Tragic Death Of Affane Youth

The whole of West Waterford was reeling in shock last Friday August 19th following the news of the tragic death of fourteen year old Thomas Scanlon, a student of the Christian Brothers School, Dungarvan.

Son of William and Catherine Scanlon of Ballyhane, Cappoquin, the youth was fishing with a friend in the River Blackwater at what is locally known as the 'Kitchen Hole', near Cappoquin when the tragedy struck at around 4 p.m. Divers of the Fermoy sub-aqua club later recovered the body at around 6 p.m. To his sorrowing parents, brother Richard, sisters Maria and Elaine and relatives we extend our sincere sympathy.

Removal was on Sunday evening to Affane Church where a huge concourse of mourners gathered in a fitting tribute to the most popular youth. Members of Affane/Cappoquin G.A.A. club and students of Dungarvan C.B.S. formed an impressive guard of honour.

The grief and shock which the deceased's untimely and tragic death has cast over the area was truly evidenced on Monday when another immense concourse of mourners gathered in their hundreds at Affane Church cemetery where a popular and respected youth was finally laid to rest.

Address: New Line, Abbeyside, Dungarvan.

Where are you working at present? I am currently training in the Mater Hospital, Dublin. I am in my second year and getting more practical experience on the wards daily.

When did you complete the Health Science course?

I completed the Health Science course

in DTC in June '92 and commenced my hospital training in March '93. I achieved first place in the 1st year nursing examinations and this I attributed to the ground work I had covered in the Health Science Course at the College.

Can you tell me a little about the course?

The course covered a wide range of subjects which we studied in great detail. This helped my understanding of what nursing entailed, and gave me a taste of the study which a student nurse would be required to complete during her training.

Any aspect of the course you found particularly helpful?

I found the practical nursing classes very helpful. We got hands-on experience with many of the practical procedures which are used daily during nursing training.

Would you recommend the course?

I would highly recommend the Health Science course to anyone wishing to pursue a career in nursing, as I feel it prepares one well for the actual life of a student nurse, and one gets a good insight into this while on work experience in the hospitals which is organised by the college.

Do you know how your former classmates fared?

The majority of my class-mates were successful in getting hospital placements. Many students, like myself, availed of the college's facility to repeat certain Leaving Certificate subjects. Many of us had a choice of two or three places in hospitals in Ireland. Those of us who were not placed at home obtained places in UK hospitals.

A Saucy Little Salmon



SALMON WITH HORSERADISH SAUCE

Poaching fish is easier than most people think — and result in a tender, juicy dish. Here it's served with a piquant horseradish sauce.

Ingredients

2 to 3 cups of water
 1/2 cup onion chopped
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 1 bay leaf
 1/2 tsp salt
 5 peppercorns
 2 tsp dill
 6 salmon steaks 200-250g (6-7oz) each
 4 tbsp prepared horseradish
 2 cups low-calorie sour cream
 1/8 tsp dry mustard

Method

Fill a deep 12 inch diameter frying pan with 2 to 3 cups of water to make 1 inch of liquid. Add the chopped onions, lemon juice, bay



leaf, salt, peppercorns and dill and bring to the boil. Add salmon steaks to liquid and add boiling water to cover, if needed. Cover pan, reduce heat and simmer for 10 to 15 minutes. (Allow 10 minutes per inch of thickness of fish measured at thick-

est part). Carefully remove each steak with spatulas and place on warmed plates. Mix horseradish, sour cream and dry mustard in a small bowl. Serve this mixture on the side with the salmon.

From Ireland To Chernobyl With Love

Now's the time gardeners can save ££££'s

DON'T just savour the garden in August — save money too!

Many gardeners already take cuttings and there will be few geranium lovers who are not potting up healthy shoots for next year.

We can also save seeds as well. Admittedly, some hybrid varieties are not suitable because they are so changed that the seed will never produce anything like the donor plant.

Roses or chrysanthemums and dahlias fall into this category and you will also have problems with seeds from plants not normally sold commercially in seed form — you can bet they need highly controlled or specialised conditions for germination.

But staple varieties such as marigolds and other hardy annuals can yield a huge amount of seeds for sowing next year.

They might not be as fresh as commercially produced seeds, but you will have so many, you can afford to sow generously.

