Hedgecutting Onus Now On Landowners

Waterford Co. Council is to take a sterner line with landowners who fail to lawfully maintain grass verges and hedges on land adjoining county roads.

That's the message from County Manager Donal Connolly who told last Monday's Council meeting that notices will be served on landowners who fail to shoulder this responsibility and eventual court action will be taken.

Mr Connolly said he had attended a meeting with the Irish Farmers Association where he had pointed out the new responsibility of landowners regarding the upkeep of hedges and verges on their land. He told the representatives that the Council is prepared to cooperate in future with farmers on this issue.

From July 1st to August 1st, limited hedge/verge cutting will be carried out

Bord Pleanala To Decide On 'Beeches' Development

Hackett Estate, commonly known as "the Beeches", O'Connell Street will now be decided by An Bord Pleanala following an appeal lodged against the proposed housing development on the derelict site.

News of the planning application for a 15 house private estate at 'the Beeches' generated much excitement among local residents who consider the O'Connell Street site to be a long familiar eyesore in the town.

The application which proposes the construction of 15 three-bedroomed semi-detached houses complete with garages, was lodged last February by Cork based architect Tony Dennehy on behalf of Richard O'Hanlon, Bishopstown, Lismore.

As part of the proposed development, the once stately building, now sadly di-lapidated, which has stood on 'the Beeches' site for the last 158 years would be demolished.

THE APPEAL

Last April Dungarvan UDC issued a notification of the decision to grant permission but prior to the deadline of April 27th, an appeal was lodged by Elizabeth and Matthew Connolly who reside in the house next door to the proposed housing estate at 'Ravensdale', Shandon.

The appeal against the granting of planning permission was lodged with An Bord Pleanala who in turn informed the Urban Coun-

The future of the former cil. In the appeal, Mr. and Mrs. Connolly state that the applicant, Richard O'Hanlon failed to indicate in the site/layout plan, the proper position of an extremely high sycamore tree situated in the eastern boundary of the development site. The appellants maintain that this tree is indicated on the site/layout plan as being situated within the development area (house no. 2).

The couple also appeal against the proximity of the proposed houses no. 1-3 to their residence and point out that the granting of planning permission permits the erection of these houses at a distance of 16 metres from their residence. "The normal distance from an existing residence in a development of this type is 30-40 metres as per Foras Forbatha 1983 recommendations", reads the appeal.

Speaking to the 'Dungar-van Leader', Acting Town Clerk Joe O'Flaherty said the development is now in the hands of An Bord Pleanala who have a total of 4 months to come to a final decision.

Whatever the outcome however, Mr. O'Hanlon already has planning permission for the erection of 18 houses on the O'Connell Street site. He was granted this permission by the UDC in May of 1993 but later decided to change the original house plan and layout to allow for an increased size of 1,366 sq. feet per

Pests — Wage Your Own War Of The Roses

Roses are not only a favourite bloom - they are also popular with garden pests.

So it is vital that gardeners stay vigilant and hit back at the intruders as soon as they appear.



One warning sign is a rolledup leaf, indicating that sawfly

larvae or tortrix moth caterpillars have moved in. These can be simply cut away without resorting to insecticides.

Unfortunately, nibbled flower buds and leaves mean more serious effort as they show that chafers and slugworms are feeding and the tree needs spraying.

Even more difficult to dislodge is red spider mite, which infests the underside of leaves, particularly when conditions are hot and dry.

They cause leaves to yellow and drop, weakening and disfiguring the tree.

Diligent spraying of both sides of the tree leaves is needed to rid your stock of these pests.

But this painstaking effort will at least go towards keeping the season's second wave of pests such as greenfly at bay.

Trouble does not only come from the insect world either. We are still prone to humid and dewy conditions at the moment so fungal infection is a risk. Hit back during June with a couple of applications of systemic fungicide.

Meanwhile, don't neglect the staple requirement of the rose during this month - regular watering and a

You can help by applying a mulch of peat, pulverised bark or even lawn clippings to the soil surface around the trees, thereby keeping moisture in and the heads of weeds down.

Dying or infected blooms should be promptly and cleanly cut away along with the trailing stem above the next series of buds or shoots, so that the rose keeps blooming strongly.

