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## Death Of Famous Dungarvan Man

One of the most famous and noted businessmen ever to hail from Dungarvan, John A. Mulcahy has died in New York at the ripe old age of 88.

Known to many Dungarvan residents as the man who brought the Quigley Magnesite plant to Ballinacourty, John A. (Jack) Mulcahy was recognised as being one of the most influential figures ever in promoting the establishment of U.S. businesses in Ireland. Born and educated in Dungarvan, Jack attended the Christian Brothers School and was in the same class as Michael Curran, of M. J. Curran and Sons, Hardware, Dungarvan.

He was one of a large family of 13, resident at the Lookout, Dungarvan.

Jack's father Patrick Mulcahy was Town Clerk from the early 1900's until his retirement in 1921 and is now buried in St. Mary's Parish Church Graveyard.

Recalling the famous industrialist and ex-classmate, Michael Curran of O'Connell Street described Jack Mulcahy as a "very ambitious fellow" who had always been deeply interested in the town of Dungarvan.

He left the town as a young teenager and made his way to the 'land of hopes and dreams'. Arriv-

# Calling All Art Enthusiasts

**CALLIGRAPHY** — the art of beautiful handwriting — an inexpensive hobby or craft and now a popular Junior and Leaving Cert subject! If you're interested in calligraphy and want to know more, then come to the free Calligraphy Exhibition and Demonstration Day at the Park Hotel on Saturday, October 1.

Self-taught calligraphers, Jane and Jonathan Bulfin have organised this intriguing exhibition to promote interest in and understanding of the art of calligraphy.

On the day, from 11.30 a.m. to 5 p.m., the experienced duo will demonstrate their famed techniques of lettering and illumination. Framed pieces of their work will be on display and calligraphy pens, inks and papers will be on sale.

Based in Cork, the husband and wife team have held several successful exhibitions in galleries nationwide, the most recent being in Bandon earlier this year, where, Jane said, the public feedback had been tremendous.

Studying the craft for over 15 years, the couple founded the former Calligraphy Society of Cork and since 1987 they have been offering courses and workshops in calligraphy and related arts in the Cork area.

Saturday's exhibition however will be a home-

coming for the former Abbeyside resident and Dungarvan-born Jonathan Bulfin, who is looking forward to bringing his love of calligraphy to his native community. A musician by profession, John specialises in teaching copperplate script while his own work is in a modern painterly style, free and somewhat experimental.

Jane is a full-time calligrapher, often commissioned to execute commercial projects (letterheads, logos, etc.) and illuminated presentation scrolls, as well as custom-designed wedding stationery.

She holds a BA in Literature and Fine Art, an MA (UCLA) in Comparative Mythology and Celtic Studies, a Diploma in Medieval Studies and is currently completing an M.Phil. in Insular Palaeography — an impressive track record by any account!

If sufficient interest in the art of calligraphy is generated at next Saturday's exhibition/demonstration, Jane and Jonathan report they will set up a workshop in the area.

So, all local art enthusiasts, calligraphy students and anyone interested, why not drop into the Park Hotel on October 1. All are welcome and you won't be disappointed.

# STRADBALLY TIDY TOWNS REPORT '94

Stradbally's marks in the 1994 Tidy Towns competition totalled 201 out of a possible 250, six more than the 1993 total.

The Limerick village of Galbally won the overall National Award scoring just five points more than the Co. Waterford village.

Stradbally's results however earned the scenic village first place in the South East Region and first prize in the County Tidy Towns Competition.

This year's competition attracted 672 entries, an increase of 22 on 1993. The high level of effort and commitment is evident from the tightest of margins which separated Galbally from nine other towns and villages — all of them scoring between 200 - 205.

The following is the adjudicators report, 1993 marks in brackets:

### EFFORT (39) 40

The town of Stradbally has a unique character in that it is almost like two towns in one — two connected nodes — with the village green as its pivotal point — yet an integrated whole. The efforts of its residents to display their town to its best advantage are all too apparent, the result being an undoubted success. Some minor areas need attention before next year's competition however.

### TIDINESS (34) 34

Very little litter was visible, although some stray papers were strewn on the otherwise pristine village green. Attention must also be paid to such areas as the interior of the phone box which contained some papers and lollipop sticks.

Some weeds to be seen at the base of the wall and along the path of the boys' school. Otherwise the town was immaculately presented and appeared very fresh and natural.

### PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS (34) 35

The public buildings of the town are impeccably turned out. The Garda Station, Catholic Church and Hall all looked very smart. The Protestant Church was particularly noteworthy, a very peaceful space with its elegant gravel drive overhung by a majestic avenue of trees. The associated school looked well also. The boys' school, already referred to, was the single exception. The commercial buildings all looked very fresh, although the plastic canopy to Shop Local has not been removed and is quite out of keeping with the charm of the town. Tom Condon's butchers shop is particularly simple and elegant. The building with the red tin roof looked very bright, although its out-buildings should be freshened up before next year's competition.

### PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES (34) 35

This category is obviously one which attracts particular interest, as the standard of presentation is very high indeed, resulting in a very natural elegant environment. The wattergarden was very neat and elegant, while the village green with its beautifully simple decoration to the pump and pristine lawn was delightful. Greater attention, however, should be paid to litter control.

### APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS (35) 36

The standard of roads and their ancillary signposts and street furniture was very high. The Dungarvan road with its high canopy of trees and majestic wrought iron railings and gate (to the left hand side) was particularly attractive.

### PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS (19) 21

The standard of houses and gardens was truly exceptional. Carrigahilla House, although private is yet obviously a distinct part of the town. Of particular note in respect of this category was the use of colour in a very successful manner. The majestic terrace of houses down the hill from the Garda Station with their elegant front gardens and earth tone hues of cream, soft pink and sage green were breathtaking, while the thatched cottage on Dungarvan road with its red roses around a contrasting dark green door and matching gate was very quaint. Of note also was the quite beautiful house by the wattergarden and the house opposite Shop Local with its rich red colouring and strongly contrasting mustard trim. The public planting outside gardens was also considered, that outside

"Kismet" being particularly lovely.

Keep up the excellent work!

### SECOND ADJUDICATION

It is a pleasure to visit Stradbally for the purpose of Tidy Towns adjudication. The village looked extremely well on the day of second adjudication. All buildings and spaces were well presented. It is only details of presentation that now need attention. The first adjudicator had awarded a total of six extra marks this year. This is a very substantial increase especially in view of the fact that Stradbally is already so highly ranked in the competition. Nonetheless, this increase seems justified and is supported by the second adjudicator. The only disappointment on the day of second adjudication was the presence, once again, of some street litter. Groups of litter were noted near the village green and near the Garda Station. Presence of street litter completely undermines the benefits of other amenity improvements that are carried out in a town or village. You must maintain a completely litter free environment throughout the entire year. The boundary wall of the boys school has been weeded since first adjudication. Well done.

# County Musicians In Celebration Concert

This year the Local Centre Examination System of the Royal Irish Academy of Music is one hundred years old and in order to celebrate, the Academy has organised a series of twenty six concerts throughout Ireland. From Donegal to Kerry, Longford to Leitrim, the sound of music and drama will fill the concert halls, schools and hotels of Ireland during October and November as children from each county participate in these Local Centre Centenary Concerts.

The celebrations begin on Saturday, October 1 when the Waterford Regional Technical College plays host to the Waterford Local Centre Celebration Concert. This concert will comprise the highest placed students from the county who participated in the Local Centre exams during the period November 1993 to June 1994.

Local participants in the Waterford Centenary Concert included — Fearghus de Paor on Pianoforte Preliminary, taught by Ms. Maria White of Monarud, Dungarvan; Kathy Power on Pianoforte Preliminary, taught by Ms. Maris White of Monarud, Dungarvan; David Flynn on Pianoforte 1, taught by Ms. A. D'Alton, Colligan Mountain, Colligan, Dungarvan; Regina Ryan on Pianoforte 2, taught by Ms. Mairead Cullinane, Monamon, Lismore and Catherine O'Mahony on Pianoforte 4, taught by Ms. Mairead Cullinane, Monamon, Lismore.

Founded in 1894 by the Italian composer and pianist, Michele Esposito, then Professor of Piano at the Academy, the Local Centre Examination System is designed to improve both music/speech performance and teaching in Ireland.

This exam system has grown to serve every county in Ireland, examining over 30,000 students annually. Through a system of scholarships, to encourage the more outstanding students sitting those exams to continue their studies at the Academy, the talents of some of Ireland's finest young musicians have been attracted. Examples are R.T.E.'s Frank McNamara and pianist Jimmy Vaughan, now a member of the Vienna State Opera.

The concert beings at 8 p.m. and tickets are £4 and £2 (concessions).

# Local Premiere Of 'Broken Harvest'

On Friday, October 7, Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society is to host the Dungarvan Premiere of Broken Harvest in the Ormonde Cinema.

Shot in the beautiful landscape of West Cork last summer, Broken Harvest is a truly unique Irish film in that the production was completely financed in Ireland.

