What's In Store For Oireachtas '94

The last minute details were being finalised this week in Dungarvan for the official opening of Oireachtas na nDéise this Friday, October 28. The town and surrounding area is expected to attract approximately 20,000 visitors to the festival, which has never been held in the Déise before.

Both the Park Hotel and Lawlor's Hotel will accommodate many of the official guests and most of the Oireachtas events will also be held there. B&Bs and guest houses also report a steady stream of bookings over the past few weeks. At this stage, many of the listed places of accommodation have been booked.

Ciarán Mac Mathúna, patron of this year's Oireachtas, will perform the

opening ceremony. RTE will be on hand to televise some of the main events, including the opening concert on Friday, October 28. Cúrsaí, the Irish current affairs programme, will broadcast many items from the Oireachtas during the

following week on Network 2. Pádraig Ó Gaora, head of Nuacht and Áine Ní Fhéinne, reporter with the RTE Nuacht staff, will also be in Dungarvan for the opening.

£.5m For Dungarvan Castle Project

UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne has welcomed the recent £1/2m investment for St. John's Castle which will fund restoration and excavation work on the famous local landmark.

The exciting announcement came at a recent launch of the Operational Programme for Tourism by Minister for Trade and Tourism, Charlie McCreavy T.D.

The impressive twelfth century structure has long been a source of attraction to visitors and tourists in the area and is held in high regard in many circles both at home and on the continent.

Supervised by the Office Of Public Works, the first phase sees the commencement of an archaeological dig, ultimately working towards the complete renovation of the historical monument.

"For the first time in the history of the castle, the state has reinvested", said Cllr. Kyne.

The UDC Chairman declared that as the castle project gets underway it will be seen as an encouragement to the business sector to develop and invest in the Quay area surrounding the castle which is designated under the urban renewal scheme.

Local Pub Changes Hands

One of Dungarvan's oldest pubs, the former Clancy's Corner, reopens this Friday, October 28th under a new name, new management and with a complete new style of its own.

FORMER GAELIC BAR

Situated at the corner of Grattan Square and Davitt's Quay, the pub is well established in the social circles of the town.

Many Dungarvan residents will recall previous owner and local personality, Michael (Micky) Landers who named the 'local' - "The Gaelic Bar". The inter county hurler and his wife managed the bar for almost 50 years, in which time it was hailed as a mecca for all GAA supporters. The Gaelic Bar was also a favourite local venue for the game of 45.

In recent years the pub changed management and was renamed Clancy's Corner after the new owner.

OLD STYLE ATMOSPHERE

"Good Quality beer in old style comfortable surroundings", is the motto by which manager, Pat Morrissey aims to promote the pub.

The veterinary surgeon bought the premises just three weeks ago and plans are now well under way for a grand opening on Friday next, October 28th under the new name "The Lady Belle".

Pat aims to create a somewhat maritime atmosphere while still retaining the old style effect of the premises.

An impressive anchor will be placed on the side wall while the centrepiece behind the bar will be a beautifully restored schooner boat. The front façade of the building will be retained and painted in mustard and bottle green.

Other changes to The Lady Belle include full central heating, a new pine bar, a modern cold room in the back and a horse shoe shaped cushioned seating arrangement in the bar.

Pat knows that first impressions last and is therefore determined to "do the simple things right", before the final curtain is drawn.

The old-fashioned stove, a familiar feature to many of the pub's regular clientele will also be retained as decoration only, while the old wooden paneling along the wall of the bar will be restored to its former glory.

Vital additions to the old pub are proper toilet facilities. The former lobby at the rear will be tiled and modern toilets installed.

THE LADY BELLE

The premises is aptly named after Dungarvan's famous steamer, The Lady Belle.

Owned by Messrs. Moloney & Co., the ship supplied the town with food and other necessities until the roads and rail-

ways were repaired during the Civil War of 1921. According to John Young's 'A Maritime and General History of Dungarvan, 1690-1978' The Lady Belle was a regular visitor to Swansea, Cork, Cardiff, Waterford and Liverpool.

While captained by the well known Abbeyside hero, Tom O'Donoghue, the ship was damaged by a German plane in the Bristol Channel in 1941.

The 140 ft. vessel was later sold to Messrs. Sheehan & Sullivan of Cork.

An interesting shanty for The Lady Belle goes as follows;

"The Lady Belle is a hell of a swell

When she's full of corn 'Tis only when she rounds the Cunnigar Point

'Tis then she blows her horn."

HARD WORK

Pat has employed all local labour for the huge renovation job.

"A reason why the work is moving so fast," said Pat, "is because the carpenters, plumbers, painters, electricians etc., all know exactly what to do and are working independently of each other".

