New Ultra Modern Technical College For Dungarvan

In what can only be regarded as an unexpected and even dramatic u-turn, the Department of Education has reversed a decision of nine years ago and decided to give the official go-ahead to the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee to build a brand new, ultra modern, technical college on a green field site on the seafront in Dungarvan.

The decision was conveyed to a startled V.E.C. membership at a meeting in Dungarvan on Monday, but the change of heart by the Department received the unanimous support of the meeting. The committee was al-

ready at an advanced stage of planning a proposed £1m plus extension to the existing technical college in the town for which official approval had already been granted by the Department. However following a meeting between V.E.C. representatives and senior Department officials last week the offer of a modern new school came "out of the blue" from the officials and has now been grasped with both hands by the V.E.C.

It was back in 1986 that

Dungarvan Crying Out For New Industry

Despite the formidable presence of two of the country's industrial giants, Waterford Crystal and Waterford Foods, Dungarvan is a town now crying out for new industry.

With in excess of 1100 registered as unemployed Dungarvan hasn't attracted a major industry for more than a decade, and now local Fine Gael TD, Austin Deasy, is demanding that the Industrial Development Authority take immediate steps to "rectify the situation".

"There is a very great need for new industry in Dungarvan", Deputy Deasy told this week's meeting of the Urban Council. "There are two readily available sites within the urban area and every effort must be made to attract industry into

Psychiatric Nursing Posts To Be Advertised

The Minister of State at the Department of Health, Mr. Brian O'Shea T.D., has announced that the South Eastern Health Board will be advertising for 15 trainee psychiatric nursing posts this year.

The trainee psychiatric

nurses will be located in St. Otteran's Hospital and will commence training in October.

Mr. O'Shea stated that the advertisement for the posts will appear in the national press on Sunday, June 25, 1995.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Who is entitled to adoptive leave — does your employer pay you while you are on adoptive leave and what is the procedure for applying for it?

ANSWER

Women who adopt a child are entitled to 10 weeks adoptive leave starting on the date the child is placed for adoption. This right is also available to fathers where the father is the sole adopter. An additional 4 weeks optional leave may also be taken.

The right is to leave from employment, not to paid leave. Some employees may in fact get paid leave with the agreement of their employers. Adoptive parents who are entitled to adoptive leave and who satisfy the PRSI conditions may be paid Adoptive Benefit by the Department of Social Welfare.

The procedure for applying for adoptive leave is that:

1. — You must give your employer at least 4 weeks notice in writing of your intention to take adoptive leave. You must also give evidence of placement, or, in the case of a foreign adoption, the declaration of suitability issued to you from the Adoption Board.

2. — If you intend to return to work, you must advise your employer of your intention to return to work not earlier than 4 weeks and confirm this in writing not later than 2 weeks in advance of the date you expect to return.

3. — If you wish to take the optional 4 weeks additional leave, you must notify your employer in writing at least four weeks before you would be due to return to work if you were not taking the extra leave.

In the case of foreign adoptions some or all of the additional 4 weeks leave may be taken before the placement of the child, to allow for the parent(s) to become acquainted

with the child.

If the adoptive mother dies after giving notice of her intention to take adoptive leave or if she dies during that leave, the father is entitled to take the leave or the unused part of it.

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Sometimes a flaming nuisance

This month is often known as 'Flaming June' but gardeners sometimes don't intend it as a complement to the lovely weather.

Of course, June heat is good for plant growth and our relaxation in the garden, but too much sun can damage plants and scorch the lawn.

However, 'heat-stroke' can be minimised with a little effort.

In the case of the lawn:

- mow frequently if the lawn is growing fast, but never cut so close that the grass is easily scorched by the sun
- fork, spike or slit the lawn so rain and your watering can get to roots before the sun evaporates the moisture
- water at sensible times - early morning or dusk - to minimise evaporation
- install a rain butt fed from a downpipe on your house or an outbuilding - if it's the garden shed or another outhouse it should be closer to where you need the water
- be sensible about wear and tear on the lawn during hot weather. If it is dry then funning feet or laden wheel-barrows won't help.

If you follow these tips regularly during the warm weather they may save you the trouble of patching, raking and re-seeding or even laying an expensive and time-consuming new lawn.

But don't neglect other garden chores while caring for the lawn - there's lots more watering to be done elsewhere and if you do have to use a watering can then a garden butt really is a boon.

Use a fine hose on the can to emulate the effect of summer rain and avoid battering down the growing plants.

Again, water at the end of the day to make more of the water and your work. Use just enough to wet the surface of the soil without causing puddles.

Mulching will ease the burden: use pulverised bark, chopped straw or - plentiful by now - lawn clippings. This will keep dampness in the soil even if it doesn't always make for a beautiful-looking garden!

Other seasonal chores include attacking weeds as soon as they appear, preferably by hoeing or yanking out by hand.

If they become established and you risk leaving part in the ground - a problem with dock and dandelion - then 'paint' on weedkiller using a paintbrush to minimise risk to surrounding flowers. In the case of the lawn, you could also water in a selective weedkiller. Another strong grower now is likely to be the hedge, especially if it is a privet. Trim now and expect to give another 'haircut' in a month's time.

If you don't feel too over-worked on watering you might also consider sowing and raising vegetable seedlings this month.

French and runner beans, and spring onions for the summer salads are options and you could also sow carrots for autumn, broccoli and sprouts for winter, and cabbage for the spring.

Deasy Requests Extra Teacher For Cappagh School

The following question regarding the appointment of an extra teacher for Cappagh National School was raised by Deputy Austin Deasy in the Dáil recently.

To ask the Minister for Education, in view of the projected figures for Whitechurch, Ballinameela National School, Cappagh, for the school year

1995/1996 and subsequent years, if she will allow the appointment of a third assistant teacher, even on a temporary basis to overcome the staffing and pupil/teacher ratio problems that are likely to arise.

Education Minister Niamh Bhreathnach, T.D. replied "the staffing of a national school for a particular year is determined by the enrollment of the school on the

30th of September of the previous year.

The total enrollment of the school referred to by the Deputy, on the 30th of September, 1994, was 88 pupils, which warrants a staffing in the 1995/1996 school year of a Principal and 2 assistants.

I regret that it will not be possible to depart from agreed procedures in this case. Accordingly, the post

of 3rd assistant will be suppressed at the end of the current school year.

I should also point out to the Deputy that the school has the services of a shared remedial teacher.

If the school is in breach of the maximum class size guidelines in the 1995/1996 school year, the school authorities should submit enrollments to my Department in September 1995.

O'Shea Assured On Further Industrial Development

Brian O'Shea, Minister of State at the Department of Health has welcomed assurances he had received from the IDA that they will continue to promote the Co. Waterford area for overseas industry, particularly in the larger county towns which have appropriate industrial infrastructure available such as serviced sites.

The IDA told Minister O'Shea that whilst overseas companies are tending to locate in the larger centres, the success of Michell in Portlaw and Flair in Tallow shows that overseas companies can succeed in the smaller communities.

As a further sign of their confidence in the region the IDA has recently announced new overseas projects for Carrick where Scram will employ 200 people and Clonmel where Seagate will employ 1,000. Also recent expansions at Norton and Milton Bradley in Waterford City and Stafford Miller in Dungarvan will benefit the Co. Waterford economy and provide both direct and indirect job opportunities.

Honey Had A Little Lamb



This succulent-looking dish uses lamb noisettes, which are the most luxurious way of eating loin of lamb. They are to lamb what tournedos are to beef.

Noisettes are prepared from loin which has been boned and rolled then cut into half-inch slices. You can ask your butcher to do this for you, or do the job yourself. Remember

the bone you have removed is T-shaped. Boned meat should be rolled up tightly and secured with string before slicing.

NOISETTES WITH PINEAPPLE AND HONEY

Ingredients
1 tsp honey
1 tsp dry mustard
salt and pepper
1 crushed clove of garlic

2 tsp lemon juice
15oz (425g) can pineapple rings
8 noisettes of lamb
1oz (25g) butter
4 tsp. chopped mint
8 maraschino cherries

Method

Blend together honey, mustard, seasoning, garlic, lemon juice and 2 tsp of juice from tin of pineapple. Spread seasoning mixture over noisettes and leave to stand for 20 minutes. Place remaining pineapple juice in a saucepan with butter and boil until reduced by half. Remove from heat, add mint and keep warm. Grill noisettes, brushing with pineapple baste. When



cooked, place a ring of pineapple on each and flash under a hot grill to warm through. Serve decorated with maraschino cherries. If you're in a hurry noisettes are delicious just grilled for 5-6 minutes, each side and served with mint or herb butter.
Serves 4-6.

Lismore Festival A Huge Success

Lismore's 3rd Festival of Early Music held over last week-end was another huge success. Music wise the week-end proved a memorable one and the huge crowds who thronged the town for the Festival all went home satisfied with the wonderful entertainment provided.

It was a weekend overflowing with music, song, spectacle and fun - from the 11.30 p.m. musical procession through the streets led by over-worked Town Crier Dick Ahearne, flanked by two Lismore gardai in full medieval costume, complete with flaring torches, right through to the colourful pageant on Sunday afternoon.

