Councillor Calls For Licensed Cannabis Markets

Against the backdrop of new stringent measures to strengthen the gardai in their fight against drug barons, a Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council has called on the Minister for Justice Nora Owen to consider the legalisation of cannabis.

Minister Owen's proposals include a seven-day detention period in garda custody for suspected major drug-dealers and giving senior gardai powers to sign search warrants. The tough anti-drugs trafficking package is expected to be brought to cabinet today (Wednesday, July 12th).

Likewise, Cllr. Billy Kyne who had raised the issue of illegally parked caravans at the Sweep over three months ago, said people in the Ring/Windgap area were up in arms over the current location of the travellers.

"I'm not happy that the decision was made by Council officials to move the two families," declared Cllr. Kyne who added that Council members weren't even aware of the situation until they had received complaints from the public.

A concerned Cllr. Austin Flynn described the top of the Sweep as an unofficial halting site and said the questions of local residents need to be publicly answered.

NOT PERMANENT

Responding to the concerns voiced by members, Co. Manager Donal Connolly said the travellers at the Sweep were not there on a permanent basis.

The families which had been moved by the Council were originally parked on a narrow road, rendering it virtually impassable. "They

Recent movements within the travelling community have been the cause of concern to many Co. Waterford residents. That's the message that came across loud and clear at last Monday's Waterford County Council meeting as many members spoke of receiving numerous complaints from people concerned with the proximity and location of certain travelling families.

First to raise the issue, Cllr. Lar Hart told members that travellers had recently pulled into a scenic lay by overlooking Dungarvan at the top of the sweep. In addition, just a short distance down the road at Ring Cross 2 families had been moved in by the Council from a site in the town. "People have been ringing me up asking if the site is a designated area for travellers," said Cllr. Hart.

to Cork and that they were getting first class co-operation from the authorities.

The three day Feile rock concert takes place at Pairc Ui Chaoimh on the banks of the Lee over the August Bank Holiday Weekend and now that the venue has definitely and officially been confirmed, MCD expects a rush on the three-day tickets over the weekend.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My mother has been in a private nursing home for some years. She has now become incontinent and we have been asked to pay £25 per week towards incontinence pads. She has a Medical Card. Should we have to pay this money?

ANSWER

If your mother is receiving a subvention from the Health Board towards the nursing home fees you should not have to pay for incontinence pads. Under the Nursing Homes (Subvention) Regulations, 1993, incontinence wear, laundry service and aids and appliances necessary to assist a dependent person with the activities of daily living should be provided by the nursing home. If your mother is not getting the subvention, you should apply for it now. You must apply for the subvention before being admitted to the nursing home (except in an emergency). So, if she was admitted to the nursing home after the 1st September, 1993 when the Regulations came into effect, she can be refused a subvention for up to two years. An appeal can be made if she is refused.

If she is not eligible for the subvention, then, it seems that her medical card wouldn't cover the incontinence pads. It would be a matter of coming to some agreement about this with the nursing home.

Musgrave To Acquire L&N

OFFER RECOMMENDED TO SHAREHOLDERS

The board of Musgrave Ltd. confirms that the company has negotiated with Adam F. Torrie (Superstores) Ltd. and AFT (Properties) Ltd., trading as L&N Superstores, for the acquisition of the companies; as a result of which Musgrave last week made an offer to the shareholders for the entire issued share capital of AFTS and AFTP for an undisclosed consideration.

L&N has 18 supermarkets in Munster and Leinster, with a combined trading area of 265,000 sq ft.

Following the acquisition, the L&N stores would become part of the independent Super Valu supermarket group. No L&N store closures or any reduction of employment in the enlarged group is envisaged.

In recommending the Musgrave offer to shareholders, Robert Andrews, managing director of L&N, stated that he believed it was in the best long term interests of the employees, customers and suppliers of L&N. Mr. Andrews said that he was pleased to be in a position to see the future secured.

Musgrave currently owns the franchise to the 143 independently-owned Super Valu supermarkets and the 223 Centra foodmarkets throughout Ireland and services Super Valu and Centra on a countrywide basis. The L&N stores will bring the number of Super Valu supermarkets to over 160.

Commenting on the Musgrave offer for L&N, Mr. Hugh Mackeown, managing director of Musgrave Ltd. said the strategic objective was to underpin and enhance the strength of Super Valu, as well as extending Super Valu into areas in which it is not currently represented. 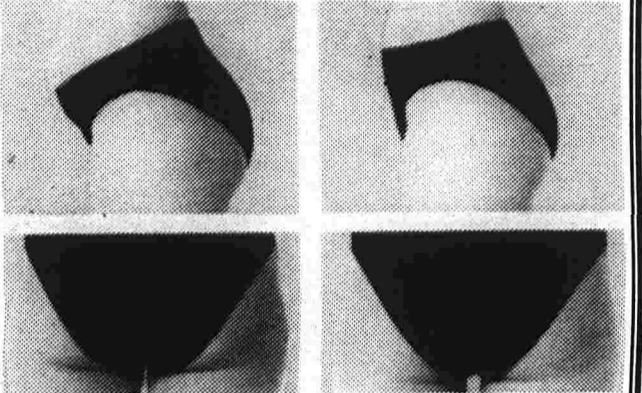

Think Green: And Save Yourself Some Cash

GREEN thinking is not just good for the environment — it can also save the gardening budget!

Even small gardens can contribute to the build up of chemicals in soil and the death of wildlife — tiny amounts absorbed by insects and small animals can build up into a fatal dose for owls and other predators at the top of the food chain.

But if you aren't swayed by this argument, simply weigh up the costs of chemical gardening — the price of pesticides, weedkillers and artificial fertilisers.

Of course you need them when pests are rampant, but it is amazing what you can do without — here are a few tips towards greener gardening and saving money:

Compost Heap — rapid growth is now creating a lot of mowing, trimming and dead-heading to produce compost.

Start two heaps so that one can be 'stewing' while the other is built using fresh material. The first should produce a good supply of free organic compost by winter but:

DON'T pack heaps too tightly

DO water to get moisture to the centre and assist rotting

DO add tea leaves, shredded newspaper and peelings to the pile but not other household scraps — they may attract vermin

DON'T add weeds — seeds often survive the heap and germinate when you add compost to your flower border!

● **Hoeing** — the hoe is still the most cost-effective method of weed control. A good one, possibly stainless steel, should slice easily through soil and the weed stems.

Hoe for a few minutes each day rather than blitzing at the weekend — especially now, when weeds establish quickly.

● **Plant containers** — don't waste money on new pots and seed trays when you could use disposable containers and other food packaging you would usually throw away.

These normally have a useless burial at the local refuse tip or, worse, end up polluting roads, beaches, picnic sites, rivers, ponds and the sea.

But you can give them a second life as plant containers. Poke drainage holes in plastic ones using a hot poker or lighted match. Tins can be punched with a hammer and large nail. Trimmed clear plastic bottles and jars can be inverted over pots to warm and germinate seeds.

Check indoor planters for flower pots which could serve elsewhere if replaced with a liner made from an old plastic bottle or tub.

