UDC Has Power To Introduce Local Taxi Service

Following new regulations announced recently by Environment Minister Brendan Howlin, Dungarvan UDC will have the power to introduce a full taxi service including a designated taxi rank in the town, depending on demand.

At present, Dungarvan and surrounding areas are served by hackneys only, which are technically prohibited from pick up hailing passengers on the street.

Under the new regulations however which come into effect on August 1st, UDC will be able to introduce a full taxi service. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 40**

Abbeyside/Boreenatra Beach Clean-up Needed

Following the recent spell of hot, dry weather, much concern has been raised over the ugly state of local beaches such as at Abbeyside Strand and Boreenatra. Normally popular resorts with local residents, these two beaches have fallen into a sad state of decline due to stagnant seaweed, dumped rubbish and dirt. Slamming the current state of Boreenatra beach in particular, Cllr. Tony Wright told last Monday's Dungarvan UDC meeting that the beach was 'filthy'.

"It was very popular with local people down through the years and was frequented especially by children," declared Cllr. Wright. "It's one of the few facilities down there during the summer," he added. Indeed, last Friday the Council had even removed a dumped washing machine from the beach. "There's days if not weeks of clean-up work involved there," he urged.

"A DISGRACE"

Likewise critical of the Council's inaction in cleaning up the town's beaches, Cllr. Paddy Power submitted that for the past ten weeks, stagnant seaweed had attracted flies and dirt on Abbeyside strand. "The smell is unnatural," he stressed, "it's a disgrace." The Abbeyside Councillor said the beach could still be cleaned up in August, with just one man on a horse with a sprong! Supporting **CONTINUED ON PAGE 40**

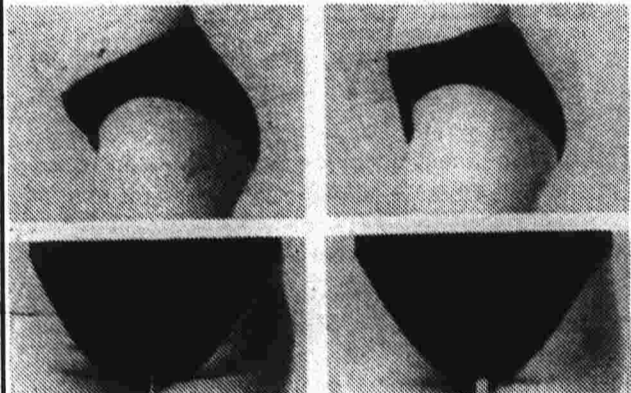

Youth Festival At St. Augustine's College

Searching for God . . . to find you, is the theme of the youth festival to be held in St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford from July 25-31. This international festival is held every three years. This year, the Irish Province of the Augustinian Order will act as hosts. Approximately 350 young people (18-25 years) will gather together with fifty Augustinian Fathers, Brothers and Sisters for a week filled with events and activities. Delegates are expected from Argentina, Columbia, Mexico, U.S.A., Ireland, U.K., France, Germany, Holland, Italy, Malta, Spain, Australia and of course Ireland.

We hope to bring together as many as possible of the young people already active in the various apostolates of the Order throughout the world, such as in Folk Groups, Prayer Groups, Catechetical Groups, Justice and Peace Groups, and so on. The object of the exercise is threefold:

1 — To explore the concerns, questions and need of young people with them. In the process, it is hoped, young people will learn something about the Church and the Augustinians.

2 — To provide a setting in which young people can be prepared for leadership roles in their local communities.

3 — Each festival is intended to help young people who are already working with us: it aims also to encourage new young workers to join us.

A retired Monsignor, Fr. Lannen is now in his 83rd year, having spent most of his priesthood ministering in England.

While not claiming to have written anything new on the subject of celibacy, Fr. Lannen, however, feels that in the light of so much recent media coverage and criticism, now is an opportune time to take another look at celibacy and "assess its real value." "My own personal view is", says Fr. Lannen, "Mother Church could not afford to part with such a priceless and sacred gift."

An interesting read, the book is well written and easy to follow, full of personal comments and useful information on the teachings of the Church.

Grave Concern At Speed Of Traffic

Dear Editor,
I am writing to express my grave concern regarding the speed of the traffic on the by-pass road in the Coolagh area. The speed limit in this area is 40 miles per hour, but the traffic is not observing this limit.

My children cross this road a number of times every day. I used to encourage them to use the pedestrian lights, but I don't anymore. I have often seen cars drive right through. Their speed was so great that they simply couldn't stop in time when the lights went red. Or maybe they just ignored them!

Before this road was built the residents of the area held meetings with public representatives and we were assured that necessary steps would be taken to ensure safety. This has not happened. There has been a number of accidents in this area already mostly due to speed. Do we have to wait until one of our children is killed or seriously injured before something is done?

I have been living in this area for seventeen years and have seen very few speed checks on this road.

The speed limit signs are so small that anyone driving

at speed would certainly miss them!

We need the following — BIG speed limit signs; Regular speed checks; Ramps to slow traffic (or some effective device).

Let's hope I will not be writing this letter again when it is too late for one of the children in our area.

Copies of this letter will be sent to local papers, Council, Gardai, and local representatives and look forward to prompt action.

You And Your Money

Employers can often be the first to notice that one of their employees has financial problems. The age-old plea — "Any chance of a sub from next week's wages" is the tell tale sign. The financial problems can have many causes ranging from a variety of personal and family difficulties to marital breakdown or unexpected expenses. One thing for sure is that the employee will be under a stress which adversely affects his/her work performance.

A number of large corporations have Employee Assistance Programmes (E.A.P.) in order to address these issues. For the average smaller firm, it becomes the responsibility of the Personnel Manager or the local "boss". Sometimes a loan may be arranged, though more often than not this is not the best solution. Although it usually fails to address the underlying problems nor does it challenge the employee to look at his/her overall behaviour.

This is where the Money Advice and Budgeting Service can help. By working closely with the person, looking at the overall personal and financial situation and devising a practical budget plan, a long-term strategy aimed at tackling the problem can be put into place. This service is confidential and free of charge and can be an essential part of any Employment Assis-

tant Programme. When a worker's stress level is reduced, not only is the individual helped but there is also a positive knock-on effect for family members and fellow workers alike.

Local Labour polltopper, Cllr. Billy Kyne was last Monday re-elected as Vice-chairman of the South-East Regional Authority at a meeting in City Hall, Waterford.

Already Chairman of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee and the South Eastern Health Board, Cllr. Kyne is also past Chairman and long-time member of both Dungarvan UDC and Waterford County Council.

A dedicated member of S.E.R.A. since its establishment at the start of last year, Cllr. Kyne was unani-

mously re-elected Vice-Chairman on the proposal of fellow Labour Councillor Lar Hart, seconded by Independent Davy Daniels of Waterford City Corporation.

