

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I do voluntary work in the course of which I frequently have to try to find out which particular organisation or support agency I can call on or refer clients to. It is usually in the evenings that I need this information when most places are closed. Can you suggest where I might get a list of the different voluntary organisations?

Answer — Yes, the National Social Service Board has just published a new revised edition of their Directory of National Voluntary Organisations, Social Service Agencies and other Useful Public Bodies. This is a most useful directory to have for those working in the field of information and advice such as librarians, social workers, health professionals, voluntary and statutory organisations, journalists and politicians.

It is also an invaluable source of information for volunteers or any member of the public looking for information about voluntary groups and public bodies. It is also very useful for those wishing to take up voluntary work who might like to know what type of work a particular voluntary organisations is involved in. There are over 550 organisations listed in it.

Lismore Town Commissioners Meeting

Present at the January meeting of the above were — J. Heneghan (presiding), Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey, R. Canning, D. Coughlan, P. Dowd, B. Leddy, J. Roche, D. Whelan, Eric Flynn (Town Clerk), B. McNally (Acting County Manager), and D. Brady (County Librarian).

FAMINE ESSAY COMPETITION

At the beginning of the meeting the Chairman expressed greetings to the members at the start of a new year and introduced Mr. D. Brady who had been invited to the meeting to inform the Commissioner on plans to mark the 150th anniversary of the Famine.

Mr. Brady, in addressing the meeting, stated that this anniversary was one of the most important commemorations in Irish history and the Government had requested Local Authorities to put together a plan to fittingly commemorate this occurrence. He then outlined in detail some of the proposed events that Waterford County Council hope to undertake this year.

B. Leddy stated that having invited a number of people to a meeting in the town, there was a very poor response.

J. Heneghan proposed that a competition based on the famine between the five local schools would be a fitting way for the Commissioners to mark the event. He went on to propose two separate competitions, one for primary and one for secondary schools with a prize of £25 for each. Following further discussion he

then proposed, seconded by D. Coughlan and resolved "that Lismore Town Commissioners hold two essay type competitions (Primary and Secondary schools) based on the famine events of West Waterford, with a prize fund of £50 in total, to be confined to the five local schools, the closing date for submission of individual entries to be with the Town Clerk by May 1, 1995."

COUNTY DEVELOPMENT PLAN

It was agreed on a proposal of Mrs. Fenton-Morrissey, seconded by B. Leddy and resolved that a special meeting be held to consider this plan when it is complete.

NOTICES OF MOTION

B. Leddy moved "that the Town Commissioners consider the Local Employment and Trading System (LETS) in Lismore." He explained that LETS was an agreed bartering system which provided for the exchange of goods and services without money changing hands. He went on to state that successful schemes were already operating in this country.

Following discussion it was agreed that this matter would be brought up later in the year as part of the employment and enterprise initiatives.

David Whelan moved "that the approach to Lismore from the Deerpark Road be investigated." He acknowledged that tree supports had been renewed at this location. However, he went on to highlight the need for public lighting at the Deerpark /Parks Road

exit. Stating that this was a much used area and if it was not possible to have a new light, then the light at the junction with East Main Street, which is partially hidden by trees, should be moved.

The Clerk stated that no new public lighting had been provided by the County Council for the last three years. It was agreed to write to the County Council to provide lighting at this and the following locations: Deerpark/Ballyea road toward Dr. O'Mahony's and beyond the hospital towards J. Cotters.

B. Leddy moved "that the Town Commissioners write to the Minister for the Environment to abolish the recently introduced Drink-Driving Laws and replace them with rules which have a less draconian effect on the social life of rural Ireland."

He stated that in proposing this motion, he did not condone drunk driving. However, in lowering the alcohol level from 100mg. to 80mg., while it put us in line with Europe, nevertheless, took no account of the cultural differences of Irish society. In addition, no account was taken of the effect on the business and the social life in rural Ireland.

He went on the say that its rigorous implementation was an inefficient use of Garda time.

J. Heneghan felt that Ireland as a country does not always get in line with other European guidelines and this present law has produced a fear factor in Irish motorists. It was agreed to write to the Minister of the Environment and request that a graduated level of punishment, commensurate with the alcohol levels found, be introduced.

DAIL CONSTITUENCY COMMISSION

At the request of B. Leddy it was agreed to write to Dail Constituency Commission and request that in any future Dail constituency boundary changes, that the area of West Waterford remain in the County of Waterford for such elections.

PASS MACHINE FACILITIES

J. Roche highlighted again the need for pass machine facilities in Lismore. He went on to state that with Lismore the headquarters of three local banks, that the AIB in Lismore should provide such a service. It was agreed that such a facility would be of great benefit not only to locals but also the tourists during the summer.

It was agreed on a proposal of J. Roche, seconded by B. Leddy, to write again to the local AIB and request the provision of such facilities.

VICTIMS OF CRIME

P. Dowd proposed that a proper state agency be set up as support to the many victims of crime. He went on to say that such people not only need financial help, but also proper counselling and support services. It was agreed on the proposal of P. Dowd to request the Minister of Justice to provide appropriate support services for all victims of crime.

Launch of Urban Renewal Action Plan Next Monday

A further step in the process of Urban Renewal in Dungarvan will be taken in the Park Hotel on Monday night next, January 30 at 7.30 p.m. when Dungarvan Urban District Council will present their Action Area Plan for that part of the town designated last August under the Urban Renewal Scheme.

This week the Council issues an invitation to all interested parties and individuals to attend what should be both an informative and interesting meeting at which the Council's Planning Consultant, Mr. John Reid, will outline the Council's proposals in detail, with particular reference to how the Action Area Plan will benefit property owners within the area.

Also in attendance will be District Inspector of Taxes, Mr. T. A. Dilleen who will outline the tax incentives which are available for, and the benefits likely to accrue to investors. The meeting will also be of value to any of the general public who may be considering investing modestly in the scheme.

