Robert Corbert Edwards of Lismore was reported missing by his father John during the voyage on the Stena Felicity between Rosslare and Fishguard, Wales.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am getting the Contributory Old Age Pension of £122 per week for myself and my wife. Apart from savings of approximately £9,000 we don't have any other income. As she is now 66, would she be better off with her own Non-Contributory Old Age Pension?

ANSWER

In the case of the non-contributory old age pension, half of your combined means would be assessed against your wife. The actual interest or income you get from your savings is ignored and instead a special formula is used to work out your weekly means. Capital of £9,000 would be assessed as follows in the case of a married

With weekly means of £8.90, your wife would be entitled to a Non-Contributory Old Age Pension of £57.00 per week. If your savings amounted to more than £16,375, there would probably be no advantage to her in transferring to her own Non-Contributory Pension. These figures generally change when the rate of pension increases.

Interest rates are on the way up again and most types of borrowing will be affected. For most people, the first pinch will be felt with an increase in the region of £15 -£60 per month in mortgage repayments. The purchase of a house represents the single largest financial commitment of our lives. It requires two, three or more times the average person's annual salary and the repayments make up a considerable part of the family budget. That said, borrowing to buy a house

usually makes good financial sense even when interest rates are relatively high. Assuming that you do not pay an inflated price for the house, there is little doubt that it makes more sense to borrow and buy rather than to rent — unless, of course, the rent is particularly low as it might be on a local authority house.

But there are traps along the way and a lot of critical decisions to take. At the Money Advice Service, we believe that it is vital to be realistic about your options. The repayments on the average new house will be in the region of £500 - £600 per month. This amounts to about £127 per week and can you afford that over a period of time? Most of the problems arise when people go in too deep, too soon. It is prudent to allow yourself a financial cushion so that when interest rates rise, you can meet the higher repayments. Drawing up a detailed family budget sheet and looking at your overall state of financial 'health' is an important part of the process.

Problems with mortgage repayments can occur all too easily. Loss of overtime or employment, marriage breakdown, some unforeseen large expenditure, can all lead to missed payments and arrears. Arrears can grow very quickly. While you may not want to face the problem, it is imwise you will put your home at risk. Take a hard look at your finances. Reduce your outgoings. Prioritise. Rent or mortgage should always be top of your list. If possible, increase your income. Contact the mortgage company or

our Money Advice Centre. Make any payment which you can each month. Don't stop paying completely because you can't afford the full amount. It is not a good idea to take out another loan to clear bad arrears. It increases your outgoings and just delays dealing with the problem. It is better not to let matters got to the court stage. The lender's legal costs will be added to your arrears and you may incur your own legal costs also.

For many people buying a house works out very well. For others, it becomes a nightmare. Our advice is: if there is a problem, it will not go away. Deal with it imme-



Get Your **Priorities** Right

Spring is in the air but wintry chills may still stop you polishing off your 'hit list' of essential tasks.

Priorities should include completion of all rose pruning by the end of March and especially all dead, blighted, frosted or deformed growth.

PRUNING

Cut spindly sections back to a healthy outward-facing bud before general pruning - HT varieties need a severe pruning of two-thirds of last season's growth, while floribundas and climbers need about half



Finish by raking rose fertiliser into the soil above the circle of roots and then mulching with pulverised bark or an equivalent to keep weeds down. Alternatively, plant alyssum, lavender or other attractive ground cover beneath the roses.

Keep the secateurs handy to tidy up most other garden shrubs as well.

The lawn should be fit for its first mowing of the year but check that the surface is frost-free and dry.

BALD PATCHES

Set blades at an inch above the ground to avoid creation of bald patches. A light rolling will help if you don't use a cylinder mower. Finish off by applying a proprietary lawn fertiliser.

Providing you were wise and did your winter digging early, beds should have been well broken up by winter wind, rain and frosts, leaving you to crumble and rake out remaining sods before warmer weather bakes them hard.