The two hour long film is the impressive result of 10 years work on the part of writer/director Maurice O'Callaghan. Having

worked in Hollywood for some years, O'Callaghan was eager to do something in his native country, and so, with the help of his brother, Jerry, he set about raising the entire budget here in Ireland. "It's not like other Irish made films who receive part finance from Hollywood companies," said O'Callaghan, who employed the talents of an all-Irish cast to give the film a truly Irish feel.

Local amateur dramatic society players were even used for the supporting

roles.

## TOWERING PERFORMANCES

Broken Harvest is a film which will certainly strike a cord with many local cinema goers. Friday week's premiere at 8 p.m. is a great opportunity to catch this remarkable film which has been accorded excellent reviews by film critics nationwide.

Incidentally, Broken Harvest will return to the Ormonde Cinema on October 28, where it will run for a week or so.

The film features towering performances from New York based stage actors Colin Lane and Marian Quinn, well established Abbey player, Niall O'Brien and the talented Darren McHugh.

## STORYLINE

Broken Harvest opens in present day New York as wealthy business man, Jimmy O'Leary (Darren McHugh) learns of the death of his mother back in Ireland. He is immediately brought back to his childhood days spent on a remote farm in the South West during the 1950's. Jimmy spends his summer days lazing about, reading comics and playing pranks. But when he buys a new comic with money intended for Josie McCarthy's (Niall O'Brien) parish dues, he unwittingly rekindles a vicious feud that had lain dormant for years.

Josie and Jimmy's father, Arthur (Colin Lane) have been sworn enemies since the Civil War when they found themselves fighting over the same country and the same woman. That woman is, of course, Jimmy's mother Catherine (Marian Quinn).

As the drama unfolds it embraces many of the great issues to affect Ireland this century — the Civil War, emigration and the effect of modern technology on a conservative rural community.

Most of the film's action takes place in this period when Arthur, the republican hero of the film, is faced with the increasingly painful realisation that the independence struggle has merely left big farmers and bank managers in charge, while Ireland is culturally swamped from abroad.

## GUEST APPEARANCE

Broken Harvest is Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society's first ever film premiere and all funds raised go to the society's development. The film itself was suggested by Ormonde Cinema Manager Joe Green and after viewing the film, society members were in no doubt that Broken Harvest would make a big impact on the local scene.

A cheese and wine reception will be held afterwards in the Park Hotel where the Executive Producer (either Maurice O'Callaghan or his brother Jerry) will make a guest appearance.

Tickets may be obtained from members of the society, Delany's Shoe Shop, The Square or the Ormonde Cinema and are priced at £5 each — great value for a night packed with solid entertainment.

So come on all you film buffs — Broken Harvest is one film certainly not to be missed.

# Microwave Kebabs In A Hurry



Here's a hot snack that can be made in a jiffy — in your microwave oven.

## SEAFOOD KEBABS

Soy sauce and water chestnuts add an Oriental flavour to these miniature Kebabs.

### Ingredients

4 slices bacon, each cut in 3 pieces  
2 tbsps soy sauce  
2 tbsps honey  
2 tbsps white wine  
1/8 tsp garlic powder  
12 whole water chestnuts  
12 sea scallops (1/2lb)  
1 small green pepper, cut into 12 chunks  
12 short wooden skewers (3 inches long).

### Method

In a 1-quart (1.1 litre) casserole, microwave the bacon pieces at high for 1 to 1 1/2 minutes, or just until bacon begins to brown.

Drain, reserving 1 tbsp of bacon drippings in the casserole. Set bacon aside on a paper towel-lined plate. Add the soy sauce, honey, wine and garlic powder to the casserole. Stir. Mi-



crowave on high for 45 seconds, or until the marinade mixture can be stirred smooth. Set aside. Wrap 1 piece of bacon around each water chestnut. Assemble each kebab by placing ingredients on skewer in the following order: scallop, bacon-wrapped water chestnut and green pepper chunk. Repeat to form 12 kebabs. Place kebabs in mari-

nade mixture. Turn to coat. Cover and shill for 1 to 2 hours. Arrange the kebabs on a roasting rack with the scallops towards the outside. Microwave at medium for 5 to 7 minutes or until the scallops are firm and opaque, turning kebabs over and basting with marinade once during cooking time. **Makes 12.**

# Jobs To Do Now Before Winter

OCTOBER marks a distinct change in gardening chores as well as the weather. Gone are the almost pleasurable dead-heading, mowing, clipping and trimming — to be replaced by a special 'hit list' which must be completed before the cold weather deterrent takes a grip:

**LAWNS** — must be cleared of fallen leaves and, if you haven't already done so, worked over with a spring rake. This will remove the infamous 'thatch' of flattened and dead material which prevents moisture getting to the soil and blocks progress by the grass.

Follow-up by spiking or slitting for aeration and feeding with a proprietary phosphate-based lawn mix.

Trim newly-sown lawns at two inches high and again a few weeks later.

**HARVESTING** — lift and store the last of your potato and carrot crops and keep picking apples and pears as they ripen. Never store produce when damp and always ensure that it is well ventilated and protected from vermin.

Keep checking for mould and decay or you risk the proverbial 'one rotten apple spoiling the whole crop.'

**GERANIUMS** — can survive early frosts but prepare for overwintering now by moving to a frost-free greenhouse or a windowsill indoors. The latter should be sunny but not in a well-heated room.

A shed with a decent window may do, but any lack of light may cause dropped leaves.

Another method is to dig up the plants, shaking off soil, pruning back to six inches high, and cutting off leaves. These 'skeleton' plants are then planted close together in trays of slightly moist peat. Watch for and remove shoots of plants which die but most should survive and revive next spring, ready for re-potting or planting.

**HEDGES** — clear out hedge bottoms thoroughly and burn or bag up debris to stop pests and diseases over-wintering there and wreaking new havoc next year.

Such cleared areas beneath deciduous hedges can also be used to plant snowdrops and primroses for a chery start to next spring.

**CONIFERS** — plant now to give them a flying start but take care when preparing the site. Thorough planting now will ensure strong and healthy growth for many years.

**FROST PROTECTION** — all frost-prone plants should be raised now. Bulbs, tubers and corms should be dried and stored while complete plants are overwintered in a greenhouse or place where frost cannot reach them.

**REPAIRS** — repair all fences, gates, brickwork and paths before winter sets in and adds to the existing damage and makes it harder to remedy.

**STORAGE** — many tools and machines will be stored away now for several months. Make sure they are clean, well-oiled and put away carefully and safely. Repair now rather than wait until needed.

# County Waterford V.E.C. Snippets

## HIGH COST OF P.L.C. COURSES

Speaking at last week's Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee meeting, Cllr. Nora Flynn hit out at the high cost to students and parents of Post Leaving Certificate Courses.

Boasting a remarkable success with a high record placement, P.L.C. courses in V.E.C. Colleges throughout the country including Dungarvan Technical College, are now attracting a considerable number of students. In this year alone, Cllr. Flynn said students had travelled from as far as Galway to attend P.L.C. courses in Dungarvan and subsequently had to fork out £38 per week for accommodation costs. "It's ridiculous that there's no grant for P.L.C. courses, not even a tax free allowance", she slammed, "the students should at least be mean tested".

The Cappoquin Councillor then proposed that the Co. Waterford V.E.C. call on the Department of Education and all V.E.C.'s nationwide in an effort to secure future grant aid for all P.L.C. students.

## IMPRESSIVE RESULTS

No exam failures at Junior and Leaving Cert level were recorded this year at St. Declan's Community School, Kilmacthomas and Dungarvan Technical College. That's according to C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan who reported impressive exam results all round.

Of a total of 63 Leaving certificate students in Kilmac, 80% have now secured a place in third level education.

The C.E.O. continued that 83 Kilmac' students completed the Junior Cert and all had done 'extremely well'.

Students at Dungarvan Technical College also deserve a clap on the back with 'good results' being the order of the day at both exam levels.

Mr. Heffernan continued that one Junior Cert. student in the Dungarvan College had received a creditable eleven honours.

## W.R.T.C. BUS TOO EARLY

Raised at a previous Co. Waterford V.E.C. meeting by Cllr. Tom Cunningham V.E.C. Chairman Cllr.

Billy Kyne moved a notice of motion at last week's meeting that the committee contact both the W.R.T.C. and Bus Eireann, "pointing out the difficulties facing students", due to some classes finishing at 5.15 p.m. while the bus servicing West Waterford departs at 5 p.m., "and to request that some arrangement be put in place to resolve this problem".

In moving the motion, Cllr. Kyne said he had been approached by many people who pointed out that having missed the bus by 15 minutes, West Waterford students then had to wait for the 6 p.m. bus which is an express service and does not stop at such intermediate points as Kilmacthomas etc.

Supporting the motion, Cllr. Cunningham said there was enough pressure on students such as exams, without having to thumb home on winter evenings.

Urging that the emphasis should be more on Bus Eireann to change it's timetable rather than Waterford Technical College, Cllr. Con Casey, said it was 'extremely unlikely' that classes would finish earlier at 5 p.m.

The motion was passed unanimously by the members.

