Who is entitled to Adoptive Benefit and for how long is it paid?

ANSWER

An adoptive parent who is in insurable employment at the start of his/her adoptive leave and who is entitled to adoptive leave under the Adoptive Leave Act 1993 and who meets the PRSI requirements is entitled to Adoptive Benefit.

The PRSI requirements are the same as for Ma-

ternity Benefit. You must have:

 At least 39 weeks PRSI paid in the 12 months immediately before the date of placement of your child, or-

 At least 39 weeks PRSI paid since first starting work, and-

 At least 39 weeks PRSI paid or credited in the relevant income tax year (for a claim made in 1995 this would be the 1993/4 tax year).

This Benefit is paid for 10 weeks from the date of the placement of your child. The minimum weekly payment from June '95 is £75.70 and the maximum s £162.80. You won't be paid less than the rate of Disability Benefit you would be entitled to if you were claiming Disability Benefit. (With Disability Benefit you could be paid increases for your adult and child dependents).

You should claim at least 5 weeks before your leave is due to start on claim form AB 1. A certificate of placement must also be submitted as evidence of the placement of your child. In the case of a foreign adoption you must submit a copy of the declaration of suitability issued to you by the Adoption Board.

If the adoptive mother dies within 10 weeks of the placement the father may be entitled to some Adoptive Benefit if he qualified for Adoptive Leave and provided he satisfied the PRSI requirements on his own insurance record. The payment would be calculated on his earnings in the relevant year.

Minister for State at the Department of Health, performed the opening ceremony of NRB's (National Rehabilitation Board) new local centre at Galdstone Street, Waterford recently. Located in a central location in Waterford City, the centre is ideally placed for public use and is fully accessible. NRB will use the new offices to provide a range of services free of charge to people with disabilities, their families and anyone whose work affects the lives of people with disabilities, in Co. Waterford and South Kilkenny.

Marius Cassidy, NRB, Area Manager, said NRB offers support for anyone affected by disability directly or indirectly. "We have always provided a hearing service and also provided assistance to people with disabilities to find suitable training programmes. We have extended the services available to include occupational guidance, to assist people think through the options to the kind of lifestyle they want to achieve. Peoples needs are changing and increasingly they want a greater say in the kind and range of services available to them. NRB is now perfectly placed to offer a greater range of quality services to meet these changing needs."

"The fact that our new building is so accessible will, we hope, encourage everyone from builders/architects looking for information on build-

ing design to representatives of voluntary groups looking for information on sources of funding to school children doing school projects, to drop in and see what is available. NRB sees the building as a resource to people with disabilities and we intend to develop our services on an on-going basis to meet changing needs. NRB wants to hear the views of people with disabilities on the services we provide and we want to extend our links with all organisations active in the field of disability."

Last Chance To Sow That Lawn!

July is the last chance for any groundwork if you plan to so a lawn in August considered to be the best time for a DIY lawn.

Preparation is vital to ensure that the grass establishes well before winter and endures the year ahead, come snow or drought.



You should start preparation some six weeks before sowing by digging over to one spade depth.

MECHANICAL DIGGER

It can be hard work after warm weather, but don't be tempted to use a mechanical digger as they tend to spread weeds and compact soil.

You also need to avoid compacting if the soil is wet use a broad plank to stand on and support your weight as you work.

While digging, work in well-rotted compost or manure before raking the newly-turned site into a fine crumbly consistency. Then leave it for a few weeks, apart from removing new weeds.

BOWLING GREEN

Meanwhile you should also decide on the type of lawn you need - what you have pictured in your mind is probably in the bowling green class and the required mixture will be something with fescue and bent vari-

However, you must be realistic if you have a family and pets who are likely to give the lawn a pounding. In this case, choose a coarser rye grass mixture which will establish and recover from damage quickly.

Of course, there are 'shades' between both extremes and you will find many mixtures in shops and garden centres - check the packaging or ask for more advice there.

At least by sowing a lawn rather than laying turf, you can more accurately dictate the type of lawn you end up with.

Once the seed is chosen, wait for a calm day when the soil is moist - a course of watering beforehand will help - and sow around an ounce and a half per square yard unless there is a recommended density for the particular mixture.

Gently rake the soil to cover the seed and protect from birds. Use fine netting and string out some foil and other debris to flutter in the breeze - don't rely on reassurances that the seed has been treated with repellent!

