Dear Sir,


I am in the process of compiling a writing and book of photo-portraits of men who charged with the Light Brigade at the Battle of Balaclava in 1854.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

We are a voluntary organisation and we have just been billed for £500 in rates. We are the only tenants in the building, which we are renting for a nominal rent. Our resources are very limited. Are we obliged to pay these rates or how do we go about getting these rates waived?

ANSWER

All fixed property is valued for rating purposes but rates are only payable on commercial properties. However, some local authorities base the local service charges on the rateable valuation (RV) of property.

Valuations are determined by the Valuation Office. The valuation is based on an estimate of the annual rent that the property might be let for to a hypothetical tenant, who would bear the cost of maintenance, repairs and rates.

You can apply for a revision of the valuation of the property to the local authority. The application should be sent in writing, stating the grounds for seeking the revision, with the fee of £20. The Commission of Valuation issues the result to the Local Authority usually within six months of the application for the revision.

Revision results may be issued within the first ten days of February, May, August and November and are available for inspection for 21 days thereafter.

If you are dissatisfied with a revision you have a right to appeal to the Commissioners. The procedure for doing this is:

- Send the notice of appeal to the Secretary or Clerk of the Local Authority within 28 days of the receipt of the list by the Local Authority.
- 2. Specify the grounds of the appeal.
- It must be in writing.
- It must be accompanied by the appropriate fee (this varies from £25 to £75 according to the value of the property).

All this can take time and in the meantime it seems that you would be liable for rates until the outcome of the revision/appeal. So, it may also be worthwhile making a strong case to the local rate collector for an exemption. If the case if good enough, it may then be referred to the County Manager for a decision. We don't know if this practice operates countrywide.

Geranium — A Favourite Plant

AUGUST is the best month to take cuttings from the versatile and highly rewarding geranium.

More correctly known as pelargoniums, geraniums are probably-the Irish gardener's second favourite plant after fuchsias.



It's not hard to see why, when there is such a huge range of colours and types of bloom as well as some strong leaf markings and striking variegations. They are simple to propagate through cuttings or seed and will bloom all year in a sunny indoor location.

The regal varieties, with their large showy blooms, have become particularly popular recently, though they are more frail and tend to prefer the greenhouse.

lvy-leaved types have less striking flowers but their trailing nature, delicate blooms and sometimes variegated leaves, make them ideal for boxes and hanging baskets — they are the frequent choice for tucking through the base of baskets.

POPULARITY

Despite poor blooms, scented geraniums have gained popularity lately through the lovely fragrances given off by their leaves.

They are just as easily grown, but conservatories are the best locations to make the most of their scents during warm weather.

The plants tend to be sold by more specialised garden centres and nurseries where you will find the scents range from common fragrances such as orange and lemon, to spicy ones such as nutmeg.

So, geraniums seem perfect, but they have a weakness — overwatering.

Water thoroughly when the soil or compost is reasonably dry and then leave them until they dry out again.

Never mist, cover or subject them to humid conditions or you risk stem rot and infectious leaf mould such as botrytis. In the case of stem rot or black leg, there is no cure and the plant must be destroyed.

The latter can be cured by removing diseased leaves, easing up on watering, creating more air around the plants and spraying with fungicide.

Underwatering is less serious and usually gives due warning when leaf edges stiffen and start to brown. When taking cuttings, you can pot up lots of small ones providing they are sturdy and healthy. You don't need rooting hormone.

After overwintering, be ready to pinch back the young plants to keep them bushy. You should also delay repotting until the plant shows signs of becoming pot-bound.

Geraniums are mostly propagated from cuttings but more gardeners are using seed — F1 hybrids are particularly popular.

Sow in January or February and maintain a temperature of around 22°C for germination and they will flower the following summer.

What's

Living in one room has its problems where cooking is concerned, but you would be surprised at the tasty dishes you can make in one pan. Here are some meaty ideas to try.

PORK IN A PAN Ingredients

2 pork loin chops 1oz (25g) lard 8oz can tomatoes 8oz (225g) potatoes, diced 1/4 pint water

20z (50g) mushrooms, sliced

2oz frozen peas salt and pepper Method

Heat the lard in a frying pan and brown the chops on both sides. Add tomatoes, water and potatoes, cover and simmer for 10 minutes.

Stir in the mushrooms and peas. Cook for a further 15 minutes. Season to taste. Serve from the pan straight to the table.

Serves 2.

SAUSAGE PILAU Ingredients

4oz (110g) sausages 1/2 small onion, chopped 1oz (25g) rice little cooking oil

Nourishing Meals In Just One Pan



1oz (25g) green beans 1oz (25g) mushrooms, sliced 1tsp Worhestershire sauce salt and pepper

1/4 pint stock Method

Brown the sausages in a little oil, remove. Add onion and rice. Stir continuously for about 7 minutes to prevent sticking and produce an even colour.

Add remaining ingredients and simmer for about 12 minutes until the liquid is absorbed and rice is tender.

Slice the sausages and stir into the rice. Serve with a salad.

