Flower Power Aplenty In Lismore

All is blooming merrily down scenic Lismore way as the Cathedral town waits with bated breath for tomorrow's arrival of the Entente Florale judges.

The town's colourful blossoms and lustrous buds have been the centre of the local committee's undivided attention for the past few months. It seems the whole community has experienced a bout of 'green fingers' as gardening skills and flower talk become the main topic of conversation in the final countdown to judging day.

Nominated by the Department of the Environment Lismore represents Ireland in the small town section of the flower judging competition while Clonakilty is Ireland's large town entry.

Other entrants in this year's competition are Austria, Belgium, France, Great Britain, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, The Netherlands and Portugal.

A host of judges from these aforementioned countries will descend on Lismore at 11.30 a.m. tomorrow (Thursday August 10th) where they will

firstly visit Ballyrafter House Hotel, before journeying over the bridge to Lismore Heritage Centre. Here the judges will be given an official welcome by members of the Lismore Town Commissioners, Lismore Tidy Towns Committee, Co. Manager Donal Connolly and various council officials. Following re-

freshments, the judges will be taken on a special 2 1/2 hour trail of the town during which they will examine the variety and quality of flowers, flowerbeds, shrubs and newly planted trees, including overall tidiness of the town.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Can you tell me the age up to which a parent will be paid for their child dependents with social welfare payments? What age is Child Benefit paid up to?

ANSWER

For social welfare purposes children are regarded as dependents up to their 18th birthday. Where the child is living with the parents, the parents will be paid an increase for a child up to 18 years, regardless of whether the child is working. An allowance will not be paid for a child which is getting a social welfare or Health Board payment in his/her own right. The only exception to this is if the child is getting Supplementary Welfare Allowance or a Disablement Pension (under the Occupational Injuries Benefit Scheme).

If the child is in full time education, a child dependent allowance will be paid up to 22 years from April '95 to those on long-term social welfare payments and payments for lone parents. For people on Disability Benefit, Unemployment Benefit, short-term Unemployment Assistance and Occupational Injury Benefit, the child dependent payments stop at 18 years, regardless of whether the child is still in full time education.

Child Benefit is paid for a child up to the age of 16 years and for 16 and 17 years old in full time education or who are physically or mentally disabled and who are dependent on you. It was announced in the Budget that from September 1995 Child Benefit will be extended to 18 years olds in full time education or an FAS Courses and not getting an allowance.