Further information will be supplied by Council Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, Co. Manager Mr. Donal Connolly and Acting Town Clerk Mr. Ray Moloney in his capacity as Designated Area Co-ordinator.

The Action Area Plan is not a statutory document and as such the Council will have wide scope to vary or change it as they see fit and with a view to maximising the benefits to the Designated Area and the town as a whole.

The Urban Renewal Scheme was first unveiled last August at a very well attended meeting at which the Council announced that they would be preparing an overall blueprint for the area. The first stage of this process has been completed and after Monday night it will be up to all parties working together to make the best of the opportunities now presented. This is how the process was first envis-

The plan proposes to facilitate the promotion and con-trol of development, identify specific objectives and generally to create a favourable climate in which people are well informed of the Council's proposals for their localities.

Simplicity will be the keynote with no jargon in the documents and on Monday night the emphasis will be on conveying as much information to all interested parties as possible. Time is short and all works will have to be completed by

July 31, 1997 to qualify for the area or thinking of inbenefits. In that respect the Minister for the Environment has stated that there will positively be no extensions of the deadline.

Anyone with property in

vesting in the project or likely to be affected in any way by the proposals would do well to either be in attendance or represented there.

Look after spring blooms in the house

WITH so little colour in the garden and a real need to brighten the atmosphere indoors, many people turn to cut flowers during the winter months.

But these are naturally in short supply and expensive until spring blooms start to appear – all the more reason to make them last longer.

Some obvious precautions are to adjust the central or other in door heating to a minimum for

comfort and economy, and choose a location away from the direct heat of fires or radiators.

AVOID

You must also avoid buying any tired-looking or open blooms in the first place — tighter young buds last longest.

Once in their vase at home there are a number of lifepreserving tips for blooms — some more farfetched than others:

- Angled Cuts cutting the stems at an angle definitely helps because the stem then rests on a point, allowing more water to be drawn up than if it is cut at rightangles and rests flat on the base of the vase.
- Clean Cuts use a sharp knife or secateurs rather than scissors and you do less damage to stem fibres and allow more water to be drawn up to the blooms.

It does, of course, make nonsense of traditional advice that you should pulverise and crush the base of the stems o improve water flow. This actually impedes water flow and encourages slime to grow and makes matters worse.

- A Dose Of Aspirin many people swear by this.
 Simply pop a pill into vase water to extend the life span of cut blooms. The theory is that the drug closes the pores of cut plants and prevents water loss.
- Bleach! drastic perhaps, but it is thought that a teaspoonful per vase restricts production of gas given off by some cut flowers such as carnations.
- Feeding there is strong evidence that feeding can help and there are sachets and tubs of powder on the market which feed or preserve cut flowers while reducing slime and smells building up in the water.
- Sweeten The Dose as one of the usual ingredients in the above 'plant elixirs' is sugar, I'm inclined to believe that they actually act as a preservative for the flowers. Why not save some money and simply add sugar to the vase water. One lump or spoonful should

COMPOST HEAP

However, whichever method you favour or try you will have to dispose of your faded blooms eventually and there is one sure method of extending their useful life even then — by not binning them but adding them to the compost heap.

They will quickly break down and become useful compost for new plants and blooms to come.

BEEF WITH RED WINE AND ROWAN JELLY

Ingredients:

11/2 lb (675g) braiseingsteak, cubed

1 tbsp (15ml) oil

1 clove garlic, crushed 1/2 pint (300ml) red wine 4 tbsp (60ml) rowan jelly

2 tbsp (30ml) raspberry vinegar

1/2 pint (300ml) stock 1 bouquet garni salt and black pepper 1 tbsp (15ml) cornflour

blended with 2 tbsp (30ml) water
15 shallots whole

15 shallots, whole 6 oz (175g) mushrooms, sliced (e.g. button, chestnut, shitake).

Method

Heat the oil in and ovenproof



casserole. Add beef and garlic and cook until beef is browned. Stir in red wine, rowan jelly, vinegar, stock, bouquet garni, seasoning and cornflour. Cover and

cook in a preheated oven, Gas Mark 3, 170°C, 325°F, for 1 hour. Remove from oven, stir in shallots and cook for 45 minutes.

Stir in mushrooms and

cook for a further 15 minutes.

Serve with garlic bread and a selection of fresh seasonal vegetables.

Kyne Calls For Nett Income Limit As Minimum Entitlement

The following is a single issue budget submission by Councillor Billy Kyne to Mr. Ruairi Quinn T.D., Minister for Finance.

While the brevity, some might say naivety, of this submission must be so different to those that may come to your attention at Budget Time, it deserves serious consideration and implementation.

My comments are confined to the serious anomaly of the Gross Income Limit requirement for the P.A.Y.E. sector in regard to a wide range of state qualifying limits. While the debate on Third Level Education has moved onto so called "free education for all", the Gross Income Limit requirement has been and remains a major point of contention for the P.A.Y.E. worker. It is widely accepted that the P.A.Y.E. sector is seriously discriminated against in qualifying for these third level grants.

Labour in Government since 1992 did nothing about this specific matter. Without doubt, Nett Income (Gross less P.R.S.I. & P.A.Y.E.) should be the qualifying income limit for the P.A.Y.E. family. The insistence by the State that the Gross Income Limit is the criteria is manifestly wrong. To continue this anomaly will continue a serious injustice against the P.A.Y.E. sector. The failure to change this in previous

To that end a public meeting will be held in Damy's Bar in Kilmacthomas on



ACUTE HOSPITAL TO BE CLONMEL-**BASED**

The twenty-five year battle for control of the Acute Hospital Services in South Tipperary/West Waterford came to a sudden conclusion on Tuesday, January 17 when the Minister for Health, Michael Noonan announced a £12.5 million investment for the area. This involves the transfer of Surgical Services from Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel to St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, bringing to an end a long and sometimes acrimonious struggle between both towns for the sector hospital.