You can also increase the success rate by following these simple steps when 'harvesting':

1. Choose a warm and dry day to reduce the chance of dampness, which is likely to cause mould and contamination of the seeds in storage.
2. Take cut flower and seed pods and dry thoroughly over several weeks in a dry sunny place such as a

window sill indoors or the greenhouse.

3. Break open the pod or flower head and gently fan the debris so that you can gather up the heavier seed.

4. Seal the seeds into labelled envelopes ready for sowing next season.

5. Store the envelopes somewhere dry and cool, but free from frost.

The other secret of success is nothing to do with the seed, but simply good practice when sowing.

Use decent seed compost rather than thinking you can get away with sieved soil straight from the garden — be happy you have saved money by collecting your own seeds and don't cut more corners!

And remember that you can save more cash by taking cuttings — even those from evergreens such as conifers can be rooted at this time of year.

But geraniums are the cuttings which most gardeners take now. Ideally they should be a healthy new shoot with a little woodiness at the base.

Do not use a rooting hormone, but pot up in a slightly sandy medium for the pots or trays, before placing in a cool greenhouse or indoor window sill to establish themselves.

The tricky part is getting the water supply right. Too much and the cuttings will go mouldy at the base, yet underwatering is equally disastrous — but you soon get the hang of it.

All five ambulances have been renovated and equipped by a team of ambulance drivers and firemen from Waterford and Tipperary who will also drive them out to Belarus.

They will be accompanied on their trip by a team of mechanics who will instruct the hospitals on how to service and maintain the vehicles.

Chernobyl Childrens Project Director, Ms. Adi Roche wishes to use this opportunity to publically express her deep gratitude to the people of Waterford and Tipperary. "These ambulances will save countless lives. I have seen myself the harsh realities of their plight. One are alone, almost the size of Ireland, is serviced by one 40 year old ambulance. These ambulances from Ireland will be a wonderful boost. On behalf of the victims of Chernobyl I say "Thank You".



The bridge existed prior to the time of Charles the Second, as an act was passed during his reign for its repair. It is now exceedingly crazy; the passage of a single individual causes it to tremble from one end to the other.

Meeting To Plan Urban Renewal In Dungarvan

"Dungarvan stands to benefit greatly from the Urban Renewal scheme announced last month by the Ministers for the Environment, and Housing and Urban Renewal, and people should not delay in preparing proposals to take advantage of the generous benefits contained therein."

This is the message which goes out this week from Dungarvan Urban District Council and Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry Ltd., who jointly sponsor an information meeting at which the scheme will be officially launched in Dungarvan.

The meeting, which will be held in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Monday night next, August 29 at 7.30 p.m., will be addressed by Mr. Des O'Toole, Chartered Surveyor of O'Shea, O'Toole & Partners and Mr. John Reid of Reid Associates, Planning Consultants and Town Planners. They will outline the benefits which can be derived from the various incentives available through the new scheme and the types of development the Council would like to see taking place within the designated area.

Dungarvan is one of twelve towns selected to benefit from these new proposals and the incentives contained in the scheme are virtually guaranteed to promote development in areas which have heretofore lain derelict.

At its national launch, Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., said that the Urban Renewal Scheme is one of the most successful policy initiatives pursued by Government over the last few years. "Through an attractive range of financial incentives, the scheme has been responsible for breathing new life into our towns and cities. Derelict sites and dilapidated buildings are being eradicated and replaced by new and refurbished buildings, environmentally enhanced public spaces and improved infrastructure.

Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal, Mr. Emmet Stagg, T.D., urging people to seize this new opportunity, said: "The scheme is a joint venture between the State which provides the financial incentives, the local authorities who promote the scheme and the private sector which makes the necessary investment and carries out the work."

The areas targeted contain derelict sites, obsolete industrial buildings, run-down and boarded up retail residential premises.

Incentives available include: Capital Allowances, Double Rent Allowances, Section 23 Tax Relief,

Owner/Occupier Allowances, Rated Remissions.

The scheme is not open-ended and will cease on July 31, 1997. The Minister made clear that there will be no extensions of time, so those who propose and are eligible to take advantage of this scheme should do so now.

