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
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Kyne Elected Chairman Of S.E.H.B.

Local Labour polltopper, Billy Kyne has certainly come up trumps once again following his unanimous election last Thursday to the Chair of the South Eastern Health Board.

Already Chairman of Dungarvan UDC and the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, Cllr. Kyne is also Vice-Chairman of The new South East Regional Development Authority and long-time member and past Chairman of Waterford County Council. The popular public representative is the only SEHB

Chairman ever to hail from Dungarvan, other Co. Waterford men being Gary O'Halloran and Charlie Curran.

UNANIMOUS ELECTION

A dedicated member of the SEHB since 1985, Cllr. Kyne's unanimous election as Chairman was based on an agreement set up between various political and other medical professional representatives of the Health Board.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" Cllr. Kyne said the previous year of 1993/94 had been a year of many significant developments carried out by the

Health Board and emanating from the expressed interest of the Health Minister, Brendan Howlin, T.D. Minister Howlin's commitment to the South Eastern Health Board received much honourable comment," he enthused.

Looking forward to his 12 month term as Chairman, Cllr. Kyne said he would work with CEO, John Cooney to carry out the main objectives of the Board and to chair the monthly meetings.

U.D.C. FAILS TO STRIKE RATE

At a reconvened estimates meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council last night (Tuesday, December 13th) members voted on a 4-3 majority to defer striking a rate until an incoming government is formed. Proposed by Cllr. Lar Hart and seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan the initial vote was 3 for and 3 against (2 members abstained) with U.D.C. Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne using his special

casting vote to break the deadlock 4-3 in favour of a deferral until such time as a stable government has been formed.

Now threatening on the brink of abolition, the Council has until Sunday December 18th to strike a rate, an allowed span of 21 days.

Local Grants Approved

Deputy Brendan Kenneally has been informed by Michael Smith, T.D., Minister for Environment that he has approved grants under the 1994 Small Water & Sewerage Schemes Programme in Co. Waterford.

A grant of £75,000 has been approved towards the estimated cost of £100,500 for the replacement of water main in the Deelish/Ballina-

courty water supply and Kilrossanty water supply scheme.

The Minister for Social Welfare, Dr. Michael Woods, T.D., has also informed Deputy Brendan Kenneally that he is making a grant of £1,000 to the Dungarvan Resource Centre for the Unemployed, Lower Main Street, towards the purchase of a computer.



Exciting Plans For Dungarvan Harbour

A possible sewerage treatment plan may well be one critical step closer for Dungarvan following Waterford County Council's adoption last Monday of a water quality management plan for Dungarvan Harbour. The detailed 34 page long executive summary prepared by the Council's consultants, E.G. Pettit & Co. was described by Cllr. Billy Kyne as "the most important" study or document to come before the Council in many years. The study itself was jointly undertaken by Waterford Co. Council and Waterford Foods, part financed by the European Commission. The entire cost of the water quality plan was £95,000, £20,000 of which was EU financed while the Department of the Environment provided another £35,000 and the remainder was covered by Waterford Foods.

The plan itself is a forerunner to a local sewerage treatment plant as one of its primary objectives is to provide secondary treatment of the existing untreated municipal and industrial wastewater being discharged into Dungarvan harbour. Other general objectives include the prevention of pollution, and thereby safeguarding public health and enhancing the aquatic environment.

Speaking at the December meeting of the Council, Waterford Co. Manager, Donal Connolly revealed that a second report would be presented to the Council in one month's time with regard to a main drainage system for such a treatment plant for the town.

QUALITY OF EXISTING HARBOUR WATER

While conditions in the outer harbour were found to be satisfactory, the report outlined various localised problems in the inner harbour, "mainly associated with municipal and industrial wastewater discharges to the harbour, and the presence of nitrates and ammonia in the freshwater inflows". High lead levels were found in the upper reaches of the Colligan Estuary while the animals found in the outer harbour were typical of clean waters "though low in species richness and fauna abundance". A widespread distribution of green algae was also found. Surveys of the inner harbour found chromium

contamination of mussels.

BENEFICIAL USES

The quality management plan also outlines the principal beneficial uses of Dungarvan harbour including shellfish cultivation, harvesting wild shellfish, fishing for salmonids and other species, sailing, board sailing, canoeing, motor boating, water skiing, jet skiing, diving/snorkelling and angling. Other recreational uses include bathing, golf, nature observation etc. Also mentioned in the report is the wild bird feeding area incorporating Western Bay, the inner portion of Whitehouse Bank and Spit Bank. These areas of Dungarvan Harbour have recently been designated by the Office of Public Works as a Special Protection Area under the State "to take appropriate steps to ensure that wild birds and their habitats are protected".

BALLINACOURTY - OPTIMUM AREA

Summarising the overall content of the management plan, Co. Engineer John O'Flynn prepared a memorandum for the Council in which he explained that the single greatest pressure within the plan area "is the combined municipal and industrial waste water load entering the Harbour at Abbeyside from Dungarvan town and to environs".