This news was ready to be announced by former Health Minister Brendan Howlin last November, only for the political upheaval which led to the downfall of the Fianna Fail-Labour coalition. Local people are delighted with the news as their nearest hospital will now be only about 12 miles away as compared with the Regional Hospital, Waterford, about 45 miles away and Cashel about 28 miles.

1995 EU DESEASONALISATION SLAUGHTER PREMIUM SCHEME

A Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium will be payable in 1995 to producers in respect of steers slaughtered at licensed meat export premises in the State. In previous years, this premium was payable at £58.58 per head on steers slaughtered between 1 January and 30 April. However, the EU Commission have submitted a proposal to the Council which would extend the period of operation of the premium to 10 June 1995. The proposal provides for the payment of the full premium of £58.58 on animals slaughtered up to mid-April, with a progressive reduction in the premium on animals slaughtered from that date. This proposal cannot be formally approved by the EU Council of Ministers until the European Parliament delivers its opinion. In view of this, formal approval of the new arrangements is not expected until March. Further details will be announced at that stage.

Applicants in 1995 may submit their applications in three separate parts at times of their own choosing in order to cover cattle slaughtered within the slaughter period.

Three application forms, a copy of the Terms and Conditions of the Scheme and a Helpsheet have been posted to each applicant who applied under last year's scheme. Supplies of application forms etc. are available from the Department's Local Livestock Offices for any other producers who wish to apply in 1995.

Animals being submitted for the premium

- Must have already qualified for the Special Beef Premium in the State or
- Must have been submitted for the Special Beef Premium in the State in 1994 or 1995 - in this case, the animals must have been retained for the 2 months retention period required by that Scheme prior to slaughter and subsequently found to be eligible for the Special Beef

The procedures for the Scheme are as follows if animals are to be deemed eligible:

- The animals must be slaughtered at licensed meat export premises in the State.
- The BTE Cards for the animals must be submitted by the producer to the Department's Veterinary Staff at the plant of slaughter unless already held by the District Veterinary
- The BTE Cards must be punched by the Veterinary Staff at the plant of slaughter and returned to the producer after post-mortem examination.
- The producer must get from the plant of slaughter an invoice on headed paper showing the date of slaughter, category of animals (steers, etc), the eartag numbers and letters and the kill numbers of the animals which he/she intends to submit for the premium. The invoice must be certified by the staff of the Department of Agriculture. Food and Forestry at the plant of slaughter.
- The producer must retain all invoices and cancelled BTE Cards and submit them with his/her application.

Note: Animals slaughtered outside the State will be not be eligible for the Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium.

Completed application forms must be lodged with the Special Beef Premium Unit, Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Laois Shopping Centre, Portlaoise, Co. Laois by Friday, 14 July 1995.



THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

CALF REARING

Calves born in late winter and early spring are generally more difficult to rear than autumn born calves, with one of the main problems being scours. Since some of the organisms which cause calf diarrhoea on dairy farms cannot be controlled by antibiotics, it is vitally important that all new born calves receive colostrum. Calves receiving inadequate colostrum are more prone to scours in the first three weeks of life.

Surveys have shown that between 20 and 50 per cent of calves passing through marts have low blood antibody concentration, indicating that they have not had enough colostrum. They new born calf needs approximately 20 minutes to suck a full feed of colostrum. An oesophageal feeder and bag may be used to get 2 litres of colostrum into the calf. However, extreme care is needed when using a stomach tube.

SHEEP

Early Lambing Flocks:

To reach a target growth rate of 3/4 of a lb./day for twin lambs requires a ewe to yield 6 pints of milk per day and this means that the ewe, in relation to her body size, must be as productive as a 1,300 gallon cow at peak lactation. It is almost impossible to meet these high requirements from feed alone and, to some extent, body fat reserves have to be mobilised. During lactation, the concentrate ration should be of high quality containing around 18% protein. The ration should contain protein sources which are highly under gradable in the rumen for example, fish meal or soya bean.

Lamb should have access at an early age to creep feed and a well designed feeder is essential. It is important to keep the meal fresh and not allow stale feed to accumulate.

Early lamb production is a high cost system designed to take advantage of the better prices at Easter. It is false economy to underfeed. At the same time, cost can be reduced by the use of fodder crops or silage. Early grass, provided by short term leys can be very beneficial.

SPRING LAMBING EWES

During mid-pregnancy the growth of the foetus is comparatively slow and places little demand on the ewe for extra nutrients. However, the placenta is vulnerable to under nutrition at this time and loss of body condition should be maintained at a minimum. Severe underfeeding at this time will adversely affect the supply of nutrients to the foetuses. The level of concentrate feeding will depend on the condition of the ewes and whether they are outwintered on bare pastures or on silage in the house. During January and early February, a careful check should be kept on body condition.

FARM WORKSHOPS

Most farmers have reasonable work-shops where the welder gets regular use. For dairy farmers the use of a generator is a must in coping with electrical supply problems. Some basic level of care is needed for the safe use of both pieces of machin-

The welder should be set up safely in the farmyard. Electric welders should:

Be supplied from separate circuits.

 Plugs and sockets should be adequate capacity (32 amps).

R.C.D. (30mA fault setting) must be provided

 Exposed conductive parts of welder must be bonded together and connected to the welder protective conductor at a common terminal.

* The return conductor cable should be connected to the workpiece by a proper clamp.

* User's eyes must be protected by a suitable filter lens contained in a welding helmet or hand-held shield which protects face and neck against heat radiation. (Gas goggles, welding goggles are not

* Hands and forearms should be protected by suitable gloves and by keeping sleeves pulled down.

* E.S.B. require notification before an electric welder is installed.

