## Cappoquin Company Wins Training Award

At a packed presentation in the Tower Hotel, Waterford, yesterday (Tuesday), the chairman of FÁS, Mr. Chris Kirwan, formally presented the South East Industry Awards.

Open to companies employing 500 or less in manufacturing internationally traded services and physical distribution, the competition is divided into three categories — small (50 or less employees), medium (51-200 employees) and large (201-500 employees).

Proud winner in the medium company category was Cappoquin Chickens Ltd., Cappoquin. The winning West Waterford company will now go on to compete for the National Training Award and a £5,000 training prize.

These training awards were introduced by FÁS in 1990 to recognise and encourage training excellence in industry and to demonstrate the link between training investment and improved business performance.

In his address the FÁS Chairman congratulated the winners of the 3 categories for their efforts and paid tribute to all companies in the region who took part in the event.

Mr. Kirwan went on to emphasise that unless companies themselves recognise the extent of the problem of under-training and its importance to their competitive future, the efforts of government and its agencies can at best provide only partial solutions.

The awards are therefore very relevant because they encourage and recognise training which involves all levels of the organisation and show the benefits that have been derived from the training. These benefits include productivity improvements, reduced wastage and re-work, higher quality and increased orders, not to mention the better communications and morale leading to a unity of purpose for everyone in the organisation.

This unity of purpose should be easier to achieve in the small business, but the lack of personnel leading to a diversity of responsibilities again emphasises the need for training. FÁS has recognised this and biased the Training Support Scheme Grant in favour of the small owner/manager companies and for the first time this year included the Retail and Wholesale Sector.



## Respond Development Receives Green Light

Members of the Dungarvan Urban District Council agreed at their monthly meeting last Monday to give the Respond housing agency the go ahead to proceed with its exciting proposed development at Spring Marquis.

The 33 unit residential development at the rear of Dunabney House is now a step closer to fulfillment. Having served the section 83 Notice the Council will deal with Respond's planning application in the near future.

The proposals by Respond consist of 23 three bedroom houses, 10 two bedroom apartments and a community building. Tenants for these houses will be selected from the Council's own housing list, a factor which will greatly ease the tremendous burden placed on the local authority to provide housing for those already on the Council's long waiting list. Other positive aspects of the proposed development as expressed by Council members was that the entire estate would be capably managed by the Respond agency itself which has plenty of experience in housing developments in areas such as Clonmel and throughout the South East.



**DONAL CONNOLLY CONCERNS OVERCOME**

Previous concerns by residents of neighbouring estates of the Spring Marquis site have now been overcome.

County Manager, Donal Connolly reported at last Monday's meeting that he had obtained an agreement in principle from the Health Board to provide a separate access to the proposed estate.

# West Waterford Rallies To Carmelite Order

Their 158 year old monastery in danger of collapsing, the long established Carmelite Nuns of Tallow, unique in Munster, have turned to the medium of fundraising to bridge a shortfall of £400,000 to replace the existing building. A daunting task indeed for any fund raising committee, but there is certainly no lack of confidence and enthusiasm shown by the Tallow Sisters as they set about the challenge.

Last Wednesday saw the launch of the first major fundraising project - 'Be a Brick, Buy a Brick', spear-headed by internationally renowned athlete, John Tracey.

Speaking at the Tallow monastery, Chairman of the central organising committee, Maurice Geary welcomed the gathered crowd of GAA personalities, business people, local councillors and well knowns of the entertainment industry to the launch of the first phase of fundraising.

Mr. Geary said the Tallow people were both honoured and privileged to have the Carmelite Order in the town.

Co. Waterford international Olympic runner, John Tracey said he was honoured to visit the hallowed spot of Tallow to help the Sisters. "If you're a prayerful person at all", he stated, "you will hold the Sisters in awe".

"We turned to them for prayers and now they are asking us to help them out," the famous athlete added.

Mother Prioress of the Carmelite nuns in Tallow, Sr. Patrice, said the Order now looked to the future with hope and great expectation.

"In fidelity to the past and challenged by the present," she added, "we look to the future with confidence as we sing the song in a new key and seek to provide for future generations a house of prayer, of Carmelite presence in Munster."

Skilled Tallow tradesman, Harry Ronayne, was then

called on by Sr. Patrice to place the first brick - "a symbolic gesture of the first brick, he will lay please God in the new building", she declared. The Mother Prioress described Mr. Ronayne as a great friend of the community who had replaced many a brick in the Convent over the past 50 years.

## BE A BRICK, BUY A BRICK

"The buy a brick, be a brick project," explained Sr. Patrice, "is a straightforward appeal to all our friends, well-wishers and supporters to donate a brick and thus with a concerted effort we will see how every little helps and love will make the building grow".

To achieve the target of £400,000, the nuns are appealing to people nationwide and overseas to contribute to the appeal of 'Buy a Brick' at £5 each. People are welcome to buy as many bricks, for as many people and for such different purposes as they wish.

Those who do so will have their names and the names of their loved ones inscribed in the Order's Golden Book,

thereby ensuring a perpetual remembrance in the prayers of the Tallow Community. Bricks for £5 each may mark such special occasions as Christmas, a peace brick, friendship, birthday, christening, anniversary, wedding, thanksgiving or a remembrance brick etc.

## CRUMBLING STATE

The shocking news of the monastery's crumbling structural state was revealed to the Order last June when an assessment of the building was undertaken for an intended reroofing project, as a result of the heavy winter storms.

Following a subsequent examination of the old building by a succession of experts, it became apparent that urgent repairs were required. Severe and extensive foundation problems were evident in subsidence, wall settlements and floor deflections, while two wings of the building currently used by the Sisters as sleeping accommodation were deemed to be potential fire hazards. In addition, wet rot had attacked the joists and rising dampness had also

caused problems.

