Wright Slams 'Apartheid' Housing Policy

Democratic Left Councillor, Tony Wright, has openly criticised the proposed Respond Housing Development at Spring Marquis over what he termed an 'Apartheid' selection process where certain housing list tenants were being favoured over others.

Speaking at last Monday's Urban Council meeting, Cllr. Wright expressed concern over 'proper planning' of the green Dunabney area, with regard to an adequate entrance to existing estates and also the process by which the Respond, a

voluntary housing agency actually chooses among the many applicants it receives.

Cllr. Wright, however, found himself to be the sole objector to the project as the general feeling among Council members was one of support.

U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, objected to Cllr. Wright's use of the term Apartheid in this particular scenario.

Cllr. Wright replied, "if you ignore certain tenants and favour others, then that's what it is."

Waterford Co. Manager, Donal Connolly, however, was satisfied the housing scheme would be a major advantage in the town. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 40**

V.E.C's To Remain Viable

The threat of abolition is no longer on the cards for the present Co. V.E.C. structure following a recent ministerial announcement that V.E.C.'s are to retain a future role.

The announcement has come as a relief to many anxious members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education committee who had strongly condemned earlier suggestions of eight Regional Education Councils to be set up nationwide in place of existing V.E.C.'s

There remained, however, a general feeling of concern among members regarding the actual role of V.E.C.'s and whether their existing spheres of influence be safeguarded.

These suggestions were put forward last April in the form of a ministerial discussion paper. In the interim, V.E.C. members nationwide have actively lobbied and

pledged full backing to the I.V.E.A. in its opposition to the establishment of the proposed 15 member Regional Councils.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford V.E.C. in Dungarvan Cllr. Con Casey said the Ministers involved will have to announce and strengthen the position of V.E.C.'s nationwide. If this was not achieved Cllr. Casey likened the V.E.C. structure to "a residents association".

UNIQUE ROLE

Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said the recent announcement that V.E.C.'s be maintained was a first crumb of comfort for members. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 3**

Money Advice And Budgeting

A NEW SERVICE FOR WEST WATERFORD

This week, West Waterford Moneymatters Ltd., is happy to announce the opening of their new Money Advice and Budgeting Service for the area.

This announcement comes as a result of several years of pioneering work by this community-based group whose main aim is to assist people in dealing with their existing debt difficulties and to help them to begin to manage their own resources.

The original group was called Dungarvan Moneymatters and was established almost three years ago following on an initiative by the local Pastoral Care Team. Over the years they promoted a number of awareness campaigns and educational programmes on the whole question of indebtedness and money management skills.

Recently, they secured funding from the Department of Social Welfare and support from Waterford Development Partnership to establish a full-time advisory service.

At some stage in their lives, many people experi-

ence financial difficulty and need to avail of credit facilities. There are many types of credit available and it's easy to avail of most of these. Yet, there are some people, especially those on low income who find it very difficult to get credit. Using credit is fine, but when credit turns to debt, then it can cause all sorts of anxieties and problems. Such debt can build up for a variety of reasons such as loss of job, marriage breakdown, low income, unexpected expenses, a variety of family or personal problems or a lack of budgeting skills.

In setting up the new Money Advice and Budgeting Service, West Waterford Moneymatters are keenly aware of these difficulties and of the worry and misery that personal debt problems can bring to families and individuals. Through carefully worked out budget plans, a system of special accounts and the renegotiation of loans, the service seeks to help people by being realistic about their level of indebtedness and their level of income.

John Lawless, who is the newly appointed full-time Money Advice Officer for the service is well known for his community and youth work throughout the county. He sees this service as a community response to a growing problem for many families and individuals. He stresses the importance of the effects that debt can have on a person's dignity. But his message is pragmatic: "Do not ignore the problem, it will not go away."

Aware of the fact that debt problems can often be a very private affair, he stresses the importance of having a service which is sensitive and confidential. It is also important to note that the service is provided free of charge.

Educational programmes form another aspect of the work of the group and so they are anxious to hear from school and community groups who may be interested in talks on budgeting and money management skills.

While this new service is based at 36 Main Street, Dungarvan and is geared primarily for those living in the catchment area of the town and the western part of Co. Waterford, it is open to anyone who may need advice on money matters relating to their personal money difficulties.

Appointments can be arranged for any part of West Waterford. To make appointment, simply call in to

36 Lower Main Street, Dungarvan or telephone 058-44922.

The new service is part of a network of about 17 similar services throughout the country and its advent to the West Waterford area is a most welcome development.