The load is equivalent to that from a population of about 73,000, and it is proposed to provide secondary treatment for same by the year 2000.

The plan identifies Ballinacourty as the optimum area for discharging treated effluent, based on detailed mathematical modelling. Plan policy also calls for secondary treatment to be provided for the wastewater discharged from the Ring/Helvick/Ballinagoul area. The current treatment at Ballinroad is considered adequate, though upgrading may be required in the future. Regular monitoring and ongoing assessment of aquaculture in Dungarvan harbour figures prominently on the plan's agenda. The study also recognises the need for comprehensive examination of all proposals for expansion of existing aquaculture locations and cultivation at new areas, having particular regard to potential conflicts with other beneficial uses of the area.

MAJOR POTENTIAL

Fully appreciative of the plan, Cllr. Billy Kyne said there was major potential for commercial expansion in Ballinacourty particularly so with the recent demolition of the Quigley-Magne-site plant.

Proposing that the water quality management plan be duly adopted by the council, Cllr. Kyne deemed it a

"critical first step for the orderly development of the whole catchment area of Dungarvan harbour".

Continuing, Cllr. Kyne said that an eventual sewerage plant would greatly improve the possibility of attracting future industry to the town. He then encouraged all concerned to proceed rapidly with the development.

His adoption proposal was immediately seconded by Cllr. Austin Flynn who complimented Waterford Foods Plc's involvement in the water quality plan.

The realisation of a sewerage treatment plant "will be of huge benefit to the whole of Dungarvan harbour". Cllr. Flynn stated, adding that he was looking forward to cleaner water and a cleaner harbour. The Water Quality Management Plan on Dungarvan Harbour will now be put on public display for any observations or feedback from members of the public.

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LARGEST RANGE OF RAWL BOLTS AND DISCS IN TOWN

EQUINE EXPERTS DIFFER SHARPLY AT DUNGARVAN COURT

Equine experts differed sharply on the pedigree rating of an unraced five-year-old mare when giving evidence at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

David Pym, an international bloodstock auctioneer with Tattersalls, and John Anderson of the Curragh Bloodstock Agency, were witnesses in a civil action in which a County Waterford farmer, Patrick McGrath, Kilgabriell, Clashmore, sued a farming neighbour, John Cliffe, D'Loughtane, Youghal, arising out of an incident in July 1992 when the defendant's bull got into an adjoining field and gored the plaintiff's un-named five year old mare.

Liability was admitted by the defendant, and the court was only being asked to assess the plaintiff's damages.

The court was told that the horse received a severe wound under the foreleg and as a result of the injury could never be raced.

Patrick McGrath said in evidence that when he found the mare she was unable to move and the wound was "very deep". The mare, he said, was very well bred being out of "Solo Run" and "General Ironside".

David Pym of Tattersalls said that apart from her injuries, which left the mare with a visible scar, she was in otherwise excellent condition. He described her as "above average" pedigree and put her pre-accident value at £10,500.

However, John Anderson of the Curragh Bloodstock Agency, said that the mare's mother had five foals of racing age, none of which had made it onto the racecourse. He opined the mare's pedigree to be "very moderate" and said he was being generous in putting her pre-accident value at £7,000.

"It is very difficult to sell National Hunt horses at the moment" Mr. Anderson added.

Judge Esmond Smyth commented that horse racing is a specialist business and a very selective approach is taken by people who go to the sales to buy horses.

Judge Smyth assessed the plaintiff's total damages at £8,150 and awarded McGrath a decree for the amount together with costs.

Late Mr. John Byrne

On last Saturday the entire district was stunned into sadness with the news of the death, which occurred after an illness of long duration borne with true Christian fortitude at his residence, of Mr. John (Jack) Byrne, "The Glebe", Kilonan, Kilmanahan, and late Boolabrien Upper, Ballymacarbry.

Deceased was a member of an old and respected Ballymacarbry family, who saw the light of day in 1921 when Ireland's fight for freedom was taking place. Brought up in a Republican environment, at an early age he began to be involved in politics with the Fianna Fail party and proved himself a valued member of the party and for over forty years he was secretary of the Fourmilewater Cumann, a position from which he resigned a couple of years ago.

During the Emergency he served with the local Defence Force, an organisation of which he was a valued member. He was a wonderful family man, a devoted husband and a loving father. He was possessed of an old world charm that was refreshing for all and he was always welcome in whatever company he found himself. A thoughtful neighbour his integrity, courtesy and outgoing sincere nature commended him to young and old alike. He was indeed the essence of good humour and established lasting friendships with all who were indeed fortunate to know him and who now feel a deep sense of personal loss as they justifiably mourn his sad demise.

