Rural Crime On Increase

In light of spiralling criminal activity in rural county areas, as seen in recent times, Waterford County Council is to call on the Minister for Justice Maire Geoghegan-Quinn to deploy additional Garda recruits to stations in rural communities where an insufficient Garda force exists.

500 EXTRA NEEDED

Voicing his concern over a recent spate of crime in the Tallow, Knockanore areas, Cllr. Willie McDonnell declared at last Monday's County Council meeting that there was not enough Garda in any area "to curb the increase in crime." "500 extra Gardai should be put into training," he added, "on the beat, in the street."

Cllr. McDonnell stressed

he had no qualms with the Garda Siochana and believed they were doing a

top class job.

Due to what he described, however, as the shortage in

Garda numbers, the Fine Gael Councillor proposed to call on the Justice Minister to ensure that "extra recruits be trained as Gardai to curb the crime situation in West Waterford." "It's pretty

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Clam Saga Gains Impetus

The stand off between objectors and members of the Dungarvan Clam Growers Association over proposals to establish a controversial clam growing industry at North Shore, Dungarvan is now reaching a critical crossroads following last Monday's proposal by Waterford Co. Council members to obtain a detailed report from County Manager Donal Connolly regarding progress to date and his own reasons for opposing the development proposals.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting, Mr. Connolly said he had met with representatives of the Clam Growers last month, and had conveyed his concern that the specific area identified in the group's proposals could interfere with existing job creation facilities in the harbour.

An application for a shellfish cultivation licence is currently before the Department of the Marine but the clam growers are currently facing opposition from a number of parties including Bord Fáilte and the Office of Public Works.

According to the Co. Manager what is needed in this situation is a Coastal Management Study which would identify various uses the coast can have which would be suitable to everybody.

GENERAL SUPPORT

The general feeling among Council members was one of support however for the clam growers proposal.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham said he had visited the site

on Friday and had encountered 'no problem' with regard to tourist amenities and beach facilities.

With 1,150 people currently unemployed in Dungarvan, Cllr. Cunningham said the proposed harbour development deserved a fair crack of the whip.

"The Manager should designate a suitable area for the growing of clams and come to an agreement," he further suggested, adding that he supported the venture 100%.

JOB CREATION BENEFITS

Strongly supporting the proposals of the Dungarvan Clam Growers Association, Cllr. Tony Wright stated that as a country with nearly 300,000 unemployed, "we should be putting a huge emphasis on developing our own natural resources such as the land, forests and sea."

Cllr. Wright went on to welcome the new timber processing plant in Waterford, which he felt was a successful example of job creation using available re-

Joyous Day Of Celebration In Dungarvan

A chance meeting between Dungarvan man, Fred Forsey and a 39 year old Dubliner, who was miraculously cured of multiple sclerosis on the final day of his pilgrimage to Lourdes five years ago, has set the scene for what promises to be a joyous day of celebration of "The Year Of The Family" at St. Mary's Parish Church next Sunday afternoon.

Peadar Clarke, a Dublin taxi driver, was struck down with multiple sclerosis and suddenly his whole life was shattered. He had to quit his work; months of hospitalisation followed, but his condition progressively worsened. Then in May 1989, friends organised a trip to Lourdes for him, and it was on the final day of that pilgrimage that Peadar was miraculously cured.

Today, he no longer has use for his wheelchair, and his marriage has been blessed with two lovely children. His entire life has changed for the better, and he works with the Carmelite Travel Club in Dublin which organises pilgrimages to Lourdes on a regular basis.

Last August a group from Dungarvan and Abbeyside were visiting Lourdes when that chance meeting between Fred Forsey and Peadar Clarke took place. Fred extended an invitation to the Dubliner to visit Dungarvan for a religious function honouring the "Year Of The Family", and it was an invitation Peadar readily accepted.

Virtually there and then, the organising of next Sunday's great occasion at St. Mary's Parish Church was underway.

The first essential was the setting up of a committee — a task made easy by the willingness of so many people to come forward. They included Dungarvan parish priest Canon Gregory Power, Abbeyside parish priest Fr. Richard Doherty, Fr. Pierce Ahearne C.C., Fr. Jim Kiely P.P. of Ring, Fr. Michael Kennedy C.C., Geraldine Kiely, Donal Kelleher, Máire Burke, Marie Kiely, Michael Drummy, Marie Kiersey and of course Fred Forsey.

METICULOUS PREPARATION

In the intervening weeks a lot of meticulous preparation has been undertaken. The idea is to make Sun-

day's celebration of "The Family" more of a festival embodying every facet of family life and every component that goes into the making of a family.

While the undoubted highlight of the afternoon will be the address by Peadar Clarke who will detail the story of his miraculous cure in Lourdes to an expected packed congregation, it will be an afternoon of many and varied highlights.

The proceedings begin at 2.30 with David Power on uilleann pipes, and friends. At 2.45 the Abbeyside Youth Choir will perform, followed at 3 p.m. by the recitation of the Rosary.

The Friary Folk Choir will sing at 3.15 and the eagerly awaited address of Peadar Clarke is timed for 3.30.

To bring to a fitting end what promises to be a memorable occasion of music, prayer and celebration, Fr. Pierce Ahearne will celebrate benediction. Master of Ceremonies throughout will be Fr. Michael Kennedy, while the organist will be Claire Maher.

To those intending to be a part of next Sunday's uplifting occasion, our advice is to be in St. Mary's well before the 2.30 starting time.

Successful Garda Operation

MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH IN CRIME INVESTIGATIONS

In a carefully planned operation, Gardai from Dungarvan and West Waterford, backed up by members of the Cork Regional Crime Task Force, swooped on a number of houses in Cork City in the early hours of yesterday morning.

One man was taken into custody for questioning, and Gardai believe they have now made a major breakthrough in their investigations into a whole series of crimes committed throughout a wide area of

West Waterford, including Dungarvan, Tallow, Lismore and Ballymacarbray, over a four-month period.

These included the unauthorised taking of cars, break-ins and burglaries at the Southways and

Pinewood housing estates in Abbeyside, raids on Dungarvan golf clubs and as many as five licensed premises, a break-in at the Carmelite Convent in Tallow, and other robberies and attempted robberies in Ballymacarbray and other parts of the region.

In all the Garda investigations, which have been painstakingly ongoing, could result in the solving

of up to twenty five crimes.

In the early hours of last Thursday morning, a Garda Checkpoint near Dungarvan also resulted in the questioning of four men from Cork City, and Gardai now believe that will also prove significant in what they are confident will be the smashing of a major criminal network.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" last night, Supt. Ray McAndrew of Dungarvan confirmed that "substantial progress" has been made in their investigations into the crime spree of recent months in the West Waterford region.