Cork Bus Service Withdrawn

DUNGARVAN TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Extension Work A Step Nearer

The long-awaited £1 million-plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College is now a step closer following last weekend's inspection at the existing school and adjoining site by a Senior Official of the Department of Education.

Programme Manager to the Education Minister Niamh Breathnach, the official met with Co. Waterford VEC Chairman, Billy Kyne and reported he would confer with the Department as to the best planning strategy

for the proposed extension. Speaking at last Monday's VEC meeting, Cllr. Kyne said a decision was now imminent.

CEO, Kieran Heffernan told members he was satisfied with the official's response following the site inspection.

Mr. Heffernan then submitted a preliminary plan from the architect, Shay Cleary, to the meeting which set out a strategy for the existing site without recourse to the adjoining property.

The CEO disclosed that Mr. Cleary wanted the college to become an amenity for Dungarvan that could be used by the majority of people, young and old, such as the proposed hall and canteen area.

"His ideas in producing civic space is good," said Mr. Heffernan, who stressed the plan was open to any suggestions from the members.

Cllr. Con Casey complimented the Chairman on his efforts to keep the project moving. Likewise, Cllr. Austin Flynn, who said speed was crucial to the proposed development.

portant work has been carried out by the flexible V.E.C. structure in numerous areas in education over the years and Cllr. Kyne believed this must now be copperfastened in with the announcement that V.E.C.'s be retained.

Having attended an I.V.E.A. conference last week-end, the Chairman declared that the Irish Vocational Education Association's lobby "is to copperfasten and maintain the role of V.E.C.'s" nationwide. Cllr. Kyne said that the niche role of V.E.C.'s has in part been taken up by Fas, various county schemes and the Waterford Development Partnership etc. who, he added, have worked closely with the V.E.C. and were "tying into the role we have".

"The V.E.C. should now liaise with our four constituent T.D.'s", insisted Cllr. Kyne, "in stressing that our unique role must not be hindered and our powers must not be taken".

SOCIETY WILL BE LOSER

Cllr. Nora Flynn warned that if existing powers were taken from the V.E.C.'s, society would be the loser. "I am personally very concerned", added the Fine

Gael member, regarding the future role V.E.C.'s would be given if and when the Minister gave the green light for Regional Educational Authorities.

"The V.E.C. is there to fill in a gap", Cllr. Flynn stated, adding that should a regional structure be set up, local democracy would go by the wayside thereby eroding the powers of existing V.E.C.'s.

Also slamming the concept of regionalisation, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said the move had been initiated by the civil servants to "reduce and regionalise the role of V.E.C.'s".

Cllr. Kenneally said the same scenario had been enforced when the local health committees had been replaced by Regional Health Authorities.

"The same thing will happen here", warned Cllr. Kenneally, "be it five years or 10 years, that will be the result".

NEVER SELECTIVE

Fianna Fail councillor Austin Flynn agreed that V.E.C.'s had a unique role in education and training since the 1930's. With training now such a 'big business', Cllr. Flynn said the V.E.C. should now jealously guard their role in education because they are fulfilling it better than most.

Never selective in their enrolments for training courses, Cllr. Flynn recalled that the vocational schools had taken in every student that ever wanted to enrol.

"We need to assert the role of the V.E.C.'s and back the vocational schools in the great job they are doing", he added.

Complimenting the strong lobby made by councillors of both government parties nationwide, Cllr. Con Casey said the I.V.E.A. was not strong enough to oppose the R.E.C. proposals on its own without the support of the V.E.C.'s

It was unanimously decided to draw up a resumé of activities and achievements of the Co. Waterford V.E.C. to date which would then be circulated to the four T.D.'s.

You don't need room for veg

Winter digging now looms but the chore always seems easiest and most worthwhile in the vegetable plot.

If you don't already have one then you are missing out — no vegetables seem to taste as good as those straight from the garden.

If you grow your own you can also be as 'green' as you like by using garden compost instead of chemical fertiliser, or chasing weeds out by hoe and hand rather than a spray.

ROOM

Unfortunately many people don't think they have room to grow vegetables, but even the balcony of a flat can be used if you:

DO choose small varieties — they are often heavy-cropping too.

DO try different sites — who says cabbages can't be grown at the back of the flower bed or lettuces raised in a half-but?

DO try 'deep bed' cultivation, designed for tight spaces.

DON'T waste valuable space on bulky rows of crops such as potatoes and carrots when good quality ones are so cheap to buy.

