"BIGGEST DISASTER EVER"

Co. Waterford's first citizen-Council chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey described the Great Famine as the biggest disaster ever to hit this country", during which time over one million died, most unknown, and in excess of one million emigrat-

Villierstown Famine Commemorations

The Rev. Philip Homan served the Church of Ireland-community in Villierstown for 25 years and died of famine fever on November 20, 1846, aged 47 years. He is buried on the right-hand side of the sanctuary in Villierstown Church.

These stark details hide a story of adventure, romance and indeed tragedy. His father, Isaac Homan, a Dublin barrister, emigrated to Georgia to live in a log cabin, where he later died. His widow and son Philip

survived shipwreck, were marooned for a whole winter on an unidentified island, and finally got back to Ireland.

Philip entered Trinity College, Dublin, in 1815, was ordained and appointed to the chaplaincy in Villierstown through the influence of Sir William Homan, a cousin, who lived in Tourin. He married Marion Cameron from Lismore on November 16, 1828 and lived in blissful happiness in Villierstown. They were blessed with six children,

four girls and two boys.

The family put down very deep roots in the locality, through hikes and jaunts with the physical surroundings, through birthday parties and social events with the local community. Underneath was a deep Christian faith.

The harvest of 1846 was disastrous — the people of the surrounding area were reduced to eating blackberries by the summer's end. Philip Homan multiplied his efforts to feed the suffering. His family helped in every

way they could. On November 2 his wife was struck down with the famine fever. For days she lay unconscious on her sick bed. Just as she got better, Philip himself got sick. At first there was no alarm. His condition deteriorated and doctors from Cappoquin, Lismore and Carrick were summoned — but he was beyond help.

Countless seemed the number of poor from far and near, east and west, of every persuasion and denomination, who attended his funeral. The monks in Melleray had Mass for his recovery.

All of this information has been gleaned from a highly charged account "Memories of Villierstown," written by a daughter of Philip Homan in 1872. At that stage the family had been scattered to the four winds. Such is life. It is difficult to imagine that practically no memories of the Reverend Homan, no folklore surrounding him, nothing tangible remains. His body is still interred in Villierstown Church and an impressive white marble memorial is now housed in Lismore Cathedral. Yet his story is part of that overall here in West Waterford.

In this 150th year it is fitting that a tablet is to be laid to mark Rev. Homan's burial place in the floor of Villierstown Church and a facsimile of the memorial tablet will be displayed on the sanctuary wall.

A commemorative lecture will be given by Monsignor Michael Olden, P.P., Clonmel on Friday, July 21, in which he will outline ehe impact of the famine on the wider locality in the Blackwater Valley. The lecture will be at 8 p.m. in Villierstown Church.

£117,194 In Grants For County Fisheries and Marine Projects

The Minister for the Marine, Sean Barrett, T.D., has announced the allocation of £117,194 in EU and government grant aid for four marine related projects around the county under the EU PESCA Initiative. The projects receiving grant aid cover a range of activities from lobster and mussel cultivation to development studies and tourism related ventures. Two development officers have also been appointed to oversee and progress the development programme.

£18,700 has been granted to Ring Co-op to finance a research and development study for a community-based fishermen's co-op to diversify into marine related activities.

study of the fishing areas in
County Waterford; (2)
Multi-tier training programme to address the
needs of fishermen.

Meanwhile, South-East Shellfish Co-op has received £83,875 for the extensive bottom cultivation of mussels in Waterford Harbour and the East Waterford Co-op Society receives £4,950 for harvesting, collecting, notching, tagging and placing of female adult lobsters in the fisheries along the East Waterford coast.

PESCA is an EU initiative aimed at helping the fishing industry overcome difficulties caused by factors such as global fleet reductions, ongoing instability in the markets and the enlargement of the EU. It focuses particularly on regions which are dependent on fisheries to support their local economies and aims to contribute to their socioeconomic survival through a range of job-creating measures.

The Minister said that the allocation of funding under the PESCA Initiative would complement and enhance the substantial £140 million investment programme already under way under the Fisheries Operational Programme. "The aim of these investment programmes is to maximise the potential of the fisheries resource and at the same time provide realistic alternatives and opportunities for development in other marine-related areas," Minister Barrett said.

Yard. This pedestrianised area would be the first new street in Dungarvan for over 100 years since the town was laid out by the Duke of Devonshire.

The remaining half of the former Mulcahy property and the adjoining former Ducey's would be totally reconstructed with a new shop front timber window.

At its mid-point the new street would open into a square covered by an impressive glazed roof cover. lined on each side with retail units and 13 upstairs apartments.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Mr O Criostoir said he was delighted with the UDC's recent decision.

Although the development is still not authorised, Mr. O Criostoir said that if full planning permission is finally granted, the proposed development which covers over 1/2 acre would come on stream by early next

Comprising retail/commercial units ranging in size from 32 to 64 square metres and 16,700 square feet of potential supermarket floorspace, Mr. O Criostoir said the development would constitute the size of a major industry in the town with initial employment figures estimated at 100 during the 2 years construction period.

