As the enormous flooding of fields continues and the major downpours persist, much concern has been raised with regard to the sorry state of our county roads, which have rapidly deteriorated under the influence of this latest bout of inclement weather.

of Waterford County Council, rural based members spoke of flooded impassable stretches of secondary roads and the damage being done to cars and the basic county infrastructure alike as the heavy rains continue. First to raise the issue, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said the situation had gone from bad to worse with water flowing along the sides of county roads. "If we get more bad winters, we won't have any roads left", he warned. He subsequently proposed that the Council write to the Environment Minister, Brendan Howlin to impress upon him the urgency of the dire situation of the county's secondary roads. The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who had raised his own motion that

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I work part-time for 12 hours per week. Am I entitled to Public Holidays? What happens if they fall on a day I don't normally work?

Answer — A regular part-time worker who has worked for the same employer for 13 weeks and who is normally expected to work for at least 8 hours per week is entitled to Public Holidays on the same basis as full-time workers.

Even if the Bank Holiday falls on a day you normally don't work, you are entitled to — an extra day's pay, or an extra day's annual leave, or a paid day off within a month of the Bank Holiday; the nearest Church Holiday (except Christmas Day or St. Patrick's Day). Note that where the employment cease before the Public holiday, the employee would be entitled to payment for the Public Holiday if they had worked for 4 of the previous 5 weeks.





Now That The Days Get Longer

February may seem cold but the soil should be warming as the days lengthen - albeit slowly!

Make the most of these longer days, especially the sunny ones, to start getting back into the gardening routine.



 Check your roses - new bush roses should be pruned during February and roots firmed in after disturbance by windy winter weather.

Cut back all growth to about 6 inches from the ground, preferably at a bud facing outwards so that new growth is not hindered.

New climbers need cutting back by two-thirds and fastening securely to the wall, fence, trellis, pergola or other support.

But don't fertilise new roses yet - they will be more inclined to put down stronger roots and be healthier in the long run if you don't spoil them just yet.

It's a different story for established roses. They need a dressing of well-rotted compost or commercial rose mixture, lightly raked into the surface above the roots. This can be done this month or early in March, when it's their turn to receive a pruning.

 Strike early against slugs - milder weather will bring out these pests and you need to kill as many as possible before your blooms arrive or the slugs will find more places to hide as dormant vegetation comes to life.

Pellets are a convenient favourite with many gardeners but can be expensive, are not very 'green' and may harm pets and children.

ALTERNATIVE

Simple traps are a good alternative - saucers and flower drip trays filled with milk or beer slops which the slugs cannot resist. They will either drown or break cover, enabling you or the local thrushes and blackbirds to dispose of them.

 Bring some 'scents' to your garden schemes - Lily of the Valley produces tiny flowers which have a powerful scent for their size.

Crowns can be planted now in a shady spot with lots of leaf mold and other well-rotted organic matter.

Leave shoot tips just below the top of the soil and they will soon poke through. Within a couple of years they will be established and spreading to create a scented carpet of greenery.

If you've already got good 'scents' in the shape of wallflowers, simply check that these have battled through the worst of the winter and firm them into the soil if they have been loosened by wind and frost. A good nitrogen-rich fertiliser such as dried blood will perk them up.

• Moving plants - if you want to swap deciduous shrubs, ferns or herbaceous stock around then lift gently with as much soil around the roots as possible. Don't allow them to dry out before relocating. Tease out any coarse grass and weeds, especially the fleshy white roots of that tenacious pest, bindweed.

One Child In Every Seventy Has Access To Computers

In a recently published survey by the Irish National Teachers Oganisation, it emerges that one in every three primary schools in the State still have no computer.

And, in the case of schools who now had a

computer or computers, only twenty-six per cent had funding from the Department of Education.

"These are worrying figures," commented Joe Conway of the INTO in Waterford, "and, of the 56,000 pupils surveyed, the

ratio of computers to primary school children is one to seventy. It just emphasises once again the under-funding of primary education."

Teachers, too, are dissatisfied with this state of affairs and returned again and again in the survey to

the lack of Departmental funding for in-service training. "We have a computer but not one teacher feels confident to use it," was one teacher's comment, typifying a common complaint throughout the survey.

THIS LAMB IS SURE TO GO

WHEN you're planning a candlelit dinner for two, lamb with orange and brandy sauce is sure to be a success. And it's not at all difficult to cook.

