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EXTENSIVE DAMAGE AS FIRE GUTS LISMORE BUILDING

Lismore Fire Brigade are still searching House. for the cause of a blaze which gutted an unoccupied building in the grounds of the old Lismore District Hospital on Sunday morning last.

According to Eric Flynn, spokesman for the Lismore Fire Brigade, the fire, which broke out around 10 a.m., was mainly confined to the old slate roof of the 154 year old building which is situated near the road opposite the modern St. Carthage's

Lismore Fire Brigade arrived promptly on the scene, aided by a unit from the Cappoquin Brigade. Although the fire was prevented from spreading to further parts of the building, the damage was extensive with the entire middle portion of the roof being completely destroyed in the blaze.

After rapidly taking control of the fire the units remained on standby for four hours.

Ring Film Co. Makes History

History was made last Friday by the ring based film and television company Nemeton who became the very first company in Ireland to make a T.V. programme under contract with Radio Teilifis na Gaeilge.

Entitled 'Ard San Aer' the half hour programme was shot in studio in Spiddle, Connemara and is the first programme actually commissioned by and paid for by the new Irish language T.V. service. Based on sports archive material, the pilot programme will be run on a weekly basis featuring favourite sporting memories of two guests.

The programme will be presented by well known

national broadcaster Cynthia Uí Mhurchu of Eurovision fame and will draw from a wide range of sporting events going back over

the years. Footage for the pilot programme is taken from Italia '90, Ireland's last rugby triple crown victory. CONTINUED ON PAGE 7

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My daughter attends a third level college in the U.K. Can you tell me if she would be eligible for the Summer Jobs Scheme and how do you apply for this?

ANSWER

Irish students who attend college outside this country would be eligible for the Summer Jobs Scheme if they meet the requirements of the scheme.

This scheme allows third level students undertake part time work useful to the community during their summer holidays with sponsors such as Community and Welfare Groups and to receive payment for the work. Full time third level students aged 18 or over who satisfy a means test are eligible for this scheme. Under this scheme students undertake to do part time work over a 6-16 week period for a maximum of 200 hours. They are allowed to do other part-time work if they can get it.

The hourly rate of pay will be £3 which will not be subject to tax or PRSI. They can earn up to a maximum of £600. An extra £1 per hour will be paid to students living at home with their parents and whose parents are solely dependent on a social welfare payment.

The project can be completed within 6 weeks with the agreement of the sponsor but the students must not work more than 35 hours per week. The working arrangements are to be agreed between the students and the sponsor.

Students should apply as soon as possible and if they apply before May 1 this will ensure that the Job Certificate will be issued by June 1. This certificate must be given to the sponsor on commencing work. Students should quote their RSI number on all correspondence and should allow at least 21 days to have their application processed. The closing date for receipt of completed application forms is June 30.

A student who cannot get the maximum hours (200) with one sponsor may apply for a further Job Certificate for the remaining hours with another sponsor. Students living at home who cannot get work under this scheme and whose parents are solely dependent on a social welfare payment may be entitled to a separate allowance. They must send the original application form to participate in the scheme and a request for this allowance to: Social Welfare Services Office, P.O. Box 3988, Dublin 1.

LOCAL NISSAN DEALERSHIP OFFICIALLY OPEN

Last Thursday's official opening of Waterford's newest Nissan dealership was marked by bright sunshine and huge crowds as masses packed the forecourt and superb new showrooms at the scenic Youghal Road venue.

Open since last April, Dungarvan Nissan has already made a huge impact on the town and surrounding areas, a fact which was reflected by the prodigious number of well wishers, local dignitaries, customers, business people and supporters who turned up to congratulate directors John C. Flood and David Dickenson on their successful venture.

The approx. 3,500 sq. ft. building was designed by local architect Damien Dillon and constructed by Cyril Healy & Sons.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Mr. Dillon said that the unique splayed, effect of the showroom walls was to solve a spatial problem and to increase the structural quality of the building.

The attractive porthole windows add distinction to the premises, perhaps influenced by the maritime setting of the dealership.

"WELCOME ADDITION"

Officially blessing the spacious, new showrooms was Fr. Nicholas McCarthy, the first person to buy a new Nissan car from the Dungarvan dealership. Delighted to be performing the ceremony, Fr. McCarthy said the premises was "a very welcome addition to the economy of the area".

On behalf of both Directors, David Dickenson thanked all invited guests for attending the opening of the dealership. Referring to

the scenic coastal setting of the site with a full tide, he declared, "I bet there's not a better site in the country". Having met with John Fogarty of Nissan last summer to discuss the possibility of a franchise, David said it was hard to imagine the Youghal Road location just 6 months ago. In conclusion, David thanked his wife Helena for her patience during the start up of the venture.

"GREAT CHARACTERS"

Declaring the dealership to be officially open, Gerard O'Toole, Executive Chairman of Nissan Ireland said there was no more beautiful location for a dealership.

"John C. and David are great characters", said Mr. O'Toole, "...they're both very different but they complement each other and work well as a team. We have a lot of faith in them", he added, "and we're sure that they will work quite hard". Mr. O'Toole continued that in the first few months alone, the dealership had performed very well. The Nissan executive then presented a piece of specially designed Waterford Crystal to John C. and David.

