## Urban Renewal Interest Heightens

The much publicised and eagerly anticipated public information meeting on the New Urban Renewal Scheme was strongly attended last Monday evening as public interest in the scheme and its benefits came to a height.

Local contingents of landowners, property developers both U.D.C. and Co. Council members, investors and interested Dungarvan residents all swarmed to the Park Hotel venue to satisfy their curiosity and learn what they could of what could possibly be described as the most exciting development ever to affect the Deise capital.

In all, the information evening organised by the Dungarvan U.D.C. in association with Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry Ltd., was a huge success and if the generated public interest and packed attendance is anything to go by, it certainly bodes well for the future development of the scheme.

### LONG LASTING BENEFITS

Formally launching the Urban Renewal Scheme in Dungarvan the Junior Minister for Food and Horticulture Brian O'Shea, T.D., said designation under the scheme gives the community in Dungarvan a unique opportunity to develop the area in a way which will have a long lasting benefit for the people of the town.

Dungarvan has been making a case for designation under the urban renewal scheme for a number of years and this years Ministerial decision to include our town was greatly influenced, Minister O'Shea felt, by the case made by public representatives for the area, by the officials of the U.D.C.

Waterford County Council and by the people of Dungarvan itself.

Continuing his speech, Minister O'Shea pointed to the areas of decay and neglect prevalent in the town. "There is a high degree of dereliction for one reason or

another and a lot of older buildings are in urgent need of up-grading", he stated.

The scheme, however, the Minister went on, is geared to ensure that as many old buildings as possible are refurbished and brought back

## Stronger Garda Presence Needed

Following a recent crime spree in the areas of Rathgormack, Leamybrien and Ballymacarbry, Waterford County Council has called on the Minister for Justice, Maire Geoghegan-Quinn and the Garda Commissioner to increase the Garda force in rural stations throughout the county.

Moving the motion at last Monday's Council meeting, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said that people in rural areas were living in fear in view of the long winter ahead and warned that law and order would break down if Garda presence was not increased. At present one member of the Garda Siochana is stationed in Rathgormack, two in Ballymacarbry, and one in Leamybrien.

Declaring that this situation was 'just not on', Cllr. Coffey said that rural areas in particular were very vulnerable - common knowledge to criminals.

On a more positive note, however, the Fine Gael Councillor welcomed the Justice Minister's letter to the Council regarding the

expected increase in Garda recruitment. 407 Gardai are to be recruited in 1994 while 3 additional judges are to be appointed.

Between 1995 and 1997 there will be an annual intake of 350 Gardai and an additional 210 prison places will be provided. These measures are only part of the comprehensive package of Law and Order measures which is designed to improve the effectiveness of the Garda Siochana in the fight against crime.

The letter states the Minister is satisfied that the introduction of these measures will go a long way to reducing crime in both urban and rural areas.

**LAWLESS SOCIETY.**  
Seconding Cllr. Coffey's

proposal, Cllr. Ciaran O'Riain said the stark reality of these recent raids on business premises was that they keep on recurring and the "criminals and gangsters were never apprehended". Calling for much stronger action, Cllr. O'Riain declared that people living in rural Ireland were 'frightened, tense and fearful': "We are in a lawless society where law and order has broken down completely", he further stated.

Continuing the irate Nire Valley Councillor said that although numerous representations had been made to the Justice Minister to stop closing down rural Garda stations, the campaign was pointless if the stations

were not manned on a regular basis.

### INVOLUNTARY MILITARY SERVICE

"People seem to think that they can do what they like", the angry Councillor went on and sharply added that a 2 year involuntary military service would "knock a few corners" off potential criminals.

### CALL FOR SECOND JUDGE

Agreeing with Councillors Coffey and O'Riain that a major crisis existed in rural areas due to insufficient Garda resources, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran (F.G.) also proposed that a second judge be appointed to the South East area, which at present he added, was too much for one man.

## Excellent JNLR Figures For WLR FM

Where did you hear about the course?

I heard about it from students who did the course last year.

Why did you choose Dungarvan Technical College?

I was interested in Engineering and knew that it was a major part of the course in the Technical College.

Could you describe the course briefly?

We do a lot of practical work on projects in Woodwork and Engineering. We also made candle stick holders and Christmas stands, and a large number of other craft projects in our practical engineering. The subjects are Engineering, English, Maths, Business Organisation,

Motor Car Maintenance, Science and Computers, (CAD) Computer Aided Design. We go on work experience each Thursday for the entire year. It is broken up into eleven week periods with different employers. At the end of the first period, if you are happy where you are working, you will be allowed to remain in that work place. If you are particularly interested, for example, in plumbing, engineering or maintenance, the school will place you with a suitable employer where possible.

Do you travel to places of interest on the course?

We go on day trips to FAS and to factories to see laser and other specialised equipment.

Is the course of benefit to you?

It is a great benefit to each student as the practical work is especially good. I also find the work experience beneficial and very relevant to my future plans.

Are you enjoying the course?

Yes, it is great to be doing something positive for your career and to enjoy it at the same time.

Has the course developed your skills?

I have learned a lot of practical skills which were not taught in my previous school, and improved the skills I'd acquired at school.

How do you think it could be improved?

I am happy with the course the way it is, but I would like more visits to factories and other relevant places.

Would you recommend it to your friends?

I would recommend it to my friends because, as well as learning a variety of practical skills, we benefit from producing items for sale through a mini-company and the big plus is that the majority of students succeed in getting employment, as a large number of employers in the area contact D.T.C. for apprenticeships.

What are your future career plans?

I hope to get an apprenticeship with a plumber. I would really like to go into the area of security in the long term, but a trade is also necessary for me.

# Final Phase Of Dungarvan Draft Development Plan

On public display for the past three months, the Dungarvan Draft Development Plan 1994, has now reached its final phase as UDC members met last Wednesday to discuss amendments to the plan as submitted by a number of urban rate payers.

The 5 year draft development plan for Dungarvan was formally adopted by the Urban Council in May last and in the intervening 3 month period, a total of eight submissions had been made to Town Planner, John Reid.

