# Injured Garda Hospitalised

— YOUTH REMANDED IN CUSTODY

An eighteen year old unemployed youth was remanded in custody to St. Patrick's Institution when he made a brief appearance before Judge Michael Pattwell at a special sitting of Dungarvan District Court yesterday afternoon (Tuesday).

Rossa O'Donovan, with an address at c/o 36 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, is charged with unlawfully and maliciously causing grievous bodily harm to Detective Garda Michael Lacey at 36 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan on September 6 with intent to maim and disfigure him. O'Donovan, who was granted free legal aid and was rep-

resented by Mr. Gerry McCullough Solr., was also charged with producing in a manner likely to unlawfully intimidate another person an article, to wit, a timber handle, capable of inflicting serious injury.

The accused was further charged with feloniously handling property valued £35 knowing it to have been stolen.

An application for bail on behalf of O'Donovan was strongly opposed by prosecuting Supt. Ray McAndrew on the grounds that he believed the accused would not stand trial if granted bail. O'Donovan gave an undertaking on oath that he would honour bail, but Sgt. Tom O'Grady con-

firmed in evidence that on at least one previous occasion he failed to turn up in court and a bench warrant had to be issued for his arrest.

Supt. McAndrew also told the court that Detective Garda Lacey had sustained very serious head injuries and is presently detained in Waterford Regional Hospital.

Refusing bail, Judge Pattwell said he was doing so because of the gravity of the charges and because O'Donovan had failed to turn up in court on at least one previous occasion.

He then remanded O'Donovan in custody to appear again at Cappoquin District Court next Friday, September 9.

## New County Enterprise Office Opens Its Doors To The Public

The County Enterprise Board has completed its move to new office premises. The office is located in Dungarvan at Cross Bridge Street (between the AIB and the Post Office). The move is intended to ensure that the County Enterprise Board and the services it provides are made accessible to enquiries from new and existing businesses.

The County Enterprise Board is intended to support a broad range of small commercial enterprises across most economic sectors including Manufacturing Services, Tourism and some aspects of Agriculture. This flexibility is reflected in the variety of projects which have been supported in County Waterford so far. Since being set up the Board has approved grant aid for 31 projects totalling £210,000.

In addition to dealing with people who are interested in applying for grants from the County Enterprise Board itself, the Board also plans to operate its office as a point of contact between various state agencies and the public. The County Enterprise Board is currently consulting all relevant agencies to establish how this role can

best be carried out. It is hoped that by doing so, access to the full range of services available to new and existing businesses will be improved.

The Board is finalising its County Enterprise Action Plan which will serve as a guide for its activities over the next three years. It is hoped that as the plan is implemented the Board will be able to expand in its existing role to include additional support services and facilitate better take up of existing enterprise supports by local business people.

# Council Welcomes New County Manager

Attending his first Waterford County Council meeting last week, newly appointed County Manager, Donal Connolly, received a warm welcome from members on his return to his native county.

Chairing Mr. Connolly's inaugural meeting, Cllr. Lar Hart formally welcomed the Kilbrien man back home.

The Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey declared that Mr. Connolly would make a fine Co. Manager and he looked forward to working with him in the years ahead.

## "OUR GAIN IS THEIR LOSS"

First elected to the Council in 1950, Cllr. Jackie

Fahey submitted he had served under many Co. Managers but was now particularly proud to serve under a Co. Waterford man. Describing the newly appointed Manager as a "great administrator," Cllr. Fahey informed Council members that Mr. Connolly's record as former Co. Manager of Roscommon was indeed "second to none." "What is our gain is Roscommon's

loss," said Mr. Fahey and added that though Mr. Connolly had a difficult task ahead of him, he could be assured of the members' co-operation.

Cllr. Pat Coffey said it was "nice to see one of our own" take up the prestigious position, while Cllrs. Billy Kyne and Con Casey also extended a formal welcome to the new Manager.

Speaking of the difficult financial straits the Council now have to navigate, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain said new blood was needed to lead the County Council out of

this trial.

Also welcoming Mr. Connolly, Cllr. Austin Flynn said he was greatly impressed with the Manager, having previously met him at Urban Council level. "The Council is fortunate to have him," he added.

## A GREAT HONOUR

In his inaugural address to the Council members, Mr. Connolly said it was a great honour for him to be appointed Manager of his native county.

Aware of the great obligations facing him and conscious of the many major improvements that had been made throughout the county, Mr. Connolly assured members of his intent to work closely with them in pursuing and expanding many more services county-wide.

"I assume you of my dedication in making Waterford one of the most premier counties in the country," declared Mr. Connolly, and was answered by warm applause of welcome by the Council members.

## Technical Leaving Certificate At D.T.C.

The Department of Education has responded to the growth in demand for technical and computing skills, with the introduction of the Technical Leaving Certificate. The required core subjects are the main craft subjects: Construction Studies, Engineering and Technical Drawing. Computer studies are also required, and the College offers CAD and CAM in addition, as part of the technology programme. Study of a continental language to a basic standard is part of the course, and Irish Studies is offered as a choice instead of the L.C. Irish Syllabus. A choice of other L.C. subjects makes up the seven Leaving Cert subjects taken by students.

In addition, Work Experience is arranged for all students taking the Technical Leaving Certificate.

The objectives of the course are to prepare students for the work environment through emphasis on practical skills, and work. Entry to further education, at R.T.C. level, or directly to employment in the trade area, are the twin aims.

Points can be gained for entry to college in the same way as for the traditional Leaving Certificate. This is the Leaving Cert for anyone whose main interest and ability is in the craft area, and who wants to take his/her training beyond the minimum standard. The course is two years in length. Entry is at 5th year. Application should be made immediately to the Principal.

