towards proficiency in English.

The Spanish evening is one of the annual highlights, and this year the many visitors tasted typical Spanish food and Sangria while enjoying a selection of music, songs and dances from the students' native sod. The evening was rounded off with set dances of the natives!

Patricia Geoghegan, a Dubliner, who lives and teaches in Valencia, welcomed the many visitors and thanked them for attending the Spanish Evening, the proceeds of which was later presented to Sesame Pre-School and St. John's Special School.

The final party on Saturday, July 30 was attended by the students, their Irish families and friends, and it was a happy occasion when addresses were swapped and promises of 'forever yours' were exchanged. On Sunday, July 31 'everybody' turned up to say goodbye. Amid tears, handshakes and wishes of good luck and 'bon voyage' there was only one criticism — the weather! With one voice we said "rain, rain, go to Spain!"

## Well Bread Tarts



We've used crisply baked bread cases in place of the usual pastry, for these tasty egg tartlets.

**Ingredients**  
6 large slices whole wheat bread  
4 oz (100g) butter  
3 eggs, beaten  
2 fl. oz (50ml) single cream  
2 oz (50g) sweetcorn  
1 tsp (1x5ml spoon) parsley chopped  
Salt and pepper

**Method**  
Cut the bread into 12x6.5cm (2 1/2in) circles. Melt 3oz (75g) of butter and dip bread circles into it. Use to line greased patty tins, pressing circles



well in. Bake at 350°F, 180°C, gas mark 4, for 15-20 minutes until the bread has formed crisp golden cases. Meanwhile, melt remain-

ing butter in a saucepan, add cream and beaten eggs, and stir gently until scrambled. Add the sweetcorn and season just before

the egg mixture is cooked. Pile mixture into bread cases and serve hot. Or, allow egg mixture to cool before filling the cases and serve cold.



Since then successive popes have approved and themselves made the pilgrimage to Meryem Ana.

Crotty's Lake is now more accessible to the public as a result of a roadway which winds its way up to within a half hour's walk of the lake.

It has been suggested that all those interested in visiting the lake to assemble at Cullinane's farm in Ross at 2 p.m. on Sunday, August 14. Signposts will be visible on the Dungarvan Road. Come prepared with sturdy walking boots, the final part of this walk is rather steep and therefore may not be suitable for young children.

All the information about the lake and the history of William Crotty the Robber will be available on the day and guest speaker on the mountain will be historian Sheila Murphy, Mahon Bridge.

The committee would encourage as many people as possible to come along and

enjoy this day out on the mountain and discover (or indeed rediscover) the breathtaking beauty and colourful history of Crotty's Lake and the Comeragh Mountains.

### HERITAGE MAP

The Nire Valley is a paradise for the discerning tourist. Set in the Comeragh Mountains, it offers a range of activities — hill walking, horse riding and angling. Its mountain valley location gives it a remoteness which offers peace and solitude to the traveller in an old world atmosphere. This old-world feeling can be attributed not least to the preservation of the old skills and customs of its people.

This modern age has begun to cherish its heritage and regret what has been lost. The Nire Valley is fortunate in that it moved slowly into modern times and still has a wealth of landmarks, stories and songs that can be conserved.

This map is the first step in an attempt to identify and locate important sites — historic and social — from our past, and to explain from whence the present Nire Valley and its people evolved.

Some of the sites listed have been adapted for modern usage. Some are intact but in need of restoration. Others are attractive ruins and others still have only their site remaining. Every effort has been made to be as accurate as possible. However, many sources of knowledge remain untapped and they would welcome further contributions. This map should be used in conjunction with the Nire Valley Heritage Guide.



# Record Entry To Tidy Towns

A record 672 entries have been received for the 1994 Tidy Towns competition, which is run by Board Failte in association with Super Valu Supermarkets. This represents an increase of 22 over last year's entry of 650 towns and villages.

The largest concentration of entries to the competition, which has become part of our cultural and environmental heritage, are from the West of the country and the Midlands. Entries from County Cork total 71, with 10 new participants since 1993, making this the largest single County entry. Next in line is County Tipperary, with 62 participating towns and villages. Galway, Limerick and Clare have the next highest number of entries.

