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E5m. Hospital Announcement For Dungaryan

Health Minister, Michael Noonan's first official visit to Dungarvan last Saturday was highlighted by a £5m. shock announcement apropos a new hospital facility for the town and county.

The long-awaited disclosure was appropriately revealed by the Minister at the old St. Joseph's Hospital, which has served the area since famine times.

Although the confident word prior to his official visit was that Mr. Noonan would confirm the go-ahead of a hospital development project, no one could have anticipated the sizable financial allocation involved.

NO LONGER SUITABLE

The modern £5m. hospital will replace the nigh-on 150 year old St. Joseph's geriatric facility which currently caters for 112 patients.

Phase one of the project is

estimated at £1m. and construction work is expected to commence by the end of this year. The multi-million pound development will

cater for the entire West Waterford region.

Following a brief tour of St. Joseph's, the Minister acknowledged that there was a great need for a modern hospital in Dungarvan and subsequently announced plans for a new 27 bed nursing unit plus day care facility. Patients located in the upper storey of St. Joseph's will then be transferred to the new unit. The gradual development of the new hospital will take place on a site adjoining the existing facility and will expand in conjunction with each new unit.

Addressing the gathered crowd of delighted councillors, Health Board officials, hospital staff members, etc.,

Minister Noonan said he was happy to announce that the brief for the new unit has been approved. "I am now sanctioning the appointment of a design team to carry this scheme through to completion in





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KNOW YOUR

QUESTION

My aunt sold her house in 1992 to go into a private nursing home. Her capital is rapidly being used up and she is concerned that she will not be able to meet the costs of the home. Would she be entitled to a subvention from the Health Board? What will happen when all her capital is used up?

ANSWER

It is quite difficult to qualify for a subvention towards the cost of private nursing homes. The rate of subvention depends on your means and the "level of dependency," i.e. ability to carry out tasks of daily living and the level of social support you have, e.g. housing conditions, ability of people in your household to care for you.

There are three rates of subvention and the maximum rates are: Medium Dependency £70 per week; High Dependency £95 per week; Maximum Dependency £120 per week.

The means of your children aged 21 or over who are living in this country are also taken into account and your subvention can be reduced to take account of what they may be deemed to contribute. Whether or not they do actually contribute is not relevant.

You must apply for the subvention before being admitted to the nursing home. However, this rule does not apply if you entered the nursing home prior to the date these Regulations came into effect — September 1993

In your aunt's case, if she has capital of more than £20,000 remaining, she is unlikely to be considered until her incomes goes below this amount. We cannot really say what will happen when, even with the subvention, she can no longer afford to pay the fees to the nursing home. She could apply to the Health Board to be transferred to one of their Welfare Homes. Not all Health Boards have Welfare Homes. A medical assessment will be carried out and she will be put on a waiting list.

We do know of one situation where the particular Health Board involved was very sympathetic to the case of a person in her nineties who had been in a particular home for a considerable number of years where they undertook to make up the shortfall in her income for the remaining time left to her.

This was just one individual case and we do not know the practice/policy of the various Health Boards on this issue. We can only assume that if the Health Board cannot accommodate the person, that the private nursing home may have to keep the person even if the fees cannot be met in full.


Question: My father died recently and we had to sell a parcel of land to pay the "inheritance tax." Is there a way to alleviate this liability for my children?

Seasafe Courses At Bonmahon

For the past 2 years, members of the Bonmahon Lifeguard Club and Inshore Lifeboat have conducted Seasafe Courses for members of the public at Bonmahon Beach.

The Seasafe programme incorporates a variety of interesting talks and videos on various aspects of Beach Awareness.

Included in the programme are the following; (1) beach games, (2) waterwork (including basic rescues), (3) first aid, (4) cliff walks (where dangers such as rip currents, wave patterns, cliff erosion etc. are pointed out), (5) lifeboat talk (lifeboat and equipment is put on display and questions relating to the boat, equipment, operating procedures are answered).

The emphasis at all times during the course is on safety and alerting people to the dangers involved in dealing with the sea. Enjoy the beach, but be safe is our policy.

This course is invaluable to any person that visits a beach. It heightens awareness to potential dangers. It is of particular value to parents, teachers, youth leaders who may be in charge of groups visiting beaches,

scouts, guides etc.

Guided Tour Of Colligan Wood

1995 has been designated European Nature Conservation Year by the Council of Europe. As part of the Conservation year, Coillte Teoranta is organising guided tours which will be led by local foresters in various forest areas around the country. The theme of the tour will be 'Commercial Forestry in Harmony with the Environment-a working forest".