IFA **WELCOMES CHARTER OF FARMERS' RIGHTS**

Waterford IFA County Chairman, Pat Murphy has described the announcement by the new Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Ivan Yates of his intention to introduce a Charter for Farmers' Rights on direct payment as breakthrough in recognising Premium Payments as farmers entitlements."

The new Minister set out his commitment at the IFA Annual General Meeting in Dublin Castle on 5/6 January and said that he would be announcing full details of the Charter of Rights for Farmers by Easter.

Mr. Murphy said that Minister Yates told the IFA National Council members and County Chairmen that the main element of the new charter would include prompt payment, day long office opening hours, full telephone service, immediate response on problem cases, full compensation, proper office accommodation, the right to privacy, confidentiality and the right to appeal.

The Waterford Co. Chairman warmly welcomed the Minister's announcement and his statement that his Department would adopt a culture of "delivery to the client" in terms of its services to farmers. He said that IFA had campaigned strongly for a Charter of Farmers Rights on Premium, Headage and Tillage

aid over the past two years.

Minister Yates said that there is a high level of commitment among Department of Agriculture staff to give farmers a quality service but they had been hampered by unsatisfactory office accom-modation, inadequate structures and practices and under-developed use of information technology.

In outlining the four principle ICMSA requirements to the Taoiseach, Mr. O'Dwyer said these concerns must be met if the Government is to fulfill its commitment to maintain the maximum num-

ber of family farmers.

The four key requirements outlined by the ICMSA President were:

H A clear policy to assist the development of the maximum number of family

H A long term develop-ment plan for the agricultural and food sector to be put in place to create new opportunities and to enable the sector to take advantage of any new circumstances which may arise under the new CAP and GATT regimes.

H Opposition to any further quota cuts for Ireland and the rejection of any proposal to reduce CAP or FEOGA payments.

H The provision of equal personal allowances as are available to the PAYE sector, to farm families. The simplification of tax administration to reduce the cost of compliance and the extension of the Farm Income Supplement to low income farm families.

Mr. O'Dwyer asked the Taoiseach for a guarantee that all the outstanding commitments entered into by the previous Government in the Programme for Competitiveness and Work will be implemented in full.

He also told Mr. Bruton that he welcomes the recog-

nition of the crucial role of the family farm in the Government document - "A Government for Renewal", and hopes to see the measures he proposed reflected in Government policy.

"The new Government should also ensure that the improvement in public finances is passed back to the productive sector and to tax payers. Farmers must be given every opportunity to develop. The many national barriers and disincentives should be removed and the Government should continually seek, at EU level, to expand the opportunities for Irish agricultural exports, and to be ever vigilant to ensure that no further restrictions are placed on Irish farmers,' concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

Breakthrough On Early Retirement/ Area Aid Problems — IFA

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee, Anthony Ryan, revealed recently that farmers who applied in 1994 for Area Aid, premium and headage payments and who subsequently retired resulting in the non-payment of premia, will now be paid subject to individual assessment.

Mr. Ryan said the Department of Agriculture has confirmed that following representations from IFA it has taken the matter up with the EU Commission. The Department has now informed IFA that the EU Commission has no objection in principle to paying livestock premia and headage or indeed arable aid to the transferee in the Early Retirement Scheme where premia/headage, arable aid scheme undertakings are honoured in full by the transferee on the transferors application in 1994. However, the EU Commission is insisting on each case being considered individually by the Department and a decision being taken on the circumstances involved.

Welcoming the decision, Anthony Ryan said that this breakthrough was very important for farmers who had transferred their farms after mid 1994 and who were told that they were not eligible for the payments of headage and premia. The fact that the transferee can now claim the payments is very significant as it ensures that the payments are not lost.

Mr. Ryan advised farmers applying for the Early Re-tirement Scheme to ensure that their applications for the various headage and premia are not lost in future as the problems encountered with the payment of headage and premia in the Early Retirement Scheme brings into sharp focus the conflict that often exists between the various EU Regulations which can lead to farmers ruling themselves ineligible for schemes which they should. be entitled to.

Surely, you would think, the very least these fellas should do is to show a little appreciation of the continuous sacrifices of others over many years by offering their services to a club which has served the people of Tallow for 75 years and has every right to expect support. How can they withhold that support whenever they cast and eye on trophies won and recall great days of enjoyment and fulfilment on the playing

This problem and others were referred to in Eamonn Power's secretary's report. "The running of a G.A.A. Club in a small town", he said, "gets harder every year as there are less and less people around who are willing to help out. Emigration and a change in work patterns make it hard to get people together be that for training or for meetings or even for playing matches". As he points out: "It has been stated many times in the past at the A.G.M. that the same few people are doing the vast majority of the work while others simply watch. I know

you have heard this in the past - maybe tonight is the night to do something 31 about it".

It was encouraging to see young

"Otherwise", as Eamonn reminds us, "the stark reality is that the club will not survive in the long run". How can a very small number of people cope with preparing for and fulfilling 61 fixtures, part of last year's workload over a season extending from March to November if the burden isn't shared more equitably? We had few trophies to celebrant last year - Under 16 Hurling and Junior Football only but the important thing is that we competed at every level of competition. "We owe this", as Eamonn says, to the young members of the club. It will be their club in 10 years time".

to function. Tim Sheehan and his assistant treasurer patiently unraveled the intricacies of the Balance Sheet and gave a clear account of their stewardship. Johnny Curley congratulated Tim and Johnny Geary on their report and expressed his huge disappointment at the pathetically small membership of the club as indicated by the small subscription

Wine Of The Month

THE FRENCH CONNECTION

No one who has any interest in wine has to be told that the French taught the rest of the modern world how to make it - and while the new kids on the block have become very proficient with their own ideas the French core of wine makers still produce some of the best, wine in the world.

Their main problem in recent years has been to match the price range of the New World of Australia, New Zealand, California and Chile but now their efforts are showing success. They have taken on the best of the newcomers and are definitely winning the battle.

