# Central Dairies Plant to Close

The shock disclosure of the pending shut down of Dungarvan's long established Central Dairies plant was announced early last Friday at a meeting between plant workers and management officials.

In trade for over 40 years as a private limited company for local farmer/suppliers, Central Dairies Ltd. was acquired just two years

ago by Waterford Foods plc., Ireland's market leaders in liquid milk and fresh dairy products. The controversial move to close the

plant follows a decision by the Board of Waterford Foods plc to concentrate its liquid milk business in fewer sites.

The Shandon plant is expected to close on March 31 of next year with subsequent job losses estimated

# Council Hard Pressed To Balance Books

As harried Waterford County Council members arrived last Monday for the first round of the annual estimates meeting, the cash strapped Council's dilemma was only all too evident as a picket line protesting against proposed increases in water and service charges was there to greet each councillor.

### "DIFFICULT FINANCIAL POSITION"

Reaction to Co. Manager Donal Connolly's report was generally mixed among the 21 members present as he proposed sweeping increases of 23% on domestic water charges, 10% on commercial water charges and 33 1/3% for refuse collection. "While the percentage increase appears high, I am satisfied that the charges for both the water supply and refuse collection services are quite reasonable having regard to the service being provided", Mr. Connolly stated in his report. The detailed report also stressed the 'very difficult financial position' in which the Council has found itself over the past number of years, a fact which was greatly evidenced by last year's estimates meetings when councillors teetered on the brink of dissolution, being granted a time extension by the Minister to come to an 11th hour agreement.

Against this cash strapped background Mr. Connolly believes he has done the best he could, keeping charges to a minimum and providing badly needed funds for the upgrading of County and Regional roads,

public toilet services, beach cleaning and library services, all of which had earned Waterford Co. Council considerable criticism during 1994 for inadequate provision of services. As stated in his report, Mr. Connolly firmly believes the Council has to provide a reasonable level of service within the County to ensure the proper development of the county in the years ahead.

"Unless adequate monies are expended on the maintenance of the Regional and County Road System, Water Supplies etc.", warned the County Manager "the Council will, over a number of years, lose very valuable assets valued at many millions of pounds built up over many years. There is no room for reductions in this expenditure", he further warned.

### 'ALARMING' NEWS

Tramore Councillor, Con Casey, said it was alarming to hear the Council's finances were in such a 'bad state'. While concerned over the proposed increases in water charges (£26 increase for domestic charges), Cllr. Casey welcomed the re-introduction of a provision for public toilets throughout the County for 6 months. For tourist areas,

# A Villiers-Stuart Wedding In Bosnia

Married recently in Bosnia was Sarah Scott, granddaughter of Gertrude Villiers-Stuart of Dromana, Villierstown.

Longtime residents of Villierstown will remember that Gertrude Villiers-Stuart (Lady Scott) married Sir Basil Scott of Bombay, India and was instrumental in rescuing Dromana from the Land Commission. She later gave Dromana to Fitz Villiers-Stuart and his family.

In the new year, Barbara Grubb, daughter of James Villiers-Stuart, and her three children will be moving into the famous West Waterford landmark - Dromana House.

Sarah Scott, daughter of Cherry Scott was convoy driving in Bosnia for 14 months when she met and later married Bernard Boras, a Catholic Croat, who was a hero of Sarajevo by rescu-

ing over 8,000 people despite the Serb occupation.

Bernard's family themselves were rescued by an Austrian friend, Nicolai Eltz.

The happy couple were married on October 15th last in St. James Church, celebrated by Fr. Svetozar and attended by among others, Milona Von Hapsberg, daughter of the Archduke of Austria, Ottio Von Hapsberg and distant cousin of Sarah. Nicolai Eltz was bestman. During the wedding ceremony, the sound of shelling could still be heard from Mostar.

The wedding reception started with a fuselage of gunfire followed by a tradi-

tional procession of the Croatian flag and a very special type of Croatian singing. The couple were invited to spend their honeymoon in the castle in Austria belonging to the family of Nicolai Eltz.

The work of Sarah and Bernard's organisations is still continuing with over 500 refugees arriving each day. The need is still acute as these refugees have no clothes, food or possessions.

ous Tramore business interests who would be willing to help the Council in this regard. As outlined in the report, however, Mr. Connolly said he would endeavour to avail of such employment schemes as may be available to supplement this provision. "I will also be prepared to discuss ways and means with local communities and enable them to assist the Council in the provision and maintenance of public conveniences", he added.

Also alarmed at the proposed increases, Cllr. Willie McDonnell pointed specifically to the proposed £35.98 commercial rate for shops and businesses.

With County and Regional roads on the Council's priority list for the past five years, Cllr. McDonnell said he was glad to see an increased allocation of £459,700 for road maintenance this year. "The abuse we have received from rural people is unreal", he stated, regarding the deplorable state of the County's pot-holed roads.

## 'JOKE OF CENTURY'

Also reacting to the Manager's proposed book balancing implementations, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally welcomed the increase in the provision for road and public toilet maintenance. "The County was the joke of the century last year, when we closed all the public toilets", he declared.

Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan said an alternative source of revenue was needed other than a 23% increase in water charges and 33 1/3% increase in refuse collection. Representing the interests of the East Waterford Tramore town, Cllr. O'Callaghan said the managers proposals were asking Tramore townspeople to subsidise for County roads at a time when Tramore was without even a basic public lighting system. "I cannot support these water charges", he firmly declared.