The Co. Waterford tours will take place at the following locations - Faithlegg Amenity Site car park (3.5 km. north of Passage East) and Colligan Wood (Wooden Bridge) (8 km. north of Dungarvan on road to Clonmel).

Coillte's aim is to further incorporate nature conservation into everyday forest management. It will be an ideal opportunity for people to learn the life cycle of a forest from seed to final felling. The Colligan Wood tour will be attended by a wildlife officer from the O.P.W. and will take place on Sunday, May 28th at 3 p.m. Assembly point at Colligan Wood.

PLANS FOR FUTURE

Mr. Noonan then invited the South Bastern Health Board to meet with him this time next year to discuss the second phase of the hospital development.

HISTORIC DAY

Thanking Minister Noonan, SEHB Chairman and Dungarvan UDC Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said his announcement made it an historic day for the town and for West Waterford.

Cllr. Kyne also paid tribute to former Health Minister, Brendan Howlin who allocated £100,000 towards the planning stage for the proposed development and everyone who had contributed over the years and who had helped to finally turn the dream into a reality.

"LONG OVERDUE"

Describing the multi-million pound news flash as a 'fantastic' announcement for the town, Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy reiterated the Minister's guarantee that the hospital project is not just a promise — but a decision.

The issue of a new hospi-

tal for the West Waterford area, he said, has long been a 'hot potato' among members of the SEHB — a contentious subject which has received ongoing attention for the better part of 25 years. "The announcement is long overdue," Deputy Deasy added.

Likewise, Minister of State at the Department of Health, Brian O'Shea, T.D., said he was happy to see that £750,000 is being allocated in phase one to what he described as a "much-needed and worthwhile project."

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It's A Month When There's **Plenty**

MAY can be a month of back-bending and breaking everything seems to be growing at once!

There is planting to be done quickly, trimming or pruning of existing plant stock and, above all, war declared on weeds and pests.

It is best to start with the plants that have already had their day this year, such as tulips.

- Lift the tulips from beds needed for summer blooms and replant elsewhere to allow the greenery to whither naturally, before finally lifting the bulbs for storage.
- Indoor bulbs can be 'finished' too with a spell outside before storage, but remember they must now become outdoor bulbs and be replanted in Autumn - they can only be forced for indoors
- Lift and divide primroses so that they strengthen and add more blooms next year, but avoid new sites prone to dryness and direct sun.
- Despite the risk of frost, particularly on the east side of the country, you can then boldly plant biennials such as Sweet William, wall flowers and Canterbury Bells.

Stand by with clothes or newspaper to protect halfhardy annuals and dahlias on potentially frosty nights, but all is not lost if you are caught out.

You may salvage the situation next morning if you water them with tepid water first thing, using a fine rose on the watering can. This reduces the effect of the sun's heat so soon after the touch of frost.

- It is also not too late to establish conifers and evergreens. Simply soak the root ball overnight before planting in soil enriched with moist peat or good well-rooted garden compost. Then make sure they are well-watered every day if the weath-
- Help roses by yanking up sucker shoots the pale and extra thorny ones which sap the strength of the tree.

Then check and wipe out pests such as greenfly or aphids, and leaf-rolling sawfly. You will have to use an insecticide, so spray on a calm day, keep pets and children away, and cover all bare skin.

- Hedges such as privet will be starting to grow quickly and need gentle trimming and shaping.
- The lawn may also look patchy and in need of a cut, but avoid trimming new lawns until the grass is about two inches high.
- Attack weeds by hand at first or dab them with a paintbrush dipped in weedkiller. The last resort is a selective weedkiller that should keep them at bay for the rest of the summer. You may need something more potent to stop weeds and grass growing up between paving slabs and through paths, but always use a hoe elsewhere if you possibly can.

Lamb In A Flash

LAMB BURGERS

Ingredients: For 4 10 oz (300g) lean lamb, finely minced 2 oz (50g) wholewheat breadcrumbs 3 ths milk bunch watercress 1/2 oz (15g) butter 1 medium onion, peeled and finely chopped salt and black pepper 1 small egg, lightly beaten151/2 oz (439g) can baked beans

Method Soak crumbs in milk. Reserve 2-3 watercress sprigs for garnish, finely chop remainder. Fry onion in butter over low heat for 4 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in meat, crumbs and milk and chopped watercress. Season and beat in egg. Shape into flat cakes about 2-5 cm (1 in) high. Line grill with foil. Grill burgers on high for 3 minutes each side. Reduce heat and grill for a further 10 minutes until just cooked. Serve with baked beans.