The old hands - which have more than a mere tip of the cap to make to Ireland - are definitely doing their thing. Thomas Barton was the son of a sheep farmer from Co. Fermanagh who arrived in Bordeaux in 1715. He soon spotted the potential for wine development especially as there was a thriving trade - prohibited by the English - between Ireland and Bordeaux. It was a successful connection and the Irish family sent back wine galore through Irish and Scottish ports to avoid the high rate of English duty. Indeed there was a time when it was a sort of Irish mafia in Bordeaux with the Bartons, the Boyds, the MacCarthys, the Lawtons and Skinners.

today the Irish connection is still very strong and the Barton name lives on especially in the name of the company that handles a huge range of Bordeaux wines - Barton and Guestier. This is one constant memory of the past associations between the two countries - as well as being a telling sign for the future Today there is a Bordeaux A.C. to commemorate the year that Tom Barton started his great enterprise - it is called simply Fondation 1725 (price £6.99 approx). No, not made in 1725 but from 1990, one of the region's best vintage of recent years. It has all the intensity of a top Bordeaux red made from a combination of the merlot and the cabernet sauvignon grapes. The 1991 white under the same label is a dry, long lasting mixture of semillon, sauvignon blanc and muscadelle. No doubt France can give many more wines of this distinction and price - for instance the B&G Cuvee Speciale is light and easy to drink (price £4.39 approx), while the name of Fonset-Lacour is one that should be remembered. There is a whole range of red and white wines under this label from Bordeaux at prices that will tackle the New World opposition with vigour. One that is widely available and should be

looked at in this context is the B&G Saint-Julien 1988 (price £12.50 approx), a truly well balanced red to keep the French flag flying.

Picking out the vintage is something that baffles most wine beginners but if you remember that 1988, 1989, and 1990 were among the best in recent years then you won't go far wrong. And on your local wine shelf you will find numerous wines with great parentages and even historical significance from Bordeaux. Look for other labels apart from those already mentioned that lead to wines from Schroder and Schyler, Yvon Nau, Eschenauer or that most famed House of Rothschild.

Yes, there is lots of good French wine about right now exceptional value is the phrase that must go along with it. It can be a problem looking around the shelves of your local supermarket or off-licence so remembering a few names is important (especially when they have the Irish association). And don't ever be afraid to ask for assistance every shopkeeper knows the old advice of "sell a dud and lose a customer".

Ordering wine in a restaurant is often a great worry than just buying from a storeshelf. In a restaurant you have to make a choice and sometimes ask for it out loud but you don't have to pronounce something like Lanelonsheimer Sonnenburn Scherve Spatlese; check it out; it will probably be a number on the wine list.

Don't be intimidated by whoever is serving the wine ... in most cases they will know less than you. They should bring the unopened bottle to the table - and open it there in front of you. You should take a sniff at the cork to make sure it hasn't gone musty. A small amount of wine should be put into the glass, swirled around and then you should sniff it. It should have a fruity aroma and look fresh; anything that looks soupy is off.

Don't, however, make the mistake of complaining about the wine simply because you don't like it; you have ordered it and you should have a rough idea what the smell and taste should be like. That is quite different to a wine being off - off is a nasty sharp, farmyard smelling or just plain musty. If it is this then tell them so.



A LOOK AT THE COURSE

To-day we take you 2 PAR 4 through the second. Although this is one of the shortest par fours on the course, it is also one of the most testing. WATER HAZARDS

A "water hazard" is any sea, lake, pond, river, drain, or open water course, whether or not it contains water. Water hazards are defined by yellow stakes. These stakes, and lines, if present, are part of the hazard.

A "Lateral water hazard" is a water hazard, or part of a water hazard, so situated that it is, in the opinion of the committee, impractical or impossible to drop behind the hazard. Lateral water hazards are defined by red stakes.

If a ball ends in a water hazard (whether the ball is actually in water, or not) the player has three options. 1. The ball may be played as it lies. If this option is

taken, the player may not test the conditions, remove loose impediments, or ground a club, before playing. Taking a penalty of one shot, go back and play again from the same place, as the previous shot was played.

3. Taking a penalty of one shot, drop behind the hazard, as far as he/she wishes, keeping in line with the flag and where the ball crossed the line of the hazard.

4. If the ball is in a lateral water hazard, all these options still apply, plus one more. The player may now drop within two clublengths of the point of entry to the hazard, not nearer the hole.





THE PAT NOCTOR MEMORIAL AWARD

The Supreme Young Sportstar of the Year 1994 and winner of the truly coveted Garda Pat Noctor Memorial Trophy, will be announced at what is certain to be a packed Ard Scoil na nDeise Hall in Dungarvan on Friday night (7.30 p.m.).

Last years inaugural winner was Ring/Old Parish athlete Jamie Costin, and he is among the twelve finalists in line for the top accolade again this year.

The awards scheme was set up by the late Garda Pat Noctor's colleagues in the Dungarvan Garda District and it is confined to boys and girls under 18 years on January 1 who live in the Dungarvan Garda District area which also embraces Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Ring, Aglish and Bal-

lymacarbry. The late Garda Pat Noctor was one of the esteemed and respected officers ever to serve in Co. Waterford. He spent more than twenty six years in the Dungarvan District and his untimely death at the age of 53 from the Motor Neurone disease on March 6, 1993 occasioned widespread regret.

The initiation of a sports award scheme to commemorate his memory is entirely fitting. Garda Noctor loved sports of all kinds, but more importantly he himself was an outstanding sportsman in different codes during his younger days. Gaelic football and handball were games he particularly excelled, and his playing excellence was always matched by his exemplarily sportsmanship.

Within the Force his involvement with young people was

renowned, and the great work he did in the role of Juvenile Liaison Officer could never be overstated.