## 'REDUCED TO TAX COLLECTORS'

Another councillor opposed to water charges was Cllr. Tony Wright who claimed he would not support any water charges even if it were reduced to .05p. Slamming the 'unbelievably bad' budget passed by Council members last year, Cllr. Wright said members were now reduced to debt and tax collectors. "That's not what I put myself forward for", he slammed. Cllr. Wright then warned of the realistic consequences of implementing a 33 1/3% increase on refuse collection. "It's going to encourage widespread dumping ...

and that's a reality", he stressed.

## 'INEQUITABLE SYSTEM'

Although praising the Manager's good efforts to balance the books, Cllr. Pat Leahy strongly criticised the service charges of being inequitable.

"Rural Ireland is being washed out", declared Cllr. Leahy adding there was no equity in a system where people pay different rates.

Also airing his views on the Managers proposals, Cllr. Billy Kyne said a 10% increase in commercial rates was 'significant' for smaller shops and family groceries in the County. Realising the seriousness of the situation, however, Cllr. Kyne warned that were the Council to remove water charges members could then "just turn off the lights".

The Labour councillor then called for the waiver scheme to be re-examined. This scheme allows for old age pensioners, people on social welfare and those on certain incomes to qualify for relief from water charges.

## MAJOR FUNDING PROBLEM

Confirming that he would certainly re-examine the waiver scheme, Mr. Connolly responded to the members criticisms by stating that local authorities had no choice other than to operate a realistic charge for services.

"The total tax paid isn't adequate to meet the services provided - that's the reality in the Country", he submitted.

As stated in his report, Mr. Connolly claims that funding of local authorities, "has, and continues to be, a major problem for local authorities and particularly for Waterford County Council".

As in the words of his predecessor, Dan Hurley, the County manager said there was a need at national level to review the whole system of funding for local governments.

His views were certainly shared by various council members such as Cllr. Austin Flynn who deplored the manner in which the Minister has treated local authorities. "He's expecting us to act as tax collectors", Cllr. Flynn added. "It would be farcical if we had to close down basic services".

Cllr. Jackie Fahey was also critical of the entire funding system, declaring that the responsibility and accountability of local authority members was 'constantly being eroded'.

On a proposal by Cllr. Con Casey and seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey it was

unanimously decided that the Council communicate with the Minister for the Environment, highlighting the dire straits of the Council's meager finances.

Whatever about government funding; however, Council members will certainly go to the wire this year over the proposed increases in service charges.

The deadline for striking a rate is December 5th. With a second estimates meeting already fixed for Friday, 25th November, it remains to be seen whether councillors will resolve their differences or whether Waterford County Council will go to the brink of dissolution.

# Time To Be Led Up The Garden Path



Garden paths are a carefree route during wet and muddy weather and also stop feet compacting soil and damaging drainage. But paths must be laid and maintained and there is no better time for such warm work than when the weather is cooler.

With water and mud building up over winter, you should also see where a new and more permanent route is needed.

A typical problem is the damage done to a lawn in winter when it is used as a route to a shed or the washing line.

This can be cured unobtrusively and elegantly by round paving stones let into the lawn at intervals.

Avoid a straight line — the path will be more attractive if it snakes or curves — but make sure the stones are recessed to clear the mower blades next spring!

Small slabs can also be used as hard points in deep borders for weeding, hoeing and other access.

Alternatively, a gravel path can be tailored into a meandering and elegant route through borders. Unfortunately, this medium can allow weeds to poke through unless a powerful chemical is used, or the gravel is laid using a more substantial and time-consuming method:

1. Dig out at least three inches of soil and fill with coarse gravel.
2. Compact with a roller to create a tight impenetrable layer.
3. Top with lighter gravel, perhaps one of the coloured types available.
4. The topping must not stand proud of the surrounding area or passing feet will scatter the chips, although this can be countered by edges of angled bricks, split logs, fencing lathes or a proprietary design.

However, such a path may still not be tough enough for a route taking wheelbarrows, busy foot traffic, prams or bicycles.

Concrete is the cheapest answer then and easy to lay and shape, but it can look boring and become discolored and prone to algae, although it can be jazzed up with colouring or made into shapes using DIY moulds.

Ready-made paving slabs are another alternative but hard to cut and shape for anything more than geometric shapes.

Somewhere in between these extremes is crazy paving or the small blocks which have become so popular, despite their cost. Such materials can be laid in shapes and patterns — blocks can be herringboned or laid to other patterns — but they do need secure footings.

Start by digging at least five inches below the base of the actual paving, so that a three-inch core can be laid before a two-inch layer of sand and cement.

Crazy paving should then be laid, large lumps first, followed by smaller ones, before the whole is seated in mortar and the gaps dusted with dry sand and cement.



# Intoxicated Man In Gross Contempt Of Court

Appearing at Dungarvan District Court last week in an obviously intoxicated state was John Cawley, the Halting Site, Shandon, Dungarvan who was held by Judge Michael Pattwell to be in gross contempt of court due to the highly intoxicated state he was in.

Solicitor for the accused, Mr. Joe Lavan, accepted that was the case and apolo-

gised for his client.

Cawley faced charges of driving with excess alcohol, with no driving licence and of driving with no insurance at O'Connell Street on May 13th last.

Judge Pattwell however refused to deal with the charges, given the condition the accused was in.

Cawley was subsequently committed to prison for 2

days to appear before Judge Pattwell again at last Friday's sitting of Tallow District Court.

When he appeared before that court, Cawley was sentenced to one months imprisonment for driving with excess alcohol.

The conviction was endorsed and he was disqualified from driving for 3 years.