## Dungarvan Museum To Host "Kerlogue Rescue" Exhibition

On Monday evening next, September 12, Dungarvan Museum's latest exhibition "The Kerlogue Rescue" will be formally opened before guests and society members by Waterford County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly, who pays his first formal visit since his recent appointment, to the museum.

The exhibition is on loan to the Museum Society from the National Maritime Museum of Ireland in Dun Laoghaire, Co. Dublin and has been on permanent display there since May when it was formally opened by President Mary Robinson.

The exhibition commemorates the gallant rescue of over 150 German seamen during World War 11 in the Bay of Biscay in December 1944 by "The Kerlogue" under its captain Tom O'Donoghue of Abbeyside, Dungarvan. "The Kerlogue" was en route from Lisbon to Dublin when it was approached by German aircraft and signalled to follow and assist. Despite obvious danger, Captain O'Donoghue immediately responded and soon sailed into the results of a major naval battle where a German naval convoy had been attacked by British warships.

# Military Mouthful



## BIRTHDAY PARADE

If you're short on ideas for a little boy's birthday party, how about a cake decorated on military lines.

### Ingredients

4 oz (100g) soft margarine  
4 oz (100g) castor sugar  
2 eggs, beaten  
4 oz (100g) self-raising flour  
1 tbs (20ml) cocoa powder  
**Decoration**  
12 oz (350g) chocolate butter icing  
2 packets chocolate finger biscuits  
candles and soldier holders; sentry box and soldier

### Method

Cream margarine and sugar together. Beat in eggs, adding a spoonful of



flour if mixture shows any signs of curdling. Sieve flour and cocoa together and fold into mixture. Add a little milk if mixture is too dry, then turn into an 18cm (7in) diameter deep round cake tin, greased and base lined.

Hollow out centre slightly and bake at 325 deg. F. 170 deg. C. gas mark 3 for 35 - 40 mins. Cool on wire tray.

Slice cake in half and

sandwich with little butter icing. Spread remainder round sides and over the top. Mark top into lines with palette knife. Lift on to plate or board. Rub surface of finger biscuits, then press them round the sides. Arrange candles in holders. These can be bought at some newsagents. Colour with felt marker pen.

# Red Tide Phenomenon

Reports have come in of a 'red tide' affecting parts of the Dungarvan and Tramore coastal areas. This is a totally natural phenomenon which occurs with appropriate weather conditions out at sea.

The 'red tide' condition is caused by the massive growth of a particular algae species, usually lasting only a few days.

### NO FISH KILLS

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Co. Council Senior Executive Engineer, Denis McCarthy, with responsibility for environmental matters, said the Council had carried out an investigation in relation to the red tide condition. Dungarvan Bay and the Back Strand at Tramore were the only affected areas, he continued.

Mr. McCarthy continued that the algae had grown to such an extent that it was now depleting the oxygen level in the sea. As a direct result, lugworm were being killed, though Mr. McCarthy reported that the Council was not aware of any fish kills.

"The red tide is a natural phenomenon", stressed Mr.

McCarthy, "it is not caused by any effluence". Meanwhile, the excessive algae condition is expected to clear up in a number of days.

# Prevent wind damage now

WE still have September sun and some mild October days to come.

However, gardeners' thoughts will be turning to overwintering vulnerable plant 'fixtures'.

Most established perennials, trees, shrubs and herbaceous border plants can cope with winter if they are familiar Irish garden varieties.

But you may have some specimens which have not been planted long or not known to favour our winters. In these cases, don't be tempted to prune before spring — top growth gives the frost something to attack without doing major harm to the heart of the plant.

It is also worth building an insulating layer of straw, leaf mould or even shredded newspaper around the plant or over its crown, secured against wind by means of pegs of wire or twig.

### Unpredictable

Wind is actually more worrying than frost because its strength is unpredictable — look at the number of mature trees lost in the freak hurricane of a few years ago!

Newly-planted shrubs and trees are particularly at risk and must be checked regularly in case one 'blow' weakens them before the next and fatal onslaught.

If the specimen has been loosened, firm the soil again with your boot and, if staked, check this still has a good hold. If it isn't doing its job then replace it or double it up.

Preferably, use an angled stake driven deep into the ground and in line with the prevailing wind.

In serious situations it might also be worth erecting a wind break. Wattle is ideal because it allows sufficient wind through to resist being toppled easily itself.

In the case of ground-hugging plants or shrubs you might also consider pegging down plastic sheet to protect against frost and wind.

### Drainage

Though difficult to predict in certain parts of the country, snow is a risk but not necessarily for the freeze that comes with it. You only have to look at a stand of pines to see the worst threat — it is the weight of snow which causes splits and breaks in branches. Garden conifers can have their attractive silhouettes ruined by snow causing sections to bow out and break or never spring back to recover inner foliage, long browned by a lack of sun.

Avoid this by lightly binding round conifers with light rope for the depths of winter and being ready to brush snow from branches.

Make sure you also clear snow from greenhouses and frames to maintain light to plants inside.

For rain protection you really need to condition soil against water-logging before you plant it, but you can protect alpines by laying rigid plastic sheet during winter to create an open-sided 'umbrella'.

## Little Assurance At An Post Meeting

Fine Gael Councillor, Willie McDonnell told Waterford Co. Council members last week that he will continue to fight An Post's controversial 'Recovery Plan' which threatens to downgrade 17 rural P.O.'s in the Mallow postal district.

At a recent two hour meeting held in Lismore, Council Chairman, Cllr. Lar Hart and West Waterford councillors Nora Flynn, Jimmy Quirke, Oliver Wilkinson

and Willie McDonnell had met with An Post representative, Donal Ahern, Mallow Head Postmaster, regarding future postal arrangements in the affected areas.