Accepting the crystal, John C. thanked Des O'Toole, property advisor, Damien Dillon architect, Cyril Healy & Sons and the sub contractors, Gerard O'Toole and the team from Nissan, the loyal people of Dungarvan and West Waterford and his wife Martha and family.

DUNGARVAN WAS NATURAL CHOICE

In an interview later with the 'Dungarvan Leader', Gerard O'Toole said Dungarvan was the natural choice for a Nissan dealership between Cork and Waterford. He knew John and David when they worked with GM in Clonmel and described both men as being hungry to look for business, competent with tonnes of experience.

"Relatively, they're one of our best performers since they started", he added.

FUN MOTOR SHOW

Meanwhile the local Nissan dealership was again to the fore, this time hosting a popular Nissan motor show throughout last weekend. Despite adverse weather conditions on Friday and Saturday, the gala weekend attracted huge crowds to the

new spacious showrooms at Youghal Road. Visitors were treated to giveaways and competitions, while the latest full range of Nissan cars and commercials including the exclusive 100 NX sports car were all on show.

Manager, David Dickenson said he received tremendous feedback from visitors over the weekend with many people complimenting the 'fresh new look' of the site which was once an awful eyesore in the town.

Another popular attraction during the motorshow was a competition for a £50 Statoil petrol voucher where entrants had to guess the number of balloons in a Nissan Micra. The competition winner will be announced in next week's edition.

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Welcome Public Amenity For Ardmore

The Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin, has approved a grant to Waterford County Council for the construction of a tourist complex adjacent to Ardmore beach. The value of the grant is £40,000.

This is an unusual project, as it is being promoted by a local group, the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op in association with three other bodies. In October 1992, the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op agreed with the then County Manager, Dan Hurley, to proceed with the project.

The complex will include a tourist office, public toilets and beach guard facilities.

Funding for the project is provided by a number of sources: the Dept. of the Environment, Waterford Co. Council, Waterford Development Partnership and local funding provided by Ardmore Enterprise Co-op.

In July 1993 the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op presented a cheque to the value of £10,000 to Waterford Co. Council for the project. This was followed by a press conference in October 1993, unveiling plans and a design for the proposed tourist facilities.

In April 1994, a delegation from the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op, led by Brendan Kenneally T.D. met the then Junior Minister for the Environment John Browne where Ardmore's case for funding was put forward.

Since then officials in Waterford County Council, in particular, County Manager Donal Connolly, have been in constant contact with the Department. The Waterford Dail Deputies and the County Councillors for the Dungarvan area (which covers Ardmore), have been working strenuously behind the scenes to ensure that this much needed project will proceed.

Tourist interests in Ardmore are overjoyed that this project, so long awaited, can now proceed.

Don't Forget The Indoor Plants

There has been a great revival of interest in growing herbs — both for their visual appeal and use in the kitchen.



They can be very decorative and need not take up much space — some people grow useful ones in kitchen window boxes or on the balcony of their flat.

Choice of location is more important than space as most herbs like lots of sun and well-drained fertile soil — many come from the Mediterranean.

Enrich the earth with a good dressing of well-rotted garden compost before planting.

The cook of the household will want a say in the location too — it will need to be close to the kitchen door.

This is why a large tub, window box or even a grow-bag have appeal, even if some of the suggestions are not too pleasing to the eye!

If you are using a patch of ground then remember you will harvest from it frequently, so plant nothing more than an arm's length from the path. If the patch is going to be more than five feet square then small gravel walkways or stepping stones will be needed.

Despite the practical purposes of the feature, make the most of it visually as well by planting taller varieties at the back.

Some useful and attractive varieties to start with are:

MARJORAM — Sown outside in spring to produce pretty flowers and foliage. Good for Continental dishes.

PARSLEY — Rich green foliage is very useful for flavouring and garnish but can be difficult to start unless soil is warm.

FENNEL — Lacy foliage is attractive and the aniseed-like flavour is good for salads and cooked dishes.

CHIVES — A firm favourite for all cooking and salads and an eye-catcher for the herb garden thanks to its mauve 'puffball' blooms.

MINT — Can be a nuisance unless confined to its own pot or box, but a must if you are also growing potatoes.

HORSERADISH — Another which threatens to overrun unless grown in a container or hemmed in by walls and paths.

You can keep certain varieties bushy and attractive by pinching out growing tips, but be ready to trim other parts if the plants get tall and spindly.

Spare growth can be dried for winter use; while not as good as fresh herbs, home grown dried herbs still seem to have more life left than those sold in shops.

Pick tender undamaged non-flowering springs and shoots on dry days and bind into small bunches before washing and draining on newspaper in the shade. Then hang them in the airing cupboard for a couple of weeks before storing in airtight containers.

Alternatively, hang some of your favourites in the kitchen to scent the air.

DIET SOUPS

THERE'S nothing like soup for giving you a nicely satisfied feeling, without "costing" too many calories. Some can be a light main meal in themselves.