However, Judge Pattwell

said he would not issue a warrant in respect to the prison sentence pending Cawley's suitability to undertake 100 hours community service instead and he adjourned the case to Dungarvan District Court on December 14th.

In addition, Judge Pattwell imposed a one month concurrent sentence for uninsured driving in lieu of another 100 hours community service. Cawley was also fined £20 for not having a current driving licence.

## Late Father Andrew Moore, D.C.L.

It is with deep and sincere regret that we record the untimely death of Father Andrew Moore of 'Ard Mhuire,' Boolavoonteen, Ballinamult, which took place at Ardeken Regional Hospital, Waterford on Tuesday, October 25, following a short illness.

Father Moore was born in Waterford in 1925 and was educated at St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny, following which he entered St. John's College, Waterford, where he remained for two years.

He was then accepted for the Diocese of Westminster, went to Allen Hall, Ware, Hertfordshire, where he completed his studies and was ordained priest in 1949.

For the next two years Fr. Moore carried out pastoral duties in London and in 1951 he attended the Gregorian University, Rome, where he studied for and obtained a degree in Canon Law. In 1953, he returned to Allen Hall as a Professor of Canon Law and lectured to students for the next sixteen years. From 1969 until 1972 he was Chancellor of Westminster Diocese following which he was appointed Parish Priest.

In 1982 he moved to St. Bonaventure's, Welwyn Garden City, Hertfordshire where he remained until his retirement in October 1992. He loved Welwyn Garden City and always looked forward to St. Patrick's Day which he declared as his "official birthday" and which provided an excuse for a party in the parish hall adjacent to the church. He entertained his parishioners by singing a song or two followed by a few steps of a hornpipe.

Father Moore was a regular visitor to Ireland and maintained contact with his relatives and some former parishioners who had returned from Britain and settled near the foothills of the Comeragh and Knockmealdown Mountains. He was so impressed by the beauty and tranquility of the locality that when he retired from his pastoral duties in October 1992, he gravitated to Boolavoonteen, Ballinamult, from where he had spectacular views of both mountain ranges. Although his stay was shortlived, he enjoyed the friendliness and humour of the people, the beauty of his surroundings and never regretted his decision.

Father Moore possessed a deep faith and his priesthood and ministry meant everything to him. He had a great gift of listening and concentration and would never dismiss any topic until he had clarified the logic of the conversation. He will be remembered as a person who spoke quietly, yet deliberately, was sensitive to the feelings of others, gentle in manner and a ready listener. His forty-five years of priestly work has enriched many priests and people and he will be sadly missed by all those who had the privilege of knowing him.

On Friday, October 28, Requiem Mass was concelebrated at The Holy Trinity Cathedral, Waterford, the chief celebrant being Most Rev. James O'Brien, Bishop of Westminster. Following Mass, Fr. Moore's body was interred in the family grave at Ballygunner.







## DEATH OF THEOLOGY EXPERT

The diocese of Waterford and Lismore are the poorer at the passing of Dr. Tom Marsh from Ardfinnan who served as lecturer and professor of Dogmatic Theology at Maynooth College for eighteen years up to his death last week and in recent times published a book on The Holy Trinity called "The Triune God". Dr. Marsh who was in his early sixties died before his book was launched.

Dr. Marsh was born in 1932 at Gormanstown, Ardfinnan. Both his parents were school teachers and he was predeceased by a brother and sister. He received his early education at Gormanstown National School, from there he went to Mount Melleray Secondary School and from there to Maynooth where he was ordained to the priesthood in 1957.

He studied classics for his B.A. degree which was followed by a distinguished course in theology which culminated in the doctorate which he received in the late 50's. He served for a time in the diocese of Southwork, England. On his return to this country, he was appointed to the staff of St. John's College, Waterford and in 1976 he joined the staff of Maynooth College. His main specialisation was in sacramental theology, particularly the sacrament of Confirmation. He also wrote many learned articles on theology in various journals. Not surprisingly for some one hailing from Ardfinnan, he was keenly interested in the G.A.A. and especially Gaelic football and for a time served as a selector on the Tipperary senior football team. When Monsignor Michael Olden P.P., S.S. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel was President of Maynooth, he was a great colleague of Dr. Marsh's, his twenty years working with him and also when both men served at St. John's in Waterford.

Paying tribute to the late Dr. Marsh, Monsignor Olden said he was a much beloved and loyal member of the staff at Maynooth College, he was scholarly but also extremely human and kind. Dr. Marsh was laid to rest last Thursday in the cemetery attached to Maynooth College. His book The Triune God, will be launched posthumously at Maynooth by Cardinal Cathal Daly, Primate of All Ireland.

## LATE MR. THOMAS FAHY

It is with deep regret we pen the death of Mr. Thomas (Tommy) Fahy, Cappelquin and formerly of Knockanaffrin, Ballymacarbry, which sad event took place at St. Vincent's Hospital, Dungarvan on Friday, November 11.

The 1995 estimates as placed before the Commissioners provided for expenditure amounting to £5,150 and a rate of £1.6051 in the pound, being a 2% increase over 1994.

With regard to Commissioners expenses, B. Leddy queried the amount of £400 p.a. expenses and stated that over the five years of the Commissioners, some £18,000 would be paid out under this heading.

J. Heneghan stated that other sectors in the community do not give up such expenses, but if any particular individual wanted to donate his or her share to a worthy cause, then this option was always open.

Following further discussion B. Leddy proposed that the Commissioners provide for only half the stated amount in the coming year. There was no seconder to this motion, which was then declared lost.