MANURE

However, if you have just taken over a garden or didn't get around to wielding a fork and spade, simply turn the top six inches of the soil and work in well-rotted compost or manure.

Support your weight on a plank as you work, thereby ensuring that this narrow band of turned soil stays as light and crumbly as possible for good drainage.

Collect weeds as you go and bin them rather than add to the compost heap, where the seeds can live to fight another day. From now on you need to rake and hoe beds to keep new weeds under control as the soil and climate warms.

DRAINAGE

When you start to sow seeds the rule of thumb is to keep them to a depth about three times the size of the seed although you may need to go deeper in sandy soil due to faster drainage.

Obviously, the reverse applies in sticky soils such as clay but it is a finer art than many realise. Too near the surface and the wind sucks away moisture; excessive depth stops air permeating through the grains of soil.

Melt-in-the-mouth treats

These are two melt-in-themouth pudding recipes to grace a festive table. Marshmallows have been used to give them an extra flavour.

FROSTY ALPINE DOME

Ingredients:

12 trifle sponges or 9 oz (250g) sponge cake 1 packet marshmallows 3 fl oz (100ml) milk 6 oz (150g) plain chocolate grated rind and juice of 2

1/4 pint (142ml) each double and single cream Method

Spir tritle sponges in nair to make thin pieces. Line a 21/2 (1.5 litre) pudding basin with the soft spongy side outside, filling in gaps with small pieces of sponge. Melt marshmallows in milk over gentle heat. Reserve 2 squares of chocolate; add remainder to melted marshmallows and stir until smooth. Stir in orange rind and juice. Whip half the amount of both creams together and fold into mixture. Pour a little into basin and arrange sponge layer on top. Repeat process, using all chocolate mixture and ending



with sponge. Cover with greaseproof paper and a plate to fit top of bowl. Press down with weights, refrigerate overnight.

Turn out, whip remaining cream and spread over pudding. Make reserved chocolate into curls and sprinkle over the top. Serves 6-8

APRICOT **CLOUDS**

Ingredients: 1 lemon 1 packet marshmallows 1/4 pint (142ml) double cream 2x5.3 oz (150g) apricot yoghurts 1 oz (25g) roasted nuts, chopped

Method

Grate half the lemon rind quite finely, Melt marshmallows in juice of the lemon over gentle heat. Cool. Whip cream, fold in yoghurt, half the nuts, lemon rind and melted marshmallows. Divide between six glasses, sprinkle tops with remaining nuts and chill before serving. Serves 6.

Ballyduff Residents Say No To Community Policing By Aisling Conroy

Residents of the West Waterford village of Ballyduff are currently up in arms over proposals for the introduction of a community policing programme in the Fermoy Garda District.

Already in existence in areas. East Cork for the past 2 years, the community policing scheme involves such changes in Garda operational procedures as the introduction of outside Garda mobile patrols to replace the traditionally local based Garda and has been greeted with strong criticism by public members.

STRONG **OBJECTIONS**

Voicing the concern expressed by the majority of Ballyduff residents is the Chairman of the local Community Council, Paddy Jim Feeney.

Mr. Feeney's main concern with Ballyduff's inclusion in the proposed community policing scheme is that outside Gardai may not receive the same level of co-operation as those locally based Garda who have gained the trust of the local community over the years. "Our area will be policed by Gardai who may not have a very good local knowledge of the area", said Mr. Feeney adding that this would mean "good local knowledge going to waste because of Gardai working in areas with people they don't even know". The Community Council Chairman stated that Council members are strongly opposed to the community policing proposals. "We do not want to see them introduced in our area", he declared.

A Ballyduff Community Council meeting will be held on March 20th at which the proposals will be discussed in depth.