Meanwhile Chairman James Brett was also un-aminously re-elected to the chair on the proposal of Cllr. Kyne, seconded by Senator Sean Byrne.

van Leader', Cllr. Kyne said he decided to serve a second term as Vice-Chairman rather than take the Chair as he felt Mr. Brett had done an excellent job as Chairman for the past 12 months. County Receives £160,000 Renewal Grants

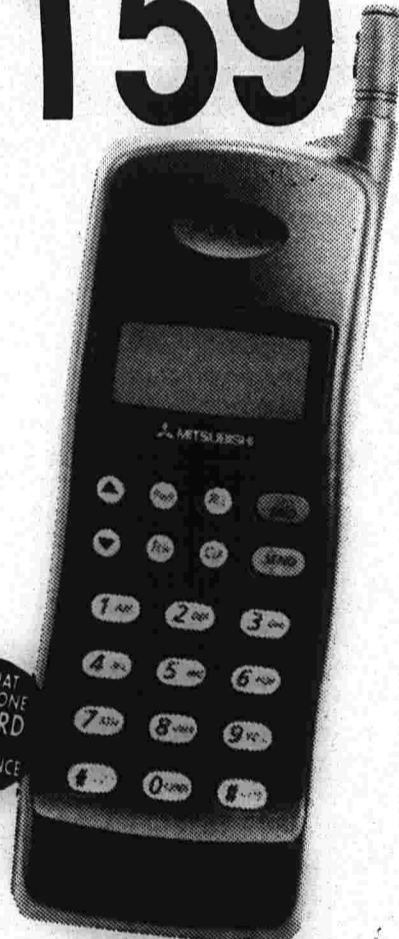

The Fuchsia : A Favourite So Easy To Grow

Mexican waves at soccer matches may have been a fad but there is nothing faddish about another Mexican import — the fuchsia.

It is now an established favourite with gardeners; it's not fussy about soil, cuttings are easy and there is a huge range of types and colour combinations.

VARIETIES

There are trailing varieties for hanging baskets, others can be over-wintered outdoors, and yet more are good for growing as bushes or standards.



Peak flowering is from now until October — time to take cuttings and note down varieties you want to grow for the future.

I add a plea here from professional gardeners — don't swell your own fuchsia collection by helping yourself to cuttings from public displays and hot-houses. It causes damage and spoils the displays for everyone else.

Instead, you will find plenty of cheap deals in shops and mail order sections on popular newspapers and magazines.

If you already have plenty of stock or have friends and relatives willing to do swaps, two-inch cuttings take quickly in a cold frame or well-aired greenhouse or conservatory

As a special and rewarding project, you could start training an established plant or a cutting to produce a standard — a long stem crowned by a heavily blooming bush — as an excellent stand alone plant for a key site or a tub:

- choose an upright variety with a single main stem
- pinch out side shoots but leave side leaves until the 'crown' forms
- train the main stem straight by tying to a cane every few inches
- keep potting on as roots fill the existing pot
- wait until the stem is a least 2.5 feet high before pinching out the growing tip to encourage side shoots and make a dense head for maximum booming.

Half-hardy fuchsias need over-wintering once frosts threaten. Cut the plant down by two-thirds and move under glass or indoors.

If you opt for the house keep them slightly moist and undisturbed at around 40°C but don't throw them out if they look dead — they should revive in spring.

MULCH

As for hardy types such as Riccartoni and Gracilis, they tend to have less spectacular blooms but can survive in most parts of the country. You can help by setting the plant deep and covering surrounding soil with an insulating mulch.

Frost can disfigure and destroy foliage but the plant should surge again in spring.

In milder parts of the country, hardy fuchsias can even be trained into a smart hedge.

CREAM OF CARROT SOUP

Ingredients
3/4 lb (350g) carrots, roughly chopped
1 onion, chopped
1 1/2 pints (900ml) chicken or vegetable stock
1 tsp garlic salt
a little freshly grated nutmeg
pepper
2 tbs tomato ketchup
4 tbs single or sour cream

Method
Place carrots, onion, stock,

garlic salt, grated nutmeg, pepper and tomato ketchup in a saucepan. Cover and simmer gently for 20 minutes. Liquidise in a blender until smooth. Reheat gently, stir in cream but do not allow soup to boil.

CASSEROLED LAMB

Ingredients
1 tbs marjoram
1 crushed clove garlic salt
freshly milled black pepper
2 1/2 lb (910g) boned weight shoulder of lamb in one piece
2 oz (50g) butter
1/4 pint light stock
8 oz (225g) button onions
6 oz (175g) courgettes, thickly sliced

Method
Sprinkle marjoram, garlic and seasoning on lamb, then roll up and tie securely with string. Melt 1 oz (25g) of butter then brown meat on all

sides. Transfer to 3-pint casserole dish. Add stock. Bake covered at 350°F, 180°C, Gas Mark 4 for 1 1/2 hours. Melt remaining butter and cook onions for 10 minutes, then add to casserole with courgettes. Bake for 30 minutes.

GRAPE & ALMOND FLAN

Ingredients
6 oz (175g) plain flour
pinch salt
3 oz (75g) margarine
2 oz (50g) castor sugar
1 small beaten egg

Filling
4 oz (110g) softened margarine
4 oz (110g) castor sugar
2 beaten eggs
3 oz ground almonds
3 oz self-raising flour
1 oz (25g) cornflour
grated rind of half small lemon
a few drops almond essence

To Decorate
3 tbs sieved apricot jam
5 fl oz carton double cream, whipped
12 halved black grapes
6-7 halved white grapes

Method

Sieve flour and salt into a basin. Rub in margarine, stir in castor sugar and mix to stiff dough with egg. Roll out and use to line 9 in. flan dish. Flute edges and chill.

To Make filling

Beat margarine and castor sugar together until pale. Gradually beat in eggs, then fold in ground almonds, flour and cornflour. Mix in lemon rind and almond essence.

Turn mixture into pastry case and spread level. Bake at 350°F, 180°C, gas mark 4 for 30 minutes. Cover with aluminium foil, then bake a further 10 minutes. Cool. Spread on apricot jam. Decorate as shown.

All serves 6.