## NO MAJOR CHANGES

Addressing the special meeting of Dungarvan UDC, held in the Council Chambers, Mr. Reid stated that the various submissions did not represent any 'major changes' to the draft plan. No oral hearing had been requested by any of the 8 parties involved, though discussions had been held with Mr. Reid.

Outlining each representation, Mr. Reid then explained to members which submissions he had included in the plan and those he had felt were already covered by existing paragraphs.

His recommendations to the Council as Town Planner would ultimately be decided upon by Council members.

## USEFUL

### AMENDMENTS

The various representations were made by local landowner, Con Dempsey, architect, Cllr. Damien Dillon, Dungarvan based solicitor, Joseph P. Gordon, Paddy Lannen, Colette O'Connell, the Office of Public Works, the Southern Regional Fisheries Board and the Urban District Council.

Describing the various submissions as 'positive and useful', Mr. Reid said it was good to get a reaction

from the public when so much hard work had been involved in the 5 year draft plan.

## CLLR. DILLON

Those to be included as proposed amendments to the plan as submitted by Cllr. Dillon are;

- that the Council provide a public toilet in the town centre suitable for use by the disabled,

- that the Council provide serviced sites for the development of individual private houses,

- that the development of marina activities be encouraged such as the recent addition of a pontoon to Dungarvan harbour,

- that the Council provide serviced industrial sites for new, small scale enterprises,

- that the Council encourage the adaptation for small industries and crafts of disused and underused buildings of character,

- that the Council take all steps to ensure that there is adequate signposting in the field of tourism and leisure.

It was recommended by the Town Planner that submissions made by Paddy Lannon, Colette O'Connell and Con Dempsey be not included in the plan as their suggestions were already covered by existing paragraphs.

The only objection encountered in the public feed-back pertained to no. 21 Church Street, which solicitor Joseph P. Gordon felt should be excluded from the listing whereby houses in the terrace line were to be protected due to their historical nature.

Mr. Reid however, recommended that the Council did not accept Mr. Gordon's rejection and that the line of houses be kept as is.

## OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS

Having carried out a comprehensive archaeology survey recently of County Waterford, the Office of Public Works has now delineated three zones of archaeological potential.

These are the general town centre area westwards as far as Gallows Hill wherein the Norman and medieval town grew, the Shandon area wherein the original Viking settlement of Dungarvan may have been sited and the area surrounding the Abbey at Abbeyside wherein there was a settlement from medieval times onwards.

These three areas are to be included as map 2 in the draft plan with the amendments;

- that the Council will take all steps to ensure that archaeological material is not unduly damaged or destroyed. In the three zones of archaeological potential and find-spots, appraisal and recording of material by an on-site archaeologist will be required as part of the development process,

- that the Council take all steps to ensure the retention of the medieval street pattern of the town,

- that the remains of the medieval house at the east side of Castle Street be retained.

Reacting to the OPW's submissions, Cllr. Damien Dillon expressed his reservations at the need for an on-site archaeologist in the three protected zones. "Archaeologists are hard to come by", declared the local architect, adding that the submission would represent yet another obstacle on the route to obtaining full planning permission for private and industrial development.

Sharing Cllr. Dillon's concern, Cllr. Austin Flynn pointed to the major expense of hiring an archaeologist for couples building their own home, etc.

Mr. Reid then moved on to the submission made by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board which called for the rehabilitation of Ballyneety landfill site. The Town Planner explained however, that this would not be included in the draft plan as the site pertained to the Co. Waterford area, not the Dungarvan urban area.

## URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

The amendments to the displayed plan as submitted by Dungarvan UDC are as proposed at an earlier Council meeting by Cllr. Dillon, i.e. that the Council will seek to provide serviced sites for both the industrial and private sectors.

Also written into the plan is a welcoming statement by the UDC regarding Dungarvan's inclusion under the Urban Renewal Scheme.

"Approximately 4 hectares (10 acres) of land in the town centre have been designated for development.... the Council welcomes this designation".

Concluding his detailed report, Mr. Reid said that should the Council adopt his recommendations, the amendments would then go on public display for another month.

Following much discussion, Cllr. Nuala Ryan subsequently proposed to adopt the amendments as recommended by Town Planner, Mr. Reid. The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Lar Hart.

Ending the meeting, UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne thanked Mr. Reid for his comprehensive report delivered in a "clear, succinct style" and also the public for their valuable input.

The adopted amendment of the draft development plan will now be on public display for a period of one month until September 26th at the Town Hall, Dungarvan, during office hours.

## Advice To Flockowners

Sheep Scab is an important ectoparasitic condition affecting sheep. As well as its economic importance, the disease poses a major welfare problem in flocks — infected sheep suffer intense itching, produce a poor lambing crop, less wool and may die. Finishing lamb growth rates are reduced and skins are often severely damaged. The disease is extremely contagious.

Following on a condition of the Programme for Competitiveness and Work, the national compulsory sheep dipping programme has been dropped. Based on experience in Britain and Northern Ireland, this is likely to result in a large increase in the number of sheep scab outbreaks.

Plunge dipping in diazinon, propetamophos or flumethrin based dip formulations still offers the only fully effective method of controlling sheep scab combined with activity against other sheep ectoparasites.

Sheep owners are advised to dip their flocks. Any bought-in sheep should get particular attention and should not be mixed with the main flock without dipping.

Sheep scab remains a notifiable disease, and flockowners have a statutory duty to report any suspect outbreaks to the Local Authority.

# Cheese & Veg -In A Pie



Economical ingredients make a really unusual and impressive centrepiece for a picnic or summer buffet.

#### Ingredients:

#### Filling

2 medium potatoes  
3 large carrots  
2 onions  
2 sticks celery  
1½ oz (40g) butter  
2 oz (50g) frozen peas  
6 oz (150g) cheddar cheese, grated

#### Herb Pastry:

12 oz (300g) plain flour  
good pinch salt  
1 level tbs of dried mixed herbs

6 oz (150g) butter  
cold water to mix

#### To Finish:

2 size 1 eggs  
¼ pt (150ml) milk  
salt and pepper

#### Method

Peel and thinly slice potatoes, carrots and onions. Scrub and chop celery. Fry gently in melted butter, stirring for 5 minutes until softened but not browned. Cool, then stir in peas and grated cheese.

