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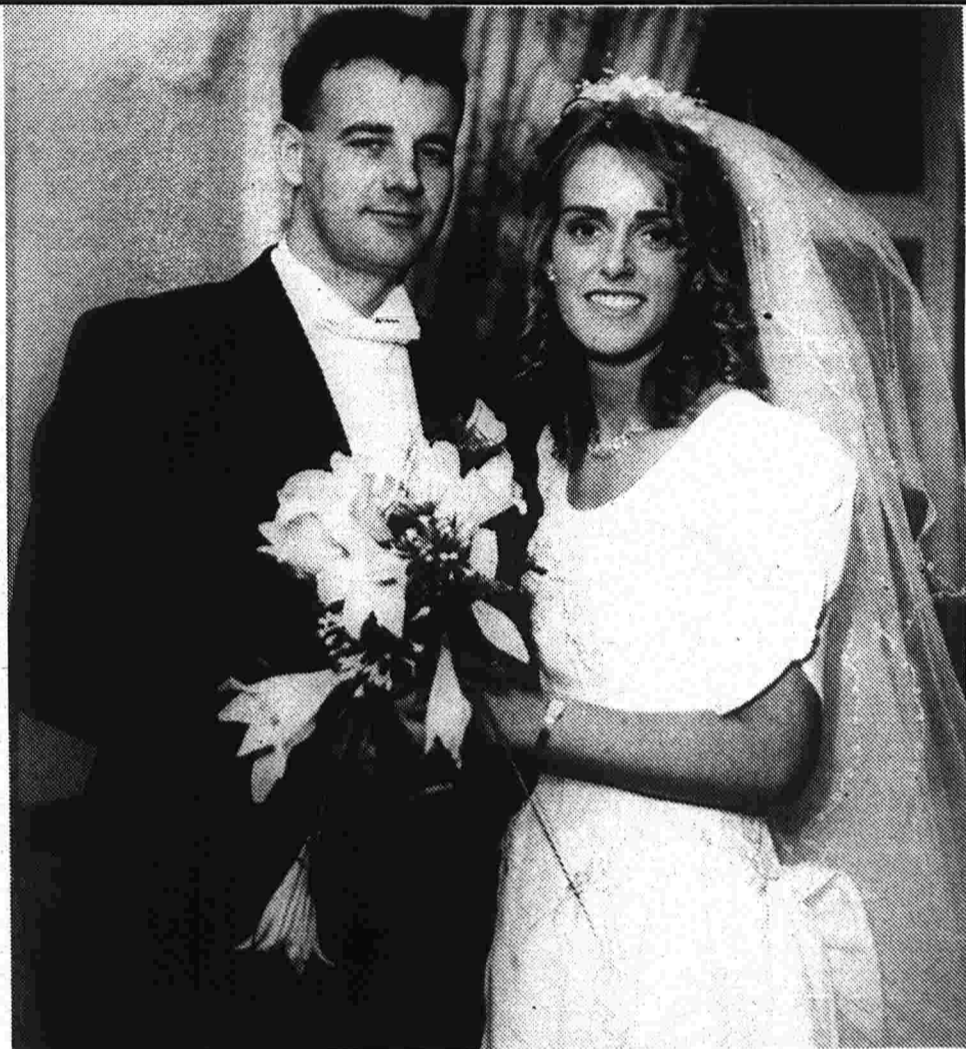

Good News For Ring T.V. Company

Local journalist Irial Mac Murchú of the Ring company, Nemeton was recently elected to the position of P.R.O. of RÉALT, a nationwide trade organisation, made up of independent Irish language T.V. producers of which Nemeton is included.

The vacancy arose at the RÉALT A.G.M. in Galway last Saturday where Irial was unanimously elected by representatives from T.V. companies all over the country.

Presently the only independent T.V. company to make Irish programmes in Co. Waterford Nemeton joined the representative association of RÉALT, as, according to Irial, the association 'helps all companies to speak with a unified voice'.

Nemeton was set up in 1993 with the intention of supplying programmes from the Waterford area to the new television service, Teilifís na Gaeilge.

Last December saw Waterford Gaeltacht's first locally produced television

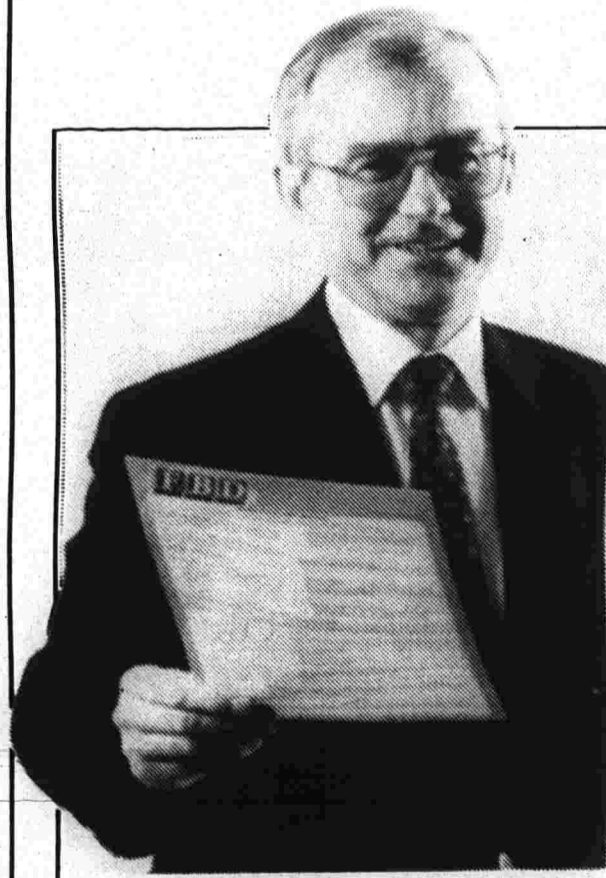
programme when Nemeton launched a 1/2 hour documentary programme on the county's hurling story. This documentary was the first made for broadcast by the

Kilrush Traffic Lights Hazard

Out of order, for over a week, now, a dangerous traffic situation certainly exists for motorists at the Kilrush junction. There the traffic lights have been flashing amber, unable to guide the heavy traffic flow of town commuters and Cork, Waterford travellers. The cause of the breakdown appears to be a malfunction in the control box which was struck by lightning last month.

A spokesman for Waterford County Council said the situation was currently being dealt with and the traffic lights are expected to be back on line by the week-end. The modern lights function via computer operated signals and are sensitive to the volume of traffic on the road.