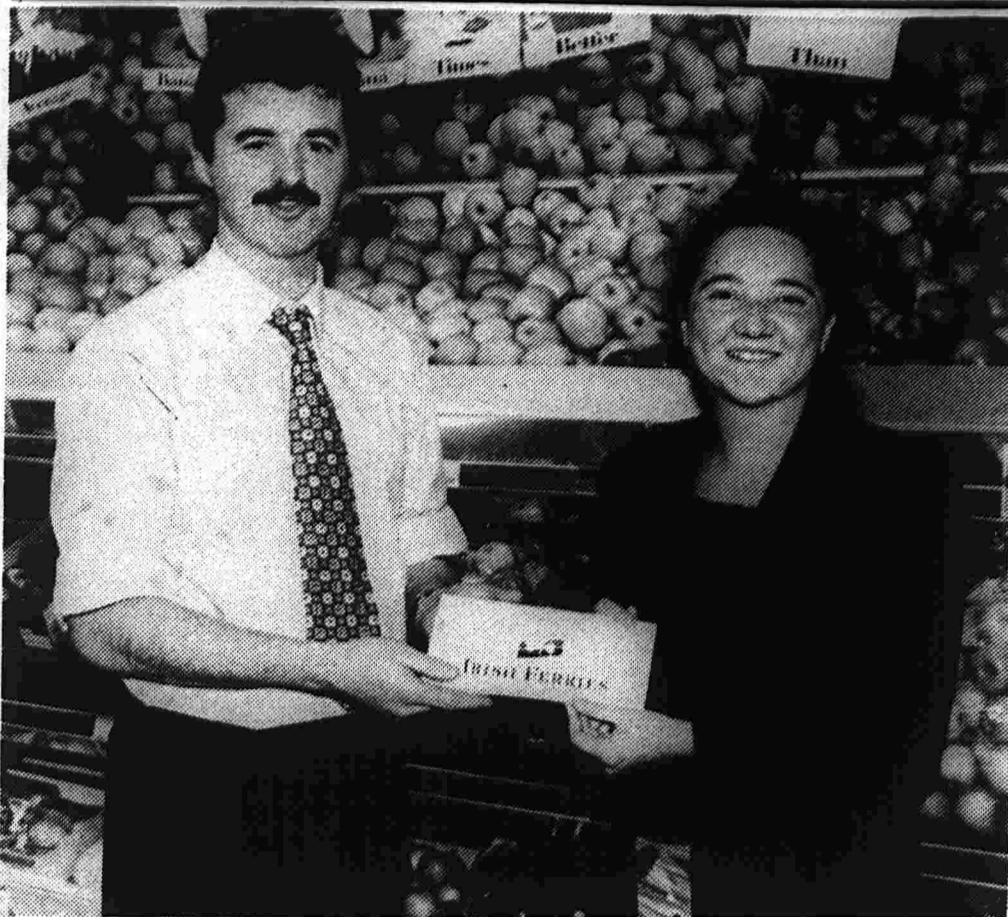

Kenneally Calls For Extension Of Salmon Season

Deputy Brendan Kenneally has called on the Minister for the Marine to extend the salmon fishing season for an extra two weeks beyond its present closing date of July 31st to the later date of August 15th.

"Speaking to a wide cross-section of fishermen in various locations, they have told me that this is the worst salmon season in over thirty years. One fisherman of forty-eight years experience has told me that in all his time, he has never seen so few fish around at this time of year.

In my visits along the Waterford coast I found nine boats who had not caught a single salmon between them in two days fishing. This is a disaster for them and they have to be given some time to make up their losses before the season closes", said Deputy Kenneally.

"Some boats have not even covered the £150 cost

of the licence yet this year", Deputy Kenneally continued "and it seems likely, on present evidence, that they may not have earned that much even by the close of the season".

"As the run of salmon is taking place later and later each year, it is imperative that the season be extended to August 15th to forestall the ruin which now faces Waterford fishermen. In comparison to the huge numbers of fish which are caught annually on the high seas by the big operators, the number involved is almost negligible.

"I would point out that there are no extra fish involved, rather giving small boats an opportunity to take their normal reasonable harvest.

I now call on the Minister to extend the fishing season to 15th August and to announce this measure as a matter of urgency".

BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

BREAKTHROUGH IN TWENTY-FIVE YEAR BATTLE

At long last a major breakthrough in the bitter 25 year battle over the location of the acute hospital facilities will release the £12.5m. for the county's health services, which were said to be on the verge of collapse. The main provision of the package is the transfer of acute surgical services from Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel to St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel.

The development of these hospital services is great news for the people of West Waterford, especially Ballinamult, Ballymacarbry and Nire Valley.

They are just ten to fifteen miles away.

Another boost is the arrival in Clonmel of a brand new £70,000 trauma ambulance which is due to come into service next month as part of the upgrading of the Health Services. Staff are at present being trained to use the ambulance. The trauma ambulance, one of five in the South Eastern Health Board area, is the latest development in the transfer of trauma patients, according to Ambulance Supervisor at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, Ballymacarbry-born Benny Walsh. It will be used to

transfer badly injured patients from local hospitals to specialised units in Waterford, Cork or Dublin. It is just an extension of the casualty unit, Mr. Walsh said, and will be used in cases which previously required a helicopter. A specialist team including an anaesthetist, nurses and a specially trained ambulance crew will travel in the new ambulance with badly injured patients. It contains all the necessary monitors and a special stretcher operated by hydraulics which can be tilted any way the anaesthetist requires.

MASS AT ANCIENT CHURCH

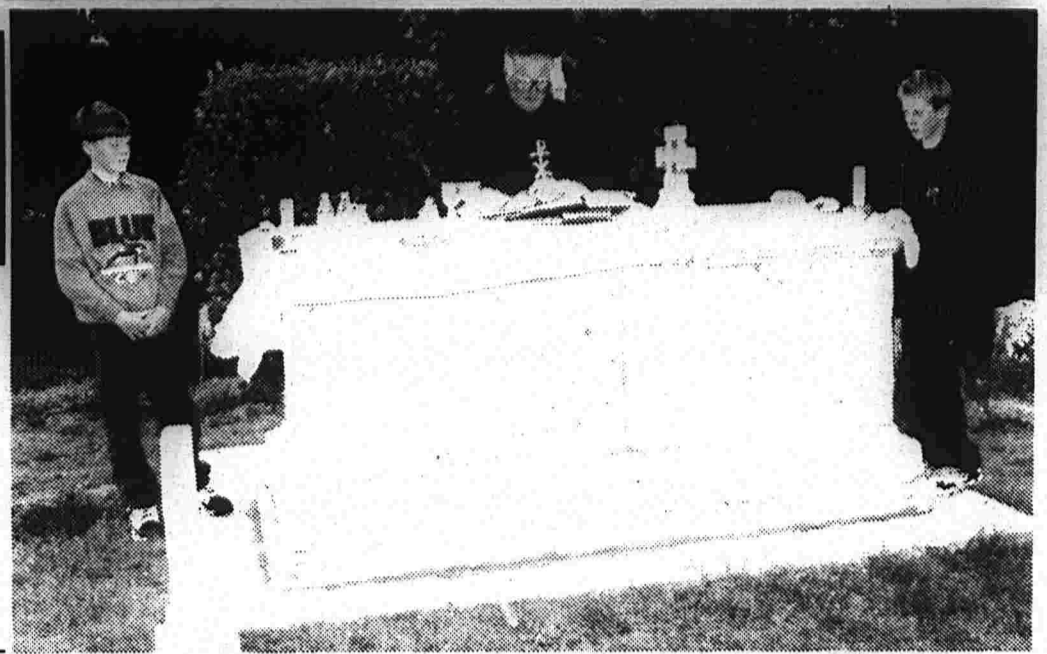

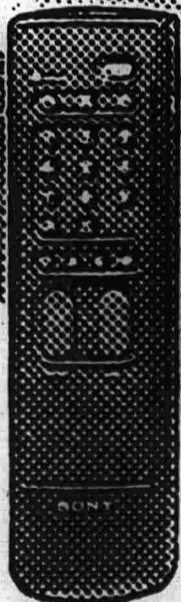

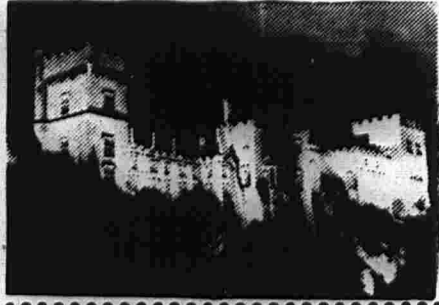

Lismore Musical Director Receives WLR/Waterford Crystal Award

The second WLR FM Waterford Crystal Arts and Entertainment Award was presented on Wednesday, July 19 to Jan Van Putten, instigator and musical director of the annual Festival of Early Music, held in Lismore.

