

Detective Garda 'AIMS' For **Guinness Book Of Records**



Detective Garda Michael Carroll of Clonea, Dungarvan is taking on the challenge of circumnavigating Ireland in less than 30 hours. A former student of St. Augustine's College, Michael is stationed at Letterkenny, Co. Donegal and is an ex-member of the Garda Underwater Unit.

His solo effort will be made in an Irish made Rigid Hull Inflatable Boat (RIB) from Dungarvan to Dungarvan.

"I aim to launch from Dungarvan on 27th May and travel in a clockwise direction around the country, hoping to

complete the trip in less than 30 hours", said Michael. "The main objective of this is to raise money for the Friends of M.S., 65 Bushy Park Road, Dublin 6".

Deasy On Dail Representation In Waterford

The following is a copy of a submission made by Deputy Austin Deasy to the Dail constituency Commission last February. Deputy Deasy is delighted to see that the Commission has decided to leave Waterford City and County as a four seat Constituency.

Waterford County and City have a population of 91,642. Over 2,000 of these are included in the South Tipperary Constituency, in the area adjacent to Clonmel.

As both North and South Tipperary are both short of the lower recommended population of 20,000 persons per seat, there may be a temptation to transfer more of County Waterford's population into Tipperary, to compensate for the shortfall. I would be very opposed to this, on a number of grounds;

(a) The area to be transferred would most likely be the western end of the County, as was done from 1961 to 1977, embracing the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow. This would be a most unnatural geographical entity, as this part of County Waterford is separated from Tipperary by a mountain range, the Knockmealdowns, and in my opinion would seriously inhibit the economic development of the area.

(b) West and Central County Waterford is capable of electing one, and possibly

Without West Waterford the likelihood of having any Dail representation in the centre of the County is remote, as the population of Waterford City and Tramore Electoral Area together would constitute an overwhelming numerical majority. The chances of West Waterford electing a Dail representative for South Tipperary would be even less remote.

(c) Waterford County and City is closer to being a 5 seat Constituency rather than a 4 seater.

I note from the 1991 census figures that Kilkenny-Carlow, at 114,577 is well in excess of the lower recommended figure for 5 seats. South Kilkenny is part of the natural hinterland of Waterford City, and a transfer of 9,000 or 10,000 persons to Waterford would be the least upsetting course of action, if there are to be changes. In fact, for some years past Waterford Corporation have been seeking an extension of the City Boundary into Kilkenny, and presently some of it's new Local Authority Housing Schemes are situated in South Kilkenny.

Alternatively, instead of a transfer upwards from Waterford to Tipperary, a lateral transfer from Kilkenny to Tipperary, would solve Tip- new 5 seat Constituency perary's shortfall, and should would be the preferred not create any serious prob- course of action.



Also recognising that there is a problem in Tipperary, which may result in it's losing a Dail seat, you might consider transferring the town of Carrick on Suir and surrounding area into Waterford to form a 5 seater. There is no physical impediment involved.

Basically, the population of Waterford continues to rise, while Tipperary's population shows a marked decline. This is in line with trends where there are large urban centres vis a vis areas which are predominantly rural. Splitting the County in two, as was done previously, would affect the economic development of the County and seriously affect it's prospects of being directly represented in the Dail. Waterford's population is heading towards 100,000 and with the recommended upgrading of it's Regional Technical College to College of Technology status, the population will definitely increase further in the years ahead.

In my view the best option at present, would be to leave the Constituency unaltered, but if changes have to be made, then the creation of a



Oh, Hang It — And You'll Be Pleased

HANGING baskets may take time to prepare and settle but the long term rewards are great.

They can brighten the most confined spaces, such as the balcony of a flat or a tiny backyard.



Their drawback, of course, is that wind and sun can quickly dry them out, so the plants need checking and watering.

Fortunately, they repay this extra effort with displays, which can be quite versatile. For instance, you could plant up a basket to contain herbs such as sage, thyme, chives and parsley - or even grow strawberries in mid-air!