BEAT THE CLOCK STIR FRY

Ingredients: For 4 1 lb (450g) lean lamb from leg or shoulder 2 tsp soy sauce 2 tsp dry cider 2 tsp comflour salt and black pepper 2 medium carrots 3 the sunflower oil


1 small onion, finely chopped 8 oz (225g) frozen broccoli spears, thawed 8 oz (225g) canned sweetcom kernels. drained and rinsed 8 oz (225g) frozen green beans, thawed 8 oz (225a) brown rice Sauce: 1 ths soy sauce

2 tbs dry sherry 2 tbs orange juice 1/4 tsp sugar Method Cut lamb into thin strips. Mix 2 tsbs soy sauce, cider

and cornflour, season and toss in lamb. Mix sauce ingredients. Cook carrots in boiling salt-

Fry onion in oil in large, heavy-based pan over moderately high heat for 1 minute, stirring. Drain meat, stir-fry for 2 minutes. Add vegetables (not rice), stir-fry for 1 minute. 

STOMACH WORMS IN YOUNG CATTLE

Dose young cattle under one year of age every three weeks after turnout for stomach worms. (3 and 8 weeks for lyomee). Suckled calves born this year and suckling their mothers throughout the summer will not require dosing until housing.

Dosing and moving young cattle to clean silage aftermaths in July will avoid the need for further dosing until

housing.

Boluses are attractive for use in cattle grazed in remote areas with poor handling facilities, in that one bolus at turnout covers the greater part of the season. Boluses are far more expensive than white drenches and some injections, however, the reduction in labour, hassle and possible loss in cattle thrive may justify the extra cost in certain circumstances.

If coughing was observed in 2 year old cattle at the end of the last grazing season, it may have been

caused by an outbreak of lungworm.

There is evidence to suggest that some of the most efficient wormers may not allow sufficient immunity against lungworm to develop in the young animal during its first year at grass, leading to lungworm outbreak in later life. CLEAN GRASS FOR YOUNG CATTLE

Stomach worms are often responsible for the loss in performance in young cattle under 18 months old. Worm larvae survive on the land over winter and calves going out to grassland which carried cattle the previous year are bound to become infected. This can be prevented by

in spring where they need not be dosed.

CEREAL DISEASES

Timing of fungicide sprays in relation to disease development can have a large influence on grain yield response. Aim to inspect crops regularly to identify disease problems early and enable a fungicide to be applied before they become established. Delaying fungicide application until disease infestation reaches high levels will result in reduced grain yield response when compared to earlier applications. Fungicide spraying for foliar disease control should be completed shortly after yew emergence when grain reaches the watery ripe stage. Spraying later then this is unlikely to be cost effective with most products.

POTATO BLIGHT CONTROL

The year 1845 marked the arrival of potato blight in Ireland - 150 years on, growers are much better equipped to deal with this potentially devastating disease, thanks to scientific advances.

Growers must plan ahead to avoid trouble later on. Check that seed tubers are free from blight, avoid excessive nitrogen fertiliser and destroy dumps before growth starts. Choice of variety also has some influce. With very blight susceptible varieties e.g. Kerr's Pink or Pentland Dell, spray intervals must be kept short, some newer varieties are slight more resistant.

From the beginning of June, be ready to spray. Start as soon as crops meet within drills, or when a blight warning is issued, whichever is the earlier.

Starting the spraying programme with two or three applications of systemic spray helps protect plants

when they are growing fastest.

for crops where some blight is present or which have been sprayed with Mancozeb - containing products for most of the programme, a Fentin based fungicide remains the best choice to complete the programme. No fungicide can eliminate blight once it is established in the crop. If infection exceeds 5% burn off as soon as possible and wait at least three weeks after haulm death before lifting.

It is essential to follow instructions on the approved label when handling, storing or using any crop protection chemical.

Pasture Supplements Significantly Improve **Blood Profiles Of Dairy Cows**

An 11% increase in (increased susceptibility blood Copper, 122% increase in GPx (Selenium) and 259% increase in PII (Iodine) status in treated dairy cows over untreated animals is the message coming from a simple Summer feed trial in 1994 carried out by GAIN Animal Feeds and Dr. Phil Rogers Teagasc, Grange.