Presenting Mr. Van Putten with the hand sculpted crystal trophy, John Foley, Director of Sales and Marketing, Waterford Crystal, commented on the vision and perseverance shown by Jan in initiating the festival which is now firmly established in Irish musical life.

Born in Holland, Mr. Van Putten's musical career began at the age of six, when he first learned to play the harmonium. By the time he was sixteen he was playing church organs and had developed an interest in conducting.

Annual attendance at the festival of early music in his home town of Utrecht sparked an interest in music of an earlier era which led him, many years later, to the Lismore Hotel where the first 'early music' meeting was held. Since then musicians and singers of interna-

tional renown have participated in the festival and the streets of Lismore have come to life with pageants, morris dancers, town criers, prisoners in stocks and general 'craic'. This year saw the arrival of a special Celtic box organ, commissioned from Lammermuir Pipe Organs in Scotland, the only one of its kind in Ireland.

Before dedicating himself full-time to music, Jan Van Putten was Dean of the Faculty of Political Science in the University of Amsterdam. His move to Ireland in 1990 was the result of his meeting with Irish journalist Maureen Fox, now his wife, at a political conference in Moscow. The couple have since set up home in a thatched cottage in the Lismore area where they produce a variety of organic vegetables which are sold

locally. Along with the ongoing work he does for the festival, Jan is currently both organist and choir master at St. Carthage's Cathedral and two years ago established the Blackwater Singers.

This year's festival from June 16-18 inclusive, was the third consecutive West Waterford Festival of Early Music — a festival that has, in a short space of time, firmly established itself as a 'happening' event in the Irish music calendar.

Sponsored by Bank of Ireland, Guinness and Waterford Crystal the festival this year received a much needed grant from the Arts Council.

The local community and West Waterford area in general also contributed greatly to the financial viability of the festival. Thousands of pounds were raised by locals and many families of-

fered accommodation to visiting musicians who travelled to Lismore from England, the Netherlands and other areas of Ireland.

Indoor concerts were held in Lismore Castle, Lismore Cathedral and the Courthouse Theatre and thousands of people took to the streets for the variety of entertainment on offer there.

The WLR FM/Waterford Crystal Arts and Entertainment Award was launched in November of last year and is presented quarterly to the group or individual considered by the panel of adjudicators to have made the most significant contribution to the world of arts and entertainment in the region. Trade Union Concern At Health Services

At the annual conference of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions, held in Tralee recently, the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers Union adopted a motion regarding the country's health services.

The motion was moved by Sean Kelly, District Officer, Clonmel and states; "this conference condemns the continuing deterioration of the National Health Service brought about by hospital closures, reduction of bed numbers and the non replacement of staff with a general depreciation of the quality of the service delivered".

"The Health Services are now driven by monetarist considerations which are detrimental to the interest of patient care and service".

The motion continues, "conference instructs the Executive Council to develop a campaign to reconstruct and restore health service to an ethos of patient care and equality of access and to ensure that sufficient state resources are made available to meet this objection".

During the past ten years under various administrations, Ireland has seen over 20 hospital closures, thousands of beds taken out of the service and not replaced; thousands of jobs lost and the quality of service and access reduced. The resultant hospital strikes have been about conditions, over-

work, over crowding, bed shortages and denial access.

The ATGWU's resolution is designed to reverse this trend.

Cllr. Fahey On Maintenance Of Dunabbey House

A member of the South Eastern Health Board, Waterford Co. Councillor Jackie Fahey has repeatedly raised the question of maintenance of Dunabbey House, Dungarvan. As a result of these representations, Cllr. Fahey has received the following reply from M. Lynch, Programme Manager Special Hospitals.

"I refer to your recent enquiry regarding the above (Dunabbey House) and wish to advise you that upgrading work has been carried out on Dunabbey House Welfare Home, Dungarvan, which included the installation of new PVC windows, a new main door and door into the courtyard. The painting work required on the building is being done on a phased basis".

Sport Minister Opens Historic Declans Way

St. Declans Way, a 94 kilometre route that links the rock of Cashel with the Round Tower in Ardmore was officially opened last Sunday week by the Minister for Sport, Bernard Allen.

The famous walk was once traversed by the patron saint of Ardmore, St. Declan, on his way to meet St. Patrick in Cashel during the 5th century. Fifteen centuries later, the route was again traversed, this time by eleven members of the Ardmore 34th CBSI unit. The group, under leader James Moloney, completed the walk from Cashel to Ardmore starting last Thursday and arriving at the Round Tower on Saturday night.

£55,000

DEVELOPMENT

Planning for development of the walk began six years ago by the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op. with much of the research completed by the late Canon Power.

Funded by the EC, the complete development cost £55,000 and could only have been brought to fruition through the co-operation of the IFA and the many landowners situated along its route.

Declaring St. Declans Way officially open, Minister Allen unveiled a specially inscribed plaque to mark the occasion. The Minister said the event re-organised "local initiative, enterprise and courage" and he paid tribute to the major achievements of Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op.

The development of the walk, he said, would prove a major tourism boost to the area and he hoped to undertake "at least some part" of the scenic route in the future.

As part of the unveiling

ceremonies, Minister Allen formally launched a new map detailing St. Declan's Way and later attended an impressive photographic exhibition at St. Declan's Hall.

TOURISM BENEFITS

Next to address the large crowd gathered around the sun-drenched Round Tower was Chairman of Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op Richard Lincoln.

The Co-Op Chairman said the development of St. Declan's Way had been preceded by the opening of the local Cliff Walk in 1990, which had already proved to be a major, popular tourist attraction.

The completion of the walk, he said had largely depended on the co-operation and support of many groups such as South Tipperary and Waterford Co. Councils who took on board the important matter of public liability insurance.

Mr. Lincoln also thanked Cospoir and the Department of Education, Board Failte and the South East Regional Tourism Organisation, FAS and all the FAS workers, the IFA and the landowners and finally the EC who had provided the badly needed funding for the project.

"St. Declan's Way is a tourism product, Ardmore is hoping to build significantly on," said Mr. Lincoln. "It was a very difficult undertaking but in the end was made possible through the marvellous co-operation

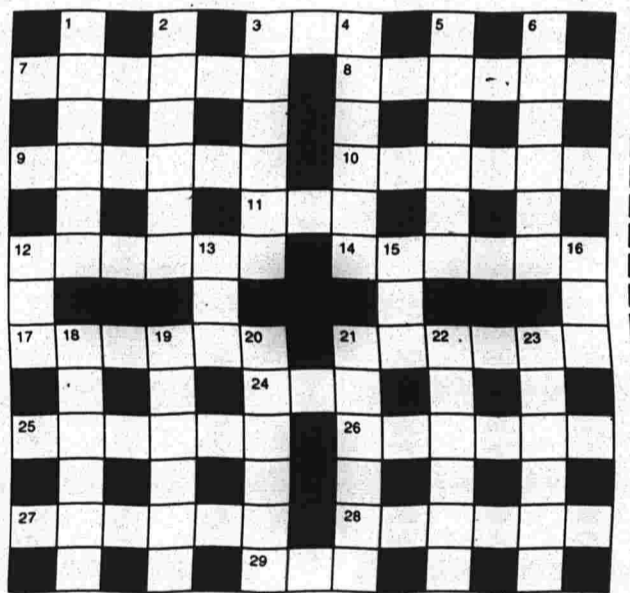

Teagasc Says

THE SUCKLER HERD

DOSING

With fresh aftergrass becoming available, dose calves for worms before moving to graze these pastures. The common anthelmintics are adequate at this stage - there is no need to use very expensive doses.