It was that involvement with the young people that prompted his colleagues to launch a sports awards scheme exclusively for the youth.

The guests of honour on Friday night will included the late Garda Noctor's wife Mrs. Judy Noctor, members of the Noctor family, senior garda officers, and the Chairmen of both Dungarvan Urban Council and Waterford County Council, Cllrs. Billy Kyne and Lar Hart respectively.

This year a record fifty one young boys and girls were nominated for the award, and these were reduced to a final twelve by an adjudication panel comprising John A. Murphy (Cork Examiner), Jim Landers (WLR FM), Mary Ashe (Ard Scoil na nDeise) and Kieran O'Connor (Waterford Foods.).

Fifteen sports were included among the original nominations and no fewer than ten are encompassed in the final line-up of twelve. These are hurling, gaelic football, ladies football, soccer, athletics, show jumping, tennis, hockey, boxing and golf.

There is intense public interest in the outcome of the adjudicators deliberations, but with such a quality "final twelve" one would almost require a crystal ball to correctly name the winner.

Dungarvan Brass Band under conductor Francie Kenneally will be providing musical entertainment from 7 o'clock onwards and Francie will play a salute as each of the twelve contenders is invited onto the main stage for presentation to the audience.

Hours of painstaking work has been put into the organising of the scheme, especially by Garda Eddie Fitz-patrick in his role as secretary, by Sgt. Dave Sheehan who is chairman of the Dungarvan District Social Committee, and by Nuala Condon of the District Office.

It promises to be marvellous sporting and social occasion, and a wonderful tribute to a garda officer who will always hold a very special place in the hearts and minds of his colleagues and the public in his adopted Dungarvan.







At an early stage this year, it was rumoured that James Walsh would not seek reelection and this probably was responsible for the fact that a number of other candidates were nominated. Two weeks ago James scotched this rumour by announcing that he will stand and because of this, a number withdrew, leaving only two in the field.

SECRETARY

It is now practically certain that Seamus Grant will be unopposed, as the other three candidates nominated against him have seemed to indicate that they have no intention of contesting the position.

MUNSTER

The information which I have received over the weekend would seem to indicate also that both Jimmy O'Gorman and Tommy Hennessey will be returned unopposed as delegates to the provincial council. A total of eight members were nominated for these two posts. The big 'field' was probably a result of an unfounded rumour that Jimmy O'Gorman might not be standing. Many people were delighted when the popular Lismore clubman, who had been indisposed for a while through illness, confirmed that he will definitely stand now that he is back in the swing of things again.

OIFIGEACH GAEILGE

For the past couple of years Nioclas Mac Craith and Jim Hennessey have contested the position, and at the time of writing, I was unable to confirm if there is going to be a contest here.

CENTRAL

Three are nominated and while S. O'Brien and Michael Dowling of Erin's Own have confirmed that they will stand, the third candidate has yet to make a firm commitment.

OTHER POSTS

We are almost certain not to have a contest for the post of County Youth Officer as John O'Leary, Ballyduff, who has been working for the promotion of the Urban Development Plan in the city area, is not likely to be challenged by Paddy Dunphy, who is a candidate for the chair.

The ever popular John Fraher, Cappoquin/Affane, will have a free run for the position of Development Officer and John Kiely, St. Patrick's, Hurling Officer, who is very well known for his tremendous work on both the Western and County Juvenile Boards is the second officer this year not to have an opponent nominated against

COUNTY P.R.O.

Brendan Tobin, who was elected to this position following the resignation of John Jackson (John defeated Brendan for the post at last year's convention), has Jim Landers and John Jackson named against him as opponents this time round and

while Jim Landers has indicated that he will not stand, John Jackson was undecided when I spoke to him.

So overall, the election of the new executive committee is likely to see, at most, only seventeen of the thirtyseven candidates stand for election.

Hopefully, in future years a 'withdrawal' date will be introduced in order to avoid a lot of confusion for clubs, who are, to a certain extent, being led astray under the present system.

FINANCE

The striking feature of the Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts is the enormous amount of money now involved in running the affairs of the Board for a full year.

The total intake of money this year is in excess of a quarter of a million pounds (£253,872) and when we compare this figure with the income of ten years ago (1984) when it was £58,985, we get a clear idea of the massive increase in the number and cost of the transactions involved.

Likewise on the expenditure side the figures shows a corresponding increase. The amount for 1994 shows £233,368 (as compared with £71,820 ten years ago in 1984).

Income from games and sponsorship form the bulk of our income as they in total come to approximately £150,000.

The income from our hurling club championships amounted to £44,381 (£40,303 in 1993) and football brought in £28,261 (£38,103 in 1993).

Our share of National League gates is down about £9,000 (it was £22,500 as compared with £31,000 in the previous season). Sponsorship which came in the main from the Bank of Ireland, Church and General, Tedcastles, Lawlors Hotel, etc. was up by almost £13,000. Refunds of travel from the Munster and Central Councils is almost £11,000 and we got a grant of £28,000 for development.

On the expenditure side the big figures are travelling expenses at £102,000 and administrating expenses at £68,000. Our coaching scheme expenses are down about £10,000. The balance sheet shows, on the basis of the above figures, an operating surplus of £20,486.

MOTIONS

named against him as opponents this time round and ous motions which are list-

ed will fare, as other decisions relating to the byelaws which may be changed, will or may have been taken at the special county convention which was due to take place at Dungarvan on last night (Tuesday). Such decisions, if taken will considerably change the structures in the county and allocate responsibilities for many of the things which are proposed for the annual convention on Saturday evening.

The Abbeyside/Ballina-courty motion seeking to change the format for the senior and minor All Ireland hurling championships has become a fair talking point and the new format, which predictably would be beneficial to Waterford if our record of success is taken into consideration, seems to be finding favour with a good number of clubs.

Another motion from the same club, will seek to have an intermediate inter-county hurling championship replace the present junior and senior 'B' championships.

