## Local Oyster Industry Has £6.5m Potential

Meitheal Trá na Rinne, the company which markets the produce of over half the oyster growers in the Ring/Dungarvan area, estimates that the industry has the potential to turn over £6.5 million annually when its full potential has been realised.

Meitheal Trá sells oysters and provides facilities for over half the licence holders operating in the Dungarvan Harbour area. This joint marketing strategy has already reaped dividends in terms of shipping the oysters, providing facilities and guaranteeing maximum profit to the growers it represents.

These growers collectively employ up to 120 full-time workers and the 80 or so part-timers involved can also look forward to permanent employment as the jobs total is expected to top the 200 mark before too long.

It is expected that oyster sales this year will exceed 500 tonnes but this is, however, still only the tip of the iceberg.

Meitheal Trá expects production to reach a staggering 6,500 tonnes when the oyster growers reach their full capacity.

The growth of the oyster industry in the area has

been one of the major success stories of recent times, beginning as an Údarás na Gaeltachta supported feasibility study in 1985 to a now estimated forty million oysters being cultivated in

the area.

In the current season Meitheal Trá members produced at least 80% of the oysters grown in the Dungarvan Harbour area, and source their seed from well established nurseries in the U.K. which in their view is the only way to harvest a top quality product.

## Brave Rescue By Clonea Lifeguards

On Monday week last, 8th August lifeguards Fergal Concannon and Helen Creagh were on duty at Clonea Beach. Despite the red warning flags flying, many swimmers were in the water, so Fergal patrolled on a surf-ski outside the line of swimmers and Helen observed the beach through binoculars from the beachguards' caravan.

At approximately 3.30 p.m. a strong undertow began to carry out some swimmers. Fergal had helped an adult and two children into shallow water when he noticed a man and his daughter, holding onto a small body board, being dragged at speed out to sea. He rowed out on the surf-ski and managed to reach the pair, John and Gina Coleman. At this stage, Helen was swimming out to help, and made contact with Gina approximately 550 yards from the shore and brought her ashore. Fergal and John drifted further out, to approximately 700 yards from shore until he managed to fight the undertow and work his way to the beach.

In all, the rescue operation took about 45 minutes and the Gardai were also notified. The matter was complicated by a report by an onlooker that a further person had been swept out to sea. This was adamantly denied by both lifeguards, but as a precaution Bonmahon Inshore Lifeboat and Waterford Harbour Sub-Aqua Club, whose boat was in

### ACCOUNTING TECHNICIAN



Name: Dermot Drohan.

Address: Knockenpower, Ring, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

Where are you working presently? I'm working in Dungarvan with Shanley Electrical Contractors Ltd.

Could you describe your job briefly? My work consists of preparing computerised accounts, spreadsheets, using databases (computerised files/stores of information). I also prepare job costings and analysis and payroll. Sounds like

double dutch unless you have a knowledge of computers, I know. Highlights the importance of computer literacy to anyone considering accounting-type work nowadays.

**What's your opinion of the course?** It's a very good course — I got this job on the basis of the skills learned in those two years! Apart from being employment oriented itself, the course is also an excellent foundation for anyone intending to progress further in accountancy, taxation, law or computers. You can qualify for a number of exemptions from further study courses.

**How could it be improved?** If the Friday work experience could be screened, so that greater emphasis be put on relevant work practice while doing the course, that would be great!

**Would you recommend the course?** Yes — particularly because DTC gave us the extra subjects — typing and a foreign language. Without typing, I'd be lost — keyboard skills are essential for all accountants from the financial controller down.

**To whom, specifically, would you recommend the course?** School leavers with an inclination towards the accountancy field, who don't want to jump into the deep end of R.T.C. or University. The IATI course is a useful stepping stone. For people like myself, it can be an end in itself — as I've said, I got my job largely on the strength of it.

**What are your future career plans?** To make a million before I'm forty . . . at least! Realistically, I hope to further my career in whatever aspects possible, whether that be extra courses, study — time will tell.

**Do you know how your former classmates fared?** The three that I know of are working in jobs related to the course work.

## Over £100 Million Announced For Urban Sub-Programme

Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., Minister for the Environment and Mr. Emmet Stagg, T.D., Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal, recently announced that they would shortly unveil details of a new programme aimed specifically at improving the environmental conditions of towns and cities, the length and breadth of the country.

Praising local authorities throughout the country for the high standard of environmental improvement works they have carried out to date in towns and cities, Minister Smith said that "more than £100 million is being provided over the next six years under the National Development Plan for an urban renewal sub-programme. This sub-programme will include environmental enhancement projects as well as projects to conserve our urban heritage. I have already invited local authorities to submit suitable proposals to me. I am examining these at present and I hope to announce details of the 1994 allocation of grants shortly."

It is believed, however, that priority will be given to local authorities in those towns and cities not already designated under the 1994 Urban Renewal Scheme.

Therefore, the chances of Dungarvan receiving a 'slice of the cake' under this new sub-programme, would indeed be slim, but the final Ministerial decision has yet to be made.

Minister Smith spoke of the importance of not underestimating the value of works designed to improve the environment of our urban areas. "Such works can dramatically enhance the development potential of towns and cities, and are often instrumental in attracting private sector in-

vestment to areas which might otherwise be overlooked. Environment enhancement schemes are therefore central to creating the right conditions for developments which will give rise to job opportunities," he said.

Referring to the new urban renewal scheme, which came into operation on August 1, this year, Minister Stagg said he would be asking local authorities in the areas recently designated for urban renewal to give priority to environmental upgrading so as to maximise the possibilities for development, investment and job creation in these areas.

"Besides improving the potential for development, these works enhance tourism potential and also improve the quality of life for all citizens. Minister Stagg went on, "local authorities should consider carrying out works such as urban landscaping, development or riverside potential of towns, pedestrianisation, decorative lighting and paving works and the provision of street furniture. Such works are necessary to ensure that urban renewal of a sustainable nature is generated."

**PUBLIC MEETING**  
Back to the local scene, just a reminder to all interested parties of a public information meeting to be held at the Park Hotel on August 29 next. Organised by Dungarvan U.D.C., the meeting will deal with all aspects and queries relating to the new Urban Renewal Scheme in Dungarvan. More information on the meeting will be released shortly.