The number of participants in the Tidy Towns competition, which has run since 1958, varies from year to year but has increased substantially in recent times. Growing interest in Tidy Towns and the unprecedented number of entries to the competition in recent years has been attributed to the key economic role that tourism now plays in Ireland.

"The concept of Tidy Towns and the voluntary community effort that goes in to improving our environment has, no doubt, had a major impact on Irish tourism" Seamus Scally, Super Valu's Chairman says. "This kind of commitment brings its own rewards within communities, and is certainly something we enthusiastically support".

There has been increased local promotion of the Tidy Towns competition since Bord Failte organised national sponsorship of the scheme with Super Valu, the independent supermarket group in 1992.

The screening of an R.T.E. TV programme on Tidy Towns in 1992 and 1993, following September's results announcement, has focused attention on matters of concern involving the en-

vironment and also the enormous contribution and commitment of local communities participating in Tidy Towns. "The hour-long documentary on Tidy Towns figured high in the TV ratings at the time and obviously made a good impression on a lot of people", according to Brenda King, Bord Failte's Community Projects Officer.

Adjudication is currently under way in the 1994 competition with top scoring entrants scheduled for a further inspection during August. Along with the title of Ireland's Tidiest Town, the overall national winner receives £5,000, the perpetual trophy and grant-aid of a further £5,000 for an approved environmental project. Awards for Ireland's tidiest village, tidiest small town and large town are also made, along with county titles and population category prizes.

The current holder of the Tidy Towns national title is the village of Keadeu in County Roscommon and the 1994 tidy Towns results announcement will be made at a reception in The Royal Hospital, Kilmainham, Dublin on Monday 19th September next.



## IFA Grain Chairman Welcomes Minister's Clarification On Intervention Release

The IFA National Grain Committee Chairman, John O'Mahony, Tallow, has welcomed the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh's statement clarifying the condition under which intervention grain can be released on to the market. He pointed out that Minister Walsh had acknowledged intervention would be used only to offset a shortfall of supplies in the market and then only be released at intervention or market price, whichever is the highest. This, he said, confirmed the information issued by the IFA Grain Committee in its statement last week.

Mr O'Mahony continued:

"Nevertheless, it must be pointed out that a serious error was made by the Minister in threatening to release intervention grain in September next in an effort to cap cereal prices. A lot of harm has been done with the whole grain trade thrown into confusion. Growers were shocked while merchants, who had been making encouraging sounds regarding 1994 prices, scurried for cover and knocked £10 per tonne off grain prices. This should never have happened. It is unthinkable that growers' incomes should be threatened at this time of year when most growers have only one

chance to sell grain which will determine their entire income for the year.

"Merchants, however, have started to recover and are beginning to realise that grain supplies will in fact be tight, with some offers of £85/tonne minimum now being freely available. The situation in the UK and the European mainland is that grain prices have moved up £2/3 per tonne in the last week. This should ensure that market prices into Irish ports are in the region of £115 to £118 for September

delivery of wheat and barley. Growers should bear this in mind when dealing with grain buyers. Some merchants would claim they need £20 per tonne to dry and handle grain, while others claim they can do it for much less. After doing a bit of simple arithmetic, growers should expect to receive £90-£95/tonne for green barley at 20% moisture this harvest with wheat based on its feed value being worth in the region of £10/tonne extra."

Mr. O'Mahony concluded by advising growers to hold grain off the market where possible and if selling green grain, to take an on-account price until prices return to realistic levels.

## Vets Must Not Be Allowed Sabotage EU Funding For TB Scheme

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy has said that farmers will no longer tolerate any further irresponsible actions by the Irish Veterinary Union that would put the promised annual £10 million EU funding for TB Eradication in Ireland in jeopardy. He called on the Minister for Agriculture to ensure that Ireland's application for the funding is sent to Brussels by the 1st August deadline.

Mr. Murphy said: "This is the second time this year that members of the IVU have threatened strike action in their selfish demand for exorbitant increases in

their testing fees, above the PCW agreement."