Working tirelessly over the past few weeks, the Dungarvan man can soon relax and 'stand back from it all'. His wife Maeve, will take over as manageress with a competent team of friendly staff.

The old style pub will also offer light refreshments such as tea, coffee and snacks.

Speaking of his plans for the future, Pat hopes to create a meeting room in the former house upstairs.

"Chances like this come only once in a lifetime", says Pat and we wish him well with his new venture.

Ormonde Cinema Guide

SPEED (Cinema 1)

Bursting through the \$100 million mark in just seven weeks at the U.S. box office, Speed now arrives on a wave of particularly strong advance word, with big talk of Die Hard On A Bus, Keanu looking seriously cool, and some of the more spectacular action scenes of the year to date. And that's just the first 45 minutes.

What we have here is one great big action movie, neatly divided into three clear parts. Part one, Die Hard In A Lift: a bunch of innocent wageslaves get stuck in an elevator and psychonutbar Dennis Hopper tries to blow them all up.

Part two, Die hard On A Bus: a bunch of innocent wageslaves are trapped on a bus which the increasingly insane Dennis Hopper will blow up just as soon as it goes under 50 miles per hour.

And part three, Die Hard On a Train: somehow or other Keanu and his bus drivin' chick find themselves alone on a subway train with just old lunatic Dennis for company.

An addictive blast of pure adrenaline, Speed looks all set to be the knee tremblin', white knuckle ride of the year.

BABY'S DAY OUT (Matinee Sunday at 3.00 in Cinema 1)

BROKEN HARVEST (Cinema 2) — When wealthy New York businessman, Jimmy O'Leary (Darren McHugh) learns of the death of his mother back in Ireland, he is immediately brought back to his childhood days spent on a remote farm during the 1950's. In an idyllic rural community young Jimmy spends his summer days reading comics, playing pranks and fumbling around with the local caifin. But when he buys a new comic with money intended for Josie McCarthy's (Niall O'Brien) parish dues, he unwittingly rekindles a vicious feud that had lain dormant for years. Josie and Jimmy's father, Arthur, (Colin Lane) have been sworn enemies since the Civil War when they found themselves fighting over the same country and the same woman. That woman is, of course, Jimmy's mother, Catherine (Marian Quinn). The re-opening of old wounds results in the whole community being split down the middle as the two men attempt to destroy one another. As the drama unfolds it embraces many of the great issues to affect Ireland this century - the Civil War, emigration, and the traumatic effect of encroaching modern technology on a conservative rural community.

High drama, solid performances and fights with pitchforks all combine to make this well worth the admission fee.

Scenic Stradbally Hosts Prestigious Awards

"Making your own place a better place", was the theme of the address by Austin Crowe, Chairman of the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation

(SERTO), at the Regional Tidy Towns Awards ceremony held in the picturesque village of Stradbally last week. Mr. Crowe praised the

committees and workers of the 113 centres in the South East Region who entered the Tidy Towns Competition this year and who, in many cases, from the inception of the competition, had worked extremely hard on a voluntary basis assisted by their Local Authorities and Fas to enhance their local environment.

He stated that in excess of 25,000 people nationwide are now involved in the tidy towns movement and that these were the "unsung heroes" who presented an image of Ireland to our visitors of a country becoming increasingly conscious of the value of its environment.

Mr. Crowe paid special tribute to the Local Authorities, Fas and to the staff of SERTO for contributing so much to the encouragement of these communities in their efforts.

He also had a special word of thanks for the sponsors of the competition and in particular, to Super Valu Supermarkets who are the national sponsors of the competition and who have indicated that they will continue to sponsor for the im-

mediate future. LISMORE ALSO A WINNER

The presentation of the awards was coupled with the announcement that Lismore has been selected by Bord Fáilte to be Ireland's entry in the 1995 European Entente Florale competition.

Congratulating the Cathedral town, Mr. Crowe wished them every success in the competition which he added, "will have the effect of focussing international attention on the lovely heritage town of Lismore".

County Awards were then presented to Stradbally (201 marks), Ardmore on 198 marks and Passage East (194 marks). The Regional Award for the South East winner was subsequently presented to Stradbally in the form of a specially commissioned plaque.

Proudly accepting the prestigious award, George Foley, Stradbally Tidy Towns Chairman said he and his fellow committee members were very proud of their village and clean environment "and we hope to have it looking even better in time for next year's judging, when we'll be looking for those extra marks in the national title", he confidently added.

Successful Sale Of Quigley Site

The famous 65 acre site at Ballinacourty on which the former Quigley Magnesite plant once stood overlooking Dungarvan Bay, went under the hammer last Wednesday at a public auction in the Park Hotel.

