## Taoiseach On Visit To Lismore

On Sunday afternoon last An Taoiseach Albert Reynolds T.D. visited Lismore on a courtesy call to see the near completed St. Carthage's House.

The Taoiseach was met on his arrival by Brendan Kenneally T.D., Tim Hegarty, Chairman, Board of Management, St. Carthage's House and Mary Fenton-Morrissey. J. Murphy, Su-

pervisor, escorted the Taoiseach on a visit to the present St. Carthage's House prior to his conducted tour of the new building which is now in the final phase of construction.

Speaking afterwards, the Taoiseach said he was very impressed with what he had seen and he then complimented the hard working committee on their initia-

tive in undertaking such a worthwhile and costly project. Mr. Reynolds promised to examine the shortfall of £46,000 with the relevant Department in his cabinet.

After the visit which lasted

45 minutes Mr. Reynolds left for Dublin by helicopter.

The Taoiseach was accompanied on his visit by Sean Duignan, Government Press Officer, Pat O'Farrell, Gen-

## Council Welcomes Peace Initiative

Waterford County Council is to formally send a vote of congratulations to SDLP Leader John Hume, An Taoiseach, Albert Reynolds and Sinn Fein Leader, Gerry Adams on the joint cooperative peace initiative in an attempt to tackle the notorious Northern Ireland conflict.

Proposing the vote of congratulations, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson described the peace initiative as the most important event ever to happen in Ireland since the Republican forces ceasefire in 1923.

"The peace initiative is a great attempt to tackle an age old problem and I would like to see that the efforts by these three men will be successful" continued Cllr. Wilkinson who praised the "great courage" shown by Irish Leader, Albert Reynolds.

### MEDIA CRITICISM

While praising the three political headfigures involved, Cllr. Wilkinson however strongly criticised sections of the media warning that they control themselves in this matter of life and death. In particular the Fianna Fail Councillor slammed the reaction of Professor John A. Murphy on a recent edition of 'Questions and Answers' on R.T.E.

Seconding the proposal, Cllr. Ciaran O'Riain also hit out at Prof. Murphy's reaction to the peace initiative declaring that the efforts of all politicians involved would mean peace and reconciliation for the whole country.

"We've been working for such an event for the past 25 years", Cllr O'Riain declared, "this is an historic time for us all".

## Plans For New Waste Disposal Site

Waterford County and City authorities are to proceed jointly with plans for a new County Waste Disposal site, a study of which will cost the authorities almost £1/4m between them.

Members of Waterford Co. Council agreed to Co. Manager, Donal Connolly's recommendations that they proceed with the waste disposal plans even though it is not yet clear as to the extent of the grants that will be available.

In a detailed report to Council Members at their monthly meeting last Mon-

day, Mr. Connolly explained that the question of obtaining an alternative landfill site for the county has reached the imperative stage.

The site at Dungarvan has very limited remaining life and the continuing use of the site at Tramore has given rise to unfavourable comment in recent years.

Discussions between the Council and Waterford Corporation have taken place over the past number of years on the possibility of a joint site to serve the needs of both authorities.

### NATIONWIDE ISSUE

With regard to the vast amount of funds needed to carry out this waste disposal study, Mr. Connolly said

it was something the Council would "just have to face up to" in view of the changing environmental and legislative approach both at EU and National level.

The nationwide emphasis, he explained, is now towards increased recycling and the EU Draft Directive on landfill sites will impose more numerous criteria for new sites. Mr. Connolly added that a new Waste Bill will be coming on stream later in the year and in the past fortnight alone, the Department of the Environment has issued a Document - Recycling for Ireland which envisages nu-

### LENTIL BURGERS

Rinse 1 cup dried lentils under cold water. Place in a large saucepan and add 5 cups water. Cover and simmer until soft — about one hour. Drain.

Combine lentils with 1/2 cup breadcrumbs 1/4 cup finely chopped onion, 3 tbsps. wheat germ, 1 tbsps. vinegar, 1 tbsps. mustard, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. garlic

powder and 1 beaten egg. Divide mixture into six equal patties.

In a large frying pan fry patties in 3 tbsps margarine for three minutes on each side. Top each patty with a slice of cheese. Cover frying pan and cook until cheese is melted. Serve on rolls.



### COURGETTE FRIES

Cut two large, unpeeled courgettes into strips 3

inches long and 1/4 inch wide. Add oil for frying to a medium saucepan to a depth of three inches. Heat oil to 400 degrees on a frying thermometer. While oil heats, combine 1/2 cup water and 1/3 cup flour until smooth. Dip strips a few at a time into flour mixture and deep-fry until golden. Drain on paper towels. Salt to taste.

## Evergreens help lessen winter woe

We are now into summer's final fling and the tidying up 'after the party'.

On top of that comes lifting plants at risk from frost, bulb planting and the knowledge that hated jobs like clearing leaves and digging are not long away — no wonder some gardeners question whether it's all worth it.

Their lives would be easier with more space turned over to evergreens. They also keep the garden looking attractive all year round.

Dwarf conifers are excellent labour savers and a visit to the garden centre reveals the range of variety, shade of green and variegation.

Grouping several different varieties should be fairly inexpensive while creating an all-year round feature, easily enhanced or framed by attractive rocks or paving.

If you still want colour, try planting knots of aubrietia to provide pinkish and mauve flowers from spring into early summer.

Apart from providing this seasonal display, aubrietia is hardy, needs little care and has an attractive smoky-green foliage all year round.

The plant is particularly effective if allowed to cascade down a slope or edge of a wall.

Heathers are more good 'bedfellows' for conifers.

Though everybody pictures these as compact carpets of pink, the various plants under this loose heading come in many sizes and with care, you could plant enough different types to ensure some blooms all year round.

However, you may have problems if your soil is limey. Other suggested evergreen labour savers:

**LAVENDERS** — in an evergreen garden these offer a contrast thanks to their greyish foliage. On top of this you get delicately coloured flowers ranging from pink to blue to white.

**SENECIOS** — silvery-grey foliage offers another contrast to green and they also provide plenty of daisy-like flowers in early summer.

Unfortunately, senecios can be damaged by winter frost and chill unless you live near the coast and the moderating influence of the sea.

**BROOM** — easy to care for, with rich green foliage enlivened by masses of blooms in May. Most are deciduous, so check carefully when buying.