SUCKLER CALVES

Where the suckling herd is being moved to fresh pasture, it is also an opportune time to dose the suckled calves at this stage, the spring-born sucklers are increasing their grass intake rapidly and are therefore likely to pick up more worm infestation, although not as much as bucket-reared calves because the calf stocking calves rate is not as high. However, with intensive suckling, the worm burden in suckled calves can become significant at this stage. Hoose can develop, so watch out for coughing and treat if necessary.

CALF GROWTH

Spring born suckled calves should be at peak growth rate at present, provided they are kept on good quality pastures. The cows' milk supply is still good and the calf is able to utilise increasing quantities of grass. The target growth rate is 1.2 kg. per day for bulls and 1.1 kg. for heifers.

PASTURE MANAGEMENT

From August onwards, the suckler cow will give less milk and grass becomes increasingly more important to the diet of the calf. Therefore, it is a good practice to provide a creep grazing for the calves.

COMPACT CALVING

Compact calving in the suckler herd improves profitability and facilitates management by producing a group of calves at approximately the same age and weight. For the farmer selling weanlings, in particular, the late born calves

make a lower price.

Many suckler cows do not calve within a yearly interval. A slippage of 2 months in calving date will result on a loss of over 1 cwt. in weaning weight. Efforts should be made to get late spring calvers back in calf as soon as possible. Strategies that could be used are: (1) Removal of the calf, (2) Introduction of heat using progestagens.

REMOVAL OF THE CALF

Teagasc research shows that by removing the calf from the cow at 30 days of age and allowing it to suckle twice a day caused cows to come in heat about 2 weeks earlier than where the calves were running with the cows continuously.

This method should suit the smaller suckler herds that are using A.I. Good fencing is required to keep the stock separated and here a double strand mains electric fence is very useful.

Cows and calves can be driven into a yard or small paddock to suckle. After the first day or two, animals become used to the routine. When the cow is settled in calf, they can be let suckle ad lib again.

PROGESTAGENS

There is a choice of drugs for synchronising heat in cows. Progestagens and Prostaglandins are the two commonly used. However, for suckler cows that are not coming in heat the only effective treatment is Progestagens combined with P.M.S. injection.

The Teagasc research team recommended the use of P.R.I.D. removal.

COW CONDITION

The above treatments are useless in the absence of good management of adequate body condition. Indeed, with grass quality falling from now on, body condition needs attention on the more milky types of cows especially.

IFA Call On Minister Yates To Take Action To Halt Cattle Price Slide

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman, Richard Booth, this week called on the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates to take firm action to halt the slide in cattle prices.

Commenting on this, Waterford Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, urged Minister Yates to waste no time in taking advantage of the recent move by the EU Commission to increase export refunds to Turkey. "If a Ministerial visit is necessary to remove any lingering concerns among the Turkish

authorities over BSE, then Mr. Yates should take the initiative and travel to Turkey immediately. Any delay in opening up what could be a major outlet for Irish beef and cattle, will only hand over the Turkish market to our European competitors."

Mr. Donovan pointed out that the Turkish market demand for Irish beef and cattle could be in the order of 20,000 tonnes a year. This would be equivalent to 60,000 head of cattle.

The Waterford IFA Livestock leader said that the present difficult market situation highlighted the need to maintain a strongly competitive live trade for Irish cattle. "It is essential that Minister Yates ensures no artificial or bureaucratic barriers are imposed on this trade."

Finally, Mr. Donovan stressed that the current market difficulties for Irish cattle underline the need for a proactive approach by Minister Yates and his Department in continuing to seek out and consolidate new market outlets for the Irish livestock and beef industry.

County Waterford ICMSA News

The County Waterford ICMSA held an executive meeting recently in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan.

The main issues discussed included the proposed meeting with Waterford County Council (see report of this below), milk restructuring scheme, interest rates, T.B. and the need for proper compensation, finalising the family farm award and occupiers liability.

On the issue of T.B. the executive felt that farmers were the only losers even though they subscribed millions of pounds in levies each year to the scheme. Everyone seems to get paid along the line, but farmers with reactors are the big losers as the compensation they receive is totally inadequate said John Skehan, County Chairman. Whatever changes are to be made to the scheme, he said, farmers will have to get either the market value for their reactor animal or replacement value.

The executive felt that the gap between the bank rates for borrowing and depositing money should be closer and they called on the lending institutions to look again at this issue.

Final arrangements are being put together for the ICMSA Environmental, Conservation and Safety Award in the County. Mr. Tom Hickey said that without the help of Teagasc and the sponsors it would be impossible to run.

He said he would like to thank the sponsors who are Roadstone, Waterford Foods, A.I.B., A.C.C. Norris Brothers, Ulster Bank, Dawn Meats, East Cork Oil

and Jim Quinn.

The winner of the Award will be announced at the Dungarvan Show on Thursday, July 27 next.

A County Waterford ICMSA deputation led by the County Chairman John Skehan and including County Secretary Anne Kirwan, Tom Cronin, Jim Prendergast and John Quigley, Area Officer, met with Waterford County Council recently.

The County Council's team included Oliver Coffey, County Chairman, Donal Connolly, County Manager, Tom Lineen, Engineer and Martin Walsh, Staff Officer.

The main items discussed included hedge cutting, rural roads, itinerants and pollution.

Mr. John Skehan, County Chairman, said that farmers would help in hedge cutting provided their expenses could be claimed fully as a tax credit.

The Council told the ICMSA group of community involvement whereby work carried out on roads would be funded 15% by the community. The funding from the Department seems to be the main problem for lack of work on rural roads.

On the pollution issue, while farmers have done tremendous work at enormous expense, the ICMSA proposed that where a farmer has an accidental spillage and if he reports same to the Council immediately in order that they can work on the problem, that he (the farmers) would not be prosecuted. This, of course, would only apply in genuine cases. The Council noted the ICMSA proposal.

IFA Push To Have Conacre Included In Eligible Land Exchange Process

Speaking after a meeting with the Department of Agriculture recently, IFA Deputy President, Michael Slattery said that the IFA delegation sought to have conacre included in the Eligible Land Exchange Process, which is expected to come into operation in the Autumn.

Commenting on the meeting Waterford Grain Chairman, Alex Heskin, stressed that it was essential that conacre land was included as most specialised grain growers were dependent on conacre. The Grain Chairman said that conacre could be accommodated in the exchange process by allowing the temporary exchange of the eligibility status of land within producer holdings, with the land reverting back to its original status at the end of the conacre and/or lease period.

Mr. Heskin pointed out that this would help to reduce conacre prices as it would free up more land for grain production.

However, Mr. Heskin warned that with the eligibility exchange process, IFA would be insisting that grain growers would have in-built protection at all times. "This may involve limiting the scope of exchanging eligible land if Ireland comes close or within a certain defined limit of the NBA of 345,000 ha," he said.

Concluding, Mr. Heskin said the Eligible Land Exchange Process was only an interim solution to grain growers' concerns on eligible land and their fight for

individual protection, pointing out that the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates must quickly deliver a greater and more encompassing package for grain growers.