CHILLED BORSCHT

Ingredients

1lb (450g) cooked beetroot
2tsp (10ml) Bovril in 1/4 pint
(150ml) hot water
juice of 1 large lemon
1/2 small onion, sliced
4tbs (60ml) cider or wine vinegar
4 eggs
salt and pepper to taste
6tbs (90ml) plain yogurt

Method

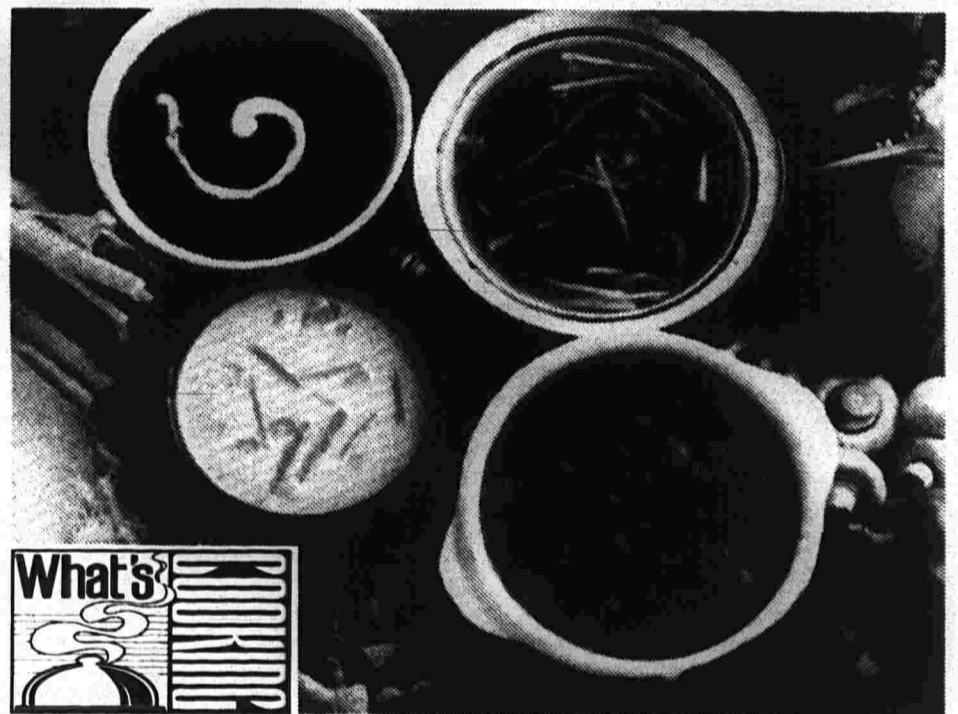
Peel and dice the beetroot. Put half dissolved Bovril in blender with half or remaining ingredients. Blend until smooth. Repeat with remainder. Chill. 80 calories per serving.

Serves 6-8.

CONSOMME

Ingredients

3tsp (25ml) Bovril



1 1/2 pints (900ml) water
large bay leaf
1/2tsp (2.5ml) each marjoram and dried thyme
1 large onion, sliced
2 carrots, sliced
1dsp (7.5ml) lemon juice
salt and pepper

Method

Put all ingredients except seasoning and lemon juice in pan and bring slowly to boil. Simmer for 1 hour. Strain, add lemon juice and salt and pepper. Re-

heat without boiling. 150 calories per serving.
Serves 4.

HUNGARIAN SPICY SOUP

Ingredients

1 large green pepper, de-seeded and chopped
1/4 tsp (1.75ml) caraway seeds
1tbs (15ml) tomato puree
1lb (450g) frankfurter sausages, thinly sliced
1tbs (15ml) paprika

2 pints (1 litre) stock made with 2 red Bovril cubes
1 large onion, chopped

Method

Slowly fry pepper and onion with a little fat in a non-stick pan. Stir in paprika, tomato puree and caraway seeds. Gradually blend in stock and bring to boil, stirring. Add frankfurters and simmer for 30 minutes. 220 calories per serving.
Serves 6.

Due to launch from Dungarvan harbour on Saturday morning last, Detective Garda Michael Carroll was forced to postpone his plans for a round Ireland trip due to adverse weather conditions.

The Donegal-based Garda who hails from Clonea-Power, is taking on the challenge of circumnavigating

Ireland solo in an Irish made rigid hull inflatable boat to raise funds for the MS National Care Centre.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader," Michael thanked all the people who had turned up last Saturday to send him on his way. Unfortunately, the weather proved too rough for a record breaking perfor-

mance. "I would have set a record," said Michael, "but it would have been too easy to beat" — 42/43 hours instead of 30 hours or under.

As the low band of pressure eases off, Michael hopes to launch the boat today (Wednesday) at first light. Ideal weather conditions for the trip would be south/westerly winds and high pressure which Michael expects to be today's forecast. He hopes to complete his marathon trip by Thursday morning/afternoon when returning to Dungarvan harbour.

TWO DAYS NON-STOP

Being all alone and totally exposed to the elements, Michael will need the very best of protection to keep him sufficiently warm and dry in his heroic solo attempt to circumnavigate Ireland without stopping, in less than two days.

VANDALISM IN LISMORE

In the past number of weeks Lismore has been hit by acts of vandalism.

On Sunday morning last at 10 a.m. smoke was seen coming from what was once the lodge at the entrance to the old District Hospital. Both Lismore and Cappoquin fire brigades fought the blaze until 1 p.m. when it was brought under control. The fire started on the top floor in a building which has been unoccupied for years. When this correspondent was brought through the remains on Sunday afternoon it was evident that there had been someone in the building before the fire.