For pastry, sift flour and salt and stir in herbs. Cut butter into small pieces and rub in with fingertips until mixture resembles fine bread-crumbs. Mix with enough cold water to form a firm



dough.

Knead gently on a lightly floured surface. Cut off one quarter of dough and reserve.

Roll out remainder and line an 18cm (7in) loose bottomed, round cake tin. Fill with cold vegetable mixture. Beat eggs and reserve 1 tbs for glazing. Beat milk into remainder and season well.

Pour over vegetables. Roll out reserved pastry to use as a "lid." Brush edges with water and lay in position. Press edges well together to seal, then crimp them between finger and thumb. Make "leaves" from pas-

try trimmings. Make a hole in centre of "lid" and lay "leaves" round it. Brush with reserved beaten egg to glaze. Cook in hot oven, 400°F, 200°C, Gas Mark 6, for 20 minutes. reduce heat to moderate 350°F, 180°C, Gas Mark 4 and cook further 1¼ hours, until vegetables are tender when a skewer is inserted through central hole. Cover lightly if pastry is over-browning during cooking. Leave to cool in tin for 30 minutes, then remove tin and leave to cool completely on a wire rack. Serves 6.

# Help your lawn recover from long summer

AFTER a long summer of pounding feet and sizzling heat, your lawn may need a spell in the 'recovery ward'. Fortunately, September is the ideal time to revive your piece of green before the onset of autumn and winter. Here's a step-by-step plan:

1. Mow less often as growth slows down and start to raise the blade height on your machine so that the grass grows thicker and tougher for the winter. Give extra help by applying a proprietary fertiliser if you wish.

2. Use a wire lawn rake or an electric rake/scarifier — a good investment if you have a lot of grass — to pick out 'thatch'.

#### Spongy

This spongy build up of dead grass, moss and other debris stops water and fertiliser reaching grass roots. It also harbours disease and pests, so it needs to be vigorously raked out — it's hard work with a wire rake, but well worth it.

3. Repair bald patches by either sowing new seed or cutting and switching around an existing piece of turf to repair, say, a crumbling edge to the lawn. But if you need to do major re-turfing you can leave that until later, right through until next April, except in really cold conditions.

4. Aerate the lawn by spiking with a fork to a depth of about four inches, slashing with a spade end, or running over it with a spiking tool — a rather vicious-looking rolling device with a cylinder of spikes.

Lawns become more heavily compacted by the frequent use during summer. Aeration will help drainage, particu-

larly on heavy clays, and also get air to the roots.

#### Drainage

On particularly soggy soils, you may need a hollow-tine fork. This device removes thin cores of soil to create bigger holes and better drainage.

5. Then apply a top dressing with a mix of loam, peat and sand. Many people say it should be done every year at this time to condition the soil and, certainly at least every other year.

An average soil needs a mix which is four parts loam, one of peat and two of sand. Heavier soils need less loam and more sand, while lightweight 'flyaway' soils need more peat to give them body.

#### Spiking

You will need a bucketful every couple of square yards, brushed into the holes left by your spiking, but don't leave patches of it on the surface — brush this onto the borders.

6. As leaves start to gather on the lawn, remove them promptly or they will cause the grass to fade.

It is much better to use a lawn rake to collect them and add to the compost heap or a separate heap aimed at producing leaf mould. Either way they will rot down into an excellent mulch or a soil food and conditioner.

# Respond's Proposed Development

Respond is a Housing Association formed as a Company with Charity status. Its principal object in the area of family housing is to create good estate environments in which families in need of housing can be accommodated and can provide for themselves efficient management and maintenance of their own estates and good relationships with residents in neighbouring estates.

Respond has now completed 14 housing estates in different counties in which this self reliant management system operates very successfully. By year's end Respond will have provided over 1000 dwellings country-wide.

Respond has proposed a 30-dwelling development in Dungarvan to the Local Authority at a cost of over £1 million. This development is designed to include a creche and pre-school facility. Most of our family estates also have such a communal facility. This development will house people who are now listed on

the Dungarvan housing list and who, otherwise, would be unlikely to be adequately housed for some time.

Like our other family housing estates, Respond would propose to put in place in Dungarvan a Tenant Management Board composed of the tenants themselves who are required to participate in a pre-tenancy management course to prepare them for this task. Included in the subsequent Management Agreement will be a strong budgeting and maintenance policy for the estate, as well as the provision of other training opportunities, such

as the Irish Pre-School Playgroup Association's course in child-care.

There is no cost to Dungarvan or its U.D.C. in this development. Respond will receive 100% mortgage under the Rental Subsidy Scheme. Respond does not have any vested interest in this development, all our directors receive no remuneration whatever for their work and Respond's full time Executive Director is a Franciscan seconded to the organisation, again without any remuneration.

Accordingly, Respond has indicated to the members of Dungarvan U.D.C. at a meeting of the members last Wednesday, that it is making its offer in good faith and has no intention in getting involved in any local political issues: that is a matter for the local councillors and their constituents. Our good faith would be

sufficiently reciprocated if our good name was not sullied during this political process.

Respond can wholeheartedly agree with Mr. Richard Branigan, Tenant Chairman of our Clonmel estate when he told the members of Dungarvan U.D.C. that he and his co-members of the Clonmel Board of Management are extremely happy with the running of the estate and he invited the Councillors to visit the estate and to meet the residents and see for themselves.

The pretty village of Ardfinnan was in a state of profound shock following the tragic death of a twenty-two year old local girl in a road traffic accident on the Cahir/Ardfinnan road on Sunday night, 21st August. The community was plunged into grief as news of the death of popular citizen Patricia Browne, Gravel Walk, Main Street, spread through the village. The crash took place just two miles from Cahir. Patricia Browne was pronounced dead on arrival at Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel. Lisa Hackett was transferred from Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel to the regional Hospital, Waterford on Monday morning.

The driver of the Volvo who was alone in his car, was admitted to Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel, where he is being held for observations.

The two girls had left the village an hour before the accident. They were great friends and socialised together at week-ends. Patricia worked as an assistant in Hacketts Shop in Ardfinnan.

Daughter of Alfred and Anne, Trish, as she was known to everybody was one of four children including her brothers Brendan and Declan and her sister Carmel, who was married recently. Trish was laid out in the bridesmaids dress she wore on her sister's wedding day.