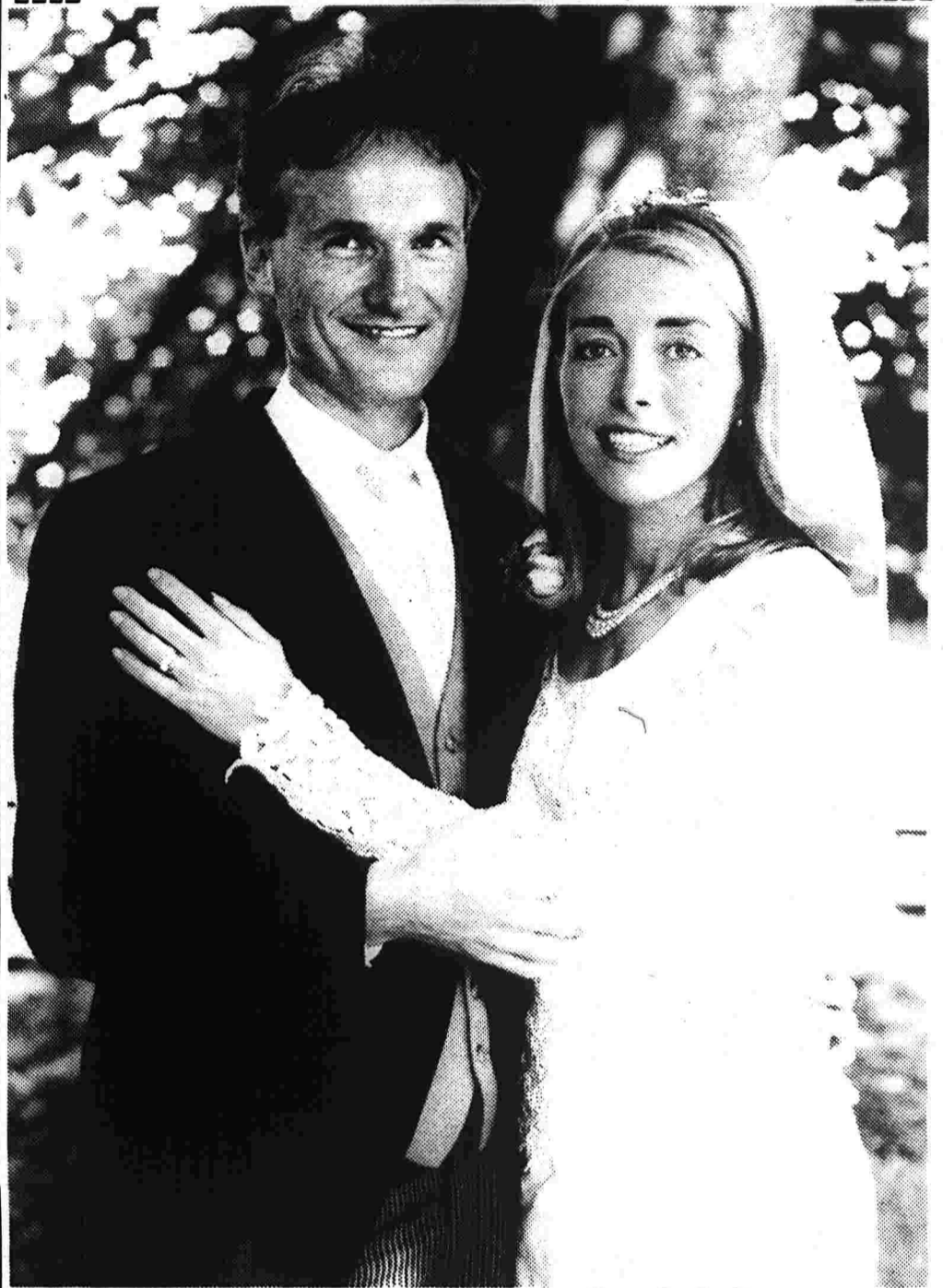


Tallow's most famous son and world renowned tenor, the late Frank Ryan

POSITIVE 1995 REVIEW BY IDA

In a review of activities in the South East area for the first half of 1995, Tom McAuliffe, Regional Director of IDA Ireland attributed the high level of investment by overseas companies in the Region to economic growth in export markets and improving infrastructure in the Region.

Highlight of the first six months was the decision by Seagate Technology to set up a disc drive project in Clonmel to provide 1,000 jobs. This project will provide a major economic boost to the Region.

Also the announcement earlier in the year that Sram was taking over the Advance Factory in Carrick-on-Suir to provide 200 jobs in the manufacture of gear shifts for mountain bikes was a further indication of the level of interest by overseas companies in the Region. Sram are expected to build up employment to over 100 by year end.

Both Seagate and Sram will commence production in the Autumn.

An increase in total employment in overseas industry was registered last year and again in the past six months. It is expected that this trend will be maintained to the end of 1995 due to the pipeline of promoters who have expressed an interest in the South East Region and the plans for increased production by existing overseas companies.

There are seven overseas projects in a start up phase in the Region. Besides providing direct employment these companies are providing indirect jobs especially in the construction sector as they construct new buildings or modify and expand existing premises.

Because of the make up of Advance Factories by overseas companies there is a need to provide additional space in the Region. IDA has recommended to Forfas that private developers be encouraged to provide space on a phased basis in a number of locations in the South East.

The existing base of over-

seas industry, including companies such as Norton, Milton Bradley, Bausch & Lomb, Carten Controls and Stafford Miller, is expected to increase employment by year end.

Every effort is being made to improve the industrial infrastructure in Dungarvan. Discussions are underway with a private developer to provide an Advance Factory there. IDA is participating with local bodies to provide a new promotional brochure for the town.

OUTLOOK

The overall outlook for the rest of the year is very positive. With a strong pipeline it is expected that performance at year end will be ahead of last year.

Not all companies, however, will share in the strong growth and there will be some job losses.

Also towns which provide a quality environment with strong infrastructure and business supports will continue to retain a competitive advantage in their bid for inward investment.