This is an ideal opportunity to tastefully improve some areas of the town which badly need work and are part of our heritage. As Minister Stagg said: "We cannot preserve all our old buildings in mothballs or turn them all into museums, it would not make economic sense." This is a practical and realistic alternative.

We in Tallow had reason to know how successful they were having bowed the knee to them in quite a few County finals in those grades and in many other grades as well.

We in Tallow G.A.A. would like Fr. Farrell to know how welcome he is among us, how willingly we will co-operate with him in his plans for our parish and how genuinely we wish God's blessing on all of his undertakings.

A Pity — All Waterford hurling lovers were very disappointed with last Sunday's All Ireland under 21 semi-final at Semple Stadium. Be we should have known that we weren't going to get away with our faulty tactical approach and lack of skill against Kilkenny. They were well-prepared, knew the Waterford approach — an obsession with lifting and "running at them" — and their own first touch and sweet striking were far superior to ours.

Kilkenny, I know from experience, take their preparation seriously (as do Waterford) but all of their training is so structured as to prepare them to play the type of quick accurate hurling that we saw last week-end.

I have watched lads like P. J. Delaney, Dermot Maher, Philly Larkin, Brian McEvoy, Brendan Ryan many times and the range of

skills and assured striking that we witnessed in Thurles on Sunday last came as no surprise to me. And all of their hurling gifts weren't acquired overnight.

Why were Waterford so far behind do you think? Your answer and mine may not agree but I think that no matter how many videos you study or what lessons they reveal you will effect no change in your playing strategy unless you use the training ground productively: that you train as you hope to play. Even then it was futile to expect our players who had a certain approach to the game of hurling throughout the Under 21 campaign to suddenly alter that pattern over two or three weeks prior to an All Ireland semi-final.

One thing is inevitable, when pressure comes on in the big game you revert to the former failed practices and routines with a consequent plummeting of confidence. With respect I must disagree with "Commentator" when I hold in high regard. He asserted when previewing the game that our chances "depend on attitude and the commitment of the fifteen players over the hour". Our players commitment and attitude were, to my mind, always beyond reproach but the weaknesses, failings and shortcomings which were crystal clear in all our games (winning ones remember) were cruelly exposed on the superb Thurles sod, which facilitated first touch and crisp striking, by a team who were preparing for just such a test over many, many years of honing and refining the essential simple skills of hurling.

KILMORE WATER SUPPLY

Waterford County Council are to carry out an investigation into the short supply of water at Kilmore, Tallow.

Benefitting from this supply are residents of eight private houses and one farmer. However, problems at this pump-house arose five years ago, and after discussion at a Council meeting improvements were carried out. The residents who have complained say they have no water for long parts of the day and get a supply at an early hour in the morning.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell taking up the problem said the overseer for the area Mr. James Ryan who has done his very best to keep up a supply here in recent years stated that the supply at Kilmore is drying up. Cllr. McDonnell contacted the Co. Engineer who in turn wrote back saying the matter of short-supply of water at Kilmore will be fully investigated this week before the next Council Meeting.

Call For Co-Ordinated Training For Newcomers To Sport Horse Production

Speaking at the 1994 Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show in the RDS recently, the President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said the level of farmer involvement in the non-thoroughbred horse industry has increased in recent years. Mr. O'Dwyer said however that there must be an increased emphasis on quality and training if farmers are to succeed in this area. He called on the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Teagasc and the Horse Board to co-ordinate this necessary training.

"Ireland has a strong reputation for thoroughbreds and sport horses. The sport horse tradition is evidenced by the high level of quality entries for this year's Kerrygold Horse Show and in particular our international reputation is reflected in the quality and number of overseas entries at this year's show.

FARMERS ADVISED TO BUY QUALITY MARES

"However in my view there is always room for improvement and what is required, now that there is a

renewed interest in the industry, is a planned programme to ensure that all newcomers receive training in quality, breeding and in marketing," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He said that more and more farmers are acquiring brood mares and that there are a number of equine schemes which financially support sport horse production for farmers.

"Farmers planning to invest in brood mares should ensure that they receive the best advice possible so that they produce top quality foals. There is no point in a farmer becoming involved in sport horse production unless he buys in quality breeding stock. In my view Teagasc, the Department of Agriculture and the Horse Board all have a role to play in co-ordinating a quality, training and information programme for farmers.