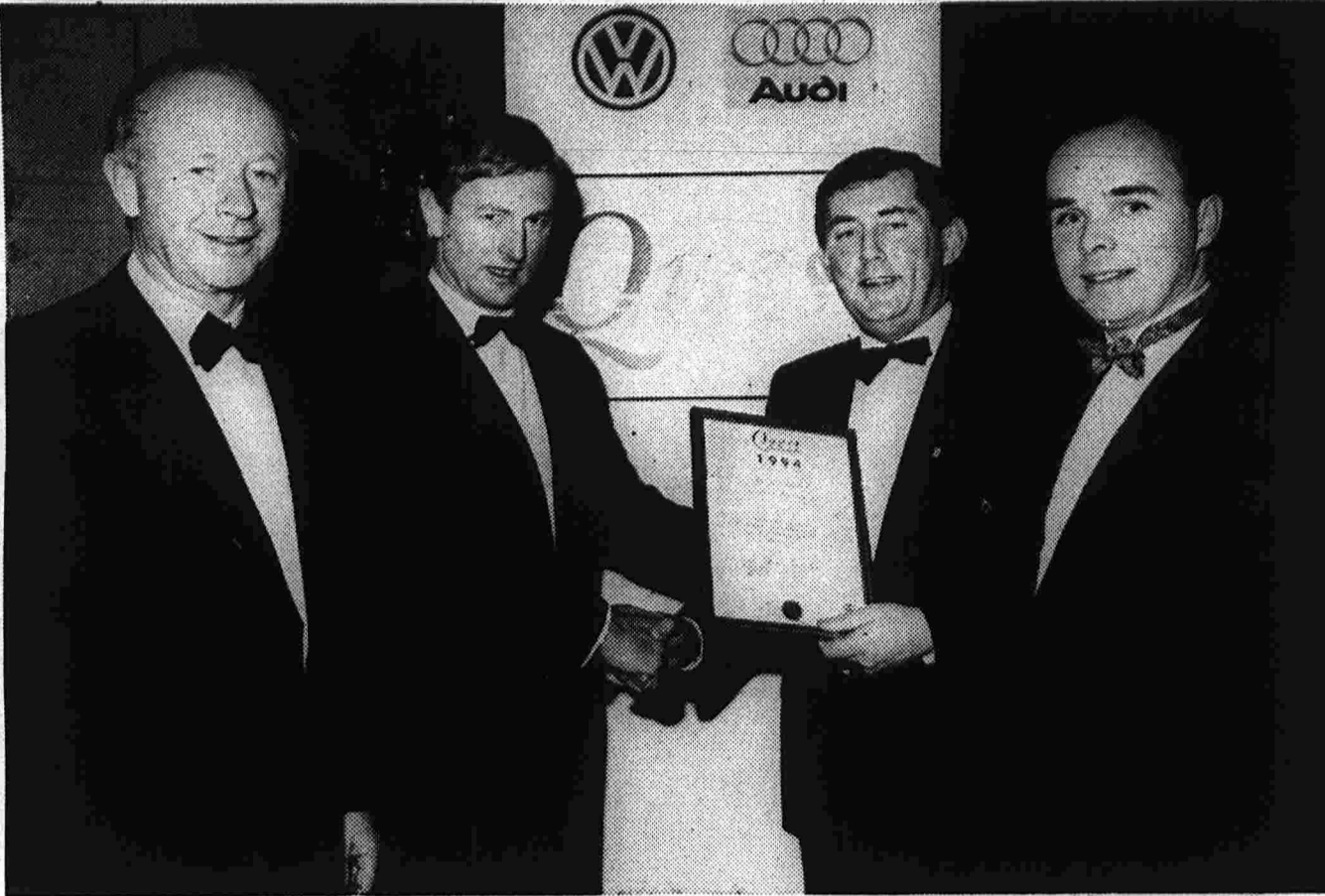
A Dublin serviceman is now writing new software for the affected control box and the junction should

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have the Contributory Old Age Pension and my wife has her own Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. I was refused the Free Colour TV Licence because the Fuel Allowance is on my wife's pension book. Is this correct and what do you suggest we do about it?

Answer — In order to qualify for the Free Colour TV Licence you have to show that you are entitled to the Fuel Allowance in your own right. There are two solutions:

(1) — You can apply for the Fuel Allowance instead of your wife.

(2) — You arrange to have the electricity (or gas) supply transferred into your wife's name and she then applies for the Free Electricity/Natural Gas Allowance/TV Licence in her name.

The first option would seem to be the simplest. However, if, apart from your old age pension you have other income of more than £5 per week or savings of more than £2,800 you would not qualify for the Fuel Allowance. Because your wife had already undergone a means test for the Non-Contributory Pension this provision would not have applied to her. So, the fact that she qualified for Fuel Allowance would not necessarily mean that you would.

With a new album just re-

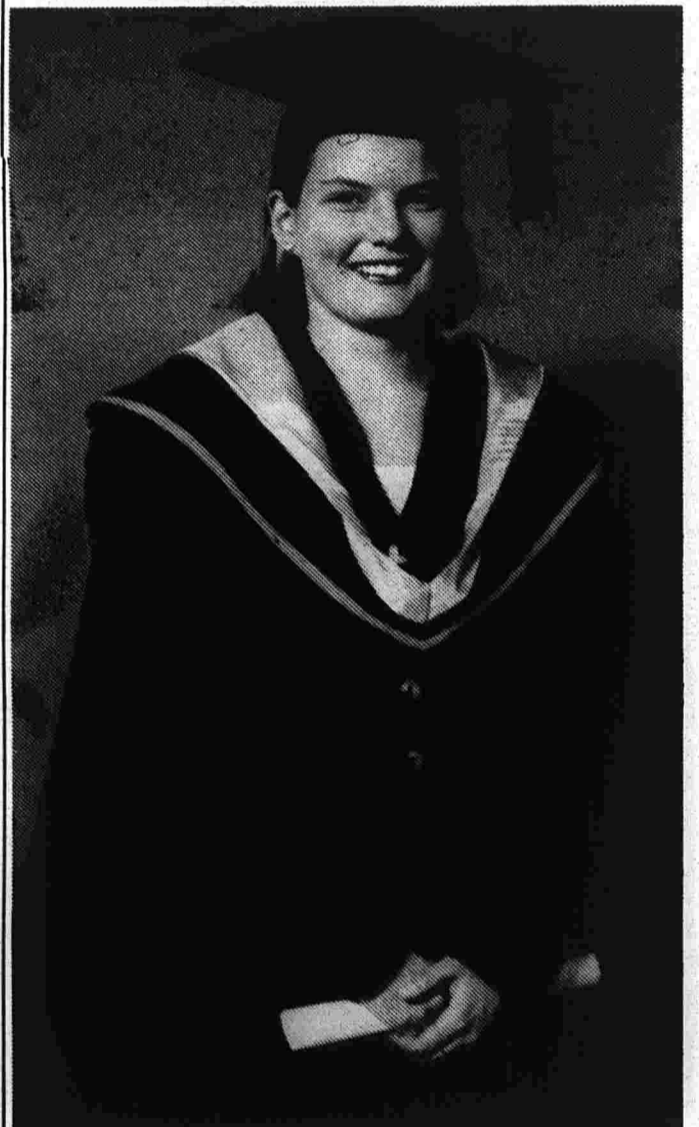
leased and her many overseas tours, 1995 will be a year to remember for Ireland's favourite country star, Louise Morrissey.

Some Simple Water Gardening

THERE will be many gardeners already longing for summer and making plans for an even more glorious display.

One idea they could be working on now would be some simple water gardening.

It need not be a proper pond, with all the digging and preparation that it entails, but a simple yet effective feature created at the cost of just a few pounds and suitable for all but the smallest garden or terrace.

Existing

It would make use of an existing and possibly otherwise useless container such as a half barrel butt, old vitreous sink, galvanised tank or large pail.