● **Mulch** — recycle newspaper yourself by shredding into mulch. It doesn't look nice on flower borders but it is fine for vegetable plots and will keep weeds down and moisture in the soil. Lawn clippings may also be used.

Daffodil Day Breakthrough: £1 Million Target Reached

Daffodil Day 1995 was the most successful to date, breaking the £1 million barrier for the first time in its eight year history and raising a record figure of £1.1 million.

Announcing these results last week, Tom Hudson, Chief Executive, Irish Cancer Society, thanked the volunteer fundraisers and supporters all over Ireland who had helped raise this record total. The money raised would be used to provide care and support to people with cancer at every stage of their illness, he said.

Outlining expenditure plans, Mr. Hudson said that the bulk of the money raised would go to fund the Society's network of daffodil home care nurses who bring care and support to cancer patients, free of charge, in their own homes. "In the year ahead, the Society will provide over £500,000 to local health boards and hospice groups to support the salaries of 37 specialist cancer care nurses working with home care teams in 25 counties," he said.

Daffodil Day will also fund

the Society's free nationwide night nursing service for seriously ill cancer patients, the education of specialist cancer nurses and the Cancer Helpline which provides telephone advice to callers concerned about cancer.

NEW HOSPITAL BASED DAFFODIL NURSING SERVICE

Mr. Hudson said that the additional money raised on Daffodil Day 1995 would be used to fund a new type of daffodil cancer care nurse. Based in hospitals, these nurses would provide emotional counselling and information to patients and families at time of diagnosis and throughout treatment.

"Almost 15,000 Irish people are diagnosed with cancer every year and the need for specialist care and support continues to grow", Mr. Hudson continued.

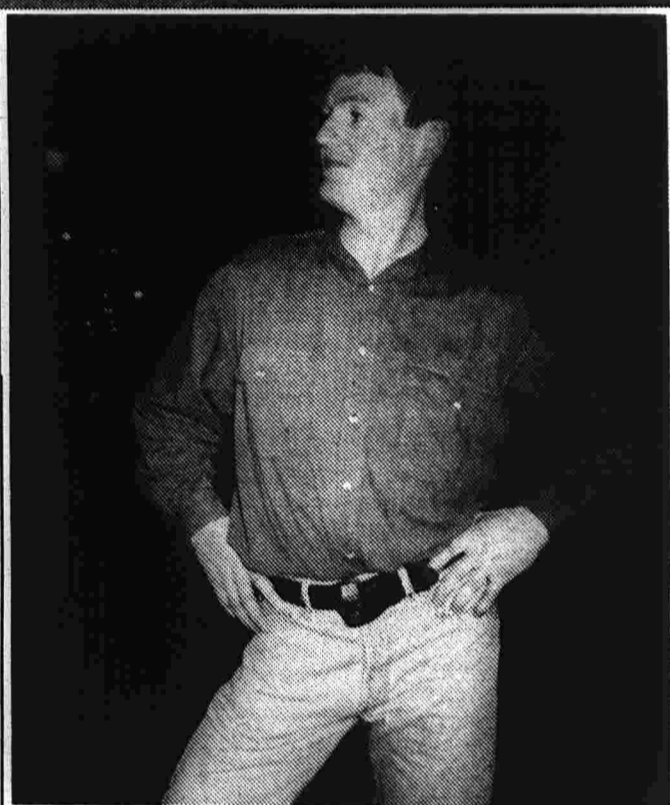
THANKS TO SUPPORTERS

The centre of attention proved to be outgoing Chairman, Commissioner John Heneghan (F.G.) who refused to vote for himself in the contest for the Chair. After losing out by 5 votes to 2, Commissioner Heneghan made a strategic rethink and backed his own candidature in the vote for the Vice-Chair. He again lost out, however, this time by 5 votes to 3 to Commissioner Bernard Leddy (Labour).

The newly elected Chairman, Cllr. Dowd was proposed and seconded by his F.F. colleagues Commissioners Donie Coughlan and Mary Ryan respectively. In addition, he was also supported by Commissioner Mary Fenton-Morrissey (Ind.) and Bernard Leddy (Labour). Appeal For Funds For Bronze Wolfhounds Project

Sixty years ago a sixty feet round tower was erected on the Knockmealdown mountains to honour the memory of Liam Lynch, Chief of Staff, Irish Republican Army, who fell mortally wounded there on the morning of 10th April, 1923. The memorial was designed by Denis Doyle, Architect, Clonmel. It was the intention of the organising committee at the time to complete the work by the addition of four bronze wolfhounds which were commissioned from Albert Power, R.H.A., but, unfortunately, funds had run out and the work was never completed.

Late last year the present Commemoration Committee invited Uinseann Mac Eoin, architect and Pauline Collins, Sculptress, to visit the site on the mountainside with a view to preparing detailed costings involving four wolfhounds in bronze as originally planned. They have since submitted a detailed itimised scheme and they have been commissioned to proceed with the work. The entire project, casting the wolfhounds in bronze and transportation and erection at the memorial, will cost a sum in the region of eight thousand pounds (£8,000) and this sum includes the heavy administrative costs involved in the launching of the appeal.

A National Committee has been formed whose task will be to see this project through to a successful conclusion and an appeal is made for funds at home and abroad. Each subscriber will be issued with a receipt in the form of a celtic parchment scroll suitable for framing.

Tadhg O'Regan
 AN APPRECIATION

Tadhg died on June 29, the Feast of Saints Peter & Paul. He had sung in the choir at Sunday Mass in the Church of SS. Peter and Paul in Athlone for many years. He also sang in the choir at the Franciscan Church. Music and song played a big part in his life. He was a member of Comhaltas and travelled to England and further afield with the Irish singers, musicians and dancers.

He will be well remembered for his rendering of Mai O'Higgins song "Dungarvan My Hometown" which is on one of his records. When we went down to celebrate the Centenary of Abbeyside National School in 1991 we visited the hospital to see Mrs. Queally Foley (R.I.P.) of "Shell Cottage." She recited two poems written by her about Abbeyside and Dungarvan and Tadhg sang his song in return. Anyone who was mobile had come out to the corridor before he finished.

I travelled with him on his last trip to his home town earlier this year to attend the talk "Famine in the Comeraghs" at Lawlor's Hotel. He met many old friends from the Ring and Cappoquin areas.

Since his retirement from An Post seven years ago, he travelled to many parts of the country giving illustrated talks. His good wife, Frances, looked after the slides and Tadhg supplied the narrative and the lovely songs. His favourite was "The Music and Songs of the Deise" followed by the "Story of Percy French." He was about to begin research on another songwriter.

When I took a scout troop to camp near Athlone on two occasions in the 1980's, Tadhg made all the arrangements — camp site, boat hire, scenic tours, butcher, grocer, etc. The arrangements couldn't have been better and it gave him a chance to sleep in a tent for the first time.