Mineral deficiencies in animals are primary (simple deficiency or sec-(induces ondary deficiency). The latter is caused by the presence of antagonistic factors in the soil, plant or animals. These factors reduce the absorption of the minerals in the target tissues of the

animals.

Over the last number of years, soil, herbage, blood and milk samples analysed at Johnstown Castle, Grange, and other laboratories throughout the county have shown a widespread national problem with multiple mineral deficiency common on many farms. Many forages also have excessive amounts of antagonistic factors (Nitrogen, Potassi-um, Sulphur, Molybdenum etc.).

The most important trace element deficiencies in Irish cattle are those of Copper (No excess), Selenium, Iodine and Cobalt and these may result in calf mortality (abortions, perinatal deaths, neonatal deaths), puerperal disorders (slow calvings, retained placenta, metritis), infertility, illthrift, reduced milk yield and reimmunity ficiencies. duced

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

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

Inquest — Last Sunday's overwhelming defeat in Cork has left Waterford supporters bewildered, stunned even. It was not that we were beaten -God knows we have become almost inured to that position over 30 years - rather was it the nature and extent of our demise. Some would claim that we didn't deserve to receive such a drubbing, that we came within six points of Tipperary shortly before the roof caved in on us. Such crumbs of comfort of selfdelusion serve no purpose. That reading of the situation ignores the significance of Tipperary's first half dominance when, if it hadn't been for a resolute defence, we might have conceded more scores including a couple of goals. No, it's better to be honest and admit that Tipperary were far too good for us almost everywhere.

Tipperary had many advantages going into this game. The background to their preparations meant that they could focus on their meeting with Waterford for the last 8 weeks. No distractions like league quarter finals and semi finals which with many players are an end in themselves and conceal the fact that other teams not participating in those games (Limerick and Tipperary for instance) are still very good teams whose appetite is being resharpened with every passing day. Last year Tipperary had a glorious victory in the league and were still basking in its reflected glory when they met Clare. After Clare dumped them out of the championship some said that the absence of some Tipperary stars caused the upset. Maybe, but I don't believe that. It was the poor mental and complacent physical preparation, I think, which left them vulnerable to a more determined Clare whose fitness, alertness and freshness won them the day. And remember that this was, basically, the same Clare team which was annihilated by Tipperary in the previous year's Munster final!

Tipperary were very quiet over the last couple of months. No reports, no publicity but plenty of homework which was facilitated by Waterford's two Thurles outings. against Galway and against Clare when the Tipperary management got two good looks at the opposition and had plenty of information on the Waterford approach. They obviously trained very well but so I'm sure did Waterford and those in charge of our preparation spared no effort to ensure that our team was as ready as possible.

The composition of the rival combinations made the greatest difference between the two. Tipperary had a blend of the richly experienced and the promising potentially good

younger players.

Just look at the spine of the Tipperary outfit. Noel Sheehy, Conal Bonner, Aidan Ryan, Colm Bonner, John Leahy, Declan Ryan, Nicholas English and Michael Cleary. Not just good hurlers but winners, senior All Ireland, League and Oireachtas winners, used to successful Munster and All Ireland campaigns. Add George Frend, Michael Ryan (lucky to finish the match), Raymie Ryan (man of the match) and Tommy Dunne to Tipperary's wounded pride and you have the ingredients to a display of power, finesse and accuracy which is wellnigh irrestible.

Our team had quite a bit of which couldn't match Tipperary's and we seemed much slower to react, much slower to the ball or with the ball. I watched the teams emerge from the dressing room on to the field. Tipperary raced out; Waterford came out, I noted particularly how Fergal Hartley one of our more gifted stickmen, jogged slowly out with that long loping stride of his and it crossed my mind that if he couldn't quicken that stride to match pace, then Tommy Dunne would have the advantage. And so it came to pass. Our team is now slow - many of our players would do quite well over 100 yards against Tipperary's fastest but we are sadly lacking the explosive start in a race for the ball, the essential quickness over the first three or four strides. When in possession especially around midfield, we didn't seem able to move away quickly enough to allow time and space to use the ball properly. Even then we were inclined to strike the ball forward in a straight line, vertically as you might say, rather than angle it diagonally as Tipperary did. The diagonal ball into English or Cleary reaped a bountiful harvest. One clearance by Tony Browne (he didn't let us down) went straight up his own wing drawing all the play towards the right wing. A glance across to the left wing showed it empty, Flynn and Greene were in the full forward and centre forward positions distorting the shape of our attack, leaving no width to our play. Had the ball come across, the area in font of goal would have been too crowded for penetration of the Tipperary rearguard. Understandably that particular attack yielded no fruit.