"Quality is the key word in sport horse production. Quality breeding and training are essential to continue this great tradition and ensure a good return on investment," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

ICMSA Welcomes New Environmental Rule For Sheep Farmers

A move by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry to discourage overgrazing of commonage by sheep farmers has been welcomed by the ICMSA.

The ICMSA has welcomed the decision of the Department of Agriculture, Food & Forestry to introduce a new condition to the ewe premium which requires sheep farmers who are not participating in the REPS Scheme and who are grazing their sheep on commonage, not to graze additional numbers on the designated area during the period November to April 30.

Sheep farmers who have grazing rights on commonage in parts of counties Galway, Mayo, Sligo, Leitrim, Donegal and Kerry which have been classified as degraded under REPS, must either participate in REPS or else sign an undertaking at the time of leasing or purchasing additional quota that none of the extra ewes will be grazed on the design-

ated areas during the period November to April 30.

CHANGES IN EWES PREMIUM REQUIREMENT TO FIT IN WITH REPS

Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamon O'Rourke said that this extra condition will only affect farmers with grazing rights in these areas and said that it is absolutely essential for the success of REPS that farmers operating outside of the Scheme are not allowed to impede the environmental regeneration which should flow from farmers participating in REPS.

Mr. O'Rourke concluded by saying that it is absolutely essential that farmers in these areas adopt a sensible approach to the environment. If the natural vegetation continues to be degraded due to overstocking then eventually a time will come when these mountains will be unable to support any ewes and everyone will be worse off.

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

Mr. John Cusack, County Chairman, said that ICMSA expects its 4.5% milk quota case to be heard in late October, or early November, of this year.

The County Chairman said that the Court of Justice in Luxembourg has made an Order that the five cases (which include Tom Cronin, Ardmore, Waterford and President Tom O'Dwyer, Slieverue, Co. Kilkenny in the South East region) being taken by ICMSA on behalf of all Irish dairy farmers are to be heard by the Third Chamber of the Court. The Third Chamber is made up of three Judges and the names of the three Judges will be known in September when the Court resumes after the summer recess.

The ICMSA lodged its challenge to the Court of Justice in Luxembourg against the EU Commission

in February 1993. The Association is challenging the right of the Commission to suspend, without compensation, 4.5% of our national milk quota amounting to 51 million gallons and is seeking full reinstatement of the suspended quota, or compensation for this suspension in the 1992/93 year at the rate of £20m p.a. The quotas were suspended for two full quota years (92-93 and 93-94). We are now in the third year of suspension, without compensation. If the case to have the quota restored is not successful, ICMSA is seeking a proper buy-out scheme over five years which would amount to £100m for farmers.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Anne Kirwan, County Secretary, said that ICMSA have called for fair play for telephone users, pointing out that individuals telephoning Govern-

ment Departments should be charged the same telephone rates, irrespective of whether they are calling from Dublin, Donegal, Kerry or Wexford.

ICMSA has called on Telecom Eireann and the Government to introduce a system whereby all calls to Government offices are charged as a local call.

"This telephone discrimination must stop. All citizens deserve to be charged the same rates when they contact Government Departments, irrespective of where they live in the country. This is particularly relevant for farmers as more and more, they must contact the Department of Agriculture, Food & Forestry offices in Cavan, Castlebar and Portlaoise to make queries regarding premium and headage payments. These long distance calls

can be extremely costly as these offices are very busy and callers are often left holding before they receive attention. Even if the caller is not left holding, the complex nature of many of the queries can give rise to extended and in many cases, costly, phone calls," said the County Secretary.

Similarly, the Secretary says that services located in county towns should be accessible by phone at the same cost to all people living in the county, irrespective of distance from the county town. This is particularly relevant in some of the large counties which currently have a number of different STD areas.

"A basic principle should apply which is that all people should be charged the same amount for the same services irrespective of where they live in the country," concluded the County Secretary.

Predicting Farm Incomes — A Risky Business

— CON LUCY, CHIEF ECONOMIST, IFA

IFA's Chief Economist, Con Lucy, casts a wary eye over the past year's vagaries in the farm income forecasting business and concludes that there is a long fall from politicians' expectation to the harsh reality.