The cost of reroofing, complying with the minimum fire precautions and other necessary repairs, while incurring a huge expenditure, would not improve the basic fabric of the building. The nuns were faced with the only practical option - demolish and rebuild the monastery.

## VITAL COMMUNITY LINK

A strong bond exists between the Carmelite community and the people of the West Waterford area nourished through times of famine and war.

The Order first came to Tallow in 1836 at the request of the parish priest, Rev. Fr. Eugene Condon and on July 29th, that same year, St. Joseph's Southern Carmel was officially opened.

In the early years of the foundation, the nuns, whose vocation is specifically one of prayer, responded to the educational needs in Ireland in the late 19th century by teaching in the adjoining girls' school. During the famine, the Sisters estab-

lished a lace making industry to provide a livelihood for the people of the locality. In 1910, they were enabled to withdraw from teaching and return to their normal enclosed life.

Marking the centenary of that foundation, in 1936 a statue of the Sacred Heart was donated and erected by the people of Tallow.

The Community has always received and still enjoy a great support from the people of Tallow and surrounding areas but a project of this

size is far beyond the resources of the area and so the nuns are appealing to all well-wishers. In this they have the support of Bishop William Lee and Fr. Fitzpatrick O.D.C.

The initial response to the appeal has been most encouraging and Sr. Patrice is confident of success - "the excitement is building", she smilingly added. "Please assist us as we seek to build a 'House of Prayer for all Peoples.' May God bless and reward you!"

## Waterlogged?

# This could be the reason

WINTER quickly exposes defects in soil condition and drainage but also allows remedies to be applied — plants are mostly dormant and the digging seasons gets underway.



If your soil is badly drained then it will be all too obvious when you try to dig chunks of sticky earth. Worse, water may actually lie on top of the soil.

You can't ignore it — waterlogged soil causes plants to fail, rot or die.

Some of the causes and remedies for waterlogging are:

- high water table — the cheap option is to buy in or transfer top soil from elsewhere to build up the soil level or beds so that excess water does not waterlog your plants. A more expensive cure is to put in land drains.

- non-porous rock impeding drainage — again, try raising the level or installing drains.

- a sub-surface build up of compacted soil and debris creating a strata to block drainage — double-digging (to two depths of the spade) may reach down and clear the problem. You can help avoid a recurrence by supporting your weight on a plank as you dig.

But don't mix this subsoil with your topsoil or you will spoil the condition of the latter - you simply want to break the barrier or 'soil pan'.

Sometimes, a pick and elbow grease may be needed to break through. If this fails then you should consider the last resort mentioned earlier.

Luckily, the most frequent cause of poor drainage is a heavy clay topsoil which can be cured by double-digging. Work in a good old fashioned 'dressing' such as farm manure or garden compost as you go, but leave clay clumps to be broken down by winter frosts and wind.

You can also dress the clay with lime, which is particularly beneficial as it causes fine clay particles to cling together and create a more porous, crumbly and better drained soil.

Lime will also feed plants and free other nutrients in the soil.

At the other extreme you have sandy and rocky soils which are too well-drained, drying out too quickly in summer and allowing winter downpours to wash away their nutrients.

These need binding together, so remove stones, pebbles and so on as much as possible, and work in lots of compost and thick and sticky manure.

They should still retain some good drainage so they need very little digging apart from more soil dressing each year.

Chalky soils are also too well-drained and farmers answer this by planting special crops to plough into and feed and bind the soil. You can recreate this by working in lawn cuttings, leaves and garden compost.

## COUNCIL REJECTS AN POST REPLY

Members of Waterford County Council have rejected out of hand, a letter from An Post Chief Executive, John Hynes, in which he responds to the Council's objections regarding a rationalisation of rural post offices in the West Waterford area.

Speaking at the November meeting of the Council, Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan said he was distinctly unhappy with An Post's reply. "They're trying to implement rationalisation by stealth", he slammed.

"Post offices are the focal

point of social life for rural communities", Cllr. O'Callaghan continued, further stressing that many old age pensioners would be left stranded without the P.O.'s nearby services were they to close.

In their reply to the Council however, An Post state they are not implementing a rationalisation of West Waterford P.O.'s.

The letter reads; "An Post policy regarding post office reviews is that if a postmaster or postmistress retires and the family do not wish to continue running the post

office, then An Post will assess the operation. If the level of business and the population has decreased to such an extent that it is uneconomical then An Post will close the post office and the business will be transferred to the nearest post office in the area".

The letter also states that An Post is looking at ways to improve the methods used to sort and deliver mail in the provinces. "This will involve centralising the sorting of mail and the use of more vans for delivery of mail in rural areas".

### "NOT ACCEPTABLE"

Lismore Councillor, Ollie Wilkinson was also strongly critical of An Post's reply, describing the letter as 'ridiculous' and 'contradictory'. "Mr Hynes should be contacted again", he stated, "to spell out the facts" to Council members.

On a proposal by Cllr. Wilkinson it was unanimously decided to write back to An Post and return Mr. Hynes letter. "An Post's answer is just not acceptable", declared Cllr. Wilkinson.

## Parcel Up The Salmon For A Treat

SALMON en croute sounds attractive. It might also sound difficult to do, but not with our recipe. All you need are a recipe. All you need are a can of salmon and frozen pastry. Simple!

### SALMON PARCELS

#### Ingredients


One 151/2oz (435g) can salmon  
1lb (450g) button mushrooms, sliced  
1 tbsp chopped parsley  
4 eggs, hard boiled and roughly chopped  
juice of 1 lemon  
salt and pepper  
1 large packet frozen puff pastry  
1 egg, beaten

#### Method

Drain, skin and bone the salmon. Flake it, and sea-



son with a little salt and plenty of black pepper, and the lemon juice. Roll out pastry to a rectangle of about 30.5 by 25.5cm (12x10 inches) and arrange half the salmon along the centre. Add a layer of hard-boiled egg, mushrooms and parsley, then top with rest of salmon. Paint the edges of the pastry, with beaten egg, then fold, ends first, and seal. Use surplus pastry to decorate. Turn the 'parcel' over so



that the join is underneath, paint with remaining beaten egg, and cook in a hot oven,

Gas Mark 7, 425°F, 220°C, for 15-20 minutes. Serves 4-6.