Mr. Feeney said he hoped to meet with Garda representatives at some point to get feedback on the situation. Two patrol cars have already been transferred from Fermoy and Mr. Feeney reported that the planned scheme has been put on hold' for a short time. "Now's the opportune time to put in our objec-

tions", he added. TRUSTED AND RESPECTED

The letter came in reply to fears voiced by Council members about the closure of rural Garda stations and policing in rural areas and states that the scheme was designed to allow Gardai spend more time on active operational duties in their Districts including in particular, visits to the elderly. "No longer do we have Garda Stations open all hours with no personal callers. No longer do we have a Garda sitting at a desk shuffling paperwork and answering the occasional telephone call. Instead, we have stations open at set times to transact such administrative business as is necessary, based on detailed assessments of the administrative workload. For the rest of the time the Gardai, who would otherwise be tied to desks, are engaged in active and operational duties in the community, moving around in that community and getting to know all the people they serve. The allocation of 24 clerical assistants, 17 Sergeants and 55 Gardai to the scheme, as well as microcomputers and vannettes together with a reduction in record keeping in smaller Garda stations, has increased the time available to Gardai for outdoor contract with the communities in the Districts in which the scheme is operation. The scheme has been best summarised as "technology in the Office and Gardai on the beat.



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
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RECENT DEATHS

Opposition Mounts As Clam Project Application Accepted

were lodged with the Department of the Marine for clam cultivation projects on the Northshore of Dungarvan harbour — the area within the triangle Ballinacourty, Barnawee and Abbeyside Church.

"As the area has been declared a Special Protection Area for wildbirds, the National Park and Wildlife Service of the Office of Public Works was one of the many objectors to the proposals and they recommended that the Northshore of the harbour be maintained as an aquaculture free zone.

"Recently the NPWS announced that they would have no objection to one single 25 HA clam farm in the area. The Department of the Marine has written to all the applicants save Waterford Clams Ltd. to say that their applications for licences will not be considered. The DoM is presently processing the Waterford Clams Ltd. application."

The main points in the Association's itinerary of objections include that the beach area involved in the proposal is a public beach presently in public use as an amenity area. The area is bounding the Abbeyside shore of the town, an established residential area with a large populated residential area population which regularly uses the beach for recreational purposes. According to the association, Abbeyside beach "is an area of immense amenity value to the residents of and visitors to Dungarvan town. It is already in use for the following leisure activities, Board Sailing, Dinghy Sailing, Sea Angling, Bird Watching and Swimming... it is used all year round by many who wish to walk in solitude in the pleasant atmosphere found by the seashore".

The statement concludes, "aquaculture developments on the scale proposed would destroy the character and attractiveness of the beach and must not be al-

August that he was opposed to the granting of a licence due to the following considerations:

- The fact that Dungaryan harbour and the Northern Shore is a very important tourist centre with hotels, caravan parks and B & B's around the harbour area.

- The following tourist and Amenity activities are established and developing in the area:- Board Sailing, Sport Sailing, Game Fishing, Sea Angling (including Shore Angling.)

- The beach facilities along the Northern shore of the Harbour provide a very important amenity facility for both the local population and the tourists.

- Dungarvan Bay is one of a number of sites that have been designated by the Office of Public Works as

Special Protection Areas for Wild Birds in accordance with an E.C. Council Directive.

In addition, Mr. Connolly points out in the October report that vehicular access to the area is limited. However, Mr. Connolly had also indicated that should a suitable area be identified for clam cultivation which would not interfere with the other beneficial uses in the area, he would then be prepared to consider such a proposal.

NEED FOR "REAL" JOBS

Welcoming the Manager's strategy of awaiting the advertisement and letting the public make it's case Cllr. Billy Kyne spoke of the need for the creation of 'real' jobs. The concerned Councillor claimed that 'at

best' the jobs created by a new clam cultivation project would be part-time. "I'm delighted for any job that's created", said Cllr. Kyne, "but we have to see the hourly rates of pay, protection from the weather, a P60 at the end of the year, pension fund" etc. These ingredients and more he claimed, make up real jobs. "There's a high number of jobs being created in the county with a FAS ingredient in them .. it's time developers created real jobs. Cllr. Kyne further declared that the exploitation of some part-time and seasonal workers in the state was getting higher by the year. Referring to what he described as the 'secrecy' of the developers, Cllr. Kyne further stated that the name and addresses of the investors should be made known.