"Over the past number of weeks there have been painstaking garda investigations taking place in counties Waterford and Cork into the criminal activities in the West Waterford region," Supt. McAndrew said.

"We have also increased the number of checkpoints which have proved to be of considerable benefit in our investigations."

He said that while the mounting of these checkpoints may have discommoded law abiding members of the public from time to time they have proved "most beneficial" in monitoring and controlling criminal activities.

"We appreciate also the apprehension being felt by elderly people living alone in isolated rural areas, but they can be assured that we will do everything within our power to protect them," Supt. McAndrew said.

News of the expected major breakthrough in the garda investigations come in the wake of the considerable concern voiced at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council about the increasing incidences of crime in the Western end of the county.

That meeting called for the deployment of additional gardai in the region, together with amending legislation that will not be weighted in favour of convicted criminals.

sources. The proposals for a clam growing venture in Dungarvan harbour would "create jobs for local people, both in sea and on shore."

Continuing he said that the proposal "will not infringe on the rights of any other interests or groups . . . will be warmly welcomed in the region . . . and is worthy of the support of all job creation agencies."

The Dungarvan Councillor further stated that the members of the association are only too keen to meet, explain and alleviate the fears of residents and interested parties alike.

With regard to previous objections from Bord Failte and the O.P.W., Cllr. Wright said it seemed extraordinary to him that the local O.P.W. Officer, "who works on the front line, and who walked the entire area, has no reservations whatsoever." He also stated that the chairperson of Dungarvan Tourism also "fully supports the proposals and job creation."

Pointing to those who support the proposal, Cllr. Wright said the Council must take into account the views of B.I.M.; the large number of local people who signed a petition supporting the development; the views of those striving to create a job for themselves and their families; the views of those seeking employment on their own doorstep in the service industry who "will undoubtedly benefit" as a result of jobs created in the harbour. He

disclosed that the developers are seeking to use just 55 acres out of a total area of 1,800 acres.

Concluding his speech, Cllr. Wright repeated he had no reservations in supporting the proposals and called on the Council members "to do everything in their power to assist the project."

Agreeing with Cllr. Wright, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said the Clam Growers Association should be complimented and supported on their job creation initiative "right on our doorstep."

IMPRESSIVE STATISTICS

Also lending his support to the clam venture, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain informed members that a 300 acres clam growing development would result in £31/2m annual turnover with 80% being spent locally, thereby directly creating 50 jobs in the locality.

"Our school leavers are looking to join the dole queues," declared Cllr. O Riain, adding that the development was a reasonable request which could well bear fruit.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell echoed the sentiments of his colleagues, stating he would like to seek more co-operation between Waterford Co. Council and the Dungarvan Clam Growers Association.

"PIG IN THE BAG"

Faced with two extreme view points Cllr. Gary O'Halloran said the Council was being asked to buy a 'pig in

the bag'.

Councillors required more detailed information on pollution and job creation, etc., before a decision could be reached.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also expressed the need for more information. "It would be beneficial for all Councillors to get more detail as to what the Co. Manager has in mind," he stated, "an identification of the area involved and maybe the adoption of a pilot scheme on an agreed phased basis to the Council and the Manager's satisfaction."

The Labour Councillor again stressed the importance of job creation even if a total of 10 jobs were to be set up.

BEST COURSE OF ACTION

Responding to the various members reactions, Mr. Connolly said it was his duty to advise the Council on the best course of action. "I have to be sure that the proposed development will not interfere with existing job creating facilities", he urged. Mr. Connolly further stated that he was not opposed to making jobs as long as he was satisfied with the development.

It was unanimously agreed that the Manager prepare an up to date and detailed report on the proposal, expanding his reasoning for his opposition, the suggestion of a pilot scheme, which he will return to the Council at the next monthly meeting.

Choosing the right site for a good show of roses

ROSES are a perennial favourite with the Irish gardener and preparation starts in October for planting next month. Of course, you can plant container-grown roses all year round and even barerooted stock could go in from now until next March, but many of us prefer to prepare now for November planting. This is good insurance that your roses will establish well and be stronger and healthier to resist the admittedly, large army of pests and infections that can afflict our national favourites.

IMPORTANT

The soil now should still be warm, slightly moist and crumbly for easy digging, all allowing the roots of the new roses to plunge deep into the ground to become well-established before the worst of the winter. Choosing the right site is important. Roses prefer an open position with a good flow of air unless you have chosen a climbing variety, which will obviously require a wall site or some kind of trellis.

Plan to space out the shrubs, allowing the 18-30 inches between each one depending on how vigorous the variety is — most garden centres or growers give this information but there are plenty of books available too. This should guide you for a layout making the most of the colours, size of blooms and shape of the varieties. On a practical note, remember that you also need room for pruning, dead heading blooms, weeding and hoeing. Having decided on the area to plant then dig it over thoroughly, working in well-rotted organic fertiliser such as that from the bottom of the garden compost heap or the farmyard.

It needs to be worked down deep to nourish the roots during the crucial period of establishing the new planting. This is especially important in clay soils or low-lying areas of the garden where waterlogging is a problem. Serious drainage problems can be further eased with applications of lime or gypsum but this needs care as roses dislike alkaline soils as much as soggy ones.

RELEVANT

Much of the above is still relevant if you already have roses because it is not generally realised that soil used to grow roses for seven years or more promotes 'rose sickness.'

When the roses grow spindly, the plants are often thought to be a fault and replaced, but it is the site that should be changed and the stock saved by a move elsewhere.

Alternatively, you can retain an existing site by swapping 15 inches of top-soil with some from a rose free part of the garden. The roses should then thrive as before while the 'rose soil' should be fine for other uses.

TRIPLE DECKER SANDWICH

Ingredients

Corn Filling:

4 oz (100g) sweet corn (niblets)
3 oz (75g) smoked ham or chicken, chopped
1 tbs (15ml) mayonnaise

Cucumber Filling:

4 oz (100g) cucumber, peeled and chopped
4 spring onions trimmed and chopped
2 oz (50g) Cheshire cheese
1 tbs (15ml) mayonnaise

Egg Filling:

3 hard-boiled eggs, mashed with knob of butter salt

pinch of cayenne pepper
1 tbs (15ml) mayonnaise
12 slices bread, white, brown or mixed with crusts removed

Topping:

8 oz (250g) cream cheese combined with
1-2 tbs (15-30ml) milk


Garnish:

Sweet corn (niblets)
cress
toasted almonds
olives

Method

Combine ingredients for each filling. Place 3 slices of bread side by side on a serving platter. Spread with a filling, cover with 3 more slices of bread. Repeat to use filling and bread. Coat the loaf with cream cheese and garnish (see picture). Chill before serving.