# Waterford Foods Merges Consumer Enterprises

A plan for consolidation of its fresh dairy products enterprises is announced this week by Waterford Foods. With effect from January 1, 1995, Waterford Foods (Ireland), largely associated with the Yoplait brand, Premier Dairies and all other liquid milk interests, will operate as the Consumer Products Division of Waterford Foods plc.

The new Division will be headed by Patrick J. Cummins as Managing Director and has annual sales of £170 million. Mr. Cummins had spent most of his commercial life working with consumer foods and was re-

sponsible for launching the phenomenally successful brand Yoplait in Ireland.

Aidan O. Dempsey will be Deputy Managing Director with special responsibility for sales, distribution and milk procurement. Mr. Dempsey has held several senior posts within Waterford Foods including Financial Controller, Manager of the Trading Division and, most recently, head of Premier Dairies.

The new company has brand leadership in the Irish market for Yoplait yogurt, Petitis Filous fromage frais and Premier liquid milk. It has other important brands including Kilmeaden cheese and Snowcream milk, brand leaders in the South East of Ireland.

premises and concentration on glass bottling at Finglas. The programme is currently being discussed with the workforce and their representatives.

Within the revised struc-

ture, Mr. Dempsey will take responsibility for sales, distribution and milk procurement, with Mr. Cummins concentrating on new developments, marketing, operations and finance.

# V.E.C. Project "Full Steam Ahead"

The £1 million-plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College is now to proceed as quickly as possible and is expected to reach the planning stage in and around the new year.

Despite the V.E.C.'s recent failure in securing an adjoining site for the planned development, work will now continue on the college's existing site.

### SITE SOLD

Speaking at last Monday's Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne revealed that after 3/4 months of consultation between the V.E.C. and the valuation office, and agreed price of £135,000 was reached for the site. C.E.O., Kieran Heffernan, was informed by the auctioneer acting for the vendor that the price was agreed at verbally. Sometime later Mr. Heffernan was further informed by the auctioneer that the site had been disposed of internally within the vendor's family.

Addressing V.E.C. members, Cllr. Kyne put on record the painstaking work of the C.E.O. to additional-

ly get an agreement on the sale price. The subsequent sale of the site within the family was outside of Mr. Heffernan's control and Cllr. Kyne again stressed that the C.E.O.'s efforts should be acknowledged.

### "POLITICAL CONCERNS"

Replying to concerns expressed by some committee members over the current political climate and the present upheaval at Government level, particularly so at the Department of Education, Cllr. Kyne said he was adamant that the school extension proposed was no under threat. "It's well on schedule for an early planning application", he continued no matter what political situation exists. Both the V.E.C.'s planning strategy and the architect's preliminary drawing proposals, however, have all been based on the existing college site rather than the

adjoining land.

In light of this strategy Cllr. Kyne declared that there was "no reason for anyone to suggest the project prospects have diminished in anyway".

### CRUCIAL SUPPORT

Commending the commitment and past support of the committee, the Chairman concluded by saying he was confident of a future successful conclusion of the project. He also praised the V.T.O.S. scheme under Tonya Lineen which also had a crucial bearing on the lobby for the extension.

### FAST FORWARD

Committee member, Cllr. Con Casey promised the full support of his fellow members in the project. Stressing that speed was of the essence, the C.E.O. advised V.E.C. members to proceed as quickly as possible with the planned school extension. "It's vitally important to get it up and running", he further urged.

Sharing Mr. Heffernan's views, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said the project should now "go full steam ahead".





# Views Of A Local Labour Councillor

Having hard pressed and indeed 'hounded' local Poll topper and Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne, on his personal reaction to the past week's political crisis at Government level, the U.D.C. Chairman quoted Harold Wilson's statement: "A week is a long time in politics", a sentiment which has indeed proved infallible.

## NO FIANNA FAIL OPPOSITION

Referring to the national situation, Cllr. Kyne said the coalition of Labour and Fianna Fáil will be reactivated.

It could be suggested that Fianna Fáil might be attracted to go into opposition to build for a future election, however, the Labour favourite stressed that the structural funds bonanza is now in its infancy.

"These operational programmes are just now coming into play", he stated, "and will take 1 - 1 1/2 years for the trickle down effect of the various projects".

"In my view", continued Cllr. Kyne, "it's very unlikely that Fianna Fáil will nationally decide to leave the Government while major structural investment (the biggest ever in state history) will have delivered major development within the next 2 years. For that reason, I feel Fianna Fáil will not go into opposition".

## BUILD LABOUR ADVANTAGE

That said, however, Cllr. Kyne warned that Labour should not over-emphasise their enhanced position by being too demanding at the negotiating table.

Continuing the Labour Councillor said, "I would now see that the Government is at a midterm review stage and it's imperative for Labour to build on this unexpected opportunity".

## CAUSE FOR CONCERN

"For me, the Labour party must place high on its agenda the reversal of punitive legislation on unemployment benefit and disability benefit

payments". This legislation while it may seem insignificant in regard to the crisis of last week, according to Cllr. Kyne "is causing severe hardship on many people and workers who have contributed and continue to contribute to P.R.S.I. and who are now being denied the benefits of their good hard work".