Many tributes have been paid to his memory but perhaps the finest was provided on Sunday evening by the huge concourse of mourners who were present when his remains were removed from Condon's Funeral Parlour, Clonmel, to the parish church of St. Laurence, Fourmilewater. Amongst the mourners were many T.D.'s, Senators and County Councillors from many places.

On arrival at the church a guard of honour of members of the Fianna Fail Party was formed. His remains were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Edmund Tobin, P.P., Fourmilewater/Newcastle. On Monday morning the Feast of St. Sabas, Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his gentle soul. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Edmund Tobin, assisted by Rev. Fr. Maher, Rockwell College, Cashel and Rev. Fr. Paddy Hallinan, retired Foreign Mission.

After Mass as the December rains came down, a great friend of the people was laid to rest in the family plot beside his mother who predeceased him by thirty one years, and his father who predeceased him by sixty years, he being interred in Newcastle. Again one of the largest concourses of mourners seen in the district for some time was present as they came to say farewell to a dear Christian friend whose memory they will cherish. Fr. Edmund Tobin, P.P., officiated at the graveside with the other clergy. Fr. Maher recited a decade of the rosary.



The Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland wish to notify owners and occupiers of land in County Waterford that consideration is being given to proposals for legislation under which applications might be made for the designation as Natural Heritage Areas (NHAs), on the grounds of importance for wildlife conservation, of the shaded areas on the map shown. All landowners and occupiers will have an opportunity to be heard and to object before a decision to designate is made.

The Commissioners have sent copies of maps of the proposed NHAs to County Waterford Planning Authorities and to certain other Public Authorities including certain grant aiding authorities. These other authorities include the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, which has responsibility for giving grants for forestry purposes, the Department of the Marine, which has responsibility for granting aquaculture licences and Bord Iascaigh Mhara, which has responsibility for giving grants for aquaculture development. Those authorities have been requested to give the Commissioners an opportunity to make representations and if necessary, submit relevant reports before making any decision which might affect the proposed NHAs. The Commissioners might make the case that a Public Authority should consider whether an application e.g. for planning permission or a grant, should be refused on the grounds that it would, if accepted, lead to ecologically damaging developments in these areas.

In accordance with the ordinary decision making procedures of those authorities, decisions which might affect the proposed NHAs will be made by them after fully informing all parties entitled to be heard, including the provision of all relevant information to such parties and allowing them the opportunity of answering if they so wish, any case made by the Commissioners.

The fact that the Commissioners are proposing that certain sites be designated as NHAs does not impose any restrictions on occupiers or landowners.

1/2" maps of the proposed NHAs may be viewed in the Teagasc, Farm Development Offices and Department of Social Welfare Offices and Garda Stations in the County. Arrangements to view the 6" maps of the proposed NHAs may be made with the National Parks & Wildlife Staff in the County. Further information on this matter is available on request.

Herdowners in townlands containing proposed NHAs will be notified by post as soon as possible. Owners/occupiers identified by OPW will be contacted later and provided with a site map and a site report.

At a later stage, consideration will be given as to whether to designate sites purely of geological/geomorphological interest, on foot of advice from the Geological Survey of Ireland.

Glass Cutter Loses Civil Action

A glass cutter has lost his civil action for damages against his employers Waterford Crystal Ltd.

During a hearing at last week's Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge Esmond Smyth, it was disclosed that top earning glass cutters at Waterford Crystal were making £600-plus a week in 1992.

Plaintiff in the action was Brian Flynn, 3 Abbott's Close, Seapark, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, who brought a claim for £30,000 damages against his employers, Waterford Crystal Ltd., arising from a hand injury sustained by him while working on the manufacture of a crystal mantelpiece clock at the company's Dungarvan

plant on April 8, 1992.

The disclosure of the earnings within the glass cutting department was made by the company's current safety manager and former master craftsman, Thomas O'Brien, while giving evidence in the case.

Mr. O'Brien also disclosed that in 1992 the average weekly wage for the glass cutters would have been between £420 and £450, though the plaintiff's average wage at that time was about £360 a week.

Brian Flynn told the court that while using a diamond wheel in cutting a clock mantelpiece he sustained an injury to the little finger on his left hand. The wheel had slipped and as a result of the injury he has been left with a permanent scar and with a permanent loss of sensation in the finger.

Flynn, who has been with the company for 16 years, said the first diamond wheel he was using didn't fit properly into the crystal piece he was working on. He asked for a replacement wheel and was given one which was a bit better than the first one. He still wasn't entirely happy with it, however, because it was a bit flat and he went back to the office to see if he could get another one. There were none available so he continued work-

ing with the one he had.

The plaintiff said that subsequently the clock he was working on jumped on the wheel and he sustained the hand injury. He was sent to Cork Regional Hospital and had an operation on the finger the following morning.

In cross-examination Flynn denied that the injury was the result of a momentary lapse of concentration on his part.

Thomas O'Brien, the company staff officer, said he believed that the profile of the diamond wheel used by Flynn was correct on the basis that the cut on the base of the clock on which he (plaintiff) was working at the time was perfect.