The Clerk stated that a sum of £250 was provided under the heading of elections which over the next four years would provide sufficient amount to cover for this item. In relation to other expenses, he hoped that this figure would become the basis for a reserve fund for the future and take account of any unforeseen expenditure.

Proposed by P. Dowd, seconded by B. Leddy and resolved that the rate of £1.6051 in the pound and the estimate of expenses for 1995 as presented, be adopted. This was accepted as it was only a 2% increase on previous year.

## LISMORE CANAL

The County Council was complimented on the fine job being done in cleaning the canal. Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey proposed, seconded by B. Leddy, that the Castle be requested to repair all the walls on the approaches to the town, in particular the stone wall immediately beyond the canal.

## LETTER FROM THE COUNTY LIBRARIAN

B. Leddy stated that he had been in contact with Maureen Fox regarding the complimentary paper for the local library and he would

have a further update for the next meeting.

## PROGRESS ON 150th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FAMINE

B. Leddy reported on his visit to the County Librarian. He stated that he would have further proposals regarding same at a forthcoming meeting.

## STREET BINS

D. Whelan again requested that a bin be provided at New Street, at a particular location. He stated that there was a big family in the house and a bin was very much required. R. Canning stated that there was too great a span between the present bins in New Street. P. Dowd felt that East Main Street could also do with a bin, judging by the amount of litter in the area.

The Clerk stated that he would bring these matters to the attention of the area engineer.

Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey queried why there was not a constant charge for the refuse service around the country.

## STONE WALL, TALLOW ROAD

P. Dowd requested that holes in the dry stone wall near the Christian Brothers Secondary School be repaired before they developed further. The Clerk stated that this was not a matter for the Council, but he would refer it to the area engineer.

## NOTICES OF MOTION

B. Leddy moved on notice: "that the Commissioners contemplate recent newspaper reports that suggest changes in constituency boundaries for West Waterford are under consideration."

He stated that it was his information that West Waterford was being considered for inclusion again in the South Tipperary constituency.

J. Heneghan stated that as the Boundary Commission was a non-political committee, there was very little they could do until proposals were published.

J. Heneghan moved on notice: "that a plan of action be devised for the life of this Commission under the headings amenities, infrastructure, employment, housing, tourism, education. Where possible, sub-committees be formed to report to the Town Commission meeting on progress being made on work decided on by meetings."

He reiterated the concept behind his motion as discussed at previous meetings.

He then went on to call for nominations for people who were interested in the various headings outlined in his motion.

The following expressed their interest as follows: Employment — B. Leddy and R. Canning; Tourism and Environment — Mrs. Fenton-Morrissey and O. Madden; Infrastructure — P. Dowd and R. Canning; Amenities — D. Whelan and O. Madden; Housing and Education — J. Heneghan.

It was agreed that each Commissioner would set three or four goals within the framework of their particular field during their term of office and strive to achieve results.

P. Dowd moved on notice: "that the Commissioners highlight the continuing problem of vandalism in the town." He stated that while vandalism was not a major problem in the town, nevertheless, some problems were being experienced. In particular, damage in the shape of cutting with a saw some of the timber lats in the public seating and damage to the trees and telephone kiosk was to be condemned. Stating that we have a lot going for us in Lismore and every effort should be made to protect what we have. He went on to request that people be vigilant and report any acts of vandalism. All concurred with P. Dowd's sentiments.

B. Leddy moved on notice: "that Lismore T.C. support the entry of Lismore in the 'Entente Florale' competition." He felt that the Commissioners should be proactive and not inactive in this matter and should support the tidy towns with regard to this matter.

J. Heneghan felt that there was no question of not supporting their efforts in this regard but the best method of doing so was another matter.

P. Dowd felt that it was up to each Commissioner to use his or her contacts. Following a further discussion, it was agreed on a proposal of P. Dowd, seconded by Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey that a vote of congratulations be sent to the tidy towns committee and to wish them well in the competition.

## TOWN CROSSING

Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey stated that this was a matter that should be looked at again, especially with the implications of a community school for the area. In reply to a query from R. Canning, the Clerk stated that previous studies on pedestrian movement did not warrant a zebra or other type crossing at the

convent.

J. Heneghan stated that he foresaw major traffic problems with regard to the narrowness of the approach at the CBS. P. Dowd stated that it was now the practise elsewhere to drop children in car parks and other safe places some distance from the school. He went on to propose that the area engineer look at the option of providing a footpath at Gallows Hill which could be used as a stop for the loading and unloading of children only.

It was agreed to refer this matter to the area engineer and to further look at the concept of using the hotel car park for a similar purpose.

## WATERFORD UNIVERSITY

B. Leddy moved on notice: "that Lismore TC supports the principle of a University in Waterford." On a proposal of B. Leddy, seconded by R. Canning and resolved, that Lismore Town Commissioners fully support the principle of a University of Waterford. It

was also agreed that individual Commissioners could also express such support.

## ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY

B. Leddy moved on notice: "that the Commissioners propose that a systematic archaeological survey of the Lismore area is made by the National Museum or other body."

B. Leddy stated that there was never any general archaeological survey done in Lismore, despite its rich history. He felt that any finds in this area would promote interest in the locality. J. Heneghan stated that with the advent of satellite, the number of prospective sites has quadrupled around the country and only those in any danger seem to get any attention. It was agreed that B. Leddy would check the situation with the Office of Public Works for the next meeting.

## REPORT OF HERITAGE COMPANY

B. Leddy was complimented on a detailed report which he gave of the recent Heritage meeting.

## ESB POLES

Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey objected to a number of steel poles which were being erected around the town which replaced existing wooden poles.