"This and the lack of progress on higher educational grants where gross income remains the qualifying income limit for the P.A.Y.E. sector has caused me great concern". Equally causing concern are the recent soundings from Enterprise Minister, Rory Quinn, T.D. (Labour) who, in a recent statement at a business conference, "seemed to suggest that unemployed workers may be targeted for certain employment schemes", said Cllr. Kyne who further declared that these type of statements from Deputies like Rory Quinn "is totally unacceptable to the Labour principle" which he supports. "Rory Quinn's statement was indicative for me to some of the Labour Ministers coming off the rails. It's crucial that sanity be restored in this midterm review".

## SUPPORTERS HURT

Concluding the interview Cllr. Kyne submitted that Labour supporters had been hurt by what he deemed had generally been seen as "an over-use of the Government jet and internal job placements. I expect that concern to get equal importance from the Government of the country in the coming days", he added.

# TALLOW NOTES

## TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

### The Dark Days Of The Infamous "Ban"

**Time Out!** - My three month rest from G.A.A. activity in 1955 for allowing myself to be caught watching a soccer match was founded on shabbiness and meanness. Five years later I was the victim of an almost inexplicable piece of black-guardism whose shameful purpose it seemed, was to remove me from the G.A.A. scene for a lengthy period, perhaps for good.

Where an impressive sports and leisure centre in Dungarvan now stands was once a piece of waste ground known to all as Quann's. It was a long rather narrow piece of uneven ground bounded on the north by the graveyard wall with a field to the west and the sea to the east and the south. In the summer time a most pleasant spot for a stroll or a restful pause on one of the seats provided. Two, three- or four maximum could enjoy a few

pucks of a sliotar within the constraints imposed by its geographically restricted location, if you get my drift. A hurling match was out of the question. Many's the fine summer evening poor Paddy Burke R.I.P. and myself hurled for our own enjoyment and the entertainment of regular attenders such as a gentle old lady and her dog or a veteran hurler or a retired parish priest. Later in the year when winter held Quann's in its icy grip the place suited only one game, soccer, whose slower pace suited the confined playing area. So from October on it was the big ball for us, no handling, no spectator. If our numbers added up to 8 or 10 we had a 4 or 5 aside. No offside, no referee, no linesman. We were put on our honour to acknowledge fouls and scores and behave honourably, somewhat like a good coalition government in its early months. Except

in direst weather our Saturday's featured this piece of afternoon fun.

This place, Quann's, is the context of my second brush with Rule 27. In March 1958, after a six month absence, the name E. Power reappeared on a Waterford hurling team for a match against Wexford in the League. Delighted I headed home for the week-end to Dungarvan. Because I had received no official written notification and anxious to find out about travel arrangements I went along to the County Secretary's house. When I asked the question he rocked me back on my heels with his succinct reply "You're Suspended". "Suspended!" I gasped, "for what?" "For playing soccer", he said firmly, "last October". "Surely I enquired, you don't mean that bit of fun in Quann's". There was no answer so tottering away from the door I slowly headed home shocked, confused, bewildered and angry. This was the last straw. There was no point in continuing to be a member of an organisation whose vindictiveness could stretch to that extreme and whose modus operandi was so cruel and underhand.

After a miserable week-end I was back in Tallow on Monday morning still reeling from the whole affair but growing more and more angry. In those days I usually dropped into Frank Ryan's slaughter house on a Monday evening for a chat while the Tallow butcher was killing a few sheep. This evening I could identify so easily with one of Frank's victims? Frank listened to my tale of woe. "Ah the whole thing is wrong", observed Frank, "you mustn't let it go. Fight it. Ring Pad. He'll see that you get fair play".

"Pad" was Pat Fanning, Chairman of the County Board. I wrote immediately setting out the facts of the case and how deeply I resented the slur on my good name. I reminded him that I had not played an organised soccer match of any kind (11 aside plus match officials) and that this base unjust suspension was impugning my character so I intended taking legal action if matters weren't put right at once. Happily Pat Fanning was always a thoroughly fair man who took steps to make amends. When I arrived home the following week-end there was an official match notification

awaiting me which requested my presence at Dungarvan Gaelic Field on the following Sunday for an inter-county match against Kilkenny. So I was miraculously reinstated!

I never bothered to pursue enquiries afterwards because I knew, beyond doubt, who had connived at removing me from the Gaelic scene in pursuit of his own shoddy agenda. No move, mind you, had been made to suspend me at the time of the alleged offence (October) or in the intervening five months for what was not, in fact, a breach of the notorious Rule 27. Let's keep this little number in reserve for a time when it can inflict maximum hurt. But for Frank Ryan's (may the good Lord be kind to him) good advice I would certainly not have continued to play or promote Gaelic games which would be sad both for me personally and for others. Besides, those puny, narrow-minded, negative beings who supported such a contemptible attitude to others would have achieved their murky ends. God alone knows how many good people were alienated in this period from playing and promoting our games by such loathsome behaviour.

When I reflect on those times and that despicable ban it never ceased to amaze me that the G.A.A. managed to survive relatively unscathed. The only conclusion possible is that hurling, especially, and football are very good wholesome games which respond, spectacularly, to that craving in the Irish psyche, for thrills, spills and excitement. # TEAGASC Says

## DAIRYING

Late calving, spring calving herds will still be yielding up to 2 gallons/day. Maintain yields on good quality silage. Where possible, allow milkers out to grass by day. As well as reducing feed costs, grass will keep protein levels up.

Do not allow cows in late lactation to lose body condition. The objective should be to dry cows off in the same condition as they calve in. Maintain this condition during the dry period by feeding 8-9 kgs. of silage dry matter. Do not allow cows to put on too much condition during the dry period. Cows calving down in a fat condition will have lower feed intakes and milk yields. They are also more prone to milk fever and Ketosis. Cows which have a long dry period on very good quality silage can put on excess condition in which case silage intake should be restricted.

Dry cows in reasonable condition need no meals. Where condition is poor, feed 2 lbs. of meals with good silage or 4 lbs. with moderate quality silage.