## MODER KILMAC' COMPUTER ROOM

Thanks to the fundraising efforts of St. Declan's Community School's Parents Council, students of the Kilmacthomas school can now avail of what one councillor described as "the most modern school computer system in the South East".

In his monthly report to members of the County Waterford V.E.C. last week, C.E.O. Kieran Heffernan reported that 16 computers and two printers had been made available through the generous efforts of the Parents Council who had managed to raise the necessary £21,000. The V.E.C. had then refurbished an existing school room, thereby converting it into a modern computer room for the students.

V.E.C. members were unanimous in their praise of the dedicated and hard working committee.

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

## MacGrath's Castle Featured In Decies Magazine

The Journal of the Old Waterford Society titled Decies features a comprehensive study of the now demolished castle which stood a short distance from Abbeyside Church. On the front cover of the journal there is a large picture of the castle taken around the turn of the century. The photograph depicts the castle as viewed from the east.

The castle was a typical tower-house of six floors, two of them supported by stone vaults. It is called MacGrath's Castle in the Civil Survey of 1654 which supplies the following details of the castle:

'The premises is bounded on the east with the highway leading through the strand to Dungarvan; on the north with Hores-land; on the west with the highway called Stradnemrahir. There is on the premises a small castle formerly called MacGrath's Castle which is strong and defensible and now possessed by Captain James Oldfield in pursuance of an order granted by Lt. Collonel Francis Foulkes, then Gournor of Dungarvan, grounded upon direcons from Collonel Sankey, confirmeinge a lease made by Mrs. Ellin Boyton, Alias MacGrath of

the premises, for 7 years onto the said Captain Oldfield.'

The seven page article (pages 38-44 of the journal) includes detailed descriptions, photographs, sketches and a rubbing of the tomb of Donal MacGrath in Abbeyside Church was written by William Fraher our local historian who does tremendous work for Dungarvan Museum.

During his research William unearthed the Ordnance Survey Letters of Co. Waterford (1841) which give a more detailed description of the castle:

'It is a lofty square building measuring on the outside 38 feet from east to west and 31 feet 6 inches from north to south and its walls are well grouted and eight feet in thickness. It is six stories high and had two stone arches supporting two of its floors. The quoin stones are chiselled sand stones and all its windows are narrow and quadrangular and formed of chiselled sand stone. Its east is destroyed to the ground, but the other sides are in good preservation and not less than 90 feet in height.'

Last week's meeting which was a full uniform one, saw another




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# BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

## 1994 Tidy Towns Progress Report

Centre: Ballymacarbray  
County: Waterford  
Category: A  
1994 Mark: 181  
Effort (Max 45) 1993 = 36, 1994 = 36 — Ballymacarbray set in the spectacular surroundings of the Nire Valley makes it a quite quaint and unique village. The standard this year was quiet inconsistent with some areas requiring more stringent efforts. For example the abandoned concrete blocks opposite the Post Office mentioned in last year's reports, were still there. More attention should be paid to details such as painting of gates, tidying of yard areas and side laneways and inappropriate temporary measures to block up openings in walls. It is a pity that again this year you neglected to submit a questionnaire or map to assist adjudication.

Tidiness (Max 40) 1993 = 28, 1994 = 28 — Inconsistencies were apparent in this category with some litter apparent on the approach roads and outside the B & B. Side laneways and yards also need attention such as that to the right hand side of Melody's Bar which was quiet messy. The yard belonging to Waterford Foods would benefit from a solid wall and a gate to screen the unavoidable storage of such goods as timber pallets, bags and building materials. Doocey's Garage forecourt looked well, but the bent panel on the metal gate could be straightened out. Some utility buildings along the main road in the village need painting. The fence opposite the Garda Station looks quite unsightly, while the vertical Metal Box, acting as an obstruction in the stone wall further along, is, presumably, a temporary measure.

Presentation of Building

(Max 40) 1993 = 31, 1994 = 32 — Ballymacarbray has some fine buildings. The Old Mill down the lane opposite Doocey's Garage being particularly admired. Melody's Bar and its associated buildings including the Nire Valley Tourist Information Office, looked very well indeed with their fresh strong mustard colour with a dark green trim. The Oriel Bar, however, would benefit from removal of the profusion of back lit plastic signs which clutter its facade. St. Patrick's Hall and Ballymacarbray Garda Station looked quite drab and very much in need of painting. The Post Office with its nostalgia with attractively simple in its presentation. However the Post Office sign itself should be replaced with one of a more professional appearance.

Presentation of Natural Amenities (Max 50) 1993 = 32, 1994 = 33 — The standard in this category was good. The picnic area opposite St. Patrick's Hall looked well, although the grass needed trimming. The Grotto on the bend on the left hand side of the Dungarvan Road was particularly admired for its simple and subtly natural presentation situated as it is on the chattering stream. The gates and railings should be touched up for next year. The apparently new stone wall to the left hand side of the village looked well.

Appearance of Approach Roads (Max 45) 1993 = 34, 1994 = 33 — Attention should be given to this category for next year's competition. The Clonmel Road was quiet overgrown, it improved nearer to the village. The Dungarvan Road had a badly cut laneway on the left hand side and an abandoned pile of sand on the day of adjudication. Some weeds were apparent on the stone wall

further in.

Presentation of Residential Areas (Max 30) 1993 = 18, 1994 = 19 — Great pride is obviously taken in this aspect of the competition as the standard was generally good. The Nire Valley Farmhouse looked well, the wall to the shed beside with its planting being particularly admired. The house opposite was freshly painted and boasted a lush and colourful garden. The houses to the right hand side of the Clonmel road needed a fresh coat of paint, particularly the front gates. The ivy clad Nire Vale cottage and garden on the right hand side of the Clonmel road at the bridge looked quite beautiful. St. Martin's Place with its flower planter at the entrance and hedges looked well but will need freshening up for next year.

1992 — 178, 1993 — 179, 1994 — 181.

The Sligo/Leitrim T.D. said the ceasefire provided a historic opportunity to unite people in a practical struggle for social justice, unit and independence. "Now is the time for republicans, socialists, nationalists and democrats North and South to build the peace, to work together and co-operate to begin the process of bringing about by democratic means a United Irish Republic, a new Republic which can guarantee democracy, secularism and cultural pluralism, a Republic which would unite Catholic, Protestant and Dissenter", Deputy Bree said. A ceasefire was declared within weeks of the tragic death of General Liam Lynch on those Knockmealdown Mountains some 71 years ago, and a divided and devastated country left a bitter legacy for further generations. The current ceasefire had come in altogether more promising times, he said.

## BISHOP BLESSES LISMORE GROTTTO

The recently constructed grotto to the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary was officially blessed by Bishop William Lee earlier this month on the feast of the birthday of Our Lady.

The ceremony was performed in the presence of the Grotto committee, Canon Nugent P.P. V.F., Fr.

Ryan, C.C., Presentation Sisters, Christian Brothers, St. Carthage's Church Choir, and the people of Lismore and surrounding areas who include many of those who contributed to and took part in the building of the grotto.

### LISMORE GROTTTO

About eight years ago a Grotto Committee was formed in Lismore to plan

and undertake the building of a grotto. The members of the committee were aware that Lismore was the only parish in the area without a public shrine to Our Lady.

# RECENT DEATHS

## NIACLÁS TOIBIN



It is with sincere sorrow and regret that we record the death of Mr. Nioclás Toibín, Ballyreilly, An Rinn, Dúngharbhán, which sad event occurred at the Waterford Regional Hospital on Monday, September 19. He had been in failing health for some time.

It was a fitting tribute to the stature of Nioclás Toibín that so many of the country's best known musical artists came to honour him through their presence and their music one last time. He was probably's Waterford's best known singer and the way in which the news of his death was carried by all the national newspapers and RTE's radio and television news bears testimony to this.

It was a sad and lonely parting for the many hundreds from all over the country who gathered to pay a fitting tribute to the man who was one of the best sean-nós singers of all time.

The loss at Nioclás's passing can never be quantified. His musical talent will probably never be surpassed and his winning of sean-nós singing's ultimate accolade, the prestigious Oireachtas competition for three years in a row (1961, '62, '63), is a record only he held.

A gentle, unassuming man who possessed a nobility and dignity found in so few today, Nioclás never once refused to sing for anyone. It is further tribute to him that so many young singers of a new and vibrant generation in the Ring/Old Parish Gaeltacht have taken their inspiration from him and every time they sing the songs that he made popular, he will be among us.

He had in excess of three hundred songs all stored in his acclaimed memory, mostly in his native language which he so loved — Irish.

In a special programme broadcast in Nioclás's memory on Raidió na Gaeltachta immediately after the funeral Mass, many of his old friends — from Connemara in Galway to Cora Dhuibhne in Kerry; from Cúil Aodha in Cork, to his native parish of Ring — recounted their best memories of him, some funny, some sad, but all sharing their sense of immense loss.

Among those who paid musical tributes at the funeral Mass was Micheál Ó

Súilleabháin and Nóirín Ní Riain, John Dwyer, Jimmy O'Brien-Moran, Matty Fahy and Nicky Power, Eoin Ó Súilleabháin and John Beag Ó Flaitherta.