Recalling the minutes of the meeting Cllr. McDonnell said he had received little assurances from the An Post representative and asked the Co. Council to continue to support threatened rural communities.

As a direct result of An Post's proposed plans, the concerned Tallow Councillor predicted major job losses in both counties Cork and Waterford at a time when, he added, An Post should be showing example by creating jobs.

**LOCAL AND NATIONAL PROBLEM**  
Sharing Cllr. McDonnell's concern, Cllr. Pat Coffey re-

ferred to An Post's failed Viability Plan of 1991 when 550 Post Offices nationwide were designated for closure. "The problem may be local at present, but it will grow to a national problem," Cllr. Coffey warned and then urged the Council to take the matter to the General Council of Co. Councils.

**PRICES TO INCREASE**  
Re-echoing the sentiments of his fellow Council members, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson warned that in the Cappoquin/Lismore and Ballyduff areas alone, three full time jobs would be lost.

As a result of this 'close by stealth' policy, Cllr. Wilkinson predicted a major price and cost increase, thus resulting in both a poorer and more expensive service for the consumer.

**"ANTI-RURAL PLANS"**  
Council Chairman, Cllr. Lar Hart then brought members attention to a letter from Fr. Patrick Griffin of

Mallow, Chairman of the newly formed CORPO (Conserve Our Rural Post Offices). In his letter, which is addressed to all 27 Co. Councils in the country, Fr. Griffin states that CORPO was formed to maintain the status quo and if possible, to upgrade all rural P.O.'s which are at present under threat of downgrading or eventual closure by An Post. In opposing An Post's "blatantly anti-rural plans," Fr. Griffin appealed to the Council for solidarity with CORPO's campaign.

**COUNCIL FIGHTS ON**  
On a proposal by Cllr. McDonnell and seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey, it was unanimously decided that the Council write to the General Council of Co. Councils and to An Post to fully explain the members position on the company's controversial 'Recovery Plan' and also to acknowledge the Council's full support of CORPO's campaign.



# Pollution Threat To River Clodagh

Situated on the banks of the scenic river Clodagh is the derelict building of what was once the premises of Irish Leathers, Portlaw. Closed since 1985, the disused Portlaw factory harbours a very real danger of pollution contained in the many steel drums of stored chemicals which are now threatening to leak due to heavy corrosion.

That's according to Portlaw Councillor Pat Coffey who raised the issue at last week's Waterford County Council meeting and urged that the Council investigate the "highly possible potential of pollution" to the river.

"Should the lethal contents of these corroded drums seep into the river's shore, then the Council would face a very serious problem of pollution," Cllr. Coffey warned, "particularly in view of the fact that water from the river is used

to supply the East Waterford water supply scheme, which in turn provides water for Waterford City. This would create havoc," he added.

### COUNCIL IS AWARE

Responding to Cllr. Coffey's motion, Acting Co. Engineer, Eamon Mansfield said the Council was aware of the problem and had recently inspected the Portlaw premises.

Although the potential problem of pollution to the river's ecology existed, Mr. Mansfield assured Cllr. Coffey that the Council was working on the problem and that the East Waterford supply scheme was not under threat.

The matter, Mr. Mansfield explained, would have to be sorted out legally and the Council was currently endeavouring to contact the previous legal owners of the former Irish Leathers plant.





# TALLOW NOTES

## TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

### WHAT A FINISH

Surely nobody expected the astonishing finish we had to this year's All Ireland. It will take Limerick quite a while to recover from the shock of those final five minutes. Many from both teams were bemused by the turn of events and afterwards professed themselves unable to rationalise the turnabout of their fortunes. The mystery had, I think, an explanation and a very logical one, too:— Johnny Dooley's golden goal and its effect on both sides.

Johnny Dooley's goal for Offaly from what appeared an innocuous situation shocked Limerick. When Pat O'Connor, on the run, swept a great ground ball to the net, almost immediately afterwards the Shannonsiders were numbed into virtual immobility. Those two scores coming so quickly and so late left little time for Limerick to regain control and save the game. Their confusion of mind meant that their concentration was nil. During that period of stupour Offaly rifled over the points and Billy Dooley was completely unmarked when he scored his points. Conversely, of course, those expected late scores rejuvenated Offaly. Gone were the tired legs as they flew through the last few minutes of the game.

Limerick were unfortunate (Napoleon when assessing a general always asked "Is he lucky") but any team recording seventeen or eighteen wides in a match invites some questions and is vulnerable. In the light of such wastage of possession players gradually become fragile and distrustful of their own ability and don't confidently follow through on their strokes. They become less positive and don't go for the ball with the same assurance. This negative attitude soon communicates itself to team mates. Often times players in those situations fall back on former discredited practices such as aimless solo running. Last Sunday Ger Hegarty (at midfield), Ciaran Carey and Ger Houlihan ran and ran only to be foiled by backs who were well prepared or such a tactic. Each abortive solo run and failed scoring attempt undermined, however slightly, that massive confidence which permeated the Limerick team for most of the game and enabled Offaly to capitalise on flagging concentration at the fateful moment of Dooley's late free and in subsequent play.

Let's go back to that free since it marked a turning point in the game. Limerick didn't line up, at all. Players just stood there forming three distinct lines. They had three separate strands of players rather than one straight line across. When Dooley struck the sliotar the front line (one player) lunged to his left, missed it, put the second line (two players) completely off, unsighted

the player on the line and Offaly were thrown a life line they scarcely expected.