Deasy On Fishery Officers Racketeering Probe

As Dungarvan Gardaí continue their full scale probe into allegations of racketeering by officers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board in Co. Waterford, Dungarvan based Deputy Austin Deasy has spoken out on the controversial issue. The Fine Gael T.D. was speaking during the second stage of the Fisheries (Amendment) Bill 1995 in the Dáil on July 26th last. Deputy Deasy stated:-

"Thank God something is

happening at last. What has happened in the Southern Regional Fisheries board area over the past ten years, maybe longer, is a terrible blot on the system. We are indebted to the former Minister for the Marine, Deputy Coveney, and the Minister of State, Deputy Gilmore, for initiating this legislation. It should have been done years ago.

This matter arises from the use of monofilament nets for salmon fishing, which is illegal. A salmon review

group was set up in 1987 and its report was never acted upon, and that is the basis for the present conflict. The group comprised higher civil servants, a Garda Chief Superintendent, the Commander of the Naval Service, and the Secretary of the Department of the Marine, who acted as chairman. The report recommended that a certain length of monofilament net be legalised. These problems would not have arisen had that report been acted

upon. However, every subsequent Minister has ignored the findings of the expert report.

I am glad a commissioner is to be appointed to ensure the board is run in a proper and fair-minded manner. I accept the majority of board members are fine and upright citizens. However, there is an element which needs to be investigated and I hope those investigations will result in fair play for the fishermen who have suffered".

New Bid to Entice Waterford Emigrants Home

In a novel move to attract Waterford emigrants home to their native county, the Lismore Heritage Centre, in conjunction with the Co. Enterprise Board and Leader are to compile a detailed register of skilled, qualified emigrants with a view to encourage them to return to their local community where their expertise can be put to good use.

The newly formed committee in charge of the venture comprises of Gerard Enright, Waterford Enterprise Board, Bernard Leddy, Lismore Town Commissioner and Mary Houlihan Manager Lismore Heritage Company. They now turn to the painstaking task of compiling names of emigrants who have left the county to find work overseas with whom regular contact will be maintained through the publication of a free quarterly newsletter.

The first such newsletter which provides a full infor-

mation service on the many opportunities for setting up new businesses through the presence of the Enterprise Board and the Waterford Development Partnership

L&N Acquisition Confirmed

Don't Have A Sterile Garden

In the quest to design, landscape and create the perfect garden we sometimes realise that something has been lost.

Straight and true fences and walls might enclose a tidy plot with a lawn beautifully trimmed and rolled, roses which are a riot of colour, and vegetables laden with produce.

STERILE

But something seems to be lacking — we have tamed Nature in our own back garden but created something rather sterile.

Gone are the birds, wild flowers, butterflies and bees that perhaps gave a garden character and explains why there is a strong movement back to the traditional cottage garden, which had a far closer relationship with wild creatures.

The sterility of some modern gardens is also not always the fault of the individual — environmental damage from pollution and building development is a major cause too.

But individuals can help by taking a greener approach to managing their little piece of land.

HEDGE

To attract more birds and insects, plant a hedge — the extra work in trimming and clearing out below will be repaid by birdsong and the attractive look of a natural garden boundary.

Hedges are a refuge for timid birds such as wrens or less familiar town birds such as tits, wagtails and finches, which have brighter plumage than humble sparrows and starlings.

In the case of ornamental rose hedging (*Rosa Rugosa*) the simple but abundant flowers and the deterrent effect of the thorny stem are a particular bonus.

NESTING BOXES

Encourage birds by putting up nesting boxes. These are made easily using scraps of timber, but find a reference book for dimensions and locations suiting different species — or consult the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds at The Lodge, Sandy, Beds SG19 2DL.

The size of the opening can also make all the difference between creating a palace for a homely Sparrow or an entertaining Blue Tit.

It may sound good, but wild flower seed is widely available in special mixes containing, for example, nectar producers to attract bees and butterflies.

However, some can be expensive and you may not be pleased with the results — some 'wild flowers' are regarded as weeds.

A halfway house is to sow herbs which attract bees. Those which also offer lovely fresh herbs for the kitchen are: — marjoram, chives, fennel, thyme, mint — best sown in a tub or it will over run everything else — rosemary, rue and sage. Some can also be dried for use during winter.

BEES

Bees also love poppies, yarrow and the big puff-balls produced by onions.

Butterflies have other preferences: one of the best known is buddleia, but they also like the yellow blooms of the leathery-leaved senecio, though the plant does need a sunny spot.