The butt can be simply coated with a non-toxic preservative or painted before lining with thick polythene for extra durability and waterproofing, though it should retain water naturally if it is still in good condition and given a thorough drenching for a week beforehand.

Concrete Coating

The sink can be given a concrete coating and painted or simply allowed to grow mossy and natural looking — spray on a mixture of milk and water to encourage algae.

Metal containers can be given a camouflaging green or brown paint job or made to stand out with a bright painted design.

Once you have prepared your container, line the base with three inches of gravel and fill to the top with water, before leaving for 5-6 days to get rid of any chemicals which have accumulated.

You then need to stop the water from going sour and smelly by planting several plants which will oxygenate the water, such as Canadian Pondweed (Elodea), Water Crowfoot — this also produces white flowers at surface level — and Frog's Lettuce.

These need to be anchored into the gravel to give them a chance to put down roots and hold firm to do their job.

Miniature Lilies

Then come the best part: stock the 'pond' with spectacular surface plants such as miniature lilies with their pad-like leaves and bright blooms or the lily-like Frogbit — your local garden centre will have a variety to consider.

These should be planted into nets or baskets containing rough garden soil topped with something heavy like pebbles, gravel, or washed pea shingle to keep the soil in place.

Pots

The 'pots' should then be placed into the pond at the appropriate depth: lilies can probably rest on the gravel base of the container but others may need to be fixed to the side or chocked up on an upturned flower pot or bricks.

Apart from making sure that one particular plant variety doesn't take over, this sort of feature should need very little attention since the oxygenating plants will keep the water sweet.

And while it would probably be too confined for goldfish, it could tempt a frog or other wild pond creatures to make a home there. —Arthur Hines

Cherries On The Top



Just because Christmas has gone, don't forget the mincemeat — it makes a delicious filling at any time of year.

We've topped our pastry plait with icing and cherries.

Ingredients:

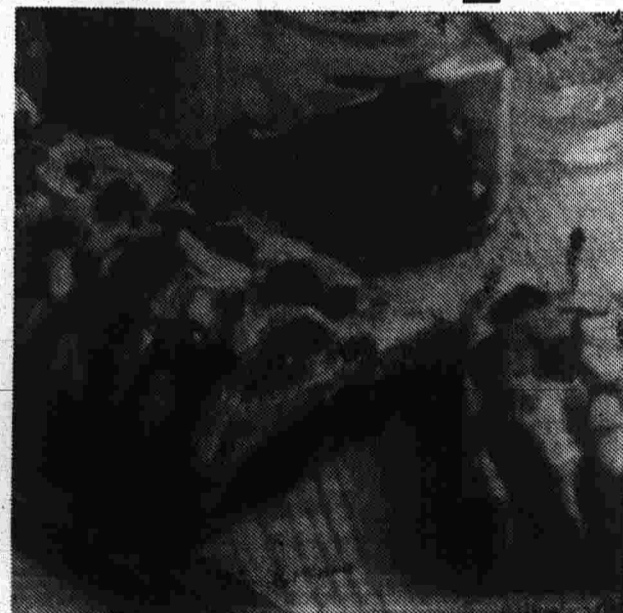
8 oz (200g) mincemeat
2 oz (50g) glace cherries, chopped
2 oz (50g) almonds, blanched and chopped
14 oz (395g) Puff Pastry, thawed
beaten egg to glaze
4 oz (100g) icing sugar
1 tsp (15ml) lemon juice

Decoration

Extra glace cherries and blanched almonds

Method

Combine the mincemeat, glace cherries and almonds for the filling. Roll out pastry to an oblong, 30x35cm (12x14ins). Lightly mark pastry into three, lengthwise. Brush edges with water. Mark 7 cm. (3in) cuts, 2.5cm (1in) apart at an angle of 45 deg. along the edges of the pastry. Place filling down centre and fold cut strips over alternatively to give a plaited effect. Seal the ends. Place on a greased baking sheet, glaze and bake at 425°F, 220°C, Gas Mark 7 for 20 minutes. Then leave



to cool. Blend the sifted icing sugar with lemon juice, adding a little boiling

water to give a smooth glace icing. Spoon over the plait. Serves 6.



Opening Of New Tallow Information Centre

This week marks the official opening of a Citizens Information Service in Tallow.

Since July of last year the Fermoy Citizens Information Centre have been operating a twice monthly service from an office in the Credit Union building. This office is staffed by two volunteers from Fermoy C.I.C. who have also commenced training of local volunteers. The office is open on the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

Our picture shows Mr. John Long of the National Social Services Board, who performed the opening ceremony, thus giving a stamp of approval to the service. Others included are Mr. Joe Cahill, Chairman of Fermoy C.I.S., Mrs. Abina Murphy, Organiser, Mrs. Helen McCarthy, Chairman of Tallow Area Credit Union, Mrs. Helen Ryan and Mr. Sean Sheehan of Tallow Branch of C.I.S.

Mr. Long commented on the excellent facilities provided by the Credit Union.

He went on to remind the gathering that "Citizens Information Centres have access to up to date information on all matters of public concern, i.e. health, social welfare, taxation, housing, family law, consumer affairs, and other matters including information on local organisations and services."

Mr. Long also stressed the total confidentiality of the service. Mrs. Abina Murphy, Organiser of Fermoy Citizens Information Centre, remarked on the fact that the service is free. She went on to say that personal data on clients, such as address and telephone number, are not required. "We do not maintain files on queries dealt with and we have no association with Government Departments other than our source of information, The National Social Service Board," she added.

Clients are invited to visit on the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month from 10 a.m. to 12 noon at Tallow Credit Union Office.

Motorist Fined £100 And Disqualified For 1 Year

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Ostrich Farming Arrives In Dungarvan

As promised in last week's edition, this week we bring you a report of a new, alternative farming practice in the Ballinacourty area - that of ostrich farming.

After an enlightening visit to the Garranbane farm, this reporter has certainly no doubts as to the viability of this fascinating and rewarding business in Ireland. Munster Premier Ostrich is a venture with a future catering for a huge indigenous market and offering a high return on investment.

WHAT'S ON OFFER

Main principal of the company, Dungarvan business man John Hurley, has certainly done his homework on the South African bird and is currently catering for nine 18-month old ostriches while expecting more shipments (each of 30 lots) in the near future. So what prompted John to enter this particular market? He says it was a simple documentary he saw on television and subsequent information he received from the British Embassy. John has visited all 3 ostrich farms in Ireland and every farm in Great Britain

and has even consulted experts in South Africa.

Already John is planning a major expansion of the farm, eventually hoping to have 100 birds on site at any one time with hatchery facilities and fully fenced grazing paddocks comprising over 4 acres.

As the only ostrich farm in Munster, the enterprising company will offer prospective buyers such services as site inspections, budget projections, feasibility studies and give advice on fencing, shelter, handling, feeding (purchased-home grown) and marketing (eggs, birds, meat and skins). First quality eggs and birds of all ages are also supplied by the company at competitive prices and John is also willing to hatch out eggs in individual incubators for customers.