**CHOISYA** — or Mexican Orange Blossom is a neat option with its shiny evergreen leaves and burst of flowers in May, plus occasional bonus blooms later in the year.

It thrives in most soils but may need siting against a wall, to cope in colder parts of the country.

**DANAE** — or Alexandrian Laurel is an excellent 'team player': it produces a rare splash of autumn colour in the form of bright orange berries. The elegant leaves also make good greenery for indoor flower arrangements in winter. Perhaps best of all for the gardener who wants to save labour is its modest needs and ability to cope with shade and damp soil.

## Algal Bloom Off Waterford Coast

The sea water around the Waterford Coast has suffered a discolouration over the past two to three weeks with a corresponding death of marine life, i.e. lug worms, fish, etc., in certain areas.

Samples taken by the South East Health Board officers have been examined at the Fisheries Research Centre at Abbotstown in Dublin. The results confirmed that the discolouration was caused by an Algal Bloom, commonly called a red tide, along the South and South East coast. The organism involved is *Gyrodinium aureolum*, a common phytoplankton in seawater, which was present in a concentration between one quarter and one half million cells per litre. The organism is not toxic to marine animals or bathers, but the decay of dead cells may re-

sult in deoxygenation of the water, leading to the mortality of certain marine animals.

Algal Blooms are a common occurrence along this coast, especially during the summer and early autumn when higher sea temperatures and calm waters favour algal growth. Further information can be obtained from the Environmental Health Offices 058/42199.

# Minister Presents Community Award To Tallow Group

On Wednesday, September 7 last the Minister for Labour Affairs, Mary O'Rourke, T.D., presented the Community Initiative Awards for the Midlands Region to the winning groups in Bru Boru, Cashel. One of the four award winners for the South East was the Tallow Enterprise Group which came out tops in the Community Enterprise category.

## AWARDS SCHEME

The Community Initiative Awards Scheme was established by FAS to recognise and encourage community effort and local initiative throughout the country. The awards also highlight the role played by FAS as a catalyst in the area of community development. Awards are made in four categories:— to projects or schemes deemed to have a social benefit, economic benefit, heritage/environmental benefit or constructive benefit in their communities.

Representing the Tallow Enterprise Group at Cashel were Helen McCarthy and Sean Tobin, Development Officer for the Enterprise Group. The duo were presented with specially commissioned trophies by Minister O'Rourke. They will now go on to represent the South East region in the entrepreneurial category at the National Community Awards Ceremony in Dublin later this month.

## MINISTERIAL TRIBUTE

The Minister in her address congratulated the winners for their efforts and extended her praise to all community groups in the region who entered the scheme. The Minister paid tribute to the many people who gave freely of their time, expertise and resources. "In becoming involved and sponsoring an employment scheme or training programme you are not just improving the amenities in your own locality you are also providing training and expertise to people who would otherwise be unemployed. You are giving them the skills which assist them in their quest for full time employment."

## LOCAL INITIATIVE

The Tallow Enterprise Group was founded in 1986 with the help of Tallow Credit Union, in response to the noticeable lack of advice and assistance available in the area for local people in setting up their own business.

"There was no stepping stone available to self em-

ployment," said Sean Tobin, Development Officer for the Enterprise Group, "our aim was to get at least one person off the dole and set up in his/her own business."

The Group started out in the old run down mill which was completely refurbished to the tune of £70,000. Incubation space was then created for "infant" businesses to take root and expand on their own.

As successful businesses flourished, it became apparent to the Enterprise Group that a bigger ground space area was needed. The former O'Brien's Garage was subsequently purchased by the Group which facilitated 17,000 square feet of workshop space.

The Group currently employs up to twenty participants who are currently engaged in developing a language school. The innovative entrepreneurial idea itself is one based on "strength in numbers," a co-operative system involving the whole community. The Enterprise Group also offers a Consultancy Board which is made up of local experienced business people who help and advise the new starters to avoid the many pitfalls often associated with the first year in business.

Already, the Tallow Enterprise Centre is home to Pat Ferguson of Heritage Picture Framing, Kelpex Displays, artists and a storage display unit.

Any number of incubation units comprising of 500 to 6,000 square feet are still available at the Tallow Centre. Social activities are also well catered for with a successful creche and dress-making centre in operation.

For the future Mr. Tobin looks forward to many different workshops in conjunction with FAS and the IDA. With so much interest in self development through training and the creation of sustainable self employment, the Community Initiative Award was well and truly deserved by the Tallow Enterprise Group. We now look forward to the results of the National Awards at which the South East will be most ably represented.

# £9,000 To Update Town Toilets

Members of Dungarvan U.D.C. were informed by Co. Manager, Donal Connolly at their meeting last Monday night that the cost of updating the town's existing public convenience near Abbeyside Bridge is estimated to be in the region of £9,000. The existing toilet facilities on the quay have recently been the subject of much unfavourable comment by members of the public and councillors alike who have described the ill kept public convenience as a disgrace to the town.

## SUPERLOO ARGUMENT

Reacting to this latest information on the updating cost, Cllr. Paddy Power pointed to the more favourable alternative of installing a superloo in Grattan Square, a sight he had often encountered in Clonmel, Wexford and towns in South Tipperary.

Speaking from his experience as former Co. Manager in Roscommon, Mr Connolly however, said the cost of purchasing such a superloo would be approximately £40,000 with extra costs in the area of on going maintenance and repair work. On the other hand, Mr Connolly agreed with Cllr. Power that superloos were practically vandal proof, could facilitate the disabled and were self cleansing, but would be slow in serving bus loads of people.

"We could apply to the Department for a grant for a superloo but again, money is limited and the waiting

list is long", said Mr Connolly.

Joining in the discussion, Cllr. Tony Wright said the present location of the public toilets on the Quay was particularly vulnerable to vandalism. The superloo alternative was also a closed door for him, declaring that the structures "don't impress me at all". In relation to the £40,000 plus cost of installing a superloo, Cllr. Wright said this expenditure would not be offset by the total income of the

charges made to use this public convenience.

## URBAN RENEWAL ALTERNATIVE

The tax incentives under Dungarvan's recently launched urban renewal scheme were then referred to by Cllr. Damien Dillon who suggested the council incorporate a public toilet in one of the areas designated under the scheme, such as Davitt's Quay or the former Mulcahy premises at Main Street, under the maintenance of a caretaker.