DO switch crop sites each year. Different plants have different food needs and pests. 'Crops rotation' stops them and the soil tiring and helps keep pests at bay.

The deep bed system is highly recommended for any 'part-time' vegetable growing. It creates patches of deep and easily-worked soil which can be more intensively sown than conventional rows, yet fitted into tight corners.

The secret is to create beds no more than 3-4 feet wide flanked by narrow paths — you can then do all the necessary work on crops without needing to

step on and risk compacting the soil.

The new beds are also double-dug (to the depth of two spades) for better draining and deep-rooting.

Such preparation also allows single-digging for the next two years before another double-digging in the third and so on. If space is particularly tight, choose special crops for butts, pots, grow-bags and other containers but replace soil each year.

When selecting locations, divide crops into three 'families':

I brassicas (cabbage, kale, turnips, swede, brussels, etc)

I root crops excluding any that are also brassicas

I the rest (beans, onions, celery, etc). Sites for crops from each family should be then rotated each year.

Finally, here are some suggested crops for your 'compact patch':

Rhubarb — tough and easily grown in an odd corner or a pot.

Broad Beans — can be planted now in mild and sunny locations.

Beetroot — Short-rooted beetroots can be raised in pots.

Lettuce — ideal for grow-bags or small beds.

Radish — rewarding for small-scale gardening.

Tomatoes — ideal for grow-bags or beds against sunny walls.

Peppers — great for livening up the cookery and slashing pounds from the grocery bill!

New Evening Classes In Positive Living and Health Care

Waterford RTC, The Technical School, Dungarvan and the Irish Mental Health Association have come together to widen access to an important series of courses which have been available in the Regional College for the past five years.

The first is a Certificate in Health Care and Positive Living. It aims to provide participants with practical suggestions on healthy living and how to cope with stressful times in life. The course approaches health from a positive point of

view. It is not concerned with the sort of diagnosis that a doctor offers or with telling you what's wrong with you. It is now recognised that health is not only about bodies — your feelings and relationships are just as important as your physical well-being.

Health is concerned with life-style. It's about the choices you make in your life about how you want to live. Just as importantly, it's about the obstacles that may stop you living as you wish. Sessions will be facilitated by experts on the topics and plenty of time will be allowed for class involvement.

Certificates will be awarded to people who attend at least 75% of the lectures and who satisfactorily complete a short project. It is a personal development certificate as opposed to a vocational qualification.

The course is suitable for anyone interested in assessing their own life style and taking control of their health or who has responsibility for the health of others, e.g. parents, teachers, nurses, counsellors, etc.

HOLDERS of the Certificate in Positive Living & Health Care may proceed to a diploma course. This is modular in design and develops the same topics in greater depth.

A variety of 10 week modules are offered each term. Students may select those that interest them and study one or two per term, depending on the time available to them. Each module will be assessed on the basis of attendance and a project. Anyone who has obtained the certificate and then com-

pletes five modules will be eligible for the award of diploma. The modules are assessed by means of an individual project of your own choice. It is meant to relate what you have learned to an aspect of life which particularly interests you.

The modules available in Dungarvan for the coming year are:

- Introduction to Counselling (this term).
- Assertiveness (next term).
- Addiction Studies (next term).

The counselling course is suited to those whose commitments requires interaction with other people. It aims to provide them with some basic skills in counselling. There is great emphasis on the sharing of each other's experience and resources.

The topics covered include:

- Definitions of counselling;
- personal qualities;
- acceptance and sincerity;
- the process of counselling;
- frameworks for understanding;
- deepening understanding;
- understanding into action;
- planning action;
- issues and endings.

Please note that this is not a professional training course in counselling, merely an introduction to the subject.

Pepper 'Em Up



PEPPERED STEAKS WITH BRANDY SAUCE

Cooking Time:

Rare: allow 2½ minutes each side

Medium: Allow 4 minutes each side

Well Done: allow 6 minutes each side

Ingredients

2 sirloin steaks 2 cm (¾ in) thick
2x5 ml sp (2 tsp) pepper-

corns (black, green or mixed) crushed
15g (½ oz) butter or margarine

2x5 ml sp (2 tsp) oil
50g (2 oz) button mushrooms, sliced

2x15 ml sp (2 tbsp) brandy

3x15 ml (3 tbsp) double cream

Method

Press the peppercorns on to both sides of the steaks. Heat the butter or margarine and oil in a frying pan and cook steaks. Remove and keep warm.