# TRY VEAL PICCATA



## VEAL PICCATA

### Ingredients

- 1 lb (450g) veal, thinly sliced and pounded flat
- 1/3 cup flour
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 2 tbsp white wine
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 tbsp parsley, finely chopped
- 1/2 lemon, sliced

### Method

Coat the veal with flour, and shake off excess. Heat the olive oil in a frying pan until very hot. Quickly cook veal until lightly browned on both sides and all oil is absorbed, about 2 minutes. Remove veal and season



with salt and pepper. Add lemon juice and wine to the hot pan, scraping to blend browned residue. Add butter and parsley and heat until the butter melts. Return veal to pan

until heated through. Serve garnished with lemon slices. If you wish, you can use thin turkey or pork or chicken slices. **Serves 4.**

mana on tin whistle. They are pupils of the Bobby Gardiner and Mattie Fahey Schools of Music.




# Does the wind cause problems

LIVING by the coast is a double-edged sword for gardeners.

The sea moderates winter temperatures and, allied with the Gulf Stream, can create balmy microclimates, as found in the West Country.

Your garden may also have a sea view to add to the summer colours.

The down side can be penetrating salt-laden winds which are hard on plants all year round, while soils can be sandy, chalky or generally thin, supplying little nourishment to help plants survive the elements.

Even if you add nutrients, your efforts may well be washed through the soil and lost with the next down-pour. The answer is to improve the garden site and plant sensibly.

First of all, shelter plant beds by using available walls, fencing and outbuildings.

Where prevailing winds are particularly damaging, invest in stout fencing, though even a trellis and a tough climbing shrub will be an efficient wind break.

If soil is thin, condition it to hold more moisture and goodness by working in fibrous material such as farm manure, leaf mould and garden compost.

Sandy soils can also be improved by working in clay — their opposite — though this may be expensive and hard work.

Alternatively, create pockets of ideal soil by using as many boxes, baskets, tubs and troughs as possible. Suitably sheltered, with deeper gaps between soil and lip for extra plant protection, these can be used to grow bright blooms for your coastal garden, while the trickier soil and locations can be tackled using durable shrubs

and trees such as:

**OLEARIA** — known as 'Daisy Bush' for its clusters of daisy-like blooms, this shrub comes from coastal New Zealand. It will endure salt and wind but may not be suitable on northerly coasts where sunshine is rarer and the sea in unable to prevent frost damage.

Blooms can take over the whole bush but must be regularly dead-headed or the display will suffer.

**CHOISYA** — otherwise known as Mexican Orange Blossom, this shrub would be a favourite anywhere, with its delicate white blooms and shiny evergreen foliage.

It rarely needs pruning and if unchecked will grow to around six feet, providing shelter to plants in its lee. However, it will suffer of the site is particularly exposed or frost prone.

**TAMARISK** — feathery leaves and pinkish blooms create a lovely delicate display which belies the toughness of this shrub. It is highly resistant to salty air and must be pruned annually or it will run amok.

**DWARF CONIFERS** — many types thrive if sheltered or firmly anchored.

For a touch of class, carnations and pinks are a surprising option thanks to their love of chalky and limey coastal soils.

Thin soils also suit alpines, though you will need to choose varieties which tolerate lime soils.

## Parascending In Clonea/Dungarvan Bay

On September 2, 3 and 4, Dungarvan Powerboat and Ski Club are organising a Parascending Weekend in Clonea/Dungarvan Bay. The proceeds of the weekend are being donated to two local charities — Dungarvan Branch M.S. and the Hospice.

The event will commence on Friday afternoon, September 2nd and will run through to Sunday 4th. The crew who operates the "Skyride" on the lake of Lower Lough Lake in Northern Ireland have agreed to travel down to stage this "once-off" event.

### WHAT IS

#### PARASCENDING?

At some time or another you have probably heard of or seen while on holidays on foreign beaches, a parachute flying across the bay, being towed by a powerboat. Well, now you can do the same thing except the scenery will be different. From the parachute you will be able to see Dungarvan town, the Comeraghs, Helvick, the Gold Coast, etc.

The procedure is quite

simple, wearing a life jacket and a harness, you are clipped into the parachute. The powerboat then accelerates until the parachute is fully open and ready for releasing. By means of a hydraulic winch you and the parachute are released off the back of the boat. As you ascend the view is increased and the boat appears smaller until you are flying at full heights (700 ft. approx.)

The relaxed sensation of flying at this height, with such a marvellous view, is peacefully brilliant. The descent is as smooth as the ascent and slowly you land back on the deck of the powerboat. This is a dry sport so there is no need for wetsuits or anything of the sort.

### HOW TO PARTICIPATE?

Each person who wishes to take part will be issued with a sponsorship card. The minimum amount for a single flight is £30 and for an adult/child tandem flight it is £40. The sponsorship card

is also your flight card, indicating the date and time of your flight. Please note also that anyone who wishes to fly as a tandem (adult/child) the weight combination cannot exceed 120 kgs.

The organising members hope to fly 20 to 25 persons on Friday, 65-70 on Saturday and the remainder on Sunday.

The club requires a minimum of 100 flyers and a maximum of 150 due to time and tidal factors. Because of the expense of this event, a deposit of £20 must be paid on receipt of the sponsorship/flight card.

# Rural Battle Intensifies Against An Post

The battle still rages in the small West Waterford community of Ballyduff. For months now, the tension and frustration has been mounting as An Post stubbornly refuses to rescind the rationalisation plans as proposed under the company's new 'Recovery Plan'.

Sporadic outbursts among the more vocal residents in the affected rural areas, have been met with tentative 'information' meetings and non-committal replies from stoney faced officials.

Opponents of An Post's decision to downgrade 17 rural sub Post Offices in the Mallow Postal District are determined to battle on, as was clearly seen in CORPO's (Conserve Our Rural P.O.'s) recent open letter to Communications Minister, Brian Cowen:

Dear Minister,  
At a meeting of the executive committee of CORPO (Conserve Our Rural Post Offices) held in Mallow on July 14 last, it was decided to write seeking an urgent meeting with you, to discuss the proposed changes in the Postal Delivery Services in the Mallow Postal District and, also the general trend being adopted by An Post in relation to postal services. It was also decided to write to some twenty five T.D.s and Senators, re-

questing them to use their influence with you, to expedite this meeting. Unfortunately, to date, no reply has been received by us from your office.

As sole shareholder of An Post, you are the one person who can decide whether the 'Excellent Postal Service' which we enjoy at present will continue, or whether the proposals by An Post to DOWNGRADE the system will be implemented. Your earlier replies to some of the T.D.'s who have made representatives to you, are worrying at the least, as they give the impression that you are evading your responsibilities in this matter.