The £2 million project

was the first planning application to be lodged under the Urban Renewal Scheme which runs until July 1997.

Just four weeks later after the application was lodged,

however, the development came under strong attack from the Retail, Grocery, Dairy and Allied Trade Association (RG DATA), who lodged a detailed 5 page objection with the UDC.

Then began months of correspondence involving the UDC's planning section together with town planner John Reid in an effort to overcome the impass between INBS and RG DATA.

The main focus of the objection is the effect such a proposed retail/residential mall would have on local existing retailers.

These local retail outlets, the objection says, are presently adequately serving Dungarvan and its hinterland in terms of both quality and convenience. Indeed, Dublin based architect and Town Planner Fergal Mc-Cabe who lodged the objection on behalf of RG DATA, envisages the proposed project as a threat to existing shopping outlets.

The loss of public parking spaces in the vicinity of the pedestrianised project and consequential traffic problems also figure in the 5 page objection as does the 'adverse' effects of such a mall on both urban conservation and the character and particular townscape of Main Street. Another point of the RG DATA objection is that the 21,500 sq. ft. development would represent a 20% increase in the number of local retail outlets which, according to Mr. McCabe was not allowed for in the Dungarvan Town Development Plan.

ECONOMIC REPORT Under the General Policy Directive 1991, the UDC was obliged to prepare a report to provide an economic assessment of the town's retail economy and to examine the potential impact of a proposed shopping development at Main Street. This report was prepared on be-half of the UDC by Dublin economist James Eustace.

The report concludes that the proposed development can be assimilated into Dungarvan's urban economy without adverse impacts.
"insofar as it promotes

competition between retailers, the development will generate a general raising of standard particularly in terms of building maintenance, shop front design and an upgrading of customer services".

The report continues, "the development is important to the proper planning and development of Dungarvan for it provides an initial and substantial check to a further spread of urban blight in the town centre; it will contribute to the consolidation and expansion of Dungarvan's retail catchment areas and it will contribute directly and indirectly, through spin-off effects to the provision of employment in the town".

The notification of a decision to grant planning permission was issued by Co. Manager Donal Connolly after a thorough examination of the report, the INBS application and RG DATA's objection. A total of nineteen conditions however were attached to the notification in the interest of public health, public safety, proper planning, traffic safety and visual amenity

'FOREGONE CONCLUSION"

The UDC's decision has already been given an unreserved welcome by Presiof Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce. John Walsh who said the £2 million project would revitalise the town centre and attract badly needed business back into Dungarvan from other main shopping centres such as Clonmel and Waterford.

Likewise, Chairperson of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Nuala Ryan was pleased with the council's decision. adding however that it was a 'foregone conclusion' that the development would now before An Bord go bei Pleanala.

The general expectation is that the objectors RG DATA will lodge an appeal with the planning board against the Council's decision within the next month.

In strong support of the proposed shopping emporium, Cllr. Ryan said the development would be a big plus for Dungarvan keeping local shoppers in the town while also attracting people in from surrounding areas.


It remains to be seen however what course of action RG DATA will now take in light of the Council's most recent decision. Time is of the essence to the developers who, if given the goahead will have until July 1997 to complete the project, to avail of the many financial incentives offered under the scheme.

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
Running A 'Mini Garden'

Don't be down-hearted if you are a garden-less 'townie' envying those with gardens now bursting with life — it's surprising what can be done with a small lot, balcony or window ledge.

With more time available per square foot of growing space you can also afford to go for quality rather than quantity, by raising unusual or temperamental blooms.

FLEXIBLE

The most flexible way of running a 'mini-garden' is to rely on containers such as tubs, pots and boxes, which can be features in their own right.





But beware of weight if your garden is above ground on a balcony or flat roof - it is surprising how much a terracotta planter and soil can weigh.

Save weight with a light soil compound such as vermiculite, or cut down on pounds weight and sterling by buying polythene pots and boxes made to look just like terracotta or stone. Or you could opt for natural look fibre containers made from peat.

You also need drip trays in aerial gardens so that you don't upset those living or walking below or cause rot or decay to the building.

If you have a balcony which is rather stark then break up angles and edges with trailing plants, such as fuchsias, and erect trellises to encourage climb-

These will also minimise draughts, although you can install sheet perspex to keep out particularly strong prevailing winds.

lvy is the favourite climber here, but honeysuckle and roses might settle to an unexposed site and reward your efforts with their blooms and scent, though rose thorns are literally a pain in tight spaces!

At the back of the balcony you can install tubs growing standard fuchsias, roses or even tomato plants to give height and depth.

If you really are restricted to window boxes, don't despair — they can be made very attractive through smart wood stains or paint-work to match doors and windows.