During the Mass, which was also broadcast live on Raidió na Gaeltachta, the voices of some of his friends who inherited the tradition from Nioclás, were also to be heard, as local singers, Cárthach and Seán Mac Craith, Marion Gough and Aine Uí Cheallaigh sang their tributes, while his old friends Ann Mulqueen, Séamus Ó Cionnfhaoilaidh, Séamas Mac Craith, Aine Nic Mhurchadha, Nóirín Uí Chionnfhaoilaidh and Dóirín Mhic Mhurchú offered prayers and readings.

Fr. Conchúir Ó Dálaigh was chief celebrant, along with Fr. Seán Ó Cadhla and Canon Dónal Ó Conchúir, Ardmore.

In the oration at the graveside, Nioclás Mac Craith said that Nioclás Toibín was "Rí-amhránaí Eireann — the all-Ireland king of singers — and urged those present to go to the people of Nioclás Toibín's generation still with us, to learn the traditional singing style from them.

During his life, Nioclás sang, explained, taught and passed along the tradition which he inherited from his parents, and they from the generations before them, and the greatest tribute to him is that these songs and the style in which he sang are carried on by this generation. While that is so, Nioclás Toibín's memory will live forever.

## TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

**Open Receptive Minds** — Nowadays most people who promote hurling manage teams, no matter what the grade, acknowledge the importance of structured organised coaching. In fact most involved with the game readily admit that without coaches and coaching the standard would be much lower because the essence of underage activity of this kind is the acquisition and practice of those seven or eight basic skills without which no player can perform properly and enjoy himself/herself. The better the young player performs the greater his/her satisfaction and enjoyment. And the increased enjoyment impels that player to strive all the more to increase his/her mastery over that illusive sliotar. Then you have an in-built motivational factor which all the great performers needed to possess.

Some who are less than enthusiastic about the value or importance of coaching (I'm not concerned with the dinosaurs or antediluvians who reject it as valueless) complain that it is too artificial, too structured and divorced from the real world of the instinctive hurling match. That criticism shouldn't be peremptorily dismissed without an admission that it has a certain validity insofar as the total reliance on mere skills training will ill prepare players for the cut and thrust of a game. Good coaching in the modern idiom embraces all aspects of the game both physical and psychological. But primacy should go to skills training. What use is a high level of physical preparedness and a wholesome positive mental approach if the team is unable to perform the skills which bring the scores and, ultimately, victory.

I was pondering this subject the other day while I listened to an expert expounding ex cathedra the theory that modern hurling isn't nearly as good as it was. "All because of the coaching" he affirmed. It should be done away with. 'Tis killing

the game, stifling natural flair and self-expression; aiming to produce a level of dullness and mediocrity which we never had 30 years ago. Will you tell me", he asked triumphantly "what coaching had the likes of Christy Ring and Philly Grimes?"

Let me agree at once that the overall standard is in decline but to blame that on coaching is neither fair nor true. There are coaches, I admit, who programme players to lift, run and pass while neglecting the striking skills, especially the most fundamental skill, the ground stroke. However, for every one of such charlatans there are many well equipped coaches whose credentials stand up to scrutiny and whose open honest approach aims to develop the full potential of their team panels. They identify weaknesses and set out to overcome them. They note faults and strive to correct them. They encourage players to question and probe, to cleanse their minds of self-doubt on any skill or stratagem so that confidence increases. You know what you are doing, why you are doing it and how it can benefit your game and your team's chances. If coaching is learning it is also teaching, an educational experience. The Socratic meaning of educate is to "draw out" so good coaching should draw from a player the innate God-given skills of mind and body so that the player fulfills himself as a hurler and as a person.

Let's get back to the late super-players Grimes and Ring. Well, my argumentative friend, I'm sorry to spoil your specious contention that those two men were never coached. They had coaching all right, self coaching.

At every Waterford training session Philly Grimes, in his eagerness to use every minute profitably and to perfect a skill he already possessed, used to go through a routine. Before any of us came out on to the training pitch Philly was there throwing the ball over his shoulder behind him, turning sharply, racing to the

sliotar and jab-lifting it into his hand. This manoeuvre was repeated many times while we viewed the operation with amused tolerance and slight bewilderment. Not by accident was Philly, go ndéana Dia trócaire air, expert at lifting and at every other skill too. He insisted, all on his own well before there was talk of coaching, in coaching himself i.e. practising his skills.

Ring carried the hurler with him in his oil truck for the same reason and his mind was ever open to any influence which might improve his hurling. He never thought, he told me years after our "battles" were over, that he knew it all and he thirsted for more information and ideas which could make him a more effective player. On one occasion we were seated side by side watching Tipperary and Limerick battling for the right to meet us in a tournament final (we had beaten Cork in the curtain-raiser). Jimmy Doyle, Tipp's sweet-striking forward, had just sent a free over the bar when I got a sharp elbow from Ring (I often got worse!). "Did you see that", said Ring darting a quick glance at me. "What?" asked I. "The follow through", explained Christy, "did you see the way he followed through high, I must remember that with my next free". There he was Ring, peerless caman-wielder, ageing genius, willing and open to receive a coaching tip from a young fellow. And a Tipperary young fellow at that!

Donie Nealon, Tipperary great, told me of Liam Devaney's coaching of his team mate Theo English at training one evening. Liam noticed that Theo's lifting grip was wrong. "Try it this way Theo", Liam suggested going on to demonstrate the correct method. Under Liam's supervision Theo tried it, again and again, liked it and used that lifting method for the rest of his hurling career.

So coaching isn't an entirely new concept; it is probably as old as the game itself. It was always there but not for-

malised until relatively recently. In the wrong hands it can do very little good for the game but thankfully there are many fine people, intelligent coaches, doing great work for hurling. And for football too, of course. They, like Grimes and Ring and English are ever open and receptive as they pursue the unattainable perfection.





## Local Auctioneers Issue Warning On Land Values

Farmers throughout the country could suffer a considerable loss on land sales if inadequately advised on the implications of the CAP reform and various EU schemes, according to representatives of the Irish Auctioneers & Valuers Institute.

Local MIAVI auctioneer, Eamonn Spratt of Edmond Spratt & Son, Dungarvan, says that farmers participating in an EU scheme such as the Farm Retirement scheme could potentially lose up to 30% to 40% of actual land value should they have to sell under certain circumstances.

"Land valuation is becoming increasingly complex under EU legislation arising out of the CAP reform," stated Mr. Spratt, "and we urge farmers to secure qualified specialist advice."

A number of complexities exist, particularly in the implications of the EU Farm Retirement scheme introduced earlier this year, Eamonn Spratt pointed out. He said that farmers must secure professional guidance to maximise the benefits of the scheme.

Mr. Spratt went on to say that for example, farmers planning to opt for the early retirement scheme under the 5-year lease need to take account of any difficulties arising should they require to sell the property during the term of the lease. Land without vacant possession, and subject to a 5-year lease, could be devalued by as much as 30-40%.

Additionally, farmers need to be aware of the various conditions entitling them to benefit from the scheme, for example, under the legislation, land transferred by lease must increase a younger farmer's holding, or be leased for non-agricultural use, such as forestry

and agri-tourism."

To provide farmers with the necessary specialist advice on the implications of the CAP reform, the IAVI is taking a stand again this year at the All-Ireland Ploughing championships (Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford, 27-29 September). Qualified IAVI experts will be available at the IAVI stand (Business Pavilion) to handle all enquiries specific to farmers, including the implications of the various schemes, land quotas and controls in tillage, dairy, beef and sheep production.

The IAVI regional representatives will also advise on compulsory purchase order acquisitions and other specialist areas of broader interest, including probate, inheritance, capital gains and residential property tax, as well as general property and land transactions.

"We have taken this step again," said Eamon Spratt, "as we are concerned at the level of inadequate advice farmers and other members of the rural community may be receiving."

He urged those not able to attend the All-Ireland Ploughing Championships this year to consult with their local MIAVI auctioneer and valuer whose expertise may be able to bring about valuable savings on land transactions.

According to the IAVI, there has been a marked increase in farm land transactions nationwide, more notably in the larger holdings. The Institute also reports an estimated 10% increase on land prices during the last 12 months and attributes the market buoyancy to a productive year in 1993 following a number of poor years, as well as to historically low interest rates and increased EU subsidies.

## Teagasc Says

### WINTER CEREALS

From the year's experience it is clear that opportunities for harvesting cereals under our weather conditions are very limited. The later the harvest the more limited the opportunities. Winter barley growers are in the happy position that they can harvest the crop in late July or early August. This is the big attraction of winter barley. Opportunities for sowing winter cereals are also often limited by wet weather. Late sowings are more risky but are usually characterised by reduced weed disease and pest problems when compared to early sowings. Consequently, the "optimum time" of sowing will always be a compromise. Aim to start sowing barley now and winter wheat before mid October.

**SEEDBED PREPARATION** — Preferably "burn off" grass swards and weedy stubbles with a desiccant at least one week before ploughing to minimise the risk of Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus infection and reduce weed problems in the following crop. During unsettled weather and for later sowings, aim to cultivate and drill immediately behind the plough. Plough, cultivate and drill headlands after rest of the field has been sown.