Having retired for a period to consider the case details in depth Judge Smyth returned with a decision in favour of the company.

Describing the plaintiff as an expert glass cutter, Judge Smyth said that taking into account all the evidence he could only conclude that the accident was due either to a momentary lapse of concentration by Flynn or through his failure to clean the diamond cutter as he pursued his work on that day.

The Judge dismissed the plaintiff's claim for damages and awarded the costs of the action to Waterford Crystal Ltd.

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

U.D.C. FAILS TO STRIKE RATE

(Continued From Front Page) voted on a 5-4 majority to abolish water charges for urban ratepayers, a charge which was first introduced in 1983. The vote came following a proposal by Cllr. Nuala Ryan and seconded by Cllr. Austin Deasy that the U.D.C. continue to implement water charges. The motion was defeated, however, and water charges abolished.

Having failed to strike a rate for 1995 County Manager, Donal Connolly will now write to the incoming Minister for the Environment explaining the Council's difficult financial dilemma and seeking clarification on the incoming government's attitude to the entire concept of water charges.

It was generally held by members that should a rainbow coalition be formed, the outspoken objections of Democratic Left and the Labour Party to the water charge issue would undoubtedly carry more weight.

STRONG WARNING

Waterford County Manager, Mr. Connolly, however, strongly warned the Council of the negative consequences of deferring the urban estimates meeting beyond the December 18th deadline.

Mr. Connolly said that in his opinion, the Environment Minister, who has the power to abolish the U.D.C.,

would see the Council's deferral as a total abuse of its power. "The Council has an obligation to adopt an estimate in 21 days", he stressed, "90% of local authorities have adopted their estimates by now".

Furthermore, Mr. Connolly strongly advised Council members that should any incoming government vote to abolish water charges such a programme would not come into effect until 1996.

Sharing Mr. Connolly's concerns, Cllr. Deasy said a deferral of the estimates decision would not be a 'responsible attitude'.

"We would be risking the possibility of abolition unless a new government decides to abolish water charges", he insisted adding that the Environment Minister "will probably not reply with a positive answer" to the Council's letter.

BONE OF CONTENTION

At the outset of the meeting, Cllr. Deasy again referred to the massive £1/4 million owed by the U.D.C. to Waterford County Council and which the Manager proposed to repay over a five year period at £50,000 per annum. Describing the annual repayment as a 'major imposition' on the Council, Cllr. Deasy said he felt slightly critical that Mr. Connolly had not briefed Council members on the arrears before the County Council rate was struck. "It

would have been helpful to have known in advance", he added, deeming the arrears as a fait accompli, given the fact that the £250,000 was included in the County Council's estimates for 1995. "Members did not know of these massive arrears", he slammed. Another bone of contention for Council members was the proposed controversial introduction of a refuse collection charge which the Manager sought to introduce at the previous esti-

mates meeting - the 50p tag a bag charge. Satisfied that members would not agree with this charge, Mr. Connolly instead proposed a £20 charge per household for refuse collection throughout the year. As in the case of water charges, this service charge would also qualify for the normal waiver scheme. Again the whole concept of a refuse charge was met with resolute objections from members who saw the charge as an additional tax on urban


ratepayers.

The proposed increase of £8 on domestic water charges to £55 and a .15p increase on commercial water charges to £1.75 per 1000 gallons have also gone by the wayside as the Council later voted to abolish water charges in their entirety.

With the Council obviously unable to accept the County Manager's proposed estimates or his compromises of introducing a £20 refuse charge per household and increase council car

park charges by .10p, the meeting ended on a note of uncertainty. What will be the Minister's reply to the Council's dire financial situation and what direction will members take when they finally reconvene to strike a rate? As in the words of Cllr. Kyne, the Council, whether rightly or wrongly has chosen its course of action.

What happens next, will be closely followed by Councillors and urban rate payers alike.





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TEAGASC Says

EARLY LAMB

Lambs will be arriving, hopefully, in large numbers, on early lambing units from now on. Keeping as many of these alive as possible is the obvious priority for the next couple of weeks. Hygiene, organisation and attention to detail are the key areas involved.

Organisation — Every early lamb producer knows when lambing will start. Better still, most know — because of the sponging routine, when lambing will peak and when it will finish. The peak occurs at day 146 to 147 after mating, with a spread of 3 days either side. Given that situation, there is no excuse for being caught unprepared. Organisation involves making sure that sufficient help is available and all facilities are ready when needed.

Help — 24 hour supervision is almost essential in early lambing flocks because: (a) Lambing is compacted into less than a week and (b) High litter sizes mean that fostering of multiples is essential; this process is most successful when the ewe gets her new family within a few minutes of lambing herself.

Facilities — Lambing pens are top of the list here. Again, because of the compact nature of the early lambing season, the usual 1 pen for 10 ewes is not enough and could be trebled to good effect. Pens should be assembled in advance, power hosed, disinfected, dusted with slaked lime and bedded with clean straw.