Throughout Saturday and

Sunday, recitals took place in the Banquet Hall of Lismore Castle, the Courthouse Theatre and Lismore Hotel. Members of the Blackwater Singers entertained in the pubs. Medieval attire was the order of the day.

Many visitors converged on the heritage town, particularly on Sunday, to enjoy the festive atmosphere and the busy Fair on the Mall.

One of the attractive features of the Festival was the singing and playing in the town by various early music groups. The Blackwater

Singers gave nightly performances of Purcell catches. Midnight musical processions, with everyone suitably costumed, marked the end of each day of the Festival and there were always unexpected events, such as the extra concert given in the Courthouse by a new recorder group from Dublin who called themselves "Piped Music".

An exhibition of paintings by local artists was held in the Mall and it was there that Ciaran de Loughry was to demonstrate how to make a baroque violin.

On Sunday night, Musical

Director Jan Van Putten paid tribute to all those who had worked long and hard to make the Festival an outstanding success.

"It is thanks to the Very Reverend Dean Cecil Weekes and the Church of Ireland community here that we have had the most perfect menu for our evening concerts" he said.

A big question mark hung over the weather, but for this Festival - the only one of its kind in Ireland - the rains held off, the sun shone, and Purcell's music came alive to delight and enthral as it did 300 years ago.

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Negative Forecasts For Proposed Clam Project

Initial forecasts regarding the granting of a fish culture licence to Waterford Clams Ltd. by the Department of the Marine have so far proved negative and there is now mounting speculation that Minister Sean Barrett is set to refuse the application.

The Dungarvan company's proposal to develop a large scale clam growing venture on the north shore of Dungarvan Harbour sparked off a volatile reaction among local residents and regular users of the harbour when first mooted in early 1994.

Many heated debates, pickets and Council meetings later, the 'clam issue' remains a contentious subject for Dungarvan and Abbeyside folk and after months of both pro and anti discussions a final ministerial decision on the application is now on the way.

NO COMMENT

Waterford Co. Council however appear to be still in the dark regarding the Minister's decision. A Council spokesperson confirmed that the Council has heard reports that a ministerial refusal is on the way, but added "we certainly haven't been told anything officially, and until we are, there will be no comment".

LIST OF OBJECTORS

Covering 60 acres of beach in Dungarvan Harbour, Waterford Clams' proposed clam growing project has been vehemently opposed by the Dungarvan Bay Amenity Protection Association who have lodged a complaint with the European Commission. Also opposed to the project are Dungarvan Sailing Club, Dungarvan Sea Angling Club, Abbeyside Shore Angling Club, Gold Coast Boardsailing Club, the local sub aqua, bird watchers and dinghy sailors. Likewise, the project also failed to earn the support of Dungarvan UDC, Waterford Co. Council and Co. Manager Donal Connolly.

In addition serious reservations were publicly expressed by Bord Failte and the Irish Wildlife Conservancy.

NO INTERFERENCE

On the other hand, Managing Director of Waterford Clams, Sean Whelan claims that there would be no interference with the rights of any other users of the harbour through the clam development. The company pledged that the development would take place in an orderly and proper fashion, creating 400/500 jobs for the local community. The proposal was also supported by the Dungarvan Unemployed Action Group.

THUMBS DOWN

Now the belief however is that the Minister will give the thumbs down to the application. The weight of influential opinion is so heavily stacked against the development that the expectation is that the Minister will, in the near future, refuse the application of the company for a licence.

Returning thanks, Councillor Ryan paid tribute to the outgoing chairman Councillor Billy Kyne and said that in succeeding him she had been left with a very tough act to follow.

Councillor Power undertook to ably stand in if and when he is called upon to act as chairman in the coming twelve months.

In his final address as chairman Councillor Kyne thanked all the voluntary groups that had invited him to their various functions during the past year. He said the work of these groups is to be valued and all of them are making a monumental contribution to society generally in the town.

Councillor Kyne said the past year had been an exciting one for Dungarvan, a year when they bade adieu to Bertie White as Town

Clerk and welcomed his successor Ray Moloney.

The outgoing chairman said it was also the year of the launch of the Urban Renewal Scheme and in this regard he said he would urge the private sector to get more involved.

Referring specifically to the objection to the plans for major investment at the former Mulcahy and Ducey premises at Main Street, Councillor Kyne said this would inevitably stall if not stop the development.

He said as he took his departure from office he was delighted that three commitments he had given at the start of his chairmanship are now about to come to fruition. One is the extension to St. Joseph's Hospital, another is the proposed new Technical College at Quanns, and finally the waste water treatment plant for the town.

Councillor Kyne said a positive first step has been taken in relation to that major scheme while an environmental impact study had now been done.

He referred to the great housing progress that had been made during the past year and this would give the town a major lift.

Finally he thanked the County Manager, the officials and all the council staff for their help and co-operation. He also thanked the press for what he said has been their fair and impartial reporting of the Council meetings.

The County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly, thanked the outgoing chairman and said it had been a pleasure at all times to work with him. He added that Councillor Kyne had been a credit to the chair, to the U.D.C., and to the town.

them" he said.

Mr. Donal Connolly, County Manager, disclosed that he has had discussions with For FAS about an advance factory for a site at the Youghal Road, and he is also in discussion with both the IDA and Forbairt about the possibility of attracting a major industry to Dungarvan. "I have, in fact, made submissions to both these agencies", said Mr. Connolly.

Deputy Deasy suggested that they invite the IDA's South East Regional Manager, Mr. Tom McAuliffe, to a Council meeting to ascertain from him the current "state of play" regarding Dungarvan's jobs prospects.

"We have witnessed many redundancies in the town, and the employment situation overall has greatly deteriorated in recent years", Deputy Deasy said. "The IDA has a duty to see that things are balanced," he added.

DISAPPOINTED

Cllr. Tony Wright supported his colleague and said he was disappointed that his proposal of some time ago - supported unanimously by the Council - to set up a local development committee had not yet been acted upon.

Cllr. Wright said other towns had set up these committees, and why the reluctance to do so in Dungarvan where the

unemployment situation is now "extremely acute".

The County Manager said it is his intention to put such a group in place in Dungarvan and that will be done at the earliest possible opportunity.

Finally it was agreed to invite senior South East IDA officials to a meeting of the Council to discuss the overall employment situation in the county town.

County Engineer Reveals Critical State Of Waterford Roads

Co. Waterford is receiving less than its due share, on a mileage basis, of all road grants. That's according to County Engineer John O'Flynn who has drawn up a detailed 70 page report on the bleak state of our county roads. Submitted at last week's Council meeting, the report covers such subjects as the road works scheme, the Council's grant allocation, maintenance and upkeep of county roads and dire warnings for the future of our road infrastructure if additional funding is not made available.

RAPID DETERIORATION

The Council presently maintains 1,573.08 miles of public road valued at £440 million. Owing to insufficient investment levels in recent years however, the centuries old network has been deteriorating by at least 3% per annum, particularly on less travelled county roads.

The additional funds made available by the Council, in its 1995 estimates, to arrest this decline, have been cancelled out by the reduction in non-national road grants in 1995.

£16M REPAIR COST

A detailed survey of the entire regional and county road network was completed in 1994 with the objective of establishing the current condition of these roads, as well as the "backlog" cost of remedying the defects accumulated since 1978. The report found that the total repair cost of regional, county primary and other county roads was estimated at £15.6 million. As the survey was carried out prior to the exceptionally wet weather during the recent winter, which resulted in almost unprecedented flooding and road damage, the backlog cost has undoubtedly risen above £16 million.

INSUFFICIENT FUNDING

In adopting its 1995 Estimates the Council provided for an increase of 59% for non-national roads. This has been offset however, by a reduction of £422,900 in State grants. Waterford ranks twenty first in the grants per mile allocated for non-national roads in 1995 out of a total of 27.

According to the Co. Engineer's report, in order to restore Waterford's non-national roads to an adequate state, funding is required for two elements, (1) restoring ongoing road upkeep to the required level, and (2) eliminating the accumulated backlog of defects.

To solve these two problems, the Council would first need £6.7 million per

annum for the upkeep and renewal of non-national roads. This figure is actually twice the £3.3 million available in 1995.

Secondly to tackle the backlog cost of remedying the accumulated defects in the road system, £1.6 million per annum would be required over a ten year period.

In total, over £8 million would be needed per annum to solve the roads crises. "Clearly, the scale of the problem is now exceptionally large", states Mr. O'Flynn.

Pointing to the overall roadworks provision of £6.11m., Mr. O'Flynn states that this figure "is insufficient to provide an adequate programme of upkeep and maintenance of the non-national roads, or to sustain the Council's maintenance workforce".

WHAT CAUSES THE DAMAGE?

Mr. O'Flynn identifies traffic usage, weather and maintenance levels as being the main contributory factors to the current declining road condition.

