One of a family of six, two boys and four girls from Moonamon, Lismore, the youth died instantly when a tractor he was travelling on overturned, trapping him underneath it.

The tractor was driven by a Dublin youth on holidays with close personal friends of the Cahill family when it hit a ditch and overturned at around 6.45 p.m. on a by-road in Toor.

Jacks were used to lift the tractor and the boy was removed from beneath it. The 14 year old was immediately pronounced dead and the body was later taken to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem was carried out yesterday evening. Anthony was a pupil of Lismore C.B.S. Secondary School where he had just completed first year. A keen sportsman, he played hurling with Lismore C.B.S. and the local Lismore club.

Abbeyside Clam Project Turned Down

Dungarvan harbour's proposed controversial 69 acre clam growing farm was given the official thumbs down last week by Marine Minister Sean Barrett.

In confirming his decision to refuse the licence, Minister Barrett said that after the most detailed consideration of every aspect of the proposal he believed it was in the public interest not to allow the clam growing development to go ahead in what would have been a significant area in the northern end of Dungarvan Harbour.

Minister Barrett's decision also gave regard to the rec-

ommendation of the Department's Aquaculture Licence Vetting Committee and to the objections lodged and concerns expressed by statutory bodies and others, in particular those of Waterford Co. Council, Dungarvan UDC and An Bord Failte.

For months the hotly debated issue grabbed local headlines with pro - and

anti - contingents both vociferous in their arguments. While the announcement came as no surprise to those who had heard the mounting speculation, the ministerial decision to refuse a fish culture licence was a major shock to Waterford Clam Ltd's managing director Sean Whelan.

GOOD INTENTIONS In his application for a

fish culture licence to the Aquaculture Section of the Marine Department, Mr. Whelan said he intended to develop a large scale clam growing venture at Dungarvan Bay which would produce a quality product for sale on the European market.

Initial employment figures were estimated at 4/500 full-time jobs, subsequently revised to 100 and finally as

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QUESTION

Can you tell me up to what age are school children entitled to free dental services, and what does it entitle them to?

ANSWER

Regulations came into effect on the 24th January 1995 which extended the entitlement of national school pupils to free dental services up to their fourteenth birthday.

The school dental service is provided in national schools where all children are screened regularly. A preventative and primary care dental treatment service is provided for defects noted during the screening.

Screening is usually carried out in certain classes — usually 2nd, 4th and 6th class but this can vary. Defects discovered at such examinations are treated free of charge at dental clinics. Emergency treatment is provided at dental clinics without an appointment.

If a child is referred to a specialist, then the specialist's treatment is also free of charge. Orthodontic services are also available to children with defects discovered at the school examination. The availability of this service and the length of the waiting list varies.

Children who are on a waiting list for orthodontic treatment will have this treatment carried out even if they are over the age limit by the time the treatment can be provided.

Children who have just completed 6th class will be recalled before their 14th birthday for a check up and preventative treatment. They will also be entitled to emergency treatment for the relief of pain.

National Campaign To Prevent Fish Kills

Since 1984, there have been over 800 recorded fish kills in Ireland. The main causes have been agriculture, industrial plants and general enrichment of the waters. June and July are the peak months for fish kills.

Minister of State at the Department of the Marine,

Eamon Gilmore, T.D., said he was very concerned at recent reports from the Central Fisheries Board, which monitors water pollution levels nationally. There have been 18 fish kills already recorded in 1995, including some serious incidents last month in Cork

and Monaghan.

FRESH WATER AT 24°C

Minister Gilmore said, "we need a national campaign of vigilance to prevent pollution in our waterways this summer. Fish life is very vulnerable in the current heatwave. Freshwater temperature has risen to 24°C and the fish are stressed from lack of oxygen," he added.

Continuing, the Minister said, "I am asking for full co-operation from our farmers, from State agencies and from industry during this period. I would also encourage members of the public to report any incidents of pollution in our waters to the Regional Fisheries Boards.

We need a national campaign to protect our freshwater environment.

"I have written to the Regional Fisheries Board to increase their vigilance at this time. The 1990 Water Pollution Act lays down the principle that the "polluter pays" for the costs and expenses incurred in a prosecution: The Fishery Boards will enforce this law strictly to protect fish stock," he concluded.

The Regional Fishery Boards have 14 Fisheries Environmental Officers around Ireland. Their task is to monitor water quality and to protect fish stocks from pollution. Regional Fishery Board staff work closely with TEAGASC and the IFA to increase farm awareness of the dangers from slurry and silage.

7% Female Presence in Gardai

Of the 10,726 members of the Garda Síochána, 713 are women, constituting less than 7% aggregate.

In light of this figure, Chairperson of the Council for the Status of Women Noreen Byrne has called for an increase in the number of female recruits. What the Gardai should be striving for is a 40% gender balance she said. Within the higher ranks of the gardai less than 3% are sergeants, 2% are inspectors and there is only one female superintendent in the country. These figures contrast greatly with those of the British police who recently appointed the first female chief constable to head the Lancashire force.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

Deputy General Secretary of the Garda Representative Associations, P.J. Stone however says that the best person for the job receive promotion irrespective of gender.

Garda Stone pointed out that 80% of the force remain ordinary members throughout their career, with only 20% attaining supervisory status. Both women and men, he said, compete at the same level for promotion, going

forward to the same exams and interviews. "No one is discouraging them, equal opportunities are there for everyone", he added.

FHS To Move Assembly & Management Out Of Dungarvan

In a sudden, dramatic turn, the rapidly expanding Food Hygiene Systems Ltd. is to pull its assembly operation and group management out of Dungarvan.

Having consulted with his business advisors on June 27th last, Managing Director, Eamonn O'Neill, stated that the FHS group management will leave Dungarvan in the next couple of weeks and relocate to either Waterford or Kilkenny. Speaking to The Dungarvan Leader Mr. O'Neill said that due to a lack of commitment and support to the project, regrettably he had no option but to move management and the assembly operation out of Dungarvan. He continued however, that should the current situation change in the near future he would review his decision. Mr. O'Neill concluded by thanking Waterford Foods Plc. and the farmers of Co. Waterford for their support and encouragement over the past few months.

The 20 extra installation jobs for the group's Thurles and Kilkenny operations will now be located in these locations. A sales, customer service and installation fa-

cility will remain at Clonea Road, employing 11 people by year end.

Mr. O'Neill claims that the nett job loss to Dungarvan

will be in the order of 39 people in 1995 and 100+ by the end of 1996 assuming the company achieves its aggressive expansion plans.

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Abbeyside Clam Project Turned Down

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 outlined in the licence application, Waterford Clams envisaged that 5 full-time and two part-time jobs would be created by the fourth year of the operation.

Access points to the clam growing plots would be from Abbeyside Strand, Ballinacourty road and via the Ballinacourty pier slip-way.