Mr. Murphy pointed out that farmer levies account for three quarters of the animal operating costs of their TB and Brucellosis Schemes.

"Farmers will not stand paying excessive disease levies of over £28 million per annum, while farmers affected by disease breakdown are getting back less than £18 million in reactor compensation.

Meanwhile, the vets are already well paid in receiving over £20 million per annum in testing fees. They are currently being paid average fees of £2.60/animal for TB testing and £3.20/animal for TB and Brucellosis testing.

## County Waterford ICMSA News

"The likely outcome of the deliberations of the Appeals Panel on the Disadvantaged Areas is that thousands of farmers whose land quality and income more than meet the criteria, will be excluded from the Severely Disadvantaged category because their farms do not join existing Severely Handicapped areas, or because they are scattered and do not form a 37,500 acre block of land. This is absolutely unacceptable to ICMSA said Mr. John Cusack, County Chairman.

While ICMSA welcomed the news that re-classification of some farms from disadvantaged to severely handicapped status is finally underway (now that the Submission from the Appeals Panel has gone to the Minister), the Chairman said that unfortunately ICMSA's worst fears have been realised in that the criteria for re-classification still includes the 37,500 acre mass requirement. He said that as a result of this requirement, thousands of deserving farmers will not be re-classified.

ICMSA campaigned strenuously and consistently to have every deserving farm which met the criteria included in the Severely Handicapped category so that they can have their rightful increased income through headage payments. Regrettably, ICMSA has not been supported in its efforts.

"It was a mistake for any farmer representative on the Appeals Panel to accept the 37,500 acre mass of land requirement. No EC Regulation governing the Disadvantaged Areas

Scheme contains such a figure. Therefore, a combined effort by the farmer representatives on the Panel could have removed that requirement put in by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry. In that way all deserving farms would have been included," concluded the County Chairman.

## Warning Not To Use Tribunal Report As A Political Football

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan, said the Report of the Beef Tribunal confirms the basic soundness of our beef industry.

Mr. Ryan said that the Government assurances to accept the findings of the Report and to implement its recommendations, are positive and helpful.

"It would be an injustice to the beef industry and to all those engaged in it if the Report was used as a political football. It behoves all those people who feel they are obliged to comment, to do so on the basis of the facts contained in the Report, and in a manner which will not damage the good international reputation of our beef and cattle," said Mr. Ryan.

## ICMSA Agrees Rest Period For Imported Animals

The recent meeting of the ICMSA National Council unanimously agreed the need for more stringent controls on the importation of livestock into this country. In particular the Council agreed that there is a need for a rest period during which extensive tests should be carried out on the animals for veterinary purposes.

The ICMSA also recently met the Irish Veterinary Union and the Irish Veterinary Association for discussions on the importation of animals and on improving the health status of the Irish livestock sector.

At the meeting ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer expressed his concern at the dangers to our animal health status arising from the harmonisation of EU rules on animal movement between Member States.


Mr. O'Dwyer, said that there was unanimity between the Veterinary Associations and the ICMSA on the dangers associated with the importance of animals into Ireland.





## EUROPEAN ATHLETIC CHAMPIONSHIPS

# Sonia Bids For Gold



Cobh athlete Sonia O'Sullivan enters today's (Wednesday) European 3000 metres final in Helsinki as clear favourite following her impressive display in Sunday evening's semi-final when she looked a class apart.

Sonia answered many questions about her current well being following defeats in the Goodwill Games and in Monte Carlo in the lead up to these championships. On Sunday last the London based Cork girl was fastest qualifier in a time of 8 mins. 51.31 secs. Sporting a new hair style she ran the last lap in 62 secs and her speed over the last two hundred metres showed that she is full of running at the moment and back to something like her best form.

Some weeks back Sonia set a new European record of 8 mins 21.65 secs. for the

3000 metres distance. She has run nineteen seconds faster than any other athlete in Wednesday's final and her greatest challenge looks as if it will come from Great Britain runner Yvonne Murray who Sonia has beaten regularly in recent time.

All indications point to a first ever Irish victory at this level if the Irish girl can produce her top form and if she runs a tactically sound race. The race is timed for 6.35 p.m. Irish time.