LAMB WITH ORANGE AND BRANDY SAUCE

Ingredients:

half a leg of lamb, fillet end, boned and rolled (approx. 13/4lb/800g)
4fl oz (100ml) orange juice salt and pepper thinly pared rind of 1 orange, cut into narrow strips 1/4 pint (150ml) stock 2 level tsp comflour 1 tbsp brandy 2 level tsp red currant jelly


Garnish: toasted flaked almonds parsley sprigs



Method

Place lamb in a casserole or small roasting tin and pour orange juice over.
Season lightly with salt and pepper. Cook uncovered at 375°F, 190°C, Gas Mark 5 for about 11/4 hours. Allow about 45 minutes per 1lb (450g). Baste twice with juices.

Cook strips of orange rind in boiling water for 5 minutes. Drain.



When lamb is cooked remove from juices and keep warm. Strain off any fat from juices, add stock and cornflour blended in a little cold water and bring to the boil. Add brandy, red currant jelly, seasonings to taste and orange rind. Simmer for about 2

minutes or until jelly has melted.

Slice lamb, arrange on a dish and spoon sauce over. Sprinkle with toasted flaked almonds and garnish with pars-



150th Edmund Rice Anniversaries Come To End



The 150th anniversary celebrations of Edmund Rice ended recently with a Diocesan Mass, celebrated by Bishop William Lee at the Cathedral, Waterford.

Among the many CBS from throughout the diocese represented in the packed Cathedral were Dungarvan CBS Secondary School. The following is an extract from Bishop Lee's sermon at the Mass:

Edmund Rice was born in Westcourt, Callan, Co. Kilkenny in 1762. There

were seven sons and two girls in the family. It comes as a surprise that a Catholic family could be prosperous in these days but they had a lease of a good sized farm and were industrious people. In view of his future work in education, it was fortunate that he received a very good education himself, first at a local hedge school and then at a private secondary school in Kilkenny.

He was apprenticed to his uncle, Michael Rice, in Waterford City at the age of 17. His uncle was involved in providing food and services for the crews and passengers of the ships trading in and out of the port of Waterford. Michael Rice became a prosperous business man and his business expanded even more when it was handed over to his nephew, Edmund Ignatius Rice. His great wealth was later to be used in transforming the lives of countless young boys.

He was married at the age

of 25 and was a widower two years later when his young wife died as a result of a fall from a horse. He was left with a handicapped daughter, Mary.

Edmund Rice worked very hard for the next 10 years, possibly to forget the great tragedy of his life. He was involved in the charitable societies of his day and was doing what he could to relieve the poverty and distress all round him in Waterford City.

Nevertheless, he became restless and was looking for a new direction on his life. He was thinking of becoming a priest in a monastery in Europe until a friend pointed out to him that the ragged, illiterate and wild young boys of Waterford were a more appropriate mission field for him.

As a successful business man, Edmund Rice was used to taking practical and swift decisions and so he opened a free school for the boys of Waterford. Of course, there were some schools in Waterford and elsewhere but a free school was unheard of. He employed two teachers at his own expense but they couldn't take the stress of teaching and controlling unruly young boys who had spent all their days roaming the streets of Waterford and they left. Edmund Rice struggled on alone but, fortunately, two well educated young men from Callan joined him. Later they became Brothers.

The first free school was housed in a stable. Later Edmund Rice built a school and monastery in New Street in Waterford out of his own resources and continued to do so until all his wealth was exhausted.

wealth was exhausted.

Opening free schools didn't solve all the problem; many young boys couldn't come to school because they had no suitable clothes and when they came to school, they couldn't concentrate because they were hungry. Again the practical Edmund Rice employed a tailor to provide the necessary cloth-

ing and opened a bakery to supply free bread.

After some time Edmund Rice felt that he and his companions should form themselves into a religious community and this happened in 1808. The congregation received final approval from Rome in 1822.

From Waterford, Edmund Rice and his Brothers branched out to Carrick-on-Suir, Dungarvan, Dublin, Limerick, Thurles and eventually to all parts of Ireland and the English speaking world.

Edmund Rice and his followers, with the Irish Sisters of Charity, joined in the battle against ignorance, poverty and violence. They were the real revolutionaries, the real radicals, who changed the face of Ireland, gave our people new hope and enabled them to take advantage of religious and political freedom.

Edmund Rice is a model for lay people and even clerics, in many roles. He bore widowhood with equanimity, he cared for his handicapped daughter with extraordinary love, he brought love into the lives of thousands of poor boys and girls, he gave example as a patient teacher using modern methods.

We look to Edmund Rice and his followers for inspiration in our unfinished task; we pray for the strength to imitate his direct and generous ways in coming to the aid of all God's children.