On the previous Monday night the Grotto at the bank field was vandalised. The floodlights were smashed, flowers uprooted and the statue daubed.

The Grotto was built by voluntary labour 12 months ago

and it must be very disheartening for the Grotto committee to see such acts of vandalism.

Some weeks previous we had two cars stolen, one crashed and burned a few miles from Lismore and the other found just outside the town. Both cars had been stolen within a week of each other from the town. The worry for car owners is that those who committed those acts could strike again.

It is a pity that Lismore should be making the news for the above reasons when there is so much time and effort by individuals and committees into making the town a prize winner in the Entente Florale. The tourist season has just commenced and this year more than any other we can expect large crowds to the town. So let us hope that the culprits who have caused

the vandalism will be caught and brought to justice.

We have to go to 1953 to find players from the parish who represented the county. The men in question were Mick Farrell and Johnny O'Connor, Ballinacourty

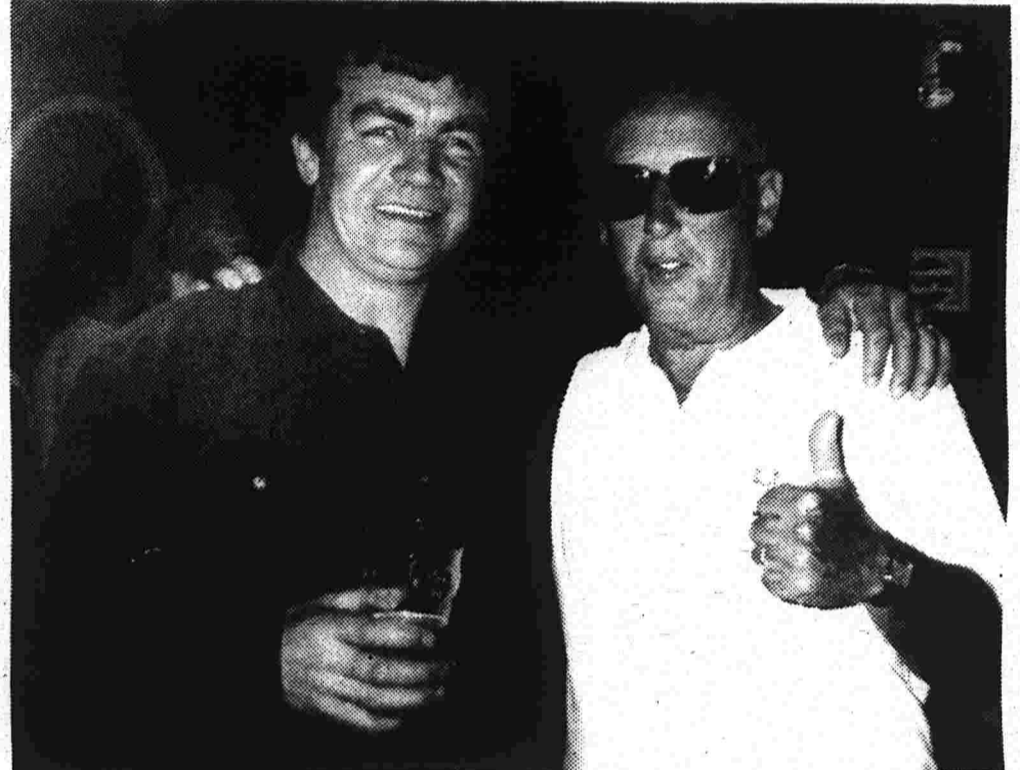

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

SELECTING LAMBS FOR SALE

Proper selection of lambs for sale is the most important factor in improving carcass quality well ahead of breeding and even nutrition. If you are prepared to weigh lambs regularly and if you know how to assess the level of finish you can reduce the level of unfinished and overfat lambs to almost insignificance.

WEIGHING

Dealers and agents may well be sufficiently practiced in handling lambs to be able to assess weight without the use of scales. Producers who put through their hands maybe a couple of hundred animals in a year are not in the same position. For any degree of accuracy, a weighing scale is essential. The sit-in types which came on the market a few years ago are cheap and very easy to use.

WHAT LIVELINEWEIGHT?

To estimate the target liveweight you must have an idea of kill-out percentages. Most producers weighing straight off grass in June can expect something in the region of 44%-46%. The second figure to be known is the target carcass weight. From now on, extra carcass weight is equivalent to extra cash, presuming the price drops, should be more gradual than recently. A target of 19 kgs. is reasonable.

To give a 19 kg. carcass at a kill-out of 45% requires a lamb weighing 42 kgs. approximately. Lambs cannot be weighed on a daily basis so we must accept a range of carcass weights around the 19 kg. targets. This means that the liveweight range should run from 40 to 44 kgs. Within this range ewe lambs will normally finish a couple of kilos lighter than male lambs, so ewes would occupy the 40 to 42 kgs. area predominantly, while the 42 to 44 kgs. range would be mainly rams or wethers.

The obvious implication here is that if lambs are gaining close to two kgs. per week, then weekly selection is required to stay within these targets. More and more of our better producers have already accepted this fact.