Add the mushrooms and cook for 1 minute. Stir in the brandy and reduce slightly. Remove pan from the heat and stir in the cream. Return pan to the heat and cook gently until sauce has thickened, do not boil.



Pour over the steaks and serve immediately with new potatoes or

pasta and fresh seasonal vegetables.

Our lighting system has been totally rewired and is now controlled by a computer aided system. To this end a new lighting control room and our new "interval tea room/meeting room" were constructed upstairs to the rear of the auditorium.

Backstage work also continued so as to increase the offstage working area as much as possible to facilitate the increasingly more technical productions staged here.

Over the last 12 months another major phase has been completed. This trojan effort could not have been undertaken by the society members alone. So, with the help and guidance of Tom Murphy, our local SESO and Austin Flynn, the Scheme Administrator, a CEDP Social Employment Scheme was set in motion.

The Friary Hall Theatre

Society joined with other local groups and operated under the banner of the Dungarvan Clubs and Societies Social Developments Committee, under the excellent care of Scheme Supervisor, Willie Whelan, Abbeyside.

In the theatre itself the task was formidable. Firstly, all the old props and bits of former productions had to be sorted, catalogued and then the unnecessary cleared away.

A new floor was constructed over the stage area to store these props, the backstage was cleared and painted totally matt black. Next came the foyer, lower exit hallway, the dressing rooms and the toilets, for a new facelift.

Then came the most daunting task of all — the auditorium itself. It was washed down, the walls were sealed, primed and painted to give you the fresh warm new look theatre which Dungarvan needs.

All this work was done by Michael Delaney, Tony Power and Brendan Delaney of Childers Estate, whose diligence, application and sheer hard work is greatly appreciated by all in the So-

ciety. The work continues this year, carried on by Michael Delaney.

The Society would like to thank all those who helped make the work on the theatre such a great success.



Mr. William (Bill) Kennefick

Under Bill's guidance the Clashmore and Knockanore Ploughing Associations were set up. His love for the ploughing was evident right up to the end, attending the West Waterford Annual Ploughing Contest just two weeks ago.

Bill has been a steward and judge in the National Ploughing contests and was to have judged at the National Contest in Wexford. It was with his involvement with the Ploughing Associations that he achieved national recognition.

In keeping up with the

changing farm developments, Bill saw the need for a new class of ploughing and so he introduced the Reversible Class which today has become part of the national competition. It was also in the ploughing that he encouraged people to participate and was a great coach to all.

Other organisations he was involved in were the Pioneers. He joined in 1945 and was still a Pioneer. Chairman of the GAA in early years, he helped buy jerseys in the 1950's and helped in the development of the Scrahan, a facility that is there today.

He bred and raced dogs and loved coursing. He was Chairman of the Cappoquin Coursing Club. He enjoyed point-to-points and had a number of good horses which won over the past years. He was Chairman of the local Fianna Fail Cumann and enjoyed the challenge of elections. In his involvement with Community Development he was involved in the drainage of the graveyard, moving the church wall to provide a car park and also played a major part in the repairs to the Community Centre and was also chairman of same. He instigated the 45 drive on Thursday nights in the Community Centre. Cards were a great pastime of his.

However, the legacy Bill left to the young people of Ballysaggart will always remain. His knowledge and air of authority were rarely questioned and he was respected by all.

The crowd was entertained afterwards at the Community Hall, Kilfeacle.

After checking in at the Nire Valley Tourist Office at Ballymacarbry, the walkers in the different categories set out for the lay-bye at Knockanaffrin where the day's programme started from and as the fog lifted they really enjoyed their outing to the beautiful valley of the Nire.

OVERTAKEN BY TECHNOLOGY

Sean Dunphy, the man who has rung the bell of S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel, for tens of thousands of Angeluses, Masses, weddings and funerals is taking a deserved rest. Churchgoers over the years have been familiar with the sight of Sean pulling the bell rope in the porch of S.S. Peter and Paul's, but that era came to an end last Thursday when the bell was electrified. The four tonne cast iron bell has been in place in the church since 1930 and for the past 34 years it has been hand rung by Sean Dunphy. The new electric system means that the bell will now be automatically struck by a 60 pound hammer instead of by the clappers inside the bell. The sound is slightly different according to some people. In frosty weather the people of Ballymacarbry could hear that bell toll. The bell is now timed to ring for the Angelus and for Masses and will be manually controlled for funerals and non-routine Masses.