Main Points At A Glance

● INCOME TAX ●

Comeragh Water Eases Plight Of Refugees



When a consignment of Humanitarian Aid arrives in a disaster area, it is greeted with such joy and relief that the only priority is to get the life-saving material to the people as soon as possible. Often the aid workers

are too exhausted at the end of their sometimes eighteen hour day to put pen to paper to thank those who donated and sent the aid in the first place, or are so remote in a country where all services have broken down that it is

often months before formal acknowledgement arrives.

This is perfectly understandable, so when a card from Zambia dropped in Carole Wiley's door in Carrigaline recently, she knew that the people of Dungarvan and West Waterford would have more than a passing interest in its contents.

Last August, under the auspices of Carole Wiley Humanitarian Aid, a local group carried out a very successful food appeal in Dungarvan and West Waterford the proceeds of which were transported to Zambia to serve the Rwandan refugees under the care of the Sacred Heart Sisters there. Amongst the fine container-load of food, blankets and medicine which left Co. Waterford was a consignment of bottled water from Comeragh Spring Waters in Kilmacthomas which was gratefully received as the following from Sr. Celeste confirms:

Mbala, Zambia,

"Dear Carole,

all you have done for us. You're a great woman and may God bless you abundantly. The container arrived on Sunday and we are just emptying it gradually. The spring water is fantastic for our dying patients in the compound.

Thank you very much for

One 19 year old girl named Gift was dying and her mouth full of ulcers. She begged for drinks and we tried to relieve her distress - your container had not yet arrived. She died last Sunday. We bought wood and made a coffin for her and took her on the back of our van to bury her. She's one of many who are destitute. The orphans increase daily. Deaths rising.

May God bless you and your team. We are so grateful to you all.

Much love, Sr. Celeste"

That is the experience of one group of beneficiaries of Irish aid in far-off Africa and it is no doubt the experience of many others who have not yet been able to get their thanks back to the Irish people. The container which left Dungarvan gave comfort and life to many on the brink of death and those who gave, whether little or much, can take comfort from being the Good Samaritans of today.

The Famine Years In An Rinn 1845-1850

As I sit and listen to the news and shows on television about "An Gorta" the famine years in Ireland I immediately think of my ancestors and I wonder how they survived without potatoes when the blight occurred. In stark contrast is life nowadays when we throw our food out the back door for the birds to feed on. I can almost hear in my inner soul the cries of the people with nothing to live on when they realised that their potatoes were inedible.

I spoke to my grandparents and asked them for some. information about the Famine. One line my grandpa spoke to me was "I Reilg an tSleibhe tá na ceadta acu trascartha". This was a line from a famine poem by a great poet in the area of An Rinn called Marie Ni Dhroma. This poem is called "Amhran Na bPratai Dubha." Any time I read it now I think of the pain they must have gone through and it brings a little more than a tear or two to my eyes.

There was an increase in the population of An Rinn before the famine but it fell again from 2,591 to 1,841 to 1,921 in the year 1851.

It has often been said to me that the people of An Rinn did not suffer as badly as other parts of the country because fishing provided a good source of nourishment. Unfortunately with the famine came bad weather. That meant that the fishermen could not take to sea in their little boats.

As a result of bad weather and the famine a lot of the fishermen had to use their fishing equipment and their boats as a deposit to buy some food. On one or two occasions they often had to burn their oars in order to have some fuel.

The houses were very badly furnished and imagine the thoughts our ancestors must have had when going to sleep at night. "Where am I going to get something to eat? How am I going to live another

In the year 1846 the amount of seaworthy boats in Baile na nGall was down to eight. The people were at this time beginning to get fever and dysentery. I hate to think of any one living in this kind of situation. I once heard a story from my grandparents in Leamybrien of a man who came across four small children under a rug crying and dying with the hunger. Unfortunately all those children died shortly after.

Things started to look up for the people of An Rinn when Reverend Alcock got some help from the Society of Friends. This society gave approximately 178 loans to purchase new boats and trammels. The reason for this was to help fight the famine. This money was used for repairs and new equipment for boats. After about one month these men began to pay back their loans.

By October 1847 the crews of 48 boats were able to support their families. From then on the people of An Rinn began to see a small light at the end of a long

In regard to the Sheehan's we are not entirely bereft because Noel Sheehan, Noelie to all of us who know him, has made some notes of his own era and that of his father Bill and his uncles Tommy and Pa who gave mighty service to Tallow and the G.A.A. in the county.

Noel Sheehan's own career I'll get around to another time when dealing with his brother Billy, Pat and Timmy. Sean Sheehan, present club chairman was employed in banking but responded on a number of occasions to Tallow's invitation that he field out with the club in the championship. So he donned the blue and gold a few times, especially against keen rivals Shamrocks. Sadly for Tallow and himself his work far from home effectively limited him from making any major contribution on the playing fields. Now settled in Tallow Sean has enthusiastically immersed himself in all aspects of community life and in the G.A.A. in particular.