BEEF CASSEROLE Ingredients

1oz (25g) oil or fat 4oz (110g) stewing steak, cubed 1 carrot, sliced

1 medium potato, sliced 1 small turnip, cubed 1tbs plain flour 1/2 pint stock salt and pepper Dumplings 1tbs self-raising flour 1tbs suet 1tbs mixed herbs 2tsps water to mix Method

Brown meat in hot oil, add vegetables and brown lightly. Stir in flour, add stock and season to taste. Bring to the boil, stirring all the time, until thickened. Lower heat and simmer for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Mix dumpling ingredients. Divide into two and drop into the saucepan. Simmer for a further 20 minutes. Serves 1.

Poaching Problem In Colligan River

With only twelve men to patrol the whole Waterford Fishery District, no wonder the problem of poaching has become so widespread.

According to local sources, poaching this season in Colligan River has now reached alarming levels with fish numbers significantly down on previous years. Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Chief Officer of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board. (S.R.F.B.), James Rogers said Colligan was a 'sadly heavily poached river'.

The Board he said recognises the problem and "is saddened by this most unfortunate and deplorable situation".

STAFF SHORTAGE

At this time of year, Mr. Rogers, disclosed that the bulk of the Board's resources were devoted to tidal water patrols. "At this stage we really don't have the resources to spare for freshwater patrolling", he added although later in the year, it is expect-ed that Colligan will be patrolled by Fishery Officers 4/5 times a week.

Now receiving only intermittent attention from the S.R.F.B. (through no fault of their own) Colligan has become a type of poachers paradise due to an acute staffing problem which is more or less the same with other Fishery Boards nationwide.

"Our own staff resources

are so low", said Mr. Rogers, "that the Board is heavily dependent on the Gardai and the public".


In this regard, the Chief Officer said he had received great support from local people and the Gardai in relation to poaching incidents over the years.

The most common poaching method, he revealed, is a fishing net strung across the river for a few hours, mainly at dead high tide.

New Factory On Horizon For Dungarvan

The Clogherane industrial estate on the Youghal road is already home to two successful multi-national companies. Sterlin Winthrop and Stafford Miller (Ireland) Ltd. The construction of a 'significantly sized' advance factory at this location would greatly enhance Dungarvan's chances of securing a new industry through the auspices of the IDA

SIGNIFICANT STEP UDC member, Cllr. Billy Kyne paid particular tribute to Waterford County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly, who, he said, has done "trojan work behind the scenes to put a package together which will result in an advance factory for Dungarvan."

With months of preparatory work involved, Cllr. Kyne said there were many obstacles to be overcome by both the Fortas officials and the private developer. Now, however, all that remains is for the proposal to go through the planning process.

The provision of an advance factory, he said, can only be regarded "as a significant step in attracting further new industry to Dungarvan."

The labour Councillor added that the presence of two renowned companies such as Sterling Winthrop and Stafford Miller on the industrial estate would only be a help in convincing other multi-nationals to locate there:

County Council to carry out this necessary piece of work for the past year. We got it raised at Council meetings and our local TD also raised it with the Council. We went to Waterford to get specifications from the NRB to give to the Council as the work would have to meet their standards.

I, myself, have called to the Council offices at least twenty times this year. I have met with the County Engineer, Area Engineers, County Secretary and other officials, to hear a variety of excuses as to why the job hasn't been started, the excuses being i.e. bad weather, good weather, right of way public liability, shortage of manpower, shortage of tradesmen, etc. The only shortage I can see is a shortage of commitment from Waterford County Council to carry out this necessary work.

The Council's answer to queries like this usually are — "We would love to carry out the work but we have no finance available at the moment." But for this project they have no such excuse. The money is sanctioned since last year. So, let's hope we will see the proper

Extension To Dungarvan Graveyard

Dungarvan UDC members have approved of the provision of a new burial ground at Council owned land at Ringnasillogue opposite Dungarvan Youth Club.

The walled burial ground will provide approximately 320 grave spaces laid out in a lawn fashion and is expected to suffice for the next 25 to 30 years.

Trial holes dug by the Council immediately outside the existing graveyard at St. Mary's Parish Church proved that the

ground conditions there were unsuitable. As a result of further trial holes in the vicinity, suitable land was identified at the rear of Childers Estate, along the wall bordering the CBS sportsfield.

For burials taking place in the new burial ground, following the Requiem Mass in St. Mary's the funeral cortege will travel via the existing graveyard, through an access in the existing cemetery wall and along a footpath to the new grave-

yard

As agreed with Canon G. Power P.P., the new cemetery will be developed by the Council and managed and maintained by the Church Authorities. 50% of the proceeds of each grave space will be paid to the UDC towards the capital costs.

On the proposal of Cllr. Paddy Power and seconded by Cllr. Austin Flynn, it was unanimously decided to proceed with the new grave-yard plans.