GRAZING MANAGEMENT

Grazing conditions have been good up to recently and while growth rates have been below normal for the past number of weeks, in conditions like this it is easy to achieve good grazing and good grass utilisation. There is very little milk yield reduction by making the cows eat the grass down to 2-3" stubble. However, grazing too low will reduce milk yield and is not necessary in order to produce good quality regrowth.

When grass gets strong and stemmy it is always difficult to graze well, strip grazing is necessary. It could also be cut ahead of the cows and then grazed. This is working well for some farmers. It is better if this grass is wilted for 12 to 24 hours as it seems to get sweeter. This is a good way, in dry weather, to get good utilisation of strong grass.

SECOND CUT SILAGE

For the second cut, spread 80 to 90 units of nitrogen per acre immediately. On sulphur deficient soils it will be necessary to include sulphur in addition to nitrogen for second cut. On medium to low fertility soils an application of phosphate and potash will also be required. It is important to spread fertiliser immediately after cutting. A light dressing of slurry on bare silage ground is unlikely to lead to contamination of the second cut. It is however absolutely essential to spread immediately after silage cutting.

DOCK CONTROL

Cutting can help to prevent seeding, but generally is much less effective than chemical techniques because mature docks can regrow quickly from their extensive root system. However, even when the most effective dock control herbicides are used for heavy infestations of mature docks, follow-up treatments are generally required. Always aim to prevent infestation building up to severe levels.

WHEN TO SPRAY

Heavy infestations of seeding docks should be sprayed as soon as new grass and clover reach a safe stage of development. Docks should be controlled in established grass swards when they are present at more than 10% ground cover. After first cut silage, or the middle of the grazing season, is when docks are likely to be most damaging to grass yield. Spray treatment at this time can provide better control and be less harmful to the grass.

For maximum effect, ensure docks are actively growing and that sufficient leaf area is available for herbicide uptake — three weeks regrowth is usually adequate.

A large number of chemical products are available for dock control in established grassland. However, complete control is generally not possible to achieve with a single application.

Teagasc Warning To Farmers On Silage Effluent

Teagasc has appealed to farmers to take special care this year in managing and storing silage effluent. There was an increase in farmyard related fish kills

last year, with the number of incidences rising from three in 1993 to 10 in 1994.

Sean Regan, Farm Environment Adviser with Teagasc, has warned that

effluent levels are high at present and this will demand rigid monitoring of storage tanks particularly for the first few days after silage is made.

"Directly ensiled wet grass can produce a peak effluent flow rate of up to 30 litres per tonne per day (30 cubic metres per 100 tonnes) for the first few days after ensiling. This demands extra vigilance to ensure that tanks do not overflow" he warned.

Sean Regan stressed the need to ensure that all effluent collection facilities are working effectively. Also, run off from the silage pit cover should be diverted away from the effluent storage tank. Otherwise, a sudden downpour may overflow the tank. Farmers are also advised to regularly inspect drains and watercourses downstream of the farmyard, once silage making begins.

"The effluent from just 100 tonnes of silage has the same polluting potential as the daily sewage output of a town of 25,000 people. This demonstrates the need for careful management of this lethal substance", said Sean Regan.

In addition to the damage to the environment and to the economy, farmers found guilty of pollution are liable to substantial fines as well as payment of compensation for the damage caused, he added.

DIARY COW PREMIUM TO COMPENSATE FOR SUPPORT CUTS

I.C.M.S.A. President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, has warned that the EU decision to reduce price supports for dairy products is extremely dangerous and will inevitably lead to a reduction in prices when the present buoyant position weakens.

He has reiterated his call for the introduction of a dairy cow premium scheme saying that unless the premium is introduced or the EU Commission is forced to restore the supports they recently reduced, the Irish dairy industry will come under severe pressure.

POLLUTION GRANT PROBLEMS

"The statement made by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr Ivan Yates, during the Dail debate on the suspension of the Control of Farm Pollution Scheme, does very little to reassure the thousands of

farmers who have to undertake essential pollution control work and who were misled into applying for grant aid which is not there", said the chairman of the I.C.M.S.A. Farm Services Committee, Mr Maurice Harvey.

The Minister's commitment to confirm to the Banks that conditional approvals for funding under the CFP Scheme will be fully honoured in 1997, is of little real benefit to farmers.

"What is required is a guarantee that the Minister will underwrite the interest paid by farmers in the interim period between completion of work and payment of the grant. This would be a realistic, reassuring gesture to farmers", said Mr Harvey.

To assist farmers in funding the type of investment required for pollution control and to comply with the new dairy hygiene regulations, ICMSA has proposed that accelerated capital al-

lowances be allowed to farmers in the Associations 1995 Pre-Budget submission. The ICMSA discussed this issue in detail with the Revenue Commissioners in the run up to the publication of the Finance Act in April 1995.

WASTE PLASTIC RECYCLING

The ICMSA suggested

that the County Enterprise Boards and Leader groups should examine the possibility of waste plastic recycling as the basis of small rural industries. Such enterprises would serve two important purposes - job creation and preservation of the environment.

Kildalton Student Wins Farm Safety Award

Brian and Michael received a specially inscribed plaque and a cash prize to be spent on safety equipment.