Pa, Bill and Tommy were known far beyond the boundaries of Tallow. Indeed it is fair to claim that few others were identified with Tallow and hurling as they were or had the "gift of the gab" as they had. You wouldn't want to be in a hurry if you encountered any one of the trio because no matter what the subject they could wax eloquent on it and on hurling the flow was in full spate. Every story was enlivened with a of incidents and enriched in the telling by their cial; special because post own special gifts of imper-sonation and colourful description. Like all orators they had to have a forum and they had: Sheehan's Workshop.

The Workshop was in Barrack Street, where their fa-ther David Sheehan applied his carftsmanship in timber to the making of a wide variety of essential products. Doors, windows, wheels, wheelbarrows and coffins came from his skillful hands and from the capable hands of Bill, Tommy, Pa (sometimes), Dave Doyle, Johnny the Workshop.

who with their boss Dave Sheehan comprised the

Sheehan's had all the parish school work - the Church, Tallow Boys' School, Tallows Girls' School, Glencairn N.S. and Kilcalf N.S. Besides, keeping the Garda Barrack's in Tallow and Knockanore in proper condition was part of their duties. Sheehan's were (still are) funeral undertakers, too, so between sustaining the living and burying the dead the staff

were fully occupied.

Poor David Sheehan
never really understood the passion for hurling which animated his staff. Batty Collins, the Chapel Street shoemaker and great friend of David's, didn't help at all. Sharing David's disenwith the chantment hurley/sliotar game he often painted the grim scenario for his friend.

"What would you do on a Monday morning Dave Sheehan", Batty used whine, "if you wanted one of them and he to be knocked out with that bloomin' hurley. Aren't you the foolish man to be leavin' your sons at the hurling'". Many's the time the hurling staff felt inclined to insert something substantial like a plane into Batty's mouth and sealing the orifice with a few six inch

At the time it would have taken much more than Batty to cool the ardour of the hurlers. The Workshop was akin to the forge in that it had a welcome for all at any time of the day or night and debate continued while a wheel or a door or a window was being fashioned. Monday morning was spe mortems on the week-end matches received priority over all else. God help you if you called in expecting to be served. The disputations and analyses went on and on with no one caring a hoot about consensus or accord or mundane matters like work. Better wait for the afternoon when normality would have returned. Thus was the tradition established that their half day was on Monday morning and the rendezvous of all discriminating hurling men

Government Responsible For Continuation Of Live Export Trade

"It is the duty of the Irish Government to ensure that adequate shipping facilities are in place to allow all exports from this island to continue," said the ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer.

Mr. O'Dwyer said he supports the position being adopted by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Yates, in his response to the closure of the Holyhead live export

route.
"The reality is that we are an export country, therefore

Government must fulfil its duty to farmers and to the general body of industry to ensure we have free and full access to European and world markets. As part of a single European market it is unacceptable that Irish exporters should be prevented from servicing their EU markets.

CALL ON IRISH FERRIES TO TAKE BALANCED APPROACH

"Irish Ferries have duties and responsibilities and must therefore take a balanced approach to the issue of livestock exports. I can assure Irish Ferries that Irish farmers are committed to a proper code of practice on animal welfare," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He concluded by urging the Government to fulfil its duty and ensure that the facilities are there for the continuation of our full live export trade.

Mr. John Skehan, County Chairman expressed disappointment that the government did not give farm families the same personal allowances in the 1995 Budget as are available to PAYE families.

"After the Budget a farm family will still have less personal allowances than a PAYE family and will end up paying more income tax compared to PAYE families on comparable incomes.

"Furthermore, PAYE tax payers will pay less PRSI compared to farmers and the self employed with the same income. The cost of low capital allowances for on-farm investment coupled with the gross underfunding of farm grants in the Book of Estimates, will cause major hardship to farmers now faced with having to fund this investment," said the County Chairman.

ICMSA will continue its efforts to achieve tax justice for farm families. ICMSA welcome the increase in the 27% tax band and the increase in the low income exemption threshold to

£7,400

"This should lead to more farmers not having a tax liability. However, the cost of compliance will continue for those making investments as nothing has been done on this issue in the Budget," said the County Chairman.

The Chairman also welcomed a number of positive aspects of the Budget as they affect farmers. In particular the two year period for rebuilding herds after disease eradication before

subjecting the process to taxation, the £5m allocation to put the Charter of Farmers Rights in place, and the token recognition of the problems arising from the flooding and in regard to stock relief for young farmers.

With regard to the live export trade, the County Executive urge the Government to fulfil its duty and to ensure that adequate shipping facilities are in place to allow all exports from this island to continue.