Pat was born into a proud and noble family in Barnakill — traditional people who loved their parish, their home, their neighbours. Pat farmed the land of his home in Glendalligan. He loved the land, the cattle, the sheep and when his days work was over he liked nothing better than to get on his bicycle and visit his neighbours for a chat about the parish, and about how the "lads" would do on the field of play!

Pat, the family man, was second to none, married for 58 years, totally committed to his wife and family. Fiercely proud of each one's achievements — and so he may.

His daughters Kathleen and Biddy played camogie for Kilrossanty, his sons Tom, Pa and Noel are renowned throughout Ireland as the greatest exponents of football to play for any club team. "Tomineen", "Panneen" and "Noeleen", as Pat would call them, graced the fields of Waterford for Kilrossanty for many years, through good times and bad times; the fields of Ireland for their county and for Munster. Pat was so proud of them. He was right to be.

Pat gave his lifetime in service to this club he loved as player, selector, treasurer and president, a post he held right up to his

death. He was a delegate to County and Western Conventions for 56 years. He attended 56 conventions unbroken — that is history.

He attended his last convention with me in Lismore on a very cold and wet night. He enjoyed it and he never failed to put the Kilrossanty view across. He was proud of being from the Comeraghs and after the conventions he loved to chat to old comrades about the days of long ago.

As I have said, his old comrades are scarce now, some are here today: Pat Veale, Mick Veale. Let us remember Pats Fitzgerald who is ill in hospital, Dick Maguire who cannot be here.

His two brothers Davy and Martin, who are gone to their rest (R.I.P.) who also played for the "green and gold." "They played the game like heroes, the noblest, the best."

Pat was proud of the achievements of all of his grandchildren — June, Collette and Triona Whyte who have All-Ireland medals with Waterford ladies football. Pat was so proud of them and of all his grandchildren.

Pat, you are gone to your 'Maker' and I know when St. Peter met you, Pat, you told him you were going to meet your old comrades and tell them that the Kilrossanty crowd are on the way back.

10 years ago, I stood here in the Kilrossanty graveyard and spoke about your son-in-law, the late Jimmy Whyte (R.I.P.) Today, Pat, you join him in heaven. I know the chat will turn to the "lads" so very quickly. You will tell him the truth, you always did and then you may have a game of cards that you loved so much as well.

I wish to thank each and everyone of you for coming both last night and today from different clubs throughout the county to pay your respects to the giant of a man he was — Pat Walsh.

To his wife Ciss and family I once again extend our sympathy on your loss. Pat, may the green grass of your beloved Comeragh lay forever gently on your soul.

Pat, as I have said, was born in Barnakill and a few lines from a poem sums up this great man we have laid to rest:

"It's here beneath the Comeragh hills, stately and alone,

Defying times ruthless hand, that mass of solid stone,

A memory of our chequered past,

It stands unconquered still, Like Erin's Spirit, unsubdued, the Castle Barnakill."


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BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

CONCERN OVER TOURIST SHOOT

Ardfinnan/Ballybacon/Grange and Newcastle Gun Club has learned of apparent attempts in the Newcastle area to commence a tourist shooting operation. This club is totally opposed to any such operation for one main reason, the commercial exploitation of game species in the club's area by tourist shooters would pose a very serious threat to the population levels of the said species.

It is the club's view that local game stocks simply could not sustain the highly intensive levels of commercial exploitation which are the inevitable and all too frequent consequence of irresponsible tourist shoot operations. Such over exploitation tourists would amount to a direct attack on our rich and varied local wildlife heritage. Twenty five years of management and conservation by this club could all have been in vain if the tourist shoot were to commence. They have now put on public record their reasons for opposing this proposed, albeit, misguided commercial venture, the club finds it necessary to make two concluding points. Firstly, this club will use all legal means at its disposal to oppose this venture. Quigley Site On Auction

The famous 65 acre site at Ballinacourty, once the lands of the big money spinning Quigley Magnesite Plant is now to be sold by public auction at the Park Hotel on October 19 next, at 3 p.m.

Having lain idle since its shock closure twelve years ago, the plant was demolished earlier this year by Pfizer Inc. as part of a massive site restoration programme that cost the American company in the region of £650,000.

First founded in 1969 by the then President of Quigley, the late John A. Mulcahy, the plant em-

ployed over 120 people servicing the steel industry.

The restoration project is believed to be one of the largest site restoration works of its kind ever carried out in the country.

Completely cleared of all structures, the site was levelled to its original contours, coastal erosion was halted in several areas through the use of rock armour and undersea piping was removed.

Top soil was also imported and the reseeded of the site began last Spring. Remarkable work has been completed to date and the large Quigley factory is

now a long forgotten memory when one views the scenic, unblemished site today.

FOUR SEPARATE LOTS

During the public auction next Wednesday the lands will be sold in four separate lots, those being C.10 acres with sea frontage; C.7 acres with sea frontage; the former production area which incorporates 36 acres with sea frontage and Ballinacourty House. (known to many as wood houses) with C.12 acres sea frontage.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Eamon Spratt of co-agents Edmond Spratt and Son Ltd., Grattan House, Dungarvan, reported there had been a 'certain level of definite interest which one would expect from a block of land enjoying such a prominent loca-

tion and unique setting."

Referring to the remarkable transformation of the site into the natural beauty-spot it is today, Mr. Spratt said that the majority of the interested parties who viewed the lands, "are exceptionally surprised at what they remember having been there and the present topography that is there today."

Peter O'Meara of Hamilton Osborne King also reported good responses to the auction from local interested parties.

Under the Waterford County Development Plan however, the 65 acre site can only be used for agricultural and amenity use, ruling out all potential home buyers, but offering an ideal location for farming purposes and recreational facilities.



Lismore Notes



Progress On The Amalgamation Of The Primary Schools In Lismore

The Trustees of both the C.B.S. and Presentation have consulted with the two Boards of Managements, the Parents Councils and the general body of the parents.

As a result of these consultations the Trustees are of the opinion that whereas there was a broad measure of agreement on amalgamation, many objected to the proposed amalgamation on the basis that an adequate playing field was not being provided for, in the amalgamation plans.

This, they feel has now been resolved, as the Presentation Sisters have agreed to include the 'Hockey Pitch' plus the land to the right of this field (viewed from the school) in the plans for the amalgamated school.

The Trustees have, therefore, informed the Department of Education of their agreement to proceed with the amalgamation.

The Department of Education has written to Trustees saying that this project will

be re-activated as a matter of urgency and will be placed on the list of major projects for capital funding of in 1995.