PIECE OF CO. WATERFORD

Strongly opposed to the Waterford Clam Ltd's proposals, Cllr. Austin Flynn described the operation as 'semi-anonmyous'. "They haven't come clean on who they are", he stated, adding that the issue of a foreshore licence to the developers would remove the right of the public to walk, fish or swim in the clam growing area. "They'd have a piece of Co Waterford that belongs to the public", he declared.

1,900 IN FAVOUR In support of the clam growing application, Cllr. Tony Wright said in his view, the concern voiced by Cllrs. Kyne and Flynn were 'not real'. Clam growing trials, he said have been going on in the harbour for the past five years with the Dept's cooperation. "I can't see that the development would interfere with anyone", said Cllr. Wright who then pointed to the 1,900 signatures in favour of the clam cultivation project. "While the move from the Dept. to process the application has

Any objections lodged by other harbour users on local residents will of course be rigorously assessed and taken into account prior to any decisions on the licensing of the project. The observations of the Office of Public works which designated the SPA in the harbour will also be taken on board by the Dept. of the Marine. In the words of Mr. Connolly, the proposal will have to be examined and judged by its merits.

Early Morning Disturbance In Grattan Square

Three local men appeared at Dungarvan District Court last week on a series of separate charges resulting from a disturbance outside Genoa's chip shop in Grattan Square in the early hours of September 3rd last.

Stephen Duggan, 37, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to using abusive and threatening language, being drunk and disorderly and obstructing Garda Tony Deegan in the execution of his duty.

Philip Duggan also of 37, Childers Estate, pleaded guilty to the charge of being drunk and disorderly, assaulting Detective Garda Michael Lacey, and threatening behaviour.

The third defendant, Cyril Barry, 73, Springfield, Dungarvan pleaded guilty to a charge of threatening be-haviour and of being drunk and disorderly.

Outlining the facts of the case, Det. Garda Lacey said that at 2.50 a.m. on the date in question, Stephen Duggan was in custody outside the chip shop where a number of Gardaí were present. He was benaving sively and violently" and his brother Philip Duggan and a colleague Cyril Barry were trying to calm him down. The Det. Garda however said both defendants were more of a hindrance to the Gardaí. They both got involved in the disturbance and were subsequently restrained. The assault on Det. Garda Lacey by 20 year old Philip Duggan occurred when the defendant caught the Garda member by the

coat and pushed him away.
TRIED TO HANG HIMSELF The court heard that folold Stephen Duggan was put in a cell in Dungarvan Garda Station where he tried to commit suicide. He cut his wrists with a watch and tried to hang himself with the cord of his tracksuit. Had he not luckily been observed by a garda, Det. Garda Lacey said Duggan would possibly have died. He was immediately taken to hospital.

3 MONTH SENTENCE For the charge of obstructing Garda Deegan in the course of his duty, Judge Uinsinn Mac Gruairc sentenced Stephen Duggan to 3 months imprisonment.

The defendant, who has a long list of previous convictions was sendenced to 2 months imprisonment for the charge of using abusive and threatening language and for the third charge of being drunk and disorderly, Duggan was sentenced to 1 month's imprisonment. All sentences are to run concur-£60 FINE

Judge Mac Gruairc imposed a fine of £50 on Philip Duggan for the charge of assaulting Garda Lacey, while for the charge of being drunk and disorderly, Duggan was fined £10. The charge of threatening behaviour was taken into account.

Soroptimists Take Care Of

Quiet heroines and a few unsung heroes, who look after the sick and needy around the country, were celebrated in Killarney, Co. Kerry, at the weekend. Up to 180 people, who devote practically all of their time to others but who rarely get a break themselves, were guests of the Soroptimists in the Gleneagle Hotel.

Some had never stayed away from home before, while one woman, the mother of a handicapped son, was enjoying her first hotel break in 47 years. Another woman has to give round the clock attention to a child who cannot sleep.