Several ingredients go into the calculation of national farm income. Firstly, there are the product prices for the range of products produced by farmers, from the major items like milk and beef to the lesser items such as mushrooms and eggs.

Secondly, the volume of output of these products must be estimated. Thirdly, the price and volume of a range of inputs and services purchased by farmers must be estimated. Finally, the value of direct payments, such as headage and premia, received by farmers, and the amount of levies paid by farmers must be taken into account. The Central Statistics Office, as the official source of statistical data in Ireland, undertakes this exercise annually, and published its comprehensive statement on "Output, input and income in Agriculture" about mid-year for the preceding year. For example, the CSO's final estimate for 1993 farm income was published on July 26, 1994.

Clearly, neither the Minister of Agriculture and his Department, on the one hand, or IFA on the other hand, would be prepared to wait for six or seven months after year-end to

make a prediction of the farm income trend for the year. The information vacuum has been reduced by the fact that in recent years the CSO publishes its "Advance Estimate" on farm income for the year usually around the first week of December; this information is required by the EU as an input into its annual farm price review.

It is fair to say that in years when farm incomes are looking bad, IFA is likely to be bringing this fact to public and government attention, probably from mid-year onwards and backed up with an estimate of the likely income trend. Similarly, in years when the farm income trend is looking healthy, the Minister for Agriculture feels compelled to bring the good news to the public as early and often as possible. 1993 was the best recent example of such a year and farmers have vivid memories of Mr. Walsh's confident predictions last Autumn that farm incomes were expected to increase in 1993 by 15-20%.

It is worth recalling the main milestones in the saga of shrinking farm incomes for 1993:

Nov. 1993: Min. for Agriculture: up 15-20%; Dec. 1993: CSO Advance Estimate: up 8.2%; Feb. 1994: CSO Preliminary Estimate: up 4.0%; July 1994: CSO Final Estimate: up 2.8%.

As Hamlet said: "What a falling off was there." This level of margin of error is unacceptably wide, particu-

larly when the source of the first predictions, the Minister for Agriculture, is seen as an authoritative source by the media and the general public. And, of course, the original error was repeated many times in the national media at the time, but the final "adjusted" real figure received barely a couple of column inches of print.

The picture of "boom and bloom" in relation to agriculture painted by the Minister for Agriculture is particularly misleading to the other sectors of the economy. Average incomes of employees increased by about 5% in 1993, and Trade union spokesmen were quick to take the lead from Joe Walsh and point out that farm incomes were set to increase at 3 or 4 times the rate of wage increase in 1993. With the wisdom of hindsight we all now know that the percentage farm income increase in 1993 was not much more than half the percentage in average wages.

I must acknowledge that,

approaching the end of 1993, a farm income increase of about 8%-10% i.e. close to the CSO's first estimate, did seem on the cards. However, a number of factors combined to undermine these expectations. Firstly, the amount of premia and headage paid out by the end of December was £25m-£30m. lower than anticipated. In addition, the volume of cattle output was lower than expected, usage of compound feed was higher than expected and the tillage harvest turned out worse than indicated by the first estimates.

However, the 15%-20% increase predicted by the Minister was never likely, despite the significant boost to product prices which were a consequence of the currency devaluation at the beginning of 1993. There is obviously a lesson to be learned from the 1993 experience, and IFA anticipates a more cautious and realistic approach from the Minister for Agriculture in relation to farm income prospects for 1994.



ATHLETICS BY RACE LEADER

Local Athletes Of The Distant Past



JAMES WALSH

On the tenth anniversary of the death of James Walsh, Boston, U.S.A. and a native of Ballinagoul, Ring, we recall the athletic feats and life story of a man who it was said must have been the John Treacy of his time. Also a ballad about Dungarvan born Patrick Keohan has been forwarded by Donal Regan, Coffee Shop, O'Connell St., who, last year, was visited by the relations of this local weight thrower of the late 1800's when they were tracing their family ancestry in the Dungarvan area.

WON RACES WORLD WIDE

Jim Walsh was born in Ring, Co. Waterford in 1887 and as a young man his prowess as an athlete in events over distances from one to three miles made him a noted figure. He started running competitively without the advantage of coaching or team support at the age of 17 and won the one mile National Championship event in Dublin in 1904.