Under the heading 'traffic usage', Mr. O'Flynn states, "many regional or county roads... carry traffic loads greatly exceeding their abili-

ty to accommodate loads arising from bulk milk and oil/diesel tankers, trucks carrying beet, grain, lime and manure, heavy agricultural machinery, traffic serving quarries and forestry traffic. There has been a steady increase in the size, weight and number of heavy goods vehicles and the situation has been aggravated by EU provision for increased axle weights. Goods vehicles have quadrupled over the past 30 years and are believed to account for over 90% of road damage. One ten tonne lorry has the same damaging effect as 10,000 cars".

The report continues, "very few non-national roads were built to withstand heavy traffic loadings. Many county roads have received only one surface dressing, and are insufficient in width to accommodate a heavy goods vehicle and an opposing vehicle, with the result that large vehicles over-run the road surface, cause severe damage to the road edge support, and close up water inlets".

THE WEATHER FACTOR

Also contributing to the adverse road situation is of course the inclement weather of the past two winters which have seen almost unprecedented rainfall, resulting in widespread flood damage of roads. The report also points to modern farm practices which it claims have resulted

in "removal of long standing drainage channels, and accelerated run off of storm water onto and along roads, on which traditional drainage inlets have been lost, or have become choked, due to funding cuts and reduced maintenance levels".

In response to the problems created during the exceptionally wet weather, and to help prevent a recurrence of the worst road damage caused by running water along roads, Mr. O'Flynn has allocated £140,000 for surface restoration work on county roads.

'SCRIMP AND SAVE'

Under the heading 'manpower', the Co. Engineer warns of the adverse consequences for the Council's machinery yard against the backdrop of a reduced works programme on non-national roads. A combination of reduced grant levels and limited funding for direct labour improvement works on county roads, "will continue to impose pressure on the Council's ability to sustain its workforce", reads the report.

It continues, "it is vital that all works be carried out as efficiently and cost effectively as possible and, in this connection, the Council must constantly examine its work practices and systems, and be prepared to rationalise, adapt or innovate in the interest of providing all possible savings and optimum value for money".

Council Unsupportive Of T.V. Licence Hike

Waterford Co. Council members have unanimously agreed to call on the four Co. Waterford T.D.'s to refrain from supporting an increase in T.V. charges.

The call arose out of a notice of motion put forward by Cllr. Ciaran O Riain who slammed the £15 increase.

"It's a hidden tax and I'm asking the Council to reject it," he stated, adding that there was no justification in increasing the T.V. licence charge to £80 when last year alone R.T.E. had made almost £10 million profits.

"Some people are just struggling above the bread-line," he heatedly added. The motion was seconded by Cllr. Jimmy Quirke and unanimously passed by Council members.

Growing List Of Mast Applications

Waterford Co. Council is dealing with an ever increasing number of planning applications for transmission masts, a fact which became abundantly clear at last week's Council meeting. Included in the Planning Department's May list of applications for planning permission was yet another application from ESAT Telecom, which now brings their total number of mast planning applications to four.

The latest application which was lodged by ESAT on 18th May last is for the erection of a 30 metre transmission mast, cellular antennae, access driveway and a prefabricated cubicle 3 m. x 6 m. x 2.4 m. high at She-skin, Joanstown, Carrick-on-Suir.

TOUGH COMPETITION

Already an all out competitive war has started over the

second Irish cellular mobile phone licence due to be issued in October by the Government.

In a strong bid to secure this second licence, the Dublin based private company, ESAT plans to invest £50 - £60 million in establishing a nationwide cellular network, including the erection of 100-150 transmission masts.

Meanwhile, Telecom Eireann who had the monopoly on cellular communications for the past number of years will find itself in direct competition with a second licensed mobile phone service operator. The semi-state body may now want to consolidate its market share by expanding its services. Already, the highly controversial Telecom mast proposal at Fair Green, Kilmacthomas has sparked strong protest among local residents and the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association (CEPA).

The concrete platforms for the mast were laid before November last while the company was exempted from planning permission. From now on however Telecom will have to apply to the local Council for planning permission as the exemption period only lasted up to November last.

"STONEWALL ATTITUDE"

Speaking at last week's Waterford Co. Council meeting, Co. Manager Donal Connolly said no de-

cision had yet been taken on the four ESAT applications and further information had been sought from the company.

On the subject of the Fair Green application by Telecom Eireann, Mr. Connolly said he has had discussions with the company and had put forward the concerns of the local community regarding the central location of the proposed mast.

"They have given us a guarantee that they will come back to us on it and we are waiting", he added.

Thanking the Manager and officials for their co-operation and help with the people in the area, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said the residents of Kilmacthomas will do what they can to obstruct the mast at the present proposed location in the centre of the town near the Rainbow Hall. He informed members that the local public representatives had met recently with Telecom representatives on the issue but had run into what he described as the company's "stonewall attitude".

Likewise, Cllr. Oliver Coffey slammed the "arrogant" approach of Telecom and urged the company to "come off their high horse".

"This mast is being pushed into some place where it shouldn't be", he declared.

MAST SHARING CONCEPT

Cllr. Con Casey suggested

that Bord Telecom cooperate with other communications companies under the concept of mast sharing. This he said would reduce the number of masts needed to be erected throughout the county. In reply, Mr. Connolly said the idea of mast sharing would be suitable from the Planning Department's point of view and added that he had put this suggestion to the companies involved.

Speaking on the alleged health risks of transmission masts which was also foremost on members' minds, Mr. Connolly said the government held at national level that there was no radiation or health risks from such communication masts. The Council however has taken the matter up with the radiological society who are expected to report back shortly.

RTE APPLICATION

Slating the ever growing list of mast applications, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran then queried an application by RTE for the erection of an 18.3 m. tower and low power transposer at Ferry-point, Prospect Hall, Kinsalebeg.

"At the rate we're going, there won't be a parish left in the county that hasn't one of these monstrosities", he slammed.

Mr. Connolly replied that he had yet to receive a report from the Planning Department on that particular application.

Deasy On Urban Green Spaces

Dungarvan based Deputy, Austin Deasy tabled the following question in the Dail recently.

"To ask the Minister for the Environment if he will make it obligatory for local authorities to provide public parks, playing fields and play grounds, when new housing estates are being planned; and if he will draw up plans to create such facilities in existing housing estates where very few facilities exist."

LOCAL DISCRETION
Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin T.D. replied, "it is a matter for planning authorities to set out policy in their development plans for the provision of public open space in new housing estates. When deciding planning applications, the planning authority must have regard to the policies set out in the plan, and may attach conditions to planning permissions requiring the provision of appropriate facilities in any new housing estate. These are matters best left to local discretion and I have no plans to change existing arrangements in the matter."

Minister Howlin continued, "the planning, design, location and construction of local authority housing schemes, and the provision of amenities in conjunction with such schemes, are matters for the individual housing authorities. However, housing authorities have been advised in guidelines issued by my Department that, in preparing lay-outs for their housing schemes, they should ensure that new housing comprises smaller well designed schemes, integrated as far as possible with housing and other development in the area, and providing a good living environment for residents, convenient to all important services and amenities."

"Funding is available under my Department's Remedial Works Scheme to assist local authorities in carrying out major structural works to "low-cost" and pre 1940 dwellings and run-down urban estates. Works of an environmental/landscaping nature, such as the upgrading of existing amenity areas, may be included under the scheme where they are considered necessary to support the works undertaken to the dwellings."

Good News For Spring Marquis Housing Scheme

Liz McManus T.D., Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal has announced that a project, to provide 31 dwellings, proposed by the voluntary body RESPOND at Spring Marquis, Dungarvan has been approved under the rental subsidy scheme.

This scheme provides 100% capital loans and ongoing subsidy for approved voluntary/non profit housing bodies to assist them in the provision of family-type accommodation for low income households.

The Minister praised the initiative taken by RESPOND, Waterford County Council and Dungarvan UDC in bringing this project to fruition and said that it represents a further example of what is being achieved through partnership between the voluntary sector and local authorities.

Construction work on the RESPOND housing scheme is expected to commence by the end of this month.

Moscow's Catholic community welcomed the new priest into their flock on May 31 last, in a dramatic ceremony led by a Belarusian Bishop in St. Louis Church.

A nephew of the former Fianna Fail Minister David Andrews, Philip became the first Catholic priest ordained in Russia since before the Bolshevik Revolution in a 3 hour Mass charged with historical significance.

As reported in 'The Moscow Tribune', the newly ordained priest described the ceremony as a very emotional experience.

"It passed very fast. I couldn't believe how fast it was. It felt like 40 minutes. It's something I've waited 10 years for, but in the last few weeks I've been so busy it just sort of went past without me realising it, the elated priest added.

Originally from the Cork area, the young clergyman studied for four years as a seminarian in Rome before coming to Russia, where he has lived for the last eight months. Based in Samara,

he was ordained a deacon only six months ago at St. Louis, the only Catholic church in Moscow to remain open during 70 years of Soviet rule.

Special Preacher for Famine Remembrance Service

The distinguished historian and author, Very Rev. Robert B. Canon McCarthy, M.A., Ph.D., will be the special preacher at the Ecumenical Service of remembrance of the Great Famine on Wednesday 28th June in St. Mary's Church of Ireland, Dungarvan.

