Kilmacthomas Headmaster Retires

After thirty two years of distinguished service with the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, Abbeyside resident Domhnaill Ó Faoláin, is to officially retire from the post of Headmaster of St. Declan's Community School, Kilmacthomas.

First appointed to the position in 1969 Mr. Ó Faoláin's exemplary leadership in the interim was accorded much praise and tributes from V.E.C. members at their meeting last Monday.

TROJAN WORK

C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan praised the retiring Dungarvan teacher for his trojan work in building up the school from small beginnings into what it is today with a record enrolment of 520 students in the current

year. "The record enrolment is a testament to Mr. Ó Faoláin's hard work and leadership", said Mr. Heffernan. A member of the Board of Management at St. Declan's, Cllr. Tom Cunningham also spoke highly of the former All Ireland Hurling star.

"He was greatly respected by both pupils and teachers alike", Cllr. Cunningham stated, "he is a big loss to the school".

END OF ILLUSTRIOUS CHAPTER

Describing Mr. Ó Faoláin as the 'main driver' of St. Declan's School, V.E.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne said the prestige and status the Kilmac' school had gained in the past 32 years, underline what can be achieved in rural areas.

Mr. Ó Faoláin had given parents and pupils in the area a

V.E.C. Appoint Design Team

The next step on the long road to the proposed £1 million-plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College was finally reached after much debate by members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee last Monday.

Under Dublin-based architect, Shay Cleary, the design team — quantity surveyors, structural consultants and services consultants for the proposed extension — was accepted by the Committee and comprise of two Dublin based firms and one Limerick based company.

CEO, Kieran Heffernan reported that a total of 39 applicants had responded to the July advertisement. Each application

had been looked at in detail by the Selection Board in conjunction with Mr. Cleary. There had been no commitment to interview any of the companies and the architect had finally recommended three applicants that were now before the members, either to accept or to reject.

MIXED REACTION

The initial reaction of various VEC members was somewhat mixed however, as Cllr. Tom Cunningham proposed to interview ten of the 39 applicants based in Waterford county and city, while Cllr. Michael O'Riordan urged members to accept the Board's recommendations.

In a letter to the VEC from six

The people of Lismore, Cappoquin, Ballyduff, Tallow, Aghlish, Clashmore, Villierstown and Modeligo, together with the surrounding areas, made a wonderful response and a full container-load of welcome supplies arrived at the warehouse at The Marina last week to be added to what came from other areas of Munster to make a further consignment of life-giving aid for the people who are suffering so badly at the moment.

I should like to thank the willing group from all over the West, led by Mrs. Helen Feeney who took the opportunity to turn the compassion of the people into practical aid for those starving and dying from disease. Your thoughtfulness and generosity will be rewarded and the knowledge that people will live as a result of this effort will go some way towards thanking everyone.

May I thank you too, Mr. Editor, for the excellent coverage you gave, not only to this appeal, but our ongoing efforts over the last couple of years.

This week, in the company of Sr. Philomena, Sacred Heart Convent, Blackrock, I leave for the Sacred Heart mission fields of Zaire and hope to meet some of the refugees who benefitted from the aid collected in Co. Waterford and Cork, which arrived just as the first victims of the war streamed across the border from Rwanda. In our time there we hope to learn how we can best benefit the needy of their compounds and where and what to send in the future.

We hope to make contact with Dr. Mary McLoughlin from Cobh, presently in Goma, who will give us first hand advice based on her considerable experience in the worst areas of misery around the world. Thank you all so much, I know that your generosity will be rewarded.

Council Slams 'Ludicrous' Wage Increases

Members of Waterford County Council have strongly condemned the recent 30% wage increase, given to over 600 top civil servants and politicians, including the Taoiseach, Ministers, T.D.'s and chief executives of State companies.

Moving a notice of motion at last week's Council meeting, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain asked that the Council deplore these huge increases, a motion which was passed without dissent.

PUBLIC DIVERTED

The timing of the "ludicrous, crazy" pay increases, against the backdrop of the dramatic IRA ceasefire and joint peace process, was described by Cllr. O Riain as a smokescreen to divert the public's attention. "There is no need nor justification for a £14,000 pay rise" he declared adding that in a country of some 300,000 unemployed, "the poor are getting poorer and the rich are getting richer."

The irate Fianna Fail Councillor then pointed to farmers and old age pensioners in his Nire Valley area, who are being investigated as to their income.

"A farmer with a family of ten children had his State benefits deducted by £40 a week", he added.

MATERIAL GREED

Seconding the motion, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran (F.G.) said it was now apparent that material greed was rampant in the present Government.

"This Government," he said, "has sold its soul for material goods."

Also slating the 'obscene' pay rises, Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan (Lab.) submitted that some of these recent increases were "five times more, than what some people get on the dole."

"CYNICAL IN THE EXTREME"

Criticising both the Labour/Fianna Fail coalition and the Fine Gael opposition, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab.) stressed that the increases "should not be forgotten at election time"

Again, the sensitive timing of the introduction of these major pay rises was strongly attacked by the Labour Councillor who described it as "cynical in the extreme."