The Trustees have requested the Boards of Management to take the project in hand and deal with the Department themselves so that the details of the new building will be, as far as is feasible, to the satisfaction of the Boards.

The Department have indicated that they are willing to provide a permanent building consisting of 4 classrooms, a general purpose room, staff room and office. There will be no prefabricated building in use in the amalgamated school. They are also willing to make alterations in the existing building as will be necessitated by the amalgamation.

The Boards are now consulting with the interested parties as to the details of the proposed building work. They will then start negotiations with the Department of

Education on these details.

It is still impossible to state what the exact amount that will be required by way of local contribution for this project as:

a) we have not settled on the detail of the plans for the amalgamated building,

b) no agreement has yet been reached between the Department of Education, and the Trustees of the Christian Brothers on the amount of money for the sale of the Christian Brothers school and land to the proposed Community School.

However, the Trustees expect that the sale of the Christian Brothers site and school will at least cover the cost of the new building and any local contribution should only arise out of changes and improvements to the existing building. (The local contribution is 15% of the cost).

F.A.I. PRESIDENT TO VISIT LISMORE

This Friday night 14th October the President of the Football Association of Ireland Mr. Louis Kilcoyne will visit Lismore Heritage Centre where he will launch The East Cork/West Waterford Schoolboys Soccer League in association with the Red House League and sponsored by the Imokilly People.

Success For Park Hotel Leisure Centre




PHOTO SHOWS THE MAGNIFICENT SWIMMING POOL AT THE PARK HOTEL

Centre covering:


- Working Practices ● Health and Safety Practices

Steady Decline In Hurling Standards

A contributory cause of the virtual disappearance of aerial mastery of the sliotar could be coaching. That's right coaching, modern coaching which often places too much emphasis on gaining and retaining possession, on catching and holding before keeping possession by running and passing to a team mate whose first thought will very likely be to maintain custody of the sliotar in similar fashion! The possession game! Thus evolves the possession chain.

Did this craze come from football I wonder where kicking the ball is, even at the highest level, the last resort, much time and energy being expended in running and passing. It is interesting to note that clubs like the Nire, whose players are Fourmilewater senior hurlers, indulge in this possession daftness quite a lot. Among intermediate teams St. Mary's do an inordinate amount of running and passing just as the sister club Sliabh gCua do in football. What applies to football doesn't necessarily apply to hurling and if the need for a more direct approach in hurling were recognised we would have a much better and more enjoyable game.

But, as ever, who is going to do this type of coaching. There is an acute shortage

of experienced qualified personnel. The customary two evenings a week fall well short of the time needed to achieve a high skill level. Four sessions a week would offer a good chance but where in the Ireland of 1994 could you get such commitment what with unemployment, shift work and players domiciled far from home. Sad really that such expertise should be denied players who would glory in exhibiting their full repertoire of skills.

In the '40's, '50's and '60's when that Mt. Sion score described last week was recorded all players were intent on pulling on the overhead ball-backs, forwards and midfielders. And then came a little change in defensive strategy: backs began to stop or bat the ball. Coaches taught this as a safer option for defenders but it gradually reduced the aerial clashes. Tony Wall of Tipperary was an expert at this in the '50's and '60's, when he bestrode the centre back scene like a Colossus. Around the '60's the intelligent midfielder strove to supply his forwards with the low ball thus reducing further still the prospect of the high overhead clash of the ash. The gradual evolution of the game took much of the sparkle, spontaneity and abandon out of a game celebrated for these attributes.

Extracts From Tidy Towns Report Relevant To Abbeyside

Last week we pointed out that the total points received this year amounted to 179 which is an improvement of five over the total awarded in 1993. The Chamber of Commerce undertook responsibility for our performance in the 'Tidy Towns Competition' this year.

This week we report on a further three sections of the examination undertaken by the judges:

Presentation of Natural

Amenities 34 (last year 33) — The public amenity area around the Moresby Buoy looked very well indeed. The standard in this category was generally high. The maximum number of marks in this section is 50.

Appearance of Approach Roads 34 (last year 33) — The standard in this category was high in general. Some attention should be paid however to street furniture particularly with regard to replacing litter bins and

painting roads signs and street nameplates. The Tramore/Stradbally approach road looked very well with its magnificent view of the sea and stone walls and trees to the right. The Waterford/Cork road also looked well, the box cut hedging welcome sign being particularly admired. Greater attention should be paid to trimming grass around trees. The maximum number of marks in this section is 45.

Presentation of Residential Areas 20 (last year 19) — The houses and gardens were generally very well presented, the B & B's by their nature having to appear bright and cheerful. The housing estates looked well, Seapark being particularly admired for its successful efforts to address the road by the use of trees and landscaping. The maximum number of marks in this section is 30.

Effort: 33 Marks

Aglish Village's committee has obviously made great efforts to present their village to its best advantage for this years competition. The landscaped areas and flowerbeds were particularly admired. Many thanks for your comprehensive replies to the questionnaire and detailed map.

Tidiness: 30 Marks

The Village was generally litter free although some stray papers were apparent in the G.A.A. grounds, while the top of the laneway was quite weedy and the boundary fence to the school and boundary wall to the church painted. There was an untidy yard beside the terraced houses with abandoned tyres and car. The broken litter bin outside the graveyard should be replaced.

Presentation Of Buildings: 28 Marks

The standard in this category was quite inconsistent. The old national school and churchyard appeared quite neglected, while the Garda Station and church and their boundary wall needed a fresh coat of paint although the grounds looked very well. Teagasc Says

DAIRYING

OCTOBER GRAZING — The recent wet weather has made grazing difficult in all but the driest land. Dry land in Co. Waterford has now recovered to allow plenty of grazing before cows are housed permanently. Wet weather in October is very bad for those with wetter land and it hastens the end of grazing.

Milk yield takes a beating in a wet October. Herds that are giving 3 gallons or more are quickly down to 2 to 2.5 gallons. If the grass is too wet, the dry matter and feeding value is low and it will take some silage as well as meal to slow up the fall in milk yield.

If you have a nice bit of grass, such as aftergrass, cows will make very bad use of it in wet weather, unless the grass is rationed out to them and they are prevented from tramping the field.

The New Zealand grazing techniques work well in these situations, i.e. small plots, start at the far end of the field if possible and move fences frequently.

SOIL TESTS — Soil test results from Teagasc at Johnstown Castle are excellent when it comes to spending your money wisely and making good judgements about fertiliser levels. This is even more important in modern times, given the increasing complexity of fertilisers and the higher nutrient value of slurry from modern slurry tanks.