OBSTACLES

Cats can be put off digging the soft ground by laying canes and sticks at random over the site - the fussy felines will find somewhere with fewer obstacles. When the blades of young grass reach 1.5 inches high, givs them a light rolling in dry conditions, but do not mow until they reach three inches.

Once the lawn is established, look after it by never cutting it short in dry weather, keeping it well watered and occasionally adding a liquid feed.

CREAMY PIE FILLING

The delicate, slightly scented flavour of jasmine tea makes this creamy pie filling deliciously different. Ingredients

6oz (175g) crushed digestive biscuits 3tbs (45ml) sugar 6oz (175g) melted butter or margarine 2tbs (30ml) Jasmine tea 1pt (500ml) boiling water

4oz (125g) castor sugar 2 envelopes unflavoured gelatine 2 egg yolks




2 egg whites, stiffly beat-

1/2pt (250ml) double cream, whipped and orange slices

Method

In mixing bowl, combine crumbs, sugar and butter or margarine. Press mixture evenly into the bottom and sides of an ungreased 23cm (9in) flan dish. Chill.



Steep tea in boiling water for five minutes and strain. In bowl, mix sugar and gelatine. Stir in hot tea until gelatine dissolves. Beat in egg yolks. Chill mixture until just thickened. Fold in egg

whites and whipped cream. Pour into pie shell and chill until firm.

Pipe whipped cream round edge of pie and decorate with orange slices. Serves 8.

Deputy Deasy On Illegal Fishing

Dungarvan Deputy, Austin Deasy asked the Minister for the Marine, Sean Barrett the following questions regarding illegal fishing in the Dáil recently.

To ask the Minister for the Marine if he will define what constitutes a serious offence under the Fisheries Acts with regard to illegal fishing by foreign trawlers,

the number of Spanish trawlers which have been apprehended by the Navy on two or more occasions for illegal fishing and which have been found guilty of serious offences under the fisheries acts,

and finally the maximum penalties applicable to foreign fishermen in breach of our fisheries laws.

Minister Barrett replied "statutory Penalties for offences under the Fisheries Acts, which are the highest in the European Union, are specifically designed to deter illegal fishing irrespective of nationality. They reflect our determination to ensure that all vessels fishing in Irish waters comply with fishing regulations.

The penalties available to the Courts for fishery offences have been substantially increased under the 1994 fisheries Amendment Act. Serious offences relating to incorrect capacity plans and undersize nets now carry maximum fines of £200,000 and £50,000 respectively. The Act also doubled the maximum fines for having undersize fish on board and logbook offences, including under recording of catch, to £20,000. Gear and catch are automatically forfeit as well. In addition the 1994 Act provides for the ultimate sanction of confiscation of the vessel where the offences are deemed by the court to represent a particularly grave abuse of conservation.

The actual imposition of penalties, including confiscation, is a matter for the Courts in the final analysis. Overall the regime of fines, fishing days lost, and forfeiture of gear and catch amount to a substantial financial loss for fishermen. Fines imposed, for example, for underreporting of catch are usually well in excess of market value of the catch. In addition to the increased fi-

nancial deterrents, the Irish fisheries surveillance capability has been significantly enhanced this year with the coming into service of the 2 new Casa aircraft operated by the Air Corps. This has already contributed to more focused and effective deployment of the Naval Service vessels in fisheries surveillance.

Finally I can advise the Deputy that since 1991 a total of 29 Spanish vessels have been convicted on two or more occasions of serious fishing offences.

Deputy Deasy replied:

"The questions I asked have not been fully answered by the Minister, I cannot understand why the courts are not implementing the maximum penalties outlined in the reply from the Minister. Generally the fines are only a small fraction of the maximum and in no case has a boat been confiscated, despite the fact that 29 Spanish vessels have been convicted on 2 or more occasions, of serious fishing offences since 1991.

The Rugby World Cup final has come and gone having reached its exciting climax in last Saturday's great game in Johannesburg. Be not alarmed gentle reader at rugby's incursion into our G.A.A. column. The days of the negative dog-in-themanger ban on "foreign" games is, buíochas le Dia, well gone even if the ban mentally still persists in placeswhere the siege mentality of puny minds still flourishes. Most people nowadays accept the right of every field game to co-exist with its rivals. Personal preference can be given full rein without a stigma of any kind attaching to one's choice. It is only as it should be in a civilised society.