Whenever defenders and goalie fail to position themselves in a straight line for a free of that kind, or when one of them breaks the line by moving suddenly forward, the likely outcome is a goal because that forward movement disrupts the concentration of the unit of defenders on the goal line. Something a little like this happened in the closing stages of another All Ireland (Cork v. Galway (1986) but the consequences were not as great. Ger Cunningham and his six backs faced the taker of the close-in free John Cummins. As Cummins lifted the ball Ger moved forward upsetting the others. Goal for Galway!

While most people feel sorry for Limerick it would be an injustice to withhold our admiration from the Ui BhFaile men. However grudgingly most people admire the celebrated masters of the late finish, Kilkenny, they have countless titles won in this fashion. Does it not take a great team to come back from a hopeless position and win by two goals. And all in five minutes! Lest we forget, Offaly's first All Ireland title was won by a late goal from Johnny Flaherty.

On Sunday last despite a liberal supply of good ball only two of Limerick's original forward line — Gary Kirby and Damien Quigley — recorded scores. As I mentioned when previewing the game Offaly are well-balanced, each fulfilling the role allotted to him with the minimum of fuss. Kevin Kinahan is a good example of this sound unspectacular approach. Not a household name by any means Kevin's impact was big insofar as the threat of Pat Hefernan was snuffed out.

Five of Offaly's forward line (of the original six) — Declan Pilkington, John Troy and The Dooleys, Billy, Johnny and Joe — raised flags for the Midlanders. They had the basic skill, could strike left and right. In contrast Gary Kirby and Frankie Carroll, from whom much was expected, showed their limitations. Once their path to goal on their right was barred forcing them to use their left side they failed. You see they are unable to strike properly from their left side. Four of Limerick's total of wides came from their puerile attempts to strike from the left. Oh, if only they had been properly coached when young lads. A one-sided hurler isn't even half a hurler when confronted by good tacklers, such as Offaly's. What a big price to play for this handicap. Good striking is a prerequisite of the good hurler, since striking is the single most important skill in the game. And from both sides. The training ground is where you perfect it; the match is where you see the fruit of your labours.

Consider Damien Quigley, just another team member before the All Ireland. We heard little of him, but he showed the

pedigree of a champion on Sunday last. From play he scored 2-3 and it was the manner of his scoring which impressed most. What he did was to burst out, gain possession and move quickly before striking. Simple isn't it? His first goal came from a great left-sided shot, on the run. He raced to a dropping ball for his second goal and smashed it, first time, to the net from his right. All of his scores were fashioned by quick thinking, quick movement and skill from both sides in tight situations. I'd love players like that on my team. Pity Limerick hadn't more like him.

Which reminds me to ask, are there players on the present Waterford team depending on one side only? Well, are there?

# Teagasc Co. Waterford Says

## CATTLE

There are a lot of cattle on farms that will finish over the next two months. It is very important that these cattle are kept thriving. Daily liveweight gain on grass normally falls in September as the cool damp conditions result in reduced dry matter intake. This is more serious for cattle that are finishing.

On good autumn grass, cattle liveweight gain of about 0.7kg./day can be got, but in poor conditions, this is likely to drop below 0.5kg./day, which means low carcass gains and slow finishing.

Under-finished cattle should be kept thriving at 0.9kg./day. Supplementary feeding will be necessary to achieve this unless grass quality is excellent.

## MEAL FEEDING

Examine finished cattle regularly and sell the ones that are finished. These are only competing for grass with other stock and they may also become overfat. The response to meal feeding at grass can vary a lot. The best response will be got from the higher priced cattle, e.g. quality Continental crosses. The response could be poor on small fleshy cattle, especially if grass is fairly good.

Where cattle are not fit for the factory, there are a few options:

1. — Feed meal at grass and sell as they become fit.

This is satisfactory on good dry land but may be a bit awkward if there is a large group of cattle or the land is wet. Feed 2-4 kgs./head daily, depending on stock type and grass quality, meal should be introduced gradually, the higher rates to be fed to large Continental cross cattle.

2. — House the heavy cattle and feed silage and concentrates for a period. This may be the best option where grass is scarce or of poor quality, e.g. on a farm where there is plenty of quality silage that is capable of giving a higher rate of gain than the grass. Grazing would then be prolonged for other stock of lower productive requirement e.g. suckler cow, weanlings.

3. — Sell some cattle as forward stores. Consider this for good cattle that are well short of being finished where feed is scarce and/or accommodation is not available.

On average, response to meal feeding at grass should be in order of 0.25 to 0.3 kg. carcass for each 3.5 kg. of meal fed. This would give a return of 55 to 66p for an expenditure of 42p, if meal costs £120/tonne and beef is £1/lb. The economics improve for higher priced cattle and cheaper meal.

The important ingredient of the meal is the energy level of cereals, cereal by-products, beet pulp and molasses are all suitable, although a high level of molasses or wet grass could result in scouring.

## DAIRYING

September grass is low in energy, it is usually damp and gets tramped into the ground easily, so yield often falls too quickly at this time of year.

It is very economic to give spring calving cows extra feed to keep them milking well from mid-September onwards, if the quota can allow it. Baled silage, if available, is useful, feed one bale to about 30-40 cows/day, but as the month progresses, some meal will be necessary if cows are not getting it already.

A yield of around three gallons at October 1 and two and a half gallons at housing is excellent and cows will milk well on good silage until around Christmas. However, this time of year is critical if yield does down quickly, cows will go dry in November.

The amount of milk sold off farms, particularly smaller farms, is the single most important efficiency factor of all. No other efficiency or saving could contribute as much to income.

## STUBBLE TREATMENT

Cultivation of stubble ground should be repeated to encourage further germination and prevent germinated weeds from going to seed.