On hearing the ultimate thumbs down decision, Mr. Whelan said he was given to believe that his application for the licence would be considered on its merits, "but clearly that has not happened," he slammed. "At a time when the Dungarvan area is crying out for jobs, it is incredible that a government Minister could shoot down such an excellent project," said Mr. Whelan who revealed that he had presented a petition to the Marine Department containing almost 2,000 signatures of local people supportive of the development. This figure claimed included the names of 16 County Councillors and two Urban Council members. Over the past week, Mr. Whelan said he had been approached by many disappointed people who had stressed how political and powerful the whole situation is.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, a bitter Mr.

Whelan said "I feel I never got justice and I'm entitled to that." He said the national papers had known the decision a week before it was officially announced. Mr. Whelan stressed that his project would not have interfered with anyone and he is now waiting on the Marine Minister for a full, detailed explanation as to why the application was refused. When asked if he would re-apply to the Department with a revised proposal, Mr. Whelan said he hadn't given it much thought. "I stayed by the book and broke no rules," reflected Mr. Whelan. "If the case was looked at on its merits, I would get a licence," he added. In conclusion the

Waterford Clams M.D. thanked all the public representatives and members of the public who had supported him in his clam farm endeavor.

A DISGRACE

An avid supporter of the project since day one, UDC member Cllr. Tony Wright reiterated Mr. Whelan's sentiments and slammed Minister Barrett's decision as "stroke politics"

Cllr. Wright told the Dungarvan Leader that the Marine Minister's final decision had nothing to do with the merits of the case. "It's a disgrace," he added.

A LESSON IN DEMOCRACY

Meanwhile, on the other side of the fence, the Dungarvan Bay Amenity Protection Association which was formed in response to the clam application has warmly welcomed the licence refusal. The Association which is made up of local Abbeyside residents, fishermen, anglers and concerned bay users, said it is very happy that the Marine Minister has recognised the amenity value of Abbeyside beach to people of Abbeyside, Ballinacourty and Dungarvan.

In a press release the association states that the decision "will ensure that this area remains free of commercial development and continue to be available to the public for recreation purposes". The association continues, "we would like to thank all those who supported our campaign to preserve this beach especially the public representatives both national and local who were aware of the weight of local opposition to the project."

UDC member and supporter of the Dungarvan Bay Association, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan told the Dungarvan Leader that last week's decision was "a perfect example of democracy at work."

Likewise, Chairman of

Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Lar Hart said he welcomed the decision to refuse a clam growing licence. "I made no secret that I was against the development from the start," said Cllr. Hart adding that both the Co. Council and the UDC had voted against the project while Co. Manager Donal Connolly had remained totally unresponsive of the application while it interfered with other local bay users.

Serious reservations were also publicly expressed by Bord Fáilte and the Irish Wildlife Conservancy while the Dungarvan Bay Association had lodged a complaint with the European Commission.

While not against job creation opportunities, Cllr. Hart remained skeptical regarding the number of 'real' jobs the development would create.

FINAL CHAPTER

Now that the decision to refuse a fish culture licence has been made, the final chapter of the saga appears to be closed...or is it?

Obviously Mr. Whelan will be reluctant to part with his existing substantial investment in Dungarvan Harbour and it will be up to the Department of Marine to take up responsibility of any ongoing operations in the bay - be it unauthorised or otherwise.

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No Time To Snooze In The Sun This Month!

You will be torn two ways during July — between an urge to doze in the sun and a nagging concern about chores building up.

The month brings plenty of clipping, mowing and clearing up afterwards. Fortunately, most debris can go on the compost heap if it is weed-free and non-woody.

It soon rots down in the warmth, especially if you help nature by keeping the heap well-wetted and use a compost maker — add the recommended amount and regularly turn sides inwards so that the heap rots evenly.

Lawn clippings can be used as a mulch, albeit a scruffy one, to keep weeds down and soil moisture in.

With the lawn growing fast there is a temptation to mow it short, leaving it open to scorching in bright sunshine — go easy with the mower and keep the grass well watered.

Use the hosepipe sparingly and only at cool times of the day so that you minimise evaporation, ensure that the water reaches roots, and avoid temperature shock to plants.

If you would rather rely less on the hose, install a rain butt. The water it collects will be natural, free, and may help avoid water shortages later in the season.

Watering from a butt or tap also allows you to add liquid feeds to keep the lawn and plants in good condition.

It's not too hard to keep ahead of watering by just checking the dryness of the topsoil but check 'squash' crops such as marrows, courgettes, cucumbers and tomatoes, which are particularly at risk from sudden dehydration.

Roses come into their prime now and a few minutes now and then deadheading spent or wilting blooms will ensure a vigorous supply of colour.

Non-hybrid tea rose varieties yield healthy cuttings now. Pick out strong shoots about nine inches long and plant in good firm soil.

As you work, check for pests such as aphids/greenfly and signs of mildew or black spot. If infection can be cut away early then do so, but spray if necessary — apply sparingly, protect your skin and never spray in a breeze.

Trim hedges a little regularly rather than occasionally and drastically.

Though there is less planting this month, vegetables such as Savoy Cabbage, leeks and sprouting broccoli can go in now.

Pick strawberries as soon as they ripen — don't leave over-ripe, mouldy and diseased ones, or they may spoil others.

Pull out strawberry plants which are four years old — they are past their best and replacements need not cost anything.

You can start new plants by tying down healthy runners into pots of compost set in the ground. Once rooted, they can be cut away, dug up and brought on, ready for planting in August.

HERE IS A TRUE MEAT 'LOAF'



Here's a true meat 'loaf' — the meat mixture is pre-cooked and then stuffed into a hearty bread loaf.

PARMESAN LOAF

Ingredients

- 1 lb (450g) lean ground beef
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1 1/2 cups Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
- 1 (4 oz - 110g) can mushrooms, drained
- 1 cup sharp Cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 loaf Italian bread

Method

Preheat the oven to 400°F, 200°C, Gas Mark 6. Brown meat in a large frying pan



and drain. Add onion, green peppers and mushrooms. Cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Cut lengthwise a half inch thick slice from the top of

the bread. Scoop out the centre from the bottom piece leaving a shell. Fill cavity with meat mixture. Cover with top slice of bread so meat mixture will not dry

out during cooking. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Cook for 10 minutes. Discard top slice, if you wish. Slice and serve. Serves 6-8.

Muddied Helvick Harbour Could Jeopardise Lifeboat Plans

There is mounting local speculation that the muddied and silted state of the inner Helvick Harbour may jeopardise RNLi plans to relocate a lifeboat station.

Closed for over 26 years, the need for the re-establishment of a lifeboat station at Helvick resurfaced earlier this year, due in no small way to a dramatic increase in local fishing and sea leisure activities and the recent number of serious seafaring activities.

Attending a meeting in Dungarvan last March,

George Cooper, Chief of Operations Poole with RNLi, confirmed that he would recommend to the Institute to provide a lifeboat facility at the Gaeltacht site.

