

Question: Why are life assurance policies not always worth what you have paid into them?

Answer: The problem here is that for years these policies were sold as multi-functional products, meant they would provide life cover, savings, disability cover, etc. The cost of maintaining these benefits however, escalates as you get older. Therefore less of your premium goes into savings. This would explain why the cash surrender values could be less than the premium paid.

It is normal practice today to have a special plan to do a specific job, for example, protection plan for life cover, investment plan for savings, illness plan for sickness benefit, and so on. At least then you know where all your premiums are going.

If you have a plan that falls into the above category you may need to have it reviewed by the Irish Permanent's Life and Pensions Consultant.

It's A Time To Establish The Climbers

Container-grown plants may make all-year-round planting a reality but May is still favoured for starting climbers. It gives such plants a good chance to establish themselves and make the most of your garden.



You might want climbers

for decorating walls, fences, trellises and pergolas or less glamorous jobs such as hiding old tree stumps or run-down sheds.

Climbers such as ivy and Virginia Creeper don't even need help with clinging to surfaces, but others may need assistance such as fixing nails and wire, trellis or green netting.

Some are also fussy about site - the less hardy prefer to face south while the tougher can stand a northern outlook.

Once this is settled, prepare the location carefully because the plant could be there many years and be quite expensive to buy.

Dauble-dig (the depth of two spades) to break up the subsoil and aerate the top soil before conditionimpwith well-rotted compost.

Milital to plant? Good garden centres and nurseries will have advice labels on each specimen, but here are some worth considering:

- Ivy It can cling to most surfaces and withstand northern chill and shade, though the attractive variegated types need more light. It also grows quickly if you need fast results, but established plants need ruthless pruning in May and June.
- Clematis A favourite due to delicate flowers and dainty tendrils, enabling it to dling to wood or wire trellises. The plant is available with blooms of various sizes and colours and it thrives in most soils, but roots must be shaded and moist, while top growth basks in sunlight. Mulch or lay old roof tiles over the soil to retain as much water as possible.
- Hydrangea Specifically Hydrangea Petiolaris can cling and thrive even on a north wall. It needs pruning in spring and produces bright green leaves as well as delicate white flowers.
- Roses No shortage of climbing varieties and they look superb decorating walls, fences or pergolas, but keep an eye out for pests and dis-
- Wisteria A real favourite with its beautiful mauve flowers. It needs a sunny and fertile location but requires little pruning.
- Virginia Creeper A strong climber with attractive green leaves which turn rich red in autumn.
- Nasturtium Simply plant the seeds and stand back! Fast results, but the soil must be thin if you want blooms rather than a glut of greenery.
- Russian Vine Handle with care! It can cover eyesores with dense foliage and creamy flowers at the rate of 15 feet a year, but must be pruned ruthlessly in spring.

How To Soup Up The Pie

A tasty sauce made with condensed soup and the addition of tiny forcemeat balls make our chicken pie extra nourishing, and really delicious.

Ingredients:

For 2: 2 chicken joints 1/2 can condensed pea and ham soup 14 oz (400g) packed puff pastry 1 egg, beaten

6 oz (175g) sausage meat 3 oz (75g) fresh white breadcrumbs 1 tsp mixed herbs salt and ground black pepper pinch ground nutmeg

Method

Cool chicken in roasting bag at 400°F, 220°C, gas mark 6 for 45 minutes to 1 hour. When cool, cut flesh into bite-sized pieces. Place in pie dish. Mix soup with equal amounts of water and add.



Mix ingredients for forcemeat balls. Roll into walnut-sized balls. Put a few in dish with chicken. Place remainder on baking sheet lined with baking parchment and put in oven during last 15 mins of cooking time for pie. Roll pastry 1 inch larger than dish. Trim off a strip and press onto moistened edge of pie dish. Moisten pastry edge, cover with pastry dish and press down well. Flute edges and cut steam vent in centre. Decorate with pastry leaves. Glaze with beaten

Stand dish on baking tray and cook at 425°F, 220°C, gas mark 7 for about 40 minutes, until pastry is golden and well risen.