Tadgh Gaelach O Súilleabháin

The bicentenary of the death of Tadgh Gaelach O Súilleabháin was commemorated in his native place, Tournafola, Drumcollogher, Co. Limerick on Saturday and Sunday, July 1st and 2nd. Members of Deuglán Fáilte attended on both days and on Sunday were accompanied by Fr, James Hurley S.J. The driving force behind the whole idea of this commemoration was our own St. Declan.

Tadgh Gaelach was a prolific writer of religious poems. His best known work is 'Duain Chrof Iosa' in praise of the Sacred Heart. He also wrote 'Duain Dheugláin', and was a frequent visitor to the Pattern in Ardmore. It was fitting therefore that Ardmore should be represented at the celebrations.

On the Saturday we were taken on a most informative and interesting historical tour

of the area. Lectures were delivered by several eminent historians. Our first stop was at Mintín Eóghain, the townland where the poet was born in 1715. From there, we travelled up to the Mass Rock at Mullaghareirk. (That name will be familiar to those who did "Mo Sceal Féin" at school). There was a sense of spirituality and history in this lovely spot on the mountain side overlooking the fertile expanse of The Golden Vale.

Springfield Castle was our next port of call. Part of the original castle building, with its huge courtyard, still remains, together with an extension which was added at a later stage. The entire building may be rented out for the "paltry" sum of £1,000 per day at peak times and at £500 per day in the low season. There is no shortage of takers, we were told. The present owner is Lord Muskerry, who now lives in

1715 - 1795

South Africa. His daughter and son-in-law run the castle and the Deer Centre attached thereto. Among the amenities to be enjoyed there are nature walks, a guided tractor-trailer tour through the herds of deer, a picnic area, a coffee shop and a gift shop.

Our next stop was Killeedy. Here we saw the ruin of the monastery of St. Ita, who nurtured some of the great Irish saints included St. Brendan, The Navigator.

There was lots more on the itinerary, including a visit to the grave of another great poet Sean Clarach MacCarthaigh. Alas, time had caught up with us and very reluctantly we returned to Tournafola, to hear the principal lecture of the day which was by Una McHenry, who, with the use of slides and a fantastic handout, made the whole subject come alive.

Unfortunately we had to leave the festivities early because of the long journey home. Early on Sunday morning we set out again for Mass in Tournafola at 10.30 a.m. Ardmore native Fr James Hurley, S.J. assisted at the mass. Sr. Declan preached a wonderful sermon. She spoke of the enormous devotion Tadhg Gaelach had to the Sacred Heart; how he had travelled every county in Munster spreading that devotion through the medium of his poetry, thereby, lifting the spirit of the Irish people at a time when religion was suppressed and they were suffering extreme poverty because of the penal laws. Most of the mass was in Irish. Fr. Kelly, the parish priest was responsible for the music and he trained the choir himself. It was suThe people of Tournafola were just fantastic. A notable feature of the celebration was the number of people who spoke Irish. It just seemed to be the natural thing to do in the friendly and relaxed atmosphere which prevailed throughout.

Tadhg Gaelach O Súilleabháin died in the cathedral in

Waterford in the year 1795 and he is buried in Ballylaneen near Kilmacthomas. Through the celebration of this bicentennial year, it is hoped that there will be a renewed interest in the work of the poet and that more people will come to know and appreciate the significance of his poetry. - Cáit Uí Leighin

Although the welcome windfall falls well short of the total figure needed for the entire upgrade of the county's dilapidated infrastructural network, the badly needed money will nevertheless quickly evaporate into the many potholed and overgrown back roads so prevalent throughout the

A MAJOR HELP

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader," Waterford Co. Manager, Donal Connolly, strongly welcomed the extra funding as a major help to the Council. £379,000, he said, will go towards special restoration work such as strengthening and resurfacing, while the remaining £81,000 will be spent on maintenance.

Mr. Connolly reported that he is currently drawing up a programme of works which will be carried out before the end of the year.

Minister Howlin has indicated that the surprise funding is part of an ongoing restoration programme, with more grant allocations expected in the coming

CHAIRMAN DISAPPOINTED

Welcoming the allocation as "good news for county roads," Waterford Co. Council Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey, said many roads which wouldn't have been serviced by the cashstrapped Council, will now be included in the works programme thanks to the extra funding. "It's now up to the County Engineer,

to ensure the money is spread evenly throughout the county," he said.

On the downside however, Cllr. Coffey said he was disappointed with the £460,000 total when compared to sums received by other counties who fared much better. league table quite a bit," stressed Cllr. Coffey, who admitted however that the money is only a start for further ministerial allocations over the next few

With regard to a previously proposed Council delegation to Minister Howlin on the subject of the dire roads situation, Cllr. Coffey said the Council will have to wait and see if the Minister will accept a delegation in light of this recent development.

Derelict Quay **Properties**

For Sale

Two derelict seafront properties at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan are to be put up for sale under the Urban Renewal Scheme by Waterford Foods plc and Dungarvan UDC.

> Now over the twelve months into the renewal scheme, the proposed sale of these two Quay buildings represents a valuable opportunity to potential developers who can avail of the many tax breaks and financial incentives which are offered under the renewal scheme.