Dry cows due to calve in January — Allow a 10 to 12 week dry period for thin cows and heifers at the end of their first lactation. Dry off when milk yield falls below one gallon per day. Dry off animals which are losing condition.

Use dry cow tubes at drying off. Teat dip immediately after. The risk of E. Coli mastitis is highest for 21 days after drying off and 14 days before calving. It is essential to keep cubicles clean and dry. Concrete cubicles should be bedded with ground limestone or chopped straw. Scrape the passages regularly and clean off cubicles.

Watch out for abortions. Isolate any cow which aborts. Send foetus and cleanings to a veterinary laboratory for analysis. If Leptospirosis is a major problem, vaccinate every six months. It is also possible to vaccinate against Salmonella. Consult your veterinary practitioner.

### REPLACEMENT HEIFERS

Weanling heifers should be fed to reach 700 lbs. for bulling next summer. Aim for a liveweight gain of 1.6 lbs./day. This allows normal growth without too much fattening. Pushing for higher weight gains will result in too much fatty tissue in the udders and reduce milk yields. Train heifers to cubicles from an early age. Weaned calves and weanlings are very easy to train. Make sure the bedding is dry and comfortable. Putting a little meal or silage in front of the cubicles also helps.

Heifers which have been reared on slats should be trained before calving. Restrict them to a small area and put tyres in the passage or standing area. Most heifers will use the cubicles after seven to ten days. Heifers which continue to lie in the passage should be tied into the cubicles and fed in front.

### The Suckler Cow Herd

The suckler herd should produce the basic raw material for a quality beef industry. There is a need to get a much higher proportion of continental breeds into the suckler cows we use. Experiments carried out at Teagasc Research Centre, Grange, by Dr. Michael Drenan, show that the progeny of Limousin Cross Friesian cows have a 2% better liveweight gain than the progeny of Hereford Cross Friesians. The Limousin Cross Friesian progeny gave a carcass that was 10 kgs. heavier at slaughter and was also leaner.

The provision of suckler replacements should be planned with particular objectives in mind. Quite a lot of Continental breeds are getting into suckler herds at present through farmers keeping their own replacements. This is resulting in three-quarters or seven-eighths bred Continental heifers being bred.

While these cows produce very fine progeny, the cows themselves are not as productive as a two-way cross cow. Where there is a lot of Charolais blood in a cow, they give lower milk yields and have higher maintenance requirements than the progeny of a Friesian and one of the smaller Continental breeds.

A practice that should work well is to use Limousin or Simmental cross cow and use a bull of a different breed, e.g. Charolais, Belgian Blue or Blonde d'Aquitaine as the terminal sire breed on mature cows.

### PREMIUM APPLICATIONS

If you have not already applied for the EU Suckler Cow Premium this year, you can apply in November. Forms are available from Department of Agriculture, Government Buildings, The Glen, Waterford. Applications for the 10 and 22 months Beef Premium can also be submitted before November 30, 1994.

### TRAIN HEIFERS TO USE CUBICLES

There is nothing more frustrating for the dairy farmers than to see a good first-calved heifer lying in the central passage and covered with slurry. Ideally, heifers should be used to lying in cubicles before calving into the herd. When this has not happened it is essential to train them to use cubicles. This involves confining the heifer to a cubicle using a chain or drop-down type bar for half a day every day for about a week. This usually cures all but the most persistent offenders.

## County Waterford ICMSA News

The Chairman of County Waterford ICMSA, John Skehan, warned farmers to be careful when applying for the Suckler Cow and Beef Premium Schemes. He said that all applications must reach the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry by November 30 and he advised farmers to get certificates of postage in the event of a dispute arising over a date or lost applications.

The Chairman advised farmers to carefully check their stocking rate with reference to previous male premium applications and their area aid application in order to maximise their payments with the Schemes.

"Instead of applying in November some farmers may be best served by waiting until January 1995 to apply. Under the new rules for the Special Beef Premium Schemes for 1995, farmers can apply anytime between January 1 and November 30, 1995 but are restricted to a maximum of three applications per age bracket. A further advantage of waiting to apply in January 1995 is that the premium will be worth approximately £15/head extra, said the County Chairman.

With regard to the Suckler Cow applications, the Chairman said that any farmer who did not apply for suckler cows in June 1994 should apply before November 30. Farmers who applied in June are not eligible to apply in November.

However, he advised farmers that they should not confuse the headage and premium schemes in regard to suckler cows.

The Chairman advises all farmers who have the opportunity to apply for suckler cows in November to include cow numbers in addition to their current quotas, where they have surplus eligible cows. He said this is extremely important because unless farmers apply on cow numbers above the quota level they cannot obtain any quota from the national reserve.

### Cepravin Dry Cow Competition Winner

The lucky winner in our recent Mallinckrodt Veterinary (formerly Pitman-Moore), competition was Billy O'Grady of Ballygagin, Dungarvan.

Billy was correct in his answer of 30 cows treated by a Cepravin Herd Pack.

Mallinckrodt Veterinary recently reached a milestone in the company's history when the 60 millionth tube of Cepravin Dry Cow was produced. Cepravin is a dry cow therapy product used by farmers at this time of the year to prevent and control mastitis.

## BOVINE TB AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 1994

### CALCULATION OF NOTIONAL MILK YIELD TO DETERMINE DAIRY STOCK REACTOR GRANT RATE

From 1st December 1994, dairy herd owners with bona fide suckler cow enterprises which are ineligible for headage/beef cow payments may, as an option, declare sucklers, requesting their exclusion in calculation of herd notional milk yield.

Interested herd owners whose herds are clear can obtain Declaration Form ER83 from the District Veterinary Office.