ICMSA Court Case Scheduled For Next Week

A court case which could have major implications for the Irish dairy industry will open in Luxembourg next week. The ICMSA has challenged the legality of EU rules which removed milk quota without compensation

Four dairy farmers, including the ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, will have their day in court on February 14, when they open their case against the EU in the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg. The farmers, as representatives of Irish farmers, will attend the European Court for the hearing of their case against the European Council on the removal, without compensation, of 4.5% of their milk quotas. The ICMSA, through the farmers, lodged its challenge to the Court of Justice in Luxembourg against the EU in February 1993. The Association is challenging the right of the Council to suspend, without compensation, 4.5 of our national milk quota amounting to 51 million gallons and is seeking full reinstatement of the quota withdrawn or full compensation. "The quotas were suspended for two full quota years (1992-'93 and 1993-'94) and we are now in the third year of suspension without compensation.

"This case is of extreme importance. It is a test case which will establish farmers rights to their quota. It is my belief that the removal of our quota, without compensation, is a breach of our democratic rights and is in breach of EU law. All dairy farmers stand to gain if the Court of Justice rules in favour to the ICMSA case," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

The Court of Justice however will not give its decision on February 14. The next stage of the process is where the Advocate General of the Court will summarise the evidence on both sides and make a recommendation to the Court. The Court will then reach a decision on the basis of all the evidence and on the opinion of the Advocate General. In the majority of cases, the Court agrees with the opinion of the Advo-

Drop Tax Clearance Requirement Says IFA

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, said that IFA has sought an urgent meeting with the Department of Finance officials with responsibility for implementing the new tax clearance requirements on farmers of headage payments and grants.

Mr. Murphy said IFA has also demanded that the Department should immediately drop tax clearance requirements from all livestock headage and grant schemes until the legality of these requirements under EU law is clarified.

He said: "The Irish Department of Finance has imposed the requirement on farmers who receive more than £500 in livestock headage and grants to quote their Revenue Social Insurance (RSI) number on their headage and grant application forms. Farmers who

are eligible for over £5000 in headage or grants under the Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme, REPS, the Farm Improvement Programme, the Early Retirement Scheme and installation Aid must also obtain full tax clearance from the local tax office.

"The schemes are heavily supported through funding from the EU Commission and, in our view, this funding must not be siphoned off through the domestic tax collection system independently of the normal self assessment income tax code."

He added: "The Department of Finance must drop its regulations requiring full tax clearance by farmers who are eligible for £5000 or more in headage and grants payments until the legality or otherwise of these regulations is clarified with the EU Commission."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Re Championships, Leagues

A Chara.

As the annual debate on how we run our championships approaches, it's been going on since I first went to Convention in 1975. I cannot understand why we don't have leagues running from March/April to Sept./October and a straight knockout championship

starting in June. Not for us the 20 plus games Jack Boothman speaks about but a minimum of 8 in each code because the vast majority of players in Waterford play both football and hurling.

FOOTBALL

Top ten teams in Div. 1 and next 10 in Division 2 run by County Board and remaining teams in Div. 3 and 4 in their respective divisions run by divisional boards. A total of 9 league games - 2 in March, 2 in April, 2 in May, break in June for championship with 3 league games to follow in July, August and September. HURLING

Top 8 teams (shorter season) in Div. 1 and next 8 in Div. 2 and so on similar to the football leagues — 2 games in April, 2 in May and the remaining 3 in July, August and September.

This would give your average dual player close on 20 games, nicely spread from March to September with a good build-up to the championships. Promotion and relegation would operate, with winning clubs receiving a cash prize, e.g. Div. 1 winners £1,000 sponsored of course. Leagues would have no bearing on championship status. Clubs fielding a second team might nominate 15 players that could play on their first team only, with the remaining players being allowed play on both teams. Anyway, the boards would draw up common sense rules with penalties for walkovers, etc.

There is a widely held belief in Waterford that leagues wouldn't work. I have no doubt but that they would if the three boards got together and came before the clubs with a proper package. The bottom line is that your average club player is not being catered for with a regular game through even a six month season. Last year, Clashmore went 10 weeks in the height of the season with no SF match and even then our game with Affane only went ahead because the clubs

play in Cappoquin.

In 1993 we played our last three SF games in 8 days yes, 8 days! - Sunday. Tuesday and the following Sunday - some championship! I could give many more examples of longer lay-offs for teams and a very short season.

Players want to play games - Ardmore, Brickeys and Clashmore second string football teams, to name just a few, kept fielding last year even when out of contention. By the way, all the players involved would have played just four games over a short

period of time.