Their project consisted of a survey of accidents in their local areas and the preparation of a Safety Statement to address these issues. The outcome of the projects were publicised in the local media.

The Minister congratulated the students on their excellent project which outlined in a visual way the potential dangers existing in farming and the need for continuing awareness of the steps required to reduce the accident rate. This is particularly relevant from now on through the busy summer season.

New Sheepmeat Market Support

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, welcomed the decision by the EU Commission in Brussels recently to accept 270 tonnes of sheepmeat from Ireland under a special Aids to Private Storage (APS) Scheme.

Mr. Gray said: "This will have an immediate positive impact on the market, particularly for heavy hoggets so that factories should now be paying 90p to 95p per lb. It should also help stabilise Spring Lamb prices," he continued.

The IFA estimates the 270 tonnes of APS contracts will require up to 13,000 hoggets.

The IFA man explained that the measure had been secured by the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, following strong representations from IFA on behalf of

the country's 50,000 sheep farmers.

Mr. Gray highlighted the role of livestock export trade in providing the maximum number of market outlets for the sheep industry. "If there had been unrestricted exports of hoggets earlier this Spring, market prices would have held up much better. The Minister must ensure that all export routes are opened if the industry is to have the strong price competition that producers need to get a viable return."

IFA On Suckler Cow Premium

The IFA National Livestock Committee has called on the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates to allow a second transfer and lease period on Suckler Cow Premium Quota for the 8,000 farmers who have applied to the National Reserve and are still awaiting a response on their reserve quota allocation for 1995 from the Department of Agriculture.

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, said that delays by Minister Yates in specifying the Suckler Cow Quota Reserve categories earlier this year had prevented the Department from allocating the Reserve Quota before May 31, premium application deadline. "This leaves the 8,000 farmers involved in limbo as they do not have their precise quota and do not know whether or not they should lease or buy additional quota. The only practical solution to this problem is for Minister Yates to announce that there will be a second lease and transfer period after the May 31 deadline. This will allow applicants who are unsuccessful with the Reserve to rectify their position and avoid unnecessary 1995 premium losses."

Mr. Donovan pointed out that this problem could have been avoided if the Minister had not delayed by over a month the initial announcement regarding Reserve Quota categories. "This Minister must now move to solve this problem arising from the long delay by allowing a second lease and transfer period after the May 31 Premium and Headage application deadline."

IFA President Rejects "Conditional Approval" Under Pollution Scheme

In a letter to An Taoiseach, John Bruton, T.D., the IFA President, John Donnelly has told Mr. Bruton that the Government must find additional funding for the Control of Farmyard Pollution (CFP) Scheme, to ensure that the 12,000 farmers who have applied will be able to proceed with vital and highly costly environmental work on their farms.

Mr. Donnelly said that plans by the Dept. of Agriculture to issue conditional grant approval to some of the 12,000 farmers were totally unsatisfactory as these farmers are being obliged to proceed with necessary works immediately, but must forgo grant aid until 1997 at the earliest. He warned: "The issuing of conditional approval

is merely fudging the question as to the Government's commitment to adequate funding of the CFP Scheme over the next 5 years. All applicants need full approval and prompt payment, otherwise investment plans will have to be put on hold indefinitely."

The IFA President has asked the Taoiseach to confirm that the Government will seek extra finance to ensure the continuation of farmer investment in pollution control as well as an improvement in the up-take of the Rural Environmental Protection Scheme (REPS). 18,000 farmers have applied for the CFP and it is estimated that at least half have either joined the REPS Scheme or plan to do so over the coming year.

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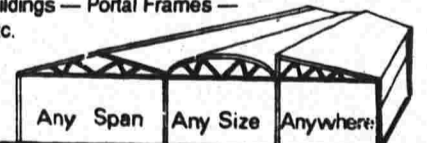

Failure to take action will be an affront to hurling standards of decency and fair play and inhibit the promotion of a great game which already has a struggle to survive without this sordid affair besmirching it.

Deputy Deasy On Acquisition Of Stately Homes

The following question regarding the acquisition of stately homes was tabled in the Dáil recently by Dungarvan based Deputy, Austin Deasy.

Mr. Deasy asked the Minister for Tourism and Trade, Enda Kenny, the policy, if any, the Government has in relation to taking over and developing stately homes such as Lismore Castle with a view to their potential as tourist attractions.

MATTER FOR MINISTER HIGGINS
Minister Kenny replied that his Department has no resources in its Vote to undertake the acquisition and development of stately homes. Policy responsibility in this area, he said, rests with the Minister for Arts,

Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins.

The Tourism Minister continued, "If the owners were to sell the castle to the State, conceivably it could fall to be considered under measure 2 of the natural tourism sub-programme, which is SPI of the operational programme and deals with the preservation of national monuments and historic properties. The EU allocation of approximately £20 million for projects under measure 2 of that sub-programme has been substantially committed. In the event of the home being sold to the State it is unlikely that it would be considered for some time".