He went on to say that the "astronomical" increases, coming on the heels of the Government benefits earlier in the year, have hit a new low and "stink to the high heavens".

"The four T.D.'s in Waterford have a case to answer to their constituents," continued the disgruntled Cllr. Kyne, who added that the Irish Congress of Trade Unions should also be criticised.

"The day of blind support to our T.D.'s will have to be queried, if they are not delivering on their promise he added.

ROTTEN SYSTEM

Supporting the previous speakers, Cllr. Tony Wright (D.L.) said it was a disgrace to ask people to live on £52 per week "when the top brass can't live on £52,000."

"It's a rotten system," he declared, adding that to tax social welfare and unemployment recipients is the lowest one can go in society.

PUBLIC REBELLION

With the motion carried unanimously, Cllr. Nora Flynn (F.G.) warned of a possible revolt among members of the public in response to this latest round of Government pay increases.

So too did Cllr. O Riain who said that people "should be out on the streets" deploring the enormity of the pay rises.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY

At last week's Waterford County Council meeting, Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed a vote of sympathy to the wife, Elizabeth and family of the late Ned Morrissey of Shandon, Dungarvan, a former employee of the Council.

Describing the late Mr. Morrissey as a tremendous servant within the local authority for a great number of years, Cllr. Kyne said the deceased had played a pioneering role in the county's fire service.

Concern Over Speed Traps

Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne has voiced the growing concern felt by many Dungarvan residents of what he perceived to be an increasing number of Garda speed traps on the main roads to centre of employment and around the town.

Speaking at last week's Waterford Co. Council meeting, Cllr. Kyne said he had encountered a strong feeling of resentment over these early morning speed checks which he claimed are "trapping" workers en route to their place of employment as early as 7.30 a.m.

"People feel very aggrieved already with the cost of road tax, etc., informed Cllr. Kyne, now they are being fined for doing 50/60 m.p.h. in a 40 mile zone.

Continuing, Cllr. Kyne said no one could or should, condone excessive speed and he was supportive of the local Gardai who are only doing their job.

Concern, however, had been expressed to him by a number of people in the Dungarvan area about Garda speed checks at 7.30 p.m. "Their resentment must be expressed," he added.





Cullen Welcomed Into Fianna Fail

Martin Cullen, former member of the Progressive Democrats, was formally welcomed into the ranks of Fianna Fail when he joined the Ferrybank Cumann at a meeting in Doyle's Lounge in Waterford on Wednesday, September 14 last.

Among those attending the packed meeting were, Deputy Brendan Kenneally and former T.D. and Senator, Donal Ormonde. Cullen was proposed by Billy Doyle and seconded by Kathleen Doyle. Deputy Cullen was then unanimously accepted into the Fianna Fail organisation in Waterford.

Following the vote, the ex P.D. member made his entry to great applause and addressed the crowded meet-

ing. This was followed by speeches of welcome by Deputy Brendan Kenneally, Donal Ormonde, Jim Byrne, Chairman of the Comhairle Dail Ceanntair and others.

Tribute was paid to Brendan Kenneally for his warm and generous speech in which he reminded the meeting that he and Martin Cullen had, in fact, worked together in the past, when for three years they had been trainee accountants together.

Time to tie up loose ends

SEPTEMBER us a transitional month — still warm, but with the occasional coolness that warns of the winter to come.

Use the pleasant days to tie up loose ends and prepare for the colder weather:

● **FLOWER BEDS** — many plants need lifting in September, starting with the most succulent and therefore, most easily damaged by frost.

Exotic tuberous-type begonias are particularly frost-prone so lift early and allow to dry off before storing in peat-filled boxes away from frost.

Fuchsias, geraniums and others can be potted up and placed in a cool greenhouse, while dahlias can wait until last — the leaves might look a little sorry after a few frosty mornings but they are really quite tough.

Sow hardy annuals as well, such as pansies, larkspur, cornflowers and love-in-the-mist.

● **BULBS** — snowdrops and crocuses flower earlier than other spring bulbs so get these in first and follow up with daffodils and narcissi, hyacinths and tulips, although these can even go in as late as early November.

● **LAWNS** — ease up on mowing so that the grass can grow thicker and harder for winter and then use a spring rake to remove the accumulated fibrous debris or 'thatch'.

Afterwards, spike the lawn with a fork or aeration tool to improve drainage and air flow to the grass roots.

Make any repairs by sowing seed or cutting and turning or transferring turf to worn patches.

The optional finishing touch is to apply a top dressing and fertiliser.

● **HEDGES** — time for the final trim and make sure you clear all clippings and other debris which might allow pests to overwinter.

You can take cuttings from some varieties such as privet and use these to extend or repair your hedge.

● **TOMATOES** — the cooler nights put outdoor tomatoes at risk, so pick the lot and ripen green ones inside paper bags in a warm place such as the airing cupboard — they need warmth rather than sunshine to ripen.

● **VEGETABLES** — make sure you lift and carefully store beetroot and carrot — choose somewhere dark, dry and cool and protected from mice and rats. Potatoes should follow after the tops have yellowed, but parsnips can stay in the soil until needed.