A large attendance was recorded at the sale with more than 80 interested parties present.

In the course of the evening's proceedings, two of the four lots were sold, though the remaining two lots, including the 36 acres of the plant's former production area, were withdrawn having failed to reach the reserve price - the highest bids tendered were considered to be insufficient.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Eamon Spratt of co-agents Edmond Spratt & Son Ltd., Grattan House, Dungarvan, reported that the remaining two lots had later been sold the same evening following prolonged negotiations.

Mr. Spratt continued, "the four lots were bought by local solicitors in trust, namely Mr. Niall P. King of Eamonn P. King Solr. and Mr. Joseph Curran of Lanigan Curran Solrs".

"The vendors were satisfied", said Mr. Spratt, "to have successfully disposed of the properties to local interests".

Check list for this month

EXPECT the worst this winter — check garden fixtures before the weather picks on that rickety fence post or lifts that flapping shed roof.

October is ideal, since it's not too cold or warm for heavy work and most growing and planting chores are over. The typical check list is:

SHEDS & outhouses

These need a new coating of preservative at least every three years. Creosote is cheap and effective. Check any glass for damage which might allow weather to rot the structure or damage contents.

However, the most vulnerable point is the roofing: check felt or corrugated sections are soundly fixed or the wind will surely peel them back on a blowy day. If you are in any doubt about a section then replace it rather than face a hasty repair later on a cold and windy day to come!

FENCEPOSTS

Check every post for possible rot and play. If a base is suspect then saw off the rot and drive in a steel fence spike, before re-fixing the remaining length of post and the fence sections.

However, posts often rot from the top because they have not been capped or sawn off at an angle to protect from or shed rain.

In these cases you may save time and money by breaking up the old concrete base and fitting a new post after soaking this in creosote.

Dig a hole at least 18 inches for a base and post supporting a six foot high fence and pack the post tightly with hard core before pouring in cement.

ARRIS RAILS

These cross pieces are often ignored, but a fence section will quickly unravel if one end of a rail comes adrift. They are prone to rot because the wood grain tends to retain rainfall and they are at their weakest where the rail is tapered to fit into the fence post.

Fortunately, unless the entire rail is rotten, you can saw off the end and replace with a galvanised section which then slots into the post.

GRAVEL BOARDS

Close proximity to the soil causes these to rot quickly, but they are easily dug out and replaced. You can also use any old timber, providing it is long enough and saturated in preservative.

FENCE SECTIONS

Check for split or sprung timbers. If they cannot be nailed back properly then replace. Always use galvanised nails when erecting or fixing — for a few extra pence, they will last much longer and save time and effort.

PROTECTION

Having repaired the fence, make sure you protect new wood and coat the entire fence at least every third year anyway.

Creosote is effective but lethal to plants and should be replaced by a 'green' alternative in places where plants grow close to fences and outhouses. **Arthur Hines**

More than 200 public representatives and officials from all over the country attended the informative weekend conference, including three Waterford Co. Council members - Cllr. Nora Flynn, Cllr. Paddy Callaghan and Cllr. Jimmy Quirke.

There was unanimous support for TnG at the seminar, with many constructive recommendations coming from the floor. The new service has the support of all parties, and delegates strongly urged that it be established as soon as possible. Concern was expressed that TnG should reflect regional

cultural and linguistic distinctiveness.

Responding to the debate, Mr. Mac Aongusa said he was heartened by the tremendous vote of confidence in TnG. "The support of local authorities is all the more welcome because of their representative nature and Coiste Theilifis na Gaeilge will take careful note of their recommendations".

NATIONWIDE COURSES

Speaking earlier at the Gweedore seminar, the Chairman of Bord na Gaeilge, Micheál O Muirheartaigh, said that there

should be a standardised system for Irish language adult education involving the VEC network and all other providers of courses nationwide. Mr. Muirheartaigh told the delegates that more Irish language courses should be provided at uniformly graded levels, to ensure that the needs of all adults wanting to learn, or relearn the language can be accommodated, regardless of their proficiency.


Having attended the conference, Cllr. Nora Flynn was highly impressed by the speakers and duly set about increasing Irish language awareness in her own Cap-

poquin area. With the help of local enthusiast, Susan Poole, Cllr. Flynn has organised a 10 week refresher/conversation course catering for all levels of expertise in Irish in St. Anne's School, Cappoquin.

Meanwhile, yet another sign of the increased local interest in our native tongue is the upcoming Oireachtas festival, to be held in the Gaeltacht, An Rinn and Dungarvan from October 28th to November 6th.

Have a tasty bacon whirl



HERE'S a true meat 'loaf' — THIS makes a tasty supper dish or snack for a party.