BRACKETS

Apart from favourite blooms you could grow herbs and vegetables, but weight is also a problem with boxes. Use stout brackets and attach them to the wall - don't assume that just because the laden box is heavy it will stay on the ledge in a strong wind.

If you are lucky enough to have a little yard, you can lay flags or decorative bricks and arrange tubs and boxes to effect, but choose the right plant varieties confined spaces are sometimes heavily shaded. Clothe walls and high fences with creepers and climbers or bright hanging baskets to break up the towering effect and look forward to some great barbecue nights!

Forest Fires — Coillte Appeal For Public Vigilance

Forests are most vulnerable to fires during March to May when vegetation is withered or dry. However, during dry spells similar to that which we have experienced recently, forests at all stages of development are extremely susceptible.
Apart from the danger to human life and the forests, fires wreak environmental and economic havoc. Forests provide a habitat for a diverse range of wildlife and Coillte's estate is worth over £800m. and supports over 11,000 jobs. "We are

very conscious of the threat and potential damage caused by forest fires and plans are reviewed regularly to minimise the risk of fire occurring in our forests," says Michael Carey, General manager of Operation in Coillte. Coillte's fire plan reduces the risk of serious fire damage but Coillte needs the continued support from the

"Forests are a source of great beauty, recreation and enjoyment, but all of this depends on the consideration shown by each person to everything in the forest," says Michael. Coillte asks people to observe the following simple rules:

 Do not light fires in or near a forest.

 Do not leave litter behind in the forest.

 If you smoke, do not casually throw away matches or cigarette ends. Better still, avoid smoking in the forest

Incidents of fire damage have decreased in recent years, mainly due to Coillte's fire plan which is

in operation in all forest centres. This includes trained fire fighting teams, the use of helicopter fire fighting services and liaison between forest staff and fire brigades. The advice from Coillte is that if you discover that a fire has broken out, you should immediately call the emergency services and the local forester. "The quicker we can get to a fire the less damage will be done," says Michael, "and the vigilance and support of people in this respect is invaluable."

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American Ambassador Launches Famine Book In Lismore Castle

CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE

he said, were the worst affected areas in the county.

From 1847 to 1850 workhouses were set up throughout the county, one in Lismore for 500 people and one in Dungarvan for 600

people.

Cllr. Coffey said he was indebted to the contributors and particularly to Des Cowman for his total commitment to the project. He also paid tribute to the publishers, Geography Publications and to Cappoquin artist Arthur Maderson who produced and donated the full colour jacket entitled "Dawn Near Lismore".

The Council Chairman was also highly appreciative of the amount of effort put into the publication by Co. Librarian Donald Brady together with his library staff, Anne Walsh, Eddie Byrne and Richie Walsh.

Concluding his speech Cllr. Coffey also acknowledged the major work of other countywide organisations in the line-up of events for the famine commemorations - Pulla Graveyard Restoration Committee, Lismore Town Commissioners; the Dungarvan Museum Society; Villierstown Community Group; Mrs. Twomey I.C.A., Tramore; the Youth Drama Group in Waterford city and the Decies.

HISTORIC OCCASION On behalf of his fellow Town Commissioners, newly elected Chairman Peter Dowd welcomed Ambassador Smith to Lismore on what he described as a very historic occasion.

'Today we are here to commemorate the Great Famine by the launch of this very fine book which records much of what happened in County Waterford during those years. However, it is a little known fact that Ireland suffered another famine more than a century earlier in the year 1740. At that time", he said "the then Duke of Devonshire (of Lismore Castle) who was also Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, passed a decree forbidding the export of foodstuffs which had the effect of limiting the duration of the famine to that year.'

In light of these facts, Mr. Dowd continued that it was indeed fitting that Lismore should be chosen as the venue for this important part of the ongoing 150th commemoration of the great

"In this regard", said Mr. Dowd, "I would particularly like to compliment our County Librarian Donald Brady and his staff for having the foresight to bring together all those associated with the publication of this very fine volume which commemorates in such a unique way the history of the time".

Having accompanied the ambassador on a tour of Lismore Library earlier in the evening, the Commissioner Chairman said he was particularly delighted that she was able to visit the Commissioners famine exhibition which was part of a local inter-schools competi-

The prize-winners in this competition were Aislinn Kenneally for her 3-dimensional model of an eviction scene and Maeve England for her objective historical and photographic research on the famine in the locality. WARM WELCOME Describing the famine as

Next to address the assemblage was County Manager Donal Connolly who extended a warm welcome to Mrs. Kennedy - Smith.

"And in finding those dreams", she declared 'as my brother President Kennedy once said, they helped build a great nation. They are a model to us of

The district was saddened following the tragic death of Mr. James (Jim) Ahearne who was a popular resident of Kilsheelan for several decades and a well-known character. Major plans are on the horizon for the West Waterford town of Cappoquin which was recently the focus of a detailed 88 page report, commissioned by the Cappoquin Community Development Company Ltd with the objective of improving the economic and social conditions of the town.

cludes comprehensive surveys of population, industry, housing, education, tourism, community facilities, dereliction and labour force etc, was submitted at last week's Waterford County Council meeting where it received warm commendations from members.