Two years later, like many other young Irishmen in those days, he joined the British Army and from 1906 to 1912 he ran and won races in the many parts of the world where his Battalion was stationed. Titles which he won in those years included the mile and two miles national champi-

onships in India and Burma and the fact that he was able to return 4 minutes 20 seconds for the mile shows that he must have been the John Treacy of his time.

He left the British Army and emigrated to the U.S. in 1913 and there he took on the finest runners in America over those distances and beat them all.

In 1917 when America entered the First World War, Jim was back in uniform with the U.S. forces. He served in France and there he maintained his unbeaten record in a number of major track events.

Back again in the U.S. after the war, Jim went to live in Beverly in 1920. He got married there in 1921 and lived there for the remainder of his life, serving until he retired, on the city police force.

Jim Walsh was indeed an outstanding man and a world class athlete and it is only proper for us to recall the great feats of this man who was born in Ballinagoul, Ring (now Harty's) 97 years ago on the occa-

sion of his death which surely marks the end of an era.

He was well-known in his

native locality for, after a long initial absence, he made contact with his family relatives and after that,

paid regular visits back to see his brother, Mr. William Walsh, Post Office, Ring, and the other members of

the family.

He is survived in the States by his family of five sons and one daughter.

THE GUEST OF HONOUR — JIM WALSH —

Tonight, the Beverly Track Boosters Club pays tribute to the "Grand Old Man" of Beverly Track, Jim Walsh. A familiar figure at all our events, he has been involved in and supportive of track in this city for the past sixty years.

Born in Ring, Co. Waterford, Ireland in 1887, Jim started running competitively when 17 years old without the advantages of coaching or team. He won the National Championship one mile race in Dublin in 1904.

Serving in the British Army from 1906 to 1912, Jim ran and won races

all over the world. Stationed in India, he held the mile and two mile championships of India and Burma for two years.

In those far-off days, running the mile in 4 minutes, 20 seconds as Jim did, was quite an achievement.

He arrived in the U.S. in 1913, lived in Lynn and worked for G.E. In 1915, he participated in a special 3 mile race in that city, which featured Jimmy Hennigan and many of the finest runners of that time. Jim beat them all.

Back in uniform, he served with the U.S. Army in France in 1917. Jim par-

ticipated in all of the major track events "over there". At a special 4th of July 1917 meet at St. Nazare, he beat everyone, including the 1916 Boston Marathon winner, Bill Kennedy in the 3 mile race. He also won at the Giant Inter-Allied meet in Paris in 1918.

Jim came to Beverly in 1920 and has lived with us since then, serving on the city police force.

Beverly old timers still talk about the American Legion meet of July 4, 1921, which pitted Jim against Fred Fopiano in a special 3 mile event which was won by Jim.

ALL IRELAND SEMI-FINAL DEFEAT

Deise Side Outclassed By Brilliant Kilkenny

KILKENNY 2-21

WATERFORD 3-6

In a spectacular display of skill and style, Kilkenny's brilliant under 21 hurling team overpowered Waterford in the All Ireland semi-final in a game that was decided long before the final whistle sounded at Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday evening last.

The winners showed themselves to be the masters of the art of point scoring and seldom have we seen such a display of accurate shooting from all angles and positions on the field, as we did here on Sunday.

Waterford showed great promise in the opening minutes when Paul Foley goaled following a splendid move involving four players, but our control was to

be short lived after the 'Cats' settled and more or less, having taken our measure, set about scoring the sixteen points which gave them an eight points advantage at half time.

Eoin Crowley's goal in the 26th minute, brought our half time score to 2-2, our points being shot over by Paul Flynn, who had been very well policed all through the half by his op-

posite number Sean Meally.

The dominance of Maher and McEvoy in the middle of the field caused us untold problems and left our defence under severe first half pressure while at the same time very few balls went in to our forwards who were left idle for long periods.

A reshuffle did little to solve our problems and Kilkenny continued to dominate throughout the second half, but managed only five points in addition to their two goals by Byrne and Brendan Ryan. Eoin Crowley's second goal, came in the 51st minute after some splendid play all the way out of our defence, but this made no impression on our deficit any more than did the second half points by Paul Flynn (2), Tony Browne and Paul Foley.