Dunhill club are asking that a committee be set up on the direction of Congress to review annually the grants which shall be paid to counties in the All Ireland semi-finals and finals, etc.

Ballyduff East are in with a popular motion which demands more coverage by R.T.E. and this is certain to be given unanimous sup-

Cappoquin/Affane are asking convention to approve of a 'home and away' arrangement being compulsory in Munster, and this is one that will be well debated, if we are to consider a recent debate by the County Board on the same subject.

I was told over the weekend that the controversial motion seeking to have the divisional boards abolished as proposed by Erin's Own is likely to be withdrawn.

Ring have a motion to change bye-law 1-02 and which will change the composition of the Coisde Gnotha which would have the county secretary without voting power.

A motion from Erin's Own which seeks to get agreement for a proposition that the term of office for all Board officers, except county secretary be limited to five years, will be perceived as being one of the most important matters to be debated. At the moment the county chairman's term is limited to five years and there are no limitations on

the others. Many clubs are expected to see merit in this motion and it is likely to get much support from the floor.

Abbeyside/Ballinacourty have motions to abolish the 'player of the year' awards which was introduced many years ago by Cnoc Sion. There will be for and against this one and it will be interesting to see the outcome.

De La Salle, Ardmore and Clashmore clubs have motions dealing with championship format and structures and all three make several very interesting points which, if taken on board will help to streamline our championships and cup competitions. Clashmore are asking to reduce the number of teams in both the senior hurling and football from sixteen to twelve from 1966 onwards. They make the same proposal for the intermediate hurling and football championships and go as far as 1998 in their proposed reorganisation of the junior competitions. The expressed opinion of many people that there are too many clubs playing in the senior grades, would seem to suggest that this one will get quite an amount of support.

Modeligo are asking that the County Board allow divisional teams (as distinct from group teams) to play in the senior championships and it will be interesting to see how this one fares. Nicky Donovan made quite a case for it at the Western convention and from what I hear, it will be supported by the intermediate and junior clubs, but it would be difficult to predict the fate of the

proposal.

The motion to reduce the number of players from 15 to 13 on the minor 'B' hurling championships will be proposed by Ballyduff west and this may resolve itself into a discussion involving the strong versus the weak clubs.

Maurice Geary will make a strong case and will again emphasise the fact that numbers in rural areas are steadily declining.

There are other interesting motions relating to admission to matches, etc. and while these may be proper to County Board, I feel sure that they will be given an airing.

Championship medals, as well as the annual awards will be presented at the conclusion of convention.

G.A.A. Coach Education Programme

FOOTBALL COACHING SEMINAR
On Saturday, January 28 a Foundation Level Foot-

ball Coaching Seminar will be held in Bushy Park. This day-long course is organised under the auspices of the Munster Coaching and Games Development Body. Those people who successfully complete the seminar will be awarded the Foundation Level Coaching Certificate which is the first of fives grades in the GAA Coach Education Programme.

The holders of this certificate will be recognised as qualified Juvenile Coaches by the GAA and by Insurance Companies. It is important to note that the day is fast approaching when only those who hold such a qualification will be insured to coach juveniles at school, club or county level.

This particular seminar is confined to Western clubs. Everyone who is interested in coaching in those areas is welcome to send representatives.

COURSE FEE

The course fee has been set at £10 by the National Coaching and Games Development Committee. This fee covers the cost of the seminar as well as elevenses and lunch. Incidentally, some clubs pay the fee for personnel from their area, thereby creating a lot of goodwill while at the same time providing a pool of juvenile coaches to look after their underage teams.

CO. SECRETARY'S REPORT

"Clubs Lagging Behind In Many Respects"

In his very wide ranging report to next Saturday's annual G.A.A. Convention covering all facets of the Association's activities in the county and beyond, County Secretary Seamus Grant says that despite making great strides during the year, they could not gloss over the fact that they still had a number of clubs who were lagging behind in many respects.

their potential."

Continuing he says: "Lack of enthusiasm for the mammoth work required in order that the youth can receive every opportunity to develop the interest and skills of our games, remains a common feature in many areas, even in places where a level of adult success have been attained. The validity of some under 21 teams is equally a case in point, when it is constantly observed that in order to field fifteen players, some clubs are resorting to playing juveniles of thirteen and fourteen years of age, and this surely must not be a good sign, considering that than adequately catered for in their own grades. As one who has long championed the necessity for the under 21 grades in the past, it gives little pleasure to now pose the question — is a radical overhaul needed at this level. Perhaps the time has come when it is most opportune to look again as to whether this grade is serving the purpose for which it was initiated or maybe a move to have the minor age limit increased to nineteen, and thereby do away with the under-21 series, might best suit the

needs of most clubs. DEVELOPMENT

Under the above heading the Secretary refers to the development and official opening of Fraher Field and the fact that the first stage of teristics, it is pleasing to rethe Walsh Park development

was in progress. The report goes on: "Such urgently needed facilities are indeed long overdue, and would not be possible were it not for the outstanding contribution of all the clubs of the county, the generosity of Munster Council, and, of course, the superlative work of the County Finance and Development Committee. CONDUCT AND

DISCIPLINE

The report continues, "The important aspect of conduct and discipline or to be more precise, the lack of such laudable attributes became in 1994 a vexed and complex problem. More than a few games at both County and Divisional levels found recourse to Disciplinary Committees involvement, and this is not a welcome trend. Unsavoury incidents on and off the field that tend to bring the good name of the Association and all it represents into disrepute, must at the latter group are more all times be ruthlessly dealt with, and according to rule.