The display can be enhanced by an application of rose fertiliser on the soil immediately above the root circle, which is denser away from the point where the main stem enters the ground.

Work this in with a hand fork and then water gently to get the goodness into the plant promptly.

For rose novices, the family broadly divides into several categories:

- hybrid tea known for large showy blooms
- floribunda less showy but more prolific bloomers
- ramblers
- climbers

For my money there is no better display than a climber trained around a cottage door or pergola, but the first two types are the most popular and especially the hybrid tea, which can produce some spectacular flowers.

Experienced growers can enhance the display by 'disbudding' or pinching out side buds to allow the end bud to grow to mammoth size, but this practice should not be tried with other rose types.

A QUESTION OF *'TER WARDENS*

Deasy in the Dail recently regarding the appointment of litter wardens.

Public Lecture On Eczema

For the first time, the National Eczema Society will host a free public lecture in Kilkenny on matters relating to the management and control of eczema. Ending the speculations and rumours on the controversial dumping site, Co. Manager Donal Connolly said no discussions have taken place between officials of both Councils. At the moment, Waterford Co. Council is still in discussion with Waterford Corporation for a joint landfill site. He hoped to get back to Council members with a report on this joint venture by September next. Should South Tipperary Councils locate suitable dump site in the county, Mr. Connolly submitted that they would then have to apply to Waterford Co. Council for planning permission.

In reply to Deputy Deasy's question, the Minister for Finance, Ruairi Quinn TD, stated: "The po-sition is that the Waterford Maritime Unit, in common with the units located in Dublin, Cork, Limerick and Sligo, is used mainly to act on information received and to support intelligence gathering operations. TOMORROW THE FEAST OF CORPUS **CHRISTI**

Till the thirteenth century the Church had not thought of establishing a special festival in honour of the Blessed Sacrament, being satisfied with celebrating on Holy Thursday the institution of this divine mystery. At that period, however, as heresiarchs dared to attack the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, and numerous miracles and special revelations had occurred to concentrate the attention of the Christinan world on this dogma, Pope Urban IV, decreed, in 1244, that a special feast should be instituted, which by its solemnity and pomp, should be as a protestation in favour of the unwavering faith of the church, and should, at the same time, offer an honourable reparation for the blasphemies of impious men. But this pontiff happening to die soon after, the Bill had not all the effect intended, and it was only after the Council of Vienne, held in 1332, that the Feast the Blessed Sacrament, or Corpus Christi, was definitively established throughout the Catholic world. The Holy Council of Trent newly approved in a formal and earnest manner both the worship itself and its attendant pomp. The Feast of Corpus Christi is then a solemn act of faith in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Eucharist; and this belief, to which the Church attaches an importance of the highest moment, is the very ground work of Catholicity, or rather is the very essence of all Christianity; for if Jesus Christ be not present really and corporeally under elements of bread and wine, as He has Himself formally told us, His word is no longer reliable, He is no longer God, and there remains of religion naught save a beautiful but sterile philosophy, which each one can remodel after his own mind. If it be allowable, as Protestants contend to interpret in a purely allegorical sense words of such clearness that there are not, throughout the whole of the Gospel, any more positive or precise, it is permissible to interpret everything at Will, and the Gospel remains an enigma, the solution whereof is nowhere to be found. It is furthermore the intention of the Church to make an avowal of her love and gratitude to Our Saviour Jesus Christ, and to offer reparation for all the profanations and sacrileges to which this adorable Sacrament has been exposed.

Deputy Kenneally Retirements at Ard On Serious **Problem Of Coastal Erosion**

by Deputy Brendan Kenneally on the serious problem of coastal erosion in parts of Co. Waterford—
"As matters stand at pre-

sent, primary responsibility for coastal protection lies with the property owner, whether it be a private individual or a Local Authority. The Dept. of the Marine's role is to work in conjunction with the Local Authorities on the management of the coastal zone rather than individual sites.

"Unless and until we get away from this concept, we will never be able to seriously tackle coastal erosion in this country. Land owners and Local Authorities are in a helpless position. They cannot cope with the power and energy of the sea and the resources of Government are needed if a serious attempt is to be made to tackle this worrying and escalating problem. I support the call by our spokesman, Michael Smith, for the setting up of a National Coastal Authority within an existing

Government Department. If we are serious about this problem, this needs to be done as a matter of urgency.