BACON WHIRL

Ingredients

1/2lb (225g) streaky bacon, minus rind
1/4lb (110g) mushrooms, cleaned
1 small tin dressed crab salt and pepper
13oz (375g) prepared frozen puff pastry, defrosted

Method

Either finely chop the bacon and mushrooms, or put through an electric chopper. Mix with crab and seasoning. Roll out the puff pastry to an



oblong 30.5cm by 20cm (12. x 8 inches). Spread the bacon mixture all over the pastry and roll up carefully lengthwise. Cut into 1.25 cm (1/2in) slices, place on a baking sheet 1 inch apart and bake in a pre-heated oven at Gas Mark 8, 450°F, 230°C for 15-20 minutes. **Serves 6.**

Youth Resolves To Mend His Ways

Tony Condon, Carriglea, Dungarvan resolved to mend his ways when he was ordered by Judge Michael Pattwell at a recent sitting of Dungarvan District Court to remain under the care, direction and supervision of the Court Welfare officer including direction as to where he will live.

At a previous court sitting in September, Condon pleaded guilty to a spate of offences relating to a series of larcenies and burglaries in the Dungarvan area, many of which he committed while on bail.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Joe Lavan, Solr., told the court that Condon had since stayed out of trouble and resolved to mend his ways should the court decide to place him in hostel accommodation.

Judge Michael Pattwell adjourned the case to October 26th for a further Court Welfare Officer's report. In the interim the defendant was placed under the Welfare Officer's supervision. "I hope you will give yourself a chance to change your life", said Judge Pattwell.

£20,000 For Lismore Urban Renewal

Brian O'Shea, T.D., Minister for Food and Forestry has welcomed the announcement that £20,000 has been allocated to Waterford County Council for work in Lismore under the Urban Renewal Grant-in-Aid in 1994.

Work will be done on replacing existing footpaths with cobblelocking paving in main Street, to under-

ground cable and provide ornate lighting in Main Street.

In welcoming this announcement, Minister O'Shea said that the purpose of this scheme in general was to rejuvenate the social and economic life of urban areas and to improve environmental conditions of towns and villages throughout the country.

ACTION AREA PLAN

Meanwhile, John Reid, Town Planner, has been appointed by the UDC to draw up an action area plan for Dungarvan. This action plan will be seen as a promotional package to prospective developers and an indication as to what progress will be deemed favourable in the town's designated areas.

Co. Manager Donal Connolly has stated however that the council is prepared to be flexible regarding development and will take any suggestions on board.

"We may have a further public information meeting at a later stage", he added.

Cllr. Wright declared that with the approach of winter, the 1,150 unemployed in the town would again have to queue outside in the rain.



Since our entry to EEC cheque book power has consolidated land and quota in the ownership of the large and financially strong. This has been allowed to happen by successive Governments in defiance of Article 45.2.3. of our Constitution, which states "that, especially, the operation of free competition shall not be allowed so to develop as to result in the concentration of the ownership of control of essential commodities in a few individuals to the common detriment."

He was a regular attendant at the Easter Commemoration ceremonies and at the Liam Lynch Memorial Mass at Newcastle each year.

He was truly one of nature's gentlemen possessed of a friendly, good humoured and generous disposition. A wonderful neighbour, he was always ready to lend a helping hand as required. He was also a wonderful family man, loving husband and father. 



RECENT DEATHS

Mr. Thomas Cullinan



It is with deep and sincere regret we record the passing of Mr. Thomas (Tommy) Cullinan, Bleantis, Ballinamult, who died at his residence during the early hours of Wednesday morning, October 19, after a rather short duration of illness but at the fullness of years.

He was one of the oldest inhabitants of Sliabh gCua and district and also the last surviving member of his family and of the Waterford Brigade Old IRA and his death marks the end of an important phase in the history of Sliabh gCua.

Tommy is survived by his wife Kitty, sons Jim (Kilbrien), Pat (Bleantis), daughters Nellie - Skehan (Kilmeaden), Bridget Martin (Monaghan), Mary Chambers (Perth, Australia), Catherine Sheehy (Clonmel), sons-in-law Paul Martin, Peter Chambers, Ger Sheehy, daughter-in-law Martina Cullinan, grandchildren Jimmy, Tommy, Edmond, Kenneth, Alan, Peter, Thomas, Evelyn, Lisa and Katie, nieces, nephews and his many relatives and friends, to whom sincere sympathy is extended.

He was a well read and self-educated man and was in many ways ahead of his time. He was a highly respected member of the farming community. He followed his father James T. Cullinan as an elected member of the Knockmeal Co-op Creamery Committee where he was a progressive voice for many years.