The "Rural Postal Service" is a VITAL SERVICE just as much as health, education and security, and as such should not be based on profit and loss criteria. Are profits more important than people? Is our "Rural Way of Live" so envied by the bureaucrats that a semi-state body should be used to bring about its destruction?

Can you not detect the anger of the people? Do you not realise that people are furious with the complete and utter contempt being shown to them? Governments are elected by the ordinary people and can also be removed from office by them. We are imploring you, before it is too late, to use your good office to stop An Post from turning Rural Ireland into a huge NATIONAL PARK in the pursuit of profit.

We look forward to receiving an early reply from you.

### COMPLETE DEVASTATION

P.R.O. of this most active group, Neily Lehane, has stated that the cost of this action to the state will far outweigh any short term savings made by An Post. The ultimate result of this action he believes, will be the complete devastation and depopulation of rural areas, directly contravening stated EU policy of 'preserving our small rural communities.'

CORPO has estimated that An Post's action will immediately put 22 postmen out of work and will certainly in the longer term endanger the livelihood of 56 families "without sufficient justification."

To many, it would seem as

if An Post's failed 1991-1995 Viability Plan, which called for the closure of 550 sub P.O.'s nationwide, is the ulterior motive working behind this new 'Recovery Plan.' It is proposed to make fundamental changes in the whole Mallow District delivery network, reducing the delivery offices from 29 to 12. Should this proposal be implemented, Ballyduff P.O. will cease to be a delivering office and will be relocated to Lismore, Araglen to Fermoy and Conna and Curraglass to Tallow.

Many now believe that the future of rural Ireland as we know it, hangs in the balance.

Formed in response to An Post's Recovery Plan, CORPO warns that should these proposals receive the green light, it will remove vital services and put an end to rural tourism and industrial development.

In the longer term the group envisages an outflow of young people from the threatened areas which will inevitably mean:

- the closure of rural schools
- chronic depletion of hurling and football teams and the closure of clubs and associations.

### NOT SATISFIED

Having met recently with a senior official from An Post, Ballyduff Councillor, Jimmy Quirke said he was still unsatisfied and was determined to fight the Company's proposals 'to the bitter end.'

Cllr. Quirke (F.F.) reported that the An Post representative was adamant at the meeting that the plan's would proceed as outlined in the proposals, thereby providing a 'more efficient and cost effective service' as outlined previously in a letter to Waterford County Council.

### POLICY CONFLICT

In all, the highly strung situation has emerged against a backdrop of a total conflict in policy, given that on the one hand, governmental policy is calling for the development of rural areas through the Leader Programme and the County Enterprise Boards, while on the other hand, there is a total lack of convergence in the flagrant policy within An Post, the Garda Síochána and within the Department of Education in removing badly needed and long established structures.



# This Week Teagasc Says

## AUTUMN GRASS

Milk yield from Autumn grass alone can average 2.5 gallons per day over a ten week period. This is very profitable, but requires good intakes of quality grass.

Planning for this should start now. Firstly, select the driest fields and graze them out well. This presents a real challenge as milk yields must be maintained to cash in on this grass. Grazing down to 2.5" of leafy grass (i.e. grass grazed down well throughout the year) will maintain yields but grazing down to 2.5" on stemmy grass (undergrazed) will depress yields.

On dry land, farmers with groups of animals which have a low nutritional requirement at this time of year such as dry cows, ewes, store cattle, can achieve this fairly easily but those on wet land without such options will have to resort to topping to about 2.5". Always ensure you have sufficient silage to cope with a wet Autumn or a late Spring.

Next, try to accumulate grass on these well grazed paddocks by extending the rotation initially to 30 to 35 days. This will not be easy on many well stocked Spring calving herds in Co. Waterford as growth rates and responses to nitrogen generally decline as the year progresses.

There are only two ways to achieve longer rotations:

- A. — Cut a smaller area for 2nd cut silage.
- B. — Bring more land into the cow grazing area.

Spread 1 to 1.25 cwt. CAN/Acre. Putting out too heavy a dressing will cause lush growth which is liable to lodging and deterioration at the butt.

## UTILISATION

There should always be a flexible approach to grazing management during wet weather. A good roadway with dry access to paddocks will help achieve this. Subdivide normal 24 hour paddocks into 3-4 grazings. The use of a back fence and grazing from the back of the paddock will reduce the amount of walking and sward damage. Dry land can recover fairly rapidly from poaching but "wet" land could take months. Spring grass is always more valuable than Autumn pasture so do not jeopardise your chance of Spring grass by overdoing it in the Autumn.

## GRASS WEED CONTROL IN CEREALS

● Scutch and meadowgrass weed infestations reduce grain yields, increase harvesting problems, raise grain moisture content at harvesting and are expensive and often difficult to control in growing crops.

● However, the development of grass weed problems is inevitable when land is used for arable cropping over a several year period.

● Pre-harvest glyphosate (e.g. Roundup) applications have potential to provide more effective control of grass weed infestations (especially scotch) and have the added advantage of improving the ease of harvesting and flexibility of post harvest management when compared to delaying application until after the harvest has been completed.

● With continuous cereals it is good practice to apply a pre-harvest glyphosate treatment to fields (and especially headlands) on a rotational basis once every third year. This interval should be adjusted depending on the severity of grass weed infestation.

● Always follow label recommendations carefully whenever making pre-harvest applications with glyphosate based products especially those relating to crop growth stage and weather.

## POTATOES

**Haulm Destruction** — Timely and effective haulm destruction will:

- Ensure the majority of crops are within the desired size range.
- Reduce virus diseases in seed crops.
- Minimise the risk of tuber blight.
- Allow earlier harvesting in better condition.
- Reduce the amount of storage disease.

Aimed to carry out destruction at the time when 80% of the crop (by weight) is in the desired size range.

Inspect crops regularly, preferably twice weekly, especially when growing conditions are good.

**Late Season Blight Control** — Continue spraying up until haulm destruction.

★ If crops contain tuber blight at the time of haulm destruction, wait several weeks before lifting so as to allow infected tubers to rot away.

★ However, if it is late in the season, it is wise not to store such crops and they should be marketed promptly, after thorough sorting, to remove disease tubers.

# G.A.A. President Opens Curtain On New Dungarvan Development

Last Saturday, August 13 was a red letter day for the old club in the county — Cumann Lúthchleas Gael Dungarbhán — with the historic official opening of its superb new grounds and clubhouse at Clogherane, Youghal Road. The lifelong burning ambition of owning their own "home" base was finally realised by the Old Boro club as the curtain was proudly opened to reveal the perfectly laid out grounds of the spacious 15 acre development, fully complimented by a modern and impressive clubhouse.