● **GREENHOUSE** — it now needs closing at night. If you heat your greenhouse over winter, check the heating system and make any repairs.

You can keep costs down by lining the glass with plastic 'bubble wrap' as a cut-price double glazing.

● **MAINTENANCE** — with the weather still mild and the garden about to enter its dormant period you can rattle through the DIY chores such as creosoting, mending or building walls and fences, or path clearing and laying, pond-building and planting trees and shrubs.

WRONG SIGNAL
Slamming the Council's decision, Democratic Left Councillor, Tony Wright, said the Gweedore conference was a waste of £1,500 and proposed that the local au-

thority refrain from sending any Councillors to the meeting. "We would be sending out the wrong signal from a cash starved Council," he further declared.

His proposal, however, failed to obtain a seconder.

Don't Think Lettuce Is A Rabbit Food

CHEESE AND HAM PANCAKES

Ingredients

1/4 Iceberg lettuce, finely shredded
6 oz. (175g) Gruyere cheese, grated
1 tbs. (15ml) grated onion
1 tsp. (5ml) French mustard
2 tbs. (30ml) chopped parsley salt
freshly ground black pepper
1 egg, beaten
8 medium size pancakes
8 thin slices ham
1/4 pint (150ml) double cream
1 tbs. (15ml) grated Parmesan cheese

Method

Mix lettuce with Gruyere cheese (save 2 tbs - 30ml) and onion. Mix mustard with parsley, salt

and pepper, and beaten egg. Stir into lettuce mixture. Lay pancakes out flat and place slice of ham on each. Divide filling between them and roll up. Place pancakes in greased shallow oven-proof dish, spoon cream evenly over top and sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 375° F, 190°C, gas mark 5, for about 20 minutes.



LETTUCE WITH CRAB SAUCE

Ingredients

1 Iceberg lettuce
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 1/2 oz (40g) butter
1/4 pt (150ml) dry white wine

salt
freshly ground black pepper
1/4 pint (150ml) double cream
2 egg yolks
1 tbs (15ml) chopped fresh dill
6 oz (175g) white crabmeat (or crabsticks).

Garnish

Paprika, lemon wedges

Method

Cut the lettuce into eight even-sized wedges. Fry onion gently in butter in large, shallow pan for 3 minutes. Add lettuce, white wine, salt and pepper to taste. Cover with lid or foil, simmer 12-15 minutes. Meanwhile, beat cream lightly with egg yolks, add dill and salt and pepper to taste. Stand bowl over pan of simmering water, and stir until mixture will coat the back of a wooden spoon. Add crabmeat or chopped crabsticks to sauce, with 2 tbs (30ml) of cooking liquid from lettuce. Drain cooked lettuce thoroughly. Spoon sauce over top.
Serves 4.

Lismore Town Commissioners Meeting

Present at the September meeting of the Lismore Town Commissioners were — Mr. J. Heneghan, Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey, Mr. R. Canning, Mr. D. Coughlan, Mr. P. Dowd, Mr. B. Leddy, Mr. O. Madden, Mr. J. Roche, Mr. D. Whelan and Town Clerk, Mr. Eric Flynn; Mr. B. McNally, County Secretary and Mr. Donal Connolly, County Manager.

DEVONSHIRE COTTAGES

Mr. B. Leddy reported that it was his information that the installation of water toilets in these houses was presently under discussion and it was hoped to have work under way by Christmas.

TOWN TWINNING

Mr. O. Madden proposed that they consider Town Twinning and it was agreed that should a situation arise in the future where a demand for twinning was evident, then they would give every help.

ROADSIDE HEDGES

Mr. B. Leddy proposed that the County Council use its powers under the Road Traffic Act 1994 in relation to the cutting of roadside hedges. He said that the County Council had now specific powers which requires owners or occupiers of land to cut hedges. He went on to state that currently Wexford County Council were enforcing this Act.

Mr. D. Connolly stated that they were presently looking at ways of resolving this problem.

ENTERPRISE COMMITTEE

Mr. B. Leddy reported on the various projects under discussion by the Enterprise Committee and stated that a company limited by guarantee would have to be set up. He expressed himself happy with progress to-date.

TOWN PARK AND RECREATION AREA

Mr. Leddy made a proposal for the provision of a town park and recreation area. He stated that what he had in mind was the provision of a recreation area specially for children, including an adventure playground concept.

Mr. J. Heneghan stated that the grounds of the community centre would be an ideal site.

The Co. Manager pointed out the cost implications of such a proposal and went on to state that the draught development plan for Lismore was presently being drawn up and when complete he would come back to the Commissioners.

ALCOHOL AWARENESS SCHEME

Mr. Leddy proposed that the SEHB through the ACCEPT programme, introduce an alcohol awareness scheme at local schools.

The Clerk outlined the previous history relating to this motion.

Mr. Leddy stated that the introduction of an ID card system for underage drinking was of little benefit without an educational

background. This programme sought to correct this by educating young people at an early age on the inherent dangers involved.