## URBAN RENEWAL SCHEME

P. Dowd felt that when the proposed cobblelock in the Main Street is taking place, some form of colour is introduced instead of the total grey used around the Courthouse. The Clerk stated that he would pass on the sentiments expressed.

## CIE

On the proposal of Mrs. Fenton-Morrissey it was agreed to write to CIE and request the continuance of the daily bus service from Lismore to Cork which, she stated, was of enormous benefit to the elderly in the area.

## CONGRATULATIONS

A vote of congratulations was expressed to the Grotto Committee on the splendid work on the completion of the grotto at the Bank Field entrance. This was proposed by J. Roche, and seconded by R. Canning.



The cost involved according to the letter would be £600.00. Not a great deal of money given the vast amounts which are being expended in other areas and indeed in other towns.

## SERVICE CHARGES

Estimates published by Waterford County Council for the coming year show a considerable increase in the service charges levied on householders most notably in areas of Water and Bin Collection charges. The water rate especially will place a heavy burden on an already hard pressed local community. Having discussed the matter with a member of locals the unfairness of the system has been brought home to us.

For instance a person living alone - say a pensioner - pays the same charge as household with a large number of occupants who would in the normal course of events use a far great amount of water. We believe that the waiver scheme should be more readily available to people who by and large use only small amounts of the liquid which was once available to everybody free of charge.

There is also to be a hike in the Bin Collection something of the order 33 1/3%. The effect of this will undoubtedly be to increase the number of unauthorised dumps in the area and to increase the volume of rubbish being placed in the street litter bins.

We know that our local councillors oppose these increases. The spiral of charges will have to stop sometime so why not now.

Their fatal preoccupation with goal attempts, however, let Kill off the hook and made a hero of Kill's goalie.

When Kill lifted the siege they had to battle like demons to snatch those title-winning scores although Tallow continued to fight with all their might until the final whistle.

Tallow had heroes too, none greater than 'keeper Bernard Pratt who gave an outstanding display all through. Time after time he thwarted the best efforts of the eastern team, standing courageously firm as

Why he was overlooked for the senior final (football) this year - and last year as well - baffles me. He contributed to making this a great game.

Fair Play — The venue for

last Sunday's junior football final was Portlaw. There is nothing in the world wrong with Portlaw as a venue. The Portlaw club spare no efforts to have it in good shape. In no way does it, in itself, militate against a good performance by either Kill or Tallow so my quarrel is certainly not with that staunch unit of the association. My gripe is with the bye law (or by law if you wish) which fails to give fair play to teams like Ballyduff and Tallow who have an unfair travel burden imposed on them by rule the few times they figure in a county final. The bye law obliged us to travel more than twice as far as our opponents last Sunday.

I know that this particular bye-law has operated for many years without protest and precious few ever thought of questioning its implementation. Not because all are completely satisfied but because most teams reaching a county final are only too willing to play anywhere.

The by-law stipulates that county finals in hurling and football alternate between east and west every year. This suits the big clubs who were mainly responsible for formulating the law and who were major G.A.A. powers at the time - Mt. Sion and Dungarvan. They were ensured of county finals at home every single year, either hurling or football. No consideration was given to peripheral clubs like Tallow and Ballyduff. Any fair-minded observer could see the injustice in compelling us in the far west to travel 51 miles X 2 to Waterford for a final. Did you know that we had to make a journey to Carrick-on-Suir (how is that for an eastern venue) in 1966 to play Mt. Sion in a county final? Carrick-on-Suir, ye Gods! The fact that we won is neither here nor there. On another final appearance in minor football we had to play in Dunhill on Christmas Eve. Santa, alas, failed to fill our stocking with anything better than bitter defeat.

The essence of fair competition is even-handed justice. That's why a referee officiates at games. Where in God's name is there fair play when one team has to make a hundred mile round trip and the other twenty? Was it fair some years ago that Ballygunner were forced to play Lismore at Cappoquin in a county final?

Fair play should operate in the promotion of games as much as in the playing of them. This matter affects far more clubs than Tallow and it is in all our interests to seek a change of bye-law. Would it be in accordance with justice if the allocation of county final venues were placed in the hands of the county fixtures committee?

# ABBEYSIDE

## TOPICS

### OUR LOCALITY

The dangerous condition of "The Hermitage" has been the subject of debate in recent times. From an old 18th century drawing of Abbeyside it seems that a walled estate stood in the place we are discussing. Could the Friars have lived here? This is a possibility, as the road leading from here to the church at Abbeyside is called "Friar's Walk". The older people

will remember "Slate Lane" and "The Hermitage" when Mrs. Elsie Morrissey lived in the big house. Many of us remember the O'Brien's thatched house near the school being demolished in the year 1984. Some can remember other houses on this street once called "Quarry Lane". There were houses along the Hermitage road also and one thatched house near where Fr. Ahearn now lives.

The quarry was situated where Murphy place joins Sheares Street and Slate Lane ran parallel to this opposite the present school and overlooking the quarry. Houses stood only on the opposite side of this lane facing the dip into the quarry. Children who tumbled down the green slopes used call it "the Glory Hill". Slate Lane was probably the first scheme of houses to have slate roofs in the Village. The first modern-type scheme of houses built were the four two storey ones at

lower Sheares Street. They were built with concrete blocks and had indoor toilets. The Council progressed somewhat when they came to the building of Murphy Place — they provided bathrooms. In one of the four houses on Sheares Street once lived the Gambon family who originally lived at Lower Sarsfield Street. Opposite the junction into Murphy Place once stood three other thatched houses and beside them a social clubhouse for men, where they played billiards, snooker and cards. We note that none of the places in the area have Irish names: The brothers Sheares were patriots and T. J. Murphy was a minister for Local Government in the Coalition Government of 1948.