"I believe that there is not

The following is a speech a sufficient awareness of the scourge of coastal erosion. A study was undertaken in 1992 by the County & City Engineers' Association which showed that out of a total national coastline of 5,800 kms., over 1500 kms. are at risk from erosion and some 490 kms. required immediate attention at a cost of £125 million. These are the figures quoted by the Minister for the Marine and they don't appear to have been updated since 1992. This in itself reflects the lack of urgency there is in relation to the problem.

"Nationally, a total of £5.092m. has been included over the period 1994-1999. This amount alone would be needed in my own county of Waterford where about 170 kms. of the coastline is in some need of protection.

"Waterford County Council spent £984,404 on coastal protection works in 1990/91. Of this amount, the Department of the Marine provided £414,250 grant aid, £60,000 was expended from Dept. of Environment grants and £510,154 was borrowed by the Council. The effect of these borrowings on the Council's ability to fund other services has been im-

being placed on coastal Local Authorities in this regard. I feel that protection of the nation's coastline with its attendant advantages for tourism, agriculture, etc., is a national and not a local responsibility. It is an essential ingredient of the infrastructure supporting economic development and it should be 100% funded by the State, in common with other infrastructure, such as roads, water supply and sewerage,

In Waterford the following areas need to be protected Clonea, Ardmore, The Cunnigar, Bonmahon, Abbeyside, Tramore, Bur-Woodstown, rows. Annestown, Ballyvoile, Whiting Bay, Dunmore East, Passage East, Kilfarrassy, Garrarus, Ballymacart, Ballinagoul, Ballyquin, Ballinard, Glencorrin and Rathmovlan.

"I wish to mention two areas in particular. The first one is The Cunnigar just outside Dungarvan. If this is breached the complexion of the whole town of Dungarvan will change. It is the protection for the town. As far as I am aware it is not an immediate problem but if it is not attended to now it can be a problem in the future.

"The other area I would like to speak about is at Ballyquin, which I visited on Saturday, June 3 last. Ballyquin is a couple of miles from Ardmore which was Ireland's tidiest town in 1993. I hadn't been out to Ballyquin for some time and was appalled at the damage that was inflicted since my last visit.

There is one small farmhouse quite close to the edge of the coast and daily it is getting closer. The particular family involved are watching their farm being eaten away literally inch by inch. The extent of coastal erosion here has progressively worsened over recent years and unless something is done wiped out in ten to twenty years and the house will literally fall into the sea.

"There now seems to be no real difference between Spring tides and slack tides and that means that this land is being buffeted all the time. I have been making repeated representations to various Ministers about this matter but all to no avail.

"I feel that the Coast Protection Act 1963 is outmoded, inflexible and unsuitable and I would urge the Minister to replace it with more modern and comprehensive legislation."

Plastic Drivi Licence

As from July 1, 1996, licence which EU member European Union countries may introduce the plastic driving licence, resembling the credit cards issued by banks.

The fact is that the European Commission recently proposed the introduction of a standard European plastic driving states could use to replace paper licences from July 1,

Launched in 1986 and modified in 1991, the Community model for national driving licences is currently in the form of a document printed on pink paper and folded in three sections. The directive would only come into

force if adopted by the EU Council which is made up of Ministers of the 15 EU countries.

The proposed standard European plastic driving licence can be used throughout the EC and could incorporate a microchip at some future

Members States however would be under no obligation to adopt the plastic driving licence. Countries wanting to retain the current model may do so.

The service, to which all are welcome, will be conducted by Very Rev. Cecil Weekes, Dean of Lismore, and will, in remembrance, recall the great work of the religious and lay men and women who laboured tirelessly to alleviate the hardship and misery of the many thousands of victims of the failure of the potato crop in 1845 and following years, at, in some cases, the cost of their own lives. One such was Rev. William Wakeham, Rector of Kin-