Mr. J. Heneghan stated that an ID system locally would make it difficult for the underage to get at drink and its introduction would be a positive statement aimed at the young.

On a proposal of Mr. B. Leddy, seconded by Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey and resolved, that the Town Clerk would arrange a preliminary meeting between ACCEPT, the principals of the local schools and the local Garda Sergeant as soon as possible.

DAILY NEWSPAPER

Mr. Leddy proposed that a daily newspaper be provided in the local library. The Clerk stated that this matter was the subject of previous correspondence with the Co. Librarian, who stated that on cost implications, such a proposal could not be granted. Mr. Leddy requested that the Co. Librarian be asked whether if the Commissioners could get a complimentary copy of a daily newspaper, whether there would be any objection to placing it in the library.

OTHER MATTERS

New Street — Mr. R. Canning highlighted the problem of excessive speeding in New Street. It was felt that this was a matter for the local Garda.

Public Toilets — Mr. R. Canning, through the medium of photographs, highlighted the condition of the present public toilet in the

town. The Clerk stated that only recently the Commissioners highlighted the need for public toilets in the town and requested the Department of the Environment for funding for new toilets. However, the Department stated that there was limited funding for this type of project nationally and Lismore's application was on the current waiting list.

Canal — Mr. David Whelan requested that every effort be made to clean up the canal on the approach to the town. It was agreed to refer this to Waterford County Council.

Film Location — Mr. B. Leddy stated that he was aware the Irish Film Board under the direction of Ml. D. Higgins, Department of Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, were currently employing a list of potential film locations. It was agreed to write to the Minister and propose Lismore as a suitable venue.

Canal Wall — Mr. D. Coughlan requested that the height of the stone wall along the canal be looked at as it appeared to offer little protection to the motorist in the event of a crash. It was agreed to refer this matter to Waterford Co. Council.

CONGRATS

MINISTER WARMLY COMMENDED

The National President of the United Farmers Association, Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, has lauded the Minister for Agriculture for taking on board what he said is U.F.A. policy in relation to milk quota restructuring.

"The United Farmers As-

sociation welcomes the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, that he has reached agreement with the EU Commission on a scheme for the subsidisation of milk quota restructuring", said Mr. Phelan.

Under the scheme a subsidy of 50p per gallon will be paid on quota purchased by dairy farmers under 20,000 gallons. This is in line with U.F.A. policy and with proposals put to the Minister and his officials by our Association at meetings in Agriculture House earlier this year, he stated. The U.F.A. President said that the 50p subsidy, taken with the recent announcement of tiered grant support for pollution control and dairy hygiene will give heart to small dairy farmers. "The Minister is to be warmly commended on his action" the President said. The United Farmers Association are now calling on the Co-ops to make their contribution towards the viability of their weaker milk suppliers and thereby towards the future of rural Ireland. The Co-op movement said Mr. Phelan, was founded to strengthen and bond together a vibrant rural population and not to create a rich elite of the few at the expense of the impoverishment of many. The time is ripe, the President said, for banks to show their social conscience and to make low interest loans available to small farmers in order that they can do what is necessary to make their holdings viable. "Banks have a vested interest in a stable society, and a healthy balance of population between urban and rural Ireland is essential to

the stability of our society and future," Mr. Phelan added.

DRAMATIC KERLOGUE RESCUE EXHIBITION

The famous son of Abbeyside, Captain Tom Donoghue and his brave exploits during World War 2 aboard the M.V. Kerlogue were fittingly honoured and beautifully displayed at Dungarvan Museum's "The Kerlogue Rescue" exhibition, formally opened last week.

Courtesy of the National Maritime Museum of Ireland, the many detailed maps, historic photographs, personal mementos and factual reports clearly outline that ill-fated December day in 1943 when the Kerlogue, under Captain Tom Donoghue, came upon the aftermath of a previous day's naval battle.

BACKGROUND STORY
Step by step, the exhibition relives the historic Kerlogue rescue on December 29, and as the story unfolds, the heroic bravery of the seaman from Abbeyside is never more truly appreciated.

Owned by the Wexford Steamships Co. Ltd., the 354 tons gross Kerlogue was on passage from Lisbon to Dublin with a cargo of oranges.

At first light on December 29th, the Irish vessel was some 360 miles south of the Fastnet, when two Fock Wolf Condor bombers circled the ship and flashed the signal 'SOS Lifeboat - follow'.

Captain Donoghue immediately altered course and after 2 hours the Kerlogue came upon floundering German crewmen in high seas in the Bay of Biscay.

For the next ten hours the ship criss-crossed the area, moving from group to group, pulling the exhausted and wounded German navymen aboard, many ill-clad and suffering from exposure. For the last five hours the Kerlogue carried out her mission of mercy under flood-lights, taking aboard 168 Germans, 93 of which were from a torpedo boat T26, out of a complement of 203.

Because of the condition of the survivors and a shortage of food, Captain Donoghue decided to sail to Cork, the nearest Irish port. He took the decision to go to Cork in spite of his Navicert, the Allied

and British Sailing Permit given to neutral ships that they must call at a designated UK port for examination and clearance on both the outward and homeward legs of their voyages from Ireland, in this case, Fishguard in Wales.