Performing the official opening was G.A.A. President, Mr. Jack Boothman, who was on his second official visit this year to the Deise capital since his election as President last March.

## AN OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT

The entire development which has cost in excess of £300,000 is certainly an outstanding achievement for the Dungarvan club under capable Chairman, Paddy Fitzgerald. This very significant level of investment is truly a remarkable tribute to everyone involved within the club, particularly in view of the fact that the entire debt has been cleared in just six years.

Plans for the now splendid Pairc Dun Garbhain began in 1988 when the club acquired 221/2 acres of previously I.D.A. owned land at Youghal Road.

The major development work began in 1990 including extensive drainage and levelling of the lands. This was followed by the laying out and seeding of all three fields, which was satisfactorily completed by the end of September 1990.

Throughout 1991, the visual evidence of the now splendid venue, was abundantly present. In the final month of that same year, the next phase of the development began with the construction of the modern clubhouse and ancillary facilities by local construction company, Cyril Healy & Sons Ltd.

Today, the 15 acre development includes two full sized playing pitches and a juvenile pitch. Incorporated in the impressive clubhouse are four spacious dressing rooms, complete with shower and toilet facilities, a referees room and equipment room on the ground floor, upstairs is located the meeting room, a fully fitted kitchen with catering facilities, ladies and gents toilets and a utility room.

The dream has finally become a reality for all hard-working members of Dungarvan C.L.C.G. and praise was justly accorded to all involved in the many glowing speeches prior to the official opening.

All throughout the day the immaculate green level grounds were full of a continuous stream of budding hurlers, young football fans, street league players, ladies football players, Old Boro supporters and many more, who had all converged in honour of this momentous occasion in the history of Dungarvan G.A.A. 

# Abbeyside Shore Angling Club Notes



**RING** — Few enough of this generation of readers have heard much of Christy Ring and fewer still saw him in action. More's the pity because he was magnetic. Stories about him are legion and as is usual, with a larger than life individual, most of those who got to know him will have tales to tell, memories to recall. They all point to a hurling fanatic with a searing passion for the game, a man almost unscrupulous in his pursuit of victory and no shrinking violet when it came for him to make an assessment of his own worth and ability. His love of hurling and craving for public adulation was such that, at times, he drove himself to perform beyond the limits of his own capabilities.

He could play in any position (his career started in the half back line) and often did, but midfield (that's right midfield, he starred there in 1951) and any forward position were where he reached his pinnacle and where his senior career blossomed. His display in the 1951 Munster final against Tipperary was exceptional. Playing at midfield, with a reckless abandon, he discarded his boots and stockings in order to drive himself to excess of endeavour. Even though much of his glory was still to come, that June Sunday in 1951 marked, in the minds of many, the zenith of Ring's career. Never did one man dominate a game so completely and although Tipperary won the game by two points (2-11 to 2-9) Cork, and Christy, exacted ample revenge in the following two seasons.

His greatest adversary of those games and many more, and the best goalie I ever saw was Tony Reddan whose hand I was proud to shake when we met at this year's Munster final. John Doyle was another of Ring's markers (in every sense). We used to say of the uncompromising Doyle that around the Tipperary goal he never stood on ceremony but he stood on everything else. Every player who opposed Ring knew beyond any doubt

that he was in for a torrid hour. Ring had his own even-handed sense of justice. If you hit him whether by accident or (perish the thought) by design he always got his own back if not that same day then on some future occasion when the circumstances suited him.

On a boiling July day in 1962 Cork and Waterford met in the Munster hurling semi-final at Thurles. Taking the aggressive approach just a shade beyond the strict letter of the rules my hurley made, shall we say, physical contact with his lower body. We won by a goal. Having escaped retribution that day (Ring said, did nothing) I knew I had to pay my dues another day, perhaps when next our paths crossed. And so it came to pass when our sides met in Fermoy the following year Ring was a year older but that year hadn't dulled his memory. During the game, a cracker of a tournament game with Waterford enjoying the lead all the way, Christy was marked out of the glory stakes by the great Austin Flynn and was given precious few opportunities to even get a puck of the ball. Such was Austin's dominance that evening. Occasionally as he prowled the goalmouth impatiently he threw me that special glance which should have warned me that Nemesis was catching up on me. Sure enough with five minutes remaining he got his chance to put manners on me and no better man to take it. "We're quits now Ned", he explained as I was being led off. An explanation wasn't necessary. We both understood.

The Lord be good to you Christy and to Philly grimes whose display adorned a fine game. Both titans in their team's cause. An mbeidh a leithéidí ann arís, ní fheadar.

## MICHAEL (MICK) O'MAHONEY, KILCRONAT, BALLYNOE

Mick O'Mahoney was laid to rest in Ballynoe Cemetery last Tuesday week. Gura mhaith an mhaise dá anam uasal é. His unexpected death at Cois Abham Welfare Home, Youghal, last Sunday week, evoked deep feelings of regret in the district. An employee of the Forestry Department until his retirement some years ago and being involved in many social activities since his youth, particularly hurling, he was a very popular person in the area.

Coming from the O'Mahoney household where six brothers played together in a local team, hurling was bound to be in his blood. He received his baptism of fire early in competitive hurling in 1927 when as a lad of 14 he was chosen as goalie for the Ballynoe team to play in the School Shield Competition. The team was organised from the whole parish by Dick O'Brien, N.T., Principal of Ballynoe NS, who, incidentally, was an uncle of All-Ireland Cork and Glen Rovers senior hurling star, Seanie Brien.

Ballynoe won a great first round that year against Ballyhooley and having received a walk-over from Ballindongan, they were pitted against Mallow who proved much superior on the day and they had to concede victory to them. Still, the seeds were sown and many future hurlers evolved from that team.

A few years later, in the early thirties, Mick was in his usual berth as cúlbaire for the newly affiliated parish team at Lacken and again in 1937 in Kilcronat's first year, who, when defeated in the semi-final of the East Cork Championship, the team, with Mick guarding the net, vindicated themselves. Later that year, with some thrilling encounters with Castlemartyr in the Irish Hurling Tournament, four successive draws it took that year without it being resolved and Mick's coolness in the many onslaughts in "Hell's Kitchen" saved the day for Kilcronat.

'Twas finally decided in 1938 with the "Reds" or Castlemartyr gaining the verdict by a narrow margin, and all remained friends.