They should be at least 5'x4'6" in size and some should be made bigger than this for triplets. Group pens should be prepared capable of holding 5-8 ewes with their lambs. Allow over 20 square feet per ewe.

Equipment — There is a long list of materials and equipment which is needed in the modern lambing shed, such as fostering crate, lamb warming box, infrared lamp, disposable gloves, water heater or electric kettle, stomach tubes, bottles, rubber teats, glucose, iodine solution and colostrum bank. The colostrum bank is best provided by milking one quarter of each single-producing ewe immediately after lambing.

Veterinary Requirements — Every flock owner should discuss his needs with his vet before lambing starts. Broad-spectrum antibiotic injections and penicillins for difficult lambings, milk let-down hormone and lamb scour preparations are the most obvious requirements.

PREVENT ENVIRONMENTAL MASTITIS

This is an acute form of mastitis which is the cause of serious loss in some dairy herds. It is associated with wet and soiled bedding. It is best controlled by keeping cows clean and dry:—

H Solid passages should be scraped twice daily.

H Cubicles should have a good airy atmosphere to prevent condensation and damp bedding.

H Cubicles should be re-bedded frequently with dry sawdust, chopped straw or sand.

H Tall clippings helps to reduce the spread of disease from passages and cubicles to the udder and from cow to cow.

H Cows should always calve in a clean pen.

SILO MANAGEMENT

Good silage face management is critical to minimise deterioration:—

H Silage at the face should be removed at an average of at least 4 inches/day in cold weather and at a considerably higher rate in warm weather.

H The silo face should be disturbed as little as possible — use a block cutter or shear grab rather than a front loader.

Where dry matter is high and stability is a problem, offer livestock fresh silage daily. This encourages high intakes.

TILLAGE

Soil conditions have, for a long period, been far too wet to attempt further sowing. Drying conditions at this time of year are generally poor and it will take time to get soils dry enough for ploughing and tilling. It will take a major change to make sowing between now and mid-January worthwhile. When travelling conditions improve, crops should get an Aphicide if not already treated. Aphid numbers are low and in broken weather are unlikely to increase rapidly.

Memories Of Times Past

Oh, there are hundreds over the last 40 years. I well remember the great schools matches in Curley's field and the thrills and excitement attending them, the great support afforded by Paddy McCarthy Chairman of the club then. Tom McCarthy R.I.P. gave us our first football. We never missed an evening except for week-ends and the freshness and the enthusiasm of the boys was infectious. There were great hurling and football games with Conna and Lismore, Ballyduff and Cappoquin.

Those hectic clashes of the early '60's gave the lads plenty of match experience and were valuable preparation for the sterner tests ahead as they grew to maturity. Training in those days was so chock-full of enjoyment and satisfaction with big panels dotting the field, our newly-acquired field, (Tallow Gaelic Field, officially opened in 1963) and the proceedings were regularly monitored by dozens of spectators giving silent support. Dusk was an unwelcome interruption.

The great days of Under 16, minor and Under 21 triumphs aren't easily forgotten. Hurling and football, Sunday after Sunday. The

satisfaction and pride of the bus - and car loads heading for Lismore or Cappoquin, Waterford or Dunhill. Tallow's deserted streets as the cavalcade set forth.

Everybody helped with the transport. Willie O'Brien regularly drummed a dozen animated little cheer-leaders into his Volkswagen, every one of them in a permanent state of hunger and thirst. "Now lads", Willie used rashly promise before the expedition set out, "if ye're good and we win we'll all have ice cream". Sure he bought it anyway.

Francie Fitzgerald and Hannah, self-appointed travel service on match days the car bursting with youthful support, a flag out of every window. God rest you Willie and Francie we're not likely to forget you.

What would we have done without Mick Mulcahy of Ballinaha? Very few knew or appreciated all he did for the hurlers, young and old, good and bad. If a hurler needed an adjustment made, an alteration or repair he went to Mick. No job (he was always busy) was too much trouble for him as he applied his skill and craft to our benefit. Many a hurley he fashioned if the ash became available and this task

was performed quietly and unobtrusively. Thanks for the memories Mick.

John Collins, R.I.P. of Knocknamuck was the epitome of the faithful supporter. He'd gladly have walked every step of the way to any venue where the Blue and Gold were playing. John was always picked up on match day, he was an integral part of our club.

Sonny O'Brien, still happily with us, was a quiet undemonstrative chap who was treasurer in those days. He was utterly loyal and dependable and committed to the welfare of the club.