It is not sufficient to just rip up stubble — a relatively fine tilt must be produced. Extensive cultivation will help greatly against creeping soft grass and will help contain scutch. The alternative is chemical herbicides.

## SCUTCH

Stubble should be allowed to green up as much as possible before treatment. Use a minimum of three pints of the B formulations of roundup or Gallop, or a minimum of one and a half pints of straight Roundup, Gallop or Prode with Sulphate of Ammonia or other appropriate wetters. Other grass weeds are also becoming a problem such as creeping soft grass, which can be difficult to control in wheat as the grass has matured before it is time to spray.

Stubble control is the only options available at this stage.

# Stronger Wool Price

SAYS IFA SHEEP COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman James Coughlan said this week that sheep farmers should be getting a minimum base price of 42p/lb for lowland wool and 28p/lb for mountain wool with an extra premium for quality well presented and rolled fleeces.

Mr. Coughlan said that at the British Wool Board sale in Scotland on August 17 prices were 5% to 10% dearer all round. "There were 2.4 million kilos of wool on offer. Trade was lively, prices advanced by 5% - 10% and there was a complete clearance."

The IFA sheep farmers leader said that based on this sale flock owners should be getting a minimum of 42p/lb for lowland and 28p for mountain wool.

## CO. WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

The Chairman of County Waterford ICMSA, Mr. John Cusack welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, that the grants for farm pollution control and dairy hygiene will be operational from September 1.

The Chairman said that ICMSA had repeatedly expressed its concern at the delay in announcing the Schemes and had raised the issue with the Minister on many occasions. He said that he was pleased to see the Minister finally fulfill his commitment to ICMSA.

"It is unfortunate that the introduction of these Schemes has been delayed for so long. However farmers should now make maximum use of the opportunity provided to carry out this much needed work on their farms. Farmers awaiting details of the Scheme in order to finalise their REPs applications, are now free to do so now that they know the level of grant aid available to carry out pollution control work," said the Chairman.

While welcoming the increase in the rate of grant aid for pollution control work, the County Chairman

said that the standard costings used to estimate the cost of the work are totally out of touch with reality and he called on Minister Walsh to address this issue. ICMSA succeeded in having the standard costings linked to the rate of inflation two years ago. However the fact remains that the base level of costings was originally too low.

"The provision of grant aid to facilitate dairy farmers to meet the standards set by the new dairy hygiene regulations was also welcomed. This grant aid was one of the primary demands of ICMSA in the Programme for Competitiveness and Work. The Chairman said that he hoped that small scale producers would now be in a position to put in place the necessary facilities to enable them continue in milk production.

"This grant aid coupled with the soon to be announced aid for the purchase of milk quota by small scale producers, is the type of support required to ensure that small scale dairy producers can have a viable future," said the Chairman.

With regard to the Pollution Control Scheme, the County Chairman welcomed the increase in the rate of grant for both housing and slurry and effluent storage facilities to a single

rate of 60% rather than the old rates of 35% and 40% respectively. He said it makes good sense to fund building works above and below ground level at the same rates.




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

Memories of these clashes will inspire the players on both sides to produce their very best in a game that will decide who fills the third place on the league table and qualifies for the quarter finals. The losers will play Stradbally in another crunch game on the following weekend.

It has been a while since Dungarvan were at full strength for a game and for that matter a while since the team played a good game. They were in sparkling form when they fielded a very experimental team against the Nire but apart from this, their displays have been rather mediocre and they will need to show considerable improvement if they are to survive this one. Scorer in chief, Morrie Ferncombe is likely to be missing from the line out and midfielder Derek Lyons who has

starred in many of their matches, will also be out, unless he has recovered from an ankle injury sustained in training. Eddie Burke, who was not available for a number of games, may also be an absentee. Without so many of their best players, they will find winning very difficult against a side like Rathgormack, who recently overpowered Stradbally at the Leamybrien venue.

Rathgormack seem to be coming to their best at the right time and players like Donnie and Dan Crotty, Richard, Kevin, Declan, Martin and Sean Power, Finbarr Crotty, Brendan Curry, Vinny Murray, Joe Murray and company, when in form, make up a very difficult outfit and beating them won't be easy for Dungarvan, who must go into this one wearing the outsiders tag.

### THE DOUBLE HEADER

I doubt if any championship could throw up a more attractive pairing than the Brickeys and Ring and this is what we have in this divisional intermediate football semi final on Sunday. When they met several weeks ago in the league section, the Brickeys won on the score 2-8 to 1-6. It was a good contest which produced some nice football, but it was not a vital match for either team, as this one is and I expect that to make an enormous difference. This is one of the rare games that people talk about for two weeks before it takes place.

Brickeys are enjoying one of their very best seasons in a long while and have ideas of going the full distance. Winning the intermediate football championship and beating rivals Ring, twice in the process, would be something more than they have ever hoped for. Making it happen is certainly not impossible, but my feeling is that this may not happen. For a long while through the championship, Ring, were not a full strength, due to injuries and a few players not being available. For this

vital tie practically all their players will be there and under the expert coaching and guidance of trainer David Kiely, who took them to the county final against Newtown last year, they will be a far better prepared outfit here on Sunday. Whether or not they will be good enough to reverse the result of their last meeting with Brickeys, is the big question at the moment. I think Ring will just about manage this.

### Faha v. Shamrocks

This is a play-off game in the intermediate football championship and the result will decide which team goes forward to the divisional semi-final. When they met in the league section, Faha defeated Shamrocks by 2-10 to 0-12. One of the Faha goals on the day was of the soft variety and that would seem to indicate that there is very little between the teams, so this should be a tight and close affair, with very little between them at the finish.