NEW BOOK ON MAURICE DAVIN LAUNCHED

A new book on the first President of the G.A.A., Carrick-on-Suir's Maurice Davin, was launched in Croke Park last week. The book was written by another former President, Seamus O Riain from Moneygall, Tipperary. Present at the function in the G.A.A. headquarters were descendants of Davin from Carrick-on-Suir who said they were delighted to see Maurice Davin's achievements recorded in print. Seamus O Riain said he had always wanted to write about Maurice Davin about whom little has been written and less known, but who had an enormous influence on the infant association. "He was the architect who formed the first rules for hurling, football and athletics for the G.A.A." Maurice Davin is laid to rest in the County Waterford Churchyard of Churchtown on the banks of the River Suir.

The saga over the location of a single sector acute hospital in South Tipperary that has divided the communities at Cashel and Clonmel for the past twenty years is about to end. Intense speculation last week suggests that an announcement by Brendan Howlin, Minister for Health, is imminent and that Clonmel will be chosen as the location of the single sector hospital. The decision would mean the transfer of Surgical Services from Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel to St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel. This news has been well received by people in the Ballymacarbry district as this hospital is only about ten miles from the district.


A DRAMATIC TREAT



JACK CASEY, LEEDS, BALLYNOE AND CONNA, R.I.P.

Profound sorrow was evoked in Ballynoe and Conna during the week past on hearing of the death of Jack Casey, 90 Deanswood Drive, Leeds, England. Jack was born 78 years ago at Cahir, Ballynoe, the only son of Owen and Kathy Casey (nee Leahy). He attended Britway School in his early years and then went to his parish school, Ballynoe for the remainder of his school years as well as two of his sisters Frances and Mary. The family then moved to Kilclare, Conna where they took up residence. Jack spent a few years in the employment of Timothy O'Keefe, Monagown and the still young Jack decided to go to England where he enlisted in the British Army. Warclouds were then looming and in the 1940's he was dispatched overseas and was shortly engaged in a machine gun battle with the Axis powers. Severely wounded he also witnessed the horrific sight of two of his comrades and neighbours from Aghern, Tom and Jim Flynn being fatally wounded. He was taken prisoner and was on the missing list for a couple of years and eventually at the cessation of hostilities he returned safely to England. Having been restored to full health again he found employment as a member of the Post and Telegraph staff. Married to Babs, they had three in the family two girls Sylvia and Heather and a boy, Bob, who was later to become a medical doctor and lecturer and who died a cancer victim at 32 years of age in Helsinki 12 years ago. Jack who was of a quiet inoffensive nature was a popular person with young and old alike. He enjoyed his many trips back to Ireland and loved to meet all his old friends in Conna, Glentrasna and Ballynoe. We will all miss him and his humorous and happy disposition and we express our condolences to his wife, Babs, daughters Sylvia and Heather, England, sisters Cissy Hurley, Kilclare, Eily Broderick, Kilclare, Frances and Mary, Canada, nephews, nieces, grandchildren, relatives and friends. TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

Rules And Changes — Many hurling and football followers don't know the rules thoroughly and yet they reserve the right to criticise the referee, players, officials and others if any of those should breach a rule, even in the slightest. Most players think they know all the playing rules but they don't. Generally speaking most G.A.A. followers are of the opinion that the rules are fine and that any alteration in them wouldn't benefit hurling or football. Perhaps they are right, but lately some changes in the playing rules were announced as was the intention to introduce them throughout the leagues.

Those experimental rule changes will be carefully monitored during the league to assess their impact on the games. It very well may prove that they weren't worth while but we should never fear to experiment with change if we are seeking to eliminate from the games some elements which don't enhance them.

In hurling's case the overall objective is clear, to give primacy to the use of the caman for the purpose for which it was designed i.e. striking the ball. With football the aim is to place more emphasis on the first syllable of the word "football" (Joe Lennon describes this proposed change as "daft").

Do you remember when a hurler was allowed discard his hurley before handpassing? The proposal to amend this rule was heavily criticized as a backward step. It would slow the game to implement the new ordinance and do away with a skill perfected by many, notably Kilkenny. That change obliging the player to retain possession of the stick when handpassing soon gained universal acceptance with Kilkenny, it's most accomplished masters? A similar hue and cry greeted the G.A.A.'s determination to rule out the handpassed goal by insisting that the goalscoring attempt must be made by using the hurley.

We soon saw how teams came to terms with this "unacceptable tinkering with the rules" and backs, in particular, got a fairer deal.