Rev. Dr. McCarthy is a native of Ballydonagh, Ballymacarbry and last month was instituted to the incumbency of Galway and Kilmummin. On the 1st of June he was installed as Provost of Tuam in St. Mary's Cathedral. His recent published book, titled "Ancient and Modern" (Four Courts Press) is a short history of the Church of Ireland.

The Ecumenical Service of Remembrance, (Order of Compline with hymns and readings), is at the request of Dungarvan Museum Society in its Famine Commemoration Programme and will be conducted by Very Rev. Cecil Weekes, Dean of Lismore. The interdenominational attendance will include representatives of the Roman Catholic Church, Church of Ireland and Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) all of which laboured to assist their fellow men and women during the great famine.

Co. Waterford was seriously affected by the failure of the potato crop in September 1845 and by early 1847 the ancient graveyard at Kilrush, on the western outskirts of Dungarvan, the main burial place of those who died in the work house, was reaching capacity. In June of that year

Henry Villiers-Stuart of Dro-mana offered a 2 acre site at Slievegreine about 2 1/2 miles south west of Dungarvan as a new cemetery, to become known as Relig-a-tSleibhe. The previous year the rector of his own parish of Villierstown, the highly esteemed Rev. Philip Homan, had died on the 20th November aged 47 from famine fever contacted during his ministry. A contemporary unpublished life of the Rev. Homan, now in a private collection, states "so esteemed was he by Roman Catholics, that they had no feeling but reverence for one so good, and the monks of the Convent La Trappe on the mountain had a mass for his recovery". The Rev. Homan's memorial tablet originally in Villierstown Church has been restored and re-erected in the Ecumenical Chapel in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore, by Dean Weekes. The Ecumenical Service of Remembrance of 28th June at 8 p.m. is a public service in which all are welcome to join. Local participants include readers William Fraher, President Museum Society, Peig Bean Uí Reagain, An Rinn, singer Ann Fitzgerald and musicians Maura Govers, Padraig Breathnach, Micheal O Haloran and Nicky Power.

Scoil San Nioclás Seeks VEC Support

Discussions are set to take place between representatives of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee and members of the Committee of Management of the all-Irish Secondary School in the Ring Gaeltacht, Scoil San Nioclás, to ensure a closer working relationship between the two educational establishments.

In a letter to Monday's meeting of the VEC, the chairman of the Scoil San Nioclás Board, Liam Suipeil, who is also a member of the VEC, said his Gaeltacht school had been in existence since 1959 when it began in co-operation with Coláiste na Rinne. In 1970 it assumed its own separate identity and continues to operate in that manner to this day.

Mr. Suipeil said however that in today's changing world the committee of management at Scoil San Nioclás is aware that such a small school — it has an enrolment of fifty-five students — may have difficulty in surviving in the future without proper linkages and support on the broader field of education.

"I would like therefore to ask the VEC for their support, in principle, for Scoil San Nioclás, and permission to begin discussions with a view to reaching a formal agreement that will be in the mutual interest of both sides," he said.

The CEO, Mr. Kieran Heffernan said they have had an excellent working

relationship with Scoil San Nioclás down the years, and he praised the tremendous efforts of "this small Gaeltacht school" in the promotion of the Irish language and culture.

Mr. Heffernan said they

had supplied teachers to the school at different times over the years and now with the school struggling to support itself the VEC is being asked to help it to expand and develop.

Clr. Paddy Kenneally

urged the VEC to give every possible assistance to "this great Gaeltacht," and it was agreed unanimously to enter into the discussions being sought by the Scoil San Nioclás Committee of Management.

WINE OF THE MONTH

McCann on Burgundy

If it had not been for the monks of the Benedictines of Cluny, there would be quite a hole in the historical significance of wine in France. The Benedictines were the first to make wine in Burgundy and from the tenth century onwards its influence widened enormously.

After the Benedictines came the Cistercians and eventually the Papal Court was even moved to the area. Religious orders became the most important factor in the formation of many wineries and by the 13th century most of the world's great vineyards were in their control. Maybe it didn't mean the same to them as it does for us today but names such as Romanee-Conti (makers of the most celebrated red wine in the world).

Richbourg, Clos de Vougeot and Pommard were under their control. Today these are wines that you would have to think twice about buying — even if you came up as a solo winner of the Lottery.

But, of course, the viticulture of Burgundy has expanded way beyond what those early monks could ever have envisaged. Today the region is managed and owned by a large number of smallholders each with their own individual offerings — and often growing not much more than a couple of rows of vines.

This method of growing has been responsible for the number of merchant houses of the region. These are known as negociants and they purchase grapes which they themselves blend and bottle under their own labels. However, in many cases, they also have their own vineyards, where, it is said, the really best wines come from.

Among these negociants-growers are famous names like Latour, Drouhin, Jadot, Mommessin, whose wines today span the whole area of price and will be seen in most large wine merchants and off licences. In the Burgundy region however there is one famous name that is always quoted — Bouchard. There are two firms carrying this name — Bouchard Aine and Bouchard Pere & Fils. Both are long

established in the area with Bouchard Pere & Fils having established the strongest historical significance with a base in the Chateau de Beaune, a medieval landmark in the area.

Bouchard Pere & Fils are now into the ninth generation of the family in the business. Over the centuries they have established a reputation second to none — among the wines they handle is Vosnes Romanee Grand Cru (another in the Lottery-bracket price). Today's firm has, with the benefit of a modern research programme, been able to provide a collection of Burgundies right across the price range.

So what will a decent Burgundy cost you? Well anything that you can afford to pay but generally if you are in the £10 per bottle bracket you will discover a ladder which hopefully you will be able to climb towards the stars.

And what can you expect for your money? Well, wines from Burgundy are the product of either Pinot Noir grape for their red wines or Chardonnay for their white — of course the labels won't state the grape name but you can be 99% sure that these are the main grapes in the wines. In taste they are quite distinctive, full flavoured and tipping towards the dry. The reds taste and smell strongly of raspberries while the Chardonnay can vary between butteriness and steeliness.

But for the finest of wines Burgundy is the name to have on your bottle.

TODAY'S INSIGHT

Whatever the quality of the wine you are drinking, the glasses do matter. You just don't take down a water glass and tip wine into it — wine deserves a glass in which brilliance, colour and clarity can be appreciated.

It isn't necessary to use the best of the cut glass for wine, indeed professionals prefer a plain, thin rimmed glass with a stem. It isn't pomposity that induces a wine drinker to twirl the glass in the hand, this practice allows for an assessment of the wine with the movement bringing out the aroma and tastes.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

MILK YIELDS

It is most important to maintain milk yields near peak for June and to prevent yield drops of more than 0.5 gallons per cow per day during July.

However, grass is scarce on many farms this year and in this situation rotation lengths should be maintained at about 20 days and adequate concentrate fed to maintain yields. Any paddock that contains rough grass should be topped closely so as to provide good quality grass later in the year. Pastures should get adequate nitrogen and sulphur. Sulphur is particularly important for most soils at this time of year.

SECOND CUT SILAGE

Very careful stock should be taken of available first-cut silage and adequate areas should be closed up for second cuts. If grass is too scarce to close enough for second cut silage, consider selling some surplus stock, applying extra Nitrogen or purchasing some hay or silage.

THE SUCKLING HERD

Cows should be already in-calf, if they are to calve in March 1992. Cows should be gaining in body condition now, to ensure high fertility and compact calving next spring. Keep the herd running on good pasture during the breeding season. If using A.I. check for cows in heat at least four to six times per day. Synchronisation, using the P.R.I.D. coil, may be useful to tidy up tailenders.

If running a bull, keep a ration of about 40 cows per bull. Do not run a young bull with more than 20 to 25 cows. Watch out for repeats. A lot of repeats in a herd may indicate problems with the bull.

PAINTING FARM BUILDINGS

Existing buildings can often be improved by a change of colour. Light or bright tend to reflect light and make buildings stand out in the landscape. Darker colours are less prominent, blending with the countryside and making large structures look smaller. The colour combination used is also very important, dark tones should always be used for the roof and lighter tones for the sides of buildings. The exception to this rule is in a prominent site. Here dark colours should be used on both roof and sides.

Weathering lightens colours, therefore, always use the darkest shade of any colour. Those preferred for farm buildings include dark greens, dark browns and dark greys. Avoid bright blues, light greens and mauves.

SHEEP

For the next three months, the breeding ewe will be the most neglected animal on many farms. This, of course is wrong. The practice of subjecting whole flocks of ewes to starvation diets is as inappropriate as allowing entire flocks to become grossly over fat. Every flock of sheep consists of individual ewes - some thin, some fat, some young, some old, some good milkers, some bad milkers.

To arrive at a situation next September where effective flushing can be done requires that a "levelling-out" process takes place between now and then. The first step is identification and grouping of ewes with similar needs.

One week after weaning, all ewes should be handled to :-
(a) Select culls on the basis of teeth, udder, feet, lambing problems etc.