On June 21 my wife and son Garrett, filled a long-standing promise and went to Athlone to visit Tadhg and Frances. They were waiting for us at the gate. It was the longest day of the year and we didn't waste a minute of it. We went down Bohereen na Smaointe — Michael Foley and Pat O'Neill, Fr. Dumphy and Fr. Power — our altar serving days — all came up on the conversational screen; visits to Mrs. Murphy in Towler's Glen after matches and other events. Tadhg left for a while to sing with a Church of Ireland choir but asked us to hold on until he came back. This we did as he had many more topics to discuss as the longest day drew to a close.

It was indeed a sad journey as we travelled the same road just over a week later for Tadhg's funeral. It was a bright summer's morning in Kiltoom near the shores of Lough Rea. The combined choirs of the different churches sang "The Lord Is My Shepherd" as the coffin was lowered. Afterwards people remained talking in groups — about how Tadhg had touched their lives. They comforted his wife Frances, son Sean, daughters Nuala, Maura, Máiread and Áine, brothers Pat and Jim (formerly "Dungarvan Leader") and brothers-in-law Dick and Charlie, Fr. Jack (OMI) in Jakarta was unable to travel.

Cappoquin Notes

A VISIT TO THE KEANE FOUNDRY, CAPPOQUIN IN 1895

The first part of the establishment that attracts attention is the block of buildings in which the principal and other offices are situated. The manager's, the accountant's, the draftsman's and other departments, I may safely say could not be surpassed for comfort, nearness, and the ingenious arrangement. All the requirements necessary for the complete equipment of first-class business offices are found here regardless of expense.

Leaving the offices we enter the yard, where very large quantities of pig and scrap iron lie piled in readiness for the smelting furnace. The coal and coalsheeds are faced by the smithy in which are some fine machines, including powerful shears and also pressing machines, tyre binders and innumerable blocks and templates. Next we come to the grinding department, where chilled plough castings are dealt with in a most careful and competent manner. Passing along we reach the engine-room, where the requisite motor power is required for the entire of the mechanism in the works. Close to this room is the capacious sand-house, and here the sand procured in the neighbourhood is prepared by machinery for manipulation by the moulder.

Next comes the moulding shop, which is one of the finest in Ireland, and in which every class of casting - including brass - is pro-

duced. Here I saw the stream of molten metal issuing from the huge furnace and borne away in great "ladles" by a brigade of hard and intrepid workers to the several moulds awaiting its reception. The regularity, activity, coolness and efficiency, displayed was quite astonishing. In America and elsewhere I have frequently visited similar establishments, but never saw such a thorough mastery of detail as was shown in this foundry. The machine and fitting shop, replete with every up-to-date contrivance, can successfully compete with English and American competitors. Here are first-class lathes, drilling machines, screening, punching, shearing, grinding, and planing machines. Next we enter the erecting shed, where all the machines are built. It is very spacious, and, like all the rest of the concern, admirably ventilated.

We now enter the timber store, where nothing is wanting towards the perfection of the various designs. Here every appliance is to be found necessary for the execution of all orders. The planing, hand-sawing and mortising machines are marvels of mechanical ingenuity. We next inspected the pattern store, which is quite a departure from the common routine. All the patterns are made in iron to ensure accuracy and hence the purchasers of machines at these works can safely rely upon the fittings supplied for their respective uses. Following the tram line, which extends

to the paint shop and connects with the Waterford, Dungarvan and Lismore Railway (W. D. and L. Railway) - from which are dispatched immense quantities of goods - we pass into the well-supplied and capably arranged paint and oil stores, and soon find ourselves in the extensive warehouse where machines are stored of every description. The area of 10,309 square feet will give some idea of its dimensions, and still this space is insufficient to cope with the increasing trade of this manufacturing depot. Finally we pass through the spacious store for castings waiting their turn for transfer to the fitting and machine shops. The same remarks can be applied to this department as all the others. It is quite perfect in all its arrangements and details. Communication is carried on by means of telephone, which obviates much trouble and loss of time.

In a special shop adjoining the offices is a splendid store divided into many compartments in which are stowed away the finished parts of all classes of implements made by the firm, and ready for dispatch on receipt of orders. This arrangement prevents any delay or inconvenience to customers. Since my last visit to this establishment a few years ago there has been a remarkable development of business as well as an enlargement of the premises themselves. In addition to home requirements, orders have been received from Russia, Romania, France, Belgium, Germany and even more distant countries. Mr. Keane has just returned from Romania where he succeeded in obtaining very large orders for weighty agricultural machines. Additional hands must be employed to supplement the already large staff in order to grapple with these requirements.

From Germany a short time ago came also heavy orders, which necessitated long overtime work. The existence of this important manufacture, it is needless to add, is a great boon to Cappoquin, and it would be well, indeed, if similar branches of industry were more numerous throughout the country, which has been so long a sufferer from commercial depression.

Major Funding Announced For Local Health Services

Brian O'Shea, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health recently announced details of major capital funding for health services in the Co. Waterford area.

Under mental health services, £100,000 has been allocated to the South Eastern

Health Board for equipment.

Under Services for the elderly, £75,000 has been allocated for the replacement of a nursing unit at St. Joseph's, Dungarvan. A further £55,000 has been allocated to the South Eastern Health Board for equipment.

£272,500 has been allocated for the provision of a new unit with 12 residential places at the Young Chronic Sick Unit at St. Patrick's

Waterford, and £55,000 has been provided to the South Eastern Health Board for appliances and aids under the physical disability service.

The Minister stated that these developments are part of the Government's commitment to improve and strengthen services for the weaker sections of the community and are in addition to the revenue funding being allocated to these services. Taken together, these will result in significant improvements in service provision and lead to a much improved quality of life for the groups concerned.

Launch of Successful Famine Book

Already sold out in the hardback edition, "The Famine in Waterford 1845 - 1850," will be formally launched on Monday next, July 17th in Lismore Castle by her Excellency, Jean Kennedy Smith, American Ambassador to Ireland.

Edited by County Librarian Donald Brady and Des Cahill of Tramore CBS, the almost 400 page long book was written by 12 contributors including Dungarvan historian Willie Fraher.

The book represents part of the Waterford Co. Libraries committee's commemoration to mark the 150th anniversary of the Great Famine and covers the whole county and each workhouse area. With 250 hardback editions sold, only 1,500 paperbacks remain and these will be available in bookstores throughout the county from July 17th next.

Lavishly produced and illustrated, the book can be rapidly reprinted should the need arise.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENT
Speaking at last week's Co. Libraries committee meeting, Cllr. Oliver Coffey congratulated Mr. Brady on the enormous amount of work and research involved in the publication of the book.

Likewise committee chairman, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan commended everyone involved in the project and described the book as an "major achievement" in such a short period of time.

SCULPTURE
Another main event in the famine commemoration line-up is the unveiling of a specially commissioned major sculpture in September. More details on this event at a later date.

Author Calls For Irish Unity On Roadsigns

The author of "Ireland, The Complete Guide and Road Atlas," Hugh Oram, has spoken out against inadequate roadsign posting on Ireland's highways and byways and called for a joint North-South approach to the matter. After the book's publication, Mr. Oram said that our roadsigns need to be made clearer and more understandable, not only for the foreign visitor but also for the native driver.