The properties for sale include the former Moloney grain stores which was used for grain storage purposes by Waterford Foods (then Waterford Co-op) until their closure over ten years ago. Adjacent is the derelict UDC owned property beside Galweys Lane which was the centre of much controversy 2 years ago when a local consortium of businessmen proposed to redethe former warehousing and grain stores into a major complex of upmarket apartments.

Both buildings have fallen into a sad state of neglect over the years and are now a major environmental eyesore on the seafront landscape.

WELCOME

Chairperson of the Urban Council, Cllr. Nuala Ryan welcomed this latest development under the town renewal scheme and said she hoped the sale of the properties would attract potential investors to Dungarvan. A possible buy-out of the buildings she felt would de-velop the quay area and pro-vide employment in the


DEVELOPMENT **PROPOSALS**

Fr. Colman Foley, of Mount Melleray Abbey, who died on July 22nd, was born in Dingle, Co. Kerry in 1906. He was the son of P. M. Foley, local historian and his wife, Bridget. He was educated at the Presentation Convent and Christian Brothers schools in the town. In 1924, he went to Mount Melleray Abbey seminary to study philosophy, with the intention of going to Savannah, Georgia in the U.S.A. to work in a diocese there. However, the monastic life of Melleray called him and he joined the community there in 1926, where he belonged until his death. After his ordination in 1932, he was assigned to teach philosophy at the seminary. He also preached in the Monastery's Public Church and heard confessions. In 1948, he was sent to Rome for seven years as assistant to the Abbott General of the Cistercian Order. After his return, he became prior of Mt. Melleray for seven years. He also taught philosophy in the seminary until it closed in 1974. He was a confessor until

Fr. Colman was an only son and is survived by his sister, Mrs. Mary Power of Tramore and Roundwood. During his long life saw many changes in the Church and in society but with his abiding compassion and sense of humour he adapted to the new ways, Fr. Colman brought help and consolation to many during his years as a confessor. He will be sadly missed. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam naofa.

This Teagasc Says

Grassland

Most farmers have found that cows do not seem to milk as well on some paddocks as others, even though they all look fairly similar. There can be over twenty different grass species, some clover plus weeds in a paddock, with the proportion of each varying with management, soil type and fertili-

Many of our pastures have poor botanical composition with a high proportion of secondary grasses like bent grass, the three meadow grasses (rough, smooth and annual), Yorkshire fog, etc. Pastures with a high proportion of these produce less milk than ones with a good ryegrass content. In addition, they are slow to recover and do not

respond as well to nitrogen. The proportion of each grass species does not remain constant for the year but varies according to its growth pattern. This was very evident during the past few weeks. Different grass types can be easily identified in many second cut silages. Ryegrass has long, dark green leaves with a reasonable upright growth habit, whereas bent grass (poor quality grass) has a pale green colour with slightly twisted leaf and low

growth habit.

This grass lodges very easily after a shower of rain and is the first to start decaying at the base. The same is happening in the grazing sward though it is not as obvious since the rest period is shorter. Good utilisation of this type of sward is difficult without affecting intake and depressing milk yield.

GRAZING STRATEGY

The best sttrategy for such pastures is to take a light grazing (7-8 cm.) with the milking cows and follow on with animals that have a lower feed requirement to graze it hard. The best quality pastures to be seen this summer are on dairy farms where sheep follow the cows. These pastures are leafy with good clover content. Where this is not feasible, dry cows or incalf heifers can do a reasonable job, followed by a good topping to 6 cm. and an application of about 40 units of nitrogen/acre. While recovery will be slow it will benefit the pasture in the long term.

> Slurry Tanks And Pits

Unless adequate precautions are taken, liquid manure storage can pose a threat to the safety of people, especially children and livestock.

Covered tanks should have adequate manholes which cannot easily be moved by children and a safety grid should be fitted below the manhole to give secondary pro-

All open tanks must be protected by a at least 6 feet high with locked access gates of the same standard.

When slats are removed, temporary covers or guard rails should be used to protect the opening.

Bacterial decomposition of slurry in storage produces a mixture of gasses Methane, Carbon Dioxide, Ammonia and Hydrogen Sulphide. All are unpleasant, some are inflammable and one in particular, Hydrogen Sulphide is very poisonous to humans and animals. The gas is most likely to be involved in fatal accidents. It is a clear gas with a characteristic smell of rotten eggs and is slightly heavier than air.

The utmost care is necessary when agitating and spreading slurry. Never agitate in still air conditions as gas can linger in buildings or in sheltered yards during still air conditions.

Remove all stock from buildings above or adjacent to tanks before disturbing the slurry and open all available ventilation to provide a through draught, especially at floor

Never stand over slats or near tank access hatches when agitation is in progress.

Stay out of the building for the first hour of agitation and if the building must be entered, only stay in for a short period.

Cattle Farming With R.E.P.S.