Having been well and decisively beaten by such an outstanding side as Kilkenny were on the night, we can offer no excuses and I'm sure no one will try to. But there must be reasons why the team did not play as well as in the Munster final and I'm sure the selectors will take a long and hard look at the way the team performed.

There was no question of players not giving of their very best in the game, every one of the 18 who played tried her heart out, but this was just not enough.

Something to remember is the fact that the same Kilkenny team were the All Ireland minor hurling champions three years ago and the majority of the team had played in the drawn All Ireland under 21 final and replay last year. It will also be a little consoling when we realise that 12 of our panel are still underage for next years championship as well as the full panel of our minors who went to the All Ireland minor final in 1992.

I'm sure the same five county selectors will contin-

ue to work with the panel, they having managed the minors in '92. It would make sense that they continue and hopefully, they will.

In the stadium, Waterford supporters must have outnumbered their counterparts by three to one. This was indicated by the roar when the teams came out on the field. The absence of a band for the occasion was commented upon and many people justifiably complained about this.

A very nice tribute to the late Tom Scanlon was delivered over the public address and a minute's silence observed in his memory before the game got underway.

TRAFFIC CHAOS

The traffic chaos which resulted after the game left very many people arriving home very late and this again highlights the unsuitability of Thurles for late evening matches. Much of the traffic was in the town an hour and a quarter after the game ended.

Games In All Grades Listed On Full Programme

All going well over the coming weekend, the league sections of the football championship in both divisions will be completed and the county fixtures committee will be free to arrange their play-off matches before going into the knock-out stages.

The meeting of arch rivals, Kilrossanty and Stradbally will be the big one this coming weekend and should attract a very large crowd to Fraher Field.

Likewise the game between the Nire and St. Saviours which is scheduled for Monday in Dungarvan, is also very attractive but highly unlikely to attract a big crowd.

Among the other fixtures likely to attract big support will be the senior hurling clash between Lismore and Ballygunner which is fixed for Fraher Field on Saturday evening. Saturday evening is not proving to be the most popular time for a big game because of the Saturday evening Masses which are being availed of by people wishing to have Sunday free and hopefully from here on in, the majority of our attractive fixtures will be arranged for Sundays.

Stradbally v. Kilrossanty

It would take something of a miracle to get Kilrossanty back into contention for a place in the play-off stages and by my reckoning this is not going to happen, but just the same the sight of the red jersey will be enough to motivate them into going all out to win this one for several reasons.

There is prestige at stake. They each like to count the number of times that they beat each other in the championship like others who like to count the number of titles won. They regard victory against each other as next in importance to winning a title, hence the intensity of the rivalry between them.

Kilrossanty are coming to the end of what must be a disappointing year even though they won the 1993 Under-21 football title in the late Spring of this year. They were beaten by Dungarvan, Gaultier and the Nire, having defeated Ballinacourty and Rathgormack and drawn with St.

Saviours. They played good football against St. Saviours and they looked well capable of reaching the concluding stages of the championships. Their scoring ability is not all that bad as they are averaging approximately 10 points per game (most of them from the boot of inter-county player Jim Maher), but their goal-scoring record is the worst of the championship so far. They have failed to score a single goal in five of their six matches played. They got two against Ballinacourty in their last game and these are the only major scores recorded by the team since last year. An improvement in this aspect of things could mean a change of fortune for the Comeragh Club.

Stradbally began the championship very well, when beating the new champions, the Nire by 1-12 to 3-4 in more decisive fashion than the scoreline indicates. Like Kilrossanty they drew with St. Saviours and then having inflicted a fourteen points beating on Ballinacourty, went on to defeat the fancied Dungarvan by 10 points. Then they suffered one of their biggest flops in recent times by losing to Gaultier by a whopping eleven points.

On last night, Tuesday, they were due to play Rathgormack in another vital game and the outcome of that one was also of vital importance as if they lost and then were beaten by Kilrossanty here on Sunday evening, their hopes of a title this year would be well and truly dashed.