### TROOP MEETING

# FARMING LEADER

## TEAGASC Says

### DAIRYING

**Footbath** — Footrot is a serious cause of lameness in some herds and it is absent in others. The problem usually occurs between January and turnout to grass and for a while afterwards. Lameness at any other time of year is not caused by footrot but growths between claws are mainly caused by footrot.

The bacteria that cause the problem only thrive in warm, damp, dirty and overcrowded conditions. So many, easy-feed houses with automatic scrapers or slats are worse than self-feed silage layouts from a footrot point of view. The older sheds, with low roofs and poor ventilation, are the worst. Footrot does occur, but to a lesser extent in high roofed, well-ventilated easy-feed houses.

A formalin footbath during the winter will bring a big measure of control. A footpath plus preventative hoofcare in December/January should reduce it to a low level in nearly all types of houses.

### CATTLE

**Wintering Sucklers** — To optimise income in suckling, the suckler cow must be fed cheaply. Concentrate feeding should not be necessary, except to thin first calvers or to feed as a carrier for magnesium. At the same time, the idea of cheap feeding cannot be taken too far.

If cows are very thin at calving, it is better to feed some concentrates to improve cow condition so that the cow will go back in calf on time, rather than having a few weeks delay in the next calving, or a barren cow. Therefore, low feed costs must be consistent with good productive and reproductive performance.

**Condition Scoring** — This is a very useful tool in setting correct feeding levels to ensure good performance consistent with efficient use of feed. Condition scoring involved the handling of cows for fat cover in the loin area (between the hip bone and ribs) and the tail-end. The level of "condition" at these points is scored 1 to 5 (1 is extremely thin and 5 is extremely fat).

At this time of year, the spring-calving suckler cow should be in good condition, i.e. at a body condition score of 3 to 3 1/2. This means that the individual loin bones can only be felt with firm pressure and there is a light to moderate level of fat in either side of the tail-head. Such cows would be described as well fleshed.

This level of condition is higher than that recommended for calving (2 1/2) so cows in good condition now can afford to lose 1/2 to 1 condition score between now and calving. This represents an affordable loss in body weight of approximately 50-100 kgs.

The idea behind this approach is that suckler cows can gain weight very cheaply on summer grass and use these reserves to supplement winter feed which is more expensive. Thus, a cow at condition score 3 at weaning in the autumn can lose 1/2 a condition score up to calving either by restricting feed or feeding low quality fodder. This roughly equates to a saving of three-quarters of a tonne of silage over the winter.

### SHEEP

**Pregnancy Scanning** — Pregnancy scanning of ewes is a well-established practice nowadays, but tighter profit margins make it essential that this, like all other non-essential costs, should be closely examined, rather than proceeded with as a routine.

Tom Egan, Teagasc Sheep Specialist, says that the value to the sheep farmer depends on: (a) Reason for scanning; (b) Efficiency and accuracy of the operation; (c) Most importantly, the utilisation of the information obtained.

**Why Scan?** — There are only two reasons for scanning ewes, namely to establish whether or not they are pregnant or to ascertain the number of lambs carried by each ewe.

**Efficiency/Accuracy** — Scanning ewes between 50 and 90 days after mating (corresponding to 80-90 days after ram turnout mating situation) should produce almost 100% accuracy on pregnancy and non-pregnancy, greater than 95% accuracy on singles versus twins and somewhat less precise results on twins versus multiples. To meet these targets, the operator needs to be very experienced, careful and patient. Scanning, outside the ideal time, will produce less accuracy, particularly with regard to numbers carried.

## Highlight's Of IFA's 1995 Pre-Budget Submission

### EMPLOYMENT

**Regulations** — IFA seeks further streamlining and simplification of the tax and social welfare regulations applying to seasonal and casual employment on farms. IFA is also seeking a £1,000 tax credit for every new job created.

### INCOME TAX

**Stock Relief** — IFA seeks the return of Stock Relief after 6th April 1995. The Association is also seeking increased relief of 100% on the first £15,000 increase in stock values in any one year.

**Allowances** — IFA seeks the extension of the £800 PAYE allowance and £286 PRSI allowance to farmers and other self-employed.

**Farm Family** — IFA seeks recognition under the tax code for family labour on the farm, particularly for women spouses, through a new family labour input allowance.

**Stock Disposals** — IFA is looking for a special income tax treatment of compulsory livestock disposals as a result of an animal disease outbreak.

**Pollution Control** — IFA is seeking increased capital allowances for investment in pollution control facilities.

**Quotas** — IFA is also looking for a new capital allowance for the cost of purchase of milk and livestock quotas by livestock farmers.

**Land Leasing** — IFA seeks a special package of incentive tax measures to promote long-term leasing of farmland, particularly for the Early Retirement Scheme.

### CAPITAL TAXATION

**Property Tax** — IFA is totally opposed to any form of Property Tax on farmland and buildings.

**Probate Tax** — IFA is also looking for the abolition of Probate Tax in the 1995 Budget.

### OTHER ISSUES

**Over 56's PRSI** — IFA is seeking an equitable mech-

anism to allow farmers over 56 on 6th April 1988 to qualify for State Contributory Pensions.

**Education Grants** — IFA demands that eligibility for 3rd Level Education Grants must be established based on revenue Approved Income figures for income tax purposes only.