1974 was a significant year. Following defeat by Butlerstown in the County final three years previously senior hurling status, last enjoyed 40 years previously, was regained and honour restored. The glory of 1980 when Tallow were crowned County senior hurling champions at Dungarvan will never be forgotten. The G.A.A. centenary year, 1984, was celebrated fittingly in Tallow by regaining the senior hurling crown and the final at Dungarvan was notable for Tallow's emphatic victory over pre-match favourites Portlaoise. The following year's senior hurling decider brought Tallow and Ballyduff together and after a tense match the title was retained by the narrowest of margins. A wonderful exhilarating exhibition against Kilruane in the Munster Club semi-final was the finest display from this team and we were decidedly unlucky to be beaten by one point in the last minute. Kilruane were later to become All Ireland club champions.

We are now at a crossroads. An infusion of youth is needed, a recharging of batteries, a refreshing of memory, a rekindling of the spirit of the '60's and '70's and '80's. There is need for latter-day Willie O'Brien's and Francie Fitzgerald's and John Collins. We can't survive on memories and nostalgia. But memories can inspire, can uplift. Long may our memories endure to illumine the way forward.

Sár Ofche — Last Friday evening was a big night for the club, a night of nostalgia and the celebration of achievement. The meal (thanks to Bernie and Michael Kearney and staff) was excellent and the convivial atmosphere encouraged shared recollection and reminiscence of games and incidents and players. The hall was festively decorated and the steady flow of liq-

Pat Daly, faithful and dedicated servant of our club on and off the field over the past 25 years, spoke feelingly and wittily about his memories of those years, recalling with a fund of anecdotes the times and characters which peopled our world. Pat, who is Games Development Manager in Croke Park, wove a rich and humorous tapestry of Tallow's years of glory, a period during which he developed from outstanding juvenile to top-class senior hurler and footballer.

It was great to meet those players who wrote many chapters of Tallow's success story. We had John and Brendan Hartigan from Cork, Dermot Cantillon from Kildare, Tommy Norris from Clonmel, his brother John from Australia, Dick Cotter from Dublin, his brother Terry from Drogheda, Jim O'Donoghue from Limerick, Kieran Ryan from London. John Russell, super efficient secretary of the '70's came from Cork to renew acquaintance with colleagues and friends of those years. It was a pleasure to meet Breed and Vincent Bergin once more and famous horse trainer Pat Flynn. Fr. Sean Cotter, although he had already forwarded a contribution managed to make it. John Tobin (remember the Birch Hill star of many under age teams?) wrote expressing his disappointment at missing the night and enclosing a contribution to the club.

The music was supplied by the Prendergasts, a talented family of accomplished musicians some of whom donned the Tallow jersey in their earlier years. A specially commissioned video of Tallow's G.A.A. story is now available. Excerpts from it were shown on Friday evening. 



GARRANBANE CHURCH REDEDICATED

After a closure of two months the newly refurbished St. Vincent De Paul Church, Garranbane was re-opened on Sunday last at an occasion which was graced by the presence of His Lordship the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Bishop William Lee. It was an historic occasion for Garranbane as it is seldom a Bishop graced the small rural Church with his presence as the yearly Confirmation ceremony for the parish takes place in Abbeyside.

Garranbane is the oldest Church in the parish having been built in 1807 when the locality was part of the parish of Kilgobinet. The ancestors of many of the people in the congregation came to worship in Garranbane over the years despite the ups and downs of rural life. The Rosary would have been said in every household on a daily basis. Weekly Confession and Sunday Mass was a regular part of religious life as were the many daily phrases and salutations used such as 'God Bless The Work!'

The refurbishing and re-decorating features a new floor, ceiling, modern central heating system, a new main entrance and a new tar-macadam surface-surrounding the Church. The colour scheme and lighting highlight the many features of 'This Gem' as it was described by Bishop Lee.

The Architect was Mr. Peter Morrissey of W. O.

Morrissey & Son, Clonmel, and the Builder was the firm of E. O'Brien & Sons, Dungarvan. Eddie Moore of Dungarvan was the Electrician. Michael Roche of Dungarvan supplied the carpets. The O'Mahoney Brothers of Dungarvan prepared the Baptismal Font. The marble for the Altar, Ambo and Chair was the gift of the Cistercian Monks of Mount Melleray Abbey (two of whom, Fr. Ignatius and Fr. Francis, attended), and it was designed, prepared and erected by the firm of R. O'Keefe & Sons, Waterford. John L. Noonan of Clonmel remade and reorganised the seating.

Fr. Doherty, P.P., was Master of Ceremonies, Christina Tobin was organist, Tommy McShane was soloist. Garranbane NS provided the choir organised by Mr. Don Shiel and directed by Mrs. Laboure Cliffe.

Many of the senior citizens in the locality took part in the Offertory Procession and members of Dungarvan Brass and Reed band provided a fanfare at the Consecration. Bishop Lee in his sermon said Garranbane could look to the future with hope. The love in the families of today - of the children and parents for each other combined with strength from the past could produce a power that should enable the community to go forward.