What the standard of football in this one will be remains to be seen, but as a contest it should prove to be one of the best we have had so far. Stradbally will start favourites because of their position on the league table, but so far it certainly has not been a year for favourites.

St. Saviours v. Nire

A decisive game for both clubs. It is their final game in the league section and as of now they are separated by just a couple of points on the league table. Nire, the county champions have 8 and the challengers here have six. A win for the champions will put them safely through, but a win for

Saviours will bring them level and earn them a chance of a play-off. It has been so long since the teams met in the championship that it is difficult to make a comparison. Interestingly Saviours and the Nire are the only teams to have beaten the leaders at the moment, Gaultier, this year. The venue might be a slight advantage to the Nire, and maybe enough to swing the result in their favour.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP Lismore v. Ballygunner

This very attractive game is scheduled for Fraher Field on Saturday evening and is sure to bring the crowds who have been waiting for the hurling championships to restart.

The sides involved are among the leading contenders for the title and regardless of the result here, both will be still involved.

Lismore's 5-16 scored from play against Passage, was probably the best performance we have seen from a senior hurling team so far this year and if this form can be repeated, they could overcome the strong challenge from the 'Gunnerys.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP Eire Óg v. Ballinacourty

This game has excited quite an amount of interest around the locality over the past week and it should provide a very exciting contest when it gets underway at Fraher Field on Tuesday evening next. Ballinacourty will be favourites, but Eire Óg are certainly not lacking in confidence — and who knows!

Kilboginet v. Ballyduff

This is scheduled for Cappoquin on Friday evening and should result in a close contest, with Kilboginet just shading the verdict at the finish.

With accommodation down by approximately 10,000 for the hurling All Ireland, all counties will receive a reduced allocation this time round. Recently a committee was set up by the County Board to decide on the new club allocation for this year, taking into account the overall reduction. It is predicted that the numbers travelling up from the county will be smaller than usual and that the demand for tickets will not be great. Two very poor semi-finals did little to arouse enthusiasm for the final between Limerick and Offaly.

The End Of The Road

Our interest on the inter-county championship scene ended at Semple Stadium, Thurles, on Sunday evening with the defeat of our under-21 hurling team by old rivals, Kilkenny.

In fact the result marks the end of the season for all inter-county activity until the National Leagues commence on Sunday, October 9.

Following on to the arguments about the rights and wrongs of postponing club championship games when a substitute on a county team was involved, I did an amount of research into the matter and came up with the following interesting facts:

We have played a total of 22 inter-county championship and national leagues matches this year since our season began with the playing of the Waterford/Sligo NFL match on Sunday, February 6. These were made up of 3 NFL games, 1 McGrath Cup match and one SFC game (5), 4 NHL matches and one SHC game (5); 1 JHC; 1 JFC; 3 Under-21 FC games; 3 U-21-H championship and 2 each in minor football and hurling. Abiding by regulations we would have been allowed to carry a total of 198 substi-

tutes for all these matches, but according to the records available, and which I have checked, only 170 subs travelled in all. A total of 57 were 'used' and the remaining 113 were surplus to our requirements on the days of the matches.

I have no doubt but that they were needed by the selectors to be a part of the overall training, etc. and I am not making the case for reducing the permitted number of 9 subs per match, but I am making the point that club championship games should not be cancelled, postponed or changed in any way because a substitute is involved.

Club games have been called off because a substitute who did not have any chance whatever of being introduced into a county match was involved and everyone knows the extent of the interruption which this practice has caused to the championships which are presently running behind schedule.

This policy is also the reason why senior championship games have to be played on week evenings and causing untold inconvenience to club personnel.

Sliabh gCua On Top

Sliabh gCua 2-9, Butlerstown 0-14

Although out of the running for a place in the knockout stages of the senior football championship, Sliabh gCua went all out to finish their 1994 campaign on a winning note and after a splendid second half display against the luckless Butlerstown, they succeeded. Butlerstown who badly needed the two points to bring them level with Kilmacthomas and give them an outside chance of being in a play-off, looked like succeeding after leading by 0-7 to 0-4 at half time.

They scored a further seven points in the second half, but it was not enough after Whelan and Hallinan had two splendid goals for the Western team in the last quarter of this very competitive and enjoyable game which marked the end of the season for both.