**Low Interest** — Agriculture and farming must be eligible to apply for all state sponsored low-interest loan fund schemes.

## GREAT INTEREST AT I.F.A. PUBLIC MEETING

Great interest and enthusiasm was shown recently at the Waterford IFA Seminar on REPS, Retirement Scheme and LEADER 11. The Co. Chairman opened the meeting which was held in Lawlor's Hotel. The Chairman introduced the speakers and outlined that these new EU schemes would have a huge impact on farmers incomes. Caoilinn O'Rourke from Waterford Carrefour addressed the meeting and informed them of what Carrefour's role in LEADER 11 would be.

Claire McNamara from the Waterford Development Partnership outlined to date the progress of their submission to the Department of Agriculture for LEADER 11 Funding. Concern was raised by a number of people regarding LEADER and whether or not Waterford's application would be successful or not.

Jerry Kingston, Teagasc CAO gave an excellent insight into the REPS Scheme. Firstly, he highlighted that the Scheme was very complex and farmers should seek the proper advice before embarking on a plan for the Scheme.

Mr. John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South-East region said that an ICMSA delegation proposed twelve amendments to the Bill on Occupiers Liability at a meeting with senior officials of the Department of Equality & Law Reform recently.

The key proposals put by the ICMSA were (a) the categorisation of entrants to property as "invited" a

'uninvited'; (b) the placement of responsibility on the entrants for their own actions; (c) the placement of responsibility for minors on their parents or guardians.

It is the ICMSA view that unless adequate recognition is given to the ICMSA submission by making major Amendments to the Bill, the result will be that farmers in particular will have no op-

tion but to restrict entry to their properties in so far as they can do so, in an effort to safeguard themselves and their families from being sued.

The delegation made the point that the large amounts of uncertainty and confusion which will arise if the Bill is enacted in its present form would lead to endless court cases to give clear meaning to the various defi-

nitions and qualification in the Bill.

"ICMSA totally objects to the very wide band of people who could claim the 'visitor' status thereby gaining for themselves the highest duty of care from the farmer. This is the greatest fault of the Bill and exposes the property owners to the highest risks of being sued."





It's a safe bet that this attractive and very important fourth round tie in the hurling league will attract a very big attendance at Fraher Field on next Sunday and the expectations are that Ardán na nDéise will not accommodate the huge attendance of Wexford and Waterford supporters at the venue.

Table-toppers Wexford who are unbeaten after three rounds are reasonably sure of making it to the knockout stages if they win here, while a victory for us would leave Waterford on the verge of qualifying and lead us into the Christmas break in a confident mood and looking hopeful of doing very well in our three remaining matches against

Down, Kerry and Carlow when the league resumes in the new year.

In the last three meetings the clashes between the counties have been very close and very few Waterford supporters will forget the game last year where a refereeing miscalculation undoubtedly cost us the points and an outside chance of advancing. We were in front on the 60th minute, level in the 62nd and behind in the 64th minute. This was very disheartening for Waterford in the New Ross game as Wexford had just missed winning the league title after three tremendous matches with Cork in Thurles.

Like ourselves, Wexford

faired poorly in the league last year and were relegated also. Their determination to get back into the top division is clearly expressed in their no nonsense displays in the three matches to date and I have no doubt but they will be very difficult to beat here.

# RESTRUCTURING PROGRAMME

The proposed restructuring of the County Board by a special County Convention is scheduled to take place within the next few weeks and while all clubs will have their say in whatever changes are to be made, the framework of the new set up will be decided upon by a special committee set up at the request of the Munster Council Development Committee and is expected to be in line with the changes made in the make-up of the Tipperary County Board.

The feeling in the Munster Development Committee is that while the present structure of County Committees has served the Association very well in the past, the social challenges and demands of the present and future make it imperative that we keep pace with a vibrant, progressive and business-like organisation, but at the same time remaining loyal to our traditions and ideals.

Under the plan it is proposed to set up a number of committees which shall be under the control of the County Board and all such committees shall report on a monthly basis to the Co. Board.

The County Board, if based on the Tipperary County Board's new structure would be constituted as follows: Chairman, two vice-chairpersons (the two divisional board chairmen); County Secretary, Treasurer, 2 Trustees, 2 Divisional Secretaries, 1 Central Council member, 2 Munster Council Reps., County De-

velopment and Youth Officers, County PRO, 2 Representatives of Football Committee; Board na nOg Representative, Oifigeach Gaelige and Cultuir, One Representative from each senior club and 2 Representatives from each Divisional Board representing intermediate and junior clubs. Also the following non-voting members, handball, vocational, secondary and primary schools representatives.

County Board shall be responsible for all GAA affairs in the county and shall delegate specific powers to the various sub-committees in accordance with their constitution and role.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Our Executive Committee, if modelled on the Tipperary structure will be smaller than at present and will have the following: Co. Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, the 2 Divisional Chairmen, Central Council Representative, County Development Officer and 2 further members selected by the above members of the Executive. That committee shall be responsible for finance, as set out in county bye-laws, the general organisation of county teams, matters of general discipline, etc.

### SUB COMMITTEES

The number will include: Games Administration (7 members), County Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, 2 Divisional Board Secretaries, Secretary of Football Board and the Chairman of the County Games Develop-

ment Committee. They shall be responsible for appointment of referees, adoption and consideration of referees reports, discipline arising from games and with power to impose penalties in accordance with general rules, hearing of objections relating to or arising out of games with power of decision, the hearing of appeals relating to or arising out of games, against the Divisional Boards, and County Bord na nOg and with power of decision. They shall meet monthly.