Amongst the speakers at the "Caring for the Carers" weekend was well known broadcaster Monica Carr, who strongly urged that the vital work of carers be properly recognised.

"When siblings and other relatives visit a house they expect to be waited upon by the very person who already has too much to do in looking after someone else. There's nothing as hurtful as being taken for granted."

National President of Soroptimist International, Mrs Eileen Herlihy called for an easing of the regulations governing the carers's allowance of £61 per week so that more carers could qualify for it.

She said that, at present, only 5% of carers are getting the allowance, but many more people were entitled to it.

"When one considers that it costs up to £500 per week to keep a person in a institution, people who care for relatives in their homes are saving the State a huge amount of money - up to £50m per year, according to our estimates," Mrs. Herlihy, from Wexford stated.

The Killarney Soroptimist President said that carers needed more support from the community. Back-up was required and people should be trained to become voluntary carers. She said that 11 people in Killarney were being trained as proxy carers, like home helps, and similar action could be taken around the country.

First prize in the Benylin Voluntary Carers Awards for 1995 went to Dick Trappe, of John's Road, Wexford, in recognition of his work for the St. Vincent de Paul Society during the past 38 years.

Second Prize went to Mrs. Joan Whelan, Dungarvan in recognition of her dedicated work and kindness in the locality. Congratulations Joan.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

AREA AID APPLICATIONS

Area Aid Application forms have been posted to tillage farmers who submitted applications for arable aid last year. If you have not received one, enquire immediately from the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry or your Teagasc Office. Accurate filling of these applications is vital, because without the area aid payments, cereal production is totally uneconomic.

The combined area aid application form should be completed only by farmers who are growing cereals, maize, oilseed rape, linseed, or protein crops. The deadline for submission of this (the combined) form is 31st March 1995.

If you have grass and root crops only, you should complete the simplified form. The deadline for submission of this form is 28th April 1995.

Any farmer who is seeking help with this years form should make an appointment with his Teagasc Adviser immediately. FEEDING WHOLE MILK TO CALVES

Joe Sheehy, Teagasc Dairying Specialist at Moorepark has issued the following guidelines for feeding large quantities of whole milk to calves:

★ Milk consumption will be highest from ad lib feeders which heat the milk.

★ Cooled milk can also be fed ad lib through a teat from containers or from troughs two or three times daily. ★ It is best to use cooled milk from the bulk tank. It will keep

fresh longer and be easier to mix with additives ★ Consumption will reach over 3 gallons per day at 4 weeks

with heated ad lib system. ★ If feeding over a prolonged period a good additive con-

taining an acidifier, vitamins, minerals, and growth promoters should be used. ★ Calves should be fed beestings from a nipple bucket for

the usual period. ★ When they are about a week old and drinking well, they can

be put in small groups and fed from one nipple of a feeder. * When they are used to the feeder they can be transferred to larger groups.

★ Groups of 15 are ideal but in well ventilated calf sheds groups of 30 - 40 calves can be reared satisfactorily. ★ Automatic feeders should be cleared every day.

★ Calves should be closely inspected several times daily. ★ Due to large intake of liquid feed, houses should have very good drainage and ventilation. Calves need a dry, warm lying area.

★ Calves should be weaned gradually, should be grouped together and milk restricted for 7 to 10 days to encourage concentrate intake.

★ This can be done by abruptly changing from hot to cold milk, diluting the milk with water and limiting access to the

* Successful weaning depends on calves having an average intake of 1 kgs. concentrates daily in the 3 days before

★ Weaned calves have their rumens develop and cannot drink large quantities of milk without the risk of digestive up-

CALF RATIONS

The quality of rations fed to young calves is most important. The following are important criteria to watch out for:-The ration should be palatable to encourage the young

calf to eat sufficient of it. It should contain 17 to 18% of good quality crude protein e.g. Soya Bean.

It should have an adequate amount of energy i.e. not less

than 12 MJ/Kg dry matter e.g. barley, pulp, oats. It should be balanced for minerals and vitamins. The physical form of the ration is very important.