**SEED RATE** — Tailor the seed rate to the crop type, time of sowing and seedbed conditions. Unnecessarily high seed rates increase costs and the risk of lodging. Under good conditions, during late September/early October, aim to sow around 11 stone of barley and 12 stone of wheat per acre. These rates should be increased when conditions are difficult.

**FERTILISER** — There is no need for autumn nitrogen. Soil analysis should be used to determine the correct rates of phosphorus and potash required and also to assess lime requirements, which is particularly important for winter barley.

**WEED CONTROL** — When sowing takes place between mid September and mid October, aim to deal with weed problems early in the autumn, either as pre-emergence or post-emergence treatment. Barley post-emergence spray timings enable more precise selection of the most cost effective spray and reduce the risk of poor results, due to rough seed beds or dry weather, when compared to the use of pre-emergence treatments.

### BEEF AND SUCKLERS

Grass quality and quantity will be declining from now on. As grass becomes less available, feed a high energy concentrate to maintain animal performance. As ground gets wet, house heavy heel cattle which will not finish for 2 to 3 months, and leave lighter cattle outside to graze off the pasture.

#### PREPARING TO HOUSE CATTLE

- Prepare buildings well in advance of cattle being housed.
- Make sure buildings are well ventilated.
- Make sure buildings are dry and initially bed cattle if possible — damp buildings and atmosphere encourage pneumonia.
- House at as low a stocking rate as possible — increasing stock density increases moisture in the atmosphere and causes more competition for feed, resulting in greater stress and increased risk of pneumonia. Tighten up after 2 to 3 weeks and cattle on slats will clean up again.
- Creep areas for suckled calves should be well ventilated, dry and well bedded. Calves should prefer to use the creep area.
- If viral pneumonia was a problem in previous years, contact your veterinary surgeon immediately about a suitable vaccinating programme.
- Clean out the water troughs.
- House cattle on a dry day. Wet cattle in a damp atmosphere, combined with housing stress, increases the risk of pneumonia.
- Clip the backs of housed cattle. They can control their body temperature more easily and may increase winter weight gain.

### DAIRYING

One of the few occasions when meal feeding at grass can be economic is with the late spring calves, in the autumn. When grass quality and quantity fall at this time, feed up to 4 kgs. per cow per day of good quality, high energy concentrate to help maintain milk yields. The achievement of a successful 10 month lactation with spring calves is highly dependent on maintaining autumn feed quality, otherwise cows very often tend to dry off too early.

**County Waterford  
ICMSA News**

This week, County Chairman, John Cusack, outlines below the new Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme (CFP).

The new CFP scheme will operate along similar lines to the previous CFP scheme. However, under the new scheme there is a greater targeting of aid towards the smaller producer with up to 60% grant aid available for certain works.

In contrast to the old scheme a single rate of grant aid is available for both pollution control works and for animal housing and fodder storage facilities. In addition, grants are available for the provision of farm roadways, water supply to fields and screening belts. Grant aid is also available for mobile equipment for slurry disposal at a standard rate of 30% subject to maximum investment of £4,000.

**COMPARISON NEW V. OLD**

1. — Disadvantaged Area/Non Disadvantaged Area — Under the old scheme the rate of grant aid was 10% higher in the disadvantaged area.

A single rate applies under the new scheme irrespective of the classification.

2. — Animal Housing v. Pollution Control Facilities — Under the old scheme, pollution control facilities qualified for a 10% higher level of grant aid than for animal housing.

A single rate applies under the new scheme.

3. — Investment Ceiling — Old Scheme: £20,000; New Scheme: £22,500 up to 80 units cattle or 32,000 gallons milk quota; £45,000 above 80 units cattle or 32,000 gallons milk quota.

4. — Off-Farm Income Limit — Old Scheme: £12,000 (89% reference income not used); New Scheme: £15,000.

5. — Additional Aid For Young Farmers — Old Scheme: additional aid of 25% for qualified young farmers; New Scheme: no additional aid.

Note: The additional aid for young farmers still available under the Farm Improvement Programme (FIP).

Where a young farmer qualifies for additional aid the rate of grant is increased by 25%. For example, where the grant rate applying is 45%, the qualifying young farmer receives a grant of 56.25%.

**LARGER FARMERS SHOULD CONSIDER FIP**

Under the new CFP scheme larger farmers qualify for a maximum grant aid of 30% and subject to a maximum investment of £45,000.

Under the FIP grant rates of up to 45% for pollution control work are available subject to a maximum investment of £45,000 per Man Work Unit (MWU) or £90,000 per farm. This makes the FIP considerably more attractive for larger farmers than the GFP. However, under the FIP a farm plan must be prepared with accounts submitted each year.

**YOUNG FARMERS SHOULD CONSIDER FIP**

The additional aid for young farmers of 25% is still available under the FIP. Therefore, where the enterprise is large, young farmers should work under the FIP. Furthermore, where the level of investment will exceed £22,500 young farmers with small enterprises should consider the FIP scheme.

**TRANSFER FROM FIP TO CFP**

Farmers who are following a farm plan under the FIP cannot now switch to complete some of the plan under the new CFP and avail of the higher 60% grant aid. If farmers do not complete the specified improvements in the farm plan they are in breach of the conditions of the scheme and sanctions could be imposed.

In any event when the CFP was introduced in 1989 farmers who were involved in FIP were given the opportunity to qualify for the higher rates of grant for pollution control work under CFP.

Where a farmer has drawn up a plan under FIP but grant aid has not yet been paid, he can cancel and transfer to new CFP. Once some grant aid has been paid for part of the plan, there is no possibility of transferring to the new CFP.

**INVESTMENT ABOVE THE CEILING**

Where the level of investment for pollution control exceeds the investment ceiling of £22,500, farmers can participate in both FIP and the CFP schemes at the same time. Investment up to the limit can be funded under the CFP with the balance funded under the FIP but at a lower rate of grant aid.

**All Out Farmer Campaign Against Sheep Scab Launch By IFA President For Autumn**

An all out farmer campaign against sheep scab in the country's 50,000 sheep flocks was urged by the President of the Irish Farmers' Association John Donnelly recently, when he launched a high profile press and advertising drive in the Mayo/Sligo Co-op Mart in Ballina, Co. Mayo, aimed at getting all sheep farmers to dip their sheep to prevent scab outbreaks this Autumn.

The IFA leader said that the high profile campaign supported by Osmond's, manufacturers of "Gold Fleece" Scab Approved Fly and Winter Dip, will involve a major poster campaign in the country's livestock marts and meat factories, a local press campaign in every county, as well as a national media drive in the main farming newspaper. In addition, he added that IFA will be actively encouraging a full Autumn round of dipping by sheep farmers through its 29 county executives and 850 branch structure throughout the country.

In support of the campaign, Mr. Morgan Lane, Sales Manager with Osmond's, said the company was pleased to be associated with the IFA in promoting this very necessary campaign. He said, "farmers must protect their flocks to protect their livelihoods. As well as being vital to control sheep scab, dipping the flock will improve the overall health status of the flock, by controlling other ectoparasites such as lice, ticks and sheep keds."

Calling on all sheep farmers to respond positively to the campaign, Mr. Donnelly said: "Dipping between now and the end of October with an effective winter dip is the only sure and effective way of preventing sheep scab."

The IFA President said that with the abolition of compulsory dipping under the PCW (Programme for Competitiveness and Work) a clear message must go out to all sheep farmers this Autumn regarding the importance of dipping their flocks to prevent scab. "Now that the old dipping scheme has been deregulated and private dipping charges have finally been abolished, it is now up to us all as sheep farmers to take proper care of our flocks and dip our sheep to prevent any scab outbreaks." Mr. Donnelly added that the IFA has succeeded in getting the unnecessary private dipping charges removed in the PCW, a move which significantly reduces the

cost of dipping.


Mr. Donnelly said that farmers may not see the immediate benefits of dipping as scab is not visible to the naked eye at an early stage. However, he added: "Farmers can be guaranteed that they will see the horrendous results of a scab outbreak in their flocks at a later stage if they do not dip." In addition the IFA President said that like any highly contagious disease

"preventing sheep scab is much cheaper than the cost of treating it."

On the safe use of sheep dips, the IFA President said that it is critically important to protect farmers health when dipping and all flock owners should read the manufacturers label carefully and accompanying literature and take all the necessary precautions including wearing the appropriate protective clothing

when dipping.

The launch was also attended by IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Mr. John Elmore and members of the National Sheep Committee as well as Mr. John McGreal and Mr. Pat Hughes, Osmond Representatives. The company is the only wholly Irish owned manufacturer of sheep dips in Ireland, with a production plant operating in Dublin since 1932.

# West Waterford Notes

## CLASHMORE TIDY TOWNS REPORT

Clashmore has been awarded with an overall total of 172 marks in the 1994 National Tidy Towns Competition an over all improvement of two marks on last year. The extra two points were awarded for Presentation of Buildings and Presentation of Natural Amenities. Once again this year the Clashmore Tidy Towns association in conjunction with the Fás scheme have done trojan work throughout the village in maintaining areas already developed and continuing work on St. Mochua's well and constructing stone walls in and around the village. Once again this year one lady stands out from all the rest, that is Mrs. O'Reilly who maintained the shrub areas and the tubs in the village. A big thank you to her for all the voluntary hours you gave Clashmore.