### MINOR FOOTBALL FINAL

This final between Ballyduff and Abbeyside will be played at Cappoquin at 6 p.m. on Sunday next and it should be quite a battle for the title, which is currently held by Abbeyside, who lost to Tramore in the county final last year. This was not one of our best championships this season as there were a number of unexpected withdrawals which made the competition a bit lopsided near the finish. Ballyduff's best display was when beating Dungarvan by five points and Abbeyside showed their best form when beating St. Olivers by 0-12 to 0-3. In a situation like this, it is usually wiser to give the vote to the reigning champions.

### U-21 FOOTBALL FINAL

This is between the Nire and Stradbally and is scheduled for Fraher Field on Saturday evening next at 6.30 p.m. In the semi-final the Nire beat Ballinacourty by

three points in Ballymacarbry, while Stradbally had narrow wins against both Kilrossanty and Dungarvan.

Both the Nire and Stradbally have a selection of very promising young players including Tom Flynn and Paul Foley who were so very prominent in the county team's effort to win a Munster championship some weeks ago.

This should be a splendid contest with Stradbally the slight favourites to take the title.

### JUNIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

#### Kilgobinet v. Lismore

This is the other semi-final and it will be played at Cappoquin on Tuesday evening next. Lismore are the reigning divisional champions and will be fancied to retain their title, but will find it difficult enough to hold this Kilgobinet team who drew with Tallow and defeated Modeligo and Ballyduff.

Ballyduff, incidentally, have notified the Board that they have withdrawn from the junior football championship.

### U-21 HURLING SEMI-FINALS

Both the under-21 hurling semi finals in the 'A' championship, involving Dungarvan versus St. Patrick's and Lismore against Ballyduff were scheduled for last evening (Tuesday) and if there are results in both, the final is likely to take place within a couple of weeks.

### FIXTURES MEETING

A further fixtures meeting of the Divisional Board is due to be held at Cappoquin on next Tuesday evening following the junior football game between Kilgobinet and Lismore. The committee hope to be in a position to fix games in all their championships, up as far as the final stages at this meeting.

### SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

#### Mount Sion v. Dunhill

This quarter final game in the senior hurling championship is fixed for Kill venue on Sunday evening next.

### Lismore v. Clonea

At the time of writing, I have been informed that the Lismore/Clonea hurling quarter final may go ahead at Fraher Field on Sunday afternoon. If this becomes a certain fixture, then the Dungarvan/Rathgormack senior football tie at Leamybrien cannot be played as Clonea players are involved with Rathgormack. It is important therefore that supporters check on this one before travelling. This tie, if it goes ahead, should see Lismore return to winning form and qualifying for the county semi-final against Passage or Ballygunner.

They were far from their best in the recent match with Ballygunner when they went down by a whopping 15 points. This was the biggest defeat suffered by Lismore in recent years and it is not the kind of thing which happens to county champions. On the other hand their records show that they have splendid recovery powers and their scoring feats are there to back this up.

Clonea, although winning deservedly against a fancied Portlaw team on Saturday evening, are a very lucky team to have qualified after quite a number of very narrow escapes. They played two draws and won all but one of the remainder of their matches by a single score. I cannot see the county champions losing out at this stage.

### Mount Sion v. Dunhill

This is the second quarter final and while there is nothing absolutely certain about the outcome, Mount Sion on present form should survive and qualify for the

semi-final. Dunhill were very impressive when defeating Stradbally and could pose quite a challenge, but I doubt if they will beat Mount Sion.

### CAPPOQUIN DOUBLE HEADER

One of this popular venue's most exciting double headers of recent times takes place on Sunday afternoon when Kilgobinet take on Glen Rovers and Tourin play Geraldines in the two Comeragh Oil junior hurling championship semi-finals. Splendid fare is promised here and with so much at stake all four will go all out to win a place in the divisional final which is due to take place in a couple of weeks time.

Kilgobinet should carry too many 'big guns' for Glen Rovers, but that too was our feeling when previewing their match with Lismore. However a defeat for Kilgobinet would be a major surprise.

Geraldines and Tourin met in the league section in a very close encounter which saw Geraldines win by 1-7 to 0-8. With so little between them, this is sure to be another one to produce a nailbiting finish. Either team can win here.

## ALL-IRELAND SENIOR HURLING FINAL

### Limerick's Amazing Failure

It must surely go down in history as one of the most amazing turnabouts ever in a national final. Leading by a clear five points with only as many minutes remaining and they to lose after Johnnie Dooley's goal from a free after corner back Joe O'Connor had rather carelessly fouled in the 30th minute of the second half, turned the game around in favour of Offaly.

How one small incident changed history for luckless Limerick, is certainly a lesson for those who refuse to believe that little things mean a lot. How Limerick let this one get away, is something that will bewilder everyone and it will continue to be talked about for many years to come. It reminded me (and many others I feel sure) of that fateful day in September 1957 when our lead of six points was whittled away in the dying minutes against Kilkenny.

We know the agony they must have suffered when the Leinster champions stole the game that looked well and truly over and decided going into the final five minutes. It also goes to prove that there is nothing at all to be gained by being the better team for 65 minutes, if a team is going to allow itself to collapse in the last five. Our hearts went out to Limerick, as it might have helped our ego a bit if they won, also we felt that they deserved an All Ireland after years of effort, but all praise to Offaly who took their chances at the right moment and were rewarded with an All Ireland for doing so.

The game was very entertaining and produced some splendid hurling and the fact that one of the teams did the amazing trick of coming from five points behind to a six points victory all in 5 minutes, will keep hurling people talking about this for years to come.