## SUM UP

Summing up the various views of council members, U.D.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne said a suitable design or layout was needed which would not be susceptible to wanton vandalism. As an alternative to spending £40,000 or more on a superloo, the council would do well, he added, to spend £5,000 in employing a caretaker to work for 4 hours a day in maintaining a modern public convenience.

It was agreed to raise the issue again at the estimates meeting in November, where members will decide on the allocation of funds for 1995.



Others are suffering from serious biochemical illnesses of the brain, some of which may require long-term care.

## WHERE AWARE COMES IN

One of the main objectives of Aware is to promote research into the causes and the effective treatment of depression and elation. Already much progress has been made and it is hoped that there is still more to come.

A major problem encountered by sufferers and their families is a lack of understanding of the problem. Through a series of lectures

and educational printed matter, Aware is already doing much to educate all concerned about depression.

# Pulla Famine Graveyard To Be Restored



The importance of tourism and the spin-off it creates for local communities was again to the fore recently, this time in the West Waterford area of Pulla, where innovative action by a determined committee has resulted in the launch of a brochure and plans for the reestablishment of a local Famine Graveyard as a major historical site.

## LONG ABANDONED

The long abandoned graveyard of the Reilig a tSlé site in Gorta, first came into existence in 1846 as a result of the Great Famine. Sadly overgrown, the site is situated beside the Seanachie Restaurant off the

Cork/Waterford N25 road, and lies somewhat forgotten among the quiet beauty of this West Waterford area.

Dotted among the triangular shaped graveyard are small foot/famine stones, marking the mass graves of the many locals who died of starvation as the potato blight destroyed their only means of survival during the famine period.

In the intervening years, mother nature has claimed back her own and a thorny, grassy vegetation now grows rampant, smothering the headstones and making passage almost impossible.

The solitary testament to the graveyard is the large concrete Memorial Cross which was erected in the early 1950's.

## 150TH ANNIVERSARY

The 150th anniversary of Ireland's Great Famine takes place from 1995-1997 and a Commemorative Day will be held in May of next year by which time the Pulla Tourism Group hope to have the restoration work on Reilig a tSlé completed.

Already, a FAS scheme organised by committee member, Fr. Gregory Power P.P., is expected to come on stream by the end of this month for the duration of one year.

A report on the site was earlier commissioned by Fr. Power on behalf of St. Mary's Parish Church and was undertaken by Delice Osbourne (archaeologist) from Clonmel. With regard to the Pulla committee's intended clean-up plan, the Office of Public Works have expressed no objection so long as the committee adheres to the archaeologist's specific recommendations.

## CLEAN-UP PLANS

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Pulla committee member and local B&B owner, Nora Fahey, said the long term plans for the graveyard site included the erection of a plaque on the outside pier by the roadside and the introduction of a stone monument displaying information on the site in both Irish and English.

In making the site more attractive and presentable to both tourists and locals alike, pathways will be laid down, shrubs are to be

planted and the old gates belonging to an Old Parish Church will be newly done up.

Mrs. Fahey however stressed the importance of the committee's ongoing maintenance even after the clean-up work is complete and the need to restore the site by hand.

Naturally, the support of the public is most welcome and on September 28th next, the committee will hold an American Tea Party at the Seanachie Bar and Restaurant, to raise funds for this most laudable venture.

In all, the committee consists of seven members, those being; Fr. Power, Martin Curran, local resident, Thomas Morrissey, a Co. Council overseer with a personal interest in the site, John Kiely, local resident, Willie Flavin, Pulla resident, Maurice Fahey, B & B owner, Christy O'Neill of the Marine Bar, Nora Fahey, B & B owner and Theresa O'Donovan of the Seanachie.

## HUB OF WEST WATERFORD

Featured in the colourful brochure of Pulla - "the hub of West Waterford", are the various accommodation facilities and amenities in the area, such as Colligan Equestrian Centre, the Marine Bar, the Seanachie, Criostal na Rinne and West Waterford Golf Club.

Launching the Pulla Tourism Group's new

brochure at a recent reception held in the Seanachie, SERTO Regional Manager, Joe Palmer said his visit had reinforced his impression that the people of Dungarvan have all the positive aspects of Irish tourism at their disposal.

Speaking from experience, Mr. Palmer declared, "Dungarvan is probably the one centre in the South East Region, which is moving ahead, tourism wise, at a phenomenally fast rate".

"I predict a very, very bright future for the area, the key to which is in the degree of co-operation and spirit evidenced within the community".

Commenting on the reason behind the brochure, Mrs. Fahey told the Dungarvan Leader that the area had "so much to offer already in terms of Irish culture and traditional Irish music, singing and dancing that we felt we simply had to market ourselves as a major tourist attraction".

The brochures will now be available in the Seanachie and the Marine bar and in various workshops throughout the area.

## Land Owners Grain Protection Group

A large meeting of concerned farmers from West Waterford and East Cork was held last Thursday, September 8 in Tallow. It was decided at this meeting to form a West Waterford Regional Branch of the Land Owners Protection Group.

At the meeting the current Department of Agriculture and I.F.A. Grain Committee proposals for the allocation of grain quotas were described as nothing short of a rip off. In essence the transfer of a major asset from a large number of farmers and land owners to a few greedy individuals.

The present proposals are — That grain quotas will only be given to farmers who grew cereals in 1989, 1990 and 1991. If these proposals are implemented they will deny grain quotas for ever to many farmers who for various reasons 'let' their land during these years.

These proposals should be strenuously fought as it discriminates against a large number of farmers and land owners:

Typical farmers who will be affected are:—

- (1) — Widows with young families who let their land following the death of their husbands.
- (2) — Young farmers whose parents farms were let prior to they commencing farming.
- (3) — Farmers who let their land on the eleven month system.
- (4) — Farmers who let their land for financial or health reasons.
- (5) — Farmers with eligible land who wish to sell part or all of same.

The current proposals of the Government, supported by the I.F.A. is clearly intended to place Grain Quotas in the lands of large grain growers and deny the ordinary family farmers their rights.

# DUNGARVAN YOUTH REMANDED

An 18-year-old Dungarvan youth, who is facing serious indictable charges, was remanded in continuing custody last Friday when he made a brief appearance before Judge Michael Pattwell at Cappoquin District Court. O'Donovan is charged with unlawfully and maliciously causing grievous bodily harm to Detective Garda Michael Lacey at 36 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, on September 6 with intent to maim and disfigure him.