In the 50's I got to know a rugby player very well. Tim McGrath from Herbertstown, Limerick was his name and he was a valued member of the management team at the Shandon Dairy, Dungarvan, humble predecessor of today's giant Waterford Foods. Tim, God be good to him, loved rugby, was very dedicated to training and was, by our standards, fanatical in pursuit of complete physical fitness.

I joined him on a couple of training stints and marvelled at his single-minded approach to a tough programme designed to achieve the goals he set for himself. And achieve them he did. His great club displays led to his selection for Munster and for Ireland. He had the ultimate satisfaction of playing on a winning Ireland team against Wales, the aristocrats of rugby in those days. I was delighted, of course, and sought every opportunity to boast of my miniscule and I'm sure irrelevant, part in his physical preparations and was content to bask in poor

Tim's reflected glory. Tim had a love of hurling too and only the ban precluded him from playing it. He was particularly interested in Waterford's hurling fortunes because of his acquaintance with Tom Cunningham, Austin Flynn and some more of us and never failed to watch our games. He was at liberty to watch our matches but, sadly, we daren't risk attending one of his in case a "spy" saw us and reported us. That would mean 3 months enforced absence from hurling.

I thought of Tim on Saturday as I watched the big game on television. Whether your interest in that game is great or marginal the huge commitment of those great players was enormously impressive and recalled for me

the willing sacrifices Tim and others like him made, sacrifices above and beyond the scheduled training sessions so that he could realise his potential. A spectacle like that final wouldn't be possible without total single-minded dedication to every aspect of preparation dietary, physical, psychological and life style. the enjoyment and satisfaction were commensurate with the investment of effort and both teams could be equally proud of their part.

Of course, Tim played to win but his enhanced state of fitness allowed him to derive immense satisfaction from playing at any level club, interprovincial or international. His attitude was the true sportsman's. I once heard that sporting sentiment expressed on the sands of Lahinch by another great Limerick sporting hero, Pat Hartigan prince of full backs. We were on holiday there one summer when Pat, on a seaside day trip, joined us. The conversation, of course, turned to our mutual love, hurling. "No matter what honours we won or failed to win", said Pat "aren't we the lucky fellas to have been able to play and enjoy a game like hurling". Playing to his customary high standard richly recompensed Pat for all of the hundreds of hours he trained. Amen to that senti-

ment Pat.

In the 50's and 60's Tipperary were the team to beat and their centre back Tony Wall was outstanding. As well as his coolness and intelligence he had great strength and stamina. I often wondered about his training methods. It was only in the mid fifties on the occasion of a Railway Cup final that he revealed to me his strict training regime. An army man he did more training on the beach at Clontarf (he was based in Dublin) and in the army gym than he did at the formal team sessions. When most players took a complete break in December and January Tony was pounding the sands of Clontarf and weight training indoors for body building purposes. When hurling activity resumed in mid February Tony had a huge advantage over the hibernators and that advantage remained throughout the playing season.

Of course, every rival hurler likes to keep secret that he worked on fitness outside of the playing season. One Tipperary fellow I was friendly with (they were few in number!) was a pupil of the Tony Wall school of physical fitness

but was careful to hide the fact. "I don't know when I saw a hurley last", he used to say, little realising that I knew all about his secret pre-season preparations.

When Donie Nealon was playing midfield he took the precaution of readying himself for the rigours of midfield play. That year he spent three months engaged in building work - shovelling sand and cement, mixing, lifting and pushing a full wheelbarrow. He was strong as an ox in every game. You can imagine my astonishment in one of our matches when he simply jumped back on to his feet after receiving a Larry Guinan special - a full blooded shoulder - which flattened him.

So I thought of Tim amidst all the colour and tension and excitement of the absorbing World Cup final. He had influenced my attitude to physical fitness some 40 years ago. He showed that there's no short cut to fitness. You'll play as you've trained.

Only what you've practiced in training will you repeat in a game. Players who want to fulfill themselves as sportspeople know in their hearts that you get out of a game only in proportion to your input and the successful athlete knows that in the last analysis effort is generously rewarded. No player in hurling, football, rugby or soccer doubts for a moment that extra curricular activity is essential for any ambitious sportsperson.

At the annual graduation ceremony held in Ard Scoil na nDeise recently the pupils of the Tenth Vocational Preparation Training Programme were presented with their Certificates in the various disciplines which they had undertaken through the course of their Fourth Year studies.