The present system is an improvement on the past and will probably stay because it suits the stronger clubs in the various grades, but it does not cater properly for the vast majority of our players.

I believe that the system I outlined at the outset (with some alterations) would benefit club and county teams alike and one and all could look forward to the cut and thrust of a real championship. Thanking you.



A LOOK AT THE 5 COURSE PAR 3

This week we're on the first of the par threes. The fifth is 190 metres for the men, and 150 metres for the ladies, and can be anything from a five-iron to a driver. depending on the wind and the length of the player, the alignment of the tee and green, tends to cause those, who can reach the green, to on the left. card wreckers on this hole, though, are the drain, which crosses short of the green, and for the big hitters, the water, behind the green.

Most sad stories, on this hole, are caused by the drain, this crosses some 28 metres from the putting surface. It is covered, crossing the fairway, which is narrow at this point, so the straight hit can run onto the green, even it's not long enough to carry the drain. Unfortunately, slightly right or left, and you're probably in the water. The bigger hitters, can ignore the drain,

and look down their noses at the shorter club members, but the last laugh will be on them, if they overshoot the target and end in the lake behind the green.

The green slopes towards the front, and is 30 metres long, from front to back, so the player can be faced with a monster putt, when the pin is at the back. Generally speaking, though, one should not take worse than a four at this hole, if no penalty shots have been collected on the way.

lected on the way.

RECORDING SCORES

1. After each hole, the marker shall check the score with the competitor, and record it.

2. At the end of the round, the marker must sign the card. If more than one marker records the scores, then each should sign for the part he/she recorded.

3. At the end of the round, the competitor should check the score, ensure it is signed by the marker, sign it, and return it to the committee as soon as possible.

4. No alteration may be made on the card after the competitor has returned it.

5. The competitor is responsible for the correctness of the scores recorded. If a score, lower than that actually taken, is returned, then the card is disqualified. If a score, higher than that taken, is returned, then that score stands.

6. The competitor is responsible for recording the correct handicap on the card.

7. The committee is responsible for the date, the name, if entries are being taken by an appointed person, and the correct calculation of the score, nett and gross, in all types of competition.





FOOTBALL COACHING SEMINAR

On Saturday, February 18th a Foundation Level Football Coaching Seminar will be held in Bushy Park. This day-long course is organised under the auspices of the Munster Coaching and Games Development Body. Those people who successfully complete the seminar will be awarded the Foundation Level Coaching Certificate which is the first of fives grades in the GAA Coach Education Programme.

The holders of this certificate will be recognised as qualified Juvenile Coaches by the GAA and by Insurance Companies. It is important to note that the day is fast approaching when only those who hold such a qualification will be insured to coach juveniles at school, club or county level.

COURSE FEE The course fee has been set at £10 by the National Coaching and Games Development Committee. This fee covers the cost of the seminar as well as elevenses and lunch. Incidentally, some clubs pay the fee for personnel from their area, thereby creating a lot of goodwill while at the same time providing a pool of juvenile coaches to look after their underage teams. This is the final foundation level course before commencement of level one courses. In order to participate at level one you must have completed a foundation course.

Level one course starts in March. No more foundation courses in 1995. This course is open to both male and female participants.

The President also spoke about the development work being done in the county and was delighted to see the progress being made at Walsh Park where he visited in the afternoon.

The launch was very efficiently presented by Nicky Flynn on behalf of Waterford Crystal and had something to say about the various speakers whom he introduced. Wall Chart

WESTERN BOARD

MBBING

Greg Fives Elected Vice-Chairman

At last week's reconvened meeting of the Western Board, Greg Fives, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty and who is the well known treasurer of the County Deise Development Draw, was elected to succeed Paddy Walsh, the former vice-chairman and who was recently elevated to the office of Board chairman.

Of the seven nominated members, only two decided to contest the post and the election resulted in a big majority for the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty man who polled 29 votes as against 7 for Walter Kearney, the Nire.

In responding to the an-nouncement of the result, Greg Fives, who is a former chairman of his club and a former Munster Council Rep., paid tribute to his opponent Walter Kearney, and said his day would come. In congratulating Greg, Walter said he had stood because he felt it important that all vacancies should be contested and that elections in such circumstances were good. It was the first time that he stood for election and it would not be his last.

BOARD MEETING

It was quite an extraordinary meeting in many ways and I thought that, most extraordinary of all, was the fact that when the championships were being discussed, that not even one delegate mentioned the word 'knockout'.

Motions for a certain style of knockout championship were before the divisional convention and were referred back to the Board for discussion, yet, everyone at the meeting sat silent on the matter and accepted the league system just as it had been in recent years. If this is to be regarded as the mood of clubs at the moment, it now looks certain that the Senior Board will not even contemplate a change in their format when they assemble to discuss championships in two weeks time.