Proposing that the Council adopt the non-statutory plan, company chairman, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson acknowledged the help and work of Patricia Griffen, Co. Manager Donal Connolly and Jim Shine of the Council's planning department. He also thanked the Ireland Fund and the Waterford Development Partnership who played a major role in getting the company off the ground. Cllr. Wilkinson described the amount of work put into the plan as "top class" and said it was socially and economically essential for a town to have a development plan.

His proposal was seconded by Cappoquin Councillor Nora Flynn.

BACKGROUND

Having identified a number of key problem issues in the town, the Company secured a grant from the Ireland Funds to undertake a planning study of the area which was completed in

The main purpose of the plan is to allow the orderly development of the physical, economic and social fabric of Cappoquin and to assist in investment decisions which will achieve these development objectives. The hardworking members of the 4 year old Cappoquin company whose initiative and motivation has

The draft plan which in- culminated in the publication of the report are; Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson chairperson; Denis McCarthy secretary; Patricia Stam recording secretary; Tom Feerick joint treasurer; Anthony Prendergast joint treasurer; Esther Barron; Michael Doherty; David Keane; Dr. Ben Murphy and Joe White.

In preparing the plan, the views of Cappoquin residents were included via a number of public meetings and the circulation of a questionnaire to each household.

DECLINING **POPULATION**

After a brief period of decline between 1956 and 1966, Cappoquin's population grew steadily to reach a peak of 971 people in 1979. From then on however up to 1991, the population declined by 14.6% (142 people). The report states that this pace of decline has been accelerating with the major reduction in the 0-14 age group. As seen from the table below, the population decline in Cappoquin is proportionally greater when compared to four other towns of roughly similar size. It is also notable that both Cappoquin and Portlaw are experiencing a significant reduction in the 25-44

age group. According to the report, the main reasons for this decline are "the difficulties experienced by private individuals seeking to build houses in the area; the emerging imbalance between public and private housing; the need for the Co. Council to actively help in developing private sector housing; the underdeveloped potential of the river Blackwater and other natural amenities for generating tourism revenue; the extent of dereliction and vacancy in the building stock; unemployment and the need to attract further employment generating activities to the area; the expansion and upgrading of the sewage facilities to support the expansion of the town; absence of passive recreational facilities: pending loss of the sec-

As of February '95, seven-ty people are registered for unemployment benefit in Cappoquin, 13 are temporarout of work and a further 33 are on FAS schemes, thus reflecting the deficiency of employment opportunities in the area.

On its own, Carrigeen Industrial Estate is not sufficient to meet the requirement of maintaining the 25-44 age group. "It must be an essential component of any strategy for the area to seek to expand existing employment and attract new enterprises to the area", reads the report.

Future job creation, it states, depends on the continuing viability and expansion of the five local manufacturing companies and the development of tourism. "Further employment may be created by new business arising from local initiative and the fostering of a spirit of entrepreneurship".

The Cappoquin development company's policy is to encourage and facilitate job creation in all sectors, through the medium of the Co. Enterprise Board, the IDA, Forbairt and all agencies involved in employment, training and industry.

NEED FOR PRIVATE HOUSING

Private housing development in the town is expensive due to a shortage of undeveloped land being serviced by the existing sewer network.

The direct effect of this situation is that the town is losing the considerable economic and social benefits which would follow from having more couples and families building houses in the town area.

which date pre 1919 are very narrow and small in size and are generally unsuitable for family living. According to these houses

The report also indicates a considerable demand from the private sector for housing designed for elderly people and suitable sites for such development are already available in the town.

There are currently 17 people on the waiting list for local authority housing in Cappoquin. Some of these will be accommodated on existing land at Danes Field.

The County Council intends to facilitate the development of private housing in Cappoquin by servicing land and getting involved in joint venture schemes with landowners. The Council will also seek to fulfil some of its own housing needs by acquiring and redeveloping derelict and obsolete buildings in the town.

SCHOOLS TO **AMALGAMATE**

Cappoquin has 2 primary schools and one post-primary school. The Mercy Convent runs St. Anne's mixed secondary school which is to amalgamated with the secondary school in Lismore in 1997 so the existing buildings and site will become redundant. In addition the two primary schools are also expected to amalgamate due to declining numbers and move to a new site across the road on land owned by Mount Melleray Abbey. The Council has zoned 7 acres of land behind the group homes for the development of such a new primary school. The report recommends a policy of cooperation with the school authorities in the provision of new educational facilities and to encourage the immediate redevelopment for suitable uses of any educational land which becomes vacant following the schools amalgamation.