HISTORIC LISMORE CASTLE
Mr. Deasy then asked,

"will the Minister agree that it would be prudent policy from a tourism point of view if we had a stately homes agenda similar to that of the National Trust in Britain. There are a number of castles and stately homes such as Lismore which, if upgraded, would be a great tourist attraction. Lismore castle is particularly historic having been the home of the Earl of Cork, Robert Boyle who, as I recollect from my intermediate certificate, formulated Boyle's law of physics. Also, the Duke of Devonshire's family and the Cavendish family lived there. The home is particularly historic dating back more than 800 years".

Minister Kenny replied, "I accept that in Ireland, no more than any other country, there is a great interest in historic houses and stately homes. Available figures indicate that at least 60% of tourists visit some area of historic, cultural and traditional importance. The Deputy is correct in that stately homes and castles, which have played such an important part in our heritage for good or ill, are always of interest. This is a matter for a policy decision by the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht".

SIMILAR PROJECTS
In conclusion Deputy Deasy asked that the Minister bring it to the attention of his colleague, Minister Higgins, that similar projects have been carried out in Muckross House in Killarney and Powerscourt in Co. Wicklow.

"That policy should be pursued as I am sure the Minister will agree it has tremendous potential", he added.

STANDING OVATION CONFIRMS JAMES' AWARD



Annual Conferences are not normally noted for sensitive moments, but delegates took time out during the Local Government, Education and Local Services Divisional Conference held in Kilkenny recently, to present to James Power from the Waterford County Branch, the Union's Distinguished Service Award to mark his 45 years of loyal membership.

James was barely in the door of Waterford Co. Council in 1949 when he first became a member of the Irish Local Government Officials Union.

A committed trade unionist, he has served on the Waterford Co. Branch Committee since the very early '50's and has taken an active interest in the affairs of the union and the welfare of its members.

STERLING SERVICE
Proposing James for the Distinguished Service Award, Waterford Co. Branch Cathaoirleach Tom Keith said that after attending his 39th conference no one will have earned retirement more than James. "We in IMPACT owe him our own debt of gratitude", he added.

"James Power has seen this Union grow from a modest membership to today's huge

numbers", said Mr. Keith, "and he has seen the name change from Irish Local Government Officials Union, to Local Government and Public Services Union to the present Irish Municipal, Public and Civil Trade Union (IMPACT) embracing many strands of the public service. The name of James Power and union affairs are synonymous in Co. Waterford".

James served as Branch Cathaoirleach for over 20 terms, was NEC delegate up to the mid seventies and has a very creditable forty plus years of committee service behind him.

"It is fitting therefore", the conference was told, "that sterling service of the type which James has rendered to us, the members of this union, be acknowledged and marked in some fitting way". As the National Secretary, Al Butler presented James with his certificate, delegates, many of whom are friends of long standing, gave him a sustained standing ovation.

In his reply, James thanked the delegates for their warm reception and said that the presentation came as a very pleasant surprise to him.

Recalling some of his memories of "active service", James said he was sad-

dened that some members with whom he had attended conference over the years and who had rendered valuable service to the union "had strayed from the fold".

"It is my earnest wish", said James, "that they would again resume membership of a union which had served their interests well over the years".

At a time when it is difficult to find people to serve in many voluntary organisations, it is unlikely that James' record of attendance at Annual Conference or in service at branch level will ever be surpassed.

On Saturday last 27th May fifteen athletes from the Ard Scoil made the trip to Limerick to take part in the Munster Schools Athletic Championship. This was the largest single contingent from any girls school in East Munster. With 300 m to go, however, she changed gear and passed the others with a burst of speed that surprised

even herself and despite a late rally on the home straight by Caroline Daly, Deirdre came home a clear winner and claimed her first Munster Track Title in a new personal best of 11.00 and an excellent performance in wet and blustery conditions and an improvement of 36 seconds in four weeks.

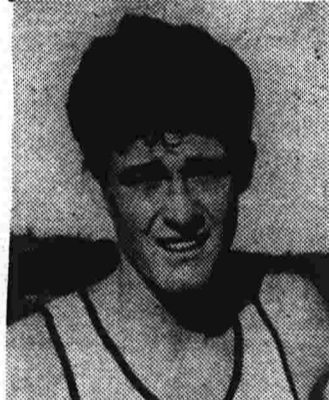

DEALING WITH LOSING

Helping children to deal with defeat is a perennial problem in school sport. While losing to an adult can be disappointing, to a young child it can seem like the end of the world! There is a great responsibility on the (supposedly) more mature and experienced adult to deal with this situation. Here are some helpful hints for parents.

Little can be done in the immediate post-defeat period. Just be with the child and don't talk very much! Make sure, later on, to come back to the feelings the child has and explore them.

Accept the child's feeling of loss. If it is a team game, inquire if the child feels he let down the others. Reassure him that he did his best.

Most children are quite resilient. While losing does sting, make sure they know there's another day for them!

Losing is part of life. While it may hurt a parent, realise the positive value to the child of learning to cope with these negative feelings.

The main point to communicate to these children is that, while their performance that day might have been inadequate, the children themselves are always valued just for what they are. This is the essential between unconditional and conditional love!

All in all losing is a difficult situation for both parents and children.

Also there are the outstanding senior football ties involving, Sliabh gCua and Newtown and Ballinacourty versus Bonmahon, which had to be put back because of players being involved with county teams.