A sample of two, each year from both grazing and silage ground, will keep a close eye on how fertiliser levels are going. This is the ideal time of the year for taking samples before any of next winter's slurry or fertiliser goes out.

HEIFERS — Weanling heifers and even in-calf heifers often perform badly in October and November on grass. Neither group of animals can afford any such set-back as they will not be properly grown at calving. Small heifers at calving are a bad start to a cow's life. Weanling should have been getting some meals all along, if not they should be getting it now. In-calf heifers will benefit from a small amount of meal also.

CEREALS

The Area Aid payments are biased in favour of spring crops and this has narrowed the gap between the margins from spring and winter cereals. This should not create an exodus from winter crops, especially wheat, as this would upset market balances and prices.

Growers however must be more discerning in their choice of grounds for winter barley and wheat. Winter wheat has, in the past, given some exceptionally high yields and margins. It is a high risk crop, but will continue, if grown in the right locations and in proper rotation, to be a very profitable crop.

It must however be confined to sites capable to producing yields of 3.5 tonnes/acre or better. To avoid the risk of yield reductions from take-all, break crops will become an essential forerunner to wheat in most soils. Winter barley may be acceptable as a convenience crop on many farms. However, if it is to be economically justified, yields of at least 3 tonnes per acre must be achieved. These yields can only be achieved from fertile heavy textured soils.

WHEAT VARIETIES — These is an exceptionally wide choice of varieties available, with no clearly defined leader. This will ensure that growers will do what was always essential — that is, grow a mix of varieties. Do not discard a variety that has performed well on your farm and be prepared to grow at least one promising new variety.

BEEF

UNFINISHED CATTLE

There are two options with these—

- (i) If you have plenty of grass, feed 2-3 kgs. meal outdoor and sell as they become finished;
- (ii) Where grass is scarce, house and put on to full winter rations, i.e. good silage plus 3-4 kgs. meal. Suck cattle could be ready by late November, December or early January. There will be an application period in November for male beef premiums, so where one plans to sell cattle in January that have not already drawn the 22 month premium, application should be made in November.

Of course, you must see how a further premium application to the Spring and Summer applications will affect stocking rate restrictions and extensification payments.

Possibly the entire sums will have to be done all over again. This was one of the reasons why advisers were impressing on farmers the need to keep good records of all premium and headage applications and payments.

HOUSING CATTLE — The date of housing on individual farms depends on grass supply and soil conditions. The performance of older cattle falls when on wet autumn grass, especially as it becomes scarce. Heavy cattle also damage pasture under wet conditions. The weanlings can be left out much longer as they do less damage and can be fed more easily outdoors.

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The County Chairman of Waterford ICMSA, Mr. John Skehan, has stated that following a meeting between the Department of Agriculture, Food & Industry and the ICMSA, the Association said it received a firm assurance that the Department will offer farmers every assistance to facilitate the operation of the REPS Scheme.

The Chairman urged farmers to be positive about the REPS Scheme. One of the biggest incentives to participate in the REPS is that it provides an income for farmers undertaking essential pollution control work which otherwise would not

generate an income return. "Once the REPS training courses come on stream towards the end of October, farmers will learn about the Scheme and this will put them in a better position to see the benefits of REPS," said the County Chairman.

ICMSA has had detailed discussions with the Department on all aspects of REPS and conveyed the many concerns voiced by farmers on the operation of the Scheme.

ICMSA urged the Department to change the requirement that pollution work must be carried out in year one of the Scheme and he

called for two years to complete such work.

The ICMSA also reiterated its opposition to the fencing of watercourses 1.5 metres from water. In response the Department undertook to discuss this aspect of REPS with the EU Commission.

ICMSA has received firm assurance from the Department that every assistance will be given to planners in

overcoming the difficulties in the operation of the REPS.

"For the first time, through REPS, farmers will be rewarded for caring for the environment. Some farmers will have little difficulty in meeting the conditions of REPS, while for others, a certain number of improvements and investment will have to be carried out on their farms.

Anger At Pandoro Over "High-Handed Treatment" Of Irish Exporters

Following an angry meeting of over 40 livestock exporters convened by IFA last week, the IFA President, John Donnelly, said, "farmers and exporters are furious at the shabby and discriminatory treatment of Irish traders by the British-based Pandoro company."

Commenting on that meeting the Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice O'Donovan, stated that "Pandoro gave its British customers one month's notice of its decision to pull out of the live trade, while Irish exporters got no notice whatsoever. Bookings have been overturned and the door has been shut on regular Irish customers."

The IFA have called on

the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh and the Government to confront Pandoro over its high-handed attitude which was damaging the livelihoods of Irish traders and 100,000 livestock farmers.

Mr. O'Donovan said the meeting was fully satisfied with the Department of Agriculture controls and supervision of exported animals. "The export trade in Irish animals is a clean trade, with nothing to hide, and with satisfied customers who require animals to be delivered in top class condition."

The Waterford Livestock Chairman emphasised that farmers and traders have no difficulty with close veterinary controls and practical rules which allow their vital export markets to be maintained.

In her time Mary also was an inter-pro badminton player and also an international hockey player as well as an avid golfer. She still enjoys a regular round of golf. Indeed, Mary played in Wimbledon in her day and in order to qualify she had to play in several English tournaments.

Mary now lives in Tramore and occasionally visits the Dungarvan area. Another winner was Mary's daughter Joan who won the trophy in 1957.

Betty (O'Neill) Ahearne captured the trophy on three different occasions, in 1945, '46 and 1954. Betty's father and brothers were managers of the Munster & Leinster Bank.

C. M. Foley won the title in 1947. Her sister was the late Dr. Ann Casey. C. M. was a wonderful baseline player due to the fact that she played her tennis on a court overlooking the Ardmore cliff and in order to save her tennis balls she had to keep the rallies going. The Cliff House Hotel now occupies the site of the Ardmore Tennis Court.

In 1952, Carmel O'Sullivan won the cup. Carmel now lives in South Terrace. In 1955 K. M. Donovan won the cup. She was the daughter of Denis O'Donovan who at the time was Manager of the Provincial Bank. Mary Harkin won the cup in 1959 and then Veronica O'Brien won in 1964.

In 1986 The Causeway Tennis Club was founded and its first president was Bernard Walsh. His wife Veronica graciously presented the cup to the club. Since then there have been six different winners. Teresa Keane is the only "modern day" player to match Betty O'Neill's three wins, although no player since Betty has been able to successfully defend her title. Teresa Keane's three wins took place in 1986, '88 and '90.

Other winners include Pat Flanagan in 1987, Teresa M. Keane in 1989, Joan Sheehan in 1991, Maria Kelleher in 1992 and the present holder Nollaig McCarthy who won in 1993.