While the final decision was confidently expected at the RNLi's board meeting in June, there are now increasing local fears that the sorry state of the muddy harbour may give the Institute second thoughts.

STUCK IN THE MUD
Speaking on the issue, Dungarvan Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy said

that such is the present condition of the harbour, that a lifeboat could not be launched at low tide. He claimed that the dredging job carried out on the harbour some years ago at the behest of Waterford County Council had proved to be less than satisfactory, and that much of the mud taken from the harbour at the time had now returned.

"Experienced local fishermen have told me that the mud wasn't dumped far enough out from the harbour and that its overall condition is as bad, if not worse, now than it was originally", the Deputy added.

Deputy Deasy also claimed that the RNLi had recently been to Helvick with a boat on a 'trial' run but that it had got bogged down because of the level

of mud and silt in the harbour.

"As a result, the plans to return the lifeboat there could be in real jeopardy", he warned.

ONUS ON COUNCIL

The onus of securing a lifeboat station at Helvick lies primarily with Waterford County Council who are responsible for the provision of adequate shore facilities.

Deputy Deasy confirmed that he has written to the Council expressing his seniors concern at the situation and urging the local authority to take immediate steps programme again undertaken at the harbour.

"It would be nothing short of a disaster if the RNCI decides not to return the Lifeboat to Helvick because of the muddied state of the harbour, said Deasy, "all possible pressure must now be brought to bear on the Co. Council to prevent such an occurrence," he stressed.

Local Ostriches Exhibited At Cork Show

The Dungarvan based Munster Premier Ostriches sent two "delegates" to the Cork Show at Ballintemple last Sunday, July 2nd where they proved to be a huge attraction.

The two prime breeding South African ostriches represented a £10,000 investment, one that Premier Ostrich owner Johnny Hurley strongly recommends. This alternative and interesting type of farming first arrived in Dungarvan last February when Johnny opened the very first Munster ostrich

farm at Garranbane.

A pioneering businessman, Johnny describes the ostrich sector as the major agri-growth area of the future. Each breeding bird costs over £5,000 and 2 females and one male are needed to start a farm.

The returns however can be enormous with premium rates paid for ostrich eggs (£300), toenails, leather, meat and even their feathers.

And the good news is that female ostriches can lay up to 70 eggs per season, with a least 45 of them fertile.

Ten year old Dilin Fennell, son of Ann and Willie Fennell, formerly of Ring, Dungarvan and grandson of Willie and Mary Fennell, Strandside South, Abbey-side has certainly raised a few eyebrows in the American Little League this season.

Having spent the first 9 years of his life in Dungarvan where hurling and Gaelic football are a strong

tradition, Dilin was quickly introduced to the American national pastime, a sport in which he has shown considerable ability to date.

Dilin and his parents moved to Eau Claire, America little over a year ago where Willie now works as a truck driver with Schneider International.

A KEY PLAYER

A member of the Presto Panthers, Dilin was quickly

spotted by Panthers coach, Joe Hamilton during pre-season tryouts who said he noticed Dilin's enthusiasm for baseball.

"His play decided it", said Hamilton who added that Dilin has the basic skills needed to be a good baseball player. "He doesn't have the repetitive skills yet, but the hand-eye coordination is there", he said.

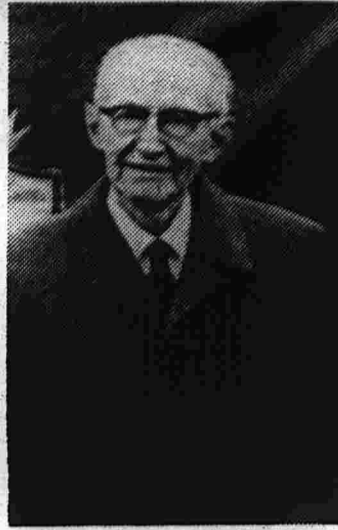
PLANS TO CONTINUE

Death Of Dungarvan Born Nobel Prize Winner

Dr. Ernest T.S. Walton, the only Irishman to win a Nobel Prize for physics, died in the early hours of Sunday, June 25 last at Belfast City Hospital at the age of 91.

Born in Epworth Cottage, Strandside South, Abbeyside in 1903, Dr. Walton was the son of a Methodist Minister and was educated at Banbridge Academy, Cookstown Academy and the Methodist College in Belfast before entering Trinity College, Dublin in



The Nobel citation honoured their "pioneering work on the transmutation of atomic nuclei by artificially accelerated atomic particles."

CHANGED HISTORY

After Cambridge, Dr. Walton returned to Trinity College where he continued his atomic work as a Fellow of the College and later was the Erasmus Smith Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy. He retired in 1974.

On his retirement, Professor Cocker of the department of chemistry, said the course of history has been changed as a result of Dr. Walton's work.

CIVIC HONOUR

In 1990, the Abbeyside native was warmly welcomed home to Dungarvan at a civic reception in Lawlor's Hotel where he was presented with a specially prepared framed civic honour scroll and a framed photograph of the old Walton family home at Abbeyside.

That same year, Dr. Walton attended the unveiling of a plaque to commemorate his achievements at the newly named Walton Causeway Park, Abbey-side.

1922. There he studied physics and mathematics before winning a scholarship to Cambridge when he was 24.

While a research student at Cambridge prior to World War II, Dr. Walton joined forces with fellow scientist Sir. John Cockcroft to take a different approach to atomic science.

Using high voltages, the two scientists were able to produce nuclear transmutations on a larger scale than before and get a better insight into the structure of the atomic nuclei.

The pioneering duo artificially split the atom and for their contribution to science, both were awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1951.

Main Street Shopping Centre At Standstill

The wrangle over the proposed Main Street shopping emporium may well be referred to An Bord Pleanála before a final decision on the multi million pound development can be made.

Dungarvan U.D.C. is expected to arrive at a decision on the Irish Nationwide Building Society's planning application sooner than the July 31 deadline. Waterford Co. Manager, Donal Connolly, however, said last week that even if planning permission is granted with conditions attached, it may well be appealed to An Bord Pleanála.

"TO BE OR NOT TO BE"

Mooted eight years ago, the exciting shopping mall application was the first to be lodged under the present Urban Renewal Scheme 1994 - 1997.

The I.N.B.S. proposal however came under strong attack from the Retail, Grocery, Dairy and Allied Trade Association (R.G. DATA) who lodged a detailed objection with the Council's Planning Department.

The Council is presently working with the developers to try to satisfy R.G. DATA's concerns but time is of the essence to INBS who hope to avail of the Urban Renewal Scheme's financial incentives.

Whatever the Council's decision (who certainly appear supportive of the development), the ultimate ruling could well be in the hands of the Planning Board.