NEW RETAIL OPPORTUNITY

At present the town has 24 retail outlets and sufficient retail space to cater for its current population and any foreseeable growth. According to the report a market niche exists for specialist retail outlets due to a large young population and comparatively low unemployment. As a shopping centre however, Cappoquin is considerable overshadowed by larger urban centres such as Dungarvan.

The Council's objective is to confine retail development to the more central town areas and to promote the establishment of new retail businesses which would the report fill the gap in market defi-

NEED FOR CARPARK

A parking survey under-taken by the Council earlier this year supports the need for a carpark at the western end of the town. The report puts forward four locations for such a carpark; part of the old bacon factory site, at Twig Bog, the Mill or at Castle street. On street parking is provided in all areas and the central part of the town contains a total of 214 parking spaces.

With regard to transport, the report states, "Cappoquin is not well served by public transport and mobility is considerably curtailed unless people have access to private transport. The lack of a more comprehensive public transport service makes the area difficult to access for tourists and can also constitute a further barrier to gaining employment if someone wishes to continue living in the area".

Other main headings in the report are water supply, sewage facilities, refuse disposal, community facilities, open space, zoning areas, urban form and amenity facilities, etc.

IMPROVING THE SQUARE

Under the heading 'open space', the report considers the steps necessary to improve the Square which it describes as "rather unattractive due to the number of hard surfaces and the scarcity of planting". A major facelift would see

a reduction in the height of

the existing boundary walls or alternatively replaced with wrought iron railings. "This would enable a softer view to be developed of a bank/flower grass beds/shrubs sloping up to the paved central area. The steps should remain but the paved area at the centre and the layout of the existing flower beds needs to be redesigned. Further seating should also be provided and some appropriate trees planted. The provision of a water feature should also be considered", reads the report. Another recommendation is the need for better lighting in the Square at night time, "perhaps by the provision of decorative light standards at the corners or in the centre".

TOURISM UNDERDEVELOPED

The report claims that the town is underdeveloped from a tourism point of view although it has much to offer in the way of outdoor amenities. To resolve this problem, a local tourism group should be set up to liaise with the Waterford Development Partnership in marketing the area.

Another idea put forward

by the report is for more extensive marketing of the Waterford side of the Valley Blackwater Drive/heritage trail together with the provision of brochures outlining the route and attractions on it.

With only 77 bed spaces available in the town (28 ensuite), the report recommends that the feasibility of providing a serviced site for camper vans in the carpark at Glenshelane Wood be in-

vestigated.

A most interesting proposal is the development of a hotel in the town. "In terms of increasing the number of bed spaces available in the area a hotel would be a welcome development. The Mill in Twig Bog, given its location in the centre of the town and proximity to the river and its activities, would be ideal if converted for accommodation uses. Redevelopment of the Mill would also act as a flagship for the remainder of the Twig Bog area".

FURTHER STUDIES

To complement the plan, a number of issues need to be further investigated such as a profile of the unemployment in Cappoquin to establish what skills are present and where local employment opportunities lie.

A shopping survey could also be undertaken to help identify gaps in the retail market while the feasibility of locating a trout farm on the Melleray Road also needs to be investigated. The necessity, cost and advantages of dredging sections of the river should be examined further with a view to facilitating regular boat trips between Cappoquin and Youghal/Lismore.

With regard to the railway bridge the report recommends that a study be undertaken to investigate the feasibility of rendering the bridge safe to pedestrian traffic. Likewise, the feasibility of an over night camper van site at Glenshelane Wood could also be looked at.

"VERY WORTHWHILE

Speaking at last week's Waterford County Council meeting, Co. Manager Donal Connolly praised the report as a "very worthwhile document" and paid tribute to the Cappoquin Development Company and the Council's Planning Department. He said the report would be the basis for further plans in Cappoquin.

Meanwhile the draft development plans for Tramore, Lismore and Portlaw are now nearing completion and are expected to be included on the Council's September agenda.

NATIONAL MILK RESTRUCTURING SCHEME

The application forms for this year's quota purchase scheme are now with farmers. Those who wish to purchase quota must have their application into the creamery by late July; quota will be allocated to the purchasers soon after that. There is an EU subsidy this year of £0.75p for those who are eligible. Eligibility to buy quota, under the priority categories laid down by the Department of Agriculture does not mean that a person is eligible for the subsidy. Eligibility to get the subsidy is a separate issue altogether, from eligibility to buy quota. There is a separate application form for those who feel they are eligible for subsidy.

PAYMENT

The price of quota varies, £1.60 - £2.00, depending on the part of the country. Small producers who are eligible for the subsidy will get some quota at £1.00 - £1.25 a gallon. These farmers are strongly recommended to buy as much as possible this year, as this is likely to be the last EU Subsidy Scheme.