IFA Wants Farm Council Action On Slashed Dairy Refunds

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Gerard Curran has welcomed Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates' commitment to address the issue of dairy export refund cuts at the next Farm Council Meeting in Brussels. The IFA man called for a reversal of the unjustified cuts implemented since last January.

Mr. Curran said: "The refund cuts implemented since January go far beyond the Commission's market management powers and must be urgently reversed by the Council of Agriculture Ministers."

Taking account of the latest cuts implemented ten days ago, export refunds have, in Irish Pound terms, been cut by over 15% for butter, 6.5% for skimmed milk powder, 16% for whole milk powder and 5.5% for Cheddar cheese, since the begin-

ning of 1995.

"These cuts are not justified by market conditions, GATT obligations or budgetary concerns. Irish dairy farmers find them totally unacceptable and view them as an abuse of the Commission's market management power" he said.

"With dairy markets currently balanced, cutting export refunds to curb

over-subscribed pre-fixations is bad management, when the Commission has plenty of scope to take other, less disruptive administrative routes to solve the problem. Such a route would be to apply across-the-board reductions to the volumes of product to which export refund pre-fixations apply," he explained.

It isn't easy to come to terms with the unexpected departure from this life of Johnny Buckley R.I.P., of Ballynoe following a traffic accident. Little over a fortnight ago I met him last and he was the same jolly, pleasant Johnny I had always enjoyed meeting and in the best of form. Our conversation was in Irish, as it usually was, and our topics covered local affairs, of course, hurling in Tallow, Cork's unexpected departure from the Munster championship, Waterford's trouncing by Tipperary, our county's future prospects.

A Ballynoe man and proud of it Johnny was a most respected member of his community to which he contributed handsomely over many years. No holy Joe was he although a staunch Catholic and loyal member of the Pioneer Association. He was a foremost figure in parish organisations and was a friend to anyone who needed a shoulder to lean on.

Johnny had a great affinity with Tallow and paid at least one visit to us every week. He hurled with Tallow and was a contemporary of Harry Ronayne and the hurlers of the 30's and 40's. He retained those links with and interest in Tallow to his dying day.

For many years subsequently he adorned the St. Catherine's hurling teams and by his skilful speedy hurling and driving enthusiasm he inspired his team mates and set high standards for others. When his playing days were over he continued to give his time and energy to the game he loved and he helped to map the pathway to success which culminated in St. Catherine's winning the Cork intermediate hurling championship, in 1994, his dream come true.

Johnny was a gifted man with the pen and for many years he was a regular contributor to the Dungarvan Leader. He was careful to ensure that no written word of his caused offence or hurt such were the innate decency and high ethical standards of the man. A very literary chap he was well-read and a student all his life, every willing to broaden his experience and to enrich his acquisitive fertile mind.

Unassuming and gentle by nature he hid his talent under a bushel, it might be claimed in the quick sequestered environs of Baile Nua. No matter. He was a happy man, content in himself, in his wife Christina and family to whom he was devoted. They, most of all, will miss him. So will all of

us who were privileged to know him and to call him a friend. No kinder friend could one have than the gentle smiling Johnny who radiated goodness and wholesomeness and who touched all our lives. Intimidation, abuse, the liberal use of the fist and the boot, pushing, jersey-pulling, frontal charging, pulling and dragging were commonplace.

Mick O'Dwyer in the commentary tried to sanitise this trappiness by describing it as "over-physical" and he expressed the hope that the referee would "stamp his authority on the game" something the whistle-holder failed to do at any stage. He didn't book even the most blatant misdemeanors and the bold Mick told us that the referee "has been forced to speak again to that player, his second time speaking to him".

Ah, yes, it was a good hard physical game and sure nobody was killed or hospi-

talised. In the replayed Munster minor football semi final last week there was one lapse in self control by a Waterford player when he retaliated after provocation. He was sent off.

It cost Waterford the match and a possible Munster title which Tipperary won last Sunday. The senior game was littered with personal fouls from start to finish with fist and boot, but the culprits got away with it, all of them.

Interesting to note once again that the team who won the toss, Kerry, handed the wind advantage to Cork and fondly expected the wind to win the game for them in the second half. They lost. Mick O'Dwyer told us some 10 minutes from the end that "Kerry need a goal". Well they didn't. What they badly needed was points. I counted five chances of a point which were scored by the Kingdom attack in their frantic pursuit of the goal which never came. That, if anything, was their undoing because a team hell-bent on getting a goal weakens in its resolve every time their

attack is repulsed. There is a consequent increase of spirit in the opposition backs which makes them almost hope that the ball comes in again so that they can display their power. We could see this in the last 10

In May 1993, Cardinal Daly and Dr. Robin Eames were present at the reception in T.C.D. when a collection of essays titled "Reconciliation" was introduced, containing contributions by major international figures in the ecumenical movement; a kestschrift celebrating Fr. Michael's 70th birthday.

In April 1994, Judge Catherine McGuinness and Dr. Garrett Fitzgerald spoke at the launching of a symposium entitled "Reconciliation in Religion and Society", in the New Common Room at T.C.D. The editor was Fr. M. Hurley.

The first annual Michael Hurley Lecture was inaugurated last year in Belfast. The second one is due to take place in September.

THE PASSING OF TOLLY BAGGE

All too soon for his dear wife Mary, his sister Molly Veale (Monareta), his brothers Paddy and Richie (England) his nieces and nephews and all his friends and neighbours throughout this community, the Great Shepherd has called home one of the kindest and gentlest members of his flock - Tolly Bagge, Ballyheeny, Clashmore.

A great shadow of sadness was cast over the entire West Waterford area as news of Tolly's death filtered through from Waterford Regional Hospital on Wednesday, July 5th. Tolly had been in a coma at the hospital following an accident at his home on the previous week.

Throughout the days following his death some very fine and fitting tributes were paid to Tolly amid the tears and sorrow. Some great memories were recalled of a true Clashmore man who was indeed a legend on his own time.

Like all of his generation Tolly Bagge was a self educated man. From an early age he showed a great flair for business. He began his career right after he left school at Kenures, Clashmore, which was a renowned general store in West Waterford area at that time. It was there he learned all the tricks of the trade which set him on the road to business life.

Those who had the great honour of working with Tolly can well remember him as a gentleman with a great sense of honour who believed in an honest day's work for an honest day's pay but most of all a great friend.

The second major advancement in Tolly's career was when he took to the high ways and by ways of the local countryside with a pony and open car bringing with him a wide range of products and returning to the village each evening with stocks of eggs, poultry, etc. purchased from the farming community throughout the country and in the fishing season the catch of the fishermen at the different quays.

The advancement to a motor van began a whole new era for Tolly and brought prosperity to all. Tolly now made a weekly visit to Youghal each Saturday bringing back fresh meat, weekly editions of gazettes, books and cakes, items which were a great novelty to the people of the age and the surrounding areas. All would queue outside Kenure's shop waiting for his return.

The highlight of each year

was "Grand National Day". From early morning Kenures was like a booking office with everyone giving him their bets. Tolly would then make that sacred pilgrimage to Youghal, taking with him the hopes and dreams of so many, all hoping their little flutter would be a winner. What a great occasion it used to be!

For most of the West Waterford country people Tolly's weekly or daily visit was a life line to happenings throughout the parish or the village. He helped keep family and friends in touch. To everyone Tolly was a solid and confidential friend whom they could relay their troubles and problems to and be sure of some sound advice in return and nobody would ever hear it from him.