Other butterfly 'magnets' included: — marigolds, dahlias, wallflowers, phlox and Michaelmas daisies.

MAKE ROOM FOR MUSHROOMS

From fun food for kids to sophisticated starters, mushrooms make the perfect ingredient open or closed. Children won't need persuading to eat up their Cowboy Special or one or two other amusing concoctions. And from the selection of starters, you'll be sure to find one to suit every taste and get those appetites going.

COWBOY SPECIAL

Ingredients

3 rashers of back bacon, rind removed
2tsp oil
1/4-1/2 tsp chilli powder (optional)
7/8oz (220g) can baked beans
2tbs tomato ketchup
8oz (225g) button mushrooms, wiped clean
3 frankfurters, sliced
1tbs chopped fresh parsley.

Method

Grill bacon until crisp. Cool, then chop. Heat oil and fry chilli for 45 seconds. Remove from heat then stir in baked beans, tomato ketchup, mushrooms and frankfurters. Cook for a few minutes. Mix well, then turn into a dish. Mix parsley and bacon and sprinkle over.

Serves 4.

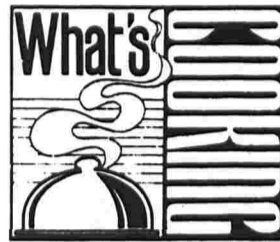
BRUNCH TRAIN

Ingredients

2 slices of wheatgerm bread
1 low-fat chipolata sausage
6 1/2 small open cup mushrooms, wiped clean
little oil
1tbs baked beans
1 size 5 egg
1tbs milk.

METHOD

Trim the bread into 3in (7.5cm) squares. Cut one slice in half for the trucks, then cut other slice into a train with a funnel and drivers cab. Toast bread under the grill. Grill sausage, then brush mushrooms with oil and grill until tender. Cook beans and scramble egg with milk. Place train and trucks on plate with six mushrooms as wheels and the half one in front as a



buffer. Spoon beans on top of first truck for coal, then sliced sausage on top of second truck. Take scrambled egg out of funnel along plate for smoke.

Serves 1.

PIRATE JAKES TREASURE

Ingredients

2tbs oil
1 onion, chopped
8oz (225g) cup mushrooms, quartered
3tbs flour
1/2 pint (300ml) milk
7oz (198g) can sweetcorn and mixed peppers, drained
4oz (125g) cheddar cheese, grated
12oz (350g) smoked cod or haddock, skinned and cut into pieces
Crumble
1oz (25g) natural wheatgerm
1oz (25g) oakflakes with bran

Garnish

tomato slices
parsley sprigs

Method

Heat oil and cook onion and mushrooms 3 minutes. Stir in flour and cook for 1 minute. Gradually stir in milk and cook for another minute. Stir in sweetcorn and 2/3 cheese, then fold in fish. Turn into an ovenproof dish. Mix wheatgerm, oakflakes and remaining cheese. Sprinkle over the



fish. Bake at 375°F, 190°C, Gas Mark 5 for about 30 minutes.

Serves 2-4.

LEMON AND MUSHROOM SOUP

Ingredients

2oz (50g) butter
1 1/2 oz (40g) plain flour
1 pint (600ml) chicken stock
1/2 pint (300ml) milk
1/2lb (225g) cup mushrooms, minced
2tbs parsley, chopped
juice of 1 lemon
5fl oz (142ml) double cream

Method

Heat butter in a pan, stir in flour and cook for a few moments. Stir in stock and bring to the boil. Add milk, mushrooms and parsley. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice to taste. Cook for 5 minutes. Stir in cream. Serve hot or chilled.

Serves 5-6.

SAUCY BEANS

Ingredients

3oz (75g) haricot beans, soaked overnight
1tbs oil
1 onion, chopped
2 sticks celery, chopped
8oz (225g) cup mushrooms, sliced
8oz (225g) tomatoes, peeled and finely chopped
2tbs tomato purée
salt and pepper

Method

Cook beans in plenty of water until tender. Drain. Heat oil and fry onion and celery in covered pan for 3 minutes. Stir in mushrooms, cover and cook for 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, purée and seasoning. Cook for 3 minutes. Stir in beans and heat.

Serves 4.