As a young man Tommy took an active part in the war of independence up to the Treaty of 1921 and his five military service medals, which were included with the Offerory Gifts at his funeral Mass was a fitting memory to his love of faith and fatherland. The Offerory Gifts also included an autographed copy of Uinseann Mac Eoinis's "Survivors," a history of the story of the Irish struggle for independence, to which Tommy was a contributor.

Tommy was a member of the 7th Battalion Waterford Brigade and his local comrades included Capt. Jack O'Mara (Knockboy), Pax Whelan (Dungarvan), Michael Morrissey (Bleantis), Jack Hickey (Kilbrien), Michael Mansfield (Old Parish) and Tom O'Brien (Dyrick). He remained faithful to the Republican cause down through the years and was a participant in the annual East-

er Commemoration of the Waterford Brigade each year up to the time of his death.

It was fitting that the choir which provided such an appropriate selection of music and hymns at his funeral Mass was led by Teresa Butler, daughter of Tommy's old comrade Jack O'Mara.

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

Unearthing Material — One of the County team management's obvious jobs - it's *raison d'être* many would say - is to prepare and manage the panel at their disposal. This panel should consist of the best players available within and without the County who have given their allegiance to their County. Simple. Oh that it were so simple! It isn't; we have only to read our papers to see how conflicting club and County loyalties, at this time of year in particular, tug at genuine players' hearts, September and October and sometimes November are the months which perennially cause team managements the greatest headaches because at that stage of the season critical County championship games are played and teams facing a junior inter-mediate or senior semi-final or final rely heavily on their inter county stars for leadership and inspiration. Thus some essential members of the county side are unavailable to Waterford for those vital opening rounds of the league. Last Sunday our hurlers showed eight changes from our Munster championship line-out and a fortnight previously we were forced to take on All Ireland champions Offaly with a barely recognisable fifteen. Last Sunday, too, our football team was depleted because of county championship involvement.

If this were an unusual, once-off situation we could grin and bear it and accept it as an aberration. But it is not, and we all know the underlying cause: failure to finish our County championships in time, the direct result of the unwieldy, unsatisfactory structure of the championships, all the championships from Under 14 to senior. There is now such widespread recognition of our predicament and the basic cause of it that I'm encouraged to hope that the clubs of our County will, at last, give serious consideration to a viable alternative and made this problem priority number one on agendas before we face a new season. The County Board would be performing a valuable service if it were to initiate discussion by calling a special meeting - and follow that with another - where all ideas for improvement would get an airing. This is a stratagem we've never tried, I think.

One man seriously concerned about the present situation is Timmy O'Keefe of Clashmore. Waterford G.A.A. has no more committed member and Waterford football no sincerer or more enthusiastic leader than Timmy. His concern for the promotion of our games make him a man well worth listening to. Despite pressure of work - he holds a senior position with Waterford Foods - he makes time

for full club involvement and managing the Waterford football team.

When I spoke Timmy recently he came up with an interesting solution which would provide regular competition and allow a smoother running of our competitions. He could best outline it himself - no better man - and when he does, my wish is that it will fuel the most genuine and caring debate. One element of his plan is the use of Saturdays in the running of a meaningful league which in the early season would help increase fitness levels, provide satisfaction for players and support team-building efforts in preparation for sterner tests ahead.

Another matter exercising Timmy's fertile mind is the big number of talented players, with potential, who never come under County selectors' scrutiny. There are players with junior clubs, perhaps the more unfashionable clubs, who have the potential to be good inter-county material if only they got the opportunity to display their worth. Trials? Even if trials could be held this method of unearthing the required talent is virtually useless. We remember the trials from Joe McGrath's first and second coming. Useless. Held early in the closed season no player, even the best, could properly motivate himself or have a modicum of fitness. Can you imagine the difficulties this "trial" posed for a good young player from, say Modeligo, Melleray or Clashmore who is thrust into a match situation and not having played the game since the exit of his club from the championship the previous June or July. How could he do himself or his club justice?

Because County selectors couldn't be expected to attend all junior games. Timmy doesn't see any reason why our senior championships shouldn't welcome group teams. Our big neighbours Cork and Kerry operate this system and it works satisfactorily. We remember Duhallo's victorious football campaign. What an impetus this win gave to football in every small club of that division. How those hurlers in Barryroe, Timoleague and ever other hurler in the Carbery division exulted in their championship victory a month ago. Could it be denied that a competition which enables a junior player to measure himself against the best seniors helps his development as a paver and that he grows in ability and confidence throughout the campaign? We have an obligation to strengthen the game - it's pretty weak it has to be admitted - so we shouldn't dismiss in peremptory fashion this notion which has proved itself already. The rising tide of a wider involvement of

players would lift many humble boats so why not hear from junior and intermediate clubs.