Choose sites which offer light but don't suffer from strong winds. Anchor the baskets well too - it will also be holding soil, water and plants.

use a masonry drill to make holes to take screws and Rawplugs of a decent length and buy brackets large enough to suspend baskets clear of the surface behind.

Large baskets are best because they dry out more slowly between watering. You may also want to consider alternatives to the traditional mesh basket lined with sphagnum moss.

This type of basket, now usually coated with plastic to prevent rust and deterioration, allows trailers to be poked through the moss.

But the moss can be hard to come by and expensive and does allow the basket to dry quickly for all of these reasons, many people now often use green or black plastic to line the basket.

Small cuts can be made in the plastic to accommodate trailers but many people prefer the traditional style and reduce water loss by hiding an old plate between the moss and the soil.

A half way house is a hardened peat fibre liner which looks natural and can be holed to take

Finally, there is the easy if less attractive option the plastic bowl with drip tray. Trailers have to cascade from the top, but these containers do retain water well and this may be crucial if you go

You can make filling and planting traditional baskets easier by resting them on a bucket or round bowl. Don't forget the plate or saucer on top of the moss or plastic to help retain water. Use quality compost because it must support a lot of plants and retain moisture.

Ease the roots of trailers in from underneath before adding compost and other plants.

The plant arrangement on top is logical — larger and bushier plants such as fuchsia and tuberous begonia in the centre, with lower types such as Busy Lizzie, pansy and lobelia at the edges.

But there is nothing to stop you planting all one variety - dwarf hasturtiums offer a cheap and cheerful riot of rambling colours.





The Clam Controversy

Dear Mr. Gilmore,

I write on behalf of the Dungarvan Unemployed Action Group in connection with the Application made by Waterford Clams Limited for a Licence to grow Clams in Dungarvan Bay.

We are familiar with the Project, the site area, the work involved and the principals in the Company. We are confident that this Project should be allowed to proceed as it will not interfere with other users of the Bay.

The Town of Dungarvan which has a population of 7,000 people has over 1,100 on the unemployment register. There are no advance factories or even talk of new industry coming into the town. In fact, all the rumours are about what jobs may be lost over the next twelve months. What are we as unemployed people to do? We desperately need jobs if we are to maintain our dignity and give our families a chance. There are over 2,000 schoolchildren in our four Secondary Schools and they will also be seeking work over the next five years. Where are all the jobs to come from?

Aquaculture has been identified as having great scope for creating jobs in Ireland in the future. We have the pure waters and the large coastline. The markets exist in Europe, so all produce can be exported. B.I.M. identified the north shore in Dungarvan Bay as being ideal for Aquaculture development. Dungarvan has an ideal chance to now develop a new industry which could create many jobs. On behalf of the unemployed people, we are therefore calling on you to ensure that this opportunity is not lost. We have suffered too much emigration and unemployment since this State was founded, let us now make jobs a priority. We are confident that there is room for jobs and all the other amenity users in Dungarvan Bay.

People often talk about developments not being allowed because the price would be too high. But they never pay the price. We, the unemployed, the people who have to emigrate to find work are the people who pay the price. We believe the time has come for our voices to be heard. We encourage all job creation endeavours. We call on you Minister to grant the necessary Licence to this project.

EXECUTIVE MEETING

The County Waterford Executive of ICMSA held a meeting in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan on Wednesday, May 3 last.

The main issues discussed were a report from a recent meeting with Waterford Foods, report from ICMSA National Council meeting, the milk restructuring scheme 1995/96 and TB problems.

The Executive expressed concern on milk price and called on Waterford Co-op to raise the price of milk for April as the returns can justify a substantial increase.

Concern was also expressed at the delay in compensation grants for TB reactors and the Executive are hopeful that this will improve under the new Charter of Rights for farmers which was launched recently.

The Executive are organising the Family Farm Environment, Conservation and Safety Award this year and work on this is in process at present.

FARM VIABILITY

Co. Waterford representatives on ICMSA National Council, Tom Hickey, Anne Kirwan and Johnny Dowley. this week outline the ICMSA policy on farm viability which was discussed at a recent Council meeting held in Limerick.