The interdenominational salebeg, who died in 1847 having contracted "famine-fever" in his ministring to his parishioners and neighbours as his tombstone in Kinsalebeg old cemetery Jeremiah Hally, Parish Priest ministered in Dungarvan for over fifty years, sought all all government work schemes to provide employment for the needy - Fr. Hally's Road and Bridge on the northern slopes of the Drum Hills commemorate his great efforts. In Ring the memory of the Rev. James Alcock, then Rector of the Parish is held in high esteem and was officially commemorated there last year during Dail na Mumhan. Fr. Twomey's Road in present day Dungarvan and Fr. Twomey's Well recall the labours of the Augustinian who sands of hungry famine vicblessed, and administered tims were fed, secured

the last rites to the dead being removed from the nearby workhouse for burial at Relig-a-tSleibhe. Rev. Morgan Crofton, Rector of Dungarvan, died in 1849, weakened by the exertions of his ministry. Members of the Religious Society of Friends were also prominent in famine distress relief work and assisted financially the Dungarvan Famine Relief Committee, of which Fr. Hally was Chairman. The Great Famine, who fishing techniques and ministered in Dungarvan for weatherproof clothing to the fishing communities in possible aid and availed of Ring, and assistance in obtaining larger boats, enabled the fishermen to venture further to sea in safety and secure larger and more varied catches resulting in better prices returns. Also at that time Fr. Fogarty, P.P., Lismore, who had earlier been curate in Dungarvan, and, in Lismore, had been largely responsible for bringing the Benedictine Monks from Rathmore in Co. Kerry to found their great Monastery of Mount Melleray where many thouworks schemes for Lismore area as did Fr. O'Connor, then P.P. in Kilgobinet.

The many known and unknown, religious, doctors. nurses, administrators and others who laboured to alleviate starvation and suffering at a tragic time in our national history will all be commemorated in this Service of Remembrance on Wednesday, 28th June.



THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

BALED SILAGE

While much of the early first cut silage is now made, baled silage making is only starting. There was a huge increase in the amount of baled silage made in the past 2 to 3 years, mainly because of poor haymaking weather.

Baled silage is most suited to

(i) Where light cuts are taken, as the charge is on a per bale rather than a per acre basis

(ii) Good wilting conditions, as the cost is lower due to fewer bales per acre from wilted material and good preservation can be obtained without additives.

(iii) Farms where there are no silos.

(iv) Where small quantities of surplus grass can be conserved as silage late in the season.

DRY MATTER

Baled silage is basically a wilting system. In the absence of wilting, problems can arise with silage preservation, effluent production, wrapping and bale shape stability. Cost also escalates at low dry matter because of the higher number of bales per acre compared to wilted material.

For example a 12 tonne crop of grass baled directly will produce about 18 bales per acre, which at a baling and wrapping cost of £5/bale, amounts to £90/acre. If the same crop is wilted to 30% D.M., the number of bales will be reduced to about 11 per acre which brings the baling and wrapping cost back to £55/acre. Wilting eliminates the need for an additive to aid preservation, even in leafy crops, provided the dry matter is got up to about 24% D.M. In relation to effluent, there should be no accumulation in baled silage, at or above about 23% D.M. This is a lower threshold D.M. level for effluent production than in clamp silage, as the compaction in bales is only general, therefore, aim at dry matter level to 25% to 35% D.M. at calving

DISADVANTAGES

The main disadvantages with a wilting system are:

(a) It is weather dependent.

(b) Field losses occur during the wilting period.

(c) Feed utilisation is lower.

Trials by Dermot Forristal at Oakpark show that any treatment that spreads the swath out over the total area speeds

In good weather a swath left undisturbed after mowing is likely to increase in dry matter by 2 - 3 units over 24 hours. Tedding twice will at least double the drying rate.

SHEEP DIPPING

Ewes need to have at least 2-3 weeks of wool regrowth before dipping. The fob should be done on a dry, but not very hot day. Dipping is a job that can be done well or done badly. The same amount of work is involved either way, but there is no comparison in the result.

Make up the bath according to the dip manufacturers' recommendation, if you do not know the capacity of your tub, you can calculate it as follows:

Average Width (ft.) x Average Length (ft.) x Liquid Depth (ft.) x 6.25, gives your answer in gallons.

Always replenish the wash according to the specifications on the container as dipping proceeds. Most unsatisfactory dipping results from non-adherence to this aspect, or to insufficient time in the bath ideally one minute but not less than 45 seconds.