1916 REMEMBERED ON A PEACEFUL SUNDAY

On a dry, cold, Easter Sunday evening in Dualla outside Cashel the 1916 Rising was remembered. A large attendance listened attentively to the thought provoking and inspiring oration delivered by Thomas Barrett Secretary of the Tipperary county Board G.A.A. As usual the traditional format of the ceremonies with a short parade, a decade of the Rosary in Irish recited by Rory McCan, followed by the oration and The National Anthem sung on this occasion by Michael O'Donnell, Borrisleagh, a native of Dualla whose grandfather taught the Dualla company of the volunteers drill and other military disciplines in 1914. Thomas Barrett in his address' recalled the events that led to the 1916 rising and the war of Independence. How Sean Treacy was in the Barrett home in Crohane on the night before he led the attack on Drangan Barracks and reminded those present how the men they were commemorating met their deaths at the hands of the British Authorities, then in control of all of Ireland. Referring to the present and the future he said "that some people measure progress only in economic terms, but the spectrum of Irish life is much wider and more involved. It is the first time in 25 years that we have peace at Easter in this country". He hoped that the future would consolidate peace and lead us on quickly to our land being a Nation once again. Another year has passed on and still the memory of Pierce McCan, Bill Delaney, Paddy Hogan, James and Larry Looby (brother), (the Looby brothers were brothers of Mr John Looby Creamery Manager, Knockmeal Co-op Creamery Ballinamult who passed to his eternal on 28th May 1959 and is interred in Dualla) lives on. LATE MRS CATHERINE BURKE



UDC To Carry Ou Retail Study

As a result of the recent objection by the Retail Grocery, Dairy, and Allied Trade Association (RG DATA), to the proposed multi-million pound retail/residential project at Main Street, the Urban Council is now carrying out a detailed study into the Dungarvan retail trade.

ager Donal Connolly, the study will enable officials to adequately answer a number of points raised in the objection which was lodged with the Council in the name of Dublin based architect and town planner Fergal Mc-

Council meeting, Mr. Connolly said he was not aware of any local support for the objection.

The time frame for the Council's final decision on what would be the town's maiden shopping emporium has been extended to May 31st while the UDC's planning section together with town planner John Reid continue their correspondence with the potential developers - the Irish Nationwide Building Society, and the objectors - RG DATA.

THE PROPOSAL The application, which

According to County Man- was lodged by local architect Muiris O Criostóir in association with Edmund Fitzgerald Selby on behalf of the INBS, is certainly a first for Dungarvan.

It relates to the semiderelict former Mulcahy and Ducey premises which have lain idle for the best part of Speaking at last week's ten years and seeks to provide 11 retail outlets including one major supermarket, together with 13 residential

Lined along each side of the proposed pedestrian street, (which would provide the only direct access from Main Street to Scanlon's Yard car park), would be retail units and upstairs apartments. The entire proposed development covers over 1/2 acre of the town and would blend in perfectly with the existing town style.

THE OBJECTION Meanwhile, the objectors maintain that the project, by

virtue of it's scale, would

have an adverse impact on existing established retail outlets in the town. These local retail outlets, the objection says, are presently adequately serving Dungarvan and its hinterland in terms of both quality and convenience. Indeed, Mr. McCabe envisages the proposed project as a threat to existing shopping outlets.

The loss of public parking spaces in the vicinity of the pedestrianised project and consequential traffic problems also figure in the 5 page objection as does the 'adverse' effects of such a mall on both urban conservation and the character and particular townscape of Main Street.

Another point of the RG DATA objection is that the 21,500 sq. ft. development would represent a 20% increase in the number of local retail outlets which, according to Mr. McCabe was not allowed for in the Dungarvan Town Development Plan.