Paddy Walsh, Chairman, presided and at the outset welcomed every one to this first meeting and appealed to clubs for their full co-operation during the year ahead. He also appealed for a full attendance of club delegates at all meetings of the Board throughout the year.

At the start of the meeting the Chairman advised delegates about the officer Board recommendations regarding the motions which were referred from convention.

Paddy Fitzgerald, speaking on the Dungarvan motions which were referred, said that the clubs should have a months notice at the start of championships in order that they could properly prepare. The chairman and secretary said the officer Board would endeavour to give clubs as much notice as possible and when the advance programme of fixtures were being planned, the Dungarvan motion would be given full consideration.

On their second motion, Paddy Fitzgerald said that a two-week break for holidays in the July/August period was important as players and their families needed time to organise their summer holidays and therefore needed to know well in advance if they were going to be free during the popular holiday period. Some other delegates said that not all firms gave holidays to their workers at the same time. In reply the chairman said it would be unwise to tie the hands of the Board on the matter, but the request would be considered.

The other motions were deferred until the championships were being discussed later in the meeting.

MINOR CLUB VOTING

About 45 minutes was devoted to the question of the voting rights of minor clubs. The chairman informed the meeting that the officer Board had discussed this matter and were agreed that minor clubs did not have a vote at Divisional Board meetings, as they were debarred by general rule from voting at divisional and county conventions. A proposal was then made that the four clubs, Naomh Brid. St. Olivers, An Gaeltacht and Kilgobinet/Colligan (formerly St. Patrick's) be allowed to vote on the election of vice-chairman, as these clubs regularly attended Board meetings and were allowed to speak there.

The case was then made that if a number of minor clubs were permitted to vote, that all the 14 properly affiliated minor clubs, be given the same privilege. It was submitted that minor clubs in all other counties did not have a vote at adult Board meetings and that the Eastern Board here in Waterford did not allow voting

by minor clubs. Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan, Nioclas McGrath, Denis Mc-Grath and some other delegates proposed that all minor clubs be treated on an equal footing, but at the end of the very long debate, the meeting, on a vote, decided to allow the four above named minor clubs to vote, but not to allow the others to do the same. Paddy Fitzgerald asked that a ruling be got on the matter from Croke Park and this was agreed to.

GOOD LUCK TO LISMORE

Board representative, John Lyons spoke about Lismore's upcoming Harty Cup semi-final meeting with the North Mon in Fermoy on next Sunday and asked if the meeting would send their best wishes to the school. This was unanimously approved.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

As I reported above, no changes in the format for the 1995 championships was asked for and all competitions will run more or less on the same lines as in former years. There were some disagreements about the officer Boards recommendations about the size of some groupings, but after the divisions were voted on, the recommendations were accepted.

WEST INTERMEDIATE HURLING

The seven teams were drawn as follows:

Cappoquin a bye, Ring v. St. Mary's; Abbeyside v. Ballysaggart; Colligan v. Shamrocks. It is hoped to commence this championship in March/April.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL

The eight teams will play this championship on a league basis and in one group. The teams are Faha, Brickeys, Ring, Ardmore, Geraldines, Ballinameela, Shamrocks and Clashmore. The top four will qualify for the semi-finals with the top club playing the fourth in the group and the second playing the third.

JUNIOR HURLING 'A'

They will play the championship in one group. The nine teams are Ardmore, Clashmore, Geraldines, Ballinameela, Kilgobinet, Modeligo, Tourin, Kilrossanty, Glen Rovers (two top teams to semi-final and third and to quarter final).

JUNIOR HURLING (Second Strings)

Eleven teams have entered and they will play in two sections as follows:

Section A — Ballyduff, Shamrocks, Lismore, Dungarvan, Ring and Seana Phobal; Section B — Brickeys, Ballysaggart, Tallow, Abbeyside and Cappoquin. The winners of the sections will meet to produce a semifinalist.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL 'A'

A total of 25 teams will play in this championship which is to be run in three sections.

In the junior proper seven clubs will complete in a league championship, Seana Phobal, Kilgobinet, Emmetts, Modeligo, Lismore, Tallow and Ballyduff.

JUNIOR 'B' FOOTBALL

Eire Og, Ballinwillin, Cnoc Melleri, Stradbally and Ballinacourty. The two top teams will meet in a final and the ultimate winners will play the second string winners in the quarter final of the championship proper.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL (Second Strings)

There are 13 teams in this group and they have been divided into intermediate and senior section.