POLLUTION

Spent dip is a pollutant. Dips which contain Phenois are particularly dangerous around rivers and streams. Dispose of spent dip by dilution and spraying from vacuum tanker -1 part dip to 3 parts slurry or water.

The R.E.P.S. Scheme insists that outlets at the bottom of dipping tanks must be permanently sealed. Always were protective clothing when dipping.

POST DIPPING LAMENESS

Non-phenol dips need a Bacteriostat, if the wash is to be used on consecutive days. This is important - postdipping lameness can be a significant problem where it occurs. Inclusion of Alum or Zinc Sulphate in the wash at 10 Lbs. or 5 Lbs. respectively per 100 gallons will control mycotic dermatitis (lumpy wool). This condition has become very common in recent years.

SPRING BARLEY

There is a wide variation in growth stage and vigour of crops. Early sown crops are now at full flag leaf and growing well. Those late sown were slow to establish and develop and are now at ground first node stage. Mildew is widespread and severe in unsprayed varieties. Rynochosporium is present at trace levels in localised areas and BYDV symptoms are widespread at low levels. Fungicide choice and rates will depend on mildew levels.

FARMING LEADER

IFA Dairy Chairman Says VAT On Temporary Leasing Causing **Unnecessary Confusion**

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Gerald Curran, expressed concern at the level of unnecessary confusion among farmers on the issue of the VAT treatment of temporary leasing of milk quota through co-ops.

The IFA man stressed that following clarification from the Revenue Commissioners, it was a fact that very few dairy farmers would be in any way affected by VAT on quota leasing.

He pointed out that most dairy farmers are not registered for VAT and that they will not be liable for VAT when leasing temporary

quota to their co-op. Only register for VAT. farmers earning more than £20,000 from non-agricultural services, such as leasing or contracting, are obliged to get a VAT registration.

The IFA man explained that the Revenue Commissioners have, however, granted a concession whereby over and above his agricultural income, a dairy farmer may earn up to £20,000 from temporary leasing alone, and earn additional income from other service activities (provided these do not exceed £20,000) without becoming liable to

A non-registered dairy farmer who earns more than £20,000 by leasing his quota to his co-op must register for VAT. To earn this level of income, the farmer in question would have to lease more than 74,000 gallons at 27p per gallon, a situation that will only arise for a small proportion of dairy sarmers.

A farmer who leases quota from his co-op will not have to pay VAT, whether or not he/she is VAT registered. This is because the co-op carrying out this quota redistribution

is acting as the agent of the Minister for Agriculture, who is exempt from the point of view of VAT.

In the very few instances where VAT is charged by VAT registered farmers, the VAT element will not result in dearer temporary leasing. In fact, all the indications are that the temporary leasing price will be a maximum 27p per gallon, including 21% VAT.

"Farmers who are leasing quota with land are not affected by these rules, as land and quota transactions are exempt from VAT," Gerald Curran concluded.

1995 May Be Best Ever For Milkers Says Dairy Board

This year will be one of the best, if not the best ever, for our dairy farmers, according to Irish Dairy Board (IDB) managing director, Dr. Noel Cawley.

The board has been returning the highest price ever to co-ops at the equivalent of £1.24 per gallon — and it looks as if current prices paid to farmers should continue for the important peak supply months of May and

This good news emerged when IDB's impressive results for 1994 were announced recently. It had a record surplus before tax of just over £19 million, an increase of 4.3 per cent on the previous year, even though turnover was down by 4 per cent to £1.16 bil-

It was quite clear from Dr. Cawley's report that the board is not afraid of the challenges that lies ahead. Record prices for milk cannot last forever, especially with so much change taking place through both CAP reform and GATT, but the board is actively involved in an assessment of future CAP policy and market framework for the dairy in-

This means a change of course in order to tackle any problems that may arise. In fact, IDB is at present undergoing an entire refocussing of its dairy export strategy, especially as regards product mix and market outlets, making sure that there are no unpleasant surprises down the road in an already competitive world market.

In overall terms, said Dr. Cawley, the Irish Dairy Board is well structured to face the demands of the future, whatever they may be.

THE 1995 FINANCE **BILL PROVISIONS**

The Bill provides for special tax treatment of profits

resulting from the disposal of livestock due to statutory disease eradication programmes. The special treatment is in two parts.