The payments under REPS of almost £50 per acre per annum over 5 years on up to 100 acres have been well publicised. A 100 acre farm can qualify for payments of £5,000 per annum or £25,000 over 5 years. EU funding of £230 million has been secured by Ireland from 1994 to 1999. This scheme is part of CAP reform and partly compensation for lower output and restriction on expansion. It is therefore important that farmers qualify for and fully claim these funds.

The scheme can have a substantial impact on farm incomes, water quality, the aesthetic appearance of the countryside, wildlife habitats and the protection of historical sites and monuments.

Costs to be incurred relate mainly to the control of farmyard pollution, the management of grasslands, the application of lime and management of field boundaries. However, some of these measures will have to be carried out in any case, e.g. pollution control due to more strict water protection regulations or good farming practice, e.g. avoidance of poaching and overgrazing, the application of lime to release soil nitrogen and to give better use of phosphate.

Every farmer should consider participation in the scheme. The first step is to have an assessment done to determine the costs and benefits of making the adjustments required to comply with the specifications of the scheme.

IFA/AIB 10-Point Silage Effluent **Control Code Launched**

IFA President, John Donnelly, recently launched a 10-point code for the control of silage effluent to help farmers protect against contamination of ed an internal study on Ininland waterways as this year's silage season continues.

The new IFA 10-point

code, produced with the

support of AIB Bank and prepared in consultation with Teagasc the farm advisory service, also includes emergency action steps farmers are recommended to follow in the event of an accidental breach in silage effluent management controls. These emergency action steps have been agreed by IFA with the Central and Regional Fisheries Boards.

At the launch of the new code at Peamount Dairy Farm, Co. Dublin, IFA President John Donnelly pointed out that the effluent from 100 tonnes of silage has the same polluting potential as the daily sewage output of a town of 25,000

people.

Mr. Donnelly said: "Silage effluent is one of the most highly contaminating substances farmers have to deal with as a part of modern farming techniques. For this reason farmers must remain constantly vigilant during the silage-making season to ensure no contamination of streams, rivers or lakes occurs as a result of mishandling silage effluent on their farms."

AIB Bank Agricultural Advisor, Jim Keane, said: "AIB Bank are pleased to support the production of this code on silage effluent control which will be useful to all farmers. AIB is totally committed to agriculture and we are very conscious

that all development must bear in mind the protection of the environment.

AIB has recently complettensive Agriculture and the Environment which has been circulated to our branch network. This study has helped to ensure that our staff are up to date on the environmental requirements of all developments."

Mr Donnelly criticised the serious inconsistency in government policy on water protection. He pointed out that on the one hand, essential protection of Ireland's waterways is quite rightly a priority, but on the other hand a vital aid scheme to help farmers carry out expensive environmental work has been closed down because it has been over subscribed. He called for the urgent restarting of the EU-funded Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme so that both these important Government objectives can be addressed with the same urgency.

The IFA President pointed have very high river and lake water quality, with over 75% of rivers unpolluted. He said that this was a proud testament to the commitment of farmers and Irish society as a whole to

water quality.
The IFA Silage Effluent Control Code consists of 10 vital measures which farmers need to constantly keep in mind during the entire silage making season. Copies of the code will be available to farmers through IFA Regional offices, AIB Bank branches, Teagasc offices, machinery dealers and co-ops and marts through-

In order to clarify some issues the County Chairman John Skehan outlines below a synopsis of the main relevant points in relation to Occupiers Liability.

The Act is now in place and therefore legislation exists governing Occupiers responsibilities towards persons who enter property.

The Act defines entrants as either: (a) visitors; (b) recreationalists or (c) tres-

DEFINITIONS

Visitors — Person who have been invited by the occupier; persons who have permission to enter; persons gardai, government inspectors, ESB meter reader, etc.

Recreationalists - Persons engaging in a recreational activity, e.g. walking, hunting, studying plant life, etc.

Trespassers — Persons who are neither visitors nor recreationalists.

Duty of Care - Occupiers owe a common duty of care to all visitors. This means "a duty to take such care as is reasonable in all the circumstances to ensure that a visitor to the premises does not suffer injury or damage by reason any danger existing thereon.

The duty of care owed to Recreationalists and Trespassers is: (a) not to injure the person intentionally, and (b) not to act with reckless disregard for the person.

Therefore the duty of care owed to visitors by the Occupier is far greater than that owed to trespassers or recreationalists.

The description of Visitor is very wide ranging. It is deemed that the term "permission to enter" would include persons who entered for the purpose of (i) selling goods or (11) enquiring for directions, or (iii) canvassing, etc.

of care owed to such people and to all visitors, Section 5 of the Act states "an occupier may by express agreement or notice, restrict, modify or exclude his or her duty towards visitors . . . '

It then goes on to state "an occupier shall be presumed, unless the contrary is shown, to have taken reasonable steps to bring a notice to the attention of a visitor if it is permanently displayed at the normal means of access to the premises."

Therefore, if such a notice is properly displayed, the duty of care owed to all visitors, is reduced to the level owed to trespassers and recreational users.