A completed declaration must reach the DVO prior to the commencement date of any test, including a private test. This facility will not apply in dairy herds containing suckler/beef cow headage-paid animals, as such animals are automatically taken into account in calculating notional milk yield.





# WHAT IS THE TRUE COST OF RURAL DECLINE?

Dungarvan Leader

In the light of closures and rumours of closures of Rural Post Offices, Garda Stations, etc., it has become patently obvious that there is very little communication between the relevant state bodies and the affected communities.

Any perceptible contact appears to take place after the event rather than before. This often takes the form of accusation, counter accusation and various types of misinformed comment. It is very clear that some means must be devised to rectify this situation, perhaps by encouraging local participation in a social impact study in the area in advance of any major withdrawal of local services.

Such a study would show the possible consequences of any closure, especially the inconvenience to the elderly, disabled, disadvantaged, etc. in the community.

Most communities in the country have local organisations quite capable of par-

ticipating in a local study group and this resource should not be ignored by the state bodies when closure decisions are being considered.

With the best will in the world such state agencies,

without sufficient local knowledge, can only make decisions based on economic and logistical criteria.

Early consultation with local communities may, at the best, show the folly of an independent closure and at worst, would allow the community to come to terms with the change, and create systems to cushion the impact.

At the moment the nearest attempt at communication is to leak the closure plans, gauge the extent of public reaction and if this is not too vociferous, to go ahead with the proposed action. It is time to make a change.

## Cruelty Of Fox Hunting

Dear Editor,  
I am writing to you on the subject of fox hunting. Under the 1976 Wildlife Act the fox has no protection. Foxes are hunted all year round, they are snared, poisoned, lamed, and dug out of their earths, including pregnant and nursing vixens.

We regularly see the highly dressed hunters on their fine horses, but, behind all this glamour and glitz lies a cruel and savage "sport" where the fix is hunted to exhaustion and is then savagely torn apart by the pack of hounds.


Cub hunting is also carried out, the purpose being is to train new hounds in pack work, to familiarise them with the fox scent, and to blood them. Cub hunting is a little known or publicised activity, but is in effect legalised blooding.

If killing of foxes is really necessary because of numbers etc., then it should be carried out in the humanist way possible. Wild animals feel pain the same way as domestic animals, and therefore should be similarly protected from cruelty.

There are many alternatives to fox hunting, such as drag hunting.

I urge your readers to write to the Minister Michael D. Higgins asking him to introduce legislation to outlaw fox hunting and to give protection to the fox.



## Historic Day For Lismore CBS

# QUARTER FINAL PLACE IN DR. HARTY CUP

LISMORE CBS 3-16 CHARLEVILLE CBS 1-13

Lismore CBS made history in Fermoy last Wednesday when they qualified for the semi-final of the Dr. Harty Cup. In only their second year in the competition, Lismore CBS, which is the smallest all-boys school in the competition, celebrated a famous victory over a very fancied Charleville CBS side.

Charleville, who had among their ranks Darren Ronan who played a major role in defeating the Waterford minors in this year's Munster final and who played on the Cork senior team that won the Oireachtas semi-final last weekend. The strength of this Charleville team can be seen by the fact that they had twelve of last year's team that was beaten by two points by the eventual winners, North Mon.

The game was played in ideal conditions and Mick Dolan and his men in Fermoy must be given great credit for the manner in which they prepared the field.

Lismore having won the toss, elected to play with the breeze and scored the opening point from a free from Dave Bennett. Right through the first half, Lismore and Charleville and in particular Bennett and Ronan matched each other point for point. At half time Lismore had a slender lead of 1 point which, considering the wind advantage, looked too little for the school that had been described in the previous day's "Cork Examiner" as an unknown quantity.

Charleville started the second half like men inspired and within minutes had the equalising point from a Ronan free. This was soon

followed by the lead point from B. Foley. The feeling now was, when would Lismore CBS collapse? At this stage D. Bennett switched to centre field and Dan Shanahan moved to full forward.

The move seemed to work and bore fruit as Shanahan kicked Lismore's first goal of the game. The fervour and courage with which all the Lismore lads hurled gave an indication of the tremendous team work that exists among this bunch of men.

Three more points were added by Lismore to give them a six point lead and they looked home and dry. Ronan, who at this stage was being superbly marshalled by Ballyduff man John Twomey moved to full forward and straight away scored a goal of the highest quality.

Now the pressure was really on with ten minutes remaining. Charleville missed an excellent chance to level the match and from the resulting clearance Michael Shanahan scored a wonderful goal to restore the 6 point advantage. With time running out, Charleville looked beaten and just before the final whistle M. Shanahan goaled again to ensure victory.

### HUNG IN BALANCE

A 9 point margin flattered Lismore as the match hung in the balance up to the last six or seven minutes.

This victory ranks alongside all previous achievements of the school. Against all the odds, Lismore CBS have helped to further the cause of Waterford hurling. The "unknown quantity" have now become known.

This was a brilliant team effort but certain individuals played a massive role —

James McNamara and Jason Barry in the full back line, John Twomey and Stephen Quinn at half back, Eugene O'Brien at centre field and the Shanahans and Bennetts in the forward line.

Tim O'Callaghan, the Charleville coach, told the Lismore students that Charleville expected to go all the way in this year's competition and felt that we had the players to do it provided the right work was done over the next couple of months. The school now meets the North Mon., Cork in the semi-final in February. Will the 'plucky Lismore CBS' as the Irish Independent called them have it in them to face up to, never mind beat, that most famous of hurling academies.

# Sparkling Display Earns Waterford Deserved Win

The explosion of joy which greeted Brian Greene's 62nd minute goal in this pulsating National League match is something that will stand out in the memories of the huge crowd who were privileged to watch this enthralling contest between two evenly balanced teams who had produced a draw result when they last clashed in Fraher field.