SUCCESS

Heartiest congratulations to Waterford minor hurlers, and to our Tallow representative Stephen Curley in particular on a splendid win over Tipperary. For the second successive year and third year out of four they won their way to the Munster Final after defeating the same opponents at the same venue as last year, Tipperary and Fermoy respectively. This is a considerable achievement because over the last five or six years Tipp have invested heavily in coaching, at under 14, under 15 and under 16 levels especially. Those involved (and I have personal experience of the situation) are most sincere and spare no effort to sift and sieve all available talent and to give the young hurlers the best possible coaching and training.

The entire annual on-going programme was financed by Tipperary County Board in the firm belief that it would pay off eventually at minor, under-21 and senior level. So far efforts have been relatively fruitless. Why I wonder?

Finding an answer to that is no easy task. For one thing the massive coaching input in Waterford — schools, colleges, clubs at under-14, 16 and 18 — has matched anything Tipperary or any other neighbouring county has managed to organise. Peter Power, Colm Bonner (up Tipp.) and Pdraigh Fanning have led the way. If it wasn't for their work, hurling within the county would be in a parlous state.

Peter's role with the primary schools in the West is of supreme importance. He is not merely content to visit

every school regularly and perform his duties. He establishes a happy rapport with the children and creates a pleasant enjoyable atmosphere. He enthuses, motivates and inspires. The love and enjoyment he derives from hurling and the magical effect his passion for the game generates in his pupils is there for all to see. Liam O'Donoghue of Limerick, Ger Loughnane of Clare and John Cummins of Tipperary marvel at his effervescent nature and capacity for hard work. My fear that Peter — such in his zest for coaching — will suffer burn-out and weary of the hard repetitive slog. Meanwhile I hope his employers realise his worth in the only meaningful way. So the school is the key area. If the flexibility and suppleness of wrist aren't acquired at school level it is too late afterwards. Concentration on the schools pays rich dividends.

Waterford have always found it difficult to better Tipp. in any grade of hurling or football. Of course Tipperary's playing numbers are greater than ours so that gives them an advantage straight away. Yet numbers alone guarantee nothing. Of faly from a small playing base have proved that over the last 15 years. So the answer to our question must lie elsewhere. Could it be player quality and team preparation?

Player quality doesn't mean skill alone. If that were so the most skillful players would always win. Rather is skill one element, albeit the most important, of a team's make up. Without skill all the physical attributes, all the tactical planning, all the strength, speed, stamina and determination won't translate into success because the scores won't come if control and use of the ball are absent. We all know good hurlers, at club and county level, who never realise their true potential, who "freeze" on the big day. Giving such players a realisation of their own true worth and an increase of self-confidence is more important preparation. A team without character, without "intestinal fortitude" as John D. Hickey used to describe it (guts to you and me) achieves little.

I admire Waterford junior hurlers. Not a great team, but, my goodness, are they well motivated, imbued with unquenchable spirit, a true mirror of the spirit of Greg Fives, their manager. They showed true grit in both games at Pairc Ui Chaoimh

overcoming a crisis on both days against Tipperary and Limerick, to fashion great victories.

Next Sunday at Thurles our minors take on a good Cork team for the Munster crown. Our good forward line, proven scorers, can win it for us. Nicky Cashin is in charge, another plus in our favour because Nicky has impeccable credentials and had operated with great success in hurling's greatest nursery, St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny, winners of numerous senior hurling

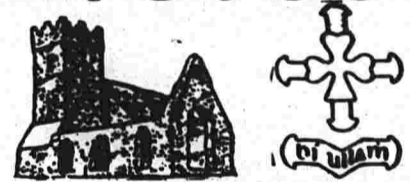

Deputy Austin Deasy On Old Lismore Hospital

The following question was tabled recently in the Dail by Deputy Austin Deasy—"To ask the Minister for Health if he will consult with the South Eastern Health Board regarding the future of the old district hospital in Lismore, County Waterford, which local voluntary groups would like to see converted into a tourist hostel for the benefit of the tourist industry in the locality, in view of the fact that it is presently lying idle and that the voluntary groups in question are not in a posi-

tion to pay the purchase price for what ineffect is a building which may well become derelict, if not occupied and used in the immediate future."

Health Minister Michael Noonan replied—"I have obtained the views of the South Eastern Health Board in this matter. Board policy in relation to property which becomes surplus to requirements is to offer it in the first instance, to the local housing authority and, if they are not interested, to sell it to the highest bidder.

I gather that the housing authority are not interested in this particular property.

The South Eastern Health Board has confirmed that they would prefer to sell this property rather than lease it.

However, I agree that it would be a pity to allow the building to lie idle indefinitely and eventually become derelict. Therefore I will suggest to the Board, that if they fail to dispose of the building within a certain period that they consider leasing it to the local voluntary group."

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

SCANNING COWS

More and more cows are being scanned each year in an effort to improve fertility. The idea is that they would be confirmed either in-calf, or not in-calf at an early stage after service. This would allow some remedial action to be taken in some cases. A farmer could easily say that he will know one way or the other in three weeks without scanning.

This would not always be correct. Some cows will not repeat for 6, 9 or 12 weeks, a long time has then been lost and this would have been detected by the scanner. Other cows have cysts and may keep repeating until eventually they are culled or the cysts disappear naturally and the cow finally goes in calf.

One visit from a scanner will not solve a fertility problem. Neither will it stop some cows from repeating, even if a problem is identified and is successfully treated by a vet. A combination of tail painting and monthly or two weekly scanning is proving successful at improving fertility.

SHEEP

EARLY LAMBERS

For those farmers who decide to continue with early lamb next year, the next few weeks are critical. Good planning, proper ewe selection and most of all effective mating management are crucial to the achievement of the high litter size and conception rates which are necessary for profitable production.

SPONGING

Sponging is the surest and most effective means of advancing lambing date, compacting the lambing season and increasing litter size through the use of P.M.S.

PLANNING YOUR LAMBING SEASON

Select the date on which you want your first batch of ewes to lamb. Allow for a significant number to lamb for three days each side of the selected date. Count back 159 days to find out the ideal sponging date. Leave sponges in for twelve days and inject with P.M.S. on removal. Exactly 48 hours after sponge removal, introduce rams.

RAMS

The ram is obviously a critical element in the success of the whole operation. The essentials are:- 1. Have enough rams - 1 per eight sponged ewes, 2. Have rams in good condition and well rested. Rams borrowed and straight off trucks or trailers or pooled rams used within the previous four days are not ideal, 3. Do not use harnesses on rams as they can become loose during this period of intense activity and cause injury, 4. Use rams in groups of three with 24 to 25 ewes, 5. There is no advantage in switching rams from group to group.

REPEATS

Many early lamb producers do not allow a repeat mating. Ewes which fail to conceive are back to the mid-season batch. This leads to compact lambing, a tighter lamb sales pattern and earlier sales at hopefully higher price. It also avoids the low litter size common among repeat lambers due to the absence of P.M.S. before the repeat mating. The disadvantage is that only 50% of ewes may lamb to the first mating, which doubles the sponging cost for each ewe lambing. If repeats are allowed, 1 ram per 40 ewes is sufficient and he should be raddled and harnessed. Where no repeats are to be allowed, sponge 50% more ewes than would be required to lamb early.