Now a determined effort is to be made to rule out another inelegant feature of hurling: the ungainly kicking of the sliotar! Not before time say I. The real hurlers will now be easily distinguished from the pseudo variety. We won't have to suffer fit footballers running and kicking only when exhaustion overtakes them. The reality of the necessity to hurl the ball will surely then dawn on them. I hope this latest rule change gets a decent chance to justify its introduction.

On rules, I wonder if you watched those recent compromise rules hurling/ shinty games, either live or on television (Ger Harris and Tom Feeney were members of the Under 21 team) and got a good idea of how our game might be if no handling or kicking of the sliotar were allowed. Skill was paramount and any player lacking this key element in his game was disadvantaged. The sliotar needed to be controlled quickly and skilfully and failure in this area meant loss of possession. Frees were few because there was constant movement of the ball and there was neither time nor reason to foul.

That accomplished Cork stickman, Brian Corcoran, enjoyed himself hugely and gave a great display. His quality control and exuberant approach made for good entertainment.

His goals on that Sunday afternoon reminded me that other hurlers can score in similar fashion but seldom attempt the strike off the stick! The game jogging my memory was this year's championship Kilkenny v. Offaly and the hurler that day was the incomparable D. J. Carey. Lifting he turned sharply and soloed at pace towards the Offaly goal pursued by his marker. When D. J. got to the Offaly 21 yard line Jim Troy came out to intercept, presuming that the Kilkennyman would handle the sliotar. Quick as a flash D. J. moved the ball off his hurley to his left side before crashing a stinging left-hander to Offaly's net. He was still travelling at full tilt as he made contact with the ball, leaving Jim Troy helpless. No handling, no fumbling. We saw this score on television several times and it was unhesitatingly adjudged Sunday Game goal of the year. A good choice indeed.

A score like that recalls other scores of that same stamp. Michael Cleary and John Leahy of Tipperary hit spectacular points in the League semi-final and final respectively. Those greats etch themselves in the memory and make us sigh for that increase in skill which makes them possible.

We should continue to encourage our hurlers, idir óg is aosta, to aim for the highest standards. Of course, our coaching should promote this aim. Great skill brings its own reward and personal satisfaction and if those experimental rule changes point the way to a more free flowing spectacular game we should welcome them. Our wish is for the enrichment of hurling so that players and spectators may have increased enjoyment and satisfaction from it.

Teagasc Says

EXTENDED AUTUMN GRAZING

Extended Autumn grazing has received a lot of publicity in recent times. The idea is being researched in Moorepark and a better opinion of the benefits is now becoming available.

At this point, the Teagasc advice is to try to get around grazing and grass utilisation during the April to October period. What can be got earlier or later than April - October will be small in terms of total year's feed.

Extending the grazing season into the early winter requires dry land, a roadway down the middle or all around the grazing area, top class fencing and plenty of drinkers. Whether a farmer is going to do extended grazing this year, has already been decided.

The facilities required limit its usefulness to a small number of farmers. These are showing themselves to be excellent grass managers, from the very good grass and appearance on their farms.

Some others might have an interest in doing a bit of early grazing next year. If so, they should at this stage select suitable dry fields with a southern aspect and close to the road. These fields could be grazed very bare over the next month or so: sheep, lambs or light cattle are best. Arrange to get fertilisers out early. Despite the excellent swards of grass on the farms in extended grazing systems, it is good to remember that it is late Autumn grass — wet, low in energy, not young with little or no clover. To achieve this "stored up" grass tight grazing is required all year and experience on farms and of advisers who have studied the system is that tight grazing of a grass sward with little or no clover will reduce cows milk yield.

Late Autumn grass, without clover should support only moderate milk yields from cows, even when getting meal. With clover the prospects are improved. Autumn calving cows should give 4 1/2 to 5 gallons, with a significant amount of grass, 12 to 14 lbs of meal and a little silage. Higher yielding autumn calving herds of 5-6 gallons or more should walk before they run as regards exploiting autumn grass. Such cows are best kept in at night on good silage and 12 lbs of meal and out by day for a few ours. It makes sense to graze by day in good weather as long as the grass lasts. It also makes sense to get cows into a good house when the cold rain comes in the short November days.

SHEEP

Colour Coding — Most lowland sheep producers begin each breeding season with the intention of knowing exactly what progress is being made by raddling or harnessing the arms. Probably less than 50% of them carry through to the stage where the information is reliable or trustworthy.

Knowing when individual ewes are due to lamb is not just nice information to have, it is also a potential cost saver. For example, two weeks extra feed to late lambing ewes cost up to £2.50 per head. Shepherding is also simpler and most cost effective when ewes can be accurately grouped.