TIME TICKING FOR **MAIN STREET PROJECT**

Now that Dungarvan UDC has issued a notification of their decision to grant planning permission to Irish Nationwide Building Society, Cllr. Billy Kyne has asked that no further objections be lodged Street shopping develop-

"We're all waiting for something to kickstart the urban renewal scheme", said Cllr. Kyne who stressed that already 12 months into the scheme, 'time is ticking away' for developments with the 1996 deadline looming closer.

Describing the exciting residential/shopping emporium as being of major significance to the economic well being of the town, Cllr. Kyne said he hoped that there would be no further delays in the process.

BADLY STAINED FOOTPATHS

Town Engineer George Taylor said pressure pumps would destroy the cobblelocking and added that a scraper would be more suit-

PUBLIC TOILET UPGRADE WELCOMED

At a cost of approximately £10,000, Dungarvan's public toilets at Davitt's Quay underwent a total revamp

and badly needed upgrade recently. Now with newly refurbished and anti graffiti interior and exterior, the toilets have been described by County Manager Donal Connolly as 'first class'.

Complimenting the Town Engineer and staff on the work involved, Mr. Connolly said the Council will ensure proper caretaking of the facilities which will be closed and locked at nighttime. He appealed to the public to respect the new toilet facilities.

While welcoming the new upgrade, Cllr. Tony Wright stressed the importance of keeping the facilities in good condition.

Cllr. Lar Hart said he was disappointed that the toilets did not include an access and facilities for the disabled. Town Engineer George Taylor submitted that it would take a major reconstruction of the building to accommodate disabled persons.

Of all the ingredients of the ideal team's make up none is more important than discipline. No single aspect of a player's make up is more important than personal discipline and without this centrally important characteristic a team will fail to fulfill its potential. Great skill, courage, commitment and intelligence are, of course, crucial for success but if the training which produces self-control and a capacity for orderliness and co-operation is absent that team will never reach the pinnacle of suc-

Being disciplined means being mentally strong. Without preparation this mental toughness in a team is incapable of being turned on in the course of a tense game as one would a tap. Rather is it the product of a rigorous spell of hard training, seriously contested, tough physical training matches where the ability to withstand severe pressure is cultivated and players are being mentally prepared for the kind of intimidation and provocation inherent in major game situations. Discipline is developed by being always in attendance at training, being on time, fulfilling all the tough demands of a training session and complying fully with the trainer's instructions. The disciplined player's lifestyle would conform to the requirements of the training schedule.

Consider your own club. Do all members of the panel attend, as much as it is possible for them, all

training sessions? Arrive on time always? Throw themselves enthusiastically into all aspects of the prepara-tion? Are there "hiders" among them? Or dodgers? I remember some years ago attending the training sessions of two teams, Kilkenny and Dublin, where the atmosphere of one was in direct contrast with the atmosphere prevailing at the

Eddie Keher had charge of the Cats at that time and even though he was an outstanding hurler, an astute student of the game and a crafty mentor, his approach to discipline was somewhat lax. There was no punctuality, lads trickled into the dressing room gradually over a half hour period and he was lucky to have the bulk of his panel by 8 o'clock. I remember, Mick Brennan arriving late, halfheartedly indulging in some hurling and then for no apparent reason except laziness perhaps deciding that he had exerted himself sufficiently for that night. He left the field when the physical part of training started, showered and dressed. Afterwards when I expressed my surprise to Eddie he excused the culprit by explaining that Brennan was a temperamental chap who, he felt sure, would be all right on the big day. Well, he wasn't, played badly and his team were beaten by Offaly. His marker Pat Fleury didn't give him a puck all afternoon and Brennan was taken off in the second half. Kilkenny lost.

I watched Dublin training under Kevin Heffernan in preparation for an All Ireland semi-final with Cork, I think. Every panel member but three was out on the field by 7.15 p.m. so that Kevin could begin at 7.30 p.m. The three absentees (Brian Mullins was one) were out of town on business and arrived at twenty to eight. They immediately joined the rest after some stretching and warm up but when the session concluded at 9 those latecomers continued to work hard for another 20 minutes. The training that night followed the usual demanding pattern and the training match (twelve a side) was as keen and competitive as any championship game. Tackling was hard and uncompromising. Heffo encouraged the most severe Heffo demands on players physical and mental condition and only blew his whistle twice, to start the match and to signal the finish. Crunch-

ing tackles, holding, pulling

and pushing were allowed and none of them complained. By subjecting them to this kind of experience Heffo reckoned that on a big day they were prepared for anything and they would have the toughness, mental and physical, to cope with any kind of pressure. Dublin won their match against Cork.

I thought of those and many other examples of the importance of a team's collective self-control while watching Dublin on Sunday evening leaving no doubt about their right to the Leinster football crown. Their discipline was awesome and was a central factor in their clear 10 point victory over great rivals Meath. They were able to absorb all of the physical punishment, the niggling and holding, without petulance or loss of self-control and were so focussed on the job to be done that bruising tackles and provocative physical confrontation never ruffled their admirable equanimity. Missed chances never deflected them or dispirited them. Their mental preparation for the mighty battle - and that's exactly what it was was outstanding.