He is further charged on the same occasion with producing in a manner likely to unlawfully intimidate another person, and article, to wit, a timber handle, capable of inflicting serious injury, and with feloniously handling property valued £35 knowing it to have been stolen.

Defence solicitor, Mr. Gerry McCullagh asked the court if the accused could be transferred from Dublin (St. Patrick's Institution) to

Cork prison for the convenience of his family.

Judge Patwell, however, said he had no function in such matters and he remanded O'Donovan in custody back to St. Patrick's Institution.

Supt. Ray McAndrew represented the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Estate residents in the Urban Area are up in arms over Council policy on grass cutting. That's according to Cllr. Tony Wright who declared that grass cutting was a 'living nightmare' for tenants in many estates.

Speaking out at last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Cllr. Wright said he had received many complaints from angry tenants directly affected by grass cutting. In a recent incident Cllr. Wright claimed grass had been cut by council workers and left lying on the ground from where it had then blown onto one tenants freshly painted house.

"If the Council is not in a position to collect the grass on the day it's being cut, then the grass should not be cut at all", he declared, pointing expressively to residential areas who were most affected by discarded grass.

Supporting Cllr. Wright, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said worried tenants had come to her door, requesting the Council leave the grass uncut. "When the cut grass gets wet, the kids go crazy ..... it gets everywhere", Cllr. Ryan submitted.

**IMPOSSIBLE TASK**  
Responding to the Coun-

cillors representations, Town Engineer, George Taylor said council workers had to contend with 30 - 40 acres of grass in the urban area, coupled with an abnormal amount of rain and growth which was experienced this year. "It's impossible to pick up all the grass .... we're in a dilemma", stated Mr. Taylor who

added that the machinery required to pick up the grass was cumbersome with workers having to constantly get off the machine and empty the grass boxes.

U.D.C Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne asked the council officials to look at the more sensitive green areas beside houses and to try to resolve the issue.

merous new duties relating to recycling and landfill which will fall to local authorities.

The Co. Manager reported that limited action has been ongoing in the county in relation to recycling i.e. glass bottles, oil, aluminum cans, waste paper, C.F.S. gas removal from fridges etc. The strategy for future recycling is one of diverting 20% of household and commercial waste away from landfill sites by the year 1999.

## FOUR

### REQUIREMENTS

Listed in the Managers comprehensive report are four necessary requirements before progress can be made on a new waste disposal site.

These are; the production of a waste management strategy covering all present and future solid wastes in the county; the preparation of statutory and special

waste plans; the assessment of waste levels and types, waste minimisation, proposals for recycling and finally proportion of waste to landfill.

The fourth requirement is the identification of likely sites for a landfill, the carrying out of the preliminary site investigation and later detailed site investigations of optimum site and the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement.

It is expected that the eventual site for the landfill will most likely be situated in Co. Waterford but alternative locations include South Kilkenny and South Tipperary.

### £239,800 STUDY COST

The consultants appointed to carry out the waste management strategy are Messrs. John B Barry & Partners, Dublin, who were selected after public advertisement, screening and in-

terview.

The approximate cost of the consultancy and site investigation study etc., is set at £239,800 - the cost to be shared between the Council and Waterford Corporation.

The already cash strapped Co. Council will work jointly with the aforementioned City Authority in the interest of economy and the possibility of obtaining EU Cohesion Fund grant-aid.

An application for grant-aid to defray the near quarter of a million expenditure together with the later developments of the landfill site, transfer stations etc. is now being made.

Replying to anxious queries from Cllr. Ciaran O Riain, Mr. Connolly said he was hopeful of receiving grant aid from the Cohesion Funds. "If not, we will have to borrow the money and pay it back, say over a ten year period."

# Practical Skills To The Fore

On September 14, Dungarvan Technical College opens its doors for the new Construction-Engineering Technology Course. The course will be certified by the Irish National Examining Body, The NCVA, at level 2. It is essentially a programme of practical skills and project work combined with work experience. Students will get a good basic training in the trade skills. Credits can be accumulated from this course for entry to RTCs and FAS courses.

## TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

### WOULD IT HELP?

I wondered some weeks ago, in the context of referees, who in God's name was going to assess or monitor our referees' performances using their findings to enable them improve as referees. Referees, no more than players, need advice, correction, guidance and criticism and it should be presented as objectively, as is possible to enable them progress as match officials. If they are a law unto themselves, answerable to no-one, with never a critical analysis of their work we are doing them and the games a disservice: we are letting them tread on paths alone, a lonely one, while the rest pursue a parallel path, never the twain meeting. The gulf between "them and us" remains wide as ever.

The referee's blanket commitment to silence is, I think bad for the referee, for the teams and for the administrative body in control. You know what I mean, no matter what the outcome of a game the referee cannot be questioned and to do so would insult his worth and that of the board which appointed him. I'm not saying at all that the referee should be in the dock or publicly pilloried. Not at all. It's just that I'd like to hear the referees version of events occasionally, where such an opportunity for frank exchanges would prevent unfair criticism of the poor man in the middle and facilitate greater understanding and appreciation of his difficult role. Many years ago I refereed a

football match, now I wasn't a good referee (you see no one that's right, no one ever offered me any appraisal of my performances) but my twin aims when appointed were to protect players and apply the playing rules. I can recall that one team was the Brickey Rangers and the other, I think, Clashmore. The game became "over robust", the common euphemism for dirty, and on two separate occasions I sent a man off for what I clearly, regarded as dirty dangerous tackles. Boy was I in right trouble!

At the subsequent board meeting, which I attended, my referee's report was read out. The report was challenged. I got to my feet to explain only to be told by the Chairman that I wasn't on trial and that my report was, in effect a sacred document. The County Chairman refused to let me say anything. I think that was a pity because I welcomed a chance to elucidate and wasn't in the least bit inhibited by that particular circumstance.

I believe that a greater understanding between referees and teams and clubs would ensure if a forum existed to allow the referee express himself in contentious situations as the need arose. Clubs then could be expected to shoulder their fair share of responsibility while the referee's authority would remain undiminished and his standing enhanced.