"Ireland, The Complete Guide and Road Atlas" is the only Irish published tour guide and is published by Appletree Press. This colourful paperback guide, which retails for £9.99, provides details of over 30 en-

joyable tours around the country and includes a comprehensive road atlas.

"The purpose of roadsigns is to help and inform the traveller. While in the main, most of our roadsigns serve this purpose, many do not!" claimed Hugh Oram. "For example, some of the roadsigns in the Republic express distances in miles at primary roads, while secondary routes are expressed in kilometres. This situation causes a lot of confusion amongst the tourists who visit our country. This confusion is added to for travellers visiting Northern Ireland where all roadsigns are only in miles."

Hugh Oram called for the

introduction of a unified approach to roadsigns for the island as a whole and suggested that the proposed North-South bodies could take this matter up in the near future.

"The term 'dancing at the crossroads' is known to all in Ireland, however it has taken on a more dangerous connotation now, because of the large numbers of travellers who must stop at road junctions in order to find their way," Hugh Oram added. "Surely, it's unacceptable that tourists should have to stop and read directions at a crossroads, if they are lucky enough to find a roadsign, especially with all the attendant dangers from oncoming traffic!"

Waterford's Francis Connors, all leading contenders who are currently battling it out for points on the Heineken League Table. At the end of the season, points are added up to establish the most successful rider on the national showjumping circuit.

NEW CHAIRMAN

At a recent press reception held in the Park Hotel to announce details of the event, it was revealed that for the third successive year the Show will be held in Ballygagin by kind permission of the Slattery/O'Grady family.

Addressing the gathered crowd of sponsors and organising committee members, Chairman Nicholas Power welcomed supporters both new and old including the Queally Group who have agreed to generously sponsor the show's inaugural Grand Prix. The showjumping event, he said, will bring big international names to Dungarvan. Chernobyl Children Visit Dungarvan Area

On 19th June the first group of Chernobyl children for 1995 arrived in Ireland. Among the group was the 1,000th child to be brought from the contaminated area of Belarus for a period of rest and recuperation in the clean non-radioactive environment of Ireland. This particular child was 8 year old Mariya one of the 13 children to visit Dungarvan. Almost one month later and nearing the end of their stay with Dungarvan host families, the improvement in both the appearance and character of these children is of immeasurable proportion.

In the Republic of Belarus there is no access to 'clean' food. People still till their fields, herd their cattle and eat the produce of their work even though only 1% of Belarussian land remains uncontaminated by international standards. The death rates in Belarus now exceed the birth rates and a 2,400% increase of cancer of the thyroid gland was recently reported by the World Health Organisation. Children are most at risk from exposure to radiation as their organs are in growth stage and 'clean' food and breathing fresh air will regenerate their immune system and Belarussian doctors have said that they will be returned two years of stolen life.

The psychological benefits of a stay in Ireland are infinite. More than a memory of a wonderful holiday, they will return to Belarus with a message of hope for their families, a message born out of the kindness and generosity of the Dungarvan people - that the victims of Chernobyl have not been forgotten.

Unlike the pale, tired faces which arrived at Shannon almost a month ago, the children now have an effervescence and vitality which is evident in their grateful smiles and willingness to

offer a loving hug to those with whom they have established family-like ties. They are no longer afraid of drinking water from a kitchen tap or eating the food which they are given. On the contrary many of the children have gained healthy amounts of weight which is surprising when one notes their unsurpressible appetite for life.

The children of Chernobyl have been given an opportunity to lead 'normal' daily lives with fundamental fresh air and pure water. The people of Dungarvan have offered them hope to live.

On Tuesday last the Beresford family opened the gates of "Colligan Falls" providing a most enjoyable evening of traditional music and fun for the Belarussian visitors.

The Park Hotel leisure centre extended an invitation to the Chernobyl children for a swimming session which proved to give them immense delight.

Part taking in activities at the Colligan Equestrian Centre the group was offered the chance to revel in the joys of horseriding for the first time in their lives.

Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club provided a most memorable day for the

Chernobyl children on Saturday 8th July when they staged organised trips around the bay from midday onwards. Indicative of their enthusiasm for the activity were the various facial expressions as the children stepped onto the boats for second and third chances to avail of the sailing experience. The Sailing Club organised a barbecue in the Moorings beer garden to follow the boat trips and a thoroughly enjoyable evening was had by all. With kind donations from Valu Centre Cash and Carry,

Cappoquin Chickens, local mineral companies, and fruit supplied by Kiely's and Lynch's the evening was a most successful undertaking.

Dungarvan Crystal organised a trip to The Mitchellstown Cave and the Parson Green, Clogheen on Sunday last. The weather was in keeping with the beauty of the Tipperary countryside and the pure air 75 feet underground in the Mitchellstown cave was appreciated by our Belarussian visitors, perhaps more than it will ever be by the Irish tourist.

A party, on their return to Dungarvan was given by J.R.'s fast food restaurant and the young travellers were collected by their host

families, eager to display badges, hats and party gifts which they had been presented with by J.R.'s staff.

The Chernobyl children have enjoyed an event filled stay and with the tireless efforts of co-ordinator, Rosemary Phelan their final days in the area are sure to be as memorable and caring as the hospitality which they have received so far.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

GRAZING DAIRY COWS

Many different grazing situations occur in July. Growth rates can be very variable especially on dry land. A typical County Waterford dry land with plenty of ryegrass, will in July see its growth rate newly halved compared with earlier in the year. The grass will contain plenty of stem and seed heads and the butt will be getting white or even brown. Extra grazing area is needed compared with earlier in the year. A stocking rate of 0.6 to 0.75 acres per cow on the grazing ground is suggested. A grazing interval of 21 to 25 days is good, with no topping in very dry weather.

An after grazing height of about 3 weeks in the short grass areas, will keep the cows milking well. This will leave more of a butt than earlier in the year, which is not of great quality and is usually not very green, with plenty of bent and creeping grasses at this time of year.

In-calf heifers do quite well behind the cows in May and June, but will do badly if this is continued for the rest of the year. They do best on their own grazing area from now on. They should be observed closely for summer mastitis and red water.

DRY COW MASTITIS

This affects bulling/in-calf heifers mainly, but also dry cows in liquid milk herds. It will be at its worst during the hot weather of July and August. Many farmers loose one or two heifers out of a typical group of five or ten because this type of mastitis always leaves a three-teated animal that will be culled at the first opportunity. Flies are thought to be the main cause, and the larger the group of animals the greater the risk of some being affected.

It is best to keep the stock in question well away from the farmyards and dirty places, high windy fields are best. Briars, big thistles and neglected hedges will tear or scrape the stock on their teats, udders and bellies, and the flies gather on the scratches.

Various methods of reducing flies on stock are available. They all work to some extent. Spraying the whole animal (especially the underside) with an insecticide will reduce fly numbers by 80% for 2 to 3 weeks and this has given good protection against summer mastitis. A combination of pour-on (on the animal) and Stockholm tar (on the teats) also works well. The spray would need to be repeated two or three times over the summer, especially during wet weather.