Pat Doyle, Chief Psychologist and Inspector with the Department of Education presented the sixteen successful students with their VPTP Certificates and congratulated each of the students on their achievements in this special year.

"What is unique about this programme," said Mr. Doyle is the collaboration between the teaching staff, the business and commercial life of the town, the voluntary and statutory services, the parents and students. It could almost be described as a meithecal approach to education."

He emphasised the better 'heart' which is instilled in the students as a result of their 'time out' year.

Mr. Doyle continued: "There seems to be a general consensus now that young people are very pressed by the consumerism of the twentieth century, which used to happen in their teens but now occurs in the middle of their primary school years through the influence of television and other sources. This course could be said to stop that rot and sends the graduates out into the community with a greater heart.

Sometimes if they were to go right through the secondary programme without this break, they would be absorbed by the points system and getting to University and that is still consumerism. One of the values of this course is that it provides a break from that mentality."

He then interviewed the girls on aspects of their

course and their hopes and intentions for the future.

The ceremony was preceded by a Liturgy led by their Religion Teacher Ms. R. Gallen in which all the students took part and which was inspirational, moving and wholly appropriate to the purpose of the evening.

The prayer, 'Christ has no hands and no feet only yours' was recited and signed by the girls in a very moving way, and was followed by prayers of the faithful.

Described as a year in which they took time out to reflect on their abilities and to ponder their future before resuming their academic studies, the girls demonstrated more than adequately how their year had been fruitfully spent in the pursuit of goals which were not all attainable in the exam hall.

At the outset, Mrs. Joan Clancy, at her usual efficient best as MC for the evening, welcomed students, parents, tutors, teachers and guests to the Graduation ceremony which is the formal end to the special year of studies which the Fourth Year girls had undertaken.

"This training programme", she said, "consists of three main components in the programme approved by the Department of Education, general studies, vocational studies and work experience. The students have taken several courses of studies within that programme and their tutors will present them with their certificates."

"Let us not forget the employers who were always so

understanding with our girls", she continued, "and who were always responsive to their needs often reacting at a moment's notice."

Mrs. Rosemary Cusack presented certificates for Cookery; Mrs. Breda Conway for Beauty Culture; Ms. Triona Foley from the Youth Resource Centre for Developmental Education; Ms. Helen Cotter for French Drama and Mrs. Clancy for Speech and Drama.

Through the course of the evening the girls regaled their audience with some of their elocution exam pieces and a playlet entitled 'Ecstasy' on the subject of drugs which they had prepared under the guidance of their Drama Teacher Mr.

Ted O'Regan.
School Principal Ms. Mgt.
O'Brien praised the work of
the VPTP team and said
that the girls benefited
greatly from this unique
course. She thanked all who
had contributed to making
the year special, productive
and worthwhile for the students and that their contribution had been part of
what made the programme
so successful.

Course Co-ordinator, Mrs. Mgt. Radley paid tribute to the girls who had undertaken the course over the previous ten years.

"It was hard work at times but I was often very encouraged by the results we were achieving and the way the girls responded to the course. I have had great support from all the teachers and tutors who have been involved over the years and in many cases they have been working with the girls for all of the last ten years. The employers have been a great support and without their help we could not have

managed."

She paid a special tribute to Mrs. Mgt. O'Brien, Principal of the School who on her arrival had continued the support and encouragement she had been receiving for the course, and to Class Tutor Mrs. Simmons with whom she had worked very closely and productively.

"They have been behind us

"They have been behind us all the way and I know the girls appreciate their active support too," she concluded.

A TRIBUTE TO FR. JIM KIEI

Fr. Jim Kiely, one of Sliabh gCua's best loved sons died in London on June 16th. He will be fondly remembered by all in his native Sliabh gCua but especially by all those in the G.A.A. Club with whom he formed a close friendship.

Touraneena National School and later at St. Augustines College, Dungarvan. At an early age he developed a great love for Gaelic Football and won a minor football county championship with Ring. He also played with the Munster Colleges while at St. Augustines.

At this time his reputation as an outstanding footballer had become established and he represented Waterford at minor, junior and senior levels in the one year - an achievement unsurpassed to this day.

As a seventeen year old he helped Sliabh gCua to a Junior Football League Medal never be really known to us

in 1953 beating Mocollop by the unusual score of 0-2 to nil.