EXISTING RETAIL STUDY

The proposed development has already been given an unreserved welcome by

President of Dungarvan terford, every other item Chamber of Commerce, John Walsh who told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that in a survey into the local retail trade, already carried out by the Chamber in 1992/'93, findings showed that visiting shoppers perceived the service in Dungarvan to be generally good.

Mr. Walsh said a group of Post Leaving Cert. students from Dungarvan Technical College distributed the Chamber's questionnaires throughout the town and selected satellite villages such as Lismore, Ardmore, Leamybrien, Bonmahon etc. The questions were structured to establish the strong and weak points of shopping in Dungarvan, and getting public feedback on the parking facilities, the general service, toilet facilities etc.

CHEAPER LOCALLY Another aspect of the survey was the comparison in prices between groceries in Dungarvan versus supermarket prices in Clonmel and Waterford. Based on a £50 grocery shopping list, the Chamber wanted to establish whether it was worthwhile travelling outside of Dungarvan for 'value for money' items.

The findings revealed that what a shopper would save on several marked down prices in Clonmel and Wawould be sold at a higher price to virtually cancel out any savings made.

The survey proved that it was cheaper to buy locally", said Mr. Walsh, adding that the findings also revealed that Dungarvan was well serviced from a grocery point of view.

CHAINSTORE NEEDED

The survey also revealed that shoppers found parking spaces in the town to be insufficient. With regard to price, 62% said Dungarvan was the same when compared to other towns.

56% of those surveyed said the types of shops lacking in Dungarvan are large chain stores, e.g. Dunnes/Penny's. Incidentally, when asked what improvements people would like to see in Dungarvan, 9% mentioned derelict buildings and the former Mulcahy's premises.

Although the Chamber's survey is now 2 years old, the findings may not differ substantially from those of the study currently being carried out by the UDC. Another month remains before the Council's final decision on the planning application - in the end however, it could be a matter for An Bord Pleanála.

These included: pair rowing, mixed doubles rowing, sculling, 4 h.p. power race and seamanship. Seven boats took part in this first ever "Rankin Worlds" championship.

Ardmore Enterprise Group sponsored the principal prizes. They were rewarded by additional visitors to Ardmore for the two days. Cliff Hotel and Ardmore Pottery also kindly provided prizes.

GRAZING MANAGEMENT

The single most important factor affecting grass utilisation throughout the year is stocking rate, although ground conditions may determine it on a day to day basis. Utilisation has to be a compromise between what is good for the sward in the long term, while achieving good daily intakes per animal. The tighter you graze, the lower the intake per cow. A realisitic post-grazing stubble height is 6 cm. (the height of your wellington). Milk yield depression is only minimal (10 gallons) over April/May when pastures are grazed to 6 cm. compared to 8 cm. The more lax grazing pressure (8 cm.) gives a very poor quality sward in July, lower growth rate and reduced milk yields of 160 gallons per

Cows are also better able to handle tight grazing earlier in the season because-

- Grass quality is very high at 80% DMD.
- Pastures are not soiled.
- Cows in early lactation are better able to buffer the effects.
- Pastures have a more upright growth

Research at Moore Park has shown that increasing grazing pressure from 8 cm. down to 4 cm, can lengthen the calving to conception period by up to 10 days. This represents a loss of about £36/cow. When grass is in short supply be prepared to supplement in the short term with a few pounds of meal.

This research reinforces the recommendation that grazing to 6 cm. in April/May is a good balance between intake, milk yield, reproductive performance and the long term quality of the sward.