Fr. Doherty, P.P. in his ad-

dress, thanked the Bishop, Mount Melleray Abbey, the Architect, Builders and Subcontractors and all associated with the preparation of the church, especially the Chapel woman, Bernie Troy and the voluntary workers.

Fr. Doherty also thanked the stewards, readers, altar servers and collectors and concluded by saying he hoped that one day in the not too distant future, the Bishop would return, maybe this time to ordain someone from the parish as a priest for work in our diocese of Waterford and Lismore.

After Mass Bishop Lee

stood at the door of the new entrance to greet every member of the congregation as they left the Church.

Christmas Lights

—Major Boost

Dungarvan's highly modernised computerised Christmas Light system is certainly an attractive incentive for outside shoppers to visit the town.

Creating a warm, festive atmosphere, Dungarvan's lights provide welcome entertainment as the light flashing sequence alternates from street to street. This is accompanied by lively Christmas carols and songs on the extensive sound speaker system while Santa Claus and his reindeer are festooned with lights in Grattan Square.

The official light switch-on took place on December 8th by Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly, to the delight of the crowd of children and town residents present.

At a reception held earlier in Lawlor's Hotel, Director of the town's retailing committee, Mario Flavin said the Christmas lights area major undertaking each year with £12,000 - £14,000 having to be raised locally. Mr. Flavin praised Dungarvan U.D.C. who paid 10% of total cost. "This is a very significant and crucial contribution to the light set up", he enthused. Unfortunately, the retailing committee were unable to secure a local contractor this year and the job was expertly undertaken by Suir Electrical. Again

James Kirwan, electrical contractor, oversaw the whole project.

Looking to the future, Mr. Flavin stressed that the biggest problem facing the town will be the lack of a major shopping retailer while cities such as Waterford, Cork and Clonmel town continue to develop rapidly. "There is no contest between Dungarvan and Waterford", he continued, "we simply do not have the shopping variety".

The introduction of a new major retailer should be the priority of all bodies in the town, the Chamber of Commerce, the U.D.C., the Retailing Committee, etc.

On a more optimistic note, however, Mr. Flavin disclosed that plans for the same were 'in play' already.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Connolly complimented all

concerned on a 'magnificent light system' and expressed his hope that the cooperation between the U.D.C. and the Chamber of Commerce continues in the future.

President of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, John Walsh, also thanked Acting Town Clerk Ray Moloney and the U.D.C. staff for their help and the local retailers and businesses who made funds available for the 1994 lights.

"It's now up to the people of the town to give Dungarvan the courtesy of an enquiry before purchasing elsewhere", he urged. Mr. Walsh said there was a certain air of expectancy and a confidence among retailers in the town, with local shop windows displaying a vast range of goods. "It's better than ever!", he promised.

A County Waterford publican, John Dallon, Main Street, Cappoquin, was fined £1,000 mitigated to £500 by Judge Michael Pattwell at the local District Court last week when he pleaded guilty to selling intoxicating liquor without a licence on January 14 last.

The court was told by State Solicitor Mr. A. V. Maher that a Customs and Excise official went into Dallon's pub and bought a drink. The premises was not licensed at the time and is still without a licence.

Judge Pattwell commented that the way the defendant was "caught" could have been considered "entrapment" and might make an interesting defence.

Defence solicitor, Mr. Neil Twomey, said Dallon has considerable problems with the Revenue Commissioners who are seeking a big

sum of money from him. Dallon's overall financial situation, however, was "appalling".

Judge Pattwell imposed the statutory £1,000 fine but mitigated it to £500 and intimated that he would support an application by the defendant to the Revenue Commissioners for further mitigation.

BRICKEY ATHLETES OF BYGONE YEARS

This Sunday may well see the first road race to be held in the Brickey Valley but it is far from being the first connection that the area has had with athletics as our photo from the past very much proves.

The photo featured was taken in Mallow in the late 1930's and included are the members of the Waterford Senior Cross Country team who finished third in the Munster Championship behind Cork and Clare. The famous "Ballingary Hare" John Joe Barry competed that day and the top club team of that era was O'Callaghan Mills from Clare.

Glenmore A.C. was a thriving club in the Brickey area at that time and they trained in the late Willie Curran's field in Kilosserra. In our photo both the two athletes on the right in the back row are Brickey men Martin Curran (Kilongford) and Ned Power (Mount Odell). Both men won many events at sports meetings throughout Munster and it is recalled that upon cycling home from Tipperary after one such occasion Martin Curran sold his winnings, which were proving hard to transport, to an interested buyer for a sum of £5 which no doubt was a small fortune in those days. Ned Power was an-

other allrounder of note and he was known to have regularly won more than one event at sports meetings in his day. In recent years his line of 'Odell' greyhounds has brought himself and his family supreme success on the tracks around the country and indeed further afield.