For some clubs, the weekend will be a time of decision, as defeat will most likely mean an end to their hopes for 1995. For others the results can guarantee them a place in the k/o stages of the championships.

For the ordinary follower who is just looking for entertainment it will provide the opportunity of forgetting the Tipperary game, which is now history and is better forgotten anyway.

S.H.C. LISMORE V DUNHILL

This game should see Lismore get a further two points that will strengthen their challenge for the title. Their display on Saturday night last looked good enough to rate them as warm favourites to beat Dunhill who are now virtually out of contention following their third defeat when losing to passage last weekend.

Defeat in this one would leave Lismore with no further interest in the championship and I'm sure they won't allow this to happen.

BALLINACOURTY V BONMAHON

They meet for their first time ever in the championship and that makes this one quite interesting for both sides when they meet at Stradbally on Sunday evening. clubs today, makes no other result predictable. As far as I know, these clubs have not met at senior level since Clonea decided to go back up to senior ranks.

WESTERN BOARD GAMES

The Divisional Board, who may find themselves under some pressure if the county junior hurling team continues to make progress, are making every effort to press ahead and plan to play as many junior games as possible over the next two weeks. This coming weekend a total of twelve teams will be in action in junior hurling and after this round, a number of clubs will begin to find their direction and those with a third defeat on the trot can start looking forward to next year. On Saturday evening the Brickeys, who have suffered two defeats already, can look to this one as their chance of starting a winning sequence as Cappoquin's second string are an untried outfit and may have to rely on a number of minors. This game is at Colligan.

Recent form leaves little option but to name Kilgobinet as warm favourites to beat Melleray in their tie which is listed as the Saturday evening match at Cappoquin. Kilgobinet are one of the strong contenders in this championship.

SUNDAY GAMES

Such are the pairings in the four junior hurling games fixed for Sunday, that picking the likely winners is not easy. They are the kind of games that can go any way.

Kilrossanty and Ballinameela will play the third of the four games at Fraher field on Sunday afternoon, and this I would rate as the pick of the junior games over the weekend. Both have victories to their credit this year and have shown good form as well. Kilrossanty went missing last year, when the majority of their hurlers transferred to Clonea. Now they have all come back and the club is doing nicely in the championship. Ballinameela are a team to be reckoned with as their recent wins over Ardmore and Modeligo, clearly show. They will be favourites here.

Trial By Television

As every reader already knows, a major controversy erupted throughout the county last week when it was announced that Trainee Garda Peter Queally was to have his graduation deferred for three months because of his involvement in the fracas during the game between Waterford and Tipperary at Pairc Ui Caoimh last Sunday week.

Obviously the Garda authorities took this action, either because it was seen on television or because the incident was reported in some other way.

To say that gaeldom in Waterford was outraged by the announcement, would be putting it mildly. Clubs and individuals from very many areas were in contact with the County Board to act on the matter and try to have Peter Queally's punishment cancelled. I know that everything possible was done, and as everyone has seen and heard, the County Board Chairman, P. J. Ryan did as much as any one man could do to have the decision reversed. Other members of the executive also made representations in the matter, without success.

The general feeling about the matter is that the Garda Authorities over reacted to what was shown on television. The decision has understandably angered people everywhere and it has embarrassed the rank and file members of the force, very many of whom continue to give outstanding service to the G.A.A. in different roles.

The whole affair has brought a new dimension to the televising of games and now players who hold appointments in any of the services of the Government will feel conscious of the fact that while playing in televised matches, they will be all the time under the spotlight by this monitoring watchdog.

The fact of the matter seems to be that if the match had not been shown on T.V. there would have been no controversy.

As a further sequel to the

affair, the Munster Council discussed the matter at their meeting on Thursday last and have named three players from each county to appear at an investigation of the matter to be held on next Wednesday night in Limerick. Both County Boards have also been summoned to attend. Ironically, Peter Queally is not one of the six players who are summoned to attend.

At the meeting of the Council on Thursday, both Tipperary and Waterford were fined £300 for unauthorised incursions on to the pitch by officials during the game.

OTHER RESULTS

ANOTHER BIG DEFEAT IN CORK

For the second Sunday in succession, Waterford supporters came away very disappointed from Pairc Ui Caoimh, having seen the senior and junior football teams very well beaten by Cork.

Cork are the reigning Munster champions and were the hottest of favourites to win this game very easily on home territory, so the outcome was no surprise. As happened on the previous Sunday, we were outclassed and therein lies the story of what happened. The message is that we have an awful long way to go before we will ever become serious challengers in the province.

The physical side of any future plan to develop and improve Waterford football is something that must be seriously looked at for a start. We seem to be always fielding teams in football without the necessary strength and power to match our opponents. Still it is very important that we also have to face the fact that height and weight are factors that help in winning football matches at this level.

Team manager, Timmy O'Keefe obviously had something like this in mind when interviewed after the game. He said that physically we were no match for Cork. It was good to hear him say also that Waterford were neither disheartened or disillusioned by the result.

JUNIOR DEFEAT

We were never at the races here and the scoring difference clearly shows the huge gap in standards between the counties. Personally, I believe that this is a grade that should be abolished as it is doing absolutely no good for football in any province. It is expensive and time consuming and is not worth all the bother. I feel it is something that the County Board should look at for the future.