So, with all this history going with this trophy, could you make a piece of history by being the 50th anniversary winner?







Thanks to the Crystal for the workout and might I say you looked very "neat" in your new "jerseys".



Ladies Football All Ireland Final**WATERFORD TAKE THIRD TITLE****WATERFORD 2-10 MONAGHAN 0-12**

It's twenty years since the Ladies Gaelic Football association was founded in Hayes Hotel, Thurles in the summer of 1974 and the 21st final played at Croke Park on Sunday last was probably the best of the times as Monaghan and Waterford served up a thriller that kept every one of the 8,000 spectators enthralled. Played in brilliant sunshine, it contained sixty minutes of non stop scores, good football, spectacular scores, near misses and a crucial penalty save.

Waterford's third All Ireland senior title in four years owes much to a dogged team performance and two players playing at opposite ends of the famous stadium, superb performances from young goalkeeper Anna Lisa Crotty, and full forward Aine Wall steered the Decies to a memorable triumph. Every one of the Waterford players did their best but Anna Lisa and Aine were the difference between victory and defeat.

A huge Waterford following cheered every ball, lifted the team when it was needed and contributed to an incredible atmosphere. When Waterford took the field the sound that cascaded out on to the pitch from the Hogan Stand threatened to lift the roof. The sea of colour when both teams paraded behind the Artane Boys Band had to be seen to be believed.

Waterford won the toss and elected to play into the Hill 16 goal with the sun at their backs. However, it was the young and relatively inexperienced Monaghan who stormed into the attack and within ninety seconds Linda Gartland kicked the opening point from a free. The Ulster side enjoyed a purple patch as full forward Voreen Quigley shot wide from a good goal chance.

Waterford shot two wides before their first move of real quality produced a superb goal after six minutes. Catriona Casey found Claire Ryan and Claire played the ball in front of Aine Wall who duly collected and slammed the ball to the Monaghan net, giving goalkeeper Ann Gavan no chance. Within a minute Aine added a point.

Monaghan began to dominate with Waterford midfield and half back line in real trouble. They rained down on the Waterford goal and shot five wides along with forcing goalkeeper Anna Lisa Crotty to make three brilliant saves in the 9th, 10th and 12th minutes. That third save when she advanced off the line to deny Monaghan corner forward Brenda McAnespie from point blank range will go into the annals of ladies Gaelic football. Monaghan's only reward for intense pressure was a 19th minute point from Brenda McAnespie.

Waterford weathered the

storm. The switching wing backs Sinead Walsh and Julie Ann Torpey improved matters dramatically and Claire Ryan moving to wing forward began to resume the supply to the full forward line. A right wing break saw Aine Wall find Catriona Casey and her inch perfect shot found the back of the Monaghan net. Brenda McAnespie replied with a point which was duly cancelled out by Aine Wall before Marie Crotty pointed a great free in the 30th minute. Geraldine O'Regan closed the first half scoring with a point to leave the half time score Waterford 2-4 Monaghan 0-3.

Fiona Crotty increased Waterford's lead within seconds of the restart with a great point from the right wing before Monaghan's Pauline Woods had the almost inevitable wide seconds later. Aine Wall tacked on another point. Then came the incident that almost certainly decided the 1994 All Ireland senior final.

PENALTY MISS

Monaghan full forward Voreen Quigley got inside the Waterford defence and was brought down - penalty - ironically into the same goal that Charlie Redmond faced a couple of weeks previously. Up stepped Orla Gartland. Crouched on the Waterford goal-line stood sixteen year old Anna Lisa Crotty. Gartland shot - Crotty saved and although Jennifer Grennan put the clearance over the bar a great chance had been missed.

SALUTE TO BALLYCOE

County final time is usually a period of the year when we are inclined to look back to dates in our history and recall events which were historical or unusual or which created a special talking point around the county at the time.

This week we take a look back at the events which made the headlines on the G.A.A. front in the county, exactly 50 years ago when we had far, far less championship activity and a lot more talk about individual matches. A long interval between games allowed time for talking and analysing and people were in a position to converse about one game at a time.

With the grand total of 26 county championships in all grades, juvenile up to senior and in both codes, there isn't enough time to give individual attention in these days and when a match regardless of its importance is over, we tend to forget about it and begin to focus on the next match coming up.

Way back in 1944 — exactly 50 years ago, we had a total of six county championships and all were played on a knockout system. With so much less activity to have to concentrate on, followers were able to talk about particular matches, in the pubs, street corners at home and in the workplace for weeks before it took place and most supporters knew everything that was needed to know about the players involved.

50 YEARS AGO

Stradbally — were the senior football county champions and won the last of their five in a row. They are still going very strong (they'll know just how strong after they have played the Nire on Saturday next).

The Army — World War II was still in full swing and so were the Army senior hurling team, who were allowed into the championship, as most of them were based around here. The war ended and this great team dispersed. (I believe that one or two are still living in the county and it would be nice to hear from them).

Dunhill/O'Briens — They were the minor football

county champions and Dungarvan were the holders of the minor hurling title in 1944.

Cappoquin — won the junior hurling county championship and were to do even better 4 years later. Presently the club are struggling to win back their enviable position of that era.

Ballycoe Are Worthy County Champions

Like the Army team, 1944 was the year that they came, saw and conquered. Ballycoe club came into existence in 1943 when they fielded a junior football team only. The following year, with Abbeyside not fielding and the Brickies not fielding either, Ballycoe were strengthened and affiliated junior hurling and football teams.

In hurling they defeated Kilgobinet by 7-7 to 0-0 in the first round and they beat Dungarvan by 6-2 to 3-0 in the second round, then in the group final the Brickie contingent didn't turn up and they were very short and lost by 2-1 to 1-3 to Kilmacthomas. That was the end of Ballycoe's history as a hurling outfit. Football was their game and having failed in their first season, they were determined to do much better in 1944.

In their opening round they faced Kilgobinet who had beaten them in the previous year. Ballycoe were ahead by 1-0 to nil at half time. Sean McGrath added a point, but points by Tom Bowe and Sean O'Brien cut the lead and brought Kilgobinet back into the game. Then a '51' by Jim Lindsay was finished to the net. Tom Curran soloed through for another point and the match was decided. The final score was Ballycoe 2-4 Kilgobinet 0-2. Patrick Ryan, Abbeyside, was the referee.

In the next round Ballycoe lost to Dungarvan on a 1-1 to 0-1 scoreline. Ballycoe objected to Dungarvan and were awarded the game. Dungarvan appealed to the County Board without avail. Jim McGrath, Modeligo was the referee in that one.