WASH EASY-FEED HOUSES

Lameness due to foot rot is present in most easy-feed houses in spring and it is a serious problem in some. Houses with poor ventilation and low roofs are the worst, but all slatted and auto-scrapers easy-feed houses can give rise to a bit of foot rot over the winter.

Open cubicle houses, where the cows eat the silage outside rarely if ever cause the problem. Foot rot is caused by bacteria that become very numerous in the warm dirty conditions of most easy-feed houses.

Power washing of the houses, especially the lower part of the walls, floors and cubicles, followed by emptying the tanks will help reduce the bacteria numbers at the beginning of next winter.

Mats can be very dirty underneath and if these are loosely attached, it is good to wash them well and stack them outside for a while. People who do go to the bother of cleaning and washing the cow house might also consider whitewashing the walls in the darker parts of the houses.

LAMB THRIVE

This is the time of year when everybody wants to know why their lambs are not thriving as they should. There is a natural decline in lamb growth rates around and after weaning time and not necessarily connected with the practice of weaning either.

Causes:- There can be only two explanations for severe ill-thrift of weight loss in lambs at this time. Either they are not eating enough food of the right quality (nutritional problem) or they are suffering from a disease or disability which prevents them converting that food into liveweight.

Consider your problem under the following headings, with the help of your adviser and your vet.

1. Severity:- Check lamb liveweights and sales pattern and compare with other years and with similar local farms.
2. Grassland:- Is enough good quality grass available at the time and what is the trace element status of that grass?
3. Parasites:- Is the dosing programme correct and properly carried out? Is there any possibility of parasite resistance?
4. Trace Elements:- Is there a trace element problem on the farm (sample soil, herbage, blood)? Cobalt is particularly important in growing lambs and is easy and safe to administer.

FARMING LEADER

Farmers To Erect Signs Countrywide

Farmers can now limit their potential liability to visitors to their farms, by erecting notices at their farm entrances. The ICMSA has launched an information campaign for farmers following the enactment of the Occupiers Liability Act 1995.

ICMSA advises that under Section 3 of the Act, farmers should erect signs to exclude their duty of care towards visitors. Beginning this week (July 3) ICMSA branches countrywide will erect signs produced by

ICMSA in accordance with the Act.

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said that while the Act clearly reduces the farmers responsibilities towards trespassers and recreational users, it is not so clear in respect of visitors. However he said farmers can exclude their duty of care to visitors by the erection of notices at their farm entrances, as provided for under Section 3 of the Act.

"The Act which is now in place contains many pro-

posals and amendments put forward by ICMSA. It sets out to provide that the duty of care owed by farmer occupiers to trespassers or recreational users, is one of not acting with reckless disregard or intentionally harming the person."

NOTICES PROVIDED FOR UNDER SECTION 3 OF ACT

He stressed that the special duty of care which would be owed to visitors is excluded only by the erection of a proper notice prominently displayed at the principal points of entry to farms.

"While the Act protects farmers generally in the case of trespassers and recreational users, this is definitely not the case as far as visitors are concerned. However by the erection of notices farmers can exclude the special duty of care owed and reduce it to the same duty as is owed to trespassers and recreational users. This is a most welcome development," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He added that, however, it is not possible to give an absolute assurance that the

ICMSA recommendation will fully protect all farmers in all situations.

"Other aspects of the Act will also apply in determining whether or not a farmer is liable to a visitor. Farmers should therefore get their own solicitors to advise them on their own particular cases."

ICMSA EXECUTIVES TO ERECT SIGNS NATIONWIDE

The enactment of this legislation signals the end of a long campaign by ICMSA to protect the interests of land and property owners.

During the last five years ICMSA lobbied extensively for a change to the Occupiers' Liability legislation to ensure that farmers are not exposed to unfair and unreasonable liability for persons coming on to their farms.

The first such notice to launch a nationwide awareness campaign by ICMSA was erected on the farm of Michael Browne, Two-Mile-House, Naas, last week by the Association's President Tom O'Dwyer and Maurice Harvey, Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee.

IFA Launches 1995 Members' Benefits Package

IFA members are set to gain from a valuable package of benefits in 1995, including Personal Accident Insurance cover.

At the launch of IFA's 1995 Members Benefits Package, IFA President, John Donnelly, said that: "In addition to IFA working successfully on over 60 different issues last year, all of which improved the incomes and conditions of farmers, I am delighted that in 1995 all fully paid-up IFA members will enjoy the most comprehensive benefits package ever".

This year all fully paid-up IFA members will enjoy a benefits package that entitles them to Personal Accident Cover of £125 per week for hospitalisation (excl. the first 5 days). £15,000 Accidental Death cover and £7,500 Capital cover for loss of hand, foot or eye. The 1995 package also includes a 10% VHI discount, £13 FBD Car Insurance discount and ACC Bank benefits package.

Mr. Donnelly said he was particularly pleased that the Association was now keeping in regular contact with all its members by post and that members had already received in 1995 the valuable IFA/FBD Payments Planner. IFA's record of achievement and valuable benefits package is attracting more and more farmers with the Association's membership numbers increasing in each of the last five years, now standing at an all time high.

The President thanked members for their valuable financial subscriptions. He advised any farmer who was not yet a member to join IFA and avail of all the valuable benefits. Mr. Donnelly said "the direct tangible benefits of IFA membership have a value greater than the annual membership subscription and all farmers benefit from the lobbying effort of IFA at home and in Europe".

Concluding, the President said the "he is confident that the increased membership numbers and improved financial position of IFA should ensure that there will be no increase in membership subscriptions for at least the next two years.

Non-Payment Of Quota Subsidy Is Intolerable

The President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, stated that it is absolutely intolerable to learn that small scale dairy producers have still not received the grant aid of 50 pence per gallon due for the purchase of milk quota under the 1994 Restructuring Scheme. Mr. O'Dwyer called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates to act immediately to free up payments to these hard pressed small scale dairy farmers.

"Small scale dairy farmers paid up front for quota which they purchased at £1.75/gallon in May 1994 on the expectation of a 50p/gallon subsidy. Now some 13 months later many of these farmers have not yet received the subsidy. This is intolerable treatment for small scale dairy producers.

"If additional information is required for farmers to enable payments to be made, it is not good enough for the Department to be writing out to farmers' only this

week seeking the information. Farmers deserve a better service than this from the Department," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

CREDIBILITY OF SCHEME MUST BE QUESTIONED

"This Scheme was designed to assist small scale producers to purchase extra milk quota to increase their viability. The delay in payment will have disimproved the viability of the farmers who are still waiting for payment. Furthermore, these farmers will not be in a position to participate in the scheme again in 1995 because of a lack of resources. Delays in payments only serve to frustrate farmers and many will question the value of participation in future schemes.