CHILLI MUSHROOMS

Ingredients

1tbs oil
1 small onion, finely chopped

1/2 small red pepper, seeds removed and finely chopped
2 dried red chilli peppers, crushed
2oz (50g) bulgar wheat
1/2 pint (150ml) water
salt and pepper
1 1/2 oz (40g) butter
8 3in (7.5cm) flat mushrooms

Method

Heat oil and fry onion and red pepper in covered pan for 3 minutes. Stir in chilli pepper, bulgar wheat, water and seasoning. Bring to the boil then simmer gently for at least 10 minutes until all the water is absorbed. Place mushrooms on well-buttered baking tray. Divide pepper mixture between mushrooms, then place small knob of butter on top of each. Cook at 375°F, 190°C, Gas Mark 5 for about 20 minutes.

Serves 4.

APPLE SALAD

Ingredients

4tbs olive oil
5tbs lime or lemon juice
1tbs English mustard
3 bay leaves
salt and pepper
6oz (175g) spring onions, topped, tailed and finely chopped
1lb (450g) button mushrooms
2oz (50g) sunflower seeds, toasted
1 green apple, cored and chopped
Garnish
parsley

Method

In a basin mix the olive oil, juice, mustard, bay leaves and seasoning. Add spring onions, mushrooms, sunflower seeds. Mix cover and chill well. Before serving, remove bay leaves, stir in apple.

Serves 6.

Future Of Defence Forces

The future of the Army School of Music and the Army Bands and an increase in the strength of the FCA was discussed recently in a letter to Dungarvan Urban District Council from the Minister for Defence, Sean Barrett.

The previous government had commissioned a review of the total organisation of the Defence Forces by the Efficiency Audit Group (EAG). In the interim, however, an internal report prepared for the EAG by Price Waterhouse, Management Consultants, was leaked to the public. This inevitably resulted in considerable speculation about a number of issues concerning the Defence Forces, including the School of Music/Army Bands.

MAJOR REFORM

Last month, Minister Barrett announced a major reform of the Defence Forces with a phased programme of reorganisation to be carried out. "No decisions of any kind have been taken concerning the future of the Army School for

Music/Army Bands or any other unit of the Defence Forces," stated Minister Barrett . . . "Furthermore, you may be reassured that whatever decisions may be taken, there will be no compulsory redundancies in any section of the Defence Forces."

An Implementation Group has now been established to

draw up a detailed development plan over an initial three year period, taking into account the importance of the Army School of Music/Bands.

DUNGARVAN FCA

With regard to the current situation in the FCA, the Minister said that the overall permitted strength of the FCA is 16,361 all ranks.

The permitted strength level for the unit based in Dungarvan, "C" Company, 13 Infantry Battalion, is 150 all ranks and the unit has a current strength of 146 personnel. There are 12 people on a waiting list, the first four of whom will be enlisted as soon as possible, while the remainder will be enlisted as vacancies arise.

New Book On Ardmore Patron Saint

Compiled by Ardmore native and noted historian, Siobhán Lincoln and beautifully illustrated by her granddaughter Katie Lincoln, "Declan of Ardmore" is a memorable book which traces the life and times of Ardmore's patron saint.

An interesting and informative read, the book is based on the research of Canon Power (1862-1951) who was a priest in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore. While serving as a Diocesan Inspector, he became acquainted with every parish in the diocese and did an enormous amount of study into the life of St. Declan, which

up to now had been the only printed source available on the saint. Canon Power subsequently became Professor of Archaeology at UCC.

According to author Siobhán Lincoln, "the more I studied his work the more I became conscious of the great debt of gratitude we owe to Canon Power who has made such detailed study of our ancient monuments, a study brilliantly illuminated by his knowledge and deep love of the Irish language."

Ardmore Celebrates St. Declan's Pattern

Among the many holiday makers to Ardmore during the recent past were hundreds of pilgrims observing the ancient Pattern, with its vigil and octave honouring St. Declan of the Déise. People came from the parishes all around to 'do the rounds' at the Well and at the ruined church marking the site of Declan's cell on the side of the cliff, above the waves.

CEREMONIES OF LIGHT

The opening ceremonies on the vigil of the feast (July 24) and the ceremony concluding the octave prayer on Sunday, July 30, were marked by candle-lit

processions of the Holy Eucharist from Ardmore Church to St. Declan's Well for the celebration of Mass.