In 1955 Fr. Jim decided his future lay in the priesthood and he joined the Augustinians. After his ordination in 1962 he was sent to the mission fields of Nigeria where Fr. Jim was educated at he spent seven years. On returning he took up a post in Drogheda and resumed his football career. Due to the fact that there was no club in Sliabh gCua at the time his services as a footballer were much sought after. He played with Affane and won a county Intermediate Football medal.

In 1972 he resumed playing with the reformed Sliabh gCua club and helped them to a County Junior Final, their first in 37 years.

After 13 years in Drogheda Fr. Jim moved to London as Director of the Irish support and Advice Centre. The full extent of Fr. Jim's work for the Irish in London will

but to say it was considerable would be an understatement. His loss to the underprivileged and homeless will be immense.

Those of us lucky enough to have known Fr. Jim will miss a man of great character, a man who was known for his wit and humour and of his love for his native place and people. A man who could mix with young and old alike and loved the craic and the Irish nights on his visits home. He is gone from us now but in truth he will never be gone for his spirit and memory will always live on in his beloved Sliabh gCua.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

MILKING MACHINES

Liners should be changed twice yearly, July is about the halfway stage in the milking season, so it should be time to change them now on many farms. This is expensive, but it is a lot less expensive than under-milking the cows or higher cell counts, undermilking during the year contributes to the rise in cell counts that occurs towards the end of the year.

The list of liners that is now recommended by Moorepark includes only very good liners, they milk cows fast and milk them out well and do not slip off or hurt cows' teats.

Eddie O'Callaghan in Moorepark is now investigating the effects of ageing on liners and the effects of not changing liners in time and how this affects cell count and the milking out of cows. Also in the context of milking cows out completely, cluster weight is very important, The cluster should be 3 Kg even at 2.8 Kg, there is a small reduction in milk yield of 0.5 - 1 litre per day. Clusters of 2.5 or thereabouts will not milk out the milk, they are slow and can creep up on the teats/udder.

Modern clusters from all of the machine companies are good and are heavy enough, but many of the older ones are not. The liners on the Moorepark recommended list do not perform well in light clusters.

ACCIDENTS ON THE FARM

The fact that most family farms have resident or visiting children means that avoiding risks to them must be a priority. As well as ensuring that slurry and sheep dipping tanks are properly fenced, attention needs to be given to the risks from machinery. Bitter experience shows that children and moving farm machinery are best kept apart.

With larger and higher capacity machines, operators need all their concentration for the job on hand and cannot reasonably be expected to look out for children in the work area. The answer lies in providing a safe and supervised play area, where they can still see enough to satisfy their natural curiosity - from a safe dis-

It is highly dangerous to carry young children on tractors, yet despite some horrific accidents in recent years, this practice is still common. Even the most modern cabs are not designed for this purpose. Most accidents of this type occur when the cab door opens, a child falls out and is run over. There is the risk of interference with controls and children are also vulnerable in the event of the tractor overturning or objects being thrown up by machinery.

Unguarded machinery and unsafe electrical installations are proven causes of serious and fatal injury. Greater vigilance is constantly needed on farms to keep equipment in better condition and take advantage of available safety improvements. Recent legislation requires that greater emphasis is placed on regular exami-

nation and safe use of equipment. Manufacturers are also required to play their part in improving safety standards.

SHEEP

Culling unsuitable and unproductive ewes is much easier if records are available. consult your adviser for details of Teagasc record charts.

Weaning Lambs-By the time the lamb is 12 weeks old, worm infestation of pasture has built up and there is increasing competition between ewes and lambs for available grazing. It makes sense to wean lambs, dose them and put them on to "parasite free" pasture. A suitable sward for weaned lambs should be leafy with a good clover content. Short grass is best and such grassland can be stocked up at to 20 weaned lambs per

Management Of Ewes Weaning-The flock should be conditioned scored. Some prolific milky ewes may require good grazing to regain flesh before mating. Overfat ewes are a problem where lambing is early. These should be 'slimmed down' by tight grazing or they may be housed and fed on a low quality fodder diet for up to 3 weeks.

Always have fresh water freely available. Undue restriction of nutrient intake is unnecessary and harmful. The aim should be to have ewes in a fit and thriving condition at mating.

SUCKLER COW FERTILITY

Suckler cows in moderate body condition should show heat about 60 days after calving and if they have not been observed in heat, it is likely that they were not detected. If cows lose too much condition, it may take 21/2 to 3 months after calving before they show heat and this will result in a calving interval of more than a year and a slippage in mean calving date.