On Monday her remains were removed to the Parish Church, Ardfinnan, where she attended Mass the previous day. It was the largest concourse of mourners seen for some time as all walks of life were present. A guard of honour was provided by An Foroige and the Ardfinnan Ladies Footballers of which she was a member.

On Tuesday morning, the Feast of St. Philip, Requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of her gentle soul.

After Mass the funeral took place to the New Cemetery, Ardfinnan, where a loving girl was laid to rest in the presence of another immense concourse of mourners, testifying to the esteem and high regard in which Patricia and her family are held. Friends and neighbours wept openly as they bade farewell to a dear Christian friend.

The stone for the grotto come from the chapel which stood in the Parochial Graveyard. The ground in front of the grotto is Liscannor Stone and the railings made by Tallow Engineering Works. The statute for the grotto was donated by The Presentation Convent, Lismore and had been in the Presentation Chapel since 1912. This gift is a most appropriate visible link with the Presentation Sisters who contributed so much to Lismore and surrounding areas for over 157 years (1836 - 1993).

A medal found beneath the statue commemorates the centenary of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia in 1909. The statue was placed in the grotto on the 10th August.

This beautiful grotto proudly takes its place among the grottos of Ireland which dot the countryside and which are a testimony to the people of Ireland's devotion to Mary the Mother of God.

On Thursday 8th September the grotto will be blessed by Rev. Wm. Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore at 7 p.m.

His great love was for the game of hurling and he played in the many juvenile grades with his beloved Affane-Cappoquin Club. His great talent was recognised in higher places as he was selected to represent his county in the under-14 grade. Those of us who knew Thomas well will long remember a nice pleasant and friendly boy who played the game of hurling with all the skill of a potential great.

The removal from his home to Affane Church on Sunday was a very poignant scene indeed. The remains were accompanied for the entire journey by his school-mates and teachers. The coffin, draped in the club colours, was borne shoulder-high by club members for the last few hundred yards of the sad journey. A guard of honour was formed by the many other club officers and members present.

The remains were received and blessed by Very Rev. Fr. Barron, P.P. The Church of St. John the Baptist was packed to capacity, hundreds more failed to gain admission and recited the prayers in the grounds of the church and on the road outside.

On Monday morning the chief celebrant of celebrated Mass was Fr. Barron who was assisted by the following clergy: Very Rev. Canon Queally, Very Rev. M. J. Ryan, P.P., Rev. Fr. Kelleher, C.C., Rev. # Urban Renewal Interest Heightens

into everyday use. "There are many older buildings here in the centre of Dungarvan which could, with imagination and flair, be reconstituted without damaging their character", the Labour Minister said.

### MAIN BENEFITS

The main benefits of the scheme, however, lies in its emphasis on residential development. There is a strong focus in the taxation incentives on refurbishment/conversion of existing buildings for residential purposes.

"Bringing people back to live in the centre of our towns is a vital step in achieving real urban renewal. It is only in this way that real and long lasting urban communities can be built up".

Minister O'Shea continuing said that the challenge now is to exploit the scheme's potential to the full in the limited time available. In this regard the former Waterford County Councillor advised the local authority to take an active role in promoting the scheme, in bringing landowners, developers and investors together, in sorting out planning problems, in helping with site assembly and in carrying out environmental improvements where possible, in and around the area where it is hoped to encourage development.

Concluding his speech, Minister O'Shea said "I am confident that the scheme we are launching in Dungarvan this evening will bring new life and prosperity to the town provided that the local authority, the business community, property owners and everyone else involved, work in partnership and commit themselves to a successful outcome".

### OTHER IMPORTANT PROJECTS

M.C. Eddie Holohan and Chairman of the chambers sub development committee, then introduced Dungarvan's first citizen, Cllr. Billy Kyne, chairman of Dungarvan Urban District Council. Heartened by the great turnout present, Cllr. Kyne first spoke of three different projects which the U.D.C., in some cases had initiated, always supported and continued to strive for a successful conclusion.

The first is the allocation of £1.1 million for a major reconstruction programme at Dungarvan Technical College. The architect has been selected and the design team is now being assembled.

Likewise Health Minister Brendan Howlin, T.D. has sanctioned £100,000 towards the planning of a

26 bed unit at St. Josephs Hospital, Dungarvan.

When finalised, Cllr. Kyne reported that these projects will deliver £2.1 million of new health and educational facilities to the town and West Waterford.

### NEW TREATMENT PLANT

Under the more direct planning and control of both the U.D.C. and Co. Council, Cllr. Kyne spoke of the Dungarvan Development Plan 1994 - 1999 and the Dungarvan Harbour Water Quality Management Plant being commissioned by E.G. Pettit and Co.

Expressing his hopes for the introduction of a new waste water treatment plant, Cllr. Kyne said "the Water Quality Management Plant and the treatment plant requirement were both interlinked and are critical in his view for the future development of the town harbour and surrounding areas.

The proposed joint venture between Waterford Co. Council and Waterford Foods is evidently the ideal model to obtain the estimated £16 million for this much needed facility. Cllr. Kyne continued, "the treatment plant will have more than an environmental dividend as it can help existing employment and can be marketed as a major attraction towards future industrial investment".

On a financial scale alone the 3 projects represent a potential investment of £18 million and according to the U.D.C. Chairman, complement the urban renewal scheme.

### COMMITMENT AND CO-OPERATION

Turning to the issue of urban renewal, Cllr. Kyne stressed the importance of commitment and co-operation between the local authority and business interests.

While being competitive, business interests must, however, accept the need for local possibly even regional co-operation - if Dungarvan is to be the winner.

The Labour Councillor said it was his commitment that the U.D.C. be 'pro-active' in pressing the objectives of the urban renewal scheme in the limited time allowed i.e. 3 years. The launch, he felt, is just the first step.

Meaningful Employment While the rejuvenation of Dungarvan will help create meaningful employment, Cllr. Kyne stressed the ever important need to protect existing jobs and services.

"Together let us commit ourselves to make this joint venture between the U.D.C. and the Chamber of Commerce the springboard to the successful implementation of the urban renewal scheme". Concluding his speech, Cllr. Kyne reiterated the Dept. of Environments theme - 'New Life For Your Town'.