In 1940, during the Emergency, Mick and his brother "Sonny" joined the Defence Forces and did duty in Templemore, Limerick and Castleconnell, the latter place being the home of the famous Mackey family. Mick did some hurling there also and, as is well known, Sonny excelled himself, playing splendid hurling against Jimmy Cooney, the Tipperary star and Mick Mackey in the Army Championships.

Kilcronat laid claim to Mick again in 1942 to play in goal with them in the Castlelyons Hurling Tournament against the local team.

After six years service in the forces, both Mick and Sonny returned to their native parish and continued their GAA as players and supporters of St. Catherine's Club.

In the early lay participation in the Church, Mick was to the fore and performed in the reading of the Lessons regularly at his local church in Glengoura. An adept hand at '45' he enjoyed and played at many sessions in the locality.

Many long and lasting memories of him will remain with us, and we extend our sincere sympathy to his wife Katie, son Gerdie, brothers, sister, sisters-in-law, brothers-in-law, nephews, nieces, relatives and friends. Solus na bhflaitheas dá anam dílis.

The interment took place after Requiem Mass in St. Catherine's Church, Ballynoe, celebrated by Fr. Lomasney, C.C., assisted by Fr. Kelleher, P.P., Conna and Fr. Philip O'Keeffe, Youghal.

# FARMING LEADER

## Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The Co. Secretary, Mrs. Anne Kirwan, expressed disappointment that the Government has failed to deliver on a commitment made to the ICMSA that grants for dairy hygiene and pollution control would be operational from August 1 last.

In the Programme for Competitiveness and Work, the Government committed itself to providing £100 million for on-farm investment for dairy hygiene and pollution control over a three year period 1994 to 1996. The Secretary said it is totally unacceptable that eight months into the first year of

this Programme, no funding has yet been announced.

"By the delays in announcing these grants many farmers are held up in carrying out essential work to comply with new EU standards and thereby prevent pollution. As it stands, farmers are being forced to carry out expensive and extensive capital works and are in some cases being prosecuted by local authorities," said the County Secretary.

"It is totally unacceptable that farmers on the one hand must comply with every increasing standards with regard to milk quality,

dairy hygiene and pollution control measures, and face the penalties for non compliance, while on the other hand the Government fails to implement essential grant aid for this work to be carried out," concluded the County Secretary.

Eamonn O'Rourke, Chairman ICMSA National Sheep Committee, summarises below ICMSA policy on sheep Scab Eradication Scheme:

- 1 — Deregulate the Scheme.
- 2 — Dipping to be considered as a good husbandry practice by farmers.

3 — Sheep scab to remain a notifiable disease (as per Sheep Scab order 1905).

4 — Spot checks to be conducted by Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry Inspectors at marts and factory lairage to detect scab.

5 — Where scab has been identified in a flock, flock-owners should be prevented from trading until the disease is cleared.

6 — Research to develop an alternative treatment for sheep scab should be continued and the results made available to farmers if the research proves positive.

# Processors Should Increase Pig Prices In Line With Europe

—Says IFA President

Mr. Ian Tierney, Waterford IFA Pigs & Pigeat Committee representative supports the IFA President, John Donnelly who has called on members of the Irish Association of Pigeat Processors to withdraw their threat to reduce price by 2p per kg. this week and should instead increase by 4p per kg. Mr. Donnelly said that pig prices should rise rather

than fall this week because of significant forward movement in pig price on the European mainland.

The IFA President pointed out that German pig prices had risen by 4p per kg. on Monday with a further rise expected this week. Dutch price quotations are also up by 5p per kg. and there is a general tendency for prices to firm up within Europe.

"The pig production sector is in serious financial trouble and operating under very difficult circumstances. Rather than depressing the industry, the Pigeat Processors should give an immediate positive signal to producers based on this week's market developments," concluded Mr. Donnelly.

## IFA Demands Government Moves Quickly On Legislation To End Occupier's Liability Uncertainty

Commenting on reports of Cabinet approval of a Bill to alter the law on Occupier's Liability, Waterford IFA Industry and Environment Committee Chairman, Matt Cunningham, has said that farmers demanded an ending of the uncertainty surrounding their rights and legal obligations to entrants onto their lands.

The IFA man called on the Minister for Equality and Law, Mervyn Taylor, to arrange for the early publication of the new Bill so as to allow for full debate and enactment of the required legislation in the Autumn sitting of the Dail and Seanad.

# 4.5% Court Case To Be Heard In October/November

The ICMSA has announced that it expects its 4.5% milk quota case to be heard in late October or early November, of this year.

ICMSA Economist, Mr. Ciaran Dolan, said the Court of Justice in Luxembourg has made an Order that the five cases being taken by ICMSA on behalf of Irish dairy farmers are to be heard by the Third Chamber of the Court. The Third Chamber is made up of three judges and the names of the three judges will be known in September when the court resumes after the summer recess.

The ICMSA lodged its

challenge to the Court of Justice in Luxembourg against the EU Commission in February 1993. The Association is challenging the right of the Commission to suspend, without compensation, 4.5% of our national milk quota amounting to 51 million gallons and is seeking full reinstatement of the suspended quota, or compensation for this suspension in the 1992/93 year at the rate of £20m p.a. The quotas were suspended for two full quota years (1992-93 and 1993-94). We are now in the third year of suspension, without compensation. If the case to have the quota restored is not suc-

cessful ICMSA is seeking a proper buy-out scheme over five years which would amount to £100m for farmers.

### ITALIAN QUOTA SITUATION IN STARK CONTRAST TO IRISH

In outlining the current situation on the 4.5% case, Mr. Dolan said that it is in sharp contrast to the decision by the recent Council of EU Ministers meeting to allocate additional quota to Italy and to the proposal to waive the Italian super levy liability of almost £1 billion. He said it is ironic that the Italians are being rewarded by the EU for their consistent disregard

for the milk quota rules, while Ireland has been penalised for conforming with the same regulations. He said this unbalanced approach calls into question the operation of the quota system.

### NO HELP FORTHCOMING FROM IRISH GOVERNMENT

"We are pleased to see that the British Government is taking the EU Commission to the Court of Justice on the issue of waiving the Italian Super Levy liability for the past number of years. No help has been afforded to Irish farmers from the Irish Government on the

4.5% case. On the contrary, our Government failed to support the ICMSA case and our negotiators accepted the decision to allocate additional quota to Italy and Spain and on the proposal to waive the Super Levy liability," concluded Mr. Dolan.