Wouldn't Willie Barreus position of premier referee have been boasted all the more if he were allowed to explain that

the second half free, which he awarded to Limerick in the All Ireland Final and which Gary Kiely pointed, was a mistake; that at the time he didn't realise that Ger Hegarty had crashed into and flattened his own team mate T. J Ryan and that no Offaly man was involved. Had Offaly been beaten you may be sure many of their supporters would have trumpeted their conviction that the free was awarded because Willie was a Munster man! That would do him a big injustice because his overall display of refereeing was good.

Muzzling referees doesn't help the games. How to effect a change in the present system which leaves a referee cocooned from redress, enjoying unlimited powers with no means of promoting his best interests is the really big question. Do clubs care or does anybody give a tinker's curse about the G.A.A.'s most pressing problem in every county - refereeing?

## IFA Livestock Chief Calls On Minister Walsh To Intervene In Shipping Company's Move On Cattle Exports

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Livestock Committee, Maurice Donovan has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, T.D., to intervene immediately over the withdrawal of services by some shipping companies involved in the shipping of livestock from the United Kingdom to the European Continent.

Mr. Donovan said that

Stena Sealink had advised IFA that this withdrawal would affect all livestock except pedigree breeding stock, and as such, will have a major negative impact on the competitiveness of Irish exports which use the Ireland-UK continental route.

The IFA man said "Minister Walsh should immediately demand a

European Commission investigation into this move by the shippers to see whether it contravenes European Union regulations as a most serious interference in cross-community free trade. He must also protest in the strongest possible terms to his British counterpart, UK Agriculture Minister, William Waldergrave."

## County Waterford ICMSA News

Mr. John Cusack, County Chairman, said that there has been no change in the law relating to Occupiers Liability and no change in farmer liabilities.

"As in the past, ICMSA is advising farmers that their best way of reducing their liabilities is to refuse entry to their properties in so far as this is possible."

The Chairman concluded by saying it is regrettable that farmers have to go to such extremes to protect themselves, but the fault lies squarely with the Government by their failure to enact reforming legislation.

Mr. John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South-East region, said that following a meeting of the animal disease eradication forum and officials of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, there are prospects that herd owners who had reacted animals in 1993 will qualify for the higher rates of compen-

satory grant that apply now.

John Quigley said that the claim for retrospective lodged by ICMSA was based on £4.4m. of savings on the budgeted costs last year.

The next meeting of the Animal Disease Eradication Forum is at the end of this month when further information will be available to make final decisions on the increased grants.

The County Waterford Executive congratulated David and Nora Fitzgerald, Modeligo, on their achievement in being presented with an award by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh in the 1994 Family Farm of the Year Award, co-sponsored by EU Commission and FBD Insurances.

David and Nora were the winners of the County Waterford Family Farm Award 1994 promoted by County Waterford ICMSA and Teagasc.

## Feed Wheat Worth £100/Tonne — SAYS IFA

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Grain Committee, Alex Heskin has said that Feed Wheat this harvest was worth at least £100/tonne and he advised growers to bargain hard when selling as, again this harvest, wheat will be very scarce due to increased set-aside and reduced yields particularly in the South where 3 tonnes/acre is currently very difficult to achieve. The Glencairn grain grower said "Feed Wheat is worth a minimum premium of £10 tonne over Feed Barley which is now firmly trading at £90/tonne in the Midlands and the North East."

He added that because Ireland is now a deficit wheat producing country, Irish wheat prices will be dictated by the cost of importing wheat which for October delivery of UK wheat now stands at £124/tonne to Irish ports.

Working this back to a green price would mean that Irish wheat at £100/tonne was very competitive.

While quotes for Feed Wheat were still difficult to come by, Mr. Heskin said "£95-£97/tonne for Green Wheat had been paid in recent days in the Kilkenny/Tipperary region. In the North East £117 for dried Feed Wheat has been paid with £115/tonne being paid in the Midlands," says the Grain Chairman.

## Teagasc County Waterford Says

### AUTUMN MANAGEMENT OF SUCKLER HERDS

There are a number of Autumn Management practices that are central to good herd performance at this period of the year. These practices should ensure that:

(1) — The suckled weaning continues to grow and put in weight at acceptable levels.

(2) — The weaning is properly managed so that the stress of weaning and sale (for those that are sold after weaning) is minimised.

(3) — That cow condition is monitored so that weaning takes place at the appropriate time.

These management practices were dealt with in detail at a recent meeting in Dungarvan which was organised jointly by Teagasc and Dungarvan Mart.

The following is a summary of points made by Patrick O'Brien and Tony Pettit of Teagasc at the meeting:

#### DO!

- ★ Feed meals for 6 weeks before weaning.
- ★ Have weanlings eating about 1.5 kg. meals at weaning.
- ★ Allow weanlings to graze ahead of cows.
- ★ Vaccinate against respiratory viruses.
- ★ Wean outside.
- ★ Wean at least one week before sale.
- ★ Wean progeny of heifers and thin cows first.

#### DO NOT!

- ★ Wean on morning of sale.
- ★ Allow cows to loose too much condition before weaning.
- ★ Wean in harsh weather.
- ★ Wean all animals, young and old at the same time.
- ★ Castrate and dehorn within a month before and after weaning.

#### AFTER WEANING

- ★ Continue to feed meals.
- ★ Provide best grass available for as long as possible.
- ★ If grass is scarce, supplement with silage or hay.

#### SELLING WEANLINGS

Ensure that all stock are:

- ★ Eating about 1.5 kg. of meal per head daily before sale.
- ★ Vaccinated against main respiratory viruses. Discuss with your Vet and have a vaccination certificate available for buyer.
- ★ Wean for at least one week before sale.

#### SOWING WINTER CEREALS

Opportunities for sowing are often limited by wet weather. Late sowings, into poor seedbeds, can lead to low grain yields even if the crop is managed to a high standard during the spring and summer.

Aim to start sowing barley in early October, wheat in mid-October.

In seedbed preparation it is important to minimise the number of passes necessary to achieve a satisfactory seedbed. Avoid cultivating wet soils which will result in soil structural damage, compaction and poor grain yields.

Growers contemplating home saved seed wheat should assess the quality of the grain and the level of small grain or Fusarium infected seeds in the sample as this could affect germination. Seed dressings should control Fusarium in the seed but this will not prevent subsequent ear infection as re-infection can take place from the soil.

Barley seed should also be dressed before sowing. There were a number of disappointed spring barley growers in Co. Waterford this year. They should not assume that a switch to the winter crop will automatically solve their poor output. Winter barley demands good soil and a detailed husbandry package for good results.