TAXATION AND LAND RESTRUCTURING

The central thrust of a land policy framework should be to increase the ability of small and medium scale farmers to compete with other land purchasers in an

open market situation, so as to bring about a more economically and socially acceptable land tenure system. The unrestricted income tax offset of all interest costs on borrowed capital, available to non-farmers and companies, to finance the purchase of agricultural land needs to be viewed and changed.

ICMSA is proposing that all repayments (capital and interest) on borrowings by full-time farmers for the purpose of the purchase and subsequent development of land to obtain a viable holding should be income tax deductible. Where no income tax liability occurs in any year the repayments should

be aggregated and carried forward to be offset against future income tax liabilities.

MILK QUOTAS

Expenditure on the acquisition of additional quota is not allowable as an expense for income tax purposes. ICMSA is proposing that expenditure on the purchase of milk quotas be allowed as a deductible expense for income tax purposes, under the following conditions:

1 — The quota was purchased through a Milk Restructuring Scheme approved by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry.

2 — The farmer continues to supply milk for at least 5 years following purchase of the quota.

3 — In the event of the farmer disposing of his milk quota within 5 years of purchase any tax relief obtained under the proposed provision would be clawed back.

SUCKLER COW AND **SHEEP QUOTAS**

Expenditure on the purchase of suckler cow or ewe quota in order to attain a viable level of production should be allowed as a deductible expense for income tax purposes. Where the farmer ceases to farm or sell his quota within a period of 5 years, any tax relief claimed could be clawed back.

EARLY RETIREMENT SCHEME

The ICMSA proposals

are-

The enlargement clause should not apply where the farm being transferred is viable. This would help to reduce the competition for land which should assist those who most need extra land to improve their

2 — The purchase of additional quota (milk, suckler cow or ewe quota) should be accepted as a means of improving the viability of the farm. Confining transferees to the purchase of additional land to improve viability is too restrictive.

In certain situations the burden of funding the purchase of land could lead to a disimprovement in income rather than a benefit. In many cases, inadequate quota and not inadequate farm size is the biggest cause of poor viability.

TALLOW NOTES

Woodview Park Housing Scheme Ends

After nearly 25 years of erecting new houses at Woodview Park, Tallow, the announcement by Cllr. Willie McDonnell that no further new houses are to be erected at this location has come as good news to residents of the estate.

The Waterford Co. councillor further revealed that the two newly completed houses have been allotted to (1) David and Catherine Smiddy and (2) Eoin Cusack and Marion Mulcahy.

In looking back over the years, Cllr. McDonnell paid a special tribute to a parish priest of Tallow, namely the late Fr. Harry O'Brien, RIP. It was he who allotted parish land to Waterford Co. Council at a time when the Council found it impossible to acquire land for housing in Tallow.

Woodview Park with approximately 50 Council houses is a compact estate which in recent times has seen major improvements to the houses, the front green and to the general surrounds. Cllr. McDonnell said he was not going to let these improvements go unnoticed and he praised the efforts of the residents committee and particularly committee Chairman John Henley who, on many occasions complained (and rightly so) about many aspects of the housing estate.

Clir. McDonnell thanked the Tallow Tidy Towns Committee for their efforts on behalf of the residents. These included the planting of trees and shrubs and the erection of a name plate on a large circular stone at the

entrance to the Park.

Waterford County Council also played a part in helping to carry out many improvements at Woodview Park. The Tallow councillor also paid tribute to the Tallow Co. Council staff and their overseer James Ryan for their contribution to the residents and the estate.

Looking to the future of Woodview Park, Cllr. Mc-Donnell said with housing now complete, it is of vital importance that the complete land area surrounding the houses be cleaned, properly laid out and planted with trees and shrubs. This would enhance the value of the housing and greatly improve the appearance of the Park. He further stated that he will be meeting the residents committee and officials of the Tallow GAA club in connection with the erection of a permanent boundary fence between Woodview Park land and Tallow GAA field. He will also shortly carry out negotiations on their behalf with senior officials of Waterford Co. Council.