The following is the 1994 progress report for Clashmore:-

**EFFORT: 34 Marks** — Clashmore is a town of great architectural assets with its old distillery chimney and the unique St. Mochua's Well. Therefore, the sadly derelict areas of "the Maltworms" and the houses by the restored archway are all the more unfortunate in comparison, particularly in view of their prominent locations.

**TIDINESS: 32 Marks** — The village was generally litterfree although some isolated papers were to be seen by St. Mochu's Well where some unsightly oil-barrels were acting as a barricade to the neighbouring field. The forecourt and yard to Waterford Co-Op were quite neat but a solid gate to screen the latter would be an improvement. The bridge as a main approach to the village would benefit from a fresh coat of paint. The traditional old phone box is a great asset as most have been replaced by their less attractive modern counterparts, therefore, it should be painted and its broken glass panels replaced.

**PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS: 35 Marks** — The public buildings of the village looked well although such attention to detail as weeding the base of the church boundary wall, painting its neighbouring green pole and gates, is necessary. Similarly the boundary walls to the hall and school needed a fresh coat of paint. The post office looked very fresh. Kennedy's is a fine traditional shopfront, which looked particularly attractive with its display of geraniums in the window - it will require a fresh coat of paint before next year's competition.

**PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES: 29 Marks** — The standard in this category was high. The grotto looked well, although the broken glass to the lamp on the left hand side needs replacing. The seating area beside the stream and the landscaping

opposite were particularly attractive. The G.A.A. grounds with their landscaping and stone wall looked well although some weeding is required to the gravel forecourt and the pile of gravel should be removed. St. Muchua's Well should be a great asset to the village when completed.

**APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS: 26 Marks** — The approach roads need some attention to details such as washing of the roadsides outside the village centre and trimming of grass verges. The Dungarvan Road had nettles growing on the left hand side, while the neglected property to the right hand side looked very untidy. The approach to the school and that to St. Muchua's Well were very overgrown. The Youghal Road was very neat but the neglected house and grounds to the right beside the B & B created a bad impression.

**PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS: 16 Marks** — The houses of the village looked generally good, the housing estate with its beautifully landscaped area in front was particularly admired although some of the boundary walls would benefit from a fresh coat of paint. The thatched cottage opposite the grotto was very simply presented but should be white-washed for next year. The house with arched windows to the village side of the school looked very fresh. The very neglected houses beside the archway are very unsightly. This area of the village is very significant as it is the pivotal point between the main street and the church and its environs. You should concentrate on the improvement of your derelict areas for next year.





St. Olivers regained the lead after 21 minutes when Eleanor O'Brien sent a great ball into Triona Tobin who hammered it home. Helen Scanlon took advantage of a Dunhill clearance

to kick over the bar and Emma Barrett pointed a 13m free.

The scores just kept on coming. Margaret Ronayne sent a 45 soaring into the square, it met Triona Tobin and she met a foul tackle — another penalty. Triona took it herself and sent it over the bar — five points the difference now. Dunhill squeezed in a near-post goal to keep them firmly in touch, and might have had another, but for clearances from Eleanor Osborne, Cathy O'Mahony and Valerie Carlton. St. Olivers had the edge at half time and led by 2-7 to 3-2.

St. Olivers lost the lead when Dunhill drew level after 35 minutes, lost a goal through a penalty after 38 minutes, and at the



# SPORTS HALL ATHLETICS

Sports hall Athletics was created and developed in 1976 by George Bunner of Frodsham who received support and guidance from the late Ron Pickering and it has quickly spread from its origins in the North West of England to establish itself in all parts of Britain and is now beginning to reach other countries.

It offers an opportunity for young people to take part in a form of indoor track and field athletics during the winter months away from the vagaries of our weather. Large numbers can be involved in a single fast moving meeting full of lively activities, all taking place within the confined space of a sports hall. Sports Hall Athletics is now recognised as playing an important role in the development of Bord Luthchleas na hEireann and the promotion of athletics in Ireland.

This new venture in Irish athletics is designed to reverse the recent trend of declining juvenile participation in sport. The idea is to put on a competition which will attract thousands of young children nationwide into athletics and thereby broaden the base of the pyramid. It will also stimulate self confidence and help to build team spirit among children.

The children will be encouraged to compete against on another in an atmosphere of fun and enjoyment for their team. Consequently, it will be a competition based on team involvement and not on individual performance. Children are by their nature competitive. They like excitement and challenges. They will be provided with team games full of fun which will teach them the value of loyalty and team pride. Truly, in the Olympic spirit, it will be taking part and not winning which will be of paramount importance.

There will be no individual champions, only the team will go forward to the next round

There will be two competitions based on the following:

Under-11 — Fun in Athletics designed to emphasise the ideal that the important thing is not the winning, but taking part.

Under-13 — A team competition requiring a team member to do more for their team than just their favourite event.

### EVENTS

For boys and girls 11 years of age on January 1, 1994 and at least 9 on the day of competition.

Over and Under Relay (4 girls, 4 boys); 1 lap and 1 lap race pairs (2 girls, 2 boys); 1 lap and 2 lap pairs race (2 girls, 2 boys); 2 lap and 2 lap pairs race (2 girls, 2 boys); 6 lap parlaaf (two members of same team sharing the distance (2 girls, 2 boys); 4x1 lap relay (4 girls, 4 boys).

N.B. — 1 lap = 2 lengths of the hall. Non-scoring: 1 lap and 1 lap race will be held in order that every child will get a run.

Field events — Sitting throw (2 girls, 2 boys); Standing long jump (2 girls, 2 boys); vertical triple jump (2 girls, 2 boys); standing triple jump (2 girls, 2 boys); javelin throw (2 girls, 2 boys); speed bounce (2 girls, 2 boys).

The competition requires a team member to do more for their team than just

their favourite event.

For boys and girls under 13 years of age on January 1, 1994:

Over and Under relay (4 girls, 4 boys); 2 lap race (2 girls, 2 boys); 4 lap race (2 girls, 2 boys); 6 lap race (2 girls, 2 boys); standing long jump (2 girls, 2 boys); Standing triple jump (2 girls, 2 boys); vertical jump (2 girls, 2 boys); shot putt (2 girls, 2 boys); speed bounce (2 girls, 2 boys); javelin throw (2 girls, 2 boys); 8 lap parlaaf relay (2 girls, 2 boys); 4x2 lap relay (4 girls, 4 boys).

Non-scoring — A special non-scoring relay should be held to ensure that each child should get a run.



## Hurling Semi Final Charges "Outrageous"

A chara,

The decision of the G.A.A. to stage the county hurling semi finals on different days and charge a £4 entry fee for each was outrageous. It was particularly harsh on regular hurling followers who attended both games (and who, in most cases, have already contributed generously to the Deise Development Draw). In return for these hefty charges, for both games supporters did not even get a team sheet (never mind a programme), nor were the teams announced over the public address system, which wasn't used at all on either occasion. Along with the absence of a band, it meant that both matches were devoid of any sense of occasion. The teams duly responded to this situation by producing two of the most lack lustre games ever seen at this level of the competition.

To make the matters worse, the game in Dungarvan virtually finished in darkness, despite the referee starting it ten minutes early. While this was essential to get it finished at all, it did not go down well with those who arrived just in time for the advertised throw-in time. Nor can the appalling weather be blamed entirely; the Waterford v. Tipperary challenge game the previous evening was played in perfect conditions and still ended in semi-darkness. It was simply the height of folly to have such an important fixture starting in the evening in mid-September.

While the new developments at the Fraher Field mark a wonderful (and long overdue) improvement to spectator facilities, there are still some significant faults which need attending to. The public address system (when used) is virtually inaudible, while the taped version of the "national anthem" which I have heard on

two occasions consists in fact of the first verse of the "Soldier's Song", which is not even part of the official national anthem.

The flip-up seats in the centre of the stand are packed too closely together, while the wooden seats in front of them are also too tightly spaced: I had to watch a match there recently sitting "side-saddle", which is not good for the neck muscles. No provision for filming matches seems to have been made in the design of the stand. During the Munster womens football final, thirty of the best seats in the middle of the stand were put out of commission by two video cameras which were placed right in front of them.

When are we going to get proper lettering for the much-vaunted electronic scoreboard? For the recent Lismore/Clonea quarter final, the words "Lios Mor" (in Irish) appeared in tiny, virtually illegible letters, while "Clonea" (in English) appeared in huge letters, except the "n" in the middle was missing. The effectiveness of the nets behind the goals is greatly reduced by the fact that both sag in the middle, right where they are most needed. During the Lismore/Clonea match, quite a number of balls were driven through this sag.

Perhaps the County Board might use the money squeezed out of the supporters last Sunday to employ a public relations consultant and buy a couple of extra poles to hold up the nets.