When about 30 miles south of Fastnet on December 31, the Kerlogue broke radio telephone silence and called up Valentia coast radio station. She reported having 164 survivors including 7 seriously wounded aboard and requested medical assistance on arrival at Cork Harbour. Valentia acknowledged and signed off with "well done, Kerlogue."

After two days of proper rest and fresh stores, the Kerlogue sailed to Fishguard to obtain her clearance. There, the senior British naval officer raged at Captain Donoghue for not landing the Germans at the Welsh port. Captain Donoghue responded that his only concern was to save life. The Kerlogue eventually arrived in Dublin on January 5 where Captain Donoghue received a letter from the German Ambassador, Dr. E. Hempel, expressing his gratitude and appreciation for the rescue effort.

Later, Dr. Hempel presented Capt. Donoghue with a splendid silver cup which was also on display at the exhibition on Monday week last.

WARM WELCOME
Prior to the official opening of the exhibition, Dungarvan Museum Society Vice-Chairman, Jim Shine, thanked the President of the National Maritime Institute, David Sheedy and local Institute member Tom McHugh, without whose help and cooperation the Kerlogue Rescue Exhibition would never have come to Dungarvan. Mr. Shine gave a special welcome to the relatives of the late Tom

Donoghue including his son Jim and the Butler family.

A special mention was also given to the attending UDC members and local artist Sean de Paor whose powerfully inspired Kerlogue Rescue painting adorned the exhibition.

VICTIMS OF OWN SUCCESS

In their tenth year functioning as a museum society, Mr. Shine thanked ex-Co. Manager Dan Hurley who had made the room available in the Old Market House back in 1984. The Society has rapidly expanded to welcome approximately 80 members to its ranks and has contributed enormously to the cultural well being of the area, having produced various publications of local interest with the help of Chairman, Willie Fraher.

With no entry charge for any of its exhibitions, the Society relies heavily on voluntary contributions and members subscriptions.

Pointing to the vast amount of historical information on display in the cramped information room, Mr. Shine submitted that the Society was in fact a "victim of its own success" with limited space area for large exhibitions.

At present the Society is carrying out in-depth research work on material for next year's exhibition to mark the 150th anniversary of Ireland's Great Famine. Having witnessed some of the many interesting documents currently being collated, Mr. Shine was confident of a significant and mighty interesting exhibition for the public in 1995.

In fact, he added, several FÁS scheme workers have continued with the famine research work entirely on their own accord, thus testifying to the abundant interest prevalent in what was Ireland's darkest period of history.

"Dungarvan Museum is a viable and important item in the cultural inventory of this town," declared Mr. Shine who added that now was the time when the window of opportunity offered under the

Urban Renewal Scheme could see the eventual construction of a new County Museum in the Deise capital.

Concluding his speech, the Vice-Chairman then welcomed Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly who formally opened the Kerlogue Rescue Exhibition.

GREAT CREDIT

Pleased and honoured to formally open such an "informative exhibition," Mr. Connolly said it was a credit to the Society. "The exhibition highlights the bravery of seamen around the coast," Mr. Connolly stated, "and the risks they take to save the lives of their colleagues and other people."

The rescue, he added, was in itself an important lesson to us all — that different cultures can live together in peace — a lesson which comes at a particular time with the announcement of the IRA ceasefire and the ensuing peace initiative.

The Manager then spoke of the importance of a museum society in any area, collecting, preserving and displaying material and giving an insight into the social history of the community it serves.

COUNTY MUSEUM

Agreeing with Mr. Shine that the Society was evidently short on space, Mr. Connolly then expressed his hope for a badly needed County Museum structure which would be linked with the already overcrowded National Museum in Dublin.

Congratulating Jim Shine, Matt Connolly and Willie Fraher on their special dedication and diligence, the recently appointed Manager promised his full support to the Museum Society's efforts. "It won't be my last visit to Dungarvan Museum and I will take a special interest in the work of the Society," he assured all present.

In conclusion, Mr. Connolly then commended the Kerlogue Rescue Exhibition to every town, school and young person in the area — a local hero who upheld the finest traditions of seamen and the sea — surely one of the most outstanding feats of heroism of the last war.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL SHEEP SCAB

Sheep Scab is an important ectoparasitic condition affecting sheep. As well as its economic importance, the disease poses a major welfare problem in flocks — infected sheep suffer intense itching, produce a poor lambing crop, less wool and may die. Finishing lamb growth rates are reduced and skins are often severely damaged. The disease is extremely contagious.

Following on a condition of the Programme for Competitiveness and Work, the national compulsory sheep dipping programme has been dropped. Based on experience in Britain and Northern Ireland this is likely to result in a large increase in the number of sheep scab outbreaks.

Plunge dipping in diazinon, propetamophos or flumethrim based dip formulations still offers the only fully effective method of controlling sheep scab combined with activity against other sheep ectoparasites. Sheep owners are advised to dip their flocks. Any bought-in sheep should get particular attention and should not be mixed with the main flock without dipping.