1. - Profit (reactor sales and reactor compensation less the book value of animals) will be excluded from income for tax purposes in the accounting period in which the disposals took place.

This profit will instead be deemed to arise in two equal instalments in each of the next two account periods.

Example: 1995 Opening value of livestock, £45,000; Reactor Sales and Compensation, £54,000; "Profit", £9,000. This profit figure of £9,000 will not form part of income for the 1995 accounting period. In 1996 £4,500 will be deemed to arise, and will be included as income for tax purposes.

2. — 100 per cent stock relief will apply in the two year deferred periods, subject to the amount reinvested in replacement stock.

The special allowance will apply to disposals which took place on or after April 6, 1993.

Following the publication of the Finance Bill, ICMSA met the Department of Finance and Revenue Commissioners representatives. Among the changes to the Bill sought by ICMSA were:

1. — The special provisions should apply in cases of disposals of part of the herd, rather than being confined to total depopulation;

this is required in any event in the case of Brucellosis.

2. — The deferral period should be longer than two

3. - The two equal instalments provision is too rigid and may not provide for all cases where farmers are rebuilding their herds following disease.

Following the ICMSA meeting the Minister for Finance introduced an amendment at the Committee Stage of the Bill, which allows the special measure to apply in the case of Brucellosis where all eligible are disposed of, even though male animals may remain in

Despite detailed suggestions by ICMSA on how the special measure could apply in cases where part only of the herd is removed, the requirement for total depopulation remain for TB.



JUSTICE

Let me say straight away that I com-mend the Munster Council action on that flare up at Pairc Uí Chaoimh on 21 May. For the life of me I cannot understand those who go on about "trial by television" or who claim that the investigation was, in effect, passing a vote of no confidence in the referee.

Since 1990 Rule 148 of Treoraí Oifigiúil specifically empowers the relevant authority (the Munster Council in this case) to view video evidence in investigating incidents so trial by television is nothing new at all. This rule has been invoked throughout the country over the last 5 years.

Have we forgotten that well-known Derry forward Damien Barton was suspended after the Derry/Tyrone National League game on the evidence of a video of the game. The referee hadn't spotted the foul and Damien, in fact, was invited to use the video evidence to clear himself. The Games Administration Committee thus acknowledged the importance of video film in identifying the misdeameanour. There was no protest from Derry or the player suspended.

In the Dublin/Clare All Ireland senior football semi final three years ago two players, Dave Foran and Tom Morrissey, committed personal fouls. The referee failed to spot either incident but the cameras revealed the truth and both received suspensions. Both Clare and Dublin accepted the punishments.

In 1993 when Derry and Cork met in the All Ireland senior football final there were two well-publicised incidents. The video evidence exonerated Tony Davis (he had been sent off) and convicted Niall Cahalane (he clashed with Joe Brolly early in the game). Belated justice was done.

Last year's O'Byrne Cup match between Laois and Dublin at Portlaoise was marred by an incident involving be done.

quite a few players. Although the referee took no action the Leinster Council subsequently imposed suspensions on the chief protagonists after viewing a video of the game.

Very few referees - good ones I mean arrogate to themselves the Almighty's prerogative of seeing and knowing everything. All should accept that, as Ter-ence Murray remarked, "the ref, can only see so much on the day". Or as the Kerry referee Tommy Sugrue said "people do get away with things and if video helps to stop that I don't have a problem". Of course, I'd expect nothing else from experienced honourable officials like them. They would reject the opinion of the unnamed Waterford official "whose anger could not be concealed" that the match referee had been over ruled and made to look as though he failed to do his duty.

In no way did he fail in his duty. In the heat of battle (unfortunate choice of words) he couldn't always be certain of the precise identity or extent of the involvement of up to 10 players. He didn't wish to apply the advice of the indulgent mother to the teacher in regard to the disciplining of her unruly son: "if he gives you trouble slap the boy next to him". It was important that the guilty parties were clearly identified and justly punished.

I have too great a regard for the great game of hurling to do other than to applaud those whose responsibility it is to maintain discipline and who are determined that our games aren't traduced.