POST MATING

Keep ewes on a reasonable plane of nutrition for one month after lambing. Luxurious levels of feed are not required of desirable. Take particular care of rams - feed some concentrate (high protein - no magnesium) to restore condition and examine chest area.

Try to avoid serious disturbances during the period shortly after mating such as dipping, dosing etc.

OVERALL

Plan your system carefully, especially the winter and spring feeding programme - do not depend on grass except at very low stocking rates, consider the amount of money to be invested and the possible returns. Be conservative in your budgets and you can only err on the positive side.

1995/96 Restructuring Scheme Falls Far Short Of Expectations

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman Gerald Curran has said the EU Commission had let small Irish dairy farmers down by failing to deliver the expected improved income and quota criteria in the 1995/96 Subsidised Milk Quota restructuring scheme.

Further to IFA representations, the Department of Agriculture were seeking from the EU Commission a relaxation of the scheme's maximum quota threshold from 20,000 to 30,000 gallons, and the removal of the 1/3 off-farm income requirement, both of which had kept many deserving producers from gaining ac-

cess to the subsidy in the 1994/95 scheme.

In the absence of improved criteria, Mr. Curran recognised as a positive move the decision by Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates to increase the subsidy to 75p/gal for all eligible producers with quotas below 22,000 gallons.

"The increased subsidy is of course to be welcomed, and we renew our call to co-operatives to complement the recently launched 9.5% IFA/AIB Quota Restructuring Financial Package by contributing a further 2.75% interest rate subsidy. This can be done at a relatively low cost to the co-op, and

would allow individual dairy farmers access to finance at a rate equivalent to an exceptional 6.5%," he said.

He however deplored the fact that, in respect of income, the criterion remains the same as that which failed many keen small dairy farmers last year, the maximum income is £15,000, of which 1/3 at most obtained from off-farm activity.

Also, at the increased level of 22,000 gallons, the quota ceiling falls well short of the expected 30,000 gallons.

"I am extremely disappointed, on behalf of the many small farmers who were pinning their hopes of improved viability on access to subsidised quota, to see that the EU Commission failed to accept the case made to them by the Department for the relaxation of the criteria governing eligibility for the subsidy," the IFA man said.

"Only £38m. was spent last year on this scheme, subsidising 7.5m gallons of quota. There is a little over £6m available for this year's scheme, which, with the increased subsidy, can cater for 8m gallons this year," he continued.

"However, I am concerned that much of this amount could be underspent, due to the retention of exceedingly stringent income and quota

criteria, which will rule out many of the smaller dairy farmers for whom the scheme was initially intended," he said.

No Basis For Fertiliser Price Hype Says IFA Industry Chief

Waterford IFA Industry Committee Chairman, Matt Cunningham, has rejected recent fertiliser price hype from manufacturers and suppliers in advance of this year's second cut silage.

He said: "We have analysed prices actually being paid by farmers and we can find no basis for the prices being quoted by certain suppliers, particularly in the south of the country."

Mr. Cunningham said that nitrogen in the form of CAN (27.5%N) is being quoted at £122 to £124 per tonne by suppliers but is available at prices as low as £114 per tonne in the east and midlands, CAN (27.5%N) is freely available at between £116 to £118 per tonne.

The Waterford IFA Industry chief also reported prices for high nitrogen compounds of £152 to £158 depending on the particular formulation.

Mr. Cunningham added: "Recent price hype is a simplistic attempt by certain fertiliser suppliers to take advantage of the upturn in

Farmers Less Vulnerable Following Enactment of 1995 Occupiers' Liability Act

The enactment into law last week of the Occupiers' Liability Act signals the end of a long campaign by ICMSA to protect the interests of land and property owners. Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, the ICMSA President, advised farmers that they are now less vulnerable than they were here-to-fore. In particular he said that under the Act farmers can exclude their duty of care to visitors to their farms by the erection of notices at their farm entrances.

Mr. O'Dwyer recently launched an information campaign directed at farmers, a significant part of which is the provision of specially printed notices in accordance with the Act. He said the principal aim of the ICMSA action is to ensure the maximum possible protection of farmers and land owners rights under the new legislation.

During the last five years ICMSA lobbied extensively for a change to the Occupiers' Liability legislation to ensure that farmers are not exposed to unfair and unreasonable liability for persons coming on to their farms.

VISITORS CAN BE REGARDED IN SAME WAY AS TRESPASSERS AND RECREATIONAL USERS

"That Act which is now in place contains many of the proposals and amendments put forward by ICMSA. It sets out to provide that the duty of care owed by farmer occupiers to trespassers and recreational users, is one of not acting with reckless disregard or intentionally harming the person.

"While the Act protects farmers generally in the case of trespassers and recreational users, this is definitely not the case as far as visitors are concerned. However by the erection of notices, as produced by ICMSA, farmers can exclude the special duty of care owed by visitors and reduce it to the same duty as is owed to trespassers and recreational users. This is a most welcome development and one which we are pleased to have achieved," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He stressed that the special duty of care which would be owed to visitors is excluded only by the erection of a proper notice prominently displayed at the principal points of entry to farms.

Macra Supports Rotational T.B. Testing

Following a meeting last week between farm organisations and the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, T.D., Mr. Joe Healy, President of Macra na Feirme made an impassioned plea for a resolution of the present impasse regarding rotational testing: "We support the Minister's present proposals regarding rotational testing. We believe the proposals are another step in an incremental process with the ultimate aim of solving a problem that has bedeviled the industry for 40 years."

Farmers are big losers in this debacle and have been left on the side-line as the Minister and the I.V.U. slog it out. We have paid the price and still been held to ransom. "We want rotational testing implemented but it will only work if it is coupled with a reduction in farmer contribution and we must be satisfied that the test is both accurate and trustworthy."

VEC To Strengthen Ties With Ring School

Existing links between the Co. Waterford Vocational Educational Committee and Scoil San Nioclas are soon to strengthen with discussions shortly to take place between the two educational establishments.

In a letter to the June meeting of the VEC, the chairman of the Scoil San Nioclas Board, Liam Suipeil, who is also a member of the VEC, said his Gaeltacht school has been in existence since 1959 when it began in co-operation with Colaiste na Rinne. Mr. Heffernan said they had supplied teachers to the school at different times

over the years, and now with the school struggling to support itself the VEC is being asked to help it to expand and develop.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally urged the VEC to give every possible assistance to "this great Gaeltacht school" and it was agreed unanimously to enter into the discussions being sought by the Scoil San Nioclas Committee of Management.

TOURANEENA NOTES

The late Fr. Jim Kiely O.S.A. Director of the Irish Chaplaincy Scheme in Great Britain. Many mourn him at Funeral Masses in London and in his native Sliabh gCua in the Waterford Gaeltacht.