Last Hope — Our hopes now rest with the junior footballers who at least are in sight of the promised land because on Sunday next it's Modeligo v. Tallow in the Western final commencing at 3 p.m.

The long wait can't have improved Tallow's chances. Still that is no excuse for failing to prepare and Tallow's preparation has gone pretty well given the constraints of shift work and the absence of those working away from home. Modeligo won't come as a surprise packet because we have met already and have a good idea of one another's strengths and weaknesses. Modeligo's team is a nice blend of the experienced and the promising young. The O'Donovan's, Vince and Nicky, the Troy's, the Fitzgeralds, J. P. Ryan and the two Shane's, Reddy and Denn offer a good balance.

Tallow's team has many a hardened championship battler. Mutty Curley, manager, is sure to include Mickey and Philly Curley, Timmy Sheehan and the Murphy's, Kieran and Pat as well as Brian Henley and Gerry Hogan. Colin Cunningham, Denis Martin and Bernard Pratt must figure in his plans while the presence of John P. Grey, Ger Sice, John and David Doyle gives the manager further options, not to mention his youngest star Stephen Curley.

It should be a close, hard encounter with everything, as usual, depending on which side makes greater use of chances.

Explanation — Many people were taken aback at W.L.R.'s announcement last week that "Tallow have conceded a walk over to Lismore in next Saturday's Western minor hurling final".

In clarification it must be pointed out that Tallow have a minor panel of 19. Recent minor hurling and football matches cost us dearly with 7 players incurring injury - 4 broken fingers, a fractured arm, a broken toe and a badly bruised back. The panel includes 5 Under 16's and when you take 7 from 19 you know the answer and its implications for any side facing a final.

Tallow sought a postponement but the Western Board couldn't accede to that request. We are in no way annoyed but that decision only disappointed the lads who battled hard to reach a final and who now can't part because 15 fit players aren't available. Nor are we resentful that Lismore are deemed Western champions. They have already had to wait quite a while for the final.

We are also anxious that the radio statement shouldn't be

misinterpreted as Tallow pique or pettiness when a postponement wasn't granted. Good luck to Lismore in the final.

TEAGASC Says

GRASSLAND

The grazing season will soon be coming to an end. In general, cows should be left out as long as possible, at least part-time. If possible, all the grass should be grazed off — this will improve the sward, crowd out some of the weeds and increase the clover content of the sward next year.

This means that all of the old grass and whatever fresh grass grows should be eaten between now and Christmas. Obviously cows and heavy cattle could do too much poaching damage.

Light stock and sheep are best, if they are available, particularly so for a light grazing of reseeded ground. It has become normal to look on Winter as a period of no activity as far as grassland is concerned. This should not be the case. The two critical periods of the grassland year are the early Winter and the early Summer. All the good processes in grassland improvement at this time of year depend on bare grass with light getting right down to the clay.

WINTER FEED

A successful Winter feed programme depends on careful planning at this time of year. Do not depend on Autumn grass to bring early calving cows into the right condition for calving. Both intakes and energy levels can be low and late season grass is not well balanced for minerals. Have all silage cuts analysed. You might argue about the benefit of silage analysis but one thing it does — it will let you know if you have a poor fermentation in time to do something about it. This is more important than every this year.

Feed the best silage at the right time. Ideally all freshly calved cows should have first cut silage nine times out of ten it is the best. This may be difficult if the first cut is buried below the second and later cuts. If this is the case, plan to make appropriate changes for next Winter. If you must change early calving cows from one silage to another, make sure you do it gradually. To maintain milk protein levels throughout the Winter at reasonable levels feed a good quality, starch-energy based concentrate right from the start of the lactation and stick with it.

SHEEP

KEEP YOUR SHEEP FLOCK HEALTHY THIS WINTER: The market demand is for high quality lamb produced from natural based systems. A high standard of animal welfare will enhance the image of Irish Agriculture and improve profitability.

It is vital to have a carefully planned disease control routine and this should be fully discussed with your veterinary surgeon who can make recommendations based on local knowledge and first hand experience of the flock. The plan should be written down and adhered to. The value of good flock records cannot be overstressed.

An ear tagging system can be used to identify problem ewes and specific remarks written opposite the ear numbers will provide useful information for subsequent culling. All dead sheep should be disposed of quickly and deaths in unusual circumstances should be investigated by veterinary examination. In this way a picture of disease problem specific to the farm can be built up.