"Unless the Minister acts immediately to resolve this problem and delivers on payments to farmers, the success of the 1995 Scheme will be jeopardised and quota will not be purchased by those who most need it," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

It is not possible to have a group of Fas employees working on the beach every day for the three month summer period and then give them a block of free time for the next three months. A number of skips emptied on a daily basis would certainly be enough to remove all unwanted material. The stones on the

beach may I suggest could be used as foundations for the continuation of the stone wall as far as the Church. A green area in the vicinity of the church would seem to be an ideal location for a children's playground. Many of our readers may have other very worthwhile suggestions to make and we would be only too glad to hear them. The Department of the Marine, Bord Failte, Waterford County Council and Dungar-

van U.D.C. could be involved in any clean up operation and some may be in a position to provide grants for same.

All in all many people would appreciate some work being done as soon as possible in what would be a very worthwhile project.

Wind Power — Clare, we hear, won the toss last Sunday and elected to play against the stiffish breeze, Waterford, I'm told, won the toss and decided to play against the elements. Quite a few that I've met since have claimed that both made the correct decision. Do you agree?

The decision on its own to play with or against the breeze in the first half doesn't, I think, decide any match. A team's mental preparation and attitude is by far the most important factor. The physical preparation cannot be isolated from the mental one because immense hard work over a long period enables the mind to be clear, alert and focussed. Overdo the physical work and the mind, too, becomes jaded as well as the body. Then there is no freshness, no exuberance. For whatever reason there was more snap pace in the Claremen and they were evidently better prepared for Munster final rigours than the Shannonsiders. Ger Loughnane is on record that their immediate preparation was so relaxed and unpressured as to be almost low-key. No table-thumping, no frenzied hyping. Single-minded determination, calm, confidence, utter conviction of their own worth and ability and a fierce determination to apply pressure from the first whistle. That almost fanatical application to the job on hand gave Limerick few free pucks anywhere on the field as the Claremen harassed and harried and battled. There was an unquenchable belief in themselves which the burden of historical failure failed to dampen. That was what made the difference, not the wind, or the sun, or the moon, or the stars. Warm congratulations to our new Munster champions. Now we all have fresh hope.

But let us return to the question: What would you do if you won the toss? Would you take advantage of the wind or sun for the first half? your answer is just as valid as mine so long as you give reasons for your preference. Personally I'd always like to be positive and would never hesitate to take advantage of the toss in order to put pressure on the opposition. So, generally speaking, I'd play with the sun or wind for the first half and attack the opponents' goal. Your team, knowing they have the wind, will be in a positive frame of mind right from the throw-in, eschewing negative attitude and eager to press forward on the attack. If your team are slow starters then you need the help of the elements to give them confi-

dence and support. At half time you know the size of the second-half task and can steel your resolve to cope with it. Besides the wind sometimes slackens or changes direction sufficiently to help out in both halves.

Abhor any negative element in my approach to a game. In 1959 in Cork when Tipperary faced Waterford they won the toss and unhesitatingly handed over to poor Waterford the advantage of a very strong breeze. Their game-plan was to absorb Waterford pressure for the first half (a negative aim) before positively amassing a winning total in the second half. Driven on by the powerful breeze Waterford ran Tipperary ragged in the first half as the Decies crisp ground hurling and speedy delivery led to a torrent of scores. Tipperary never got into the game and set up one lone attack in that first half. The half time score 8-2 to 0-0 told it as it was and that no matter what wind blew behind them in the second half Tipperary had a mountain higher than Slievenamon to climb on the restart. The shock to their systems was so great and the pressure on them to score so intense that they failed to record any meaningful score and grew more desperate with every passing minute. Every Waterford clearance increased their sense of panic as the minutes sped by and the inevitable frustration and befuddlement seized hold of them numbing all coherence of thought. I have a few more examples of the importance of being positive which will do for another time.

Waterford minors met a very well-tuned Cork outfit. Perhaps we wouldn't have won even if we had use of the wind in both halves. But I'm inclined to think that early wind assistance would have helped to settle us and give us a couple of early scores which in turn would give confidence to the whole team. Those early nervous moments often set out the pattern of play for the rest of the match.

Dire Acoustics At Courthouse Venue

The serious acoustics problem at Dungarvan Courthouse was the subject of stinging criticism last week by Cllr. Ciaran O Rian who slammed that it is now almost impossible to hear what is being said at Council meetings.

Speaking at the annual meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. O Rian said the ongoing acoustic problem seemed to have deteriorated even more over the past twelve months.

Having constantly raised the issue to no avail over the past few years, Cllr. O Rian said, "there are times when members are literally inaudible, and I have been raising this matter year after year but without anyone seemingly wanting to do anything about it".

A monthly Council meeting had previously been held in one of the chambers at the Town Hall, Dungarvan where the acoustics again proved to be inadequate,

forcing members to return to the Courthouse venue.

Urging that alternative, suitable accommodation be found, Cllr. O Rian appealed to the newly elected Council Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey to "use his good offices with the County Manager to try and have something done".

MAJOR UPGRADE

In reply, Cllr. Coffey said he fully agreed with Cllr. O Rian although given the Council's current financial situation, he stressed that members may well have to make do with what they have for another while yet.

Good news however was revealed by County Manager Donal Connolly who reported that a number of proposals are now with the Department of Justice for the internal upgrading of Dungarvan Courthouse.

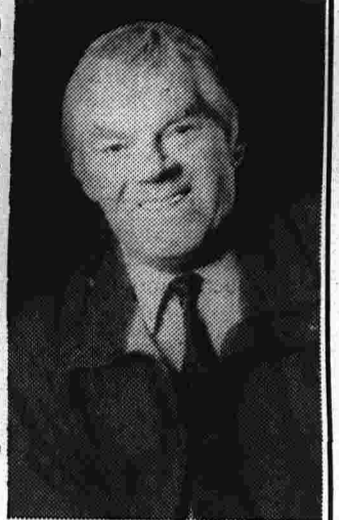
Mr. Connolly said he would look at the acoustics problem in the context of that programme.