When he took time off Tolly could be found trekking around the countryside with his dog and gun or quietly sitting on the banks of a river, rod fishing - both great sports were very dear to his heart. Or indeed a game of cards - whist being his favourite. Ill health changed his life completely some years ago. As the arthritis progressed Tolly could no longer work as he used to and to partake in his favourite sports became impossible. He resigned himself to retirement without complaint and with the loving and tender care of his wife Mary, he could still drive and get out and about and he made the best out of life. We can see from the fantastic matchstick model of "Clashmore Church" on display in his home made by Tolly in recent years, yet another of his many hidden talents.

A great Clashmore man, a gentleman and friend that is how Tolly Bagge will be remembered.

His removal took place from Egans Funeral Home, Youghal to Clashmore Church on Friday evening and following requiem Mass on Saturday morning celebrated by Very Rev. Maurice O'Gorman P.P. assisted by Fr. Michael O'Brien and Fr. Gerard O'Connor, Tolly was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.

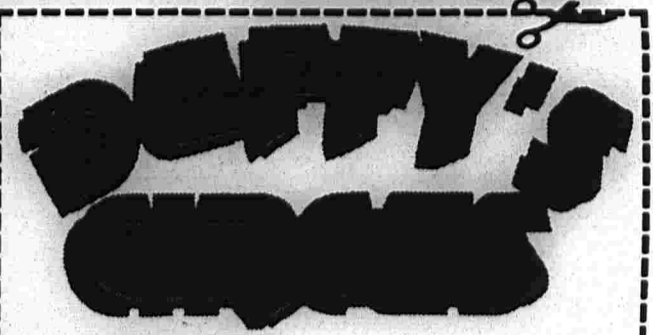

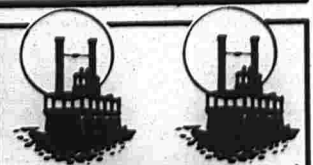

Then they proceed to Kilkenny where they will have lunch at Kytlers Inn, owned by Dungarvan man John Flynn. Then it's the long slog to Kilkullen for a short break and a cup of tea. The last section of the cycle will be from Kilkullen to Dublin. The cyclists will have a Garda escort from the outskirts of Dublin to the finish at the Clifden Court Hotel off O'Connell Bridge, where as usual, a large crowd of supporters assemble for the finish at approx. 7.30 p.m. The bus leaves the Clifden Court Hotel at 6 p.m. on Sunday after the football finals.

The back up team as usual will be Frank Murphy and his son Johnny, the chief mechanic for the day will be Pat Barry. These 3 men play a very important role in the success of the cycle, as they travel up and down the line of cyclists doing running repairs to the bicycles if the need arises. They also supply refreshments if the cyclists want any. The two men with the task of the smooth running of the cycle this year will be John O'Brien and Eamonn Martin. These two men have vast experience with the sponsored cycle, as they have cycled it 7 times between them. CLLR. BILLY KYNE SLAMS BALLINACOURTY WATER CUT-OFF

A recent reduction in water pressure in the Ballinacourty area was stingingly criticised by Abbeyside Councillor Billy Kyne at the recent Waterford Co. Council meeting.

Cllr. Kyne claimed that from 6.30 p.m. on July 4th last to 9 a.m. the following morning, water had been cut off in Ballinacourty without any prior warning to customers.

Assistant County Engineer, Tom Lineen said the incident had occurred at a time when demand for water was at a mini-

mum. "We had a request to fill a swimming pool", he added, "...there were no great shortages".

Stating that the whole episode was "badly handled" and shouldn't happen again, Cllr. Kyne said awareness of the pending water cut-off should have been created through the local radio or loud speakers.

In reply, County Manager Donal Connolly accepted that prior notice should have been given.

Villierstown Famine Lecture

The Rev. Philip Homan Memorial Lecture on "The Famine in the Blackwater Valley" was delivered by Monsignor Michael Olden at Villierstown Church on Friday July 21st. The lecturer illuminated the complexities of the Famine, its mechanics, its timetable and the unremitting human tragedy which lies behind all such events.

The Monsignor described how such events are forever catching societies and groups of people unawares, often-times when things look in fact promising. The potato was too successful, too nutritional, for its own sake and for the hundreds of thousand of "extra" people who existed, subsisted on its fertility. If anything happened to the "spud", many people were at risk. This was the Catch 22 situation Ireland was in, in the 1840's.

The Monsignor then explained the arrival of "the fungus" and how within weeks the stench of rotting potatoes pervaded localities, especially in the South East.

The impact was immediate and frightening. He explained how all the machinery of government, administration, and Grand Juries, how all the different religious groups was galvanised into action, to help the suffering people. This machinery and these groups could not have been as effective in the 1740's, yet they did not perform perfectly in the 1840's. A lot was left to be desired by the government, administrators, landlords and the wealthier middle classes, but they did do something to help. Many took cruel advantage of the suffering poor — human nature surprises or disappoints.

The Monsignor went on to point out the impact of the Famine on all the local communities from Tallow to Ballyduff, Lismore, Cappoquin and Dungarvan in particular. The effects were uneven, reflecting greater poverty in certain areas. He finally went on to warn us of being too quick in our judgements of such important and shattering events. He said a lot needs to be forgiven, but possibly less

than we think. People with axes to grind often use the Famine as a source. The Famine at this later stage, 150 years after the event should be viewed with great concern and in a balanced manner, too often it has been viewed from a jaundiced eye without regard for truth.

After the lecture the audience were invited to view a plaque which has been set in the floor of Villierstown Church over the remains of Rev. Philip Homan, buried there after he died in 1847 from famine fever contracted while administering to the suffering of all denominations in the locality. Sponsors of this plaque were thanked namely East Cork Oil, Bob Moynihan, Kereen Bar; Richie Power Videos; Paul Flynn, Hardware; Paddy Corkery, Agricultural Machinery Engineer, Aglish; Somerby Ltd., Cappagh.

Monsignor Olden was asked to nominate a charity helping to alleviate World Hunger, and a collection of over £180 was taken up for Goal.

That was until Constantino Rocca arrived at the 18th green, committed the mortal offence, flapping his simple chip into the Valley of Sin and immediately getting absolution by taking the outrageous twenty yard putt to force a play off.

It is now history that Daly moved into another gear to claim his second major championship.

"Is he" the leading pretender to Palmer's throne, I await and wonder.

And just to prove that this is not for financial reasons, the Leinster officials have decided that all Under 16's will be admitted free to the new stand, with the same offer for senior citizens in the Nally stand. Also there are free group passes for clubs, wishing to bring underage players to the game. These were available from County Boards or from the Council offices. They are certainly setting a lead for others to follow and

hopefully it will be noted in other places. There has been a big demand for tickets from football patrons in this county.

Senior 'B' Football All Ireland

COUNTY FINALS

Last year there were rumblings of dissatisfaction when both the senior county finals were played in Walsh Park - because earlier in the year a half a million pound development programme had been completed at Fraher field. There were letters in the papers, if I recall correctly. But bye-laws are rules made to decide such matters and in the circumstances there was nothing to be done to change things.

The question has recently been asked, if the Board will arrange to have the two county finals played in Fraher field this time round.