### NEW PAGE OF HISTORY

Next to take the podium was President of the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, John Walsh.

Congratulating the Local Authority on the appointment of Acting Town Clerk Ray Moloney as co-ordinating officer for the new scheme, Mr. Walsh further commended the work of the local authorities, Dan Hurley, Bertie White, Urban Councillors and politicians for their valuable contribution in winning this important incentive for Dungarvan.

With regards to Urban Renewal, Mr. Walsh believed the Chamber and the U.D.C., working as a team, "will play a significant part in realising the positive aspirations of this scheme".

Fully endorsing the exciting new scheme, the chamber President said the U.D.C., the Chamber of Commerce and the townspeople had the opportunity to write a new page of Dungarvan history and "make up for centuries of neglect" so as to recapture the town's glorious past and rebuild, renew, and more importantly, repopulate the Old Borough.

Mr. Walsh continued, "this scheme is ultimately about jobs, jobs will be created in the building of homes and business premises. People will be encouraged to work and live in the town centre and this will ensure that Dungarvan continues to have an urban community life".

In conclusion, Mr. Walsh said the Chamber fully endorses the scheme and is eager to assist any business or individual who now wishes to avail of it.

### RED TAPE REDUCTION

Also extolling the benefits to Dungarvan residents and developers alike under the new scheme, newly appointed Co. Manager, Donal Connolly reported that a brochure outlining the various advantages of the scheme in Dungarvan would shortly be made available.

Mr. Connolly also promised that the U.D.C. will endeavour to reduce

all red tape involved and assured Minister O'Shea that both Local Authorities would pull out all the stops in making the town the great success it could potentially be.

Kickstart To Development

Town Planner, John Reid described the urban renewal scheme as a badly needed kickstart to development in the town.

The guest speaker regarded the scheme as the turning point in Dungarvan's entire planning process and urged the U.D.C. to take a pro-active role in the scheme's initial introduction. In pointing to the various benefits resulting from Dungarvan's designation, Mr. Reid took the examples of past South East successes such as City Square in Waterford, the Market Place in Clonmel and Market Cross in Kilkenny.

The two major and unique assets of Dungarvan, he explained, were the town centre and its coastal setting, which could both be developed to their true potential under the aegis of the urban renewal scheme.

### ATTRACTIVE TAX INCENTIVES

Speaking of the many attractive tax incentives available under the scheme was second guest speaker Desmond O'Toole of O'Shea and O'Toole and partners, valuation surveyors Waterford.

Included in these relief benefits are; accelerated capital allowances for industrial buildings: 50% allowance for owner-occupiers and 25% for lessors in year one - owner/occupier housing tax allowance over 10 years of 100% for refurbishment work and 50% for new-build costs.

The Scheme will also feature relief for rented residential accommodation, double rent allowance, 10 year rates on a sliding scale and a new floor area maximum of 125sq. metres for refurbishment work on apartments.

### SUCCESSFUL EVENING

In all the evening proved most successful and those in attendance were much enlightened by the valuable expertise of the speakers on hand. A question and answer session later produced more interesting facts but as Donal Connolly submitted, each case must be treated individually as there is no blanket answer to a particular question.

## Agricultural Education For Young Farming Entrants

The Certificate in Farming is the main training programme for young people who seek a career in farming. This certificate can be obtained either through an Agricultural College or by attending a course at the local Teagasc Training Centre.

Those who intend to pursue the course by attending an Agricultural College will already have applied to the College of their choice and may have obtained a place there.

For those who are unable to attend an Agriculture College the programme may be taken on a part-time basis by attending at the Teagasc Office, Dungarvan, for two days per week from October to late January over three consecutive Winters. The programme combines:

- Classroom and practical instruction
- Placement on a host farm
- Project work on their home farm

There are class visits to local well run farms where theory can be seen in practice and suitable exercises provided for the students. Visits also take place to Research Stations and Open Days. Part of the local course consists of one week at an Agricultural College to learn practical skills.

An essential part of the course is a twelve week placement period whereby the trainee must live and work with a selected host farmer. During the three years each trainee must complete a number of projects which usually consist of systematic recording or monitoring of some aspect of an enterprise on the farm. Farm Accounts must also be systematically kept and analyzed during the course. A Management Module of 80 hours which looks in depth at the physical and financial planning of a farm is included in year three.

If you intend to stay at home farming and are not going to an Agricultural College then you should contact the Teagasc Office in Lismore for further details.

**Who Will Be Champions** — Next Sunday sees the culmination of all the year's se-

nior inter-county hurling activity and endeavour the All Ireland final at Croke Park. Offaly and Limerick battle for the title in a match which few students of the game anticipated early this year, or even half way through. Nobody can deny their right to battle for Corn Mhic Carthaigh but what few can assert with anything like total conviction is the name of the winners. So who, then, do you think yourself is going to win?

A good case can be made for both teams, of course. Limerick beat Cork and apart altogether from the fact that they beat one of their bogey teams it was the manner in which they stared adversity in the face and recovered from the early Cork barrage, fashioning a victory which owed much to heart and spirit, which made the greatest impression. Once Cork get a firm grip on a game very few teams overtake them. That day Limerick displayed a resilience and character strangely absent in their team's display against Clare the previous year. In the Munster final Clare kept pace with Limerick for much of the first half but in the second half, just when we thought that Clare would mount a serious challenge, it was Limerick who kept increasing their lead with a flow of well taken points to win convincingly. Even allowing for feeble opposition Limerick gave a great display against Antrim, their best to date because it had a balanced blend of handling, running, passing and ground striking. Their accurate shooting was most impressive and should they be given room to repeat that successful formula then the McCarthy cup will come south.