Bearing in mind, of course, the all time record number of games played in the county during the past season, it is only fair to report that the vast majority were contested in a most exemplary manner, and the manliness and bearing of players and officials involved deserve our highest commendation. But the fact that some isolated incidents did occur — and what is perhaps most distressing at under age level — is hardly to the credit of the perpetrators in question, and must make everyone more vigilant in the future. While strict adherence to punctuality has never been one of our renowned Irish characport that games by and large commence at the appointed time, and is a source of great satisfaction.

SCHOOLS AND YOUTH

"The invaluable contribution of our schools and colleges in the promotion and development of our national games," the report says, can never be underestimated. It has applied steadfastly down through the years, and none more so in 1994, where evidence of truly commendable progress was again very much seen at all levels. The stupendous sucneeded, and every fund rais- cess of the County and Divi-

sional Primary Schools Committee, cannot, but continue to do untold good for the future of our games. The deep-rooted involvement of so many people, and especially the national teachers in this important area of operations remains crucial to the very future existence of the Association. Clubs must always be aware that any assistance given in this area, will be returned a hundredfold in the future.

The deep rooted involvement of County Coaches Peter Power, Pat Curran, Padraic Fanning, Donal Treacy - and more recently the appointment of Joe Carton as Urban Development Officer with special responsibility for the youth, represents the most progressive step ever undertaken for the Association in this county.

It would, no doubt, be very remiss of me at this stage of my report not to make a particular reference to the part of the various religious orders who continue to give pride of place to the promotion and development of Gaelic Games. The year under review saw the departure, on a temporary basis it is hoped, of Brother Griffey to foreign shores. His contribution to the entire Coaching and Development process was monumental, and I have no doubt that without his guiding hand and influence many of the projects initiated during the past number of years would scarcely have got off the ground. Hopefully, I repeat, his absence from our midst will be only temporary, and pretty soon he will be back helping us in an area in which he has few peers.

"Once again one must pay tribute to the outstanding workrate of those connected to Bord na nOg and the City League. Here are involved many dedicated people whose only recognition lies in the fact that they are rendering an invaluable service to the games and the county. Here can be found well organised competitions, which remain second to none. Indeed, the efficient manner in which all the various competitions under their control were again brought to finali-ty, places both bodies on a par with the best in the land."

REFEREES Referring to their refereeing crisis Seamus says: "Unquestionably one of the

major crisis facing the Association at large is the shortage of referees at every level. It is a problem that unfortunately remains constant and no where close to a solution. There seems to be a reluctance of many units to completely ignore this situation, hoping one would imagine, that it will go away. Alas, it is something that must be tackled and quickly, or else many of our competitions will grind to a halt. We stand indebted of course, to the small and select band who make up our limited pool of referees. A select band of people, more often or not the subject of unnecessary abuse and unwarranted criticism from those who should know better, they continue to perform an unenviable task with strict impartiality for the betterment of the Association. That a serious problem exists with regard to numbers can hardly be denied, and there is also the added difficulty of uniformity of interpretation brought about one must hasten to add, by constant rule changes. The last mentioned problem can, of course, be easily overcome by seminars and such like, but the recruitment of adequate and hopefully competent people to act as referees, must be seriously addressed by all units of the Association from the top to the bottom."

Rule 21 To Go?

It is now obvious that the Peace Process and the cease-fire in Northern Ireland is going to have an effect on Association policy within the GAA. According to reports from around the counties. there is groundswell of opinion in favour of rescinding Rule 21 in the official guide which states "Members of the British armed forces and police shall not be eligible for membership of the Association. A member of the Association participating in dances, or similar entertainment promoted by or under the patronage of such bodies, shall incur suspension of at least three months."

Last Sunday a number of counties passed motions to have this rule deleted and notably among these were the All-Ireland football champions, Down, who decided by a small majority to have the ban removed. Kilkenny and Dublin were other counties to vote in favour of its abolition.

The Association President, Jack Boothman has also indicated on a number of occasions recently, that he is not in favour of having such bans in the rule book. On the basis of all this and other such rumblings, it seems very likely that the rule will go out after Congress in April.

The widespread annoyance with the scant coverage by RTE of our big games, has also been made known to that body by delegates at several conventions. Kilkenny, Dublin, Limerick, Tipperary and others are among the counties who have rightly lashed out at the national television station for failing

to show more coverage of

our national games on the screens, particularly at week-ends.

The Munster Council have also added their voice to the campaign, but have declared that they are not in favour of the unsatisfactory timing (6.30 p.m.) which has been proposed by the broadcasting authority.

Among other interesting proposals which seem to have found favour in some quarters is the idea of having an open draw for the All-Ireland Championships. Wexford are going all out for this and there are indications that other counties will support it, but it is unlikely that the Munster counties will agree to have the provincial championships

done away with.

This is 'rule-change' year and there is a huge number of proposals in this regard.

a distress signal by ship-toshore radio before sinking within minutes.

After launching an inflatable liferaft in the nick of time, crew member Foley had a very narrow escape when he was tossed out of the boat and had to be twice rescued from very turbulent seas by his crew-

The three then endured an anxious 45 minutes being lashed by 20 foot high waves in their flimsy raft before eventually being lifted to safety aboard the Ballycotton Lifeboat. An Air Corps helicopter also hovered overhead to lend assistance if required.

All three fishermen, in their mid-twenties, were subsequently brought into Helvick Pier where an awaiting ambulance took them to Waterford Regional Hospital where both Kelly whose arm was injured by a swinging boom from the sinking ship and Foley were treated for their injuries, while the third crewman Derek Drummy was treated for shock.

The Inis Ealga which was built in 1983 and owned by the first trained lady skipper in Ireland, Caitlin Kelly (now known as Caitlín Uí Aodha) was based at Helvick Pier in the Ring Gaeltacht and was owned by Kieran Kelly's father Liam, a brother of Caitlin Uí Aodha.

The trio set out from Helvick on Monday morning to haul in their fishing nets and were approximately eight miles from home when the incident occurred. A spokesman for the Kelly family said that they had no idea what caused the acci-