If you have begun by marking the rams, do keep up the effort for the duration of the season. It will be worthwhile.

Progress — In a flock which is cycling normally, over 90% of ewes should be mated within 17 days of ram turnout. Of these, about 70% will conceive, leaving 30-35% of the flock to be mated on the second cycle. This allows ram numbers to be reduced considerably without risk. Rams which are loosing condition rapidly, lame, hurt or sore in the brisket area should be withdrawn.

Ewe Lambs — Well grown lowland ewe lambs can be bred from now on. Those with mountain blood may be a bit slower to take the ram. It is now too late to shear. Dirty or long-wooled lambs should be scutched, however. Remember to use only mature rams with ewe lambs.


Grass — The recent fine spell has resulted in a vast improvement in grazing conditions and a plentiful supply of late grass on many farms. If grass for breeding stock becomes very scarce during mating, introduce some concentrate feed to avoid loss of condition and more importantly loss of embryos. One lb per day would cost about £1.50 per ewe over three weeks. At to-days values one extra lamb per twenty ewes would compensate.

The value of grass for finishing store lambs is declining rapidly from now on and supplementation is necessary for worthwhile performance. For either ewes or lambs, energy is the prime requirement, so beet pulp, barley or mixtures of these with feeds like corn gluten are all quite suitable.

Spring 1995 — Housing ewes from January to March provides an opportunity for resting pastures. For early lambing flocks, this will not be possible as pastures will be expected to carry lambed ewes in late January or February. These fields should be closed now and fertilised with Phosphate and Potash as required following soil analysis. There is no doubt that in mixed farming situations, where sheep constitute a small part of the total livestock units, very handsome profits have been made by producing early lambs off grass. One acre of pasture closed now could carry two to three ewes and their lambs from February onwards. Closed in December, the same pasture would not have accumulated sufficient herbage to make it worth grazing. Silage ground can be particularly suited to this purpose, with the not inconsiderable side effect of improved silage quality.

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The South-East region was very well represented at the ICMSA National AGM held in Limerick last Wednesday, October 12. "Most members travelled by car to the well attended AGM," said John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the south-east region, who was delighted with the attendance from this area.

The day included reports from the chairmen of the various committees, i.e. Dairy (Con Scully), Livestock (Nicholas Ryan), Taxation (Frank Allen), Sheep (Eamonn O'Rourke), Farm Services (Maurice Harvey) and Rural Development (Dan McCarthy). Also considered were Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December 1993, and the President's address.

Finally, resolutions from various county executives were discussed and either passed or rejected. Below, John Quigley outlines a sample of the resolutions that were passed under the various headings:

DAIRYING

That the terms of eligibility for grant aid under the Dairy Hygiene and Farm Pollution Control schemes be revised so that all farmers with significant investments be included.

That more stringent controls, including compulsory isolation in defined locations, be applied to imported breeding stock to give maximum protection to the health status of our national herd.

That the government urgently renegotiate the conditions governing

subsidised milk quotas so that farmers with milk under 30,000 gallons of quota become eligible.

That farmers with less than 40,000 gallons of quota be included in the priority category in the Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme.

LIVESTOCK

That the Government take immediate steps to ensure adequate shipping facilities for all the country's exports.

That the unspent £4.3m. of farmers disease levies contributed in 1993 be used to offset the high losses incurred by dairy farmers in particular in acquiring replacements for their reactor cows and heifers last year.

SHEEP

That the leasing of ewe quotas be arranged through a central agency.

TAXATION AND CREDIT

That Stock Relief and Free Depreciation be reintroduced to assist developing family farms.

That a special Task Force be established by Minister Mary O'Rourke, T.D., to investigate all the various charges inflicted by Lending Institutions on their customers, and that the total intake by the institutions from these charges be established.

That persons whose children do not qualify for third level education grants be allowed expenditure on their education as an expense for tax purposes.

That the Association increase its efforts to get the personal allowances applicable to PAYE persons applied to farmers.

REPS Scheme Compensation For Natural Heritage Areas Unworkable Says IFA Man

The Chairman of Waterford I.F.A. Co. Executive, Mr. Pat Murphy, said that the decision to combine the Rural Environmental Protection Scheme (REPS) and the Natural Heritage Areas (NHAs) was unworkable and unacceptable as it would not adequately compensate farmers whose forestry and other development plans are halted.

The Waterford IFA man said that many farmers stood to lose thousands of pounds annually through NHA designation for their farms. The extra payment under the supplementary measures of REPS of £10 per acre in no way compensates farmers who may be deprived from getting forest premia of up to £120 per acre or the consequential agricultural losses as a result of the freezing of development on their land.