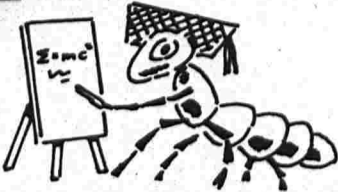

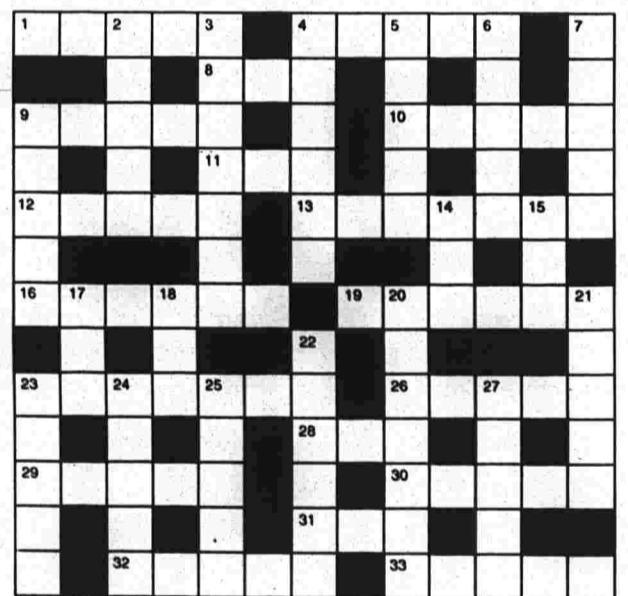

MONTGOMERIE DISAPPOINTED

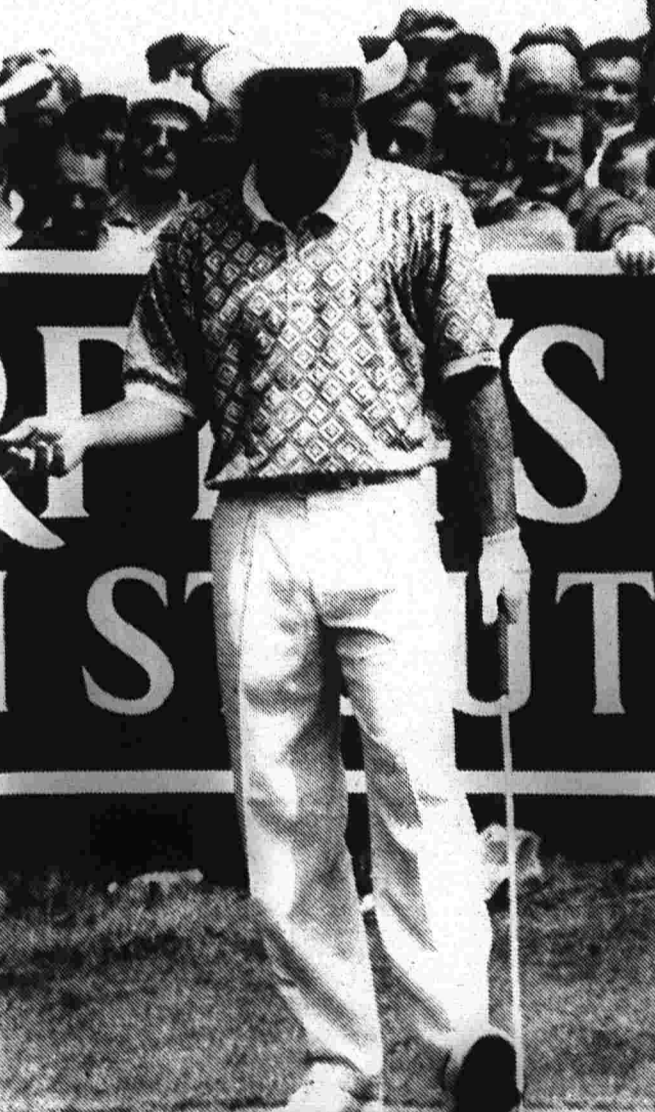

The programme of the game said that it was Waterford's 13th appearance in a Munster minor hurling final and hinted that this might prove to be a lucky omen. It didn't, but the truth is that luck had nothing whatsoever to do with the result as Cork were a superior side and there was nothing that Waterford could do about it. Cork were a bigger and stronger team physically and this was another factor which came into the reckoning as the game wore on - a problem which is becoming a common denominator as far as Waterford teams in all grades are concerned.

After winning two splendid contests against Clare and Tipperary in the early rounds we were naturally a bit confident that Cork, too could be beaten. On the form they displayed at Semple Stadium on Sunday, it is doubtful if any team will beat them this year. The view in the crowded Press Box was that they are an exceptionally good minor team.

A number of the Waterford players did not display the fine form which brought us through the other rounds and this resulted in we having weaknesses in almost every line. Maybe the seventeen points gap on the scoreboard does exaggerate the difference in standards, but Cork were clearly the better team and fully deserved their victory.

PLAY

We played against the slight breeze and had a couple of wides before Michael

O'Connell pointed from a free for Cork. Brian O'Keefe added another before Jamie O'Meara opened with a point for Waterford in the 5th minute. Ml. O'Connell added two more for Cork before Dave Bennett had our second point in the 8th minute. Cork then went on a scoring spree, bringing their total to 1-8 to 0-2 by the end of the first quarter. Jamie O'Meara had a point from play in the 17th minute and a great score by Dan Shanahan in the 26th minute was followed by a Shane Flynn point in the 29th. In between Cork had a further two points to leave the halftime score at 1-10 to 0-5. Corks' goal was scored by Sean Farrell.

At the time of writing, Waterford are due to play in three Munster championship games, and depending on the results of some or all of these, listed fixtures may have to be changed. However, regardless of the inter-county verdicts, the majority of the scheduled games will take place, and we are sure to have some great fare.

DUNGARVAN PROGRAMME

Saturday evening's double fixture in the senior hurling championship will draw a near record crowd to Fraher field for a programme in the league section. Both matches are in round seven, but Mount Sion do have an outstanding match with Roanmore.

Here on Saturday we have passage versus Lismore in action at 6.45 p.m. and this will be followed by the Mount Sion/Ballygunner tie. This should give us the best double-header of the season so far.

The Passage/Lismore match is vital to both. At the moment, both are on eight points behind Mount Sion and Ballygunner. Both may qualify for the knock-out stages, but the winners are guaranteed a place in the final four of this division.

Readers will recall their high scoring clash here last year when Lismore won on a 5-16 to 4-8 scoreline with all the winners scores coming from play. Lismore will be slight favourites to win again.

MOUNT SION V BALLYGUNNER

This is the game that a lot of people have been waiting to see. Recent clashes between them have given us splendid entertainment and some very good quality hurling. When they met in the league section last year, the 'Gunnies won on a 1-11 to 0-11 scoreline, but Mount Sion won the championship.

All other things being equal, the champions, Mount Sion may just about win this exciting tie.

ROANMORE V DUNHILL

I have no doubt but that

Roanmore will win this one as they have come bang into form recently (as we saw when they beat Ballygunner ten days ago).

A win will leave them with six points and should they defeat Mount Sion in the championship, they could be back in with a shout for a place in the top four.

DE LA SALLE V CLONEA

De La Salle will surely win this one, but it is useless as far as qualifying is concerned as they cannot now catch the four teams above them on the table. The result won't matter to Clonea either as they are going down anyway.

FOUR-MILE-WATER V ST. SAVIOURS

Unless there is a big upset, the Ballymac' team should win this one and leave them with a chance of qualifying when they meet Erin's Own. At the moment, Erin's Own and Four-mile-water are each on 8 points and are joint second behind Ballyduff who will have 11, if they beat Stradbally last evening.

BALLYDUFF V TALLOW

It is a local derby game and it can be close. I don't believe that the result really matters to either side as Ballyduff are already in and Tallow out. Ballyduff will be favourites.

DUNGARVAN V STRADBALLY

This is a relegation match with demotion to intermediate status facing the losers. As far as I can recall it is the first occasion on which we have had a relegation game between teams who had lost all six matches in the league section of the championship.

Last year when they met in the championship Stradbally caused a shock when beating Dungarvan by a single point. Even though Dungarvan had but one victory to their credit, it was not envisaged that Stradbally would beat them.