**EUROPEAN ATHLETIC CHAMPIONSHIPS**

**SUPER SONIA**

Ballymore-Cobh A.C.'s brightest star Sonia O'Sullivan created Irish athletic history in Helsinki last Wednesday evening when she toyed with the opposition in the European Championship 3000 metres final before unleashing an unmatched burst of speed less than two hundred metres from the finish to claim Ireland's first title at this level since the championships were inaugurated in 1934.

The main talking point after the race was the ease with which Sonia won her title. She looked full of running and it was obvious from early on in the race that nothing was going to deny Ireland's first lady her magic moment of glory. The Cobh girl's finishing time was 8 mins. 31.84 secs. and if she so desired, her European record of 8 mins. 21 secs. could have been troubled on the night, so impressive was her form. However, Wednesday night wasn't an occasion for records but for a much needed title which will further the athletic career of the Super Soni(c)a for the exciting times that lay ahead for her.

**SUITABLE RACE**

Sonia's team mate Anita Philpott led early on in the race before the pace was taken up by the reigning champion Yvonne Murray of Scotland. This suited Sonia very much as it took a major tactical responsibility off her shoulders and all the Irish girl had to do was to track her arch rival, which she knew she had every capability of doing. As the laps were reeled off, Sonia knew that the race was being handed to her and in fairness the courageous Murray played her part knowing that she could do very little about the final outcome.

With one lap to go Sonia's race was still a waiting game. However, she still managed to run that last lap in 63 secs. and the last 200


metres in 29 secs. (58 secs. lap pace) which could not be matched as she came home a thirty yards winner from Yvonne Murray with the World Junior champion Gabriela Szabo of Romania a further four seconds back in the bronze medal position.

**LONG WAIT ENDED**

When Sonia crossed the finish line a European sixty years gold famine was ended and the Irish public to a person were gracious in their praise of Cobh's athletic queen. Indeed the former name of the East Cork town, i.e. Queenstown, now takes on a true meaning.

It is ironic that a European title should in the end, be achieved so easily following years of disappointment. In Budapest in 1966, an Irishman, Jim Hogan from Limerick won the European marathon title but following a supposed earlier dispute with Irish athletic officials he had transferred his allegiance to Britain. In 1969 Clonliffe's Frank Murphy was pipped by Britain's John Whettan in the 1500 metres final in Athens having beaten the English Runner in the British 3 'A's final earlier in the season. European titles also escaped Ronnie Delaney, Noel Carroll, John Treacy and Eamonn Coughlan to name but a few.

Sonia O'Sullivan has succeeded where the many household names of Irish athletics have not. She quite rightly takes her place among the greats and — there's more to come!



**WORLD RECORD ATTEMPT TONIGHT (WEDNESDAY)**

Sonia O'Sullivan has set five records to-date this season. She has eclipsed three Irish marks, the World 2000 metres and the European 3000 metres time. To-night, Wednesday, she will attempt, for a second time, to break the World record for the mile at the Golden 4 Grand Prix meeting in Zurich. She just missed this record in the Bislett Games in Oslo last month when the pacemaking went astray. Tonight

Sonia will have a top class pacemaker in forty three years old Russian Yekaterina Podkopayeva. The world record stands at 4 mins 15.16 secs. Last time out Sonia was 1.64 secs. off the mark. With her confidence sky high following Helsinki, Sonia should be capable of running that ten yards faster to crown another great occasion for Irish athletics.

# The European Athletics Championships 1994

**Helsinki has always been a happy hunting ground where Irish sport is concerned.**

The Irish soccer team have never suffered a defeat in the Finnish capital, which was the venue eleven years ago for the inaugural World Athletics Championships, where that famous final burst of pace with 150 metres to go shot Eamonn Coughlan ahead of Soviet Dmitri Dmitriyev, and earned Coughlan a gold medal for Ireland. This time around, Helsinki hosted the 16th European Athletics Championships, with most Irish hopes pinned on Sonia O'Sullivan — four years ago in Split, she finished 11th in the 3000 metres in her first major championships. How times change.

## FLYING START FOR IRELAND

**Sunday, August 7 (Day 1)** — The first gold of Helsinki '94 went to Portugal when Manuela Machado won the womens marathon, continuing that great Portuguese long distance tradition which saw Carlos Lopez and Rosa Mota win numerous prizes over the last three decades. Ireland, meanwhile, had a bright start; Sonia O'Sullivan won her semi-final to progress to the 3000 metres final along with Anita Philpott, who qualified in ninth place in the same heat. Tom McGuirk set a new Irish record of 50.84 seconds in the heats of the 400 metres hurdles, Terry McHugh did the same in the round of the javelin (he threw a record 82.14 metres, yet still said: "it was not a brilliant throw"), and Niall Bruton earned himself a place in the mens 1500 metres final when he finished second behind Spain's Fermin Cacho in the semi. However, it was the end of the road for Britain's 200 metres hope Solomon Wariso, who received a three month ban for taking a herbal remedy containing a banned substance. Not quite the case of Solomon the Wise here, to add insult to injury for Wariso, he's a biochemistry graduate expert in medicines.

## BATTLE OF THE BIG GUNS

**Monday, August 8 (Day 2)** — The mens javelin final developed into a classic confrontation between the top three throwers in the world. 6ft 5in giant Steve Backley of Britain retained his crown with a throw of 85.20 metres, which surpassed Finland's Seppo Rety (82.90 metres) and the Czech Republic's Jan Zelezy (82.58 metres). Ireland's Terry McHugh finished in seventh place with a throw of 80.46. It was a contest which the athletics-mad crowd clearly appreciated. In winning the mens 100 metres, Linford Christie became only the second man ever to win three European titles in a row, and to proclaim this, donned a t-shirt which read "3 x gold". Fittingly, the man who first achieved this feat, Valeri Borsoff, presented

Christie with his medal. Russian sprint queen and former speed-skater Inna Privalova took the womens crown.

## FINN WALKS AWAY WITH IT

**Tuesday, August 9 (Day 3)** — Home town girl Sari Esayah received a heroes reception when she held off stiff opposition to win the 10k walk, while Olympic champion Fermin Cacho of Spain took the honours in the mens 1500 metres final, holding off compatriot Isaac Viciosa to earn gold in a new Championship record time of 3:35.28. 1991 World Junior champion Niall Bruton finished tenth. In the high jump, Norwegian Steinar Hoen made himself a national hero when he became the first jumper from that country to win gold at a major championships.