Mr. Murphy called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh to drop the link between NHA and the REPS and instead allow both schemes run separately and independently of each other. As things stand a farmer is not able to draw down the extra payments

for NHA designation of his land unless he is participating in the overall REPS. Where a farmer needs compensation for NHA the only way he can get for such payment is to opt for the REPS.

Mr. Murphy said that a special NHA Scheme should be put in place which would offer varying rates of payment depending on the income losses as a result of designation. Some farmers stood to lose a lot of money as a result of not being fully compensated for income foregone on their land which, as a result of designation, has a very limited usage in terms of income generation.

Concluding, Mr. Murphy said that he was very concerned about the delay in getting the maps of the designated NHA areas published by the Office of Public Works. Many farmers are deeply suspicious of the delay as the final totally designated area may be much larger than the 6% of the county that was suggested earlier. "IFA demands that the Office of Public Work immediately publishes the NHA designated areas and gets the promised appeals process underway without any future delay."







TERRY FOX RUN

Athletics by Race Leader

Sonia O'Sullivan, Ireland's first athlete to win a gold medal at European Championship level, has lent her support to the Irish Cancer Society by acting as Patron for the 1994 Terry Fox Run for Cancer Research which takes place in Dungarvan this Sunday, October 23.

Terry Fox, a young Canadian, whose leg had been amputated because of cancer, set out in 1980 to run across Canada to raise awareness of the need for funds to support cancer research. He died before his journey was completed but his courage and determination have inspired the organisation of annual Terry Fox Runs in over 40 countries worldwide.

The Irish Cancer Society, the major funder of cancer research in this country, introduced the run/walk to Ireland in 1993 with great success. 130 runs were organised nationwide, raising over £140,000 for innovative cancer research in Ireland.

Announcing details of this year's run, Mr. Tom Hudson, Chief Executive of the Irish Cancer Society said that Irish research was a vital element in the fight against cancer in this country. "Research has led to significant advances in cancer diagnosis and treatment and is paving the way to cancer prevention," he said.

IRISH CANCER RESEARCH

Research advances do not generally come in a giant leap forward. Small advances and modifications worldwide help to build up a comprehensive picture and these advances are just as likely to happen in Ireland as anywhere else. This year the Irish Cancer Society will allocate over £218,000 to research in Irish Universities, teaching hospitals and research institutes. £130,000 of this will be allocated to nine Irish research projects from the funds raised in this year's Terry Fox runs. These projects will be based in Dublin, Galway and Cork.





PROGRESS

"Local Authorities have something to learn from Respond," he declared, pointing in particular to maintenance management and the 10 week pre-tenancy training programme. Operating in Waterford and throughout the South East under Fr. Pat Cogan, the Respond provides houses for people on housing lists with a strict income limit of £8,500 p.a.

The agency's allocation of houses was guided by a local authority housing officer.

Responding to Cllr. Wright's concern over a proper entrance to the estate, Mr. Connolly said he was aware of a separate entrance question and assured Cllr. Wright he would look into it at the planning stage.

IDEAL WORLD

Referring to a recent visit to a Respond estate in Clonmel, where Councillors Kyne, Lar Hart, Michael O'Riordan, Nuala Ryan, Damien Dillon and two Comeragh Crescent residents were shown around various houses, Cllr. Ryan revealed she was pleasantly surprised to view the estate and the manner in which it was kept. "It was plain to see that the residents were very proud of their estate," she added.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan also spoke highly of the Respond estate, praising the quality of the houses, electric showers, a choice of carpets, the layout, etc. "The U.D.C. has a lot to learn from Fr. Cogan," he declared, pointing to the massive expense normally incurred after taking up occupation of a house. "There should be a back-up service for Council tenants," he added.

Describing the community effort among the 42 houses

as nothing short of 'fantastic', Cllr. O'Riordan said everyone was equal in the estate.

Having also visited the Clonmel estate Cllr. Damien Dillon said the site was most impressive and well laid out. "Any fear I had was greatly allayed," he added.

THE GO-AHEAD

It now appears certain that the proposed 33 unit residential development at Spring Marquis will come on stream during 1995. These proposals consist of 23 three bedroom houses, 10 two bedroom apartments and a community building on Council land at the back of Dunabbey House.

Mr. Connolly advised the Council members to progress with the scheme and ask Fr. Cogan to proceed with his proposals.