LARGEST LIVING BIRD

The ostrich can run up to 40 miles per hour and may

stand eight feet tall. Extremely hardy, the birds easily adapt to the Irish climate and lush grass, requiring only the minimum amount of shelter. The birds normally breed for forty years and have a life expectancy of eighty years. The average cost of feeding an ostrich is 60p to 80p per day. On the Garranbane farm, John feeds each bird grit and greens, such as cabbage and a regular supply of fresh water. During the day the birds graze in the paddock. A trio of breeding birds can be kept on as little as 1/2 acre of land

The ancient belief that the ostrich hides its head in the sand when frightened is not true. If the ostrich is exhausted or cannot run any further or if it must defend its nest it kicks with its powerful legs. Its long toes, the largest of which is 7 inches long, have thick nails that become weapons when the bird is cornered.

START UP OPTIONS

For those interested in starting up their own ostrich business, a visit to Munster Premier Ostrich is definitely a must. There John will advise prospective buyers on the various start up options available such as building up from fertilised eggs, chicks, adolescents (as in John's case), proven breeders or production.

Hens may be fertile at 20 months and should produce an average of 60-70 eggs per breeding season (i.e. March - September), laying every other day. A trio of good breeders can cost anything up to £18,000 while adolescents are valued around the £3,000 mark.

EXISTING MARKETS

Lucrative markets for ostrich owners include the meat trade through wholesale outlets or direct to restaurants or hotels. Os-

trich meat (Volaise) is a low fat red meat with lower cholesterol value than other red meat and poultry and sells at approx. £10 per lb.

Feathers for the fashion industry, household dusters and flys for fishing.

Eggs as a secondary market for infertile eggs sold as ornaments.

Leather can be sold direct to tanneries in brine or covered in salt. Demand for ostrich leather currently exceeds supply. A pair of ostrich leather boots may sell at £750.

A former Professor of Sociology and Politics at University College, Galway. Fr. Dougan died in the UCL Cliniques St. Luc on January 25. He is survived by his brother Maurice, well known chemist in Clonmel, and Peter, a well known veterinary surgeon, very well known in the Ballymacarbry district and his sister Joan. All Masses in the parish of St. Anthony's on Sunday, Jan. 29 were offered for the repose of the soul of deceased and prayers of Final Commendation were held at the parish church after which his remains were flown to Dublin and then taken to Clonmel where they were laid to rest in the Franciscan plot in St. Patrick's Cemetery.

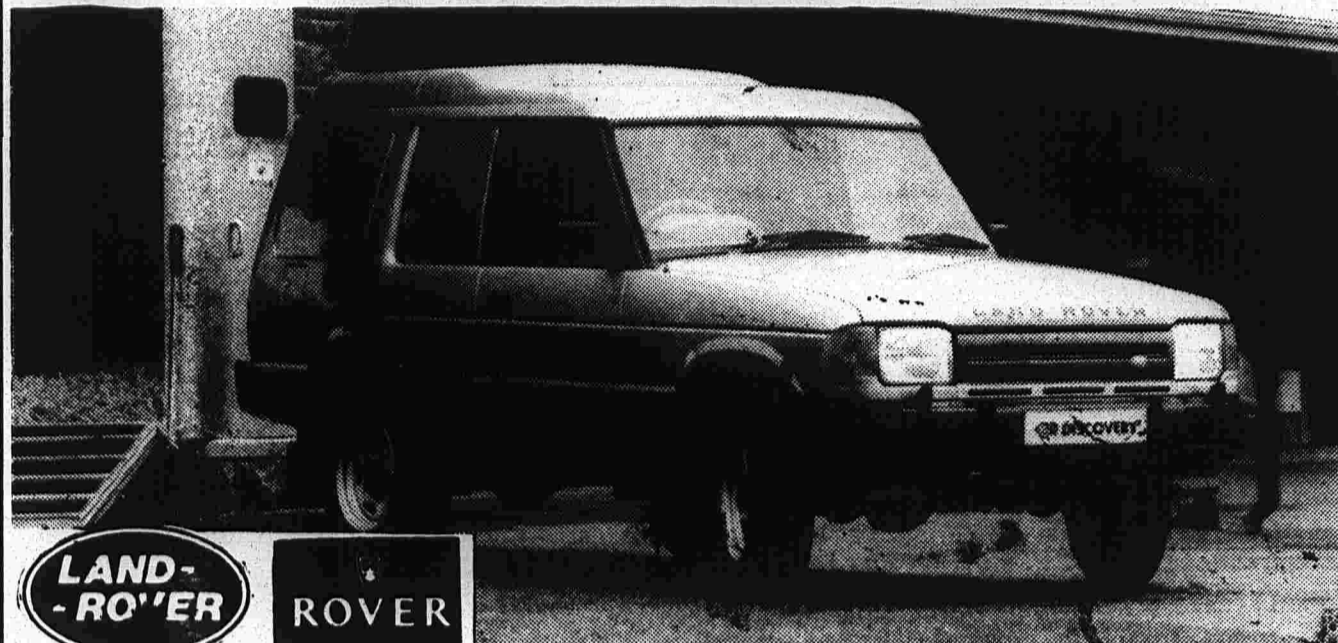
AFFANE/CAPPOQUIN G.A.A. NOTES

John Hartigan's Memories

Vin O'Donoghue also figured with his Tallow team mates on that great Waterford Junior team of 1931 which won the All Ireland. That particular combination was nearly all Tallow. And how the attitude of the time towards players has changed in the intervening decades. For that All Ireland final Waterford officials gave accommodation a very low priority. Do you know that 13 players were in the one room of a Dublin hotel on the eve of the big day? Talk of team closeness! The 12 pranksters (Vin was, unfortunately, in that same room) decided on the night of the victory to steal Vin's most prized possession, his beloved hurley. As every serious hurler knows the hurley is so important to him that it's an extension of his arm and losing it is the equivalent of an amputation.

Jimmy Cunningham had greatness thrust upon him: he was nominated to implement the plan. Jimmy, with the hurley uncomfortably placed down the leg of his trousers, made a slow stiff exit from the overcrowded bedroom, down the stairs, out to the car boot where Vin's treasured piece of equipment lay in repose. Meanwhile back at the Ranch (in a manner of speaking) Vin searched everywhere for his lost caman "assisted" in his endeavours by the remaining conspirators who maintained a strict

and innocent silence.

Poor Vin had decided that the missing hurley should be categorised with other mysteries like "the missing postman from Stradbally, Larry Griffin" when, a month later, it returned to him.

And it bore a patriotic glossy coat of green paint.

Vin never found out that facts and though he harboured deep suspicions he could never fathom which of the twelve wide-eyed innocents, who, of course, all denied complicity, was the perpetrator.

As John reminded us earlier on, Erin's Own were Waterford's dominant club on the field and at county board level and were on one occasion unable to accept an invitation to participate in a tournament game in Kilmallock against Thurles Sarsfield's. So they asked Tallow to replace them. Tallow readily agreed to take on the Tipperary champions in the prestigious Easter Sunday fixture.

They saw their rivals arriving by car and noted that they weren't all from Thurles?

No matter, a match was a match and sure they all yearned for a slap at Tipperary, even at club level. John enjoyed his usual sound game but what he remembers most about that day was the outstanding

display behind him at full back of Pat Condon. Pat was opposed by Martin Kennedy a full forward whom many oldies assert was the best full forward that ever pulled on a jersey. And here was Pat, brother of Noel and Bob (all three were on the title-winning 1930 team) handling Martin like a seasoned All Ireland man.