#### SHEEP

During September, March lambing flocks are made up and all ewes with damaged or diseased udders should have been culled.

Ewes which are aged, with missing teeth or loose teeth, will lose condition in winter and should be removed.

Where older ewes are retained for cross breeding, they require special care. Management should ensure that they are given access to fresh leafy grazing and concentrate feeding may be necessary over a longer period than with younger ewes. Nevertheless, older ewes which are sound in udder and well treated often produce good lamb crops.

Ewes mated in late July or early August are now safely in lamb and can probably afford to loose some condition over the next couple of months. Stubbles, bare pasture or rough grazing make adequate feed for such ewes. Mild restriction on feed intake at this time can actually increase lamb birth weight by promoting improved growth in the placenta. Once again the important thing is not to overdo things in either direction.

Throughout all of Johnnie's life he had a deep religious faith which helped him through the bad and good times of life and we pray he is now enjoying the rewards of that faith free from pain and worry in his new home in heaven.

Johnnie's remains lay in repose at Murphys funeral home, Corkhill, Youghal, until his removal to Clashmore Church on Saturday evening. Following requiem Mass on Sunday morning burial took place in the adjoining cemetery.



## Farmers Furious With Minister's Inaction On Cattle Prices

Livestock farmers are extremely angry with the complete lack of action and the silence from the Minister of Agriculture, Joe Walsh on cattle prices, said Waterford Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan last week.

Mr. Donovan accused the Minister of presiding over the demise of the EU beef price support mechanisms. "The Minister stood idly by as the Commission tore apart the intervention system last year. In addition, the Minister facilitated cuts in export refunds earlier this year by continually pushing his misguided rebalancing policy. These mistakes are now beginning to bite on cattle prices and at £1/lb. for R grade steers — it is high time Minister Walsh began to make an

impact in halting the slide in prices."

The livestock farmer said that the Minister has a very strong case to make in Brussels for a package of support measures involving APS and export refunds to prevent a further fall in cattle prices this autumn. "Ireland has the second lowest beef price among the 12 EU Member States. With the Irish price at only 88% of the average European price, our exporters also have a major challenge facing them to return a better price to keep Irish producers competitive."

Mr. Donovan said that nothing less than an all-out effort must now be made by Minister Walsh, geared at the Beef Management Committee meeting fixed for 16 September.

Ms. Maura Shanahan and Ms. Lily Lineen have very kindly agreed to organise a Terry Fox Run in Dungarvan in October.

Terry, a young Canadian whose leg had been amputated because of cancer, set out in 1980 to run across Canada to raise awareness of the need for funds to support cancer research. He died before his journey was completed but his courage and determination have inspired the organisation of annual Terry Fox Runs in over forty countries worldwide.

The Irish Cancer Society, the major funder of cancer research in this country, introduced the Run to Ireland in 1993 with great success. Runs were organised nationwide, raising over IR140,000 for innovative cancer research in Ireland.

Research has led to significant advances in cancer diagnosis and treatment and is paving the way to cancer prevention. Some 15,000 people develop cancer in Ireland every year. However thanks to cancer research about 50% of those go on to lead normal lives.

Last week, I reviewed the senior football league and on Thursday I received a telephone call from a reader who said that his club had always backed the league style championship, but after this year would strongly support a change as this championship was now becoming a dead loss. He felt that a number of other clubs would also favour a change.

So, the wind of change seems to be blowing in favour of a new style championship and I suppose what will apply in football will also apply in hurling. At the same time, we will have to wait and see what way all clubs will view the situation. I know of a club who are going to propose that the present system is continued, with the proviso that a list of the championship games for the year is drawn up and circulated in March and when approved by County Board, that no one will have the authority to change the list, dates, times or venues, etc., regardless of what the circumstances are at any time. In this way, this club feels that clubs will be able to plan their activities properly, all games can be played on weekends when players are available and players and officials can plan their holidays, etc., etc.

The only comment I will make on that one is that this was all tried before.

Like the football championship, the hurling championship did not seem to arouse the same interest as in previous years. In the 53 matches played (28 in Div. 1 and 25 in Div. 2) very few could be described as top class encounters and much of the competition was mediocre. From now on all that will change, and we will be treated to the very best of Waterford club hurling from here on in and this is something to look forward to until the final is played.

As we did with the football championship, we take a look at how the various clubs fared in the hurling league championship.

## PASSAGE

Suffered a heavy defeat by Lismore, who beat them in the county final last year, but won all their remaining six matches. They are one of three clubs (Dungarvan and Tallow the others) who scored one or more goals in every game. Their scoring record for the championship was the second highest. They scored 19-87 and had a total of 10-70 against. They have 11 league points. Will meet Lismore in semi-final at Dungarvan next Sunday.

## BALLYGUNNER

They were beaten by Passage and won their remaining six matches. They

achieved a total score of 14-94 and had 11-72 scored against them. They have a total of 12 league points and are in the semi-final. Will play Mount Sion at Walsh Park on Sunday.

## MOUNT SION

Lost to Ballygunner and Passage and won their remaining five matches. They defeated Dunhill in the quarter final and are now in the county semi-final. They scored (in the league section) a total of 14-100 and had 7-73 against. They have 10 league points and are third on the scoring charts. Qualified. Defeated Dunhill in quarter final.

## LISMORE

They have achieved the highest score of the championship so far and are the only team to have scored a total of 20 goals. They total score is 20-86 and had 15-73 against them. They were beaten by Mount Sion and Ballygunner and won the remaining five. They have 10 league points. Have qualified for the semi-final by defeating Clonea on Sunday. Meet Passage in semi-final.

## CLONEA

They were the only undefeated team of the sixteen who took part. They played two draws, received a w/o from Colligan and won five matches. Their total score for six matches was 7-56 and they had 6-43 against. They finished with twelve league points and they qualified for the knockout stages. They eventually went out after losing to Lismore in the quarter final.

## DUNHILL

Scraped through by a single league point after beating Stradbally by a very big score. They scored a 1-7 all draw with Clonea, who were the other team from Div. 2 to qualify. Their total score for six matches was 11-74 and they had 7-52 against. They had a total of 11 league points. They went out when defeated by Mount Sion in the quarter final on Sunday last.