Where cows are still thin, they need better feeding. More high quality grass is the obvious remedy. Apply one bag (or a high nitrogen compound where phosphate and potash is low) after grazing down a paddock or field.

Use a controlled grazing system to manage and ration grass more effectively. Land that has been cut for silage or hay responds well to fertiliser. Apply about 40 units of nitrogen per acre plus P and K if required to this land to boost your grass supply.

The presence of the calf in the suckling situation delays the return to heat. Trials by Dr. Michael Diskin at Belclare, show that this effect is more pronounced on thin cows. In some herds, it may be possible to separate calves from cows that have not come in heat and allow them to suckle once or twice per day. After the cow has been mated they may be allowed to suckle ad lib again.

Where the problem is a combination of poor hear detection and low body condition, the heat synchronisation process, using progestogens, may help fertility. Consult your veterinary practitioner for details.

FARMING LEADER

IFA Accuses Department Of Forcing Farmers Out Of Pollution Scheme

The Waterford Chairman of the IFA Rural Development Committee, Anthony Ryan, has accused the Department of Agriculture of trying to force farmers who are awaiting approval of their application for CFP, to give up their application in order to receive their REPS payment.

Mr. Ryan said that up to 500 farmers who have applied for REPS and have an unapproved CFP application have been told in a letter from the Department that they will only be paid their REPS payment if they agree to proceed with necessary works while forfeiting their CFP application. "IFA has been inundated with complaints from farm-

partment's tactics, many of whom could not afford to proceed with the pollution control work in the absence of the CFP aid.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Leader said that this particular situation affects farmers who should be entitled to conditional approval on applications lodged before December 1994, as well as those who had an application lodged prior to April 27 1995 when Minister Yates suspended the Scheme.

Mr. Ryan called on Minister Yates to intervene in the matter. He said that this latest move by the Department of Agriculture was causing great concern to farmers.

ICMSA Sleep Committee, Mr. Earnonn O'Rourke, said recently that the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, has jumped the gun by suggesting that some farmers would not object to a charge of 10p/lamb for a carcase classification scheme.

The Chairman of the

Mr. O'Rourke said the discussions on the scheme have not even begun and yet the Minister seems to be setting pre-conditions with regard to funding.

"A charge of 10p/lamb would amount to an annual cost of almost £400,000 on sheep farmers at a time when the sheep sector is already on its knees.

"Farmers are currently paying 55p per lamb in levies to the Department of Agriculture for veterinary inspections, or £2.2 million on approximately 4 million lambs slaughtered and exported live. Surely there are savings which would be made in this area to fund a classification scheme," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He also made the point that factory personnel are currently involved in grading lambs in all factories and that people could be trained to carry out carcase classification at no extra cost to farmers.

Mr. O'Rourke concluded by calling for an independent inspectorate to be put in place to provide assurances to farmers about the independence of classification and to promote farmer acceptance of the scheme.

I.C.M.S.A. Welcomes New **Animal Transport** Regulations

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan, has welcomed the adoption of regulations governing animal transport by the EU Council of Agricultural Ministers.

Mr. Ryan said the welfare of all animals in transit was always an issue of great importance to Irish farmers. He said Irish farmers are the most dependent within the EU on the export of livestock, due to our high volume of production relative to home consumption.

'However with the adoption of the new regulations we are now guaranteed the best possible transport facilities and consequently our customers can be assured of animals arriving on their farms in excellent health.

"For Ireland the agreement on these regulations means a continuation of the regulations which the Minister, Mr. Yates wisely introduced earlier this year. That the regulations will now apply throughout the Community is an assurance of all animals receiving the same high care and attention.

Minister Yates Must Make 1997 Slaughter Premium **Qualification A Priority**

Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said last week that the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, must make Ireland's qualification for the 1997 Slaughter Premium a priority issue on his Brussels agenda.

Mr. Donovan said that if Ireland is to be sure of quali-

fying for the £58.58/head Slaughter Premium in 1997 we would need a total steer kill well in excess of 730,000 head of steers for this year. With the factory steer kill this year to date up by 63,000 head or 27% already, it is going to be extremely tight to reach the necessary target of slaughtering 40% of the total

steer kill during the months September-October-November.' The Waterford IFA Livestock leader said that the so-

lution to this problem is for Minister Yates to obtain a reduction in the 40% qualification trigger down to 35%. "Only in this way can Ireland be guaranteed of the long term continuity of the Slaughter Premium.