Meath surged forward after half time whipped over a point, followed by the equalising goal and now it was just as we anticipated, suffocatingly close. Graham Geraghty sent a great kick from over 50 yards between the uprights to put Meath ahead and we

had a feeling of dejavu. It was then that Dublin displayed their discipline and calm control. No panic, no losing of their shape as they did in last year's All Ireland. Filled with self-belief they went up a gear, pouring forward in relentless fashion with a conviction that only teams of character possess to pile on the points and score the goal to which Meath had no answer.

The disciplined team reacts positively to adversity, is mentally prepared for it and confident of dealing with it. Cork in the Munster final showed a similar mental strength. This should mean a great game when those two fine sides meet in a few weeks time. Are Dublin invincible? Ask a Corkman! Ach is maith an scéalaí an aimsir.

Once again I would like to take this opportunity to thank all landowners for their co-operation during the past years and we are looking for their continued







WATERFORD HURLERS' MENTAL ATTITUDE

Some years ago, Mick O'Dwyer is reputed to have offered to act as coach to the Waterford hurling team. This offer, apparently, was laughed out of court by those in control of Waterford GAA affairs, on the grounds that O'Dwyer knew nothing about hurling. However, O'Dwyer's point was that the main problem with Waterford hurling was one of mental attitude and psychological preparation, not hurling ability. He is reputed to have made his offer after Waterford, once again, failed to rise to the occasion in the 1989 Munster final.

After 35 years of following Waterford hurling teams, I would have to agree with O'Dwyer's argument about mental attitude. The basic standard of hurling in Waterford is such that while we may rarely win titles, we should nearly always be capable of giving a good fight to any opposition in the country. However, the normal fare for Waterford teams in this pe-

riod in big games has been capitulation and severe hidings, punctuated by occafighting sional performances which

showed what we can be capable of. This was even the case of the supposedly "great" team of the late fifties and early sixties, which was badly beaten as often as it played superbly.

With the major improvement in under-age skill levels in the county in recent years one had hoped for significant advance at intercounty level. However, the problem of mental attitude persists. Having good skill levels is pointless if players cannot be first to the ball, or are not prepared to disrupt the other team when they are in possession. Both Clare and Offaly have shown in recent weeks what positive mental attitude can achieve.

Furthermore, teams with the right attitude always seem to get the breaks in games. Again, Clare and Offaly showed this as did-Tipperary against Waterford and Limerick against Tipunder-21 hurlers had the proper attitude against Clare, we can be sure that they would not have conceded two own goals and hit the upright twice.

We need to analyse this problem and come to grips with it if real progress is to be made. Why can the same team, under the same management, display entirely different attitudes from one game to the next? How was the 1992 under-21 team able to maintain its attitude right through the campaign while both this year's and last year's minor teams followed up fighting semifinal performances with listless displays in the final?

Does the problem arise in the dressing room in the minutes before the game begin, or does it develop over a longer time period? Ned Power, in his superb "Tallow Notes" in the "Leader" noted how nonchalantly the Waterford team sauntered out onto the pitch for the senior championship game against Tipperary, whereas the Tipperary players came out like greyhounds released from the traps. Similarly, I felt uneasy at the lackadaisical nature of the Waterford puckabout before the start of the recent Munster minor hurling final. Sure enough, within minutes of the throw-in, several Waterford players had dropped the ball with nerves and both McGrath and Bennett had mishit their first frees. Already at that stage the writing was on the wall.

Of course, Cork, Tipper-ary and Kilkenny have no problem with attitude. Long years of success mean that confidence is inbred in their players. Other counties are now starting to employ professional psychologists to help counter feelings of innate inferiority among their players. We may not need to go this far in Waterford, but we do need to do some serious thinking about the whole question of mental preparation, especially for big games. There is obviously no easy solution to this.

As a parting thought, I do not remember any team put out by Joe McGrath during his two spells in charge of Waterford ever going down without a fight. Yet, he to, in the opinion of many, didn't know anything about hurling either.



Kilrossanty Lodge Objection Against Gaultier

It is a rare occurrence in these times to have an objection lodged by one team against another in the championships. Last week Kilrossanty Club lodged an objection against Gaultier being awarded the senior football game in which the clubs met at Kilmacthomas on last Saturday week.

The objection was on the basis that Gaultier played Paul Foley whom they alleged was not transferred to them. The County Board had sought a ruling on the Paul Foley issue and the Management confirmed that he was legal to play with Gaultier. This was confirmed by Central Council on Saturday last.

In view of the result of the game against the Nire, it was rumoured over the weekend that Kilrossanty might withdraw the objection. If they won the objection it would have repercussions on the championship in that they would be placed level with Stradbally on 10 points, Gaultier would go out and the fourth place in line would be decided on a play-off between Dungarvan and Tramore.

In any circumstances, it is reasonably certain that nothing like this will happen.