Last year when the teams met in New Ross, Wexford emerged winners by a point scored in the 63rd minute of the game, and it was a great source of satisfaction to reverse the result here when we came from behind to score the winner in the 62nd minute. Account settled!

The conditions were bad and as the game progressed the field became soft and soggy and was very cut up by the time the game finished. The conditions made it difficult for the players but all credit to both sides for having overcome the handicap to play splendid hurling all through.

A crowd of about 3,000 turned up and apart from the surface of the ground, conditions were ideal, with no breeze and only hazy sunshine.

## PLAY

The referee got the match underway one minute before time and within seconds of the start Brian Greene shot the first of our six first half wides. From the puck-out Wexford attacked and Tom Dempsey opened the scoring for the visitors in the 1st minute. A minute later the same player pointed a free.

Waterford had two wides before John Meaney flicked the ball to the Wexford net for our opener in the 7th minute. The pass from Billy O'Sullivan was well measured as was the same player's point in the 9th minute. We now held a lead which was maintained for the next 50 minutes. A goal was missed when Paul Flynn, having broken through the Wexford defence, sent wide across the goalmouth in the 11th minute. Paul made amends by scoring the next 2 points from placed balls.

Wexford's Paul Flynn was next to score and his point left just a goal between the teams in the 17th minute. Peter Queally sent in a rocket at the Wexford keeper whose save was applauded. A spectacular point by Gary Gater in the 23rd minute extended our lead to four points and this was reduced again when the Slanerysider's D. McDonald pointed from a very

difficult angle. Brian Greene's 29th minute point was followed within a minute by McDonald's 30-minute goal that brought Wexford to within a single point of the home side at the half way stage: 1-5 to 1-4.

## EXTENDED LEAD

At the start of the second half, Sean Cullinane had replaced the injured Fergal Hartley. Within seconds of the throw-in, Michael Hubbard, receiving a ball from his clubmate Peter Queally, extended our lead to 2 points, but within another minute Tom Dempsey opted for a point from a semi-penalty for Wexford. The next three scores came in the 4th minute when Tony Brown, following a very long solo, sent over; in the 6th minute Paul Flynn from a free and in the 9th minute when Peter Queally had a good score from play.

By this time Waterford had again gone 4 points in front and were playing the better hurling, but the visiting table-toppers were showing no sign of surrendering and Tom Dempsey's 10th minute point renewed their confidence as did Liam Scallan's point a minute later. Greene and Dempsey exchanged points to leave three points between the sides at the threequarter stage.

Paul Flynn and Billy O'Sullivan added minor scores in the 46th and 48th minutes and after E. Scallan and substitute Damien Byrne exchanged points to leave the state of play at 1-13 to 1-9 in our favour by the 53rd minute, the home crowd felt happy enough about our chances, but Wexford had other ideas and came fighting back for the next four scores which gave them a goal and three points and a lead of 2 points just on the 60th minute. D. McDonald had his second goal in the 57th minute and the points were scored by G. Laffin, P. Flynn and B. Burns.

In the two remaining minutes, Waterford, urged on by the huge home support, threw caution to the wind,

broke upfield and after a move involving a number of players, Greene shot hard and low into the Wexford net to give Waterford a dramatic and well deserved victory at the end of an exciting hour in which a total of 15 players shared in the scoring.

This was Waterford's first really competitive game in Fraher Field for over a year and it was the first time that the majority of the home supporters had seen them in action since the Munster championship and everyone will agree that there is a noticeable improvement in standards on our side. The level of skill and commit-

ment is undoubtedly there and with more time and patience we can start thinking in terms of winning a Munster championship or even more. At the same time it would be foolish to get carried away with this victory as there is still a long road ahead and there is need for everyone to keep their feet on the ground.

We are now sharing top place on the table with Wexford, Offaly and Down and it is not a bad situation going into the Christmas break.

There was a good attendance of delegates, very many of whom engaged in the very interesting debate on championship structures which took place at the end of the meeting when the routine business had been dealt with.

**CONVENTION**

It was decided to hold the annual divisional convention at Aghish on Thursday, January 12 at 8 p.m. It was further decided that all nominations and motions will have to be in the hands of the Secretary, Anthony Walsh, on or before Saturday, December 17.

**CORRESPONDENCE**

Correspondence regarding the purchase of electronic scoreboards for county and club grounds outlined the usefulness of this most modern type of scoreboard which is available to committees in charge of club grounds for a sum of £940. Clubs wishing to avail of the offer should contact the Board Secretary who in turn will communicate with the firm involved.

An enlarged and laminated photograph of the 1959 All Ireland senior hurling team with complete details of the teams achievements during that historic season were on display at the meeting and offered for sale by Tom Morrisson, Cork who specialises in the business and is a known supporter of Waterford county teams. Delegates agreed that it is good value at the nominal price of £3. Board Treasurer, Tony Morrissey undertook to act as salesman on behalf of the Board.

**ALL STAR GAMES**

A rather novel ideal to raise funds for the Lions Club and W.L.R. Christmas Appeal was outlined to delegates by county P.R.O. Brendan Tobin and was given full approval by the meeting.

On a double-decker programme at Fraher Field on

a December date, county senior football champions, the Nire, will play a county All Star selection and county senior hurling champions, Mount Sion, will play an All Star hurling selection. The hurling game will be played first and following this it is hoped to have a number of celebrity events.

Each club and all Board officials have been asked to take 10 tickets which cost £2. The ticket will be signed by the purchaser and surrendered at the turnstiles and a raffle for hampers, etc., will take place (with no additional charge) during the programme.

The Chairman urged all clubs to give this their full support because of the great work being done by the Lions Club and also to show our appreciation of the splendid co-operation being given by W.L.R. to County and Divisional Board activities.