Darkness fell slowly on the large crowd gathered for Mass and as the hundreds of candles glowed ever stronger, the imagery of light and water was powerful in all its simplicity. After Mass the Holy Eucharist was taken in procession to the Beannachán (St. Declan's burial place) near the Cathedral and Round Tower, where the ceremonies ended at midnight.

TADHG GAELACH Ó SUILLEABHÁIN

At the concluding vigil, the beautiful hymn 'Duan Chroí

Iosa' (otherwise known as 'Gile Mo Chroí', put to music by Seán Ó Riada) was played on the fiddle by the Parish Priest of Ardmore, Very Rev. Daniel O'Connor. Even the waves on the rocks below seemed hushed for this beautiful haunting melody penned by Tadhg Gaelach Ó Suilleabháin. The voice of Tadhg Gaelach is now silent in the soil of Ballylaneen graveyard.

IMOKILLY CONNECTION

Tadhg Gaelach Ó Suilleabháin died two hundred years ago this year after devoting the latter half of his life to repentance and the contemplation of Divine Love in

the Heart of Jesus, presented to us in the Holy Eucharist. It must be said that the first half of Tadhg's life was more fun loving! This period of his life was spent in the parish of Clonpriest in the Diocese of Cloyne. Here he lived from about the age of 25 and after the death of his friend Bishop Walsh of Cork in 1763, Tadhg moved to the other side of the Blackwater to Dungarvan.

There he joined the Confraternity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus was established in the Decies and the Nire Valley by Father Edward Lisward who

ministered there from 1750 to 1761. "Duan Chroí Iosa" was written for the confraternity in Dungarvan.

NEW BOOK BY SIOBHÁN LINCOLN

At the closing vigil, Siobhán Lincoln recalled earlier devout and at times humorous memories of 'doing the rounds' on Pattern Day. Siobhán has recently published 'Declan of Ardmore' and very timely brought to light the scholarship of Canon Patrick Power (1862-1951) who has been described as "the historian par excellence of the diocese of Waterford and Lismore."

This little gem of research and deep spirituality has in no small measure contributed to the increase in pil-

grims honouring Declan this year. At the place of Declan's birth in Relián Deagláin in Drumroe, between Cappoquin and Lismore, Mass was celebrated for the first time in living memory on the night of St. Declan's Feast Day. Mass was also attended by a crowd of about 600 at St. Declan's Well, near Clashmore, on July 27.

Thanks to the people of Ardmore, especially its dynamic curate, Fr. Pat Butler and the scholarship of its native daughter Sr. Declan Power, the stones and holy places of this monastic city have reverberated once again with the songs and psalms of its saints — Declan and Tadhg Gaelach.

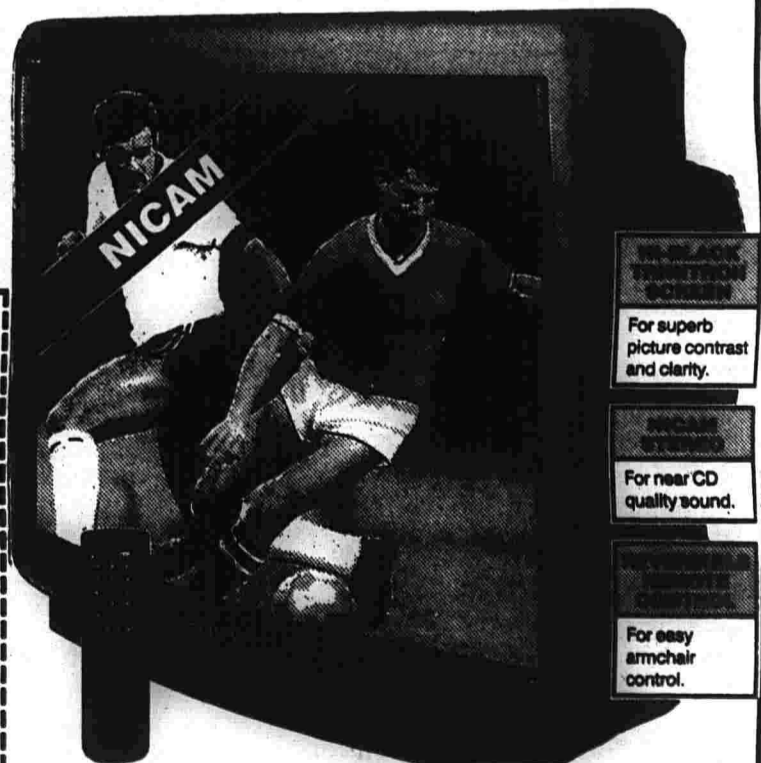
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BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