We had problems under the dropping ball. Our motto should have been "one Waterford man under the dropping ball", preferably the man coming forward. Instead two contested the air ball leaving an opponent loose. When the ball broke, as it invariably does in those situations, the Tipperary man capitalised.

Their two second half goals -Aidan Ryan's and Michael Cleary's - came from exploiting that scenario. To compound the folly one or two Waterford men tried to catch the ball every time.

He wasn't allowed do so, of course, because the Tipperary hurley (any hurley) went higher than the upstretched hand. You bet Pat Fox didn't try putting up his hand to Michael Cleary's accurately centred free. Up went his stick to flick home a great goal. The quick

We had one forward who couldn't strike from his right. In his position it was imperative that he have a good rightsided stroke. He tossed up the experience too but at a level 4-ball and missed it completely. In that same first half he found himself on the endline. He pulled from the right and drove it well wide. That's a basic skill. Interestingly I reminded that player five years ago that he should do something about his weak right side. His response was to tell me that his right side was as strong as his left. I got the message: "shut up".

We can come back but we have much to improve on, to quicken up: our thinking, our reading of play, our decisionmaking, our striking on the ground (we saw very little of that) and from the hand. Unless our players are aware of their shortcomings and set about overcoming them no progress is possible. Please let us not take the easy option of blaming the management. They never have enough time to do the immense work which needs doing, not in the two-hour training session twice a week. No, our thanks to Peter, Joey and Tony for their selfless dedication to Waterford.

We must pursue the basics relentlessly. Concentrate on speeding up their performance once so that in a match situation a player can be positive and confidently move to any ball at speed, control it and

ABBEYSIDE FOOTPATHS IN BAD SHAPE

Abbeyside Councillor Michael O'Riordan has urged the Council to instigate a long term plan for the maintenance and upgrading of footpaths in Abbeyside.

Speaking at last week's UDC meeting, Cllr. O'Riordan said that while attending the official opening of the newly developed Abbeyside AFC grounds recently, he had noticed many footpaths in the area which were badly worn, sunk and warped.

Likewise, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said she saw the footpaths in question almost everyday and agreed wholeheartedly that they should be repaired.

STUDENT SUMMER **JOBS SCHEME**

Dungarvan UDC has applied to the Department of Social Welfare to be included as a sponsor under the Student Summer Jobs Scheme '95. Open to third level students, the scheme allows various local groups such as the Council to register as sponsors to carry out worthwhile projects and at the same time provide parttime work for students during the summer holiday period.

The type of work to be offered by the Council includes; survey of fire hydrants, litter control, beach cleaning and the management of public conveniences. Sixteen students are required for the local scheme and each entrant must first satisfy a means test.

Students taken on under this scheme will be super-

maximum of 200 hours over a 6 to 16 week period. The hourly rate of pay is £3 which is not subject to tax or PRSI and the maximum number of hours to be worked in any week is 35.

Last year the scheme was a huge success with over 2,300 sponsors offering in excess of 11,200 jobs. As 3rd level students can no longer draw the dole while on summer vacation, the scheme offers a substitute income to jobless students and last year over 9,000 people took part.

Commenting on the scheme at last week's UDC meeting, Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne said the Council should match the students skills or area of expertise to the job on hand.

Likewise, Cllr. Tony Wright, said the management of public conveniences was not a very attractive job for students. shouldn't be taking the place of workers", he stressed, .. the cleaning of public toilets is a workers job".

Co. Manager Donal Connolly said the Council won't employ students to replace the work of normal employees.


SECOND HALF HAT-TRICK

COUNTY BOARD MDDING

P J Ryan, county chairman presided. This was the first meeting of the Board since the appointment of the new sub-committees and here we had a slight indication that as time moves on, the style of County Board meetings will change. Much of the work normally conducted by the open Board, will be attended to by the various committees and their decisions will be presented to Board meetings for approval. It will help to speed up meetings. Not that any delegate could complain about last week's meeting where a big agenda was got through in just two hours. The chairman had promised this at the outset. The main business of the meeting was about finance, championships and reports from referees and committees.

FINANCE

Treasurer James Walsh gave an update about the financial situation of the Board and detailed income from gates and national league since the previous meeting. He said the overdraft was going down grad-ually but it was too gradual for his liking because expenses, mostly in relation to county teams in training, were continuing at a high rate. He made particular reference to the abnormal cost of physio treatment. He said he was glad to be in a position to issue cheques to clubs who were due money and this would be done at the end of the meeting.