# Co. Board Meeting

Eamon O Murchu, Chairman, presided at last week's monthly meeting of the County Board held in Dungarvan.

Arising out of the minutes, Christy O'Brien, Lismore, enquired about the County Board decision to notify all clubs re the 1993 banquet report. He said the Board undertook to notify all clubs in the county that all tickets and payments had been satisfactorily accounted for and he wanted to know why this had not been done. The Chairman said that he had not yet seen the final report.

## CORRESPONDENCE

A letter from the Colligan club, requested permission to run a 'golden goal' lottery on the National Hurling League match involving Waterford and Wexford. This was approved.

County Board na nOg sought permission to sell the programme for the county hurling final. The Chairman stated the permission had already been given to the Fraher Field committee to produce programmes for

both county senior finals. Nioclás MacCraith stated that if one of the finals was not being played at Fraher Field, the committee would waive their right to that one in favour of Bord na nOg.

A letter from P. S. O Riain, Chairman Western Board, informed the meeting that the interview board which had interviewed candidates for the post of urban development officer for Waterford City and Tramore, were recommending the name of Joe Carton, De La Salle club for the post. After the recommendation had been unanimously adopted, Jimmy O'Gorman, Munster Council delegate, spoke about Rev. Bro. Griffey's tremendous input into the submissions to Croke Park to have such an appointment made. He also referred to the splendid work done by Bro. Griffey for the games at all levels for the county since he came here many years ago. He said it was a great loss to this county to have Bro. Griffey leaving, but that we could look forward to his return in about

a year. John Kiely, Chairman County Bord na nOg also paid tribute to Bro. Griffey and spoke about his huge input into G.A.A. affairs at youth level since he came to Mount Sion 14 years ago. He will be sadly missed, he said, but everyone looked forward to his return.

## COUNTY SELECTORS

The minor hurling county selectors as recommended by Bord na nOg were approved (published here last week).

Tommy Hennessey pointed out that Coisde na Peil were required to have the names of the minor football selectors before this meeting. An undertaking was given that the recommendations would be before the October meeting.

The junior football selectors will not be chosen until Central Council gives a ruling as to whether or not counties will be permitted to field their second best teams.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

There were reports from all the selection committees which are already in place and both the senior committees told of their preparations for the upcoming National Leagues. On the matter of the employment of a masseur, the Chairman stated that the matter of the appointment would have to be further considered by Coisde Gnótha. The idea of the appointment of one masseur for all county teams was being considered by Coisde Gnótha. He spoke about the huge cost involved over a year. Phil Fanning pointed out that it might not be possible for one man to service both the senior teams.

## FRAHER FIELD REPORT

Serious concern was again expressed about the uncontrolled movement of young children around the stand at the grounds and it was among other things, decided to advise parents and guardians about their responsibilities in this regard. It was also decided that the V.I.P. section could be railed-off and opened only when required. The matter of ensuring that team substitutes and officials would use the dugouts provided was discussed also.

## FINANCE

Treasurer James Walsh gave an update on the financial situation of the Board and said that gate receipts were improving. Gate returns for recent fixtures were given and some delegates complained about the admission charges being too high for the semi-finals. The Chairman stated that when the admission charges in our neighbouring counties were noted, our charges were not abnormal.

## DISCIPLINARY REPORT

The recommendation of the county disciplinary committee in regard to the Ballydurn/Ballysaggart intermediate hurling championship game played some months ago, was unanimously adopted. Two players were suspended and the Ballysaggart club will be written to.

A big number of players were suspended for the minimum period of 2 weeks arising out of referees' reports covering the last two months.

## MOTION DEFERRED

A motion standing in the names of Nioclás MacCraith and Denis McGrath, which County Board to agree on an interpretation of Rule 56(b). O.G. that would give county convention the right to decide on the format, etc. of the championships and the same to the Divisional Boards when the responsibility was delegated to them.

Nioclás MacCraith moved the motion and outlined the reasons why it should be adopted. Denis McGrath also spoke in favour. S. O'Brien opposed the motion on the grounds that such an interpretation would be contrary to general rule. After the debate had continued for some time, a few delegates requested that the matter be deferred until the next meeting in order that members would have an opportunity of studying the implications. This was agreed.

The attendance at the meeting was the lowest for the year and almost half the clubs were not represented.

The October meeting of the Board will take place at the Regional Technical College in Waterford on October 3.

Hurling — Our champions will play the Cork champions at a Cork venue on October 16.

*Lawlors Hotel Senior Hurling Final Between Mount Sion And Passage The Highlight Of Light Week-End Programme*

# Passage Get The Vote In Close Encounter

**S.F. And I.H. Games Also Listed For Decision**

With a record number of 28 county senior hurling championships won in their 62nd year of their existence, Mount Sion — the most famous name in Waterford gaeldom, will be fancied to take their 29th when they line out against the challengers, Passage, who have yet to have their name inscribed on the News and Star Cup.

This will be the 92nd playing of the Waterford senior hurling championship final and including their first victory in 1938, Mount Sion have participated in 38 of these and lost ten. Coincidentally, it was way back in 1938 that Passage too, won their very first hurling title, but this was in the junior grade, but the club subsequently went out of existence because many of their members were seafarers and the club could not keep going despite many great efforts by some wonderful people who were with them during that era.

Reformed in the early sixties it came back into existence as Suir Rovers but this name was scrapped and the club renamed Passage hurling club.

Having contested the intermediate hurling finals of 1976, 1985 and 1986, Passage eventually won the title when beating Fourmilewater in 1988. In senior ranks the club made rapid progress and reached the semi-final in '98 when beaten by Ballyduff and 1992 when defeated by Mount Sion in a replay. Last year they played in their first ever senior hurling final when losing to Lismore by a single point on a rain-soaked pitch. Now on real merit they are back again and with the best credentials of any team in the championship and are reasonably confident to taking the title. In two years they have lost only twice in their sixteen matches and what more evidence is needed in exposing the strength of the challengers.

This county final will be the 58th match of the longest running championship in our history and while much of the fare was forgettable stuff, we did have a few matches that gave a lift to the competition. In the early part of the middle period of the championship there were disruptions of many kinds due to cancellations and postponements and this probably had an unsettling effect on players and clubs and as a result the normal enthusiasm waned and motivation of players was difficult as a result.

That is now all behind us and in most of the matches leading up to the final the standards were very satisfactory and we did have some splendid contests, which clearly demonstrated that our club hurling standards can be as good as the best. It can also be confirmed that both Passage and Mount Sion featured in the best of the matches that have been played in the past five or six weeks, so with the sides expected to be in sparkling form here at Walsh Park on Sunday, we can look forward to a thriller.

## WALSH PARK

Several weeks ago I wrote about the possibility of the county hurling final being played at Walsh Park rather than in Fraher Field this year, because of the way in which the championship was moving. This is now going to happen because both Mount Sion and Passage, being from the same division have the privilege under bye-law, to opt for a venue in their own division, even in a year in which under the rotation system, it was due to be played at a venue in the other division. There have been discussions and negotiations at top level in the county on this issue. The fact that Walsh Park has had its stand demolished and work is being done on the embankments, allied to the fact that Fraher Field is now ideally suited to cater for the final, were considerations which prompted the discussions, etc. On Saturday afternoon following a meeting of the officers in Walsh Park and after confirmation had been given of the fact that the Walsh Park Committee were satisfied about the venue, it was decided to acknowledge the rights of the two clubs in the matter and play the game there. In recent times, both Dunhill and Ballygunner forced Mount Sion to come to Dungarvan when the circumstances were the same, and in both cases it paid off for the 'Gunners and Dunhill who won their respective titles.

It is unlikely that the venue

will effect the attendance and supporters of the game from this end of the county will travel in big numbers to see the final which is always looked upon as a special occasion and something to be remembered.

## THE CHALLENGERS?

As neither side are holders of the title, neither should be described as the challengers, but because of Mount Sion's glorious record, as compared with that of their opponents, the public generally, will see and regard Passage as the challengers and underdogs in this encounter.

Others will find it difficult to understand the logic of making underdogs of a team who have already this year defeated Mount Sion, Roanmore, Ballygunner and Lismore who between them have won all the county senior hurling titles since Passage graduated from intermediate ranks in 1988. Maybe the logic of such an analysis would make Passage favourites and maybe that is the way they see themselves and I know that that is the way Mount Sion will want to see Passage seeing themselves.

Anyway those who pursue the recent records and achievements of both will satisfy themselves that there is precious little between them. Their respective paths to the final, which is published hereunder, show how close the teams are and it will all depend on how each team performs on the day. A puck of the ball can decide the destiny of the 1994 county title.

## CONSISTENT PASSAGE!

Whether it was by design or otherwise, the Passage selectors have shown great consistency on placing their teams this year in all their games as all the way they have shown little change from their county final line-out last year. Even in the semi final against their conquerors of '93, Lismore, they played their men (all 14 of them) in practically the same positions which they occupied last year. The only newcomer to the team R. Corcoran was played at left half back.