Hurling, an old player was fond of reminding me, is a man's game but not a madman's. Those with a genuine sense of fair play and a care for our Irish games should fully support all efforts to present them to the highest standards. Not alone should justice be done; it should be seen (on video if necessary) to



THE PLAYING RULES

On a recent verbal check with ten players I discovered that only one of the ten players questioned has ever seen the playing rules booklet. The other nine did not know what I was talking about. In fairness to all ten players in question they all had a reasonable knowledge of the playing rules but not enough to profess themselves experts. They were prepared to be guided by the referee during games.

Of eight team mentors asked only two ever read the playing rules booklet and all agreed that the sideline pleading, castigating etc. of referees has more to do with trying to win the game than to do with their knowledge of the rules of the game. All eight were most fair and agreed that once the least of battle was over they appreciated that the referee's task is a most difficult one particularly when one considers that the referee has to be impartial. Now wouldn't it be somewhat of a help if the players and team mentors brushed up on the playing rules. Recently in these notes I posed the following:-

Did you know that if an attacker is too close to the ball when a team mate is taking a penalty kick in football or a penalty puck in hurling the referee shall? Well now which did you

Under rule 4 which governs technical fouls under rules for Foul Play Rule 4 .11 states:- For hurling

'A'. For a player on the team awarded a free puck to stand or move nearer than 20 m to the ball before it is struck:

'B' for a player on the team awarded a side line puck to stand or move nearer than 13 m to the ball before it is struck:

'C' for a player on the team awarded a penalty puck to be less than 20 m from the ball or inside the 20 m line before the ball is struck:

Penalty for above:

Free puck from where foul occurred with exceptions under rule 2.2

For Football:

'A' for a player on the team awarded a free kick or a side line kick to be less than 13 m from the ball before it is kicked:

'B' for a player on the team awarded a penalty kick to be less than 13 m from the ball or inside the 20 m line before the ball is kicked:

Penalty for above fouls: free kick from where foul occurred with exception under rule 2.2.

So there you have it. Very simple. The Referee's task of coarse is to award the free. Very easy from the stand or the terraces, very easy from the side line where your view - whatever that might be will receive full backing from you fellow mentors. But not so easy when you are on the spot as a referee. Can your imagine giving a free out i team who are two points down and about to take a penalty kick just because an attacker moved inside the 20 m line before the ball was struck or kicked. Yet that is the rule.

Other technical fouls are: Hurling - To take puck out from outside the small rectangle. Penalty - A 65 m free is awarded.

Football - To take kick out after a score from outside 20 m line or to take kick-out after a wide from outside the small rectangle. Penalty Cancel kick out and throw in the ball on the 20 m line in front of scoring space.

Munster Council Impose Penalties ceeding are very remote in

Four players, two from Tipperary and two from Waterford were suspended and each of the counties were fined £500 after the Munster Council had spent almost three hours debating the referee's report and a video of the Tipperary/Waterford championship game at Cork almost four weeks ago.

Paul Delaney was given three months suspension, Michael Ryan was sidelined for two months and John Leahy was severely cautioned about his future conduct. The two suspended Tipperary players had been 'booked' by referee Terrance Murray following the fracas.

Waterford player, Peter Queally was also suspended for three months and Brian Greene was given one month. The other two Waterford players, Ger Harris and Tony Browne were exonerated. Because of a cock up in the announcement from the meeting, it was reported in the daily papers on Thursday that Ger Harris had been suspended for one month. The inaccuracy was corrected on the following day. Both County Board's chief officers were also summoned and Waterford

Three players were sum- was represented by P.J. moned from Tipperary and Ryan, County Board chairman and Seamus Grant, Sec-

> Tony Mansfield was present at the request of the players and spoke on their behalf, as did the Board officers. Canon Fogarty was present at the request of the Tipperary players whose stiff suspension will keep both Delaney and Ryan out of the semi final against Limerick and possibly the Munster final. According to Tipperary sources, it seems certain that they will appeal to the Management Committee against these suspensions on Saturday next.

> Waterford's County Board approach to the matter was due to be decided at their monthly meeting on Monday night of this week. I feel that wiser counsel will prevail and that Waterford, at least, will decide to let it be and not prolong the agony, as the chances of an appeal suc-

this instance. An appeal by the County Board would have to be against the £500 fine, or against the use of video evidence and ignoring the referee's report. They do not have the right to appeal on behalf of the individuals concerned.