The year 1945 was a black year for Tallow. They fielded an illegal senior team in the championship match against Dungarvan (Willie John Daly was a Tallow player that day (for the day!). A year's suspension was imposed on the club and this had a pretty devastating effect on both the club and the town. John had been secretary of the club and that fateful year marked the end of his stewardship.

After the year's rest Tallow came back in 1947 as a junior team. The recriminations which followed in the wake of the 1945 fiasco had eroded the spirit and sapped the morale so that Tallow played without any real conviction.

Fresh still in John's memory is the championship match against Cappoquin in Lismore. Apparently it was a rough tough, match featuring much wild swinging which referee John Vaughan had difficulty in controlling.

The game was getting out of hand as a high ball dropped between John and Mossy Morrissey. Both pulled overhead and John contacted the ball driving it back upfield. A shrill blast of the referee's whistle quickly brought play to a halt as John Vaughan came over to Mossy and John and ordered both off. They went to the sideline amicably commiserating with each other and, I suppose, still in a state of shock. John can only conjecture that the referee was desperately trying to regain control by making an example of the two of them.

Perhaps it was that incident more than any other factor which influenced John Hartigan to retire in 1947. And retire he did, never again to grace the playing field of Thurles or Cork or Waterford or Dungarvan or Lismore. He saw great days, derived enormous personal satisfaction and fulfilment from playing at a high level and has a host of abiding memories of his playing career. Afterwards he enjoyed watching his sons John, Michael and Brendan write several chapters of Tallow's success story of the 60's, 70's and 80's.

ABBEYSIDE TOPICS

Early 30's — Abbeyside G.A.A.

Abbeyside had affiliated under the name Abbey Rovers in 1930 and had won their section to reach the Western final only to be beaten by Tal-low in that match.

However the hard times of the 1930's began to bite hard. The collapsed Stock Market, the ruined business concerns, the deepening world-wide slump made the struggle of the new Irish State tougher. Unemployment was rife. Abbeyside was grievously hit.

It was found impossible to enter any team in 1931. There were more team members in the London area than in the Village.

However, Abbeyside again affiliated in 1932 and entered football and hurling teams. Abbeyside though was only a shadow of its former strength and failed to survive the first round in either game.

In 1933 Abbeyside were still struggling. In these years when the flag was kept flying only with difficulty, it took officers and committee of more than normal dedication to keep hopes alive.

Percy Brett's long-term loyalty to the position of secretary cannot be over-praised; the inspiration of the Burke family in the formative years; the steadfast efforts of the Organ brothers throughout; and of such as Paddy Woulfe, Tim Ryan, Con Forde, Paddy McGovern, John Hayes . . . in good days and bad, cannot now be properly appreciated. But no youngster who grew up in those years will fail to mention the enthusiasm and unending zeal of Jack McHugh in imparting to them the qualities of soul and body that go to make hurlers.

Abbeyside entered teams in junior hurling and football in 1933 but were again defeated in the early rounds.

Evidence that the youngsters were not dormant comes in the form of an interesting

contest in football which took place during the summer between the Abbeyside Scouts and their Stradbally counterparts.

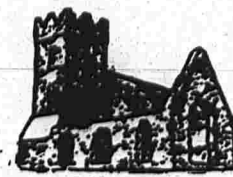

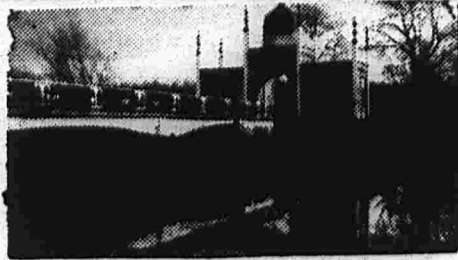

DAIRYING

TIME TO PREPARE FOR THE GRAZING SEASON

Preparation for the coming grazing and silage season should be carried out as soon as possible by deciding on an overall grazing and silage plan for the farm. The grazing and silage area should be selected. The area for grazing in April/June should match the livestock units you plan to have at that time.

Moorepark trials have shown that tight stocking during this period will improve grass quality, resulting in an extra 40 gallons of milk per cow later in the season.

As a guide, cows on good grassland should generally be stocked at about 2.5 cows/acre during the first silage conservation period.

As grass growth varies from year to year, be prepared to adjust the grazing area in order to maintain grass quality and provide sufficient feed for cows. Having decided on the area required for grazing, the remainder of available grassland should be closed for silage. Your adviser should be consulted on the likely optimum grazing and silage requirements for your farm.

Satisfactory grass growth requires adequate fertiliser and lime. Preferably, phosphate and potash should have been applied in the autumn. If not, it should be applied as soon as possible to encourage grass growth and avoid luxury uptake of potash by grass and grass tetany in cows.

Pastures that can be grazed in mid-March should get 1.25 bags of urea per acre now. Consider taking an early grazing off dry silage ground as this can provide useful high quality feed and improve silage quality especially where there has been some winter growth.

Silage yields will not be seriously reduced in the ground is not poached and the cows are removed by the beginning of April. There could be a poor response to urea where land has been limed since last autumn and other sources of nitrogen should be used in those situations.

Where the quality of swards have seriously deteriorated, some reseeding should be considered. Undersown arable silage is likely to be the best option for spring reseeding as it can provide a heavy crop of reasonable quality silage as well as high quality grazing in the back end of the year. Good paddock layouts are a great help to grassland management. They should be well fenced with an adequate convenient water supply. Roadways should be smooth and well maintained.

Paddock sizes should be suitable for the herd size. Ideally they should be capable of being subdivided into two or three divisions in order to facilitate suitable grazing pressure at all times.

CALVING JACKS

It is good practice to give cows plenty of time to calve and let most of them do so on their own. Heifers in particular need plenty of time.

Nevertheless, calving jacks are useful and essential on any farm with a reasonable number of cows. A calving jack has close to the power of a tug-of-war team and this alone means that they should be used with skill and care. Once the ropes are attached to the calf, the jack is nearly always used to provide a continuous or steady pull until the calf is born. This means that calving is often forced to proceed in advance of the cow's readiness. The natural way for the cow to calve is by contractions followed by relaxation and delay, until near the end when the contractions came quickly one after the other, almost in continuous fashion. Injuries to cows and calves can be reduced by combining the power of the jack with the cows contractions and being gentle.

CEREALS

Sowing of spring barley can commence in Co. Waterford, as soon as weather and soil conditions allow, but remember, the crop cannot tolerate marginal conditions, especially in heavy soils. With the water table very high, soil must be allowed adequate time to allow the plough layer to dry out. Assessing the suitability of ground for ploughing must not be confined to the top surface. Soil damage is inevitable if there are any signs of a shine or smear on the furrow when ploughing.

Regardless of the pressure of work, the sensible approach is to allow more drying time before continuing. Damaging the soil structure will make cultivations difficult and costly. It will invariably affect crop yield and it will subsequently create greater drainage problems.