Dr. Richie Fallon, Teagasc, Grange, recommends that it should be coarsely flaked rather than finely ground. This reduces the dustiness of the ration which tends to reduce palatability and dusty rations may also increase respiratory problems.

Always provide the calf with a daily supply of good quality hay. Poor quality or mouldy hay should never be fed to calves. Good quality silage can replace hay but it is not as

convenient as soils more easily. A constant supply of clean fresh water is essential.

CLEAN LAMBING CONDITIONS

In addition to good nutrition, clean conditions for lambing are essential to reduce the risk of infections. In the case of flocks that are housed for lambing, the ewes are usually penned in groups of 20 to 40 per pen and stocked at 15 sq. ft. of floor space per ewe. The pens should be bedded daily with fresh straw during lambing to reduce the build up of infections. Dirty pens are common cause of disease outbreak. Slatted floors are also used but they are now going out of favour as they tend to be draughty, sometimes dirty and if worn, the legs of small lambs can be trapped in the floor spaces. Again, good supervision is needed. **EWE ABORTIONS**

A ewe may abort as a result of an injury, twin lamb disease or infection. If more than 1 - 2 ewes abort, a pattern quickly emerges and the abortions should be regarded as infections. Isolate aborted ewes until a diagnosis is made. If there is an infection nothing else can be done because the infection is already established.

The most common infections are Toxoplasma, Salmonella, and Listeria and some flocks can be severely hit with one or other of these outbreaks. Toxoplasma is not infectious from sheep to sheep and ewes are immune to the condition afterwards. Listeria is generally fatal. Seek veterinary advice/diagnosis so that the cause of the outbreak is identified and hence, the advice given is based on factual evidence.





Opposing the recommendation, Cllr. Damien Dillon said Dungarvan was unique in it's provision of a free 1/2 hour to motorists. "We should advertise the fact", he added claiming that the 1/2 hour was an attractive incentive for visitors to come to the town.

however, said the present situation is "ludicrous". "If we're serious about commercialising our car parking system we have to do away with the free 1/2 hour" he submitted. Sharing Cllr. Wright's view, Cllr. Austin Deasy said that although it was unpopular to advocate stronger measures, the council was losing money on the present car parking system and it was now time to get 'the books right'. "We'll be loss makers forever if we go softly, softly on this ", he warned. The cost of operating the Council carparks in 1994 was £51,000 while receipts amounted to only £43,000. As for the current on-street scenario, Mr. Connolly felt that many people abused the 1/2 hour free parking concession. "It's non-effective', he said "we really can't police it"

ALTERNATIVE PARKING AREAS

Mr. Connolly's final recommendation was for the provision of alternative free parking for long term parkers - such as local workers etc. "I will continue my efforts to locate a suitable site for a car park for this purpose", he stated while admitting that land for a car park in the O'Connell Street area was proving very difficult to obtain. The provision of a car park in this area would allow for on-street parking to be removed from the kerbside in the vicinity of the bottleneck at Ben O'Neill's thereby assisting the flow of traffic

"There has to be some area where employees can park in town without paying", he added. Replying to a query raised by Cllr. Deasy as to the construction of a multistorey car park at Scanlon's Yard, Mr. Connolly said an interested developer had approached the Council 2 months ago, "It all boils down to economics the cost, and the return he'd get",

said Mr. Connolly.
MORE TO COME Having dealt mainly with

the issue of local car parking, the Council will next

focus its attention on traffic management with the introduction of one way streets and roundabouts etc. Mr. Connolly and the Council engineering staff will prepare a detailed programme of costing and the exact locations of each proposed change in the traffic management plan which the members will finally discuss at a later meeting.

Meanwhile, the changes proposed last Monday for off-street and on-street parking will require amendments to both the car park bye-laws and the Waterford traffic and parking bye-laws prior to their introduction. An application will now be made to the Garda Commissioner to amend the byelaws for on-street parking.