Mr. Donovan said that the Winter Slaughter Premium of £58.58/head is crucial to the future viability of Win-ter finishers. "Minister Yates is well aware of the tight margins for Winter finishers and he knows that mium Winter finishing would be completely unviable."

Mr. John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford Executive of ICMSA said that ICMSA have called on the Minister for Agriculture, rood and rorestry to imme diately announce the details of the 1995 Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme and the Subsidy Scheme.

While appreciating that the delay in announcing the scheme is due to the difficulty in getting agreement in Brussels, the County Chairman said that already farmers have supplied over one-third of the 1995-96 milk quota.

"Individual farmers need to know now how much extra quota they will qualify for and if they will obtain a subsidy to part fund the cost of the quota.

The ICMSA preferred op-

tion is that all farmers who qualify for the Restructuring Scheme should get a subsidy of 50p per gallon. Last year the general limit and 22,000 gallons in certain cases

Meanwhile, the Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, rejected out of hand any consideration being given by the Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Jimmy Deenihan, T.D., to charging farmers for sheep scab eradication.

"This proposal is simply a mechanism for the reintroduction of the old Local Authority charges and must be rejected outright. However, I have absolutely no problem with the Minister's

proposal to increase the penalties for those who fail to comply with the regula-

"The vast majority of the compulsory scheme are still treating these sheep for scab, however, it is the few farmers who won't comply with any scheme who must be penalised. The concept that the polluter pays must apply to sheep scab eradication. The welfare conscious farmer who treats his sheep against scab should not be asked to pay on the double for the sins of his negligent neighbours," said Mr. O'Rourke.

The closing date for entries for the Family Farm Environmental Conservation and Safety Award is June 30 and all entry forms should be given to ICMSA officers or Teagasc.

The winner of the award will be announced at the Dungarvan Show and will ented with ly commissioned trophy and £500.

The County Chairman reminds farmers that while the control of farmyard pollution scheme is suspended, applications are being processed on the Dairy Hygiene Grants and those wishing to carry out work should apply to their local Department office.



Collection For Priests Of The Diocese





Back to school is the furthest thing from most people's minds at a time when the sun begins to shine and the children begin their summer holidays. Yet, by thinking of it now, you may be able to relieve some of the hardship associated with it in a few months times. For most parents, September brings huge bills. Books, bags, uniforms, runners — the list seems endless. If there are a few children in the house, maybe with someone starting secondary school or a Post Leaving Cert Course or Regional College or University, the costs seem insurmountable. For example, a new full set of books for a

young person starting at First Year Secondary can cost in the region of £175.

To cope with all this, regular saving is the answer. It's much better to save, hard as it may seem at the time, than to try to borrow the money at the last minute. There are a huge range of options for this. Post Office, Banks, Saving Stamps, etc. Most Credit Unions operate a "Savings Voucher" system for their members. Most of the shops which supply school books offer saving schemes, as do many of the retailers for school uniforms and clothes.

If your income is particularly low, you may be enti-tled to the "Back To School Clothing and Footwear Allowance." This is a special supplementary payment that exists to help ease the financial pressure at the beginning of the school year. It is available to any families on social welfare payments, Family Income Supplement and FAS training schemes, who can pass the means test outlined below. The payment is £40 for each child attending primary school and £55 for each child at secondary school or third level, and £25 for each child at pre-school. It is also interesting to note that it may also be payable for a child, under 18 years of age, who is not attending school, providing that the parent(s) are in receipt of a social welfare payment for the child.

The income limits are as

Couple + 1 child £141.10; + 2 children £156.30; + 3 children 171.50; + 4 children £186.70; + each extra child £15.10.

Lone Parent + 1 child £88.10; + 2 children £105.10; + 3 children £122.10; + 4 children £139.10; + each extra child £17.

To apply, contact your local Community Welfare Officer between June 1 and September 30. Obviously if a payment is received the most sensible thing to do is to buy the uniforms etc. or the school books etc. If it is spent on something else you will probably find yourself in a position in September where you have no money to meet those huge costs of going back to school." It may seem early days, but this is the time to be practical and prepare. By doing so now you may be able to avoid hardship and worry. [Notes for this column are