(b) Condition score and group ewes according to whether they need to gain, maintain, or lose condition.

The following guidelines should be used:

GROUP 1

Fat ewes, condition score 3.5 or better. These can be stocked at 15 to 20 per acre depending on initial grass supply. Some will lose weight more quickly than others and these should be withdrawn before they get thin.

GROUP 2

Fit ewes - condition score 2.5 - 3.0. These do not need to lose weight and should be allowed more grass. A stocking rate of 10-12 ewes per acre should provide maintenance.

GROUP 3

Others - this group contains ewes in poor condition, last years ewes, ewe lambs which reared lambs and any old ewes with poor mouths being kept for an extra season. These should be stocked at about 8 to 10 per acre on good grass.

I.C.M.S.A. NEWS DIGEST

ICMSA URGES VETS TO ACCEPT OFFER ON TESTING.

Mr. Nicholas Ryan, Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, has written to the Irish Veterinary Union requesting its members to accept the terms offered by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, T.D., governing the introduction of the principle of rotational testing.

Mr. Ryan said that it appears the EU Veterinary Sections has made the granting of some funding. On this account he believes there is a serious onus on the IVU members to facilitate its introduction by accepting the terms offered by the Minister.

"Farmers with livestock

have been the only losers over the past forty years of the Disease Eradication Programme. The health status of our national herd must be protected so that our livelihoods are not interfered with."

Farmers want the long running and costly disease eradication programme brought to a successful conclusion as soon as possible.

ICMSA CALLS FOR SPEEDY PAYMENT OF EWE AND RURAL WORLD PREMIUMS.

Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamon O'Rourke, welcomed the fixing of the Ewe and Rural World Premiums and called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, to ensure that the Department

is ready to make payment as soon as possible.

"The Minister should be ready to pay all farmers within seven days of the date of publication of the Regulation governing these payments, which means in effect that all payments should commence on July 10th", said Mr. O'Rourke.

He added that the Ewe premium has only marginally increased over the last year despite the fact that Irish lamb prices are approximately 20% down on last year. He said this again emphasises the need for a top up mechanism to the Ewe premium.

Meanwhile, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, welcomed the statement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates,

that he will be preparing the way to have a lamb classification scheme in operation before the end of this year. ICMSA has always supported the introduction of a classification scheme for lamb, with the objective of improving the quality of lamb carcasses presented for sale.

"Farmers must be encouraged to produce the quality of lamb required by the customer and the best way to encourage this is to reward the farmer through the pricing system."

He complimented An Bord Bia for the launch of an intensive promotional campaign on the French market yesterday. He said he hopes this campaign will be successful in raising prices.

IFA Grain Committee Pushes For Greater Flexibility In REPS For Grain Growers

Speaking after a recent meeting with the Department of Agriculture, IFA Grain Committee Chairman, John O'Mahony (Tallow) said that IFA sought greater flexibility for grain growers under the REPS scheme, adding that the meeting explored a number

of avenues in which REPS could be modified in order to accommodate a greater number of grain growers, including specialist grain growers.

Mr. O'Mahony said IFA in particular lobbied to have straw shorteners for Winter Barley and Winter Wheat

production included under the REPS scheme. He said "there is no justifiable reason why straw shorteners are permitted for Winter Oat production but are excluded for Winter Barley and Winter Wheat production under the REPS scheme."

He said that in a country which is deficit in grain production, it is necessary that the production of high yielding cereals is maintained and that the expertise built up over the years in producing Winter cereals is not lost.

The Grain Chairman pointed out that Winter ce-

reals provide a valuable green cover over the Winter period and thus have a positive environmental effect as the green cover prevents nitrate leeching.

In addition to the inclusion of straw shorteners, Mr. O'Mahony said that IFA also insisted that the REPS payment of £50/acre should be paid on set-aside land as this land was a fundamental part of the farm business.

Mr. O'Mahony concluded saying that IFA would again be meeting the Department of Agriculture in the near future to discuss how REPS could be made more attractive for grain growers.

IFA Says Factories Should Be Paying A Minimum Base Price Of 104p/lb. For lamb

Reporting from Paris on Monday, IFA National Sheep Committee Chairman, John Elmore said that the Rungis market is returning 18 FF/Kg. for Grade 1 Irish lamb, with up to 19 FF/Kg. available in the French provinces. "This is equivalent to a return for 102p - 107p/lb. and based on these prices Irish factories should be paying a minimum base price of 104p/lb. to farmers this week."

Commenting on the report, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, said: "In view of the severe decline in lamb prices this year, which has created a dire income crisis on sheep farms around the country, flock owners are demanding an immediate response from Minister Yates, setting out the measures he will take to stabilise prices and returns to producers. The Minister must also spell out how he will protect producers incomes through full Ewe Premium compensation."

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers leader said that producers are extremely angry with the continuing reduction in prices on a weekly basis since the beginning of the new lamb season. "The reasons for the severe downward pressure on prices this year must be clearly identified. It is not acceptable that prices continue to slide week after week in a market where supplies are not exceeding demand."

IFA Calls For Vigilance On Slurry Gas

Waterford IFA Farm Family Chairwoman, Marion Looby, has called on farmers to take extreme care when agitating slurry, warning that the gases released during agitation can kill in seconds. The IFA woman's warning comes as silage making reaches its peak during the current dry spell, coinciding with the annual school summer holidays which introduces children with extra recreation time to greater danger around farms.

Mrs. Looby said: "Farmers should never underestimate the lethal effect of hydrogen

sulphate gasses released during slurry agitation. These gases can knock a grown man unconscious in seconds and kill in a matter of minutes.

"Farmers should always ensure maximum ventilation in livestock housing by opening all doors and shutters before commencing agitation and evacuate the shed of all people and livestock."

The IFA woman stressed the importance of ensuring that children are kept well away from slurry agitation and all forms of farm work involving heavy machinery and livestock.

Improved Margins Must Yield Increased Milk Prices Says IFA Dairy Chairman

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Gerald Curran Byrne said that the continuation of the skimmed milk powder and butter markets buoyancy over the months of highest milk output had improved the margins obtained by processors from these two products by just under 9p, when compared with 1994 returns, and by almost one p per gallon in the last month.

He further pointed that, as 60 to 70% of Irish milk is annually processed into skim and butter, this represents a real increase in returns of 5.4 to 6.3, of which 4 to 5p was passed on in April milk prices. Hence, he said, despite paying increased prices since April, the vast majority of processors are now benefitting from much improved margins.

With low intervention

stocks, favourable exchange rates to Continental Europe, improved cheddar and casein prices, no immediate impact arising from recent support cuts, and despite currency difficulties with Sterling and the U.S.\$ the dairy picture remains very rosy.

"I urge each committee and Board member of the Co-ops which have not yet increased their milk price to at least 110p per gallon, to see to it that this is done from May milk, as such a rise can now be implemented very comfortably indeed", the IFA man said.

"I also ask Boards and committees to ensure that the full benefit of the continued market buoyancy be passed to all suppliers in all co-ops, by the introduction of a generalised 1 to 2p price rise for May," he concluded.

IFA Leader Welcomes 12 Month Extension On Pollution Works Deadline Under REPS

IFA Deputy President, Michael Slattery, has welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates that he intended to extend the deadline under the REPS plan by which the pollution works on a farm need to be completed from 12 months to 2 years.

Mr. Slattery said that the deadline extension will help increase the number of participants under REPS which so far has been very sluggish.

The IFA Deputy Leader said that only slightly over

2,000 farmers having received REPS payments so far out of a potential up-take of 40,000 farmers. £230m has been provided to the REPS Scheme over a 5 year period but only £7.5m has been taken up.

Concluding, Mr. Slattery said that this important amendment to the pollution requirement was one of a number of changes to the REPS Scheme that IFA is seeking. It is of vital importance that the REPS is made as farmer friendly as possible to ensure maximum up-take of the aid available.

The Mental Dimension

I've met quite a few people over the last number of days who profess surprise and puzzlement at the result of last week's big game at Pairc Uí Chaoimh when Limerick successfully defended their Munster crown against Tipperary. Some, of course, were disappointed at the result because Tipperary's defeat, they argue, relegates us to the lowest run of the merit ladder in our providence. It does no such thing. Only a dull schoolboy would offer such an argument. Each game is an entirely independent entity. Only the simplistic or witless, would claim that because, say, Limerick had a point win over Tipperary who beat Waterford by 21 points that Limerick would beat Waterford by 22 points. They wouldn't and didn't last year when the Shannonsiders got their closest game from Portlairge.

We are apt to overlook a few significant facts about Limerick. Limerick are a good team with the emphasis on that word team. They shared the great sorrow of losing an All Ireland which they seemed poised to win and that wretched experience can do any one of two things: destroy you or increase your resolve to keep the faith and be true to yourself. Their faith in themselves, on the evidence of Sunday last, remains undimmed, strengthened in fact.

Limerick work hard for and support one another throughout the field and Pairc Uí Chaoimh a week ago gave us many examples of that support play especially among their backs when pressure was heaviest. Their discipline and type of strong fast crisp play made for a very lively game where pressure forced the opponent in possession to strike hurriedly or not at all.