## REMAINDER

The remaining ten teams in the championships were the 'also-rans', and as will be seen from their progress, a number were unlucky to have lost out narrowly.

## PORTLAW

Like last year, they are one of the unlucky ones who seem always to get just far, but not far enough. A single match point in their game against Clonea would have kept them in the running. It also cost them the league point which would have had them level with Dunhill for a tie-breaker. They scored a total of 9-87 and had 5-56 scored against them. 10 league points was just one short for them.

## BALLYDUFF

A single score in their match against Clonea would have kept the second Western team in the hunt, a little longer. They were effected by a very spread-out campaign. Finished up with a total score of 8-79 for and 9-53 against. Had a total of 10 league points.

## ST. SAVIOURS

Had a number of near misses, but were out of the running at a fairly early stage. Had a total score of 17-68, which was very good in the circumstances and had 13-71 against. Finished with 4 league points.

## DE LA SALLE

Their best display was when losing by a single point to Ballygunner. They lost four matches and went out fairly early. Had a total of 9-73 for and 16-84 against. They finished with 5 league points.

## DUNGARVAN

Won 1 match, lost 5 and recorded a w/o from Colligan. Scored one or more goals in every game and was one of only three teams to do so. Overall score 13-43 and had 9-74 against. Total league points 4.

## STRADBALLY

Had a draw with Clonea in their first match and their best after that was when beating Dungarvan. Received their biggest defeat against Dunhill in their final match. Scored 8-32 in six matches and had 16-68 clocked up against them. Total of 5 league points.

## ROANMORE

A win and a draw was the best they could manage. Best match was when losing by 4 points to Ballygunner. Scored 4-80 in total. Had 4 games without a single goal. Had 12-80 against. Total league points 3.

## FOURMILEWATER

Their only win was against Tallow. Their best display was against Ballygunner. Scored a total of 12-59 and had 7-88 against. Total league points 2.

## TALLOW

Their best display and only win was against Roanmore. Had one or more goals in every game played. Their final overall tally was 13-53 and they had 7-92 against them. Total league points 2.

## COLLIGAN

Played 4 matches before withdrawing. Scored a total of 4-21 in these and had 16-48 scored against them. Colligan had no league points.

## TOTALS

With a total of 185 goals and 792 points scored, the average score for the 53 matches was 1-10 per team.

There were only 3 drawn games, which would seem to be well below average for 53 matches. One score would have changed the results of nine of the games.

## NATIONAL LEAGUES

Both the county panels have been together to begin their preparation for the National Leagues which commence in just three weeks time.

The news is that there has been a very satisfactory response from players and this must be very encouraging to the selectors of both our county teams.

The hurlers have been doing some training in Fraher Field, but because lighting will be required from here on, they are likely to switch to Walsh Park.

The first get together of the new football panel took place at the Park Hotel last week and their training is expected to begin this week.

The venues for our 'home' matches were named by the fixtures committee last week and will be announced to the County Board on Monday. The first football league match will be against London and this will be played at Fraher Field on October 16. On the previous Sunday we will have played All Ireland champions Offaly in Tullamore.

## Scor On T.V.

The two half hour programmes showing the highlights of the 1994 Scor All Ireland finals and which were shown on last Wednesday evening and on the previous Wednesday brought a welcome change in policy of R.T.E., who up to now had ignored this aspect of G.A.A. activities.

The high standard and top quality of the various items presented on the programme was a delightful change from the rubbish that this station have been showing in recent times.

Hopefully when Telefis Na Gaeilge comes on stream, we will see a lot more Irish culture programmes, including a lot more of Adult and Juvenile Scor.

In the programme on Wednesday evening last, the Bonmahon Figure dancers kept the name of Portlairge to the forefront and the group can feel very proud of the delightful manner in which they performed. The opportunity of seeing them in action was welcomed by the thousands who could not see them perform on stage.

Declan Terry of Seana Phobal club was featured on the programme shown on the previous Wednesday and Decky can feel equally proud of his performance when delivering the Recitation that won him the well deserved honour of being selected for the programme.

## Waterford To Play In Oireachtas

For the first time in many years Portlairge have been invited to play in the Oireachtas senior hurling competition and which is likely to be held sometime between October 1 and the end of November.

Because the Oireachtas is being held here in the Ring, Gaeltacht, it is possible that one or two matches, or perhaps the final, will take place at Fraher Field. The purpose of this tournament is to help fund the Oireachtas and is not usually a part of the cultural festival.

The draw was due to be made over last weekend and will be published this weekend.

## County Board Meeting

The meeting of the County Board which was due to take place on Monday of this week was postponed until Monday of next week. As no meeting of the Board has taken place since July, there is certain to be a huge volume of business to be transacted.

## Huge Sponsorship

Cork County Board have finalised a three-year sponsorship contract with Trustee Savings Bank for £100,000 for their hurling and football club championships. Approximately 18,000 supporters attended the hurling final in which the group team, Carbery defeated Middleton on Sunday last.

## Mount Sion Qualify

### Mount Sion 2-17 Dunhill 2-9

This was a well contested senior hurling quarter-final match played at Kill before a good crowd on Sunday evening and the result puts Mount Sion through to the semi-final in which they will take on Ballygunner

next Sunday. At half time Mount Sion led by 2-7 to 0-6. In a very lively second half the challengers came back for 2-3, while the winners totted up 10 points in the same period.

# Intriguing All-Ireland Football Final At Croke Park

If the demand for tickets is a clear indication of the widespread interest in next Sunday's All-Ireland football final, it must be one of the most attractive finals to be staged at headquarters for a very long time. There will be a big crowd travelling up from Waterford and many football enthusiasts who failed to obtain a stand or terrace ticket will travel in the hope of picking up one on the streets of the capital.

The wonderful spectacle of flag-bedecked Croke Park when the players of Dublin and Down take the field to decide if Sam is to go North for the fourth year running or whether the Dubs will break the sequence and keep it down here for a while, will be remembered as the highlight of the GAA calendar of events for 1994.

The fact that the New Cusack stand is behind schedule in being completed, will reduce the capacity to around 56 thousand — a factor which will considerably increase the number of disappointed ticket seekers. The decision of the Dublin Chief Fire Officer to reduce the numbers being allowed in the Canal End and Hill 16 terraces has added to the capacity problems this year. The problem about patrons being able to crowd onto the sideline from the new Cusack Stand is something which needs to be taken care of as a close finish to this particular game in an electrified atmosphere could result in encroachment of the playing field with serious consequences.