FEILE IN CORK

I suppose it can be described as a "sign of the times" that Cork County Board have consented to allow the Feile to be staged this year in Pairc Ui Caoimh. According to some newspaper reports, the event will net in the region of a quarter of a million pounds for the Cork Board, in rent, etc. and it will bring a huge amount of business to the city as well.

For the years in which the Feile was

held in Thurles there was widespread criticism about the immorality and the obscenity of staging such entertainment in a GAA ground. Whatever about the immorality of the thing (this does not seem to matter anymore any-

way) or whatever about the fact that it is not in keeping with the ethos of the Association who have a responsibility for promoting our Irish culture, etc., very serious cognisance should be taken of the fact that gatherings of this nature provide the ideal market place for drug trafficking which is quickly becoming a major problem and is doing more than any other vice in destroying thousands of young people who have become entwined in the net of the racketeers who peddle the drugs in many different forms.

Very many young people from this county will make their way to Pairc Ui Caoimh for the weekend and many of them will enjoy the entertainment provided by the bands and the singers, etc. and I'm sure that to those young people this sort of criticism will sound prudish. To those people let me say I am not moralising or that they should not have the option of deciding for themselves what they should do in their search for entertainment. What I am saving is that it is a sad sign of the times that the GAA are allowing themselves to be used in this way, just because there is money to be made out of it. I must also point out that there is no rule (yet) in the GAA guide which states that such concerts cannot be organised.



Surprise Resignations **Shock Lismore Festival Committee**

Director of the annual festival, Jan grabbed local headlines last week when he was awarded the second WLR FM/Waterford Crystal Arts and Entertainment Award.

INTERNAL TENSIONS

Mr. Van Putten levelled a number of allegations against Festival Director Mary Ryan claiming that internal tensions surfaced as far back as April when the couple blocked attempts by Mrs. Ryan to change the relationship between the festival and Lismore Dramatic Society.

In doing so, Mr. Van Putten said he had prevented the outburst of an open conflict that would have "split the festival committee and the local community". In the run-up to this year's festival, Mr. Van Putten said he also objected to the decision to drop the Lismore Heritage Centre as the booking office for the festival. "They had been very helpful in the previous years and were now very much on top of the job," he said.

Since the end of May, the Musical Director claimed there has been no communication between himself and Mrs. Ryan.

"After the festival we had to wait four weeks before any communication was made and a meeting called," said Mr. Van Putten who claimed the meeting had gone ahead despite the fact that he had informed Mrs. Ryan of his inability to attend.

Mr. Van Putten said a strange irony was the fact that the committee meeting was called on the very night the Lismore Festival Musical Director was in the visitor's centre of Waterford Crystal to receive the WLR FM/Waterford Crystal Arts and Entertainment Award.

At the next committee meeting, held last Thursday night, Mr. Van Putten said he and his wife were met with open hostility.

This year's festival ended leaving a deficit of approximately £600 which Mr. Van Putten said he would be prepared to cover if other efforts to raise this money

"DEEPLY SADDENED" Maureen and I spent a lot of time and personal money in developing this festival", said Mr. Van Putten. " We certainly did not deserve such treatment, we never want to go through this again. For the town of Lismore it is a great pity that this happened. The Festival was on its way to becoming very prestigious and promised to add many thousands of pounds to the local economy in the years to come."

Summing up his feelings about the Festival Jan said he felt deeply saddened at this outcome, particularly

when under the Festival chairmanship of Neil Twomey last year all problems that arose - as they do in any Festival and in any committee - were solved with a constructive attitude, good humour and straight

talking. UNFOUNDED ALLEGATIONS

Do these shock resignations spell the end of the road for Lismore's successful money spinner? Not for Festival Director Mary Ryan who said her only wish is to see the festival committee to go from strength to strength.

Following the surprise announcement, Mrs. Ryan expressed shock and anger at what she said are many unfounded allegations made against her.

'I have no desire to engage in public outpourings that can only damage the reputation and status of the Festival and because of that I have no further comment to make", she added. Looking to the future of the Early Music Festival, Mrs. Ryan stated that while the resignations of the Musical Director and the Press Officer are regrettable the Festival is bigger than any individual.

"Those of us that are remaining", she stressed, " will strive even harder to ensure that next years event is just as successful as the three previous ones".

O'Shea Announces Major **Grants For SEHB And** Carriglea The Minister of State at

the Department of Health, Brian O'Shea, T.D., has announced that £450,000 has been allocated to the South Eastern Health Board by way of capital grants for the maintenance and fire prevention works under the 1995/96 capital programme. The sum comprises of £250,000

maintenance/refurbishments and £200,000 for fire prevention works.

Minister O'Shea also announced that capital grants are being allocated nationwide for maintenance/fire prevention works to those agencies providing services for mental handicapped. Amongst the agencies to benefit are the Sisters of the Bon Sauveur, Carriglea, Dungarvan who have been allocated £50,000 for fire prevention works and £25,000 for refurbishment.

Commenting on the allocation Minister O'Shea said "these capital grants would make a significant contribution to improving services and safety to health service users in the constituency."