**CHAMPIONSHIPS**

In his report to the meeting the Secretary, Anthony Walsh, reported that the Board's full championship schedule had been completed by October. The Chairman complimented all concerned and paid particular tribute to the Secretary for his efforts in this regard. He said that enquiries have shown that we are the only Divisional Board in the province to have our competitions finished before the end of October.

Some delegates referred to the fact that this division had been kept waiting for county finals because the Eastern division were running behind schedule. It was however, pointed out that their problems stemmed from the fact that the St. Mary's group were involved in quite a number of championships up to the final stages and this had a slowing-down effect on their progress.

Nicolas Mac Craith said that the Board were to be complimented on finishing

the championships by October, but we should never be in too much of a hurry.

Declan Barron spoke about the unsuitability of many of the grounds and complained about the fixing of county finals unsuitable venues. He referred to the bye-law relating to the alternating of venues for county finals and said this was something that should be looked at by convention. Several delegates agreed with this, but it was pointed out that if the bye-law was deleted, the result would be high-powered canvassing by clubs involved in county finals. In response to this someone pointed out jokingly that canvassing is illegal.

Noel Fleming came out very strong about the two senior county finals having been played at Walsh Park this year, after the Board spending more than half a million pounds in redeveloping Fraher Field. He said that the comfort of our patrons was of paramount importance. Again it was pointed out that the fixtures committee had to comply with the bye-laws.

Michael Lyons spoke about the poor condition of the playing surface of Fraher Field in recent weeks. The Chairman stated that the ground had been overused and the field would be back to normal when the drainage had been attended to.

**CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT**

In a long and very interesting discussion on the above subject a good number of delegates gave their views. Many criticised the systems currently in operation and it was obvious, also, that several were not in favour of a change over to the knockout.

Declan Barron, Ardmore, submitted a plan which was detailed and illustrated. This comprehensive document dealt with all the championships under the control of the Western Board and programmed each championship from round one to the final. It was not examined by the delegates but will be circulated for further study and will give clubs a chance to study it before the 1995 championship format is eventually decided upon. He offered the opinion that standards are dropping because of the present structures.

Noel Nugent, Clashmore, said that the junior hurling championship this year was very well run and was not competitive. He said that all

the games were well contested, but in some cases the delay between rounds was too long.

Tomas Caodhla, An Rinn, said that in a number of cases, winners in the division were kept waiting too long for the winners in the Eastern division.

The hold up of the club championships due to the preparation of our inter county games was referred to by a number of delegates. Nioclas Mac Craith said that 3,000 club players had their schedule interrupted because of 250 inter county players. He thought that hurling and football championships should be divided and the switching of codes avoided. He also came out strongly in favour of admitting group teams into the championships.

Greg Fives who spoke on standards, said the number of substitutes being carried by our county teams was a joke as the records showed that only an average of 2 were played in games. This was a factor in delaying the

club championships. He said he was very much in favour of the straight knockout championship.

Nicky Donovan spoke also about the decline in standards at club level, which, he said was noticeable over a number of years.

Michael Lyons felt the league could be retained for smaller groups.

Noel Fleming said the Boards should insist on the minor county finals being played in conjunction with the senior finals and he wondered why there had been a departure from this policy. The Chairman pointed out that in many cases in recent times, the same club was engaged in both finals and this meant a player problem on the day.

A number of delegates spoke about refereeing standards and Micheal O Tobin, Sean Phobal, asked if anything was being done to improve refereeing standards. The Chairman told him that coaching and recruiting was a matter for the county referees' body and he understood that they had met last week.

John Lyons spoke about the high standard of refereeing in the junior football county final and Christy

O'Brien also spoke on the refereeing standards.

**NO DECISIONS!**

At the end of this debate, one could not help but feeling that what transpired was more of a review of what had happened throughout the year, rather than a restructuring of the championships for next year, and there was certainly no indication that there are going to be major changes in the championship format. The first meeting of the new Board will decide on this matter in February next.

**LAST MEETING**

As this was the final meeting of the outgoing Board, the Chairman thanked all clubs for their splendid co-operation which had enabled the committee to complete the championships in very good time. He thanked each member of the Officer Board for their attendance at meetings and for their co-operation and help and for working as a team in transacting the business of the Board in a very busy year. Greg Fives complimented the Board on finishing the championships and also for playing the special inter hurling championship which was won by his club.

**WRIGHT UNHAPPY**  
Cllr. Tony Wright declared, however, that he was still unhappy with the tenant selection process and that until such time as he had "assurance from Respond that tenants would be taken from the list in order of housing priority", he would oppose the proposed development.

Mr. Connolly replied, however, that the Respond agency will write to all those on the housing list who would qualify as a tenant for the estate i.e. those with an income not exceeding £8,500. The County Manager stressed he had "no doubt that 30 applicants will be off the housing list", with little or no variance to the Council's priority housing list.

### BEST USE OF LAND

Satisfied that by handing the site over to Respond the Council was thereby making 'the best use of the land', Mr. Connolly further stated "this estate will interlink and integrate well with the area" giving people from the area a chance to get their own house. Sharing the Manager's sentiments, Cllr. Austin Deasy, T.D., said Respond was a

first class organisation that will do the town of Dungarvan proud.

"I'm quite happy the development will be a success" declared Cllr. Michael O'Riordan while Cllr. Austin Flynn said the housing development was a great chance for the Council to gain an additional 33 houses.

### THE WAY FORWARD

U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said he disagreed with Cllr. Wright's rationale and highlighted the positive effects of an additional 33 houses in Dungarvan. "It will bring work into the town", he added "an interaction of money and a significant investment". "Any emotive backlash will be non-productive", he warned.

In conclusion, Cllr. Kyne said that social housing such as Respond's policy, "is now the way forward in Ireland". On a proposal by Cllr. Nuala Ryan and seconded by Cllr. Lar Hart the voluntary housing agency received the green light to proceed with the proposed estate on which construction will hopefully commence in the near future.