ROUTINE TREATMENT: It is not possible to give detailed information on disease control in this short article but certain problems relate to all farms and the following programme is fairly typical:-

- * All purchased ewes and ewe lambs should be vaccinated against Clostridial and Pasteurella disease. A history of veterinary treatment on the previous farm is an advantage.

- * Worm dosing of the ewe may be carried out at housing or at lambing time in the case of outwintered ewes.

- * Fluke dosing will be required during October/November period on affected farms and again during the January/February period.

- * Efficient sheep dipping will control external parasites including Sheep Scab.

- * Footrot causes unnecessary suffering and indirectly causes financial loss to the farmer. Paring the feet exposes infected tissues to fresh air, and this aids healing. Formalin does not work in the presence of organic matter. Zinc Sulphate is a safer produce and does not irritate the feet to the same extent.

- * Abortion problems can only be dealt with properly under veterinary supervision. Toxoplasmosis is now a common cause and is spread through fodder contamination by cats. A vaccine is available through veterinary surgeons.

- * Orf infection is a common virus disease of sheep characterised by scabbing lesions, particularly around the mouth and nostrils of lambs. A vaccine is available but should not be used on farms which do not have a problem with Orf.



FARMING LEADER

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The County Chairman, John Skehan, said ICMSA has called for the speedy establishment of the New Appeals Body, as promised to farmers in the Programme for Competitiveness and Work (PCW) and he expressed the hope that the Appeals Body would examine all outstanding problems and not just those arising under the 1994 schemes.

"ICMSA was responsible for obtaining a commitment during the negotiations for the PCW that the Government would establish a formal procedure for dealings with farmer complaints with regard to premium and headage schemes. We have reminded the Department of this commitment many times and we are now calling for its prompt introduction.

"Our hope is that under the proposed new system,

complex problems will be solved quickly and efficiently and that farmers will be satisfied that their individual circumstances are examined in detail," said the County Chairman.

"The need for this body is not a criticism of the work of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry. In many instances problem cases have been satisfactorily resolved through contact between ICMSA and the Department. However, for a number of complex cases, the Appeals Body should be more effective in resolving the problem," said the County Chairman.

Meanwhile the County Executive welcomed the decision of the Department of Agriculture, Food & Forestry to change the rules regarding eligibility for dairy hygiene grants. ICMSA had succeeded in

obtaining this change which means in effect that more dairy farmers will qualify for a grant, or for a higher rate of grant, under the dairy hygiene grants scheme.

As sought by ICMSA, quota purchased under the Restructuring scheme in the past three years, as well as quota purchased under the current scheme, will not now be added to an applicant's quota. This is a positive step and one to be welcomed by dairy farmers.

Meanwhile, ICMSA are advising farmers to continue to restrict entry on to their farms until such time as appropriate legislative changes

are made to the law on Occupiers Liability.

PRO for County Waterford ICMSA, Tom Hickey, said that ICMSA is very concerned that the Recommendations of the Law Reform Commission do not go far enough towards reducing the level of farmer responsibility for accidents occurring to uninvited persons while on a farmer's land.

In particular, ICMSA is concerned at the recommended definition of the term 'visitor' which they say in effect would provide an opt out mechanism for trespassers.

IFA Demand A Minimum Base Price Of 97p/lb. For Lamb

With the French market returning 16.5FF to 17FF/kg. together with skins making £5.50 each, the lamb factories should be paying a minimum base price of 97p/lb for lamb according to Waterford IFA Sheep Committee, James

Coughlan.

Mr. Coughlan said that 16.5FF/kg. coupled with £5.50 each for skins was returning a gross of 105p/lb. to the factories and based on this return, they should be paying a minimum base price of 97p/lb to farmers.

Mr. Coughlan said that there is a very strong demand in France at the moment for lambs with a big retail promotion by one of the major supermarkets, Intermarche.

The Kinsalebeg sheep farmer said that he expected lamb prices to harden significantly between now and Christmas. "On the hoggett price for next Spring there is no reason why prices will not be familiar to last year's level when they peaked at 140p/lb. in late March.

The IFA sheep farmer leader said that the store trade has picked up significantly in the marts in recent days, with up to £1/kg. being paid by feeders.

On the light lamb trade, Mr. Coughlan said that following market investigations, new opportunities were developing, particularly in relation to meal feeding for specific outlets. He said: "It is clear that we can compete in this market and our objective must be to build on what we have achieved and capture a larger slice of this market."

Local Finalist For Best Breeder Title

Seven finalists have been shortlisted for Ireland's "Best Breeder" farming Award, sponsored by Kerrygold and the Irish Farmers Journal. The winners of this competition, which is in its first year, will win a study for two to the world's best source of information on dairy breeding, as selected by the winners themselves.