There were moving scenes at St. Augustines Hammersmith, London on Wednesday 28 June when the remains of Fr. Jim Kiely were removed from the Augustinian Church Fulham Road for burial in nearby Mortlake Cemetery. Young and old visibly cried as his coffin was borne down the aisle of the Hammersmith Church which brought to mind an earlier quotation "see how these Christians love one another, and perhaps it was only in his dying that the depth of feeling and good-will there was for him from the many he touched during his years as a priest was revealed. He was truly a real Christian man, his every word, his very being was an example of Christianity in action. Over 100 priests and Bishop Brady representing Cardinal Daly and Bishop Pat O'Donohoe representing Cardinal Hume attended the funeral Mass.

His fellow priest and countymen at St. Augustines, Carlisle, Fr. Seamus Ahearne, that English and Scottish Provincial of the Augustinians in his eulogy said the Jim's vision of God and church were far bigger than the conventional views of most. Jim believed that God was everywhere and so he was out there where-ever people were, in the pubs, the clubs where people played sport as well as at their christenings, at their weddings and their funerals.

Jim was no academic but his faith and vision of God and church have him a real wisdom, understanding, know-how and organising ability and a kind of common sense that without conflict enabled him to achieve what many would regard as being impossible.

He had a capacity for work and achievement which continuously astounded those who worked close to him and his great fortitude and attention to detail became most apparent in the last few months as he prepared for death. Though unwell for some time he refused to slow down and the first acknowledgement to those around him that his strength was failing was his non attendance to the annual fund raising concert last March at Wembly for the Irish Chaplaincy Scheme in Britain of which he was the Irish Bishop's appointee as Director.

When the news came out that he was terminally ill he received thousands of messages and letters of good-will and he continued to send replies in which he spoke openly about his cancer, right up to a week before he died. He further acknowledged these letters by personally participating in preparing extracts from the letters he received to be published after his death. These came from an extraordinary range of people and touched on all aspects of his complex ministry and give a deep insight into the kind of priest he was. Many people from Sliabh gCua travelled to London to the funeral and were joined by many from the home district living in the London area.

The same moving scenes were repeated at St. Marys parish church in Touraneena in the Sliabh gCua gaeltacht where

friends of his childhood and a host of people from all over Ireland gathered on the following Saturday to pay their final respects to perhaps the greatest and certainly the most loved of the many priests who were born in the area.

The great sense of shock and regret at Fr. Jim's death touched practically every family in the district and the church was filled to capacity for the funeral Mass celebrated by Fr. Byrne Provincial of the Augustinian order and by some 60 priests which included many of his Augustinian colleagues as well as Bishops Russell and Bishop Lee. The liturgy was as Fr. Jim would have planned himself and indeed as he often did when he came to the Touraneena church to celebrate Mass which he did on many occasions over his priestly life. The music at the Mass incorporated Sliabh Geal gCua na Feile, and the other hymns and songs of Ireland all of them with words and musical themes which largely through Jim's own influence have become incorporated in the prayer liturgy of Sliabh gCua.

In the homily Fr. Dick Lyng talked about Fr. Jim's work as missionary in Nigeria where his great talents with people were first developed, his work as a community priest in Drogheda where his ministry to the youth of the area had a revolutionary and lasting effect, his work as Head of the Irish Support and Advice Centre in London where he befriended many thousands of Irish and other people during his time in that post and later his directorship of the Irish Chaplaincy Scheme in Britain where his achievement and workload astonished all around him. He told many anecdotes about Fr. Jim's life and how he returned to Sliabh gCua regularly to re-suscitate himself spiritually and mentally in the area and amongst the people he loved so much. He said there were many layers to Jim; he was a man of contradictions, an aloof, reflective introvert; he loved the company and a sing-song. An inveterate prankster he was a deeply serious man. A prophet and an innovator, he was at heart the traditional Irish Catholic priest and he had a special affect and admiration for the "outsiders".

Fr. Jim was the only son of the late Lar and Josephine Kiely of Touraneena. He attended the local school at Touraneena after which he went on to the Augustinian Secondary College in Dungarvan. He joined the Augustinians in 1955 and was ordained in 1962.

He came from a unique but humble family all of whom entered religious orders, Sr. Angela (June) former Superior of Colaiste Mhuire in Dungarvan and now attached to the Cahir Mercy Community, Sr. Marie based in Guildford and Sr. Ann Superior General of the congregation of the Franciscan Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood and Sr. Gertrude who up to the time of her death in 1984 was attached to the Dungarvan Mercy Community and based at the Dungarvan District Hospital.