Offaly's road to the final

was even rockier. Opposing Kilkenny, provincial and All Ireland champions, was an intimidating assignment and it says much for their mental attitude (physical preparation is easy, comparatively) that they dethroned the Cats after a great hour-long battle and typical late Kilkenny resurgence. Boy, did they work hard to earn that victory! But then victories only come after hard work and, of course, you know that the only place where victory comes before work is in the dictionary. Offaly's Leinster final win over Wexford was richly deserved and it doesn't diminish that victory one whit to say that they had to work very hard in the closing stages (especially their goalie) to retain their lead and regain the Bob O'Keeffe Cup. They got out of the game what they had already invested in their training. The All Ireland semi-final with Galway reaffirmed my regard for Offaly, Galway could, possibly, have won which would be unjust because the Tribesmen's hurling didn't deserve to earn them a place in the final. So even if Galway ran them close so did Kilkenny and winning narrowly is a greater accomplishment than scoring a run-away win.

Who do I think will raise the cup on the Hogan Stand at around 5 p.m. on Sunday? The Offaly captain! So now you know. Why? Because, with no disrespect to Limerick, Offaly are a better-balanced fifteen. They have Eamonn Creagan and Eamonn (a Limerick man!) has a hurling philosophy with which I find myself comfortable: he places great emphasis on simple basic but essential skills and direct hurling and ensures that they are well practised. Not for Eamonn what plagued Galway and Antrim (and Limerick until Tom Ryan arrived): the Jennet Express, the heedless, headlong headless chicken stuff resulting in a waste of energy and the perversion of a noble game. Eamonn will have Offaly prepared for quick positive direct stick-work which will in no way inhibit soloing and passing when the occasion warrants them. Offaly defenders are, I think, better tacklers and closer markers than their counterparts. The most desirable quality that any defender could have is soundness, reliability. Of the finalists Offaly, methinks, have this in greater measure. I expect their Monday evening trek back home to Tullamore to be a joyous one with the McCarthy Cup in tow.

# FARMING LEADER

## Minister's In-Action On Beef Premium Contributes To Price Fall

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan, has blamed the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, for contributing to the drop in cattle prices due to his failure to take action to modify the application procedure for the beef premium scheme. Mr. Ryan said that because of the restricted application system for the beef premium scheme, many farmers are forced to hold cattle longer than they otherwise would and furthermore, a lot of cattle become eligible for sale at the same time after the ending of the 2 month retention period. The glut on the market means that factory buyers have a huge selection of

cattle and therefore they can relax prices and still get supplies of cattle.

### FACTORIES ALSO TO BLAME FOR PRICE REDUCTIONS

Mr. Ryan also said that meat factories are not blameless either when it comes to dropping cattle prices. Despite the fact that there is no price drop for meat in the market place, factories have continued to reduce prices in recent weeks.

### CALL FOR SIX APPLICATION PERIODS FOR BEEF PREMIUM SCHEME

The application system for the beef premium scheme must be changed to allow for the more orderly marketing of cattle which should benefit both farmers and proces-

sors alike. The processors who experience a scarcity of cattle during the retention period suffer from an oversupply once the retention period ends. This can give rise to a difficulty in supplying contracts with retail outlets. ICMSA met Minister Walsh over a year ago seeking a change in policy to provide for an application system based on six applications per year beginning in February and every two months thereafter.

### CALL FOR INC REASE IN EXPORT REFUNDS

Mr. Ryan said that cattle prices have now fallen to a level where intervention

buying is possible. "The last thing that we need is to begin placing large quantities of beef into intervention as we approach the GATT implementation date of January 1, 1995," said Mr. Ryan.

The Minister must secure an increase in the level of export refunds for both carcase meat and for live cattle so that Irish factories and live exporters can compete to win contracts in Third countries. "It is far better for all concerned if meat and live cattle is exported out of the Community, rather than having to resort to intervention," concluded Mr. Ryan.

## Farmers Furious With Minister Walsh Over Ewe Premium Payment Delays

The Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan, said recently that sheep farmers who are still owed over £16 million in Ewe Premium payments are furious with the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, for his broken promises on speedy payments.

Mr. Coughlan said that it is now over 4 weeks ago since Minister Walsh first announced payments and, as of earlier this week, there was still 11,000 flock owners owed over £16 million.

The Sheep Committee

Chairman announced that in a recent major campaign IFA County Officers have been making contact with their rural T.D.'s to put direct pressure on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to immediately remove the Department of Agriculture bottleneck and release payments to these hard pressed producers.

Mr. Coughlan said that complaints on the Minister's failure to pay our Ewe Premium as promised, are pouring into IFA Regional Offices throughout the

country from furious flock owners. "Sheep farmers feel badly let down by Minister Walsh. What is even more annoying is the fact that the major delays in payment relate to errors made by the Department of Agriculture in processing files for computer payment. Over 8,000 cases were incorrectly lodged into the computer and in turned rejected for payment. The Department then sent these cases back to local offices when it appears there was no need as the error was actually made at

the input end. From the slow level of payments being made this week it seems that these cases are only being corrected at a snail's pace."

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Sheep Committee said that sheep producers are under extreme financial pressure this year as a result of the unprecedented fall in lamb prices in the month of June. "Low lamb prices coupled with this delay in Ewe Premium payments are driving producers to the wall. The Minister's own figures show that this pressure has already pushed 3,000 flock owners out of business over the last year with numbers falling from 52,000 to 49,000 sheep farmers.

Mr. Coughlan called on Minister Walsh to intervene directly with the Department and insist that payments are released to the sheep farmers involved immediately. It is no excuse for the Minister or the Department to say that all the files are being fully checked and farmers should have patience. The Department had since last February to check all the files. Indeed they can still make advance payments now, similar to previous years and have the files checked before the final Ewe Premium instalment next March. Mr. Coughlan warned that farmers' patience was fast running out.

## IFA President Calls For Urgent Announcement Of Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme

Commenting on Minister Walsh's interview on RTE's Agriview recently, Mr. Gerald Curran, Chairman Waterford IFA Dairy Committee, supports the IFA President, John Donnelly, when he expressed concern at the failure of the Minister to officially announce the long-awaited subsidised milk quota scheme which the IFA was instrumental in promoting earlier this year.

"Small milk suppliers are anxiously awaiting this unique opportunity to purchase quota at reduced prices to improve the viability of their farm," he said.

"At the same time," Mr. Donnelly explained, "10 million gallons of milk sold into the restructuring pool last March are

currently in limbo with most of the farmers having sold milk into it as yet remaining unpaid."