First athlete on the left in the front row is the late William O'Brien, another Brickey man, from Glenmore and his contemporaries speak of him as one of the top runners in those years. Directly behind him is the late W.J. Nolan, M.P.S.I., Main Street who was the manager and trainer of the team and he was also the main motivator of athletics in this area at that time. He was a highly respected figure in the sport. Directly behind Mr. Nolan is the late Vincent Donoghue (with hat) from Lismore who was a former president of the G.A.A. and on his right is the late Paddy Walsh from Friary Street.

In the photograph it is interesting to note the 'W' on the singlets. Snaps such as this one are gems. It gives proof of the athletic traditions in our locality and, in the week that is in it, the part that the men from the Brickey Valley played in promoting that tradition.

All Field Activity At An End For The Christmas Break

Sunday last marked the official cessation of all field activity for an eight-week period until the National League resumes on February 12, which may also be the date for the county under-21 football final between the Nire and Tramore.

The two months of a break will be deservedly enjoyed by the majority of players, but of course, club officers will not be idle as at this time all units will be stocktaking and holding their annual meetings as well as planning for the new year.

Clubs will also be considering motions and nominations for County and Western Conventions and this being the year for rule changes, I have no doubt but some clubs will come up with ideas about bringing improvement to our games by changing some of the present rules. The experimental rules brought in for the National Leagues, will have to be passed by a two-thirds majority of Congress before being introduced for the championships.

CONVENTION COMMENTARY

For the next four or five weeks all our attention will focus on boardroom matters and every effort will be made to keep readers up-to-date with Western and County Convention gossip.

At the moment there is not a great amount of canvassing going on, obviously some are waiting to know which way 'the cat is jumping' before giving a commitment. On the county scene rumours abound about possible candidates but so far only a few have given a firm decision. There

have been rumours around that County Chairman, Eamon Murphy may decide to try to stay on for a further year, but having stated publicly at last year's convention that this would be his final year, I'm sure he is unlikely to change his mind. The likelihood of his being elected for a seventh term would be pretty dim anyway.

It will be a while before we know the number who intend to stand for the chair but at the time of writing there are two declared runners, Pádraig S. O Riain, present Chairman of the Western Board and Paddy Dunphy, Tramore, who was Chairman of the Eastern Board some years ago. Rumours that Ollie Wilkinson, Frankie Cullinane and Níoclás Mac Craith will also be in the field, have not yet been confirmed or denied.

The news over the weekend that County Treasurer, James Walsh had decided to stand down came as a big surprise, even though the popular Kilgobinet man had hinted this on quite a number of occasions. Like everyone on the County Board, James has his adversaries, but he was highly respected and was very well liked and no doubt everyone will be sorry to see James retire. Christy Dowling, Erin's Own, who contested the post on the last two occasions, will likely

be in the field again this time, as may be others.

WESTERN FRONT

All is quiet here at the moment and apart from the vacancy arising from the withdrawal of Brendan Tobin from the post of County Board Representative, there are no other rumours about retirements. Brendan will be concentrating on the County PRO position and as he cannot hold two positions on the same Board, it is understandable that he would shed the less-

er of the two posts.

Paddy Joe Ryan, who is a definite candidate for the county chair, is unlikely to be opposed for the Western Chair after his first year in office, but should he be successful in the contest for the Senior Board chair, he will step down and leave the divisional vacancy to be filled in the normal way.

Clubs should note that Saturday of this week is the final date for the acceptance of nominations and motions for the Western Convention.

Friends Of Waterford Football

The special committee set up by Coisde na Peil recently to organise the above have had several very satisfactory meetings and have now compiled a very comprehensive and well documented constitution produced in a nine-page submission which will go to the County Board for ratification and approval.

The object of this new body is to act in conjunction with the Waterford

County Board and Coide na Peil to support and improve the image and status of Waterford as well as the promotion of football in primary and secondary schools. Coisde na Peil have described this as a new and exciting development in the overdue promotion of the game here.

There will likely be an official launch when the constitution has been given County Board approval.

Better Deal From R.T.E.

Proposals for greatly increased coverage of gaelic games by R.T.E. for the coming season are presently being considered by the association and in 1995 a bigger number of matches will be shown by the station.

The proposals by R.T.E. include a suggestion that the 'Sunday Game' series from May to July would consist of a game being shown 'live' on R.T.E. television every Sunday evening at 6 p.m. and the highlight of the remaining games would be shown immediately afterwards (i.e. the programme would run from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. approximately). However not all the provinces are in favour of putting back the starting time of matches to such a late hour, so this aspect of the proposal is unlikely to be pursued. Many of our people will agree that to accept such a proposal would mean that that which might 'be gained on the swings, would be lost in the roundabout'. Travelling away to an inter-county match with a 6 p.m. start would pose all sorts of problems for patrons as well as for County Boards who would then be required to refrain from fixing club championship games for that day, if patrons were to be free to travel. So it would seem that the 6 o'clock start for Munster championship games in the May/July period will become a non-starter. However, it is good to know that there will be an increase in the number of games to be televised.



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