THE BRIDGE BELOW THE TOWN

The two hundred year old bridge which links Waterford with Tipperary and which is in everyday use, may now be structurally unsound, members of Waterford County Council have warned. Councillor Jackie Fahey (F.F.) has called on

the County Council to commission a report on the conditions of Sir Thomas Bridge spanning the river Suir below the town of Clonmel. Cllr. Fahey said there is considerable concern about the structural state of the bridge and he expressed his fear of what might happen if the matter is not attended to immediately. Councillor Kieran O'Ryan (F.F.) said that while there is presently a tonnage limitation governing vehicles using the bridge it is now always adhered to. Sir Thomas Bridge was built privately, almost two hundred years ago, but over the past two decades its condition has deteriorated. Cllr. Fahey fears that the condition of the bridge may have been further weakened by a car rally which was allowed to use it a few months ago, and he believes they should seek a meeting with their neighbours South Tipperary County Council to consider the possibility of the two local authorities undertaking a joint survey of the bridge.

G.A.A. Fourmilewater Take Quarter Final Spot

At famed Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Saturday evening last Fourmilewater beat Erin's Own for a place in the Waterford senior hurling quarter final v. Lismore at Fraher Field on Sunday 27th August. At the end they had two points to spare. Sliabh gCua kept their title hopes alive when they had twelve points to spare over Boimahon at Dungarvan on Sunday evening.

A LEGAL CHALLENGE AGAINST DEPARTMENT

A legal challenge against the Department of Agriculture over their requirement for R.S.I. numbers from farmers to qualify for E. U. premia is expected to be served within a few days. The United Farmers Association has confirmed that a case against the Government is being prepared, because of the withholding of payments from farmers over the past two years. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, President of the United Farmers Association said that they were extremely disappointed that the Government have insisted that all farmers must provide an R.S.I. number to qualify for entitlements under the E. U. premiums on livestock. The President said, "I am very surprised at the course of action being taken by the Minister, because of his reported indication in the Dail earlier this year that the payments would be made, and that other procedures could be used to determine if these farmers had a tax liability or not", he said. Mr. Phelan said that the U.F.A. were left with no alternative in the circumstances but to challenge the decision of the Government to withhold the payments. Meanwhile, a formal objection by the U.F.A. to the E. U. commission in Brussels over the requirement for tax clearance for payments of more than £5,000 under E.U. Schemes in Ireland has been upheld by the Directorate General for Agriculture in the commission. The Commission informed Munster M.E.P. John Cushman that the requirement for Tax Clearance was in breach of the Treaty of Rome, and proceedings would be instituted against the Irish Government if the matter was not resolved to their satisfaction. Mr. Cushman said he believed that the requirement to supply an R.S.I. number to receive payment was also in breach of regulations.

No member of Waterford County Council Engineering department was available for comment. The County Engineer Mr. John O'Flynn acknowledged that the bridge is, by any standards a dangerous one, and has accepted the fears of the public about its stability. During the floods earlier in the year when Clonmel was cutoff by floods and no bridge in town was passable, all traffic to County Waterford was using Sir Thomas Bridge which was passable.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

Quality Milk Production

Cheese manufacturing has grown to major significance in Co. Waterford in recent years with the development of the Kilmeaden plant by Waterford Foods.

To survive in a competitive market the cheese manufacturers must aim to produce a good quality product, achieving high yields and keeping production costs to a minimum. Both the farmer and the processor have an important role in producing and processing good quality milk.

The consumers perception of quality milk includes not only hygienic production and freedom from contaminating substances, but also, milk produced from healthy cows with healthy udders.

The somatic cell count (SCC) level is of major importance. High somatic cell counts are generally the result of sub-clinical mastitis and inflammation in the udder. Somatic cells in milk are mainly white blood cells which have migrated from the blood stream to find infection in the udder, plus some other cells of udder tissue.

Milk with a high SCC has poorer manufacturing characteristics and pricing systems for milk are based largely on assessment of quality, including the SCC of milk.