Sheep scab remains a notifiable disease, and flock-owners have a statutory duty to report any suspect outbreaks to Waterford County Council — telephone no. 058-42822.

Death Of Nioclás Toibín

Nioclás Toibín, Ballyreilly, Ring, Dungarvan, whose death occurred Monday at the Waterford Regional Hospital aged 66, was one of the country's most celebrated sean nós singers.

He is the only singer to have won the ultimate sean nos accolade at the Oireachtas three times - 1961, 1962 and 1963. He provided the inspiration to a whole new

generation of sean nos singers in the Co. Waterford Gaeltacht where he became a legend in his own lifetime.

He made many classical songs of the Deise very much his own among them "Sliabh Geal gCua Na Feile" and "The Connerys".

He made a number of television appearances, he also featured on R.T.E. radio, and made numerous record-

ings which will forever keep his memory alive.

He was also reputed to have known hundreds of songs both in Irish and English.

A most gentle and unassuming man, Nioclás was a fluent Irish speaker and the native tongue was in fact a way of life for him. He commanded the respect and affection of everyone in his

beloved Ring Gaeltacht and indeed of Gaeltacht communities throughout the country.

He was a fisherman by occupation in his earlier days, but his life, in the main was dedicated to traditional music and to all things Irish.

He is survived by two sisters, Alice who lives in Old Parish and Bella in England.

Bord Fáilte has decided to host the 1994 Tidy Towns Competition Awards in Stradbally on Tuesday, October 18. More details later.

Local Gardai Smash Drug Ring In Dungarvan

Dungarvan Gardai successfully smashed a local drugs ring, following a search at the Ormonde Hotel, O'Connell St., Dungarvan on January 18th last, where two men were charged with the possession of illegal drugs under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1977.

The duo appeared before last Wednesday's sitting of Dungarvan District Court.

One defendant, Gerry Noblett of 240, Larchville, Waterford, pleaded guilty to charges of possessing a knife for unlawful purposes and the possession of illegal drugs with intent to supply and sell to others.

The second defendant, Terence Moroney of Childers Estate, also pleaded guilty to a charge under the Misuse of Drugs Act of having cannabis resin in his possession.

DEFENDANTS SEARCHED

Outlining the facts of the case, Sgt. Tom O'Grady told the court that at 4.20 p.m. on the day in question, he entered the licensed premises at O'Connell St., accompanied by Garda Ned Gavin and Det. Garda Ollie Phelan where they had reasonable cause to believe that drugs were being sold.

The team of Gardai then approached five men sitting around a table in the bar area. Sgt. O'Grady said he had seen a broken cannabis joint on the floor and then proceeded to search Gerry Noblett under the Misuse of Drugs Act.

Sgt. O'Grady informed the court that on searching the defendants, the Gardai had found a sum of money totalling £175 and a 2 inch knife under Noblett's sleeve, which the defendant explained had been for his own personal protection.

Continuing the search at Dungarvan Garda Station, 9 pieces of cannabis resin were also found in the defendant's boot and the Waterford native was later arrested at Youghal Road.

Det. Garda Phelan told the court that on searching Terence Moroney, he had found two pieces of

cannabis resin, enough to make 15-20 joints, worth £20 market price.

IN FEAR OF LIFE

Appearing for both defendants, Mr. Niall King Solr., said that 22 year old Noblett had been most cooperative with the Gardai, he had not brandished the knife and had received no financial gain from the sale of the drugs.

"He was being used to hold the drugs by a more powerful person", Mr. King stated, "...he was not the prime mover".

Noblett told the court that he had been asked to mind a brown envelope containing the hash by a friend of his in the Ormonde Hotel.

The unemployed youth said he had been aware that the sale of drugs was going on but insisted that he was not being used as a carrier.

He refused to give the name of his friend stating that he was in fear of his life. His previous conviction dates back to 1986 when he was convicted of larceny at Waterford District Court.

Appearing for Moroney, Mr. King described him as "a man of misfortune" who was easily led. The cannabis, he added, had been for the defendant's own personal use.

15 MONTH SENTENCE

Referring to the drugs ring as a classic operation of distribution, Judge Michael Pattwell described Noblett as a "drug pusher".

The defendant was subsequently sentenced to 12 months for the possession of illegal drugs with intent to sell and supply (the maximum sentence permissible). For the illegal possession of a knife for unlawful purposes, Noblett was sentenced to 3 months imprisonment to run concurrently. The cash and knife were both confiscated.

Judge Pattwell then imposed a £100 fine on Moroney for the illegal possession of cannabis. In all cases recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal. Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

COUNTY WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

INFORMATION ON NEW DAIRY HYGIENE GRANT SCHEME

John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South-East region, outlines below grants which have been introduced to assist farmers in providing the necessary facilities to comply with the EU Milk Hygiene Directive (92/46/EEC). These grants have been geared towards the needs of smaller producers.

Rates of Grant and Quota size — Up to 15,000 gallons: 60%; 15,000 to 30,000 gallons: 40%; 30,000 to 40,000 gallons: 25%; Above 40,000 gallons: zero. Investment ceiling: £45,000.