## THE IRISH SQUAD

Ireland has its largest representation ever at a major championship with twenty five athletes competing in Helsinki. Terry McHugh has qualified for the javelin final on Tuesday as the fifth best thrower, getting an Irish record of 82.14 metres in the process. Anita Philpott qualified for the 3000 metres out of the same heat as Sonia O'Sullivan.

Niall Bruton looked very impressive when qualifying for Tuesday's 1500 metres final and he could prove a dark horse for a medal. Marcus O'Sullivan's performance was a big disappointment in his 1500 metres heat and he will be less than happy following his 3 mins. 35 secs. run in Monte Carlo recently.

# Waterford Shine In Brilliant Second Half

Waterford 1-12, Clare 0-12

It was great to be in Fermoy on Wednesday evening and see the ecstatic scenes of jubilation as thousands of excited and elated Waterford supporters rushed onto the pitch to cheer the heroes who had brought us our third Munster Under-21 hurling title after a splendid, if hectic second half performance that was reminiscent of what was achieved in Semple Stadium against the same luckless opponents Clare in 1992.

It was Waterford's third appearance in a provincial under-21 hurling final and it was our third victory. The game marked Clare's seventh appearance in a final of the same championship and their seventh defeat. Shattered and dejected, their players and supporters waited around for the presentation of the cup. It must surely have been agonising for them to be in the middle of all the roaring, cheering and the wild celebrating of the huge Waterford crowd who made no secret of their joy and delight at this rather unexpected victory.

Our win will do a lot to lift the spirit of the county and it will help to renew our hopes for the future of hurling in the years to come. After a brief rest, the selectors propose to resume training for the All-Ireland semi-final against Kilkenny in Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday, August 21.

As the last sounds of our celebrating fade away and after those concerned have studied a video of the final, it will undoubtedly be conceded that in the overall, lady luck did shine on us and that without her help, we might not be champions today. Good fortune was with us through most of the first half when our forwards were making practically no impression on the Clare defence and our rearguard was under constant pressure with Clare getting the better of the exchanges in the middle of the field. Having said all that, I must now emphasise that because of the manner in which the team set about their task in the second half, we fully deserved to win. The second half display saw the team give an overpowering performance and adding a further 1-8 to our half time score of just four points, while Clare added on only three points between the 46th and 52nd minutes. Clare were obviously shocked at the manner in which Waterford began taking the game to them from the throw-in in the second half and were finding it difficult to withstand the degree of pressure which was maintained against them as

our side became fully operational, with every man finding his true form.

How Clare must have be-moaned their first half failure to take their chances as Waterford began to whittle away their lead with well taken points and Paul Flynn's brilliant goal which brought us to the front before Clare had their first score of the second half, entering the final quarter.

Waterford showed their real character in the nerve-racking final six minutes as Clare drew level and went in front before Anthony Kirwan's brace of points brought us back into the lead with time ticking away.

The eruption which took place at the sound of the final whistle was something that will be remembered for a long time to come.

PLAY

Both sides showed a change from the published teams. Timmy Cronin (Roanmore) cried off the Waterford team because of illness and was replaced by Conor Walsh of the same club at centre forward. Clare had left a vacancy on their team and filled it with Damien McGrath. They made one positional change before the start. They won the toss and played with the fairish breeze into the town goal. Within two minutes Paul Foley had the ball in the Clare net, but the score was disallowed for some unknown reason.

From the puck-out Clare attacked and Pat Harnan brought off a wonder save from a rocket-like shot by Ronan O'Mara. The ball went wide and from the resultant '65' Sean McMahon pointed. A free to Waterford in the 7th minute saw Paul Flynn bring the teams level. At this point Clare began to assert their authority on the game and tacked on points by Stephen McNamara, Eamon Taffe and McNamara again, to leave the score at 0-4 to 0-1 by the 15th minute, and Clare, having missed another great chance of a goal.

Paul Flynn pointed our second score from a free before McNamara and Taffe stretched their lead to four

points in the 19th minute. Flynn pointed another free and Waterford were twice rescued by the splendid hurling of Tom Feeney and Ger Harris. Madden had another Clare point before Waterford were awarded a semi-penalty which Paul Flynn hit just over the cross-bar for our fourth and final score of this half.