My view is that in all the circumstances we did not come off too badly, as the television shots of the indiscretions did show that some of our players were involved in the fracas. Central Council or the Management Committee are most unlikely to see it any differently. Appealing the penalties now will only keep us in the headlines for a while longer, and goodness knows, we have got the headlines for all the wrong reasons for too

What is very disconcerting about the whole affair is that television has brought a new, and perhaps dangerous dimension into our games and whatever they show as visual evidence after a match, can supersede whatever report is submitted by the appointed referee on the day. Up until now the appointed referee and his six subordinates, four umpires and two linesmen were the sole judges of misconduct, or indiscretions, etc. One might also ask if we are now going to have situations where a county being beaten by a single score, can have recourse to video evidence to prove that the referee, or umpire or linesman erred in making a judgment that might have cost them an equalising or winning score. The final point that I am

going to make on the whole matter is that I cannot find a rule which allowed the Council to date the suspensions, in this case, to the date of the players last game. Paul Delaney was obviously advised not to play with his club, pending the hearing of the case, therefore his three months suspension will end a couple of weeks before Peter Queally's suspension, eventhough they were both punished for a similar incident, in the same match on the same day and at the same meeting. We might hear more on that

Hedgecutting Onus Now On Landowners

clared. Highlighting the considerable green growth which has occurred over the past few months, the Nire Valley Councillor submitted that the narrow 10 ft wide roads in his area were now impassable.

"Avonmore lorries have refused to collect milk from a number of farmers in the area," Cllr. O Riain added. **CLEAR DYKES AND**

GULLIES Also joining in the heated discussion, Cllr. Nora Flynn said the Council ought to prioritise the clearance of dykes, inlets and gullies, which she maintained was the main problem behind

the rapid deterioration of

non-national roads. There are farmers who are taking up their hedgecutting responsibilities and some parts of the county are a credit to them", she said.

Thoroughly disillusioned with the current state of affairs, Cllr. Austin Flynn said the enormous increase in service charges, adopted in the 1995 estimates had been eroded by the Environment Minister who had cut back the state grants by £422,900. "We're not fighting the case at national level", stressed Cllr. Flynn.

"The Minister has pulled our teeth", he declared, " he didn't give us money for roads, and he didn't give us the means to pull our own money in by disallowing cut offs".

Agreeing with his namesake, Clir. Nora Flynn, on the subject of clearing the dykes and gullies, Cllr. Flynn urged the Council to concentrate on these two problems and let the landowners do what they are supposed to do.
WAKE UP CALL

Admitting that he felt very badly over the hike in service charges and the "gross-ly unfair" cut in grant aid, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson told members to forget the Minister's 10 year plan. Environment Minister Brendan Howlin had informed Dáil Eireann that he was examining the county road situation and would be reporting back to the Dail with a view to a possible 10 year programme to restore non national roads.

"Our roads won't be there in ten years time", warned Cllr. Wilkinson. "There's a heavy responsibility on the Minister to wake up and see what's happening".

DONKEY AND

CART ROADS

Describing many of Co. Waterford's back roads as being suitable for donkey and carts, Cllr. Paddy O' Callaghan warned of the damage caused by heavy

"County roads were not built for 40 tonne trucks ... they do more damage than

1,000 cars", he added. As regards a further increase in service charges in the '96 estimates, Cllr. O'Callaghan warned that the well is now dry.

CHARGES WERE

ESSENTIAL

Responding to the Council members concerns, Mr. Connolly said additional sources will have to be found for non-national

With regard to the 23% increase in domestic water charges and the 33 1/3% increase in refuse collection which was adopted by members in the estimates for '95, Mr. Connolly said these increased charges were essential or the Council would be in a 'diabolical situation'

As outlined in the Co. Engineer's road works scheme report for '95, Mr. Connolly said money will be channeled into drainage and side clearing in the Ardmore, Kilmacthomas, Lismore and Waterford area at a cost of £140,000. Complimenting those landowners who have already cut hedges and verges on their land, Mr. Connolly said it will take a period of reeducation for all landowners to comply with the new hedgecutting laws.