The finalists have been shortlisted from a large entry and are currently being visited by Dr. Geoff Simm from the Institute of Animal Genetics in Edinburgh and Con Hurley, dairy Editor of the Irish Farmers Journal. The judging panel is chaired by Tom Cleary, Chairman of the Irish Dairy Board. The Co. Waterford finalist is James Foley, Ballyneety, Dungarvan.





Bord na Gaeilge agus an tOireachtas

The Oireachtas is very important for the Irish language community, according to Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh, Cathaoirleach of Bord na Gaeilge. "It provides an opportunity for those interested in Irish music, song, dance, language and culture to get together and have a good time." As the biggest festival of Irish heritage and culture, the Oireachtas is a vital mechanism for the promotion of the Irish language and Bord na Gaeilge is proud to be associated with it. This year the Bord is sponsoring a number of competitions and events in Dungarvan over the days.

Positive Trends

Bord na Gaeilge is conscious that interest in the Irish language and all

things Irish in on the increase. The most recent Census of 1991 showed that an increasing proportion of the population can speak Irish. This is most encouraging, says the Chief Executive of Bord na Gaeilge, Mícheál Ó Gruagáin. "I am pleased that the County Waterford figures followed the nationwide trend and that the number of Irish speakers in the county is now 18,232, or 37.2% of the population."

The response received by Bord na Gaeilge to their freephone service, giving details of Irish language adult education classes, showed that there is a huge interest in learning Irish throughout the country. Deireann Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh, "Tar éis an

spéis a léiríodh sna ranganna Gaeilge, deineadh chinneadh ar lá speisialta imeachtaí a eagrú ag an Oireachtas i mbliana." "Lá na bhFoghlaimoírí" will consist of a range of activities to cater for adult learners of Irish and those with a basic knowledge of the language.

Services In Irish

Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh says that there is a reservoir of bilingual potential in the community which is not being realised. "We have a duty to serve the linguistic, social and cultural needs of these people," he says. Bord na Gaeilge is working closely with the state sector in promoting the use of Irish and ensuring that the State takes a leading role in the creation of a bilingual Ireland. Progress is being made. The Bord is also actively promoting the use of Irish among the business community. "There has been a noticeable increase in Irish language advertising," says Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh, "guidelines have been drawn up and brochures published giving advice on how to further the use of Irish in business." Tá Bord na Gaeilge ag obair leis na hóstáin, na títhe tabharne agus le siopaí, go háirithe, sa ghnó seo.

The establishment of Teilifís na Gaeilge is another area where the

State is providing valuable support for the Irish language. "When Teilifís na Gaeilge comes on air, a giant step will be taken in developing a truly bilingual society. This will be particularly important for the younger generation, for whom television is a very large part of their lives," says Ó Muircheartaigh.

Bord Na Gaeilge Ag Tacú Leis An Oireachtas

As well as organising "Lá na bhFoghlaimoírí", the Bord is also hold-

ing its monthly board meeting in Dungarvan on Friday, October 28, in honour of the Oireachtas being held here. Bord na Gaeilge is closely involved in a number of other events at the festival. Tá an Bord den tuairim go bhfuil an t-aos óg an-tábhachtach do thodhchaí na teanga. Tá an comórtas Fonn do dhéaghóirí á reachtáil ag an mBord ag Oireachtas na mbliana seo. The Fonn competition is for newly composed songs in Irish, and 11 groups from all over the country will take to the stage at the Dungarvan Sports Centre on Saturday night, October 29. Among the prizes will be studio time in Bord na Gaeilge's own studio in Dublin. "Tá comórtas mar seo an-tarraingteach do dhaoine óga," arsa Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh. "Baineann siad spórt as an gcomórtas agus tá an Ghaeilge á h-úsáid acu mar theanga bheo."

A unique aspect of our language and culture is the 'Agallamh Beirte' and 'Lúibíní' competition, which is an institution of the Oireachtas. This year's competition takes place in Coláiste na Rinne on Saturday, November 5 at 2 p.m. and is sponsored by Bord na Gaeilge. Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Supt. Ray McAndrew informed the court that on November 26th last the defendant was searched under the Misuse of Drugs Act at Davitt's Quay where he had thrown a joint containing .038 grams of cannabis resin on the ground.

In the intermittent period, Carlton had refused to present himself for sampling and had since travelled to England where he had found employment.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Niall King Solr., told the court that the cannabis had been for Carlton's own use. The defendant had no previous convictions and had since given up the drug.

Judge Michael Pattwell subsequently imposed a £250 fine.







It has been confirmed that Macnas will perform their highly acclaimed show, Sweeny, on Sunday night in the town's Sports Centre. This will form part of the Scléip na hOige weekend at which about 800 young people are expected to attend.