"The greater the delay with the scheme," the IFA boss warned, "the more difficult it will be for farmers to produce the milk within the quota year. This is a scandalous situation at a time when a number of processors have warned that they need extra milk to fulfil their market commitments."

"The Minister," Mr. Donnelly declared, "must urgently obtain clearance from the EU Commission to announce and implement the milk quota restructuring scheme just as he did for the Farm Pollution and Dairy Hygiene Schemes he announced recently."

## County Waterford ICMSA News

The ICMSA Livestock Committee has demanded the prompt payment of premia and the continuation of the live export trade.

The South East region is represented by Mr. Kevin Connolly, Knocktopher, Kilkenny and Mr. Michael Barron, Gusserane, Wexford, and they attended a recent ICMSA livestock meeting in Limerick.

Mr. Barron said that it is simply not good enough that thousands of farmers are being kept waiting for payments which are legally theirs. Mr. Barron said that there is no excuse for delayed payments or the interminable waiting periods which farmers are put through when they make queries to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry.

He said there is a very real cost to farmers when you add up the cost of delayed payments, long distance telephone calls and in many cases the cost of petrol incurred when driving to the local DVO offices.

The Livestock Committee called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. J. Walsh, to finally fulfill on his commitment to make the payment of premia and applications 'user friendly'.

The ICMSA Livestock Committee also called for a continuation of live exports, as according to Committee Chairman, the current strong export demand for Irish cattle has led to a firming of cattle prices.

The Committee agreed that given the GATT requirement to control inputs into intervention, it is essential live exports continue indefinitely.

Mr. Barron said that with the traditional high level of slaughterings in the autumn, exports are extremely important.

"Farmers and the industry as a whole are best served by a lively meat and live export trade. Competition in the market place leads to all round efficiency. The vast majority of live exports are from the best of dairy cows; these animals are not suited to the European meat trade, but are ideal for the North African market. The live exports and the slaughtering trade are complimentary to each other," said Mr. Barron.

The Committee called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry to retain a healthy balance in the meat industry and to remain resolute in defence of the live export trade.

The Livestock Committee also reviewed the operation of the Deseasonalisation Premium — the premium payment introduced under CAP Reform to encourage out of season cattle slaughterings. Prior to its introduction the majority of cattle slaughterings took place between September and December.

Since the introduction of this premium, slaughterings for April have increased dramatically with 102,000 cattle slaughtered in April 1994. However, the low level of slaughterings in May and June after the ending of the premium of April 30 has caused concern about inadequate supplies of cattle to supply contracts.

The ICMSA is proposing a phasing out of the deseasonalisation premium during the month of May, to help avoid the sudden reduction in slaughterings in the first weeks of May. ICMSA proposes the following rates:

60 ECU from January 1 to April 30;  
40 ECU from May 1 to May 15;  
20 ECU from May 15 to May 31.

Mr. Barron expressed disappointment that the farming organisations have no representation on Board Bia even though farmers levies are providing the funding for this Board.

country who have given most generously to each appeal on behalf of the Rwandan refugees. The church collections yielded huge sums with even the most sparsely populated parishes giving record amounts.



# Waterford Hang On In Nail Biting Finish

As the clock ticked towards five last Sunday evening a hushed silence fell over the Fraher Field. With the game almost seven minutes over time, Sue Ramsbottom faced up to the most vital kick of her life, about twenty five yards from the goal. Sue had just produced one of the great individual performances of Ladies Gaelic Football scoring 3-3 and threatened to defeat Waterford almost singlehanded.

Sue's shot sailed to the left and wide and the kick out brought the final whistle and the end of one of the most memorable games in the twenty year history of the Association. A huge crowd basked in a welter of excitement as two fully committed teams fought for every ball as if their lives depended upon it.

For Laois it was absolute heartbreak. For the fourth time since 1991 Laois had lost a major game to Waterford. That defeat owed much to the courage and determination of a gallant Waterford side for a magnificent second half perfor-

mance against the breeze.

Laois won the toss and surprisingly opted to play against the wind in the opening half. The first ten minutes was tense and it took a while for the teams to settle. Geraldine O'Ryan kicked a point in the 3rd minute with the outside of her right foot and when she was brought down Marie Crotty added another in the 6th minute.

Waterford weren't moving well, the defence looked ill at ease and Laois were looking dangerous. Marie Crotty again pointed a free. Sue Ramsbottom gave a foretaste of what was to

come with a 12th minute point and sixty seconds later she got in behind the defence to slam the ball to the net.

Claire Ryan found Catriona Casey yards from the end line on the left hand side of the goal.

Catriona lifted the ball over Bernie Deegan's head into the far corner of the net. Waterford players will fully appreciate that goal. They had seen Catriona do that hundreds of times at training. Fiona Crotty cut in from the right wing to add another point as Waterford led 1-11 to 1-2 after thirty six minutes.

The Laois fightback began. Lulu Carroll and Sue Ramsbottom (twice) shot points as the Waterford defence attempted to stem a tidal wave of Laois attacks. Olivia Condon made a great break along the left wing and when she was fouled Crotty unerringly pointed the free. Two minutes later Aine Wall was brought down and Crotty again obliged.

It seemed as if Waterford had weathered the storm, but they hadn't reckoned on Sue Ramsbottom. Waterford were caught with a quick kick out and a quick transfer saw Sue break

through for a goal and a lifeline. Within a minute she added another and Waterford faced the greatest test of their sporting lives.

Bernie Ryan's immediate opponent Brid Kehoe was substituted and Marie Crotty kicked nine points, every one of these a pressure kick.

Even though the forwards never moved with their customary collision Olivia Condon, Geraldine O'Ryan, Catriona Casey, Fiona Crotty, Aine Wall and Claire Ryan all contributed immensely to a memorable day for the County.

# Western Board Meeting

P. S. O Riain, Chairman, presided at last week's open Board meeting which was held at the Park Hotel and at which there was a big attendance.

At the outset, the Chairman paid tribute to the memory of young Tom Scanlon of Affane who had lost his life under tragic circumstances in the previous week and to Michael Quirke who had died during the course of a football championship match in Lismore. He said the GAA in the county was shocked by these tragedies and both Tom and Michael will be sadly missed from the scene.

Sympathy was offered to the bereaved families.