In the 28th minute Brian McCarthy, doing trojan work with our other defenders in trying to keep the Clare attack at bay, was struck accidentally and was forced to retire with a nasty facial injury. He was replaced by James O'Connor (Passage). We then had two players with the same name on the team. Madden and McNamara added points for Clare before the break to leave the score 0-9 to 0-4 in their favour. They had six first half wides and we had two.

SECOND HALF

There were expectations of changes on the Waterford side for the second half, but none materialised. Waterford immediately went into attack and in the 31st minute we won a '65' from which Tony Brown began his masterful second half performance by scoring a point and Paul Flynn, receiving from Tony Browne, pointed to narrow the gap to just 3 points.

Then followed a period when both sides threw everything they knew into the game and some splendid hurling was seen for a 15 minute period while the battle for scores remained fruitless for 11 minutes until Paul Flynn's point from a free in the 44th minute. A minute later a Tony Browne delivery was crossed to Flynn by Conor Walsh and the dynamic Ballygunnerman rounded his man and shot to the Clare net for the only goal of the game and the lead for Waterford. O'Mara and Madden were beginning to lose their grip in the middle of the field and our forwards were getting a better supply of the ball, but we were not making full use of our chances.

Tony Browne was twice wide with frees and then Clare hit back for two points by Fergal Hegarty to put

them back in the drivers seat with a point lead. Paul Flynn had one awful wide with a shot, but Clare were equally as unlucky within a minute when Taffe sent wide.

In the 52nd minute Stephen McNamara put Clare two points in front, but two minutes later Owen Crowley had a great point and another by Tony Browne from a free a minute later brought us level in the 55th. Kirwan's two and Tony Browne's pointed free in the last minute of normal time gave us a three points cushion before the whistle blew in the 62nd minute.

Several of our players could have been in line for the man-of-the-match tag, and in the immediate aftermath of the game, everyone seemed to have his or her choice.

Pat Harnan would be very high up on the short list as of course was the top scorer, Paul Flynn, Tony Browne, Tom Feeney and Ger Harris who was flanked by a James O'Connor on each side after Brian McCarthy went off injured. John Joe Ronayne, Tony Browne and Tom Feeney — our half back line — all played magnificently. Fintan O'Shea and Tom Kiely had the Clare pair, Ronan O'Mara and Brian Madden to contend with and the fact that both came very well into the game in the second half was a factor in turning the game in our favour.

Up front and after a quiet first half which saw them constantly being overpowered by the Clare defence, our six came well into the game and combined well in fighting for the scores that brought us the victory. Paul Flynn with his personal total of 1-6, added to his 2-11 in the Tipperary game, makes him the runner-up to the provincial top scorer, Gary Kirby who has 2-21 to date, was once again our outstanding player up front, getting great assistance from Anthony Kirwan, Conor Walsh, Gary Gater, Eoin Crowley and Paul Foley.

# APPEAL UPHHELD

Jimmy O'Gorman, Waterford's representative on the Provincial Council, and who was recently suspended for two months under rule 140, had his appeal upheld and his suspension lifted when his appeal was heard by the Munster Council at their meeting in Limerick on Tuesday of last week.

There were seven points in the appeal and for the

most part they alleged that improper procedures were followed all along the line by the County Board Chairman. The important point in the list was the allegation that the Chairman was in breach of rule 140 by refusing to accept a counter proposition and to put the suspension motion to a vote, as required by rule. Jimmy O'Gorman further

alleged that the notice sent to him by the County Secretary, did not comply with proper procedures. In the final point of his appeal, he stated that he was denied natural justice by the Chairman's insistence to act as judge and jury in the case.

He was accompanied to the appeals meeting by his club secretary Christy O'Brien and the Chairman

of the Board was accompanied by the Chairman of the Western Board, P.S. O Riain.

Jimmy O'Gorman, a former Chairman of the Western Board, was chairman of the outgoing senior hurling selection committee and is vice-chairman of the Lisimore club, was automatically reinstated following the announcement of the result.