Heavy soils and those following beet and potatoes are slow to dry. Patience is required with these sites and they should not be cultivated unless sufficiently dried out. One-pass systems do not have the same flexibility in spring on fresh ground as they have in the autumn. When worked in marginal conditions pre-Christmas, the soil will subsequently be exposed to a range of weather conditions that allow a curing process to rectify any minor damage to the soil. Using a one-pass system or powered cultivator in poor conditions in the spring can be a disaster if followed by dry weather. The risk is greatest in the medium to heavy soils and these need sufficient time to allow the cultivating layer to dry before tilling.

If sowing in the next week or two, apply 0:10:20 or 0:7:30 at sowing. Nitrogen is not required now and can be applied in early March.

County Waterford ICMSA News

Mr. John Skehan, County Chairman, welcomed the commitment given by the Minister for Finance to ICMSA that he will bring in changes in legislation so that farmers who have to compulsorily dispose of animals, because of disease, will not have to pay tax as a result.

The County Chairman said that some farmers who suffered an outbreak of TB or Brucellosis are facing huge tax bills and that the current rules are grossly unfair.

"In effect farmers are being taxed on the salvage value of the animals and the reactor compensation they receive. Because of veterinary restrictions farmers cannot restock within the tax accounting period, so therefore when they come to restock they have to do so with after tax receipts", said the County Chairman.

The ICMSA proposal to the Minister was that farmers would be allowed a period of one full tax year, after the end of the restriction period, to rebuild the herd or that the receipts from the sale of reactors and reactor compensation would be deemed to be non-taxable income for a period of one year after the end of the restriction period. Both approaches would give the same result and would mean that farmers who have to dispose of animals under any eradication scheme would not face a higher tax bill as a result.

ICMSA will be endeavouring to ensure that this commitment is honoured in full and that a proper solution is proposed in the Finance Bill, before the legislation is finally adopted by Dail Eireann, ICMSA

wants the new rules to apply retrospectively to April 1993 when the old stock relief rules were abolished.

ICMSA has also sought the restoration of the old stock relief rules or the nil

value system, so that farmers are not forced to pay tax on animals before they are sold.

ICMSA has also sought the following:

★ the provision of the same personal allowances to

farm families as are available to the PAYE sector.

★ the provision of special capital allowances to facilitate on farm investment.

★ a simplified system of making tax returns with no compliance cost.

Superlevy Situation Explosive

—Says IFA Chairman

Commenting this week on the current explosive superlevy situation, Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran,

called on farmers to examine their own position very carefully. "For the April to December period, national deliveries were 1.5% over quota. For the month of September alone, deliveries were 4% over quota, for October 12%, November 21% and finally 15% for December, and the preliminary results for January indicate a continuation of the tendency," the IFA man warned.

"The Department have made it clear that we are currently approximately 8 million gallons more over quota than for the same period in 1992/93, the last year in which we paid a superlevy fine, also the highest bill paid to date, at £8.8

million, Gerald Curran explained.

"After the lean Spring months of 1994, producers understandably pushed their production up to improve their income, but the mild weather in the Autumn led to an unexpected gigantic boost in production and farmers are now having to come to terms with the prospect of one of our largest superlevy bills to date," he said.

"It is vital at this stage that dairy farmers whose production is heading towards over-quota fully realise the seriousness of the situation and take every possible step to minimise their exposure to superlevy liability. Farmers whose creamery is over quota should examine their own situation very closely, and obtain advice from their Co-op and Teagasc advisers," he concluded.

Donovan Welcomes New Area Aid Plan

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, recently welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Ivan Yates on simplification of the 1995 Area Aid application for livestock farmers.

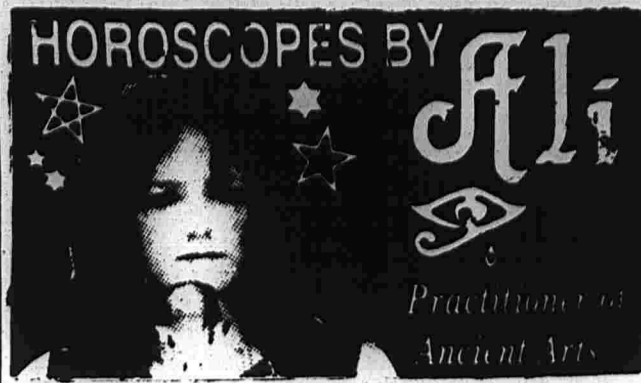
Mr. Donovan pointed out that under the new Area Aid plan announced by the Minister, herdowners who have no change in their forage area for 1995 will only have to confirm this fact to the Department of Agriculture on a specially provided postcard. "Over 100,000 farmers will avoid the chore of filling out Area Aid forms and collating farm maps under this plan."

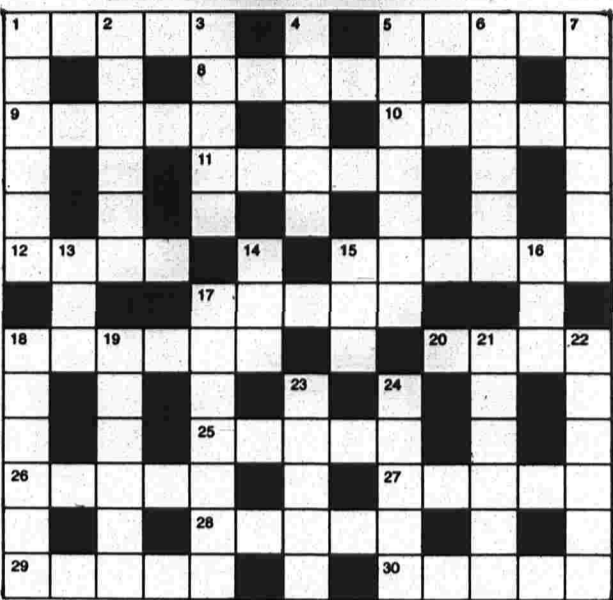

Waterford Farmer For European Court On February 14

Co. Waterford dairy farmer, Thomas Cronin from Ardmore, will have his day in court in the European Court of Justice on February 14 for the hearing of his case against the EU Council on the removal, without compensation, of 4.5% of his milk quota.

Thomas is one of four farmers — including ICMSA President, Tom O'Dwyer — named in the ICMSA 4.5% quota case to be heard in Luxembourg on St. Valentine's Day.

The cases being taken by ICMSA on behalf of all Irish dairy farmers have been in preparation for over two years. The court will not give its decision on February 14, the next stage of the process will be the Advocate General who will summarise the evidence on both sides and make a recommendation to the Court. The Court will then reach a decision on the basis of all the evidence and on the Advocate General's opinion. In the majority of cases, the Court agrees with the opinion of the Advocate General.

REINSTATEMENT OR COMPENSATION SOUGHT

The ICMSA, through the farmers, lodged its challenge to the Court of Justice in Luxembourg against the EU in February 1993. The association is challenging the right of the Council to suspend, without compensation, 4.5% of our national milk quota amounting to 51 million gallons and is seeking full reinstatement of the suspended quota, or compensation for this suspension in the 1992/1993 year at the rate of £20m p.a. The quotas were suspended for two full quota years (92-93 and 93-94). We are now in the third year of suspension, without compensation. If the case to have the quota restored is not successful ICMSA is seeking a proper buy-out scheme over five years which would amount to £100m for farmers.