In round 3, Ballycoe were pitted against Mahon Ramblers and giving their best display of the year, won by 3-12 to 4-0. Jamie Moloney was the referee.

In the Western final, Ballycoe met Sliabh gCua. The Touraneena team was reputed to be one of the best sides around at that time. The game was described as fast and furious. At halfway, Sliabh gCua led, thanks to 3 points by Jimmy McGrath. Pa Foley had scored Ballycoe's lone point. In the second half, a goal from a melee and another from Sean McGrath was replied to by a lone point by Jimmy McGrath to leave Ballycoe divisional champions on a 2-1 to 0-4 score.

COUNTY FINAL

It was a great occasion and early on Sunday, October 22 a huge crowd from the parish were on the move. World War II was in full swing, there was practically no motor transport and no money to engage hackneys, so the chief mode of conveyance was the push bike, the odd pony and trap, etc. Still a good crowd managed to get to Newtown in time to see well-known referee (of that period) Sgt. P. Graham, throw in the ball between Ballycoe and Fenor.

Ballycoe proved to be the better team leading by 1-1 to 0-1 at half time. In the second half, Fenor threw everything they knew into a fierce onslaught but Ballycoe defended very well and ran out worthy winners by 1-5 to 1-1 in the end.

Mount Sion Supreme In Top-class Decider

MOUNT SION 2-13 PASSAGE 1-11

As was expected from this refixed county final, it was a sparkling display of club hurling as Mount Sion won their 29th county title in beating the gallant challengers, Passage before a crowd of approximately 3,000 at sunny Walsh Park on Saturday afternoon last.

Conditions were ideal and the pitch looked immaculate as the teams paraded behind the Seafield Pipe Band. With no curtain-raiser, the crowd were slow to arrive, but by the time John Kelly got the game under way a good crowd had taken up their positions at the venue made naked by the removal of the old stand in preparation for the major development work which is about to begin within days.

There was a tremendous atmosphere in the park as the game got underway and after young Barry Walsh snapped a high ball sent in by Sean Carey and sent it to the Mount Sion net within half a

minute of the start, the scene was really set for a splendid contest. The early score inspired Passage who continued to press, but Mount Sion's resolute defence held firm and denied them the goals that looked to be "on" during the first quarter.

After 15 minutes Passage were a mere point in front (1-2 to 0-4). Around the 20th minute of this half, John Meaney scored a splendid goal to put Mount Sion in front for the first time, but back came Passage and some splendid scores by midfielder Anthony Fitzgerald brought the village team back in control and at half time they led by 1-9 to 1-6.

On the run of play, Passage should have been further ahead, but with the kind of pressure being exerted by Mount Sion, scoring was made very difficult.

When the sides emerged for the second half, Mount Sion had made two substitutions. Brian Coughlan and

Kevin Ryan were both introduced to replace David Power and Terry Butler. Also there was an amount of reshuffling of their defence. As the second-half progressed, it became apparent that this tactic was having its effect. Passage were to score only two second half points as against 1-7 for 'Sion.

Passage did stretch their interval lead to four points after Mossy O'Keeffe had his only score of the game in the 32nd minute. Their final score came in the 38th minute from Sean Casey, but they had some inexplicable misses from placed balls. For the final twenty minutes Mount Sion took control and playing some spectacular hurling got their 40th minute goal when young Barry Browne shot home from a melee around the square after Tony Browne had got distance and accuracy into a long range free. This was the killer-blow for passage, but full credit to them for refusing to surrender and maintaining their effort right up to the final whistle. Hitting the crossbar and having close wides showed how much their luck was out in the second half.

SPLENDID FINAL

So, thanks to both teams, it was a splendid final and a wonderful exhibition of the best club hurling in the county. It was hard luck on Passage to have lost two county finals in a row, but I have no doubt but that they are too good a bunch of players to fade from the scene and I have no doubt that they will be back next year.

Mount Sion are now the undisputed champions and have extended their enviable record to 29 titles, something that is unlikely to be ever equalled in this county.

Someone said on Sunday night that Mount Sion won it

on the sideline. I don't know how true that is, but no one will dispute the fact that the experience of their mentors was a big factor in swinging the final in their favour.

For both sides, it was a team effort but we did have some outstanding play from Gary Gater, Tony and Barry Browne, Pat Ryan, Paraigh Fanning (team captain), goalkeeper Philly Flynn, B. Flannery, etc., for the winners and the Fitzgerald brothers Paul and Anthony, Sean Carey, Eamon and Sean Cullinane, Noel Connors, Barry Walsh, etc. for Passage.

For the final, and despite the fact that there was a full programme of games in the West, a crowd of about 3,000 paid £10,500 at the turnstiles. A programme for the final was produced by County Bord Na nOg and the musical entertainment was provided by the Bonmahon Pipe Band.

After the final, Chairman of the County Board, Eamon O Murchu presented the Waterford News & Star Cup to Mount Sion team captain, Paraigh Fanning amid scenes of great excitement.

Overall it is a very attractive programme and one must be choosy in naming any one of the published matches as the big one of the week-end. I give pride of place to the game in which the county jersey will be worn as even though supporters in this county rarely get excited about matches in the football league, I do know that a lot of people are interested in seeing London here for their first time ever and also I know that very many of

our football supporters have a special interest in seeing how the team will perform under the guidance of Larry Tompkins who is the coach/advisor to the team this year.

The county as a whole will be interested in our new county champions Mount Sion's performance against the Cork representatives, Midleton in round one of the Munster club championship which takes place at Midleton.

Excitement about the destination of the Conway Cup is beginning to build up around the county now that the hurling is got out of the way and a very big crowd will come to Fraher Field to see the champions, the Nire,

play Stradbally in the semi-final after watching Abbeyside and Erin's Own do battle for the intermediate hurling county title in the curtain-raiser. Both teams matches are on the Saturday programme and it is possible that a game or two will be played at Fraher Field after the London match which is being timed for an early start on Sunday.

THE LONDON VISIT

There is a touch of history involved here when we welcome and greet our London friends to Fraher Field for the first time. In fact this will be the first occasion on which we will meet London on Irish soil in the championships as our one and only previous meeting here was

in a challenge at Walsh Park early last year. Our other two matches against them were at Ruislip, London, one in the McGrath Cup final and the other in the National League last year. London won both these games and in each this result was unexpected. In other words we were to blame for our defeats. Last year when we lost to London by 1-8 to 0-10 we were forced to travel under-strength with Stradbally and Rathgormack players both club-tied and some other regulars also ruled out for a variety of reasons.