Off-farm income limit £15,000. (This limit is specific to the applicant with no account of income of spouse).

QUOTA SIZE
Eligibility for the grant is determined by the permanent quota on April 1 in the year of application.

CRITERIA FOR ELIGIBILITY FOR GRANT

1. — Quota size; 2. — Off-farm income limit. No account is taken of the number of livestock on the farm.

WHAT QUALIFIES FOR GRANT AID

1. — Structural Works, e.g. building (new or repairs), concrete apron, drainage works, washing facilities, doors, windows, etc.

2. — Milking Machine — all parts necessary to ensure quality milk is produced, e.g. pulsators, milk liners, claw piece, etc. Funding may not extend to the provision of a

replacement electric motor where an existing motor is worn out.

Where a complete new building is required a new machine will qualify for funding as part of the overall package.

3. — Refrigeration — Refrigeration equipment will qualify for grant aid provided the farmer has not previously collected a refrigeration grant.

REFRIGERATION GRANTS — NEW V. OLD

Old Scheme — Grant rate of 50% subject to maximum of £1,750 for farmers with milk quota up to 30,000 gallons

New Scheme — Grant rates as shown above.

Comparison of New v. Old — 1. — Farmers with a milk quota up to 15,000 gallons will benefit from the higher grant rate of 60%.

2. — Farmers with a milk quota between 15,000 and 30,000 gallons will receive a reduced rate of funding down from 50% to 40%. However, with no upper limit on the amount of funding under the new scheme farmers who purchase a tank which costs in excess of £4,375 will be better off under the new scheme.

3. — Farmers with a milk quota between 30,000 and 40,000 gallons will benefit from the new scheme and now qualify for grant aid of 25%.

GAS REFILL FOR EXISTING REFRIGERATION EQUIPMENT

The conversion of refrigeration equipment to use a different type of gas which does not contain CFC's will not qualify for grant aid.

Grain Prices To Strengthen Says Waterford Grain Chairman

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Grain Committee, Alex Heskin said "the reduction in barley output is now worse than originally predicted due to many Spring Barley crops failing to reach 2 tonnes/acre. Consequently, supplies are going to be extremely tight even with the release of intervention grain and therefore barley prices in Ireland should firm upwards in line with trends in other European states."

He said that "despite grain being released from intervention in Europe, the cost of importing barley, even from the cheapest source in Europe, would be over £120/tonne delivered to Irish ports. Many grain merchants now realise this and consequently are paying £90/tonne

in many regions, particularly in the Midlands.

Mr. Heskin said that Irish barley was still well behind European prices where the average price is now £114/tonne as a result of tight supplies in the European market. He said that it was unacceptable that Irish grain growers are not benefiting to the same extent as their European counterparts. He added "considering the situation in the rest of Europe, Irish dried barley should trade at a minimum of £110-£115/tonne.

The Grain Committee Chairman said that demand from the compound feed sector was very strong this year with animal feed sales predicted to be up by 10% to a record level of 3.3 million

tonnes. Therefore, with demand for grain increasing and grain supplies decreasing, grain prices in Ireland will be determined by the import price.

Regarding prices themselves, Mr. Heskin said: "£88-£89/tonne has been paid in the south for Spring barley while £93/tonne + is available for feed wheat in this region. £92/£93 is being paid in the Waterford-Laois-Offaly region with £93 to £95 being paid in the Carlow/Kildare region." He concluded saying "growers should not accept less than £90/tonne for feed barley or less than £100 for feed wheat as supplies are now becoming very scarce as is evident by grain merchants actively seeking supplies in the market."

SHEEP: FLOCK HEALTH

The incidence of liver fluke infection is expected to be above average this year following the wet spring and summer. Take precautions against fluke infection, which in its chronic form causes anemia and ill-thrift, potentially leading to death.

Lambs finished off grass can become infected, leading to many of their livers being condemned at slaughter. The following points should be borne in mind when preventing liver fluke infection—

- Regular dosing reduces the contamination of pastures.
- Choose the correct dose for the situation — some drugs are more effective against immature fluke and are therefore more suitable for farms at risk from acute fluke disease.
- Use the correct amount of dose — this should include weighing a number of sheep before dosing to determine the dose rate. Over-dosing can be toxic and underdosing may fail to kill the fluke.

● Dose all susceptible animals on the farm, including sheep and cattle.

Your dosing programme should be decided in consultation with your veterinary surgeon.

EWE CONDITION

The body condition of ewes at mating is an important factor in determining the number of lambs born. If possible, ewes in poor condition at this stage should be separated from the flock and grazed on the best pasture available. Often ewes in poor condition are found to be lame — every effort should therefore be made to prevent foot rot, which can be eradicated from the farm with suitable treatment.

The organism which causes foot rot is spread from animals to animal through contaminated grazing but does not survive in the pasture for longer than two weeks, in the absence of sheep. Fields that are left ungrazed for more than two weeks are therefore considered "clean" from foot rot. Hence, the incidence of foot rot can be reduced through careful examination, trimming and foot bathing, carried out on a routine basis at each change of grazing.