SILAGE GROUND

Silage requirements will normally range from 6 to 9 tonnes/cow depending on the winter housing period and milk production

When pastures were not grazed prior to closing, high silage can be obtained in mid to late May. A heavy crop of 14 tonnes/acre can be 12 to 20% cheaper per tonne dry matter to make than subsequent cuts and is easier to preserve. Grazing the silage ground lightly in late winter or early spring will improve silage quality by a few percentage points but first cut yields will be reduced. It is essential to have all stock removed by early April at the latest if acceptable yields are to be obtained by late May. A one week delay in cutting date towards the end of May will compensate for grazing prior to April 1.

DOCK CONTROL IN **GRASSLAND**

At farm level, dock herbicides have not been wholly satisfactory. Generally speak-

ing, it has been found that where a dock stand has been particularly heavy, re-infestation can occur. In such a case, a second application is necessary to obtain acceptable control.

Dock herbicides differ from each other in their effect on clover and grass. Auslox and Prospect do not affect clover. whereas the others do, as they contain Dicamba or CMPP or some such chemical. However, Asulox and Prospect may affect the sward, depending on the weather and grass varieties present.

CONTROL

Where clover is important, Asulox or Prospect should be applied eight to ten days before cutting for silage. Applications two to three weeks after cutting is even better as the docks have less protective cover and any adverse effect on the sward is minimised. A field closed off for hay should not be sprayed until two to three weeks after cutting.

The Dicaba/CMPP type formulations do not generally affect the composition of the sward but do kill clover. They do, however, have a broad spectrum of weed control in addition to docks. Therefore, when selecting a herbicide for use in dock infested pasture, the pros and cons of the various formulations available, must be carefully considered.

Cereals — Pest Control

Leatherjackets and aphids are the greatest threat to spring cereals. While slug populations are high, the risk of crop damage is low when growth rates are rapid.

LEATHERJACKETS

This grub is the larva of the Cranefly and could be a problem in the coming weeks if growth rates are below normal. They attack the young plants and cut off leaves and stems just below or at the surface of the soil. Leatherjackets are easily controlled by spraying with Dursban or Gamma-col at 1 pint/acre

APHIDS

Aphids migrating on to late sown crops may transmit Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus. Spring cereals are at high risk and should be checked for aphids on warm calm evenings. If aphids are present, spray with a contact insecticide and apply follow up applications two weeks

WIREWORMS

This pest may be a problem after lea or in second lea, but it is not a major problem in intensive tillage. Linstane (Gamma BHC/HCH) used as a seed dressing gives the emerging plant adequate protection against wireworm.

Tallow

The Late John Hartigan -We all turned out on the Wednesday evening of Easter week for the removal of the remains of the late John Hartigan R.I.P., our townsman, our neighbour, our friend. Local clubs were well represented and the large attendance on Wednesday and again on Thursday for the internment included many (a dwindling number) who played with and against him like Mossy Morrissey, John's opponent in his last game for Tallow, and Jackie Green from Cappoquin.

Isn't it extraordinary how it takes death to focus our minds on life's realities and its eternal verities and to help us appreciate the true worth of the man we have lost. Words are inadequate to encompass John's long and fruitful life and to do justice to a stalwart son of Tallow whose life, though long in human terms, was cut short so suddenly and so tragically on Easter Monday evening

John was a quiet, self effacing man. I knew him well. In fact I knew him before ever I set eyes on Tallow over 45 years ago. I saw him play for Tallow and although Mick Curley, Sonny Curley, Pa and Bill Sheehan graced the same pitch with distinction my most vivid memories are of John in the No. 6 jersey bestriding the scene like a Colossus - strong, resolute, unyielding, dependable and stylishly economical. Behind that gentle calm demeanour lay an iron resolve and rack-like determination.

Distinguished hurler though he was and uncompromising back, John never paraded his virtues or sought acclaim but he won the admiration and respect of team mates, opponents and appreciators of all that is best in the game of hurling. He was a significant part of Tallow and our lives and by his death we are all, to a great or lesser extent diminished.