### GAMES DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

(9 members). Chairman and Secretary (who shall be appointed by the County Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer). Also on the committee shall be the Youth Officer and six other members who shall be chosen depending on their specialist knowledge in the various fields of development.

Their functions shall be to increase the numbers playing Gaelic games in the county; be responsible for coaching and coaches, etc.; the organisation of coaching courses, summer camps and the acquisition and provision of promotional materials.

They shall examine and redress the imbalance in the frequency of games, the timing and running (systems) of the Divisional competitions and they will oversee the recruitment and

training of referees. They shall meet monthly.

### CLUB DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

(9 members). The County Development Officer shall be the Chairman. Eight other members shall be selected by the County Board officers. Their role will be to assess club structures and administration, etc.; to advise and assist with improvements based on the development needs which are identified; the organisation of leadership and management courses as well as workshops for club officers; the development and improvement of club ground facilities, etc.

### CULTURAL COMMITTEE

(9 members). The chairman shall be the Oifigeach Gaelige agus Cultuir. Two members of the County Scor Committee and six specialist members appointed by the Oifigeach Gaelige in consultation with the three County Board officers. They shall assist with the organisation of Scor, Scor na nOg and Scor na bPaisti.

They shall promote Traditional Irish Dancing, Music, Song and other aspects of Irish Culture and will be responsible for the promotion of the Irish language, including Gaeltacht Scholarships, etc. They shall meet monthly.

### PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

(Not more than 12 members). The County PRO

shall be a member and the county chairman shall appoint the other members who shall be representative of the 2 Divisions. All members will be expected to have experience, knowledge and a general enthusiasm and flair for matters pertaining to public relations, the media and publications, etc. They shall be responsible for match programmes, county year book, county directory and other relevant publications; they shall provide information to the media as authorised and organise courses for Division-

al and Club PRO's; they shall elect their own officers and will meet monthly and as requested.

### YOUTH COMMITTEE

(9 members). County Youth Officer shall be chairman with a member from the County Primary Schools Committee, County Post-Primary Committee, County Bord na nOg; five other specialist members shall be selected by the Board officers, etc.

They will deal with all aspects of Association activity relating to youth membership, etc.

## Will Our Gates Be Opened?

To put it more bluntly, will our venues, in time, be open to all sports? I cannot answer this, but I do know that the number of people who believe that all games will eventually be played in our grounds is growing steadily.

The recent announcement about Croke Park being made available for American football in 1996 has sparked off speculation about this being just a preliminary to the granting of permission for other high profile fixtures in the not too distant future.

According to the announcement, negotiations are at an advanced stage and

within a short time an announcement will be made confirming that the two great American football sides, Notre Dame and the US Naval Academy at Annapolis in Maryland, will clash in Croke park, Dublin on November 2, 1996.

According to a newspaper report, a contract has already been signed with the game's promoters, an American company named Emerald Isle Classics and that negotiations have been going on for about five years.

It will be interesting to see how all this unfolds in the months ahead.



# Central Dairies Plant To Close

at 11, by the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers Union which represents nine of the employees involved.

**"TOTAL LACK OF COMMITMENT"**  
ATGWU District Officer, Tony Mansfield, has expressed anger over the closure decision, stating that Central Dairies "has always been a profitable concern and that the decision taken by the Board of Directors of Waterford Foods plc and senior management, to close down this profitable company, shows a total lack of commitment to maintaining employment in Dungarvan."

The concerned Union representative continued "clearly Waterford Foods only real interest in purchasing Central Dairies was to acquire its milk pool of approximately 750,000 plus gallons."

"The ATGWU's worst fears as to management intentions have now been realised", he further stated.

Since the Waterford Foods takeover in 1992, Mr. Mansfield disclosed that 3 voluntary redundancies had occurred in the Central Dairies plant with 3 trucks taken out of the system.

**"COMPULSORY REDUNDANCY"**

On behalf of the concerned plant workforce, Mr. Mansfield further stated "while noting management decision, which they state is irrevocable, membership is stating that the dairy won't close until such time as there is an agreement put in place which is acceptable to Union members as they are now facing compulsory redundancy."

**MOVE TO GLENVILLE**

On the other side of the coin, Waterford Foods plc have recently issued a statement in which the move to close Central Dairies Ltd., is outlined against the backdrop of a detailed study of the Group's total liquid milk enterprise. This study pointed clearly to the need for significant change in the face of intense competition and the importance of being a lowest cost operator.

In the case of Central Dairies, the statement records an 'urgent need for considerable investment in upgrading production facilities and the computer system.'

This scenario is put into stark contrast with the ultra

modern plant facilities available in Glenville, Waterford, which has the capacity to process the entire liquid milk requirements for the South East area. The plant is managed by Liam Neville of Knockanore.

As regards redundancies, the statement claims the change over to Glenville will involve 8 or 9 as production is transferred in the first quarter of '95.

Patrick J. Cummins, Managing Director of Waterford Foods Consumer Products Division, said there was no real option, in terms of cost effectiveness, to closing the plant, but he offered reassurance that customers of Central Dairies would receive a continued high standard of service and an increased product range to retail outlets and doorstep deliveries.

For the consumer, the Central Dairies closure will have no visible impact on the finished product. The Snowcream brand will remain as before as will daily deliveries to agents, householders and milkmen etc. in West Waterford from Cappoquin/Lismore to Clashmore/Ardmore areas and Dungarvan town.

For the redundant workers, however, Mr. Mansfield is determined to get the best deal possible.