## GOLDEN GIRL

**Wednesday, August 10 (Day 4)** — Before 6.45 p.m. (Irish time) today, Ireland had never won a gold medal in the sixty years history of the European Championships. All that changed when Sonia O'Sullivan made a decisive breakaway from defending champion Yvonne Murray with 200 metres remaining in the womens 3000 metres final. Realistically, the Scot probably didn't think that she would win the gold and pretty much said so in a post-race interview with the B.B.C., whose coverage of the race, described by David Coleman and Brendan Foster, was brilliantly unbiased and impartial. Sonia's time of 8:31.84 was ten seconds outside her own European record, but was twelve seconds faster than Murray's winning time in 1990.

This was a wonderful performance from an athlete who is living up to her potential, and we are blessed by the fact that this great athlete is Irish. In another interview afterwards, she told Ennis's most famous son Des Lynam, that the race was perfect for herself and Murray and that in a slow race, they just couldn't stay with the main field. In twelfth position was Mallow's Anita Philpott, who set a personal best mark of 8:54.79 — one for the future, perhaps.

To conclude the Sonia story, the best quote for me came from Eurosports Tim Hutchins, who said that if Yvonne Murray was asked to draw a picture of Sonia O'Sullivan, then it would probably be a view from behind.

## BLACK MAGIC NOT ENOUGH

**Thursday, August 11 (Day 5)** — Britain's Roger Black was vying to become only the third person to win three European titles in a row when he went to the blocks for the 400 metres final, but 45 second of sprinting later, he was congratulating fellow Briton Duaine Ladejo who had shot through for the gold medal. In the mens 200 metres final, Geir Moen continued Norway's renaissance when he became the first Norwegian ever to win a sprinting

gold medal. T. J. Kearns set a new Irish 110 metres hurdles record of 13.60 secs. in the heats, Frank O'Mara qualified for the 5000 metres final and Russian Radion Gattaulin won a classic pole vault competition.

## FABULOUS FRAU

**Friday, August 12 (Day 6)** — Heike Dreschler is a lady with an unbelievable C.V. Long jump World Champion 1983, 1993, second 1991, third 1987; Olympic Champion 1992, second 1988; European Champion 1986, 1990; Former World record holder. 200 metres — Olympic Games third 1988; European Champion 1986, second 1990; former World record holder. To that list can be added the 1994 European long jump title which she won with her very first jump. Dreschler is still only 29, which makes her a mere toddler compared with Russian Yekaterina Podkopayeva, who at the age of 42 won her semi-final of the 1500 metres, and joining her in the final is Ireland's Sinead Delahunty. There was double delight for Britain — Colin Jackson won the 110 hurdles and Sally Gunnell easily won the 400 hurdles.

## PLENTY OF ZIPP

**Saturday, August 13 (Day 7)** — The aptly named Bettina Zipp was one of the inspirations as Germany won the womens 4 x 100 metres relay, while in the womens 10000 metres final, Cravero and Ferreira gave Portugal a one-two success in a race where, sadly, Catherine McKiernan was forced to drop out.

## SPAIN'S SUPER SUNDAY

**Saturday, August 14 (Day 8)** — Spain sensationally dominated the mens marathon, taking a clean sweep of the medals. With a lap to go in the womens 1500 metres final, Geraldine Nolan led the way brilliantly, but was swallowed up by the field in the ultimate lap. Kelly Holmes of Britain dramatically beat the veteran Podkopayeva for silver. In the mens discus, Nick Sweeney put in a superb performance. He finished fourth, 18 centimetres away from bronze.

R.T.E. are to be congratulated in having John Treacy as an analyst. His astute observations will certainly improve R.T.E.'s coverage, which has to be criticised for its brevity. 
The achievement was in no small way due to the perseverance and dedication of Tom Drummy who continued to encourage the

# Outsiders Waterford Field Unchanged Team For Clash With Kilkenny

## U/21 HURLING SEMI-FINAL AT SEMPLE STADIUM ON SUNDAY

Making ourselves outsiders in this instance is certainly not an act of gamesmanship as some readers might be inclined to suspect. We will field in that role because all the facts add up to make Kilkenny warm favourites to advance to the All-Ireland final and regain the title which they won for their fifth time in 1990. Last year, Kilkenny drew with Galway in the All-Ireland final and were beaten by a goal in the replay. Several of the same team are available to them as are all the members of their All-Ireland winning minor side which defeated Tipperary by 0-15 to 1-10 three years ago. So, on the score of experience they are entitled to be strongly fancied.

It must also be said that in beating Wexford by a couple of points in the Leinster final, they were not over impressive and probably won because of Wexford's squandermania in shooting seventeen wides as against seven for Kilkenny. However, whether it is by luck or skill, they are the champions representing their province and Waterford will have to be mighty good to have a chance of beating them.

It is a very consoling thought that we were also the outsiders (and justifiably so) against Tipperary and Clare and we survived in both after splendid displays — the first half against Tipperary and the second half against luckless Clare.

Since winning the Munster final, the panel have been back in training and preparation seems to be going very well, even though they were made look poor enough in a challenge game against a Cork senior team at Fraher Field last week.

The display was a bit listless and if we are to regard the result as showing our best form, we certainly would have a lot to worry about. Selectors rarely take the results of challenge games very seriously and rightly so, as no team worth talking about would go all

out in a challenge to the same extent that they would in the real thing.

The selectors met over the weekend and named an unchanged side from that which was selected for the Munster final. There they were forced to make a late change when Timmy Cronin cried off sick and was replaced by his clubmate Conor Walsh. This is a full vote of confidence in the team and hopefully the confidence will prove to be justified.

Having watched the video of the Munster final and seen the mistakes and weaknesses which the first half of the game exposed, we can expect a different kind of performance from the forwards who were downright poor in the first half when they made no impression at all on the Clare defence, while at the same time, balls poured into our defence almost non-stop for the second quarter of the game and it was the sheer brilliance of Pat Harnan in goal and the very solid defensive play by the six backs which saved us from being much further behind at the break.

As I wrote last week, the midfield improved in the second half and our forwards made up for their first half lapse, but this is not the way things are supposed to happen and I doubt very much if we would be lucky enough to get away with the same thing against Kilkenny.

It will take sixty minutes of our very best hurling to give us a chance against the "Cats" as they are the experts in punishing opponents for their mistakes. Having written all this, I must make it clear that I am not trying to create the feeling that we don't stand a chance. We sure do have a chance and maybe a good chance if all things go right.