The intermediate section will consist of Brickeys, Ring, Clashmore, Shamrocks, Geraldines, Ardmore and Ballinameela.

The senior section will have Stradbally, Kilrossanty, Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, Nire and Affane. The winners of the respective sections will meet to decide which team will play the 'B' winners.

MINOR FOOTBALL

A total of 16 teams have entered and on an 18-8 vote it was decided to apply the same formula which worked so well last year.

This means that all sixteen teams will play in four sections with the minor 'A' teams being seeded (Dungarvan, Abbeyside, Ardmore and Clashmore). The winners of all four sections to form the 'A' championship (knockout). The runners-up in each section to constitute quarter finals of 'B' championship. In this 'B' championship the third team will play the fourth to constitute the quarter final of the section. There will be an open draw for the semifinals. The sixteen teams are Stradbally, Kilrossanty, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, Brickeys, An Gaeltacht, St. Olivers, Kilgobinet, Nire, Naomh Brid, Affane, Shamrocks, Ballyduff and Lismore.

MINOR HURLING

A total of 16 teams will play in the 'A' and 'B' minor hurling championships and as there were complaints about the proposed make-up, it was agreed to have the proposals sent back to the officer Board and the format will be presented to the next meeting.

UNDER-21 HURLING 'A'

Seven teams are entered and this championship will be played on a knockout basis as follows — Abbeyside a bye, Ballyduff v. Dungarvan, Fourmilewater v. Lismore, Tallow v. Colligan; In the semi-finals Abbeyside will play the winners of the Tallow/Colligan game and Ballyduff/Dungarvan will meet Fourmilewater/Lismore.

UNDER-21 HURLING 'B'

Seven teams also with the following draws — An Gaeltacht a bye, St. Olivers v. Cappoquin, Clashmore v. Ardmore, Stradbally v. Naomh Brid; In the semi-finals, team 1 will play 4 and team 2 will meet 3.

UNDER-21 FOOTBALL 'A'

Stradbally a bye, Ballinacourty v. Dungarvan, Nire v. An Gaeltacht, Kilrossanty v. Naomh Brid; In the semi-finals, Stradbally will meet Ballinacourty/Dungarvan and the Nire/Gaeltacht will meet Kilrossanty/Naomh Brid.

"torn away" by the floods. NATIONAL SCANDAL

Cllr. Jackie Fahey stressed that the neglect of county roads had now become a national scandal. Ireland he added, received huge sums of money from the E.U. in order to create incentives for people to remain in rural areas. Cllr. Fahey, however, felt that the most important incentive was to keep the roads alive.

He then asserted that it was impossible to walk along county roads as a result of overgrown hedges and mucky surfaces at it was likewise impossible to drive on them without damage to cars. The skeleton Council staff, he added are doing the best job they can under the circumstances but are unable to cope due to insufficient numbers.

Re-echoing his colleagues sentiments, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain declared that they had never seen the roads so bad in all his time as a public representative. "They are in an inexcusable state", he slammed, "because the dykes and the inlets are not being cleared".

BLAME IT ON THE RAIN

Portlaw Councillor Pat Coffey stated, however, that the inlets were open in his own area, and stressed that members would have to be reasonable with the Council in view of the unpreceded rain of late. "The council staff are doing their utmost ... and we're not in half as bad a position as other counties are in", he insisted.

able in the planning department", he stated adding that he was willing to meet with any concerned members.

While supporting the proposal that Councillors of the affected areas meet with Mr. Connolly, Cllr. Con Casey said there was general unease among all membership of the Council regarding the unknown medical risks of M.M.D.S.

"The rainfall is causing the problem, not what the Council is lacking", Cllr. Coffey concluded.

NEED MAJOR INVESTMENT

Sharing the members concern County Manager Donal Connolly said the county roads clearly need major investment. "We have neither the staff nor the resources", he reported while adding that a lot of the problems experienced were due to exceptional weather and flooding.

With regard to the recent severe flooding, County Engineer, John O'Flynn said such flooding would not occur again for an average of 50 years. He disclosed that the cost of clearing the county roads is estimated at between £400 to £1,000 per mile, and said the Council simply did not have enough manpower 'to go around'.

Boat Owner Rescued From Quay

A local boatowner narrowly escaped with his life from the freezing waters of the Dungarvan harbour last Saturday night (February 11th) when he was rescued by a courageous passerby. The incident occurred at 12.20 a.m. when the unfortunate man, who had been checking his boat, was rescued by Leonard Russell of Mapstown who had been on his way home when he heard the man moaning over the quay wall. He had no reported injuries.

SERIOUS DANGER

This narrow escape has done much to highlight the potential danger of certain parts of the quay area where lack of secure fencing can have very serious consequences.