PRIORITY CATEGORIES

There is no change this year in the priority categories

Category 1—Producers with permanent quota below 30,000 gl., there is special priority within this category for new entrants who do not own a quota, also certain producers following an F.M.S. Development plan that was drawn up between 1981 and 1984.

Category 2—Producers with quotas of 30,000 - 55,000 gls. who had abnormally low milk delivery in 1983 due to disease.

Category 3—Other producers-with quotas of 30,000 -55,000 gls.

Eligibility in any category above does not ensure that person is eligible for the £0.75p subsidy. Nor does entitlement to the subsidy affect the distribution of restructured quota. In other words, a supplier who is not getting the subsidy is just as eligible to buy quota, but at the full price, as a person who is getting a subsidy.

SUBSIDY DETAILS

The three criteria which determines eligibility for the subsidy are: A, Present quota less than 22,000 gls., where a producer buys quota that brings his quota above 22,000 gls., the subsidy does not apply on the balance over 22,000 gls.; B, Total annual income below £15,000. This includes farm and off-farm income, but does not include off-farm income of a spouse if he/she is not the owner or partner on the farm. The income will have to be verified; C, Stocking rate, eligible applicants must not have too high a stocking rate, if they are eligible for extensification premia, this will suffice.

BUY IF POSSIBLE

Those who are eligible for the subsidy can buy quota at £1.00 - £1.25 a gallon. This is excellent value, and in the most favourable situation it will pay for itself in about 2.5 years. This applies where savings are available to buy the quota, no extra cows or buildings are needed and only PRSI tax is payable on the extra profit. In the same situation, if income tax and PRSI had to be paid on the extra profit, purchased quota would pay for itself in 4

But most people who buy extra quota have to borrow, and perhaps plan for extra cows or buildings or a bigger milk tank. An extra cow, can, with good management leave an extra profit of about £650; where the cow displaces a bullock, she will make £400 - £450 more profit than the bullock. These figures have to be reduced by whatever repayments are involved.

It is important for farmers who have barely enough cash to live on at present, to at least maintain their cash income during the repayment period. Seven year loans are recommended in most cases, especially where borrowing for more than the quota is involved.

In the least favourable situation, if a farmer borrows for quota at £2.00, and also for cows and buildings, he will be far worse off as regards annual cash income until the repayments are finished. This is not recommended. If the quota subsidy is available, it is possible that, with good management, and no extra income tax, that repayments could be met on quota cows and buildings while still maintaining the previous standard

More Job Cuts As Waterford Foods Initiates Restructuri

By Aisling Conroy Managing Director of Waterford Foods plc, Matt Walsh has revealed that the Dungarvan based dairy giant is to shed a total of 400 jobs throughout the group as part of a £12 million restructuring plan.

The fundamental review of the company began in the second half of '94 with 150 jobs already lost. The remaining job cuts have yet to be sourced but are expected to be in Dublin, America and England. A total of 30 jobs have been shed in Co. Waterford through the closure of Central Dairies in Dungarvan but Mr. Walsh said the company had no er rationalisation plans for the county. Already making substantial progress with the plan, Mr. Walsh said the programme will result in annual savings of £5m from 1997 onwards. The M.D. however remained adamant that the plan was "not just about cutting jobs for the sake of it", but rather a type of consolidation one can expect to see more of in the future.

In his presentation at the company's AGM last week, Mr. Walsh cited a number of major issues such as GATT and CAP driven changes, structural changes in the UK dairy sector and a constant

tightening of company margins, etc. as the main reasons for the rationalisation

"YEAR OF **CHALLENGE AND** CHANGE"

In his review of 1994, Mr. Walsh said it had been a year of challenge and change with difficult trading conditions. Pre tax profits stood at £20.3m, down 17% on the previous twelve months. Good news however was a record turnover balance of £710.6 million, representing a 2% increase on 1993 figures. In all the group's margins continued to be among the best in the dairy sector. Waterford Foods continued its 31%

leadership in the Irish liquid milk market with significant growth achieved by Premier Supermilk and Premier Slimline. Supermilk was also introduced to UK consumers and initial reactions are proving positive. Another new innovation was the introduction of a twin compartment product - Fruit Royale - at its plant in Inch, Co. Wexford while last year also saw the relaunch of Yoplait Diet Yogurt.

Due to a change in milk buying patterns and a sig-nificant increase in milk prices the Didsbury liquid milk plant in the UK is expected to close within a matter of months, to be sold off as an asset by the company. The plant's butter and milk powder facilities were earlier closed in late '94.

A major achievement for the group during '94, was when Waterford Food ingredients became the first company in Europe to attain the I.S. 310 environmental

US BELOW EXPECTATIONS

In 1994, the US operation, Waterford Food Products Inc. at Wisconsin performed significantly below expectations. According to Mr. Walsh competitive market conditions coupled with high Wisconsin milk prices

caused a continued pressure on margins.

The US operation is also targeted for a significant number of job losses (estimated at 50) together with changes in management.