### ALL IRELAND MINOR FINAL

#### Galway 2-10 Cork 1-11

This was the first occasion on which a Galway minor team have beaten Cork in the All Ireland championship even though they had met on 13 previous occasions. The Tribesmen, who reportedly spent £7,000 on preparing their under-14 panel for the Tony Forristal Tournament (which they won) this year, are hopeful of adding the All Ireland Under-21 title to their list of victories when they play Kilkenny on next Sunday.

### BRO. J. L. DORMER

He was in action also in Croke Park on Sunday and was manager of the Limerick team in the I.N.T.O. Mini Sevens. His side came off second best to their bigger opponents on the Offaly team.

### NEW STAND

The new Cusack Stand was partially open for the first time in an All Ireland and it certainly looked magnificent. However, what could be a major problem and a headache for the Association, is the fact that it is possible for all the patrons in the lower deck to gain unhindered access to the playing pitch and this could, in certain circumstances spell danger. On Sunday in the closing minutes of the final, a couple of thousand supporters came out on to the sideline waiting to engulf the Offaly team when the whistle went. It is something that needs urgent attention.

Tickets seemed to be plentiful enough on the streets of Dublin on Sunday and the touts were in business all the way from O'Connell Bridge out to the barriers.

### WATERFORD v. OFFALY

The luck of the draw means that Waterford will be the next team to play the All Ireland champions as the counties are scheduled to meet in the opening round of the National League in Tullamore on October 9. This is not a very inviting prospect to start off our campaign.

# The End of the Football League?

Unless we are completely misreading the situation in regard to the present system of running the championship, it seems that the end of the league system has arrived and a new system will be introduced for the 1995 championships. The number of clubs who are opposed to the present system is growing by the week and it seems to be only a matter of time before a halt is called to the present league system and a system similar to the one proposed for hurling by the Lismore Club introduced.

Since our notes last week the football league/championship was completed with the playing of the Nire/St. Saviours match on Monday evening and this may be the opportune time to take a look back on what were the memorable features of the 56 championship matches played by the sixteen clubs in the two divisions set up last March. I wrote recently that it was the most haphazard competition on record, with cancellations, postponements, changing of dates, etc., being a source of great annoyance to the clubs and the public and of inconveniences to many of the players working away. Most of the changes were as a result of players being required by county selectors, but I have written all about this before and won't bore readers again on the matter.

The bottom line in all this is that very few people could describe the senior football championship to date as being a successful competition. In fact if one were to undertake a random survey of patrons throughout the county and ask them to name the most memorable senior football championship game seen by them so far, very few would be able to name games that excited them or would be remembered as splendid contests.

There were some matches which entertained and pleased the patrons, but these were few and far between indeed. I know that in the half dozen or so matches remaining, we will see the best of club football because all the remaining teams are in a "death-or-glory" situation and there is no way back into the championship for those who are beaten. It is great to have this to look forward to in the coming weeks.

### HOW THEY HAVE FARED

**Gaultier** — Had a great run and ended by qualifying for the county semi-final. They lost two games (Saviours and the Nire). Scored no goals in their first four matches, but in the finish they came out as the top scorers in division 1. Their total score was 10-77 and had 4-58 scored against. They have 10 league points.

**Nire** — They are the reigning county champions, but found it difficult enough to get through to the semi-final and had to wait until the 102nd match of the championship to qualify. They lost to Stradbally and Dungarvan. Their total score from their seven matches was 14-51 and had 3-67 scored against them. They have 10 league points.

**Stradbally** — They got off to a great start and went to their fifth game before being beaten by Gaultier. They were the only team in their group of 8 to have scored one or more goals in all their matches. With a total of 14-63 they were the second highest scorers in their group. They had 12-57 scored against them. They have eight league points and will need to win their play-off match against Dungarvan or Rathgormack before knowing if they have qualified for the knockout stages.

**Dungarvan** — Dungarvan had a lot of near misses. Won their second and third matches by a point, having lost their first match by just a single point. They scored 8-57 and had 6-61 scored against them. They have 8 league points and will need to beat old rivals, Rathgormack on next Sunday, to qualify for the quarter-finals.

**Rathgormack** — There were no green flags raised in their first three matches as both themselves and their opponents went without a single goal. A great display against Stradbally in their final game rescued them from being one of the "also-rans" in the battle for the knockout stages. They have scored 6-67 in their 7 games and had 8-47 against. They have 8 league points and are in a tie-breaker with Dungarvan next Sunday.

**St. Saviours** — They promised a lot when playing a draw with both Kilrossanty and Stradbally in their first two matches. Ended their run when losing a crunch game to the Nire last week. Had a total score of 7-49 and the score against them was 9-53. They have 6 league points and are out of the championship. Will be in a play-off with Kilrossanty for relegation to Division 2.

**Kilrossanty** — Like St. Saviours, they just missed out. They needed a win against Stradbally but only

managed a draw which left them 2 points short for a play-off game with three others. Had only three goals in their seven games, but did well in scoring the second highest number of match points in their division. They had five games without scoring a goal. Their total score was 3-73 and had 10-50 against. They had 6 league points and can be relegated.

**Ballinacourty** — The only club in the championship who did not recall their re-graded players after the first couple of junior matches, as is the normal practice. They won no match, but were distinctly unlucky not to have done better against Rathgormack who beat them by 2 points in their first match. They scored a total of 6-41 and had 16-81 scored against them. No league points and will be relegated to Division 2.

### DIVISION 2

**Tramore** — After a number of poor seasons, they seem to have improved quite a lot and are the only one of the sixteen teams to have won six matches. They lost to Sliabh gCua in their first match and won all the remainder.

They are also the highest scoring side in the entire championship with a total of 14-67 and also have the smallest score against 3-37. They have 12 league points and are qualified for the quarter-finals as well as being promoted to Division 1 for next year.