50 Day Walk To Highlight Public Disgrace

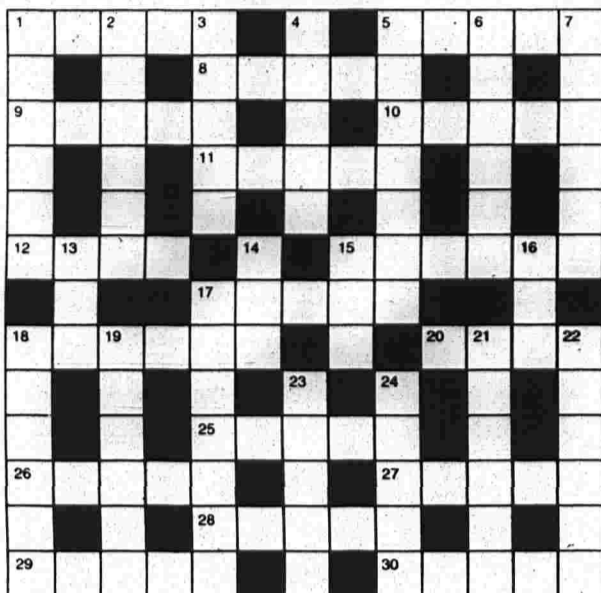

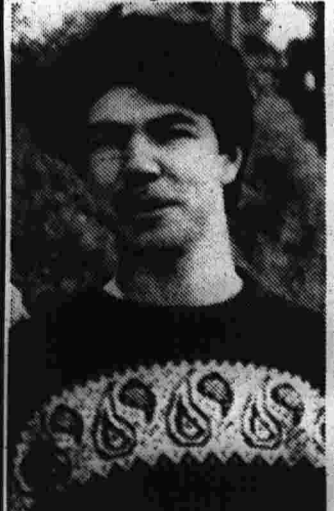

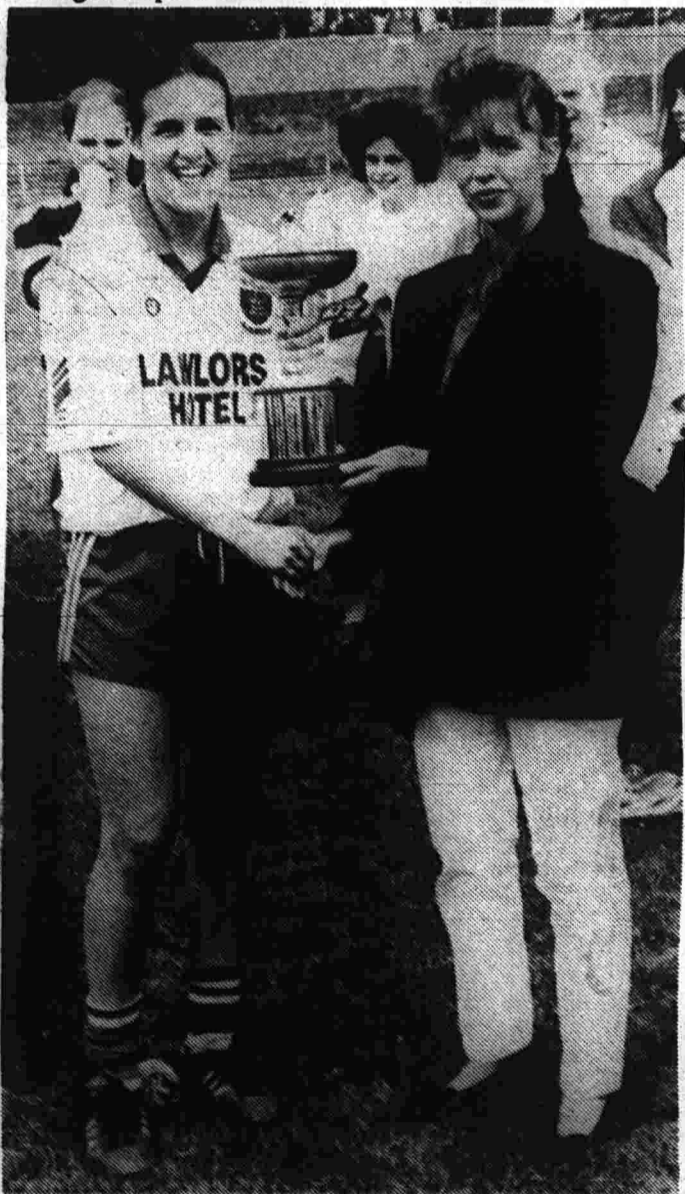

and I must say that I was very impressed with the skill level and all round attention given to the various individual skill drills and team performance aspects of the sessions.

THE RULES,

A SENSIBLE REVIEW
In our Rules corner this week just a few very interesting ones for you:—

1. Provided he has at least one foot on the ground, a player may make a side-to-side, (and remember only side-to-side) charge of an opponent—(a) who is in possession of the ball or (b) who is playing the ball or (c) when both players are moving to play the ball. How often have we heard "sure I hit him with my shoulder ref.!" and that after the charge was to the back or to the front. Remember the charge must be side-to-side.

2. When he is in the small rectangle, the goalkeeper may not be charged at all in any manner, side-to-side or otherwise. The goalkeeper may be challenged for possession of the ball and his puck or kick or pass may be blocked. Incidental contact with the goalkeeper while playing the ball is permitted.

That's what the rule states. This is a long way removed from the days when the goalie was "eesy meat" for the in-rushing attackers. You had to be tough to survive in those days. Of course, the goalie did have the protection of the "hold off tackle", so very ably executed by his backs. If the backs failed to "hold them out" it was fend for yourself goalie. Now all that is changed and the rule says what it says.

This rule applies to both Hurling and Football.

3. Scoring(a) a score may be made by striking the ball in flight with the hand or hands. (Hurling and Football); (b) a score shall be allowed if in the opinion of the referee, the ball was prevented from crossing the goal line by anyone other than a player or the referee.

Now imagine that one cropping up and the referee awarding a score as per rule. (Hurling and Football).

This was the second successive year in which we have survived in a photo finish with Tipperary in the minor grade and most of the people who saw the game will agree that there was that little bit more nail-biting stuff in the second half of this one, than there was in the 1994 game. Both were thrillers.

It was great to be in sunny Fermoy on Wednesday evening when we saw Waterford display skill, courage, fitness, discipline and anything else that was required in the circumstances, to beat a splendidly prepared Tipperary team who could be excused for not hiding their bitter disappointment at this second beating by Waterford, by a single point in exactly twelve months.

Tipperary had been very well prepared for the game, but did not have the advantage of a first round, as we did, but as the programme stated, they had very satisfactory trial games with Laois, Limerick and Galway. This lent support to the prediction that this one would go down to the wire. It sure did and the tit-for tat trend of the final quarter left the very big crowd breathless until the Clare referee Sean MacMahon blew the final whistle at the end of the 62 minutes.

The second half produced really top-class hurling and I'm sure that all the real neutrals must have said that it was a pity there had to be a loser. We did have to play second fiddle all through the first half and our eight wides left us trailing by three points at half way. We saw a different Waterford team in the second half and I'm sure that Tipperary must have been shocked at the sudden transformation.

PLAY

Ken McGrath sent wide in the first minute. A point by Eugene O'Neill in the 3rd and one from Michael Murray in the 4th left the sides level. Dan Shanahan's shot rebounded off the post in the 6th minute and there followed two Tipperary points per Mark O'Leary and Denis Kelly to leave the score 0-3 to 0-1. Two further points by their brilliant player John Enright followed for Tipp before Dave Bennett pointed his first from a free in the game. Tipperary hit back with points from Michael Bevens and Eugene O'Neill to leave them 5 points clear before Jamie O'Meara had our third score in the 26th min. Dan Shanahan, Jamie O'Meara and Ken McGrath, in turn, sent wide. Cahill pointed for Tipp and we had points by Dave Bennett and a great score by Michael

White to leave it 0-8 to 0-5 before Michael Murray had a very near miss in the 31st minute.

SECOND HALF

In less than a minute Dave Bennett pointed a Waterford free, but within another minute Tipperary had brought one back when corner forward Michael Kennedy had a very good score under pressure. Then came the first goal of the game when Michael Murray shot an unstoppable ball past the helpless keeper, to leave the teams level at 0-9 to 1-6 in the fourth minute. Enright sent Tipp back in front with a super point in the 6th min. Eoin Bennett replaced Antoin Lennon in the Waterford attack. In the 7th min. Dave Bennett sent over a tremendous point to bring the teams level again. Then followed another fine score by Dan Shanahan to put Waterford in front for the first time in the game.

Within another minute (9th) a number of players combined in an attack which sent Michael White through for our second goal and a 4 points lead. Eamon Corcoran had a long range point for Tipp. and two minutes later Waterford keeper David Fowler was applauded for his spectacular save from Michael Kennedy. The ball went over for a '65' and Mark O'Leary made no mistake from the free.

Fowler's puck out was long and reached Shanahan who sent to Dave Bennett and who in turn sent to brother Eoin who crashed the ball to the Tipp. net in the 13th minute. We were six points clear a minute later when Dave Bennett pointed a close in free (3-9 to 0-12).