According to the official rotation arrangement, the senior hurling final is due to be played at an eastern venue this year - which means Walsh Park. It was played there in 1993 and it was played there in 1994, because two eastern teams (Mount Sion and Passage) were engaged. The teams are given the option under bye-law and are right to avail of the arrangement if it suits them. This year unless two western teams are involved, it will be played again there. If say, St. Saviours and Gaultier (or Rathgormack) are the finalists, the battle for the Conway Cup will be fought out at the new Walsh Park, which is likely to be officially opened by then.

G.A.A. NOTES

S.F. CHAMPIONSHIP

Where They All Stand

With 45 games played and only 3 remaining to complete the league section, the following is the position of all 16 teams who started out in the hope of taking the Conway Cup or 1995.

RATHGORMACK

They won six of their seven matches and are through to the semi-finals. Their amazing second half collapse against Stradbally cost them a 100% record.

STRADBALLY

They have 8 points and have qualified. They have one outstanding game. If they beat Gaultier in this they will go to the semi-final and if they lose they will play in a quarter-final match.

GAULTIER

On the points table they are level with Stradbally and should they win they will be placed second and will be in the semi-finals.

KILROSSANTY

They have 7 points and their chances of remaining in the hunt will depend on how they fare against the champions, the Nire, on Saturday evening. If they lose, they are out; if they draw, they will qualify for the quarter-finals.

An extraordinary situation will develop if Kilrossanty win and Gaultier and Stradbally play a draw in the Saturday final double header, as then all three would be on 9 points. I don't know if the GAC will sort out that kind of problem by using scoring averages or scoring differences (which is different) or whether they would hold a play-off. We must wait and see.

THE NIRE

They are still hanging in there desperately with a chance of survival. They have 5 points and one game left to play. If they lose they are gone out. A draw won't do either but if they win, they will qualify for a play-off with Kilrossanty. All the complications don't end there, however, as if they are beaten on Saturday, they will be relegated to Div. 2 with Kilmacthomas. Interestingly, if they play a draw on Saturday they will be involved in a play-off with Dungarvan and Tramore to decide which team goes to the second division.

DUNGARVAN

With just six points, they are gone out of the reckoning and will be hoping to avoid relegation.

TRAMORE

Losing to the Nire at Kilmacthomas on Saturday they blew their last chance of staying in the race for the title. Like Dungarvan, they could be in line for a relegation contest.

KILMACTHOMAS

They have no points, but fair play to them, they kept fighting all the way to the finish. They will be in Division 2 in 1996.

DIVISION 2

Thankfully, there are not nearly as many problems.

ST. SAVIOURS

The Ballybeg team have 12 points from 7 matches and have qualified for the quarter finals. Also they are promoted to Div. 1 for 1996. Their opponents in the quarter finals won't be known until next Saturday.

BALLINACOURTY

They are on 10 points and may or may not qualify. An unexpected setback against Butlerstown on Saturday at Leamybrien denied them a certain place in the quarter finals. They must now await the outcome of the Sliabh gCua v. Bonmahon game which is scheduled for August 6.

SLIABH gCUA

Also on 6 points and are in with a chance of ending with 8 points if they beat Sliabh gCua. For the 1994 intermediate county champions this was a very good show. Like Affane, they are now gone from the scene as far as winning or qualifying is concerned.

BUTLERSTOWN

Victories over Ballinacourty and Newtown brought them back from the dead and saved them from relegation. They have 4 points with all their games played.

NEWTOWN

They were rarely at full strength for their matches and the loss of Peter Queally after the Waterford v. Tipperary incident was a death blow to their prospects. Newtown drew with Dunhill and finished with a single point. They will be relegated and back at intermediate level next year.

THE FINISH

At the moment the question of who will be the first to walk up the steps of fArdán Na nDéise to receive the Conway Cup will shortly become the object of speculation, but more important is the question of when the cup will be presented.

All the year the GAC have been working to a tight schedule and have enjoyed great success in attempting to keep the programme firmly on course. The complications, as outlined above, will create (maybe) some problems, but the committee are still satisfied that the senior championships will finish on schedule — or before Sunday, October 8, which is the commencement date for the start of the league.

UDC Has Power To Introduce Local Taxi Service

effect from September 1st next, the powers and functions assigned to the UDC, will include: the power to introduce full taxi services through creation of taximeter areas; responsibility for determining the fare structure for taxi operators; and the power to decide on the number of taxis to be licensed in a taximeter area as well as a new power to grant licenses for wheelchair accessible taxis.

These functions were originally carried out by the Environment Minister or by the Garda Commissioner. The annual license fee for a taxi which is estimated at £100 would create another source of revenue for the Council. The current license fee for a hackney is set at £3000.

The new regulations result from a comprehensive review of the licensing system which began in 1991. In announcing the changes Minister Howlin said, "we will now have a framework which will give local authorities the maximum discretion to decide how to cater for the transport needs of their areas". Referring to the conflict between taxis and hackneys the Minister said there would be no changes to the rules governing the use of radio or telephone equipment to facilitate hires in taximeter areas. Between now and September 1st, any holder of a hackney license wishing to renew a license should continue to apply to the local Garda PSV office.

TOUGH DECISION

Should the Council decide to introduce a taxi service, the allocation of licenses

will be on the basis of a points system which will give priority to holders of existing local hackney licenses. Describing the new regulations as an "extremely significant development," Cllr. Austin Deasy told last Monday's UDC meeting that the Council will have to make a tough decision and move with the times. While present hackney license owners should get first preference, a taxi service, he felt, would create more mobility and freedom to customers.

ILL CONCEIVED

Slamming the new regulations as "ill conceived," Cllr. Damien Dillon said the scheme was devised for an urban situation rather than a semi urban/rural area such as Dungarvan. "I don't like it," he added.

Likewise, Cllr. Tony Wright said the introduction of a taxi service would seriously affect the livelihood of existing hackney license holders. Cllr. Austin Flynn urged the Council to consult with local hackney operators and urged that they get the "first shot" should the Council decide on a taxi service.

Responding to the members concerns, County Manager, Donal Connolly said he will have to get a definite list of official hackneys servicing the area and consult with them regarding the new regulations.

Depending on local demand Mr. Connolly said there may be no need to introduce a new taxi service, and he expected to report back to the Council with more information at the September meeting.

Abbeyside/Boreenatra Beach Clean-up Needed

Cllr. Power, UDC Chairperson Cllr. Nuala Ryan said locals can't use the beach at the moment, while Cllr. Billy Kyne urged the Council to do a little bit of clean up work regularly as part of a 3 or 5 year programme.

County Manager, Donal Connolly said he would certainly look at the situation and see whether the Council has the resources to clean beaches on a regular basis.

MAN MADE BEACH?

While on the subject of beaches, Cllr. Wright spoke of the ugly view at Western Bay when the tide is out, and asked that the concept of a man made beach be explored by Council officials, i.e. the development of a

beach through the gradual importation of sand. Referring to the Youghal road seafront, Cllr. Wright said it was an ideal setting for a beach. "It has the capacity to be another Clonea," he enthused, "it would also clean up the site and provide a facility for the town. There's nothing lost in seeing can it be done," Cllr. Wright urged.

Critical of the concept however, Cllr. Austin Deasy said one south eastern gale alone would clear the beach away.

Mr. Connolly however said he would look at the feasibility of a man made beach in that area of Western Bay.