CHECK YOUR RAMS

It is easy to forget about the rams during the summer months, but it is essential to make sure that coming up to mating time everything is in order. All the rams, whether newly bought or already in the flock, should be examined under the following guidelines:

Feet — Rams may not serve if their hind feet are sore.

Teeth — Check for any abnormalities.

Health — Check for any infectious diseases, for example, Orf; treat any wounds (e.g. brisket sores) and dose for worms.

Fertility — Check testicles and penis for abnormalities and if in any doubt, consult your veterinary surgeon.

Condition — Thin rams should be fed concentrate and rams which are already fit should not be allowed to become over fat.

Silage Quality

On most farms, silage is the key source when planning winter feeding programmes as the level of animal production, the need for purchased concentrates and profits, will depend on the amount and quality of silage available. The quality of grass silage can vary quite considerably in terms of preservation and digestibility. Some silages are capable of supporting 0.8 kg/day liveweight gain or 2.5 gallons/day milk yield, while others may not be capable of even supporting the maintenance requirements of livestock.

Silage analysis has a role to play in planning your winter feeding programme with the aim of optimising farm profits. An accurate silage test will help to determine the following:

- What performance can you expect from animals fed silage?
- What quantity and type of concentrate supplements are required?
- Is there enough silage to meet winter feeding requirements?
- Is it necessary to review grassland management or silage making techniques for next year?

The accuracy of the silage analysis is important because vital management decisions (e.g. supplementation levels) are based on the results.

Teagasc provide a comprehensive silage testing service which includes proper sampling of the silage pit and accurate analysis of the sample using the in-vitro dry matter digestibility technique through its laboratories at Grange Research Centre. 


In the final, David and Brian's teams met. The game was superb and in the dying minutes David scored a stunning goal to snatch victory.







WOLF (Cinema One) — In a decidedly new twist on a familiar movie theme, Nicholson undergoes a remarkable, hairy transformation in Mike Nichols's *Wolf*, co-starring with Michelle Pfeiffer and James Spader. For Marine Captain John Robbins (Ray Liotta), convicted of murdering a commanding officer, Absolom means no escape, no hope and almost no chance of survival. The open draw in Munster is to remain for a further year, following a decision of the Council at their meeting in Limerick on Tuesday night last. Cork and Kerry delegates voted for a change and expressed the opinion that the championships in the province lost much of the glamour that had made them the most popular championships in the country.

Delegates from the other four counties submitted that the open draw had aroused greater interest in the championship in their counties since its inception three years ago.

The vote in favour of retention was 10 to 4 and it applies to both hurling and football. As far as our county is concerned, the open draw made little difference while for Limerick, Clare and Tipperary, it did mean that they were able to play in a Munster final in the past five years.

The public generally gave a resounding 'no' to the idea of the open draw and this was clearly reflected in the massive reduction in attendances over the past few years. This year it was at its lowest in over 40 years and the final between Cork and Tipperary attracted only about 40% of the crowd who normally turn up for a Cork/Kerry final. The effect of this will mean considerably reduced grants for all counties for purchase, development and other promotional work. Finances could be down by around £130,000 this year when the books are audited.

It presents athletes, parents, mentors and officials with regular activity, beginning on Sunday, October 2 with the Waterford Primary Schools races at St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside.

VALUABLE VENUE
Local and county athletics are once again very fortunate this year that St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside is being made available, by kind permission of the school authorities, for school and club championships. In addition, Munster under age cross country will be staged there in November as will the National Senior and Junior Inter-Counties Championships for the second year in a row. Looking further ahead, the International Schools Cross Country

Championships will be hosted at St. Augustine's next April and this is another historic first for the progressive Friary College. So it is quite clear that be it Waterford 'B' championships or National class athletics, the Duck-spool based school is giving great support to the promotion of the sport.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS
The second annual Waterford Primary Schools Cross Country Championships will kick off the new season on Sunday, October 2 at 1 p.m. The programme consists of races for boys and girls from 2nd to 6th class involving individual and team races.

There are prizes for the first five individuals to finish and the first five teams of three runners each. In an effort to bring the smaller schools onto a more equal footing with the larger ones the teams, this year, have been reduced from four to three scoring members, no school is permitted to win more than one team prize in

any one race and the smaller schools are allowed to group their classes. For example, fourth and fifth class children can compete together in the fifth class race.



Ring are one of the precious few clubs who can achieve a county hurling and football double this year and some of those who are close to the club, reckon there is a distinct possibility of it happening. They have already qualified for the divisional intermediate football final and a place in the

"I can understand why they would be vexed," slammed Cllr. Nuala Ryan, while Cllr. Austin Flynn strongly criticised the decision to import a whole design team for the college

project. "We must keep some of the jobs local," he urged.

Following further acrimonious discussions, Cllr Con Casey informed members that he would not like to remain a member of the selection sub-committee should Cllr. Cunningham's proposal as seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan, go ahead. Mr. Geary also declined.

It was finally decided by members to accept the Board's recommendations and to appoint the three successful applicants to the various positions on the design team.