The team to represent Waterford will not be selected until mid-week. The selectors say they have major problems in naming a team because of the club championship situation at the present time. Stradbally and the Nire players will be in action in what promises to be a tough encounter in the first semi-final on Saturday, and Rathgormack and Gaultier are not anxious to release any of their players who will be engaged in the second semi-final at Kill on the following Saturday. This would, in effect, mean that the county team would have to be selected from clubs not including the top four who are still championship tied. An extraordinary situation surely and a big disappointment for the new county selectors. In the circumstances it is difficult to be optimistic about our prospects of defeating London at our third attempt.

Last week, London had a very useful trial run when they played Clare in the McGrath Cup final at Ruislip and while they were missing six of their regular team, they did reasonably well before fading out near the end to lose by 1-15 to 2-5.

New manager Pat Griffin said after that game that he was confident that London will do very well in the league.

In our present circumstances, it is possible that they will open their campaign with a victory in the Fraher Field. Hopefully not.

OIREACHTAS

The first round of the Oireachtas hurling competition between Wexford and Waterford will take place at Portlaw over the coming week-end. Because of other commitments a number of the regular county players will not be available to the selectors, so for the second week running an experimental side will represent

the county.

In view of the fact that the Oireachtas is being held in the Ring Gaeltacht this year and the final of the hurling tournament is fixed for Fraher Field, it would be nice to be involved, but as we find things at the moment, it is unlikely that we will be playing in the final. The team on duty is unlikely to be announced until late in the week.

SENIOR FOOTBALL SEMI-FINAL

NIRE V. STRADBALLY

As I have already written, interest in the senior football championship is building up rapidly and in the three remaining matches, we can expect to see a big improvement in standards. At the moment, it would be impossible to write confidently about the prospects of any of the four remaining teams and the feeling is around that the title can be won by any one of them.

We will see which side represents the Western division in the final after the champions, Nire and Stradbally have clashed at Fraher Field on Saturday afternoon. The two Eastern teams, Rathgormack and Gaultier will meet one week later.

I have not researched the records on the matter, but I have been reliably told that the Nire have never beaten Stradbally at the knockout stages of the senior championships. I do know that when they met in the first round at Ardmore this year, the champions were the runners-up in an exciting tie which saw Stradbally come off winners on a 1-12 to 3-4 scoreline.

Since then both teams have had some good results

with the Nire beating Kilrossanty, Rathgormack and Gaultier and Stradbally accounting for Kilrossanty and Dungarvan and playing a draw with St. Saviours.

Stradbally will again have to field without inter-county under-21 player Paul Foley, but will have Packo Curran, Eoin, Fintan and Liam O'Brien, Tom Gough, Pat Halpin, Stephen Cunningham, Oliver Costelloe, Lar Walsh, David Kirwan, etc. to represent them against the champions who will look to Tom Flynn, Pat, Tom and Ian Walsh, Ger Walsh, Tom Condon, Seamus Cuddy, Ml. Guiry, Pat Crotty, David Phelan and company to see them through to their second final within a year. The Nire have already qualified for the county U-21 football final and a number of these young players can be introduced into this Lawlor's Hotel semi-final that promises to be a cracker.

It is a very open game, and any result won't surprise, but I have a feeling that if Stradbally strike their best form, we could see a repeat of the result which saw them beat the champions in the first match of the championship.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING COUNTY FINAL

Erin's Own Strongly Fancied

The famed city club were favourites two years ago and surprisingly failed to St. Saviours in a close finish and last year they went out at the semi-final stage.

Last year they inflicted two comprehensive defeats on Abbeyside and are now pitted against an under-strength village team who recently struggled to beat Ballydurn in a very well contested semi-final in Stradbally. In the semi-final Abbeyside were forced to field without Ger Smith, Ian

Kiely and Dermot Ryan all of whom were unavailable for different reasons. None of this trio will be available here on Saturday and added to their woes is the news that outstanding defender Alan Ryan, suffering from a dislocated shoulder, is definitely out until next year. Having to field without this quartet will be a major handicap for Abbeyside who have not played in an adult hurling county final for 25 years.

Both Erin's Own and

Abbeyside moved down from senior ranks about ten years ago when teams had to graduate into the senior championship through qualifying rounds. The losers played in the intermediate championship and both have still been battling to win the lower grade championship.

In their semi final against St. Mary's, the Damien Byrne, Noel Kelly, Noel Connors led city team played their best hurling in the second half, proving that they are peaking, just at the right time.

Abbeyside will have Brendan Landers, Michael and Ger Collins, Jimmy Healy, Sean McGrath, Conor Clancy, Dave Sheehan, Damien Cliffe, Damien Moore, Michael Enright, Brian Hennessey, Gavin Breen, Sean Lambert, Mark Reynolds, Justin Walsh, etc., etc., to select from for this vital decider.

It will be a great intermediate final and while Abbeyside are the outsiders here they will throw everything they know into winning and if Erin's Own are to win, they will have earned it the hard way.

serious," he added.

SOCIETY GOING DOWNHILL

Immediately seconding Cllr. McDonnell's proposal, Cappoquin Councillor Ollie Wilkinson informed members that in the past few months, alone, several key locations in the Lismore area had been raided.

The reduction in Garda numbers and the increase in crime had come as no coincidence he felt. "The situation is seriously deteriorating," he slammed, "society is going downhill".

Referring to a recent incident in which a neighbour's house had been raided, Cllr. Wilkinson said he had seen the awful effect of a house raid, the whole house was ransacked and both sentimental and valuable items stolen.

"It's a very serious problem," Cllr. Wilkinson concluded, "people are now afraid to live in rural Ireland."

FAULTY LEGISLATION

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally, however, felt the fault lay squarely with current legislation which, he believed, "favours the criminal". Continuing, the Fianna Fail Councillor said the Justice Minister was "unwilling and unable" to bring in new legislation. "A burglar is entitled to claim for damages if injured in your own house," added the irate Councillor, who concluded that until legislation is changed, "crime will be rampant."

RECURRING PROBLEM

Also voicing his opinion, Nire Valley Councillor Ciaran O Riain said break-ins in West Waterford areas was a constant problem.

He referred back to August when Council members moved a similar

motion that the Garda Commissioner and the Minister increase the Garda force in rural stations throughout the country.

"Is passing these resolutions any good at all", Cllr. O Riain questioned, adding that something concrete has to be done.

GOOD NEWS

Meanwhile, the good news is that 407 Gardai are to be recruited in 1994 while 3 additional judges are to be appointed. Between 1995 and 1997 there will be an annual intake of 350 Gardai and an additional 210 prison places will be provided. The Justice Minister further announced that these measures are only part of the comprehensive package of Law and Order measures which is designed to improve the effectiveness of the Garda Síochana in the fight against crime.

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
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