Having endured the trauma of cruel defeat Limerick I believe have become a stronger force. Their determination and resolve are reinforced and their collective minds more sharply focussed so watch out for them in the Munster final. Do you remember Waterford's reaction in 1959 to that desperately unlucky loss of an All Ireland in 1957 to Kilkenny. The teams were essentially the same both years but there was a core of steel to Waterford's renewed bid for success in 1959 which wasn't going to be easily denied.

Anyone in Cork on 12 July 1959 for the Waterford/Tipperary Munster senior hurling semi final is unlikely to forget the game. The same Deise team which had lost the League final to Tipperary two months earlier by 0-15 to 0-7 trounced the reigning League champions by 9-3 to 3-4.

Mental preparation, at inter county level, is every bit as important as physical. No matter how fit a team may be

they are at a disadvantage if they are not mentally ready for battle. For all Tipperary's hurling training their minds weren't as well prepared as were Limerick's. It was strange to see such as Declan Ryan, Tommy Dunne, Michael Cleary and Pat Fox so much "at loggerheads with their hurleys" as John D. Hickey used describe it. Their first touch, their hesitancy, their choice of options, their lack of conviction.

Tipperary's outstanding player was Raymie Ryan an exceptionally gifted hurler who shone even in adversity. He was certainly mentally switched on and did enough to inspire a response from his colleagues many of whom, in the backs in particular, resorted to fouling, a sure sign of fragile discipline, the by product of poor mental preparedness. Those were the fouls which Gary Kirby finished so expertly.

A team's mental attitude and frame of mind before a game has a vital bearing on what transpires during the course of the match. I can remember many examples of this truth over the years. That famous victory in Cork in 12 July 1959 is one example. Taking a stroll that day down Patrick Street before leaving for the pitch we bumped into a few of the Tipperary lads (Jimmy Doyle, Devaney and McLoughlin). A relaxed laid back complacency oozed from them in contrast with the tense impatience-to-get-at-them of Waterford and it betrayed a gross over-confidence which unseated the Munster champions an hour later at the Cork Athletic grounds. They were all wrong mentally.

Many years ago Tallow were facing a Western final against a neighbouring team in intermediate hurling whom - as always with near neighbours in sport - we heartily disliked and who themselves cherished a healthy hate for us. At every training session in the 3 weeks leading up to the clash I reminded the lads, and myself, that we had to be prepared to endure any hardship or provocation rather than retaliate. "No matter what they do" - and I had a few briar-cutters in mind - "we won't strike back". As you may imagine we got plenty of stick but had the mental hardness to take it all in our stride before emerging victorious.

Many teams nowadays - Carlow are among the latest - employ the services of a sports psychologist to attend to this very important matter of mental preparation for big games. If a team hasn't someone skilled in that area they would be wise to give serious consideration to seeking such a qualified person as a matter of urgency. Limerick, it seems, don't need such a person. Do we?

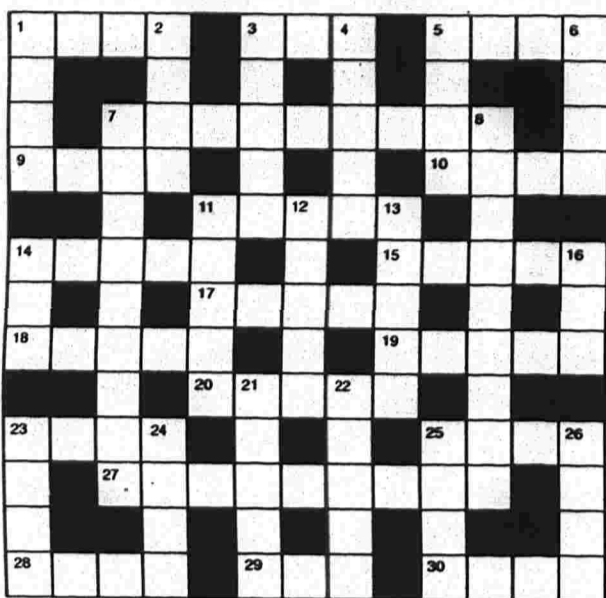



The Russian Space Station Mir with three men on board can be seen every night this week from all parts of Ireland and until June 28.

On Friday at 10.08 p.m. the American Space Shuttle Atlantic will blast off from Florida and cross the Atlantic to blaze across Irish skies just 16 minutes later, chasing Mir en route to its historic link up on the following Monday. In all, 10 people will then be in space.

Irish people watching the skies that night will have a grandstand view of mankind's conquest of the next, perhaps

the final, frontier.

Astronomy Ireland's newslines will issue the precise times to watch Mir all week. They will also carry last minute details in case weather or technical hitches delay the shuttle launch on Friday — Call 1550-111-442 in the Republic of Ireland, and 0891-88-1950 in Northern Ireland and the UK.

Waterford Boundary Extended After Constituency Revision

A Bill to revise the Dáil constituencies has been presented to Dáil Éireann and circulated to Deputies by Brendan Howlin, T.D., Minister for the Environment. The Bill, entitled the Electoral (Amendment) Bill, 1995, will implement in full the scheme of constituencies recommended by the constituency commission which reported last April.

Under the Bill, total membership of the Dáil will remain at 166 and the total number of constituencies will remain at 41. There will be no change in the number

of different sized constituencies, viz. fourteen 5-seaters, fifteen 4-seaters and twelve 3-seaters. Overall, the Bill provides for changes in 21 constituencies. One of the main boundary changes under the Bill is the return of part of the Ballymacarby-Nire area to Waterford. Under the terms of the Bill, the new constituencies will come into force on the next dissolution of the Dáil; they will not have effect in relation to bye-elections that may arise in the lifetime of the present Dáil.

Quality of Senior Hurling Games

A Chara,

Following recent disquiet at the quality of games in this year's county senior hurling championship, it is time for those at the helm of G.A.A. affairs in Waterford to take bold and decisive action, as follows:

1) Revert to a knockout format in the championship; and

2) Fall in line with virtually all other sports and most other G.A.A. County Boards and introduce a properly structured league system as a means of providing regular competitive games for players.

I would suggest the creation of a Senior Hurling League of five divisions with about eight teams in each division. Clubs which are unable to participate in such a competition are of little value to the Association, or to their own playing members. A corresponding Junior Hurling League should be created for clubs with second and third adult teams.

The county senior hurling championship would include the eight clubs in the first division of the Senior

League plus at least eight group teams made up from the remaining clubs in the lower divisions of the Senior League, the championship to be played on a direct knockout basis. There is already the basis for group teams among weaker clubs at under-age level (Naomh Brid, St. Olivers etc.). In Kerry and Cork, group teams are a key feature of the senior championships.

This structure would have a number of advantages:

(1) A higher standard of play than is currently the norm in the senior championship.

(2) Provide inter-county players with more exposure to the kind of do-or-die situations which they will encounter in the Munster championship.

(3) Provide good players with junior clubs (such as

Tom Fives and Kevin Walsh) with more experience of a higher standard of play; and

E.S.B. To Invest £9.8 Million In Co. Waterford Distribution Network

E.S.B. has announced the details of its major investment in rural low and medium networks, throughout the country.

The first phase will begin in 1996 and will be completed by the year 2000. A total of 718 kms of network will be refurbished in County Waterford. In all, E.S.B. will invest £9,799,862, in the following towns and villages and their surrounding areas: Dunmore East, Tramore, Kilmacthomas, Dungarvan, Clashmore and Ardmore. The project, which has been welcomed by many organisations, including those representing farmers, will refurbish 25% of the country's network and represent the first major investment since rural electrification in 1946.

The operating voltage will be increased from 10kV to 20kV with larger transformers, greatly enhancing the quality of supply to customers.

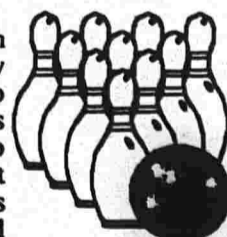

THE PLAYING RULES

Under Rules of Fair Play (Rule 1.1 Section B) says that if the ball strikes a flag marking, the boundary lines is deemed out of play. Note — A ball which strikes the corner flag is deemed to be a side line ball. Hurling and

football.

In hurling Rule 1.6 states that the ball may not be touched on the ground with the hand except when a player is knocked or falls, and the ball in his hand touches the ground.

In football Rule 1.2 exception (ii) states — Any player who falls or is knocked to the ground while in possession of the ball may fist or palm the ball away on the ground and may score by so doing.

Can you imagine how difficult it would be for the referee if he allowed a goal when a player fisted the ball along the ground having been knocked while in possession of the ball. Yet that is the rule.

THE QUICK FREE

In football Rule 2.6 states that with the referees consent a free kick may be taken quickly or immediately except for a penalty or 13 metre free on opponents line.

In hurling Rule 4.30 states — For another player on the team taking the puck out to play the ball before it has travelled 13 metres — penalty, cancel puck out and throw in the ball on defenders 20 metre line opposite scoring space.