Obviously Dungarvan's hurling progress has been impeded by their success in the football championships.

They have won no match so far this year, last year their only victory was against St. Saviours. As far as I can recall, the only match Dungarvan won in 1993 was against Mount Sion who went on to become county champions and beat almost every other team in their group. With an abundance of good underage players available to them it seems

strange that they are not making an impression. It is very important for the county to have a strong hurling team in our principal town. With no disrespect to Stradbally, it is strange to have them listed as favourites to beat Dungarvan in senior hurling, but at the moment, that is the way the form book reads.

INTERMEDIATE GAMES

Five matches are listed and we must have a few good contests. Cappoquin will be fancied to beat Ballyduff. Cappoquin showed good form against Kilmac' and this may be good enough.

Ring, after a very good display against St. Mary's are likely to beat Kill and St. Mary's will be favourites to beat Kilmac'.

In the other section Abbeyside will be fancied to beat Ballysaggart and Colligan must beat Mollersans.

Following our three games in the provincial championship so far, there is tremendous interest in the progress of our junior hurlers and there is every reason for believing that a very big crowd will follow them to Semple Stadium, Thurles for the showdown with our old rivals Clare who beat us in the final at the same venue by 2-15 to 0-10 two years ago.

The result of that one was disappointing in that we were in the game with a great chance until Clare broke through for late goals that sealed our fate. On that occasion Clare were allowed to field their second best team while Waterford were denied the same privilege chiefly because we had won the under-21 hurling All-Ireland in the previous year.

Counties are no longer allowed to field their second best and so we meet Clare more or less on level terms. While very little is known about our opponents, we are aware that they have beaten Cork en route to the final and this must be as good a recommendation as they could ask for.

At the same time, having beaten Tipperary and disposed of Limerick after a replay, we should not be overawed by anything that Clare might have achieved and we should at least consider ourselves to be their

equals.

In two of our games we did seem to have a problem or two in defence and while the repair jobs carried out from the line helped us overcome the difficulty for the matches concerned, it cannot be allowed to continue as an ongoing problem. Therefore, it is thought likely that the selectors will decide to start the final with the team that finished against Limerick.

The youthful but very experienced Pat Harnan will be the keeper. The

Ballygunner man has brought off a few brilliant saves so far, but seems a bit adventurous at times. John Hallinan, one of the outstanding players in the replay, will be in the right corner with Colligan's Tom Kiely in the other corner.

Billy Walsh who replaced Paul Goff in the replay seems sure to hold his place at full back where his presence had a steadying effect on the defence when he came on. Pat Ryan and Liam Dalton, both very prominent in the drawn game with Liam Coady may be given a vote of confidence in the half back line and J. P. Fitzpatrick and Dan Casey have done enough to win a full vote of confidence for the midfield berths.

With Pat Bennett, Noel Kelly and Shane Ahearne

having scored 4-8 of our total against Limerick, there is no doubt about them being retained in the inside forward line in front of Kevin Walsh (our saviour against Limerick in the drawn match), Eamon Crotty and Barry Doyle.

Several on the substitute bench must be borderline cases for inclusion on the team, quite a few having played in the higher grade with their clubs a few

years ago.

THE RESULT?

While we know that we are up against it and that Clare, having beaten Cork, must be strongly fancied, there are great expectations in the county that we must be good enough, having come through three tough and close encounters against Tipperary and Limerick. Hopefully, we will take the title this time. We last held this back in 1936.

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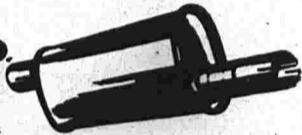

weren't forcibly moved as they were anxious themselves to be moved but did not have the necessary means to do it," said Mr. Connolly.

FOXES CASTLE PROBLEM

Meanwhile, Cllr. Tom Cunningham reported that he had also received numerous phone calls, this time regarding the state of the road near Foxes Castle, Faha where almost ten caravans had been parked since the end of March. "The road is blocked, cars have to stop for cattle and horses etc..... people in the area are very annoyed over the state of the road," he added.

"NO GO AREA"

The existing halting site on the outskirts of Dungarvan at Shandon was described by Cllr. Paddy Kenneally as a virtual "no go" area for people.

"The road is now dangerous to drive," said Cllr. Kenneally, who felt that the Council will shortly have a decision to make, whether to close off the road or move the traveller families out altogether.

He claimed the state of the halting site was now a disgrace and the Council should invite down the Minister of State Emmett Stagg and show him the problems he has created in Dungarvan and other areas by his insistence that local authorities provide halting sites.

Cllr. Jackie Fahy submitted that a campaign be initiated to make the travellers more respectful of the set-

led community and the laws of the land, whereby they keep sites clean and make roadways passable for members of the public.

MORE SITES

Sympathetic to the travelling community, Cllr. Tony Wright said the Council will have to provide proper, maintained halting sites throughout the county. Likewise, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran said the travellers had received little respect or dignity from the settled community and felt each parish in the county should have a small halting site.

In reply, Mr. Connolly said the Council was currently investigating a number of possible halting sites around the county, for indigenous as well as transient travelling families. The manager said he was hopeful that one or two areas will be identified as suitable sites and he expects to report back to the Council on the matter before the end of the year.

With regard to the situation at Shandon, Mr. Connolly revealed that a committee will soon be established on which travellers interests will be represented, with a view to improving and upgrading the entire area.

The Manager stressed that the settled community have to acknowledge that travellers have a right to exist and to accept them as a reality. On the other hand however, Mr. Connolly urged that travellers must also realise that as well as having rights, they have responsibilities too.

drugs problem would not be resolved for as long as the Minister continued to label cannabis resin as a "hard drug". While not condoning drugs which he said gave "short term satisfaction with long term devastation," Cllr. O'Halloran remained adamant however that decriminalisation of cannabis would erode the power of pushers.

"We should have properly licensed outlets for cannabis where demand can be regulated and controlled," he stated.

This, he believed, would cut the odds from 100 to one to even money in the Minister's battle against drug pushers.

"While a market remains for it (cannabis), it will be filled by the most evil, ruthless people in the land," he declared.

FROM CORK TO COLUMBIA

In total opposition to Cllr. O'Halloran's views on the fight against drugs, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) said there can be no acceptable drug.

Cllr. Kyne, who is also Chairman of the SEHB said he was "flabbergasted" that any public figure should even suggest that cannabis resin, ecstasy or any other drug was acceptable today in Irish Society.

"All ecstasy tablets and amphetamines are of chronic danger," said Cllr. Kyne, "and they have to be totally rejected on the grounds of public health alone." Drug addiction, he stressed, is a big problem for families, and a problem for every cross roads in the country. The Labour Councillor was also skeptical of the law whereby criminals caught with small quantities of cannabis resin could claim it was for their own use. "People are now making vast sums of money from Columbia to Cork through the drugs scene," slammed Cllr. Kyne who added that he was in full support of Minister Owen's proposals.

"Society at any level must be as ruthless as any drugs baron in the battle against drugs, there should be no ambiguity," he added.