'95 PERFORMANCE

BETTER

Commenting on the group's performance so far this year, Mr. Walsh said overall markets are considerably better than last year resulting in a .7p per gallon increase in milk price. Performance, he said has improved this year and the group is now operating to

As stated in the group's annual report, the manage-ment of Waterford Foods believe that further restructuring of the industry in all of their key markets is inevitable and that it will resignificant in opportunities. The report reads, "as a focused and efficient dairy business with a record of product innovation, good operating cash flow and a well structured balance sheet, Waterford is in a strong position to avail

of these opportunities".

Meanwhile both 'A' and 'B' Waterford Foods shareholders will receive a final dividend of 1.72p per share for the year ended 31st December, 1994.

Co. Waterford **ICMSA** News

Mr. John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford ICMSA, said that now that the school holidays are in operation and many children are helping on farms, ICMSA has issued a safety warning to farmers advising them to follow the farm safety code, and to exercise extreme caution during the busy summer season.

"While farms and farm life can be extremely enjoyable and healthy places for chil-dren and adults alike, the reality is that agriculture is a very dangerous industry. Agriculture claims more deaths in a year than any other industry and is responsible for an increasing number of serious injuries. Subsequently, great care must be taken by all farmers, parents and children," said the County Chairman.

He warned farmers to be particularly careful during the silage making season, and instanced the need to lock tractors when not in use, to remove keys, and to ensure that young children are not left to wander around farms unaccompanied.

The Chairman added that

the list of potential dangers is endless (uncovered power take offs, water tanks, pesticides, slurry tanks, etc.) and that if in doubt the policy should be 'keep out.'

"Generally speaking, farmers have become more safety conscious. However, we must keep repeating the message because one more fatality is one too many.'

Meanwhile, some small scale dairy producers have still not received the grant aid of 50 pence per gallon due for the purchase of milk quota under the 1994 Restructuring Scheme and ICMSA has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, to act immediately to free up payments to these hard pressed small scale dairy farmers,

Small scale dairy farmers paid up front for quota which they purchased at £1.75/gallon in May 1994 on the expectation of a 50p/gallon subsidy. Now some 13 months later many of these farmers have not yet received the subsidy. This is intolerable treatment for small scale dairy pro-

Advocate General View Vindicates IFA's Strong Objection To 340kg. Carcase Weight Limit

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said recently that the view expressed by the Advocate General of the European Court of Justice on the 340kg. intervention carcase weight limit case, as reported in this week's Irish Farmers' Journal, vindicates the strong objections IFA made to the EU Commission on the introduction of the controversial weight limit restrictions in 1993.

Mr. Donovan said: "In stating that the EU Commission lacked the competence under the EU Treaty to make the weight limit regulations and that they abused their power, the Advocate General was acknowledging the clear discrimination against Ireland in light of the fact tion from 100% to 39%."

The IFA man pointed out that the case taken by the Irish Government against the European Commission was initiated by the former Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh, T.D.

The IFA Livestock leader said that there were fundamental lessons to be learned by both the EU Commission and the Irish Government, should the Advocate General's findings be upheld in the European court. "From Irish agriculture's perspective, it clearly underlines the importance of a strong Irish Government arguing vigorously against negative decisions which are taken at EU level which pose serious implications for this country's vital interest in agriculture. He surprised me with his optimism about the future of Clare hurling. "Do you know something", he said very seriously, "when I get the calibre of hurler that's needed - fellows who fold under won't pressure, who won't be overcome by the big occasion, who won't freeze in awe of the name Tipperary or Cork or Limerick or Kilkenny -you'll hear about Clare". Well he seems to have got the mix right sooner than any of us thought. Not every Clare hurler is super-skilled but every man he has wearing the Clare jersey showed against Limerick that he was ready and willing to scrap and battle to his last breath; that he was possessed of a

burning spirit. Speaking of skill it is my contention that the under age skill level in Clare has over the last dozen years been higher than that of any other Munster county including Cork. What was most lacking over the years was that legitimate aggression without which no team can thrive and the self-confidence which allows players to express themselves positively. Ger seems to have inculcated this all-important self-belief into his charges. In his sessions he gives priority to skill training and won't accept one-sided hurlers. He would never tolerate on his team the Waterford forward I mention a couple of whomths ago, Remember?

The fellow I advised to do something about his weak right side about 5 years ago who said: "Ah my right side is as good as my left", and who was found out this year against Tipperary when he missed twice from the right. There are lessons, encour-

aging lesson, for Waterford in Clare's success. We are not too far behind Clare, really. But we have to discard those without the character to enable them pursue the battle fearlessly or improve their skill or acquire craft. When Kevin Heffernan was trying to assemble a successful football combination in the 70's he sought the type of player with the qualities needed for his role on the team. He never tried to play a footballer in a position not suited to his talents or temperament. Each player understood his role within the team pattern and there were no square pegs in round holes. If a left half forward or left full forward with a very weak right side is played, you are asking for trouble. Similarly the No. 10 and No. 13 had better have a good left side. At centre-forward the good player has to have quickness from both sides, be a good reader of the play and a good ground striker. John Troy, Offaly, comes to mind as a pretty effective practitioner in the No. 11 jersey. Intelligent personnel, above all else, is a must. "Ní féidir capall ráis a dhéanamh d'asal". 