At the beginning I wrote that Kilkenny won the minor All-Ireland final with most of the same players three years ago and that this was one of the prime factors in making them favourites. Looking at that scenario in a different and probably more favourable way, I can

point out that the team which Kilkenny beat by 2 points in that All-Ireland were more or less the same Tipperary team which we beat decisively at Walsh Park in the first round of the current under-21 championship last month. So we are not without a chance of winning our way to another All-Ireland final in the grade. It will all depend on the attitude and the commitment of the fifteen players over the hour. It should be one splendid game of hurling and a treat for all lovers of the game.

Even if it does not turn out to be a hurling spectacle, we still need enormous support at the venue. The massive support accorded the team in 1992 was a source of great encouragement to the lads and the same was the case this year against Tipperary and Clare. It is timed for 7 p.m.

### OUR FIRST UNDER-21 ALL-IRELAND

Losing an important game by a single point is always a bitter experience. Losing an All-Ireland by a single point is one of the most shattering things that can happen to a player and all the people associated with such an event. We here in Waterford know full well what such an expe-

rience is like because it has happened to us not only once, but twice and each time it happened it was against our old rivals Kilkenny.

Many readers will sadly remember the anguish of 1957 when 77,000 spectators saw us lose to Kilkenny by 4-10 to 3-12 after we had looked winners all over coming into the final minutes of that hectic All-Ireland.

In Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday, September 13, 1974, we had something like the same shattering experience when our under-21 team lost to the "Cats" on a 3-8 to 3-7 scoreline.

I suppose the story can always be worse, as the Offaly man said last year in Nolan Park after they had lost a replay of the All-Ireland by a point to Waterford.

I had intended doing a "where are they now" feature on the 1974 team but time was not on my side. # The Senior Championships

One of the messages coming through from our most important venues in the county is the great lack of interest in our senior championships this year. The lack of interest is clearly reflected in the poor attendances at matches, that in ordinary circumstances, should prove to be very attractive.

Take for interest the tie between the top two senior football championship contenders, Stradbally and Gaultier which was played at Walsh Park two weeks ago and which attracted a very, very small crowd. The gate receipts were less than £280. The senior hurling championship clash between Ballyduff and St. Saviours, which was played at Fraher Field only a week ago, had a 'gate' of less than £100.

Other attractive games in both these championships have also been attracting poor attendances. The holiday season is undoubtedly a factor, but most of all the reason for the great lack of interest is the system on which the championships are being run. Clearly now, it is time that clubs woke up and concede that the league system which we have been operating for a good number of years, is a failure in more ways than one. It is difficult to find an adjective to describe a system where-

by a club can lose three matches out of seven and still become county champions.

We have so many games where the result is almost immaterial that we might justifiably wonder why the paying public continue to support them. Year after year a strong case has been made for a return to a knockout championship (or some form of knockout championship) but when it comes to the crunch we find that a small majority of Board delegates continue to opt for the league system.

The inherent fear of being beaten in the first round and them having no further games until next year is the prime factor in having people decide against the knockout. The running of properly structured leagues with a substantial prize on offer at the end might prove an incentive to clubs to move away from the league-style championship — at least on a trial basis. A gradual return to the knockout system might also help and were it to apply to se-

nior teams only, for the first year, delegates might be encouraged to give it a go.

Whatever is going to be done, a full County Board debate on the matter should be asked for in September/October.

Some people (not all that many) believe that the decline in attendances relates more to the noticeable decline in standards rather than to the systems on which our championships are run. I would go along with the opinion that standards are falling and as a consequence matches are losing their attractiveness for many people. I cannot speak for all the games that have been played at the different venues this year, but of the big number of games which I have seen, quite a number were boring, some very mediocre and very few could be classed as being good.

I think that the haphazard way in which the championships are going, players are losing interest in training and there is a consequent lacking in commitment.

Officials, too, as well as selectors, are finding themselves being put under increasing pressure because they are not in a position to properly programme their preparation for games.

In the coming weeks and months, things will change when we reach the knockout part of the championships. Contests will improve, standards might be a bit better and the crowds will be back. This won't mean that problems are over as there are the six or seven months of next year and every other year, before the knockout stages are reached, if a change is not made soon.

## Awards

Our congratulations are extended to James O'Connor, Lismore, who this week will receive the Jury's Hotel Achievement Award for the month of July, as captain of the Waterford Under-21 hurling team. Also to Paul Flynn, Ballygunner who took the Park Hotel Award for the same month.

### CONGRATULATIONS

We offer our congratulations also to Lismore player, Brendan Lawton, who was married last week in Dublin to Miss Elizabeth Pope. Brendan won senior hurling championship medals with Lismore in 1991 and 1993.

## Club Championship Games

If the under 21 hurlers win on next Sunday, we will be engaged in an All Ireland final against Galway on the second Sunday in September and that would involve a further hold up in the club championship. Because of the possibility of this happening, the Boards are trying to use every date and venue to catch up on the arrears of matches and make sure that we will be ready for the play-off games on the scheduled dates.

All the matches listed for next weekend are part of a tidying-up operation by the County Board and will nearly all be of some interest to the clubs involved.

### SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

#### Dungarvan v. Ballinacourty

This is the third time in which I have listed this one as an upcoming fixture, but finally, I believe it will be played and keep patrons entertained at Fraher Field on Tuesday evening of next week. The game should result in a decisive win for Dungarvan, as I have written already and this will give them eight points, which is just enough to keep their hopes alive for the knockout stages.

#### Stradbally v. Rathgormack

This will be the last match for Rathgormack and the result is terribly important. It is also fixed for Tuesday and will be played at Leamybrien. A win for Rathgormack would put them on 8 points which would be a point clear of Stradbally, who still have only 7 points. It is unlikely that Stradbally who were hotly fancied for the championship following their very good start, will lose out for a place in the knockout stages, but it is still possible as if they lose here and

then lost to Kilrossanty in their final match, they are gone for the year.

Rathgormack desperately need to win here and win the points which will give them a chance of a play-off. Should Butlerstown win, and there is a good chance that this will happen, then they would have to await the outcome of the Kilmacthomas/Affane game on the following evening, to see if they are going to qualify for a play-off with Kilmacthomas.

#### Kilmacthomas v. Affane

Affane have but one sin-

gle point from their six matches to date and it is not very likely that they will upset Kilmacthomas's plan for playing in the knockout stages of the championship. Still, surprise results are the order of the day and stranger things have happened in 1994 already.