A LOOK AT THE COURSE



The ninth would be a very straight-forward hole, but for the green. The tee-shot is straight, and slightly uphill, to a generous fairway. The big hitters can reach water on the left side of the hole, but this is not a problem for most players, at least not on their first shot.

The real trouble on this hole, usually starts when the player tries to get the ball on the green. The shape of the green means that the line is from the left side, but the water on that side frightens players away to the centre, or the right side of the fairway. Now the player faces a well nigh impossible shot, to get the ball to stay on the green. The bunker in front catches anything short, while the ball clearing the bunker will surely run through, and away down the slopes be-

Once the player finally gets on the carpet, finishing out should be easy enough. The biggest problem now, is passing the clubhouse.

WRONG BALL

A player must hole out with the ball played from the teeing ground, unless a rule permits the substitution of another ball.

MATCH PLAY

If a player plays a wrong ball, except in a hazard, then the player loses the hole.

If a player plays a stroke in a hazard, with a wrong ball, there is no penalty. Strokes played with a wrong ball in a hazard, do not count in the players score. If the ball, wrongly played, belongs to another player, it shall be replaced, as near as possible to the same spot.

STROKE PLAY

If a player plays a stroke, or strokes, with a wrong ball, a penalty of two strokes is incurred, unless the only strokes with the wrong ball, were played when the ball was lying in a hazard, in which case no penalty is incurred.

The competitor must correct the mistake by playing the correct ball. If the mistake is not corrected before playing from the next tee, or in the case of the last hole, before leaving the green, the player shall be disqualified.

Strokes played with a wrong ball, do not count in the players score.

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Jobs Future Uncertain As Cyplas Plant In Liquidation

The future now looks uncertain for the 25 workers of the Cappoquin based company Cyplas International Ltd. which went into voluntary liquidation last Thursday, following an almost 3 week fight for survival.

The company which produced a range of car weather shields for export to France, Belgium, Holland and England, was temporarily closed in mid-February following the cancellation of a substantial order by one of its main European customers. Cyplas had been finding trading conditions difficult over the last few years and the temporary shut down was seen as a move to avoid liquidation. Unfortunately the closure has now proved a permanent situation and though not wholly unexpected, the news has been greeted with dismay throughout the West Waterford town.

NOT THE END OF THE ROAD

Managing Director and company owner, John Stephenson, of Abbeyside confirmed workers fears last week when he announced the closure of the plant and the appointment of a liquidator. Most of the workers are members of the SIPTU union and negotiations are set to get underway this week with Mr. Stephenson on the issue of redundancy payments. Some of the workers have been with the company since it was established on the I.D.A. owned industrial estate 16 years ago. Talks still continue between Forbairt and an interested party and South East Regional Director, Colm Hackett remains hopeful that the plant can be taken over with some of the jobs retained. "It's regrettable that the company has gone into voluntary liquidation but it's not the end of the road by any means", he said. While nothing is certain, Mr Hackett said there's a chance the iobs will be saved and he was hopeful that something screens and bin covers is in can be rescued from the situ-

MAJOR SETBACK

A native of Cappoquin, Waterford County Councillor Nora Flynn said the closure of the plant and the subsequent loss of 25 jobs comes as a major setback to a small community like Cappoquin. "For the last 15 years Cyplas has given very gainful employment in the cover".

At last Monday's Waterford Co. Council meeting Cllr. Flynn called on Forbairt the Co. Enterprise Board and the I.D.A. to combine forces in an effort to secure a replacement industry. Urging that everything possible be done at all levels to replace Cyplas, the Cappoquin Councillor then pointed to the available modern factory building (6,000 sq ft) coupled with an extremely skilled local workforce - an ideal existing base for any company interested in starting up immediately. "We can't leave it idle", she insisted.

Co. Manager, Donal Connolly said he was confident something can be resued from the liquidation. Meanwhile a meeting of the Cyplas creditors has been convened for Jury's Hotel, Waterford next Tuesday,