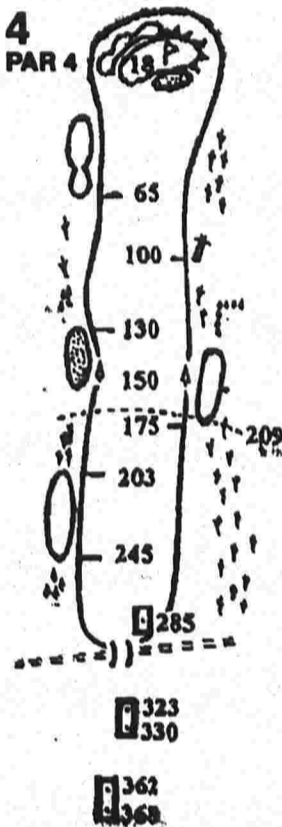

A LOOK AT THE COURSE



This week we're on the fourth, no doubt feeling relieved that the terrors of the third are behind us. At least we'll hardly lose a ball on this hole.

The fourth is a straight par 4. The fairway is uphill to halfway, and then slopes down towards the green. Some mounds, and a bunker on the left, can penalise the teeshot that misses the fairway, but the real problems on this hole, come with the shot to the green.

An evil bunker, in front of the right half of the green, makes it very difficult for a player, coming from that right side of the green, so a ball clearing the sandtrap, will probably end up through the green, and running down the hill. The best approach to the green is from the left hand side. Now the player has an approach shot which can avoid the bunker.

The green itself, seems to have more borrows than it

actually has, but like a lot of other greens on the course, most putts are straighter than they look.

PROVISIONAL BALL

If a shot may be lost, or out of bounds, a player may play another ball, provisionally, from the same place. The player MUST inform his/her marker or opponent, before playing, that it is a provisional ball; otherwise, it becomes the ball in play and a two stroke penalty is incurred.

The player may continue to play the provisional ball, until reaching the place where the original ball is likely to be.

If the original ball is out of bounds, or lost, then the

provisional ball becomes the ball in play, under a two shot penalty.

If the original ball is found, in bounds, then the player MUST continue with that ball. The player does not have the choice of abandoning the original ball. A player declaring the original ball unplayable, and opting to play the shot again, cannot opt for the provisional, but must go back, and play the shot again. So remember:

1. You must declare a provisional ball, before playing it.
2. If the original ball is found in bounds, you must abandon the provisional ball.

EOIN O'RIORDAN CONSOLIDATES LEAD

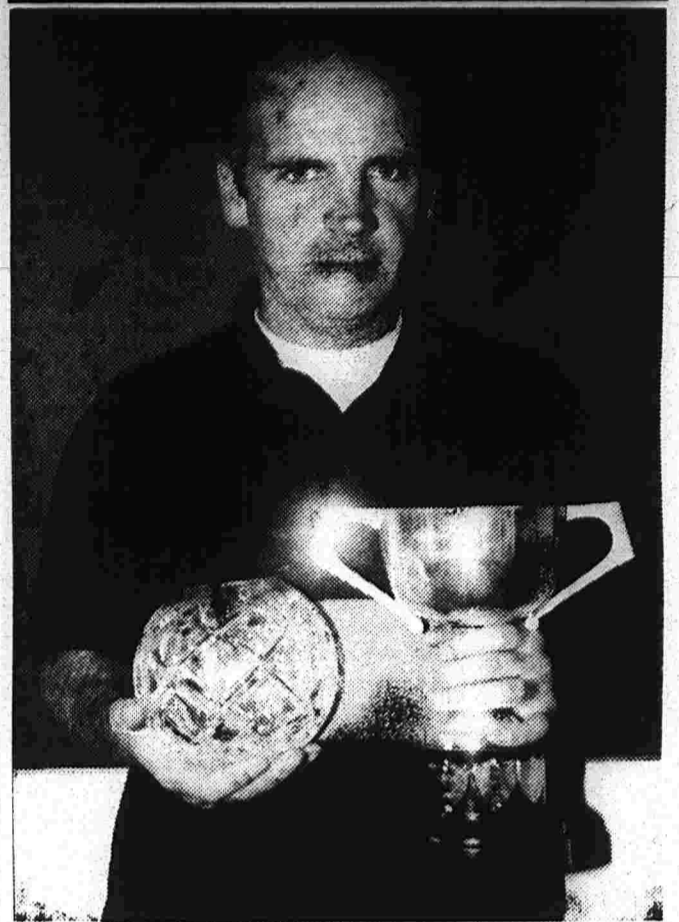

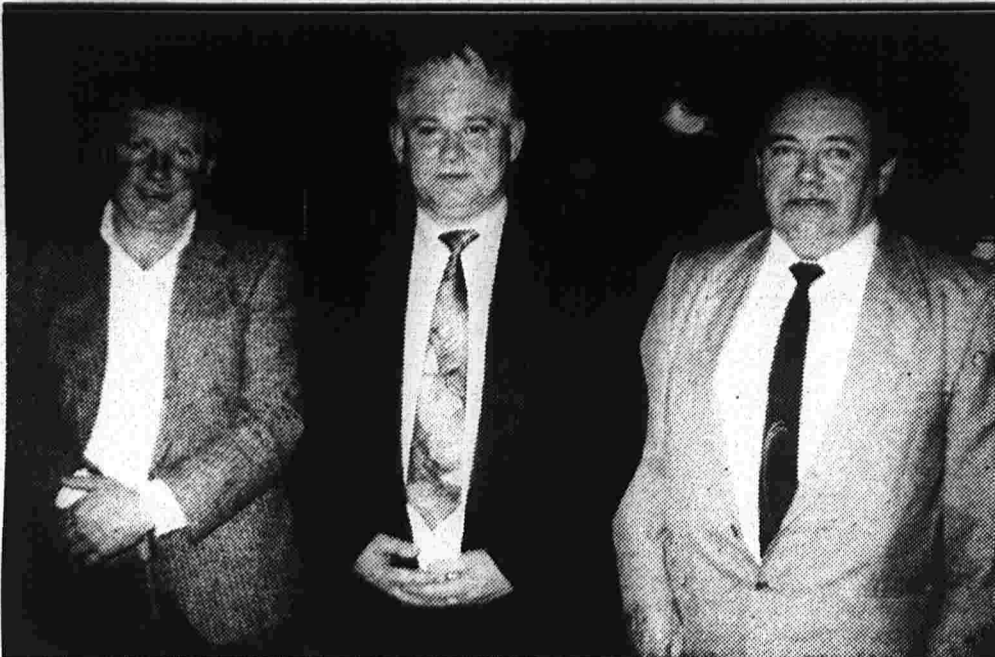

UNDERAGE CHAMPIONSHIPS

G.A.A. NOTES

Championship Format

This will be the big discussion point at three upcoming Board meetings over the next couple of weeks and it is going to be very interesting to see what the outcome of these deliberations will be. In the case of the Divisional Boards the expectations are they will stay with the league systems currently in operation.

Quite a number of championship related motions were referred from the conventions to the various Boards. The Western Board will discuss theirs on tomorrow night as required in the circumstances, and the Senior Board will debate all their referred motions at their first meeting which is likely to take place on Monday, February 27.