The South Eastern Health Board has established a Working Group to identify and examine existing policies and strategies of care for the elderly as exist within its area of jurisdiction i.e. Carlow/Kilkenny, Waterford, Wexford and South Tipperary.

In undertaking the task the Working Group will have to take cognisance of the following:-

(a) Present and foreseeable numbers and locations of elderly persons.

(b) Identify key target groups on whom the services should focus.

- (c) In the light of patients needs, and the requirement to deliver services on a cost effective manner, to identify and examine existing policies and strategies of care for the elderly.
- (d) Define objective to be achieved.
 - Assess the adequacy of existing services.
- To specify the service developments required to address any identified inadequacies.
- (g) Operation of present organisational and management structures (both local and regional).
- The principles and values set down in the National Strategy — "Reshaping a Healthier Future" — and the policies set out in "The Years Ahead" and "Planning for the Future."

The membership of the Working Group includes representatives from the various programmes of the Boards Services throughout the region together with community representatives, and it is expected to complete its deliberations by December, 1995.



Continuing our section on rules this week we highlight rule 1.4 under Rules of Control of Referees Guide: Injuries and incursions: - the referee may give his permission to a team official or field of play to examine an younger grades.

injured player. No other team official shall enter the field of play. Play shall not be stopped for injury to a player except in exceptional circumstances to enable a seriously injured player to be treated on the field or removed from the field of play. All other injuries shall be treated off the field of play. Very sensible stuff. If this rule is adhered to we will have very few field incur-sions - serious injuries will be treated on the field or the player can be removed - all other injuries where player is mobile will be treated on the side line and play continues without undue disruptions. Very sensible indeed.

Mind you though some overheated team mentors can or do sometimes disregard the rule and completely forget about a sensible approach to injured players.

Under Rules of specification the field of play is specified: Length, 130m minimum to 145m maximum; Width, 80m minimum to 90m maximum.

Imagine that 13,000 square metres, and remember the ball can be in any one of those squares 13,000 of them and the referee must be there or close enough to see what is going on. And even if he is there he must still allow for the agitated mentor who is on the corner flag perhaps football beginning in late 140 metres away and is con-August and U-12 football vinced that he saw it better! Under rules referreing to players Rule 2.2 states: a team may commence a game with thirteen players but shall have fielded fifteen players, inclusive of players ordered off or retired injured by the start of the second half. In the event of failure to comply with this, the game shall continue.



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Refusal "Not Good Enough"

The recent decision by the Minister for the Marine Sean Barrett to turn down a fish culture licence to local company Waterford Clams Ltd. "in the public interest" was slammed last week by Waterford County Councillor Tony Wright.

An avid supporter of the proposed 69 acre clam farm in Dungarvan Harbour from day one, Cllr. Wright stingingly attacked Minister Barrett's aforementioned reason as "not good enough".

In a statement confirming his decision to refuse the licence, the Minister said that after the most detailed consideration of every aspect of the proposal, he believed it was "in the public interest" not to allow the clam growing development to go

Slamming the absence of 'detailed comprehensive reasons' why the application was refused, Cllr. Wright said that if the Department came up with "good scien-tific evidence" as to why the development should not go ahead, then he could live with that.

"I want to know specifically the reasons behind the ministerial refusal and how the decision was arrived at", said Cllr. Wright. "LAP OF

LUXURY"

In full support of Cllr. Wright, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain declared that from the word go, the clam growing venture "hadn't a hope".

Thoroughly critical of the Minister's thumbs down decision, Cllr. O Riain said the licence had been refused primarily due to the opposition of people living in the lap of luxury in the Dungarvan area. These people, he claimed, didn't give a damn about those without

Cllr. Tom Cunningham was also in favour of a full ministerial report on the grounds of the refusal. "It just isn't good enough for him to say that it is in the public interest", he said.

Welcoming the official refusal however, Cllr. Austin Flynn said Minister Barrett's decision wasn't taken lightly and had taken three months of consideration. Cllr. Flynn continued that the decision would be for the good of Dungarvan and the area as a whole.

County Manager Donal Connolly said the Council has absolutely nothing to hide in the matter. "Until we were fully satisfied that the development of a clam growing industry would not be in conflict with other users of Dungarvan harbour, we could not go along with it", he added.

"Direct comparison between the standards of accommodation required by the settled community and those members of the traveller community who rehalting accommodation is not valid having regard in the nature of the accommodation provided by, and the way of life of the occupants of halting sites."

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