**Kilmacthomas** — They occupy second place in Div. 2 and have qualified for the quarter-finals of the championship and will be promoted next year. They were beaten by Tramore and Affane, but finished up with 10 league points with a total score of 7-56 and had 7-48 against them.

**Sliabh gCua** — Could be rated the most unlucky team in the championship. They missed out by a match point and a league point for a play-off. They had a total score of 15-51 and had 13-57 scored against them. They had 9 league points.

**Dunhill** — Scored 5-12 against Sliabh gCua and this was the highest score of the entire championship. Unlucky to have missed out on a place for the knockout stages. Total score was 11-53 and 9-53 against. Had 8 league points.

**Butlerstown** — Also had 8 league points and could, with a bit of luck, have qualified. They had the lowest score in Division 2. Total 3-57 and against it was 5-62. Scored no goal in five of their seven matches.

**Newtown** — Last year's

intermediate county champions can feel happy enough about their first season in the top grade. Total score 6-50 and against it was 10-55. They have 4 league points and no worries about going back down a step.

**Affane** — A single score would have made a difference in five of their seven games. No team went closer to victory and came off a loser. They were coming 'home alone' in the game against Sliabh gCua when they blew up and conceded a league point. Avoided relegation by capturing 3 league points. Scores for 6-46 and 8-55 against.

**Clashmore** — Not too disappointed about their performances, having gone close in a few matches. Were refused regrading last year and will now be demoted to intermediate grade for next year. They scored 3-51 and had 9-64 scored against them.

The grand total of 133 goals and 909 points scored in the 56 matches gives an average score of 2-16 per game. (1-8 per team).

### PROMOTION/ RELEGATION

Kilrossanty will now play St. Saviours and the losers of the game will be relegated, as will Ballinacourty. There two teams will be replaced with Tramore and Kilmacthomas who will be in Div. 1 next year (if the system is maintained). Clashmore will be relegated from Div. 2 and will be replaced by the new intermediate county champions.

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# Retiring From A Job Well Done

who, over the years, were privileged to work with Bertie White".

The official explanation of the motto states that it is, "intended to teach an important moral lesson. Individually we are admonished to make ourselves acquainted with the duties of our various callings, in order that we may be able to direct our own affairs, and collectively, that, if we desire to see the town satisfactorily governed, we must grasp the reins with our own hand".

### "ENCOURAGER, EDUCATOR AND FRIEND"

The apparent friendship and camaraderie which the U.D.C. and Mr. White enjoyed was only all too evident in Cllr. Kyne's speech who said that in the stewardship to the town, its people and councillors, Mr. White had left an indelible mark on all of them.

"To the elected members, he could be a hard taskmaster but always an adviser, encourager, educator and friend who always highlighted the fact that we were elected by the people to serve by the democratic process".

The U.D.C. Chairman said that while his service to the town could be described as having served under 6 managers, while that was historically accurate it was Bertie White who had led and driven the town of Dungarvan during a time of major social and infrastructural change that is there for all to see today.

Cllr. Kyne said his many influential contacts in Government departments were testament to his skills as negotiator, motivator and communicator — skills which he used for the betterment of Dungarvan.

### PLAYED A KEYROLE

Continuing his speech, Cllr. Kyne submitted that from working with, providing the services for and helping to attract industry to Dungarvan, Bertie White had played a key, often unseen (as was his style) role in providing employment for Dungarvan and West Waterford.

"He also believed in delegation and flexibility and this leadership was rewarded by a staff with an ability and attitude toward the public that was ahead of its time". The U.D.C. Chairman went on, "Those that mattered most to Bertie were the people themselves..... as a public servant he treated people with a respect and dignity, that, without doubt, should be an example to us all".

Finally, on a more personal note, Cllr. Kyne spoke of the great friendship he en-

joyed with both Bertie and his wife Eileen, a couple he had the highest respect for.

### "FOUNTAIN OF KNOWLEDGE"

Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly, recalled how he had been befriended by Bertie White when he started out in local government with Waterford County Council more than 30 years ago. "I owe him a deep debt of gratitude because without him and his help and advice, I would not be back in my native county as County Manager". Mr. Connolly described the retiring Town Clerk as a "fountain of knowledge" as far as local government administration was concerned and Dungarvan had been fortunate in having him for the past 35 years.

### MANY TRIBUTES PAID

Other tributes were paid by Dungarvan Town Planner, John Reid, Stephen O'Connor, Waterford Foods Chief Executive, on behalf of the local industrial and business sectors, Brian McNally, County Secretary and Ray Moloney who is presently acting Town clerk and who was M.C. for the occasion.

### OVERWHELMED BY TURNOUT

Visibly moved by the warmth of the tributes, Mr. White, who was accompanied by his wife Eileen and daughter Mrs. Elaine Falvey, admitted to being "overwhelmed and astounded" by the huge turnout.

In an emotive speech, he described the last 35 years as "eventful and job satisfying" and went on to recall many of the people with whom he had closely worked with.

He referred also to the 'friendship and camaraderie and keen spirit' of his own Town Hall staff all of whom had a job to do and did it well.

In conclusion, Mr. White lauded all the councillors with whom he had worked and praised the may courageous decisions they had taken — decisions that made Dungarvan a town to be envied from infrastructural and industrial points of view. For the press Mr. White reserved the most eloquent of tributes. "The press people who have covered the affairs of Dungarvan U.D.C. over the years always applied the highest of journalistic standards and have at all times been a credit to their profession", he said.

Presentations were also made to Mr. White by the County Manager, the County Secretary, and by Marie Mullins on behalf of the U.D.C. staff, while a presentation was also made to his wife Eileen.