## REFEREES' REPORTS

Arising out of these, a total of seven players, reported for the minimum, were each suspended for 2 weeks.

The Kilrossanty v. Dungarvan junior football championship game which was played over 2 months ago, gave rise to a lengthy discussion after the report back from the referee was read. This report had been before the previous meeting and referred back to the referee for clarification. Two people were named in the report, Chris Gough and Kevin Lonergan and there was ambiguity about the nature of the offence.

Chris Gough was reported for being abusive and Kevin Lonergan was named as having been booked, but the offence was not stated. Michael Lyons, Dungarvan, expressed himself as being very unhappy with the report and said that the referee should be compelled to describe the offence for which Kevin Lonergan was booked.

After some considerable time, Chris Gough was suspended for the minimum 2 months, which has now expired and Kevin Lonergan was required to attend the next meeting of the Board.

## AFFANE OBJECTION

A most unusual development in a championship match was highlighted in an objection lodged by Affane against the decision of referee John M. Kelly, who, it was alleged, would not allow the second half of their under-21 football championship match against An Gaeltacht to proceed.

Some of the points in the objection stated that the referee acted contrary to rule 123 OG in refusing to allow a properly registered member of their club to take part in the game and that the referee refused to allow a prop-

erly registered female member of their club to take part in the game, etc.

The report from the referee stated that Affane had only 14 players for the start of the second half and that he would not allow a sixteen year old boy to fill in for Affane and they also wanted to call on a girl, whom he was told, was over age. He further stated that two Affane officials conceded the game, which was played at the Ring venue. The referee further stated that no list of players was handed to him by Affane.

Denis McGrath, Affane, submitted that the referee was in breach of rule by not playing the second half of the match regardless of the fact that only 14 had played in the first half. The age of a player in the underage grades was not the concern of the referee and he had no right whatever in refusing to allow the match to proceed on that account.

Nioclás Mac Craith, An Rinn, stated that the second half could not have been played because the Affane players walked off when they found that they had only fourteen players.

The debate went on for quite some time before it was agreed that the referee should have proceeded with the second half even though one of the teams had only 14 players. It was then decided that because no list of players was handed in, that the match be awarded to An Gaeltacht.

## UNSPORTING

The upsurge in the number of unsporting incidents on the field of play was referred to by the Chairman who said he was not just referring to this Board. In some recent matches there have been "flare-ups" involving quite a number of players and everything possible must be done to get clubs to desist from this unsightly and unsporting behaviour.

## CORRESPONDENCE

Letters from five or six clubs complaining about fixtures and having to play with understrength teams because players were on holidays, or not available, etc., were read. The pressure on clubs having to play a number of matches within a short space of time was referred to by James Tobin (Shamrocks). He told the meeting about the problems of rural clubs in finding players to fulfil fixtures, particularly on week

evenings. Several other delegates voiced complaints of a similar nature.

The Chairman gave an outline of the problems and pressure facing the Board in trying to get the championships completed within the year. He said the officers were inundated with applications for postponements. He said that the subject matter of a number of the letters were already dealt with and the remainder would be looked at by the officers at a fixtures meeting to follow.

James Tobin appealed for a refixture of their intermediate hurling game against Abbeyside which had resulted in a draw. He said this competition was a championship and was not a tournament as some people described it.

He was assured that consideration would be given to the request.

## CHAMPIONSHIP REPORT

The Runaf, Antóin Breathnach, gave an update on the situation and said that while good progress was made despite all the problems, the Board were going to be hard pressed to finish all the championships. Progress from here on would, to a great extent, depend on results, as a number of clubs were still engaged in a few championships and it would take some time for these to unravel.

The Chairman then put the suggestion to the meeting that championship matches be fixed for All-Ireland Sunday in order to help clear the backlog. He said these games could be played at around 5 p.m. after all concerned had been given a chance to see the games on tv.

No one spoke very strongly against this suggestion, but at the same time, it did not find favour with the meeting.

## ALL-IRELAND TICKETS

Tony Morrissey told delegates that there would be an allround cut of one ticket per club for the two All-Ireland finals this year. He said a reduction of 10,000 in the capacity of Croke Park due to the redevelopment had meant a 25% reduction in the allocation to all counties. Waterford had been cut by 79 tickets.

Some delegates complained about the poor seats that were allocated to us and even though they were switched from one side of the stands to the other, they were still very poor. Tony Morrissey said that the tickets for the hurling final

(Hogan Stand) were poor also.

## FURTHER MEETING

Following the distribution of All-Ireland tickets at Lawlor's Hotel last night (Tuesday), a further meeting of the Officer Board took place to review the fixtures programme.

A meeting of the county fixtures committee was held at Dungarvan on Monday evening after the senior football championship game.

## DRAWS

The draws for the junior hurling championship semi-finals are as follows: Geraldines v. Tourin and Kilgobinet v. Lismore or Mellerary. In the junior football semi-finals Tallow will play Eire Og or Ballinacourty and Emmets will meet the quarter-final winners in the other section, which is not yet decided.

## Results

At Cappoquin on Saturday evening the replay of the drawn junior hurling section final ended in a point win for Lismore after a tremendously exciting game between two evenly matched teams. Abbeyside led for most of the game and were four points ahead at the break and were still in front until Lismore goaled in the 58th minute. (See Sportsfield Notes).

Ring had six points to spare over Ardmore in a splendidly contested intermediate football tie at Fraher Field on Saturday. Had Ardmore taken all their chances, the score would have been much closer, but over the hour Ring deserved to win.

Kilgobinet, following their recent draw with Tallow, scored a four points win against Ballyduff in junior football and if they overcome Lismore on Saturday next they will be heading for a showdown with Emmets in the semi-final.

## Suspension

Under 21 county player Brendan Ormond who was sent off in the first round game against Tipperary at Walsh Park, was suspended from 3 months by the Munster Council at their meeting on Monday of last week. His opposite number Rabbitte was also suspended for the same term. The suspension was very rough on Brendan Ormond, in the opinion of all those who were close to the action.

He was accompanied to the meeting by Michael Quinn and Seamus Grant.

## Intermediate Football

The league section of the intermediate football championship is now completed and only a play-off between Shamrocks and Faha remains to be played to decide the final place on the top four.