Before last week's Divisional Board meeting, delegates were given a proposed new format for the senior championships and which is the brainchild of Declan Barron, present manager of the county minor football team.

His proposition relates to the restructuring of both championships and it included a graph which goes a long way towards illustrating now the new system will work.

The proposal is that there would be sixteen teams divided into four groups of four teams. The 1994 semi-finalists will be seeded and an open draw for the remaining 12 to fill groups. The top team will qualify (in each group) for the quarter-finals. The second team in each group has a first round bye. Teams finishing in third and fourth places will play off in first round knockout games with the winners into the second round and the losers playing off for relegation. The final loser to be replaced by the county intermediate champions, etc.

The four teams being seeded in football are Nire, Gaultier, Stradbally and Rathgormack. In hurling the named teams are Mount Sion, Passage, Ballygunner and Lismore. As all the clubs have been supplied with all the additional details of the proposal, their members will have an opportunity of discussing it well in advance of the particular meeting.

This will not be the only proposal before the meeting on the subject of the 1995 championships as there were motions for the championship format on the county convention clar from other clubs and which were referred back to County Board. Interestingly, the motion from De La Salle on the same subject, is quite similar to Declan Barron's proposal. It has the same number of teams, the same seeding arrangement and the same groupings, but includes the 'timing' of the matches and it embodies a formula for the playing of the Sargent and Phelan Cups as well.

It is also very likely that many delegates will favour the Clashmore proposal that the number of teams allowed to play in both the senior hurling and football championships be reduced from 16 to 12. They follow on with proposals to have similar reductions in the composition of the intermediate and junior championships, etc., but they do not wish to have the pro-

posals introduced until January of next year.

As this is a 'referred' motion, it will still be up for discussion and there may be clubs who will push to have it introduced for this year.

Another championship related motion down for discussion at the first meeting of the County Board will be the Modeligo proposal that both Divisional Boards be allowed to enter a Divisional team in both senior championships.

One club chairman told me over the weekend that his club will press for the status quo and be supporting the continuation of the Colligan/Emmets style system which was introduced last year.

Whatever system is eventually adopted, it is certain that we are going to have an interesting debate at the first meeting of the Board.

KNOCKOUT CHAMPIONSHIPS

Both Ardmore and Geraldines clubs will propose the reintroduction of the knockout system of championships when the Western Board meets on tomorrow night, as both had motions for this referred from the divisional convention.

Special County Convention

Despite a submission that the procedures being followed were in contravention of general rule, the special County Convention to restructure the County Board went ahead as scheduled on the Tuesday of County Convention week.

Not very many delegates involved themselves in the discussions which brought about a number of major changes in the make-up of the various sub-committees.

Some delegates expressed themselves to have misgivings about giving so much authority to small groups, but it was agreed that all decisions by these groups, would be subject to County Board approval. The overall result may improve administration in the county and will broaden the activities of the Board — something that is very badly needed here for quite some time.

The new Executive Com-

mittee will include every elected member at county convention and this will increase by two the number there at the present.

COUNTY BOARD

This body will not change from its present composition but will have a non-voting representative from the following — County Handball Board, County Vocational School Representative, County Secondary Schools Rep. and a County Primary Schools Delegate.

GAMES ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

This was formerly the

County Fixtures Committee and as well as the three secretaries and three chairmen, it will now include the County Treasurer, and PRO. The county referees administrator will attend meetings for the appointment of referees, but will not be permitted to vote on other matters on their agenda.

The duties of this important committee will include the adoption of referees reports, matters of discipline with power to impose suspensions under general rule. They will also hear objections and appeals from Divisional Boards, etc.

GAMES DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

This committee will consist of a chairman and secretary, the county youth officer and four members selected. The four will be specialists in the fields of games development.

They will have responsibility for coaching, increasing the number of games being played, oversee the recruitment and training of referees, etc., etc.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The County Development Officer (John Fraher) will be Chairman. Six other members will be enlisted. Their brief will be to moni-

tor club development within the county and assist with organisation and leadership courses, etc.

CULTURAL COMMITTEE

They will consist of the Oifigeach Gaeilge, two members from County Scor and four specialist members to be appointed by the officers. They will have responsibility for assisting in organising Scor and Scor na nOg.

Also they will be responsible for the promotion of traditional Irish music, dancing and other aspects of Irish culture.

They will also promote the Irish language and take responsibility for the Gaeltacht Scholarships, etc.

As there was no other nomination, the Chairman, P. S. O Riain, who chaired the meeting, declared Paddy to be unanimously elected and having paid a tribute to his service as vice-chairman over the years, wished him well and assured him of his full support and help while in office.

Responding to the tributes paid to him from the floor and thanking the members

for the confidence placed in him, the new chairman pledged himself to the task of restoring harmony within the county and working with the members for the betterment of the Association within the county. He said he had a long association with the G.A.A. in the county, having played hurling and football for his club and county for many years. He felt that he had a fair knowledge of what the Association was all about. He thanked his wife Mary and his family for their support over the years and he knew they would continue to lend the same support now while discharging his duties of Board Chairman.

NEW VICE CHAIRMAN

Following the above appointment, the matter of a new vice chairman was discussed and the decision was that an election would take place on next Thursday (tomorrow) night at the same venue at 8 p.m. There was full agreement too, that nominations for this post would be required to be in the hands of the secretary, Anthony Walsh in writing on or before 7 p.m. on Monday evening, February 6. Clubs who nominate a candidate will be required to have the consent of their nominee. It is hoped that names will be available for publication in this issue.

The Limerick Co. Convention

It might seem a bit out of place in this column, but I know that a few bits will be of interest to readers around here.

The first interesting fact that a record total of 368 delegates attended the convention. This number was greater by 70 than the number who attended the annual Congress of the G.A.A. at Easter last year and it was exactly 200 more than the number which turned up for the Waterford convention two weeks ago. It goes to show how differently County Boards are structured.

Also it showed the great interest in their convention as they had a maximum attendance. The chairman, Gerry Bennis was defeated by 20 votes (194 to 174) by Brendan Danaher who had lost by just 20 votes when the same two contested the position on the retirement of Jim Hickey. Also Limerick elected a lady to the office of county P.R.O. when San-

dra Marsh defeated the outgoing officer Harry Green-smith by 224 votes to 145. Their total cost of preparing teams for the championships was a massive £160,000. They spend £15,000 in preparing their minor team which was beaten in the first round by Cork. Also they gave £10,000 to the Primary Schools Board and there was strong criticism about the sum being inadequate. The county's overall intake from sponsorship was £113,000.

Being in the All Ireland meant increased income which totalled £320,704 for the year and their surplus was just £20,000. Their convention decided that in future all positions on the executive will be limited to a five year term. It is also interesting to note from their accounts that the successful running of Feile na Gael cost them a mere £1,089.

For the three charges, Judge Uinsinn Mac Gruaire sentenced Cawley to a total of 4 months imprisonment.

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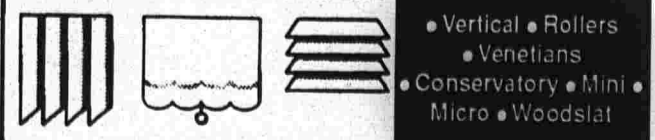
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