This will almost certainly be a very close encounter and might even end in a draw and in which case the replay would take place on Sunday, October 2.

## REFIXTURES

There are three refixtures of cancelled matches arranged for the weekend and these are the senior football championship game involving Dungarvan and Rathgormack at Leamybrien on Saturday, the refixture of the Nire v. Stradbally under-21 football divisional final, which was originally scheduled for last Saturday at Fraher Field; also the Western minor football final between Abbeyside and Ballyduff which takes place on tonight, Wednesday, at Cappoquin. This was changed from last Sunday.

## SENIOR HURLING SEMI-FINALS

Following the results of last weekend, the County

Fixtures Committee met in Kill on Sunday evening and fixed both the county senior hurling semi-finals for next weekend. In fixing the Lismore v. Passage game for Sunday evening at Fraher Field, the committee showed a break from tradition in putting on a fixture on All-Ireland final Sunday.

Very many people, in fact the majority, will commend this decision to push ahead with our own championship regardless of what is happening elsewhere. Having the semi-finals on next weekend will mean that the county final can be played on Sunday, October 2.

Lismore v. Passage — This will certainly be a repeat of last year's county final which ended in an 0-8 to 0-7 win for Lismore after a thrilling match played under atrocious conditions. When the teams met in the league section of the championship, Lismore confirmed their superiority over the visitors with a whopping 5-16 to 4-6 win, Lismore's victory being noted for the strange fact that their entire score was achieved from play.

In that particular match, Lismore were in sparkling form and did not seem capable of doing anything wrong, but it was a different story against Clonea on last Sunday when the county champions struggled for more than three-quarters of the game.

Both Lismore and Passage have high scoring potential and this is indicated by the fact that they are the two highest on the scoring charts and both clubs figured in the two highest scoring matches of the championship so far.

I must confess to feeling very unsure about the outcome. If the champions play as well as when beating Passage here at Fraher field six weeks ago, they should win and if they don't play better than they did against Clonea, they could be in trouble.

The West will have a vested interest in the result as a defeat for Lismore could take the final to Walsh Park. We'll wait and see.

Mount Sion v. Ballygunner — This is the first of the two semi-finals and will be played at Walsh Park on Saturday afternoon. Every game between these top-class hurling teams has thrilled spectators and I'm sure this will be no different. When they met in the quarter-final of the championship last year Mount Sion survived by 2 points on a 1-7 to 1-5 scoreline and when they clashed in this year's league section of the championship, only a single score separated them again with the 'Gunnies winning by 1-11 to 0-11.

These records are the best advertisement of all for this intriguing tie. Like the other Lawlor's Hotel semi-final on the following day at Dungarvan, the game is wide open with the ultimate result probably hinging on a single score or so.

If one or both semi-finals end in a draw (and this is by no means out of the question), it will upset the plans for the county final, so let us hope we have decisions in both.

## S.H. TOURNAMENT — WATERFORD V. TIPPERARY

This tournament game has been organised by the Friends of Seamus Aylward and is certain to be very well supported. Seamus, who is widely known for his great work with county underage affairs, both as an administrator and organiser over a very long number of years, was one of the county's most popular officials before being forced into retirement by poor health and for this as well as other reasons, public support is assured.

The game should be interesting as well, as both Tipperary and Waterford are gearing themselves for the National League which is due to begin in three weeks time and both will be trying out players for places in their first league games.

Our lineout is likely to be affected by the unavailability of players who will be engaged in 'championship

action over the weekend, so our representative side is looked forward to with special interest.

## DUNGARVAN V. RATHGORMACK

The winners of this tie will be listed third in Division 1 and will go on to the quarter-finals while the losers of the match will play Stradbally on the following weekend, and here the winners will qualify as the fourth team in Div. 1. This could mean that the losers in next Saturday's game could be called upon to play on three successive weekends, as the quarter-finals must be played by October 2 if they are not to run into trouble with the National League which begins for the footballers on October 16.

After last Sunday, football is on everyone's mind and a choice game such as a meeting between Rathgormack and Dungarvan is certain to attract a huge crowd to Leamybrien for what is expected to be a repeat of the 1992 saga. I cannot see this one failing to satisfy. As I wrote last week, because of a few players not being available, Dungarvan must wear the outsiders tag going into this one.

## UNDER-21

### FOOTBALL FINAL

Stradbally and the Nire will meet on Saturday evening at the Fraher Field to contest the Briska Buildings sponsored under-21 football final which promises to be a close contest, with Stradbally going into the game, the slightly more fancied side.

### MINOR FOOTBALL FINAL

This should be a very interesting tie between Ballyduff and the reigning champions, Abbeyside, at Cappoquin on tonight at 6 p.m. Ballyduff had a five points victory over Dungarvan and won't be easy to beat, but the champions, Abbeyside, at full strength, must be given the vote to retain their title.

## County Senior Hurling Semi-Finals And Senior Football Tie-Breaker Highlights At Home

There seems to be no stopping to Ballinacourty's second string team this year and so far they have taken all before them in the style of champions. eral Secretary Fjanna Fail and Mary Kennedy, Press Officer Fianna Fail.

The attending committee members of St. Carthage's House included Dr. T. A. O'Donovan, Ml. O'Leary, Mona O'Connell, Jimmy Quirke, James Tobin, Tom Murphy, Eddie Cunningham and Paddy T. Fennesy. Also present were Tony Gyves, S.E.H.B., Inspector Ml. Blake, Sgt. John Molloy, Brian O'Connell, Building Contractor, John Heneghan, Chairman Lismore Town Commissioners and Eric Flynn, Town Clerk.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" Mary Fenton-Morrissey said the building costs and fees alone amounted to almost £1 million (£995,227.43) while adding on the furniture costs of £53,000 the bill comes to a grand total of £1,048,227.43. To offset this enormous cost, a grant of £902,000 was received, £40,000 from the Lotto which was granted in September 1987, £30,000 from the S.E.H.B. and many generous local contributions amounting to £30,000 made a total income of £1,002,000 — leaving a shortfall of £46,227.

When one analyses these figures, praise cannot be high enough for this very hardworking committee and the new St. Carthage's House, which is expected to be officially opened in October, will benefit the entire West Waterford region. It is indeed a credit to Lismore and the region.