In the 16th min. Dave Bennett sent wide and after the puck out our defence was caught napping and allowed Michael Kennedy through for their first goal which undoubtedly had an inspirational affect on their side. Waterford supporters, noted for their reaction to

this kind of result, swarmed on to the pitch to engulf their heroes in their traditional celebratory manner and it was a great feeling to witness a couple of thousand Waterford followers leave the beautiful Fitzgerald Park, Fermoy in such high spirits.

It was a great game with a wonderful result and we say well done to team coach Nicky Cashin and everyone concerned with the victory.

We also have eight matches in round six of the championship listed as well as a full programme of divisional hurling ties down for decision, but some of these will have to be changed as several clubs have minor players included on their senior/junior panel. I know that the situation is being examined after the publication of the minor line-out and every effort will be made to play as many games as possible in order to keep the championships on schedule.

Also, if we beat Limerick at Fraher field this evening, we are due to play Clare in the Munster final on next Wednesday, so readers are advised to consult their clubs before travelling to games over the next week or so.

MINOR HURLERS HAVE A CHANCE

There is little point in writing about our record against Cork in minor hurling as it is too well known to every follower of the game in the county. Because of this disappointing record against the Rebel county, a win here in the Munster final on Sunday before a massive crowd would be something sweeter than anything that we have achieved since '92.

Many readers will recall the '93 final round match against red hot favourites, Cork at Pairc Ui Caoimh when we came off second best on a 2-12 to 0-12 score-line after leading for quite a while and missing a couple of scores that would have made the difference. Coming out of Pairc Ui Caoimh that night, people were talking about our hard luck, the Cork hoodoo at minor level, our supposed inferiority complex and our lack of belief in ourselves, etc. as reasons why we lost. Those and other reasons have been trotted out many times before, but in the vast majority of cases the reason was that we were not as good as Cork. Like in the Munster final last year when they beat us 2-15 to 0-9. There we didn't play at our best and we also conceded one very soft goal.

Whatever about what happened before, this is a new championship and after two splendid victories and two top-class performances there is growing confidence that this can be our year to beat the champions, Cork who seem to have got it easy against Limerick beating them by 15 points at Kilmallock on the same night on which we defeated Tipperary at Fermoy. According to one report, Limerick were a poor enough team and this report is supported by the fact that they failed to score in the second half, an unusual fact in the

Munster Championship.

The Waterford team will not be announced until mid-week, but it is not expected to show more than a change or two and maybe a couple of positional changes also. David Foley who was tried and not found wanting against Tipp will again man the goal and it is likely the Eugene O'Brien, Liam Kelly, if recovered from his injury and Freddy Kelly will man the full-back line in from of Owen O'Sullivan, Ken McGrath and Stephen Curley. This line was brilliant with Ken McGrath playing as outstandingly as he did against Clare.

Michael Molumphy and Shane Flynn, both of whom made life difficult for a good Tipperary partnership in the semi-final, will surely be given a vote of confidence and will retain their midfield berths.

We could see a change in attack with young Eoin Bennett being retained in favour of Antoin Lennon although Lennon could be selected and Bennett held in reserve. Only an injury would keep Dan Shanahan, Michael Murray, Jamie O'Meara, Dave Bennett and Michael White off the line-out.

Cork's best will include Niall Murphy, full-back, Mike Doherty, centre-half back, Austin Walsh, Stephen O'Halloran, Brian O'Keeffe, Michael O'Connell and co. and their supporters will be looking to these players to see them through.

We can hardly expect a better display than what we saw against Tipperary and hopefully a repeat of this will be enough to help us make history against the mighty Cork.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

PASSAGE V DE LE SALLE

Nothing seems to have gone right for De Le Salle since their two first round matches against Roanmore and Dunhill. After beating Roanmore in a splendid game they were being tipped as one of the surprise packets of the championship, and it was thought that they confirmed this opinion when they beat Dunhill in their

next game. Then they failed badly in their next matches, but played very well against Lismore last Saturday in Cappoquin. They will surely win their final match, which is against Clonea, but here against last years finalists, Passage, I doubt if they will prove good enough.

LISMORE V CLONEA

Lismore need to win this one to keep on course for a place in the top four, but unless something terrible goes wrong, the Western side should score a decisive win over a side who are heading for relegation to division 2.

There can be a doubt about this one as the club have so many players involved in the minor county team. It could go off until Tuesday evening. It is fixed for the Fraher field.

BALLYGUNNER V DUNHILL

This should be an easy one for the 'Gunners who must be still "reeling" from their unexpected defeat by neighbours, Roanmore last week-end.

A vital one for both clubs who are each on 8 points. The result here can make the difference between qualifying and losing out, depending of course on the result of the last matches a week later. Four-Mile-Water look to be in great form, judging by their huge win against Dungarvan of Saturday evening, and they must be fancied to win here against the 1994 intermediate county champions.

BALLYDUFF V STRADBALLY

The league leaders, Ballyduff are surely not going to slip up at this stage and allow no hoppers, Stradbally into the points bracket when they meet over the weekend in round six.

The points would help Stradbally in the upcoming relegation issue, but I cannot see this becoming a reality.

PORTLAW V ST. SAVIOURS

Portlaw will go all out to win here as the points are vital to them in their present situation. They are only a single point away from a play-off situation and while they could remain that way and not qualify, there is a reasonable chance that if they win this one, they may yet qualify.

I cannot see Saviours beating Portlaw here.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

ABBEYSIDE V ST. MOLLERANS

Only two points separated the sides when they clashed last year and by all accounts, the Mollerans have improved a lot in the interim. They played very good hurling against Shamrocks in their refixture and were also in good form when

playing a draw with Ballydurn.

Abbeyside played well when beating Colligan by a couple of points last month and will make it difficult for the eastern side, who may be that bit stronger.

COLLIGAN V SHAMROCKS

Going on form, Colligan must be fancied here. If the relegated senior side are to make an impression in the championship, they will need to start winning the points. They played well against Ballysaggart, whom they beat, and if they are as good again here they will have a good chance. Shamrocks disappointed against Mollerans in the replay, but were short on the night. May be closer than we expect, but Colligan are given the vote.

CAPPOQUIN V KILMATHOMAS

Cappoquin survived when these sides met last year but have not been over-impressive so far this season. They played an 0-4 all draw with St. Mary's in the first round and were then well beaten by Kill. The goalkeeper Pat Haran and the entire defence is as selected for our last match.

It is great news for our supporters and of course for the players and selectors

that the game is refixed for Dungarvan. It will mean huge support for us as very few hurling enthusiasts in the county will want to miss this chance of seeing us qualify for our third Munster final this year.

"I'd like to think I was fair at all times, no matter what," he added.

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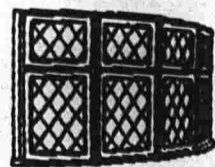
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