Interesting stuff all these rules and, of course, as we study them more we can understand why certain frees are awarded. Mind you, the frees are never contentious until they are awarded against our team.

G.A.A. NOTES

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

P.J. Ryan, chairman, presided at last week's monthly meeting of the County Board which was held at Lawlor's Hotel.

Arising out of the minutes of the previous meeting, James Tobin asked why the figure of the bank overdraft as announced at the last meeting, had changed significantly in a couple of weeks. He said the figure given at the Coisde Gnotha meeting was far greater. The chairman explained that a grant of £25,000 received from Croke Park had been credited to the Board account before being paid over to the Fraher field committee. During the discussion the meeting were told that accounts relating to bus hire in 1993 and 1994 were received only last week. The chairman said that himself and the treasurer and secretary were not aware that these accounts were outstanding and it caused considerable annoyance to have them submitted at this time. Several delegates expressed views as to how situations, such as this, should be dealt with and the Chairman stated that these would be considered by the Coisde Gnotha.

Also discussed under the minutes of the previous meeting, was the matter of the referee's report and the disciplinary committee hearing of evidence in the case of the under 21 'B' football county final played at Ardmore in November last. The particular match between Clashmore and Dunhill/Fenor was the subject of an investigation by the disciplinary committee and in their submissions they stated that an allegation was made by one of the clubs that a senior Board officer had used his influence in getting unauthorised people into the sideline and that the overcrowding in the sideline was a factor in the problem which arose on the occasion and which was the subject of the investigation. At the previous meeting on the proposal of Tommy Hennessey, the committee were asked to name the Board office involved, as otherwise all Board officers would be under suspicion. A letter from the disciplinary committee stated that the member in question was the former county chairman, Eamon O Murchu. After it was read, Eamon O Murchu vehemently denied the allegation, which he described as outrageous and defamatory. He said the statement was a total lie and he would take whatever steps that he considered necessary to have his

name cleared. He said he arrived late with his wife at the venue and was admitted to the sideline by the gate-man. He did not bring others in with him. Declan Barron, Ardmore said he was present at the gate when the chairman came late and he did not see him bring anyone else in. Eamonn O Murchu, then informed the county chairman that unless a public apology was published within one week from to-night that he would take the appropriate action in the matter.

The county chairman said that the committee were requested by the Board to name the officer about whom the allegation was made and now they had done so and he was merely reading their response to the Board's request. He did not regard himself as having a responsibility for issuing the required apology within a week, etc. Several other members became involved in the heated discussion, before Eamon O Murchu reiterated his resolve to take appropriate action if his demands for an apology were not met.

FINANCIAL REPORT

County treasurer, James Walsh gave the monthly update on the financial position of the Board and warned that the costs of running the eight county teams could not be sustained unless our income increased very considerably. He said that about £30,000 had been spent already on county teams. In answer to questions he said the detailed figures which he had given included the payment of fines for incursions, and the five hundred pounds fine by the Munster Council and the payment of the physiotherapists. He said that some people on committees felt that they had a divine right to incur expenses without the authority of the Board.

The county chairman said that he did not have to repeat what he had said about finance at the previous meeting, but he had made his attitude and his policy very clear and this would not change until our financial situation was turned around. He said a new system had been recommended by Coisde Gnotha and this would require all bills, etc to be submitted in the first week of each month. The practice of business people sending in their accounts months or years after they were due, would not be allowed to continue.

He also reminded clubs of

the upcoming Golf Classic and appealed for their full support. If the golf competition, which is sponsored by Waterford Crystal, is as successful as it can be, it will ease the financial pressure on the Board.

SARGENT AND PHELAN CUPS

The chairman informed the meeting that the Sargent and Phelan Cups would be organised shortly and would be run on week evenings. Both will be played on a knock-out basis and regardless of the non-availability of players, clubs will have no option but to play. Both competitions will be played to a finish within a specified period.

FIELD NETTING

Phil Fanning raised the matter of the erection of netting behind the road goal at Fraher field and complained that with no netting there at the moment, it was possible for clubs to lose £100 worth of sliotars during a game. The chairman explained that as soon as finance became available to the field committee, the job would be done.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

County Development officer, John Fraher informed the meeting that only eight of the 47 club grounds in the county were properly vested in the association, according to Croke Park records. He said that this could be a very serious matter for clubs, the figure was challenged by a number of delegates before the officer read out the official list of clubs which are registered with Croke Park. John said it was a matter for clubs to find out where their deeds of trust, etc. were held by the banks, club solicitors, etc. and come back to him after they have been traced. He said he would give a further report to the next meeting.

FREE WEEK-END

The chairman informed the meeting that the G.A.C. had agreed to leave the August Bank Holiday week-end free of matches. He said this was acknowledged as being in the middle of the holiday period and motions before convention had asked the Board to organise a holiday break. He said that because of the pressures relating to the completion of the championships on time, this was the best they could do. The championship will resume on the Friday, following the Bank Holiday.

PAUL FOLEY

An application from the former Stradbally player to

be allowed to play football with Gaultier was read to the meeting. Some delegates felt that the player was free to play with Gaultier who are an exclusive football club. Foley is now a member of the Ballygunner club, who are an independent hurling club and is therefore privileged under Rule 32 to play with both.

Having discussed the matter for some time, the county chairman undertook to get a ruling from higher authority on the matter.

WALSH PARK

When the matter of the cost of development of Walsh Park was raised by a member, the chairman said he understood that members of the committee would be present to give a report on progress, and finance, etc. The chairman stated that the County Board have given permission to spend a total of £868,000 on the entire Walsh Park Development project and the field committee would have to remain within that budget. He also said that some members of the committee were hopeful that the figure would be increased, but this could not be entertained because of our financial constraints and also without County Board authority.

REPORTS

There were reports from the various selection committees. The senior football report told about the under 21 team reaching the Munster final for the third year in a row. It said the team did reasonably well against Cork, considering all the circumstances and the aim in football for the moment should be to gain promotion from Division 4.

The senior hurling report was the most comprehensive submitted in years and covered all phases of their activity since the selectors were elected twelve months ago. The report stated, "It is best for all concerned with hurling promotion in Waterford, that reality is faced up to, anyone who thinks that gaining promotion to Division 1 was easily achieved, is not prepared to trade in reality. Public expectations at present far exceeds the capacity of Waterford hurling teams to deliver consistently in the short term".

The problems that had to be faced at the beginning when the league and club championships clashed were clearly outlined and the report went on to relate the improvement in the team performance later when defeating Down,

Meath, Wexford, Carlow and Kerry, before beating Galway in the league quarter-final and before losing to Clare in the semi-final.

The hurling report then went on to tell of the problems encountered in preparing for the championship tie with Tipperary in Cork. There was barely a month between the league semi-final and the championship and not all players were available for training because a total of 13 reported injured. It is not nonsense to state that Tipperary had an uninterrupted 8 week period to gear themselves for the game. Fr. Fogarty had made it crystal clear in the Waterford dressing room after the game that they, Tipperary had been preparing for five months for the 21st of May and that had been their sole objective.

The report further stated that there was no question of excuses being trotted out by the selectors, but on the question of fitness, they totally rejected the unfounded allegations that the players lacked fitness, as all their sessions were preplanned and productive ones. However, it stated that the question of freshness and appetite are other matters which come into play, when one reflects on our championship run in. A total of 24 games were played during the committees one year term of office and 68 of the 72 players requested from the 25 clubs participated in the championship, league and tournament activity, etc.

At the conclusion of the eight page report, the selectors advised that they are prepared to continue, ideally for a further two years, if it is the wish of the Board, with the purpose of implementing the policy which they have adopted in pursuit of the objectives which they have set out.

The county chairman complimented all the committees on their reports and on the splendid efforts being made in preparing our teams for the championships and on behalf of the Board, he wished them success.

NEW SELECTION COMMITTEE

When the matter of appointing new selection committees was raised it was pointed out that this is not normally done while we still have teams competing in the Munster championships. As it was agreed that there was no urgency about junior, under 21 or minor selectors, it was decided to have the senior hurling and senior football selectors elected at the July meeting. The meeting decided on the proposition of Nioclás MacCraith, that the football selectors would be selected by the County Board, rather than by Coisde na Peil. This was

decided on a vote and is a departure which has been in vogue for several years. The county chairman informed delegates that it was proposed by Coisde Gnotha that he would appoint the chairman of each selection committee and that they would be responsible to him and to Coisde Gnotha on all matters relating to administration, etc. He would insist that panels be strictly limited to the official 24 players. The functions of hurley carriers could be carried out by substitutes on the day of a game. All transport would be organised by the Secretary or treasurer and challenge games, etc. would be done through the county Secretary. He said that all sub committee, including team selection committees would have to realise that the chairman and secretary of County Board were entitled to attend their activities and this included going into the dressing rooms before a game. This year the officers were not permitted to enter in some cases. This will most certainly not happen again, he said. He asked the meeting for their approval of the recommendations and they were unanimously accepted.

MEETING DATE

As there will be no meeting of the County Board in August, it was decided to defer the July meeting until Monday 24th.

MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Munster Council delegate Jimmy O'Gorman gave details which led up to the decision to investigate the events of the senior hurling game, Waterford v. Tipperary and why the Munster Council had decided to proceed as they did.

He said that the procedures followed in the case of the players summoned to attend after the under 21 football game with Tipperary. Only three Waterford players and the County Board officers were called in the first place, as a result of council members viewing the fracas on T.V. Subsequently and as a result of the showing of the Peter Queally incident by R.T.E., a further meeting took place on Sunday evening in Limerick, and it was decided to call in Peter Queally. Tommy Hennessey, who attended the meeting at which the suspensions and fines were imposed gave details of the hearings. The county chairman also filled in delegates on the course of events during the investigation.

The Chairman recommended that the matter would now be let rest and that we not consider appealing to Central Council. This was agreed to unanimously.

Paddy Walsh, chairman, presided at last week's full meeting of the Western Board which was held at Lawlors Hotel. At the outset of the meeting the chairman asked that a vote of sympathy be passed with the relatives of the late Fr. Jim Kiely, Hammersmith and formerly of Touraneena.

Paying tribute to Jim, the chairman said that he knew him as a player and as a friend. In his younger years he was an outstanding footballer and a thorough sportsman. A minute's silence was observed in his memory before the business of the meeting commenced.

CORRESPONDENCE

A large amount of correspondence before the meeting related to applications for postponements and the chairman stated that those which concerned the minor hurling championships were already dealt with and three rounds of that championship had been put back to July.

John Lyon, Board Officer, expressed the opinion that the Officer Board had to a great extent been led up the garden path in this one, as the minors who had been facilitated because of the summer examinations had continued to play, some with their clubs in the adult grades, others had and were still playing with the county minor teams, in challenge games, etc.

The chairman and other board officers agreed that this was so, while others thought it was right to grant the postponements.

The secretary, Anthony Walsh, advised the meeting that it will not be possible to start the minor hurling championship before July 15. The minor football will resume in two weeks time.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Arising out of these, a total of five players were suspended for the minimum period in all cases.

Questions asked by Michael Lyons (Dungarvan) on refereeing matters gave rise to a general discussion on the manner in which referees control minor and second string matches. He cited cases where referees started matches with only two umpires and sometimes without the two linesmen. He asked if in the circumstances these games were legal and official.

The chairman told about the problems encountered by referees, especially in situations where there were no neutrals at the game and only a couple of team officials to take charge of the teams. It was pointed out that the rule requires four umpires and two linesmen for all official matches, but the Board would only be in a position to act if these particular matters were brought to the attention of the officers when they had happened.

Michael Tobin said that referees sometimes brought patrons who had paid to go to the game, in from the bank or the stand.

Tom Drummy said that when this happened the money involved was refunded to the member.

It was agreed that the matter would be brought to the attention of all referees.

PROGRESS REPORT

The secretary gave an update on the position of the various championships and said in minor football and in the adult competitions satisfactory progress was being made. The suggestion that the under-21 hurling and football should be played on a 'blitz' system was being given serious consideration.

The chairman said the three main officers had met their counterparts in the East with a view to finishing championships in both divisions at the same time.

DRAWS

The draws for the minor football semi-finals in the 'A' Championship are as follows — Lismore v. Abbeyside; Ardmore v. Nire.

In the 'B' minor football championship the draws for the quarter-finals are — Gaeltacht v. Shamrocks/St. Olivers, Kilgobinet v. Kilrossanty/Naomh Brí, Ballyduff v. Stradbally/Clashmore, Dungarvan v. Affane/Brickeys.

In the semi-finals, the winners of the first named tie above will play the winners of the second named tie. The winners of the bottom ties will meet in the second semi-final.

GOLF CLASSIC

The chairman said he had been asked by the county chairman to appeal to all clubs to participate in the golf classic which takes place at Knocknagrannagh on this weekend. A number of clubs reported that they had not been officially notified and were unable to explain to their members what was involved. The Board secretary undertook to contact the golf committee immediately.

THE HARRY CONWAY CUP

This beautiful trophy is to commemorate the late Harry Conway whose name was synonymous with the promotion of hurling at underage level in West Waterford from the late fifties until shortly before his death last year. It was presented by his club Ballinameela to the Western Board on Friday evening last.

In making the presentation, Lar Looby, chairman, who was accompanied by Tom Browne and Declan Glavin, spoke about Harry's great love for the game and the trojan work done by him in the West of the county for such a very long time.

In accepting the cup, the chairman Paddy Walsh said the gesture was appreciated and all people who knew Harry Conway will feel happy that his great work for the youth of the GAA is not to go unnoticed.

Jimmy O'Gorman, Munster Council and other speakers joined in the tributes to Harry and linked in with these were tributes to his life-long friend Michael Culloo who is remembered also as a pioneer of juvenile hurling.

No statement was made as to which championship will be honoured with the trophy, but I know that this will come later.

Intensive Coaching

The special coaching for present and future county underage hurlers will be held in Fraher Field on Thursday and Friday, June 29 and 30. The sessions will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until 1 p.m. All clubs in the Western division are asked to send in their top 4/5 players. The sessions will be conducted by Peter Power and Paraic Fanning. All those young hurlers who hope to play in the Waterford Under-14 teams in the Tony Forristal tournament should make a special effort to attend as these sessions are a prelude to trials which will be held later in the summer.

Fr. Jim Kiely R.I.P.

News of his death shocked everyone over the weekend and his long association with our games has been talked about quite a lot since the great Touraneena priest passed away on Friday evening in a Hammersmith Hospital. A former team mate Paddy Walsh, Chairman of the Western Board paid tribute to him on Friday and many more tributes have been added since then.

Fr. Jim played football with a number of clubs in his time, and won an intermediate football medal (county) with Affane in 1996. He played Munster colleges and minor football with the county.

For Waterford he was a great ambassador in London and on Sunday nights without fail he made sure of having the Waterford results of that weekend announced in his Hammersmith Social Club. His work for the poor and destitute of the English capitol was very well known and his death is a great loss and will be mourned silently and very sincerely by the countless number of souls whom Fr. Jim helped during his missionary life.

A special Mass for the repose of his soul will be celebrated in the church in his beloved Touraneena on Saturday week, July 1 at 4 p.m. All his friends are invited. May he rest in peace.

YEAR BOOK

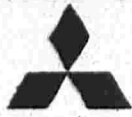
The publication of a County Year Book in late November was discussed at length and all present gave their full support for the idea. The publication

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New Ultra Modern Technical College For Dungarvan

the Dept. knocked the plans for a new school in Dungarvan to replace the present technical college where accommodation problems had become acute. That decision was based on the need to implement financial cut-backs by the Fine Gael/Labour Government of the day and left the then V.E.C. shocked and angered.

The committee had already acquired the site for the proposed new school near the Sports Centre at Quann's from the local Urban Council for a reported £40,000. Full planning permission had been granted, and everything was ready to proceed when the Dept. made its bombshell announcement that it was "off the agenda".

Now almost a decade later, and with approval granted for a major extension to the existing school, the Dept. had again had a change of heart — but this time with the blessing and support of the V.E.C.

The chief executive officer, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, Billy Kyne, the vice principal of the Dungarvan school Ms. Joan Begley, their architect and quantity surveyor, had a meeting with senior Dept. officials last Tuesday week.

"The officials pointed out that the cost of the proposed extension was equal to the cost of a complete new college on a greenfield site", said Mr. Heffernan. "They also pointed out that they were aware that the existing school continues to grow with the expected increase in enrolment numbers again next year."

Mr. Heffernan said the officials also spoke of the V.E.C.'s failure to acquire land adjacent to the school and that this would prevent any future expansion if the need arose.

"Taking all factors into consideration," said Mr. Heffernan, "the officials confirmed their preparedness to grant permission to build a complete new modern college on the seafront site adjacent to the town's Sports Centre".

PRIORITY ONE

The C.E.O. said the officials also pledged to make the project a priority one and they said the change would not set back the time scale for the building of the school as all the preliminary work had already been completed.

Mr. Heffernan added that having got full planning permission for the new school back in 1986 he did not anticipate any problems in that area nine years on.

"All going well", he said, "construction of the new school should start next April

"All going well", he said, "construction of the new school should start next April or May, and it should be pointed out too that staff representatives are delighted with the prospect of moving into a brand new, modern, college".

Cllr. Nuala Ryan welcomed the Department's change of heart and said the presence of the new school alongside the modern Sports Centre would mean each building complementing the other.

Cllr. Lar Hart, too, gave the change a warm welcome, and said they would be able at any time in the future to carry out an extension to the new school. That was something that could never be done once an extension was provided at the existing college.

Several other members expressed their delight at the Department's change of heart, but Cllr. Austin Flynn said he hoped it was not a delaying tactic on the part of the Dept. "That possibility of any undue delay in the proceeding."

Proposing the vote of sympathy, the Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey told Monday's VEC meeting that they all learned of Mr. Lynch's death with deep sadness.

All the members joined in the expression of sympathy as did the Chief Executive officer, Mr. Kieran Heffernan.