We know he loved hurling and Tallow and it was entirely fitting that the blue and gold of the club he served so loyally and generously should enfold his mortal remains. This, sadly, was to be the last occasion for him to carry the Tallow colours. The guard of honour of his club showed how highly he was esteemed by those to whom he bequeathed his ardent love for the game.

As a player John brought great honour to his club, and to his county as well when sharing in Waterford's great Junior All Ireland double of 1931 and 1934. But he served his club in a variety of ways over the years and shouldered the onerous burden of club secretary for a spell. At his death he was President of Tallow G.A.A.

John's passion for Ireland's premier field game took him to all the major fixtures - Tallow's games and inter-county games. Any venue within 150 miles radius of home suited fine - Cork, Thurles, Limerick, Kilkenny or

Croke Park. It always amazed me how keenly he awaited such trips and his youthful enthusiasm for travelling long distances - often on his own if necessary - to savour the atmosphere of the big day. The day before his death he made arrangements with his son Brendan to travel to Thurles for the league semi-finals. He was looking forward to a double feat of hurling on a pitch he loved, having played there often. But then he was always looking forward with anticipation, with hope, with confidence and with no little excitement. Now all his hopes and longings have been fulfilled. He has reached his goal, the most cherished venue of all, where his good wholesome Christian life received its rewards

He will be missed by all of us but mostly by his family, by his wife Eileen, sons John, Michael and Brendan, daughters Brigid and Margaret, by his sisters Eily and Madge and by all of his grandchildren of whom he was so proud and who were so dear

John's passing sunders another link with the past of glorious memory, an era when he carried the hurling torch for club and county before handing it on to others including his own three sons and their contemporaries, And if Tallow's rating is high in Waterford G.A.A. circles today it is because of John and men like him.

Saddened as we are by his death we are also proud, very proud, to have known him, proud of his achievements and proud to call him friend. Go dtuga Dia solas na Glóire agus radharc na Trionóide dá anam dílis.





FEILE SKILLS AND LONG PUCK

The Western final of the Féile Skills for Long Puck competitions will be held in Cappoquin on Sunday, May 21 at 11 a.m. sharp. Each club is requested to have one player only for each competition.

THE SKILLS

This week we feature the second skill to be tested in the skills competition lofting. Three sliothars are used. Numbers 1 and 3 sliothars are placed on 20m. line, 5 metres from centre line on each side of goalposts. Sliothar no. 2 is placed 3 metres out from 20m. line in centre of goalposts. Each sliothar must be struck from ground and lofted over the crossbar. Points — 4 points for each successful effort. Total 12 points.

LONG PUCK

Each contestant will get three sliothars to puck from set point. The sliothar to travel the longest distance will be measured.

FOR THE YOUNG , PLAYER

In our helpful hints for the young player this week we feature midfield play. Down through the years a certain charisma has built up around midfield players. Perhaps this comes about because play is tighter at midfield or has to pass through the midfield area and therefore the men who man this vital sector are seldom out of the match action. The position offers great scope to be creative in your play.

The main points to remember are-

(1) Do not hold play up in your midfield area; (2) Deliver the ball with speed and purpose; (3) Be prepared to receive the ball from your defence and move it on to your attack; (4) where possible deliver the ball low to your forwards; (5) Always be physically and mentally fit enough to cope with the demands of playing in the

midfield role; (6) develop your anticipation of play; (7) Develop your striking, catching, high fetching (football), passing skills; (8) Contest every ball that comes into your area; (9) Be prepared to defend or attack as may be necessary; (10) Keep your playing gear, i.e. boots, socks, togs, shin gear, gum shields, hurleys, helmets, gloves, etc., in good condition so that they are comfortable to wear or use.

Lest one should question what progress has been made, let us cast our minds back just a little to the drubbing given to us by Offaly in the opening game of the NHL and all the doom and gloom then predicted.

Who would have foreseen us contesting a league semi-final last October!

The roots of our demise against Clare lies in the necessity of having so many crucial clashes in the lead-up to the game. 