The county chairman spoke about the efforts that have been made over the past couple of months and which would continue for as long as was necessary to turn our financial position around. He told delegates that from now on we would cut our cloth according to our measure and some of the decisions that would have to be taken in relation to cost cutting, might prove painful, but they have got to be done and they will be done. He said he would be disappointed if he did not get the full backing of the County Board for this policy. Referring to the champi-onships as our biggest revenue earning activity, he said that all the county finals will be played in late September or early October when the weather was fine and patrons can come in large numbers to enjoy the finals in comfort. He expected that the revenue from county finals this year, will be greater than ever, because we will play them earlier. No one, he said, should be in any doubt about the way in which the championships will be programmed in order to ensure that we will be ready for the finals on time. Only in the case of a death of a close relative will an application for a postponement be entertained. He said the G.A.C. were leaving the last week in July and the first week in August free for holidays, but this was intended to

COMPLAINT RE. COLLEGES MATCH

Also the Ballyduff delegate stated that both colleges considered it very poor form that the matter had not been discussed with them, rather than dealing direct with the Council as after all they were two Waterford Colleges. Maurice Geary said that both the Colleges involved wanted to know why or how the original figure had increased by several hundred per cent.

COUNTY DIRECTORY

County P.R.O. Brendan Tobin informed the meeting that the publication of the new county directory was held because seven or eight clubs had failed to respond to a request for information. Heasaid his committee were prepared to wait for a further four or five days and if details had not been submitted by then, they would proceed without these clubs. He said it was hoped to launch the directory at the June meeting of the Board in three week's time.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

Submissions by the 1994 County Disciplinary Committee relating to reports of two championships played at venues here in the West, were before the meeting. As a result of their deliberations two players were suspended, fines were imposed and warnings issued.

The first report referred to the county junior hurling final and here their recommendation that Dathai O Briain, Geraldines, be suspended for twelve months, was accepted. O'Rourke was suspended for 2 months. Finally it was agreed to accept the recommendation, but the Disciplinary Committee were to further investigate and have the County Board Officer named at the next meeting.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Since the recent appointment of the County G.A.C., referees' reports are dealt with, by that body and their findings reported in the circulated minutes to all delegates who will have the right to vote for or against their adoption.

The Mount Sion v. Lismore senior hurling game in which Tony Browne and Sean Daly were sent off was dealt with by the committee and suspensions of two weeks in each case was decided on. When this came before the County Board meeting, Dungarvan delegate Michael Lyons was loud and clear in his criticism of the leniency which pertained in this case and said that anyone who saw the affair would have to agree that the minimum suspension should not apply. He also intimated that an effort to have the report mitigated might have been made.

The County Board Chairman said that he certainly had made no contact with the referee since the particular match and he was not aware that any other officer had approached him either. He said the report had stated that the sending off was for rough play and the appropriate suspension strictly in accordance with general rule had been imposed. James Tobin, Shamrocks, strongly objected to the inference that the referee, who is from the Shamrock's Club, had been dishonest in wording the report and Phil Fanning, Mount Sion, also took umbridge at the criticism made. Michael Lyons said he was standing over what he had said and he referred to the inconsistency between Boards and Councils

in dealing with reports. In the report from G.A.C. relating to the St. Mollerans v. Shamrocks game which was abandoned, fines toin accordance with rule for failure to submit lists of players for the game and £200 for the incident which led to the abandonment. The Molleran's chairman apologised for the incident, but proposed that the fines be reduced as the were very se-Tobin. vere. James Shamrocks, also apologised to the Board and to the referee, whom he praised for his handling of the game and he supported the Molleran's chairman in seeking a mitigation of the fines. Referreing to the publicity given to the particular match and the

abandonment, he said he had been instructed by his club to thank and compliment the "Dungarvan Leader" for their fair and unbiased report of the whole affair. He thanked the G.A.C. for a fair hearing and for the decision to refix the match, which was the correct one. The County Board Chairman said that a proposition to reduce the fines, would not be entertained but a moratorium would be granted in relation to the payment of the fines. This was agreed.

The Chairman reported on the Munster Council meeting and the suspensions imposed on two under 21 football players who were sent off in the game against Tipperary. He said that in future, any witnesses attending such Council meetings in support of an alleged offender, would have to be vetted by County Board officers, before attending.

We Fives and Gater was brought were outclassed by a Tipperary team whose hunger for victory was obvious from the moment of the throw-in. 