Their line out for the final on Sunday is likely to show regular goalie Ray Barry, who will be remembered for his brilliance on our 1992 under-21 team. In the back line, Edward Quann, holder of underage county and in-

termediate medals, Eamon Cullinane, county player, Seamus Keating also a member of the 1992 under-21 squad and in the half line of defence there will be James Connors, also on the '92 under-21 panel, Sean Cullinane, county players and winners of many underage titles in both hurling and football and Pat Connors or R. Corcoran who played in the position against Lismore. Pat Connors is a very talented player and won a Dean Ryan Cup medal with De La Salle. Paul Connors, another member of the famous Passage hurling family with splendid credentials and Paul Fitzgerald, who is a great county prospect will be in the middle of the field and up front the Passage East hopefuls will have Barry Walsh, county minor and under-21 player and who incidentally is grandson of the legendary 'Doyle' Walsh who played on the 1938 team which were defeated in the All Ireland final.

Martin Murphy has collected medals in many grades and the player holds one for his efforts with Limerick University, played in all grades up to junior with the county. John Carey a prominent member of the 1988 intermediate winning team, Anthony Fitzgerald, undisputed holder of the greatest number of underage championship medals on the team and played on both hurling and football under 21 teams in the past two years. Noel Connors, the veteran of the team, who captained Passage last year and has worn the county jersey with distinction, will probably line out beside his 30 year old colleague, Mossy O'Keeffe who was among the top scorers in last year's hurling championship.

Passage have a good back-up group of players which include Vincent Barry, Eddie Fitzgerald, Jerome O'Shea, Owen Lynch, Dessie Hutchinson, Michael Murphy, Edward Gough, and others who can fit in very well if called upon.

## MOUNT SION

More than half of their line out can boast of already having won county senior hurling championship medals and those who have yet to achieve their ambition in this regard are holders of medals in the under-21, minor and other grades. They are probably the most medal-laden club of the championships in the coun-

ty. Very few of their players have not worn the county jersey at some level and several have won colleges championship medals also.

Philly Flynn has county final experience before and is a sound keeper. He will probably be fronted by Ger Fitzpatrick who is holder of 2 senior hurling medals and has played in many parts of the field. Pat Ryan at full back holds 4 county championship medals and is one of the more experienced defenders playing club hurling. B. Flannery, a comparative newcomer to the side, is highly rated as a defender and will complete their full line behind R. McGrath, Tony Browne whose outstanding displays for the county under 21 and senior teams over the past couple of years has won him a very high rating as a top class player inside and outside the county. His brother Tommy, who is also highly rated by the club, will complete their defence. Gary Gater another of the county's hurling prospects will be partnered by P. Walsh another improving prospect, at centre field.

In attack the county championship record holders will have an array of talent to choose from. Paraic Fanning, holder of a senior hurling county medal and won colleges titles with W.R.T.C. David Power, county medal holder in senior and underage grades. Feile medal holder, Brian Greene, regular county player, was an outstanding player in the county jersey on numerous occasions. John Meaney whose recent scoring feats was a big factor in winning the All Ireland Sevens for the club and is one of the leading scorers at club level this year. Barry Browne, T. Butler, B. Coughlan, Kevin Ryan, S. Cleere, etc. are among the other players who will be considered for inclusion in the Sion attack.

## THE RESULT?

I believe that the question marks will remain until the last ball is pucked. If the form book holds true, it could even end in an unwanted draw. If there is to be a decision coming at the end of a tremendously close contest, I'll give my opinion in favour of Passage, despite the record and glorious tradition of Mount Sion. I think that the team from the fishing village are now at their peak and that they are just about good enough to take the title at their second attempt.

## REFEREE

John M. Kelly, Shamrocks, who had handled games in all grades and in both codes (including the series of county football final games between Dungarvan and Rathgormack), will referee his first county senior hurling final on Sunday and I have no doubt but that the experienced Shamrocks official will do a first class job on the game.

## MOUNT SION CONGRATULATED

At last week's meeting of the County Board, Eastern Board Chairman, Frankie Cullinane, proposed that the meeting send their congratulations to the Mount Sion club, on their splendid achievement in winning the prestigious All Ireland Sevens last month. In the previous year, Ballygunner were the winners of the competition and to have the county retain the title gave a boost to our hurling reputation. Needless to mention, there was unanimous approval of the proposition.

## SO CLOSE

In their nine matches in the championship to date, Mount Sion have averaged 2-15 per game and have had an average of 1-12 scored against them all the way. Passage, also in their eight games have averaged 2-15 per match and their tally against is 1-11. On these scores there is nothing at all between them.

In 1992 before Mount Sion qualified to meet Ballygunner in the county final, they had to overcome Passage by just a single score to get through. In 1993 the teams also met in the county semi-final and that one ended in a draw. In a thrilling replay, Passage got through to the county final by a single point (they lost the final, also by a single point).

This year when they clashed in the league section of the championship only a single score separated the teams at the finish of another close game.

There have been three drawn county finals in the past decade and Mount Sion have featured in two of these.

ing in New York, Jack Mulcahy completed an arduous degree course in accountancy.

The hard work paid off and once he joined Quigley, his rise was rapid.

## "NOBODY EVER DID MORE FOR DUNGARVAN"

Jack soon became President and chief executive of Quigley which was later bought by Pfizer, another American company.

Returning to his native homeland in the 1960's were he set up Quigley plants in Dungarvan, Cork and Bennetsbridge. Speaking of the Irish-American industrialist, Deputy Austin

Deasy, T.D., said "nobody ever did more for Dungarvan".

"It was never fully appreciated what John A. Mulcahy did for Dungarvan", said Deputy Deasy, "before he founded the Ballinacourty Quigley plant, the town was depressed and lacking in industry".

The new factory, however, was a heavy industry employing over 120 workers and hundreds more indirectly in the services industry such as Radleys Engineering and C.I.E. Railway Service to Waterford etc. "The Quigley plant was the biggest money spinner this town has ever seen", continued Deputy Deasy, "it was a Godsend to Dungarvan". One of his major successes

was Pfizer, which now had a plant employing hundreds in Ringaskiddy. In the course of his glittering career, Jack made the company an important worldwide facility servicing the steel industry.

He was also responsible for a number of patented inventions which prolonged the life and extended the operations of smelting furnaces.

In honour of his valuable input into local employment, Jack Mulcahy was formally presented with the solid gold chain of office by the Urban Council in the early '70's.

So overwhelmed was he by this gesture that the local man kept the chain and, in return, presented the Council with a gold plated solid silver chain of office that the U.D.C. Chairman wears today.

## WATERVILLE - HIS GREAT LOVE

Local golfers will also remember Jack Mulcahy for his construction of a world-drinking championship golf course at Waterville which complimented the million pound Waterville Lake Hotel at the Ring of Kerry. It was to this scenic abode that he returned on his many visits to his native country and it was in Waterville that he played host to eminent people from the political world, the arts, commerce, business and sport.

Jack would often say that he wanted to make Waterville "a paradise with the best golfing facilities in the world; the best hotel and the best fishing".

Another of his pet projects was the famous Ashford Castle which he built up into one of the most prestigious hotels in the world.

Always concerned with the affairs of his hometown and county, Jack also helped greatly in the purchase of the Fraher Field by the Waterford County G.A.A. Board in recogni-

tion of his generous £10,000 donation, one of the new constructed stands is named in his honour - Port O Maolcathaigh.

## A TRUE DIPLOMAT

Throughout his long and fruitful lifetime Jack Mulcahy was the recipient of many awards including an honorary doctorate for the N.U.I. but what gave him the greatest satisfaction was the response he got from people, and the rapport he established with everybody without exception.

A true diplomat in every sense of the word, he was responsible for the introduction of many wealthy influential businessmen to Ireland. His one abiding aim was to promote his country, especially in the U.S. and he spent a considerable amount of his private resources to further this objective.

He invested significantly in Irish business ventures as well as encouraging major American multinationals to set up plants here, such as Pfizer.

His interests in fishery conservation was also all-consuming and he expended time and effort in promoting its cause in Ireland and throughout the world.

A man of many interests, he took great pride in the livestock and bloodstock industries. His colours of green, white and gold were carried with great distinction in the racecourses of Europe.

Through his business and political connections, Jack Mulcahy was an internationally known figure and, for a number of years, had direct access to the Oval Office in the White House.

His story is remarkable tale of local man making the bigtime in New York but Dungarvan was never far from his thoughts.

Counted among his wide circle of friends were various U.S. Presidents including Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford.

He was recognised as the best ambassador Ireland had and, though it was unofficial, he played his role like a true diplomat. In fact, he declined an invitation from the U.S. Administration of President Nixon to become American Ambassador to Ireland. Jack Mulcahy will remain in the thoughts of Dungarvan people in gratitude for all he has done for the town and indeed for his country.

He is survived by his wife, Naoimi (New York); his sons, Kevin, general manager, Fota Island Golf Complex, and Jack, Dean of Bridgeport University Conn, U.S.A.; brother Jim Mulcahy, Dublin; sisters Miss Angela Mulcahy, Dublin, Mrs. Sheila O'Donoghue, Dublin and Mrs. Moira Sheehan, Cork; grandchildren, Siobhain, Fiona, Aisling, Colleen, Tara and Sean.