EU DIRECTIVE

The EU Directive 92/46 relating to milk quality is now in operation. The majority of producers in Co. Waterford already meet the requirements of this Directive. However, one part of the Directive, which is of concern for a minority of producers is the requirement that milk must have an SCC of less than 400,000 per millimetre for the liquid market and less than 500,000 per millimetre for manufacturing. In the future this could mean that milk with a high SCC may only be used for the manufacture of animal feed products.

REDUCING CELL COUNTS

There are a number of husbandry and management practices which affect the level of clinical and sub-clinical mastitis and hence the SCC in the herd.

- Mechanical damage to teats can result from a milking machine which is not functioning correctly. In addition, a malfunctioning milking machine can propel milk back into the udder, thereby introducing bacterial infection. Vacuum levels, vacuum reserves and pulsation need to be checked at least once per year.

- Cow housing which is kept clean, dry and comfortable for cows reduces stress and the risk of udder infection. Cubicles should be scraped regularly to remove dung or damp bedding and passages should be scraped at least twice per day.

- An adequate dry period between lactations (approximately 60 days) with dry cow therapy will eliminate existing infections during the dry period.

- The milking routine can have a major effect on SCC. Udders should be clean and dry. Risk of infection may be minimised by the use of individual or disposable udder cloths. Examining the udder and fore-milk before attaching the clusters ensures that clinical cases of mastitis are detected at the earliest possible stage. Overmilking should be avoided at this causes damage and predisposes the udder to infection.

- Teat dipping (or spraying) after milking is a very effective measure to reduce the spread of micro-organisms which cause mastitis.

Holding cows in a dispersal or feeding area for 30 minutes after milking to prevent them laying down on a potential source of infection, until the teat orifice has fully contracted, will also help reduce the risk of infections.

- Testing of milk samples from individual cows is an essential course of action in herds which currently have a high SCC. Often, only a few cows in the herd are responsible and treating or culling the worst cases can have a dramatic effect.

- A good herd replacement policy is necessary so that old cows, or those with high SCC, are being regularly replaced with heifers.

- Records of all clinical cases of mastitis, records of all drugs used within the herd and other individual cow records are essential for making management decisions, and also to ensure that no trace of antibiotic gain entry to the milk supply. A major advantage of milk recording is that it enables the cell count of individual cows to be monitored on a regular basis.

KEEPING GOOD RECORDS

Good physical records are essential in successful dairy herd management — a fact that is well accepted by the majority of dairy farmers in the county.

Waterford IFA Says Yes To Partial Privatisation

Speaking at the emergency meeting of Waterford IFA County Executive held recently, Mr. Pat Murphy, County Chairman, said that farmers in Co. Waterford were angered and frustrated over the lack of an effective scheme to eradicate TB and the IVU's persistent blocking of EU funding which would reduce the burden of disease levies.

"Farmers cannot accept a continuation of the status quo with severe hardship in breakdown cases and £30m. in disease levies towards a scheme which is going nowhere, while up to £60m. in promised EU funding has been lost," Mr. Murphy said.

Furthermore, Waterford IFA fully supports and endorses the partial privatisation of the TB Eradication Scheme and our National Council representative, Mr. Gerry Murphy will be asking for open negotiations to take place with the Department of Agriculture.

The County Chairman also outlined a number of anomalies that existed with the current scheme. He said leeway must be given to farmers who, following a TB outbreak, wish to lease their milk quotas or other production quotas, even though they may be outside the allowable application date.

Important Changes In Farm Tax

There are a number of important changes which have been made in 1995 to the tax laws as they affect farmers. They are:

STOCK RELIEF

Stock relief at a rate of 25% will continue for all farmers from April 5, 1995 for a two year period. This means that stock relief will continue for tax years 1995/96 and 1996/97. The relief will not be subject to clawback.

STOCK RELIEF SCHEME FOR YOUNG FARMERS

A new stock relief scheme will be introduced for young trained farmers. Stock relief at a rate of 100% will be available to young farmers under 35 years of age who qualify for the Scheme of Installation Aid for Young Farmers, or who have commenced farming since April 6, 1993.

The relief will be available for four years from April 6, 1995 in the case of young farmers qualifying between April 6, 1993 and April 5, 1995 and four years after qualifying in the case of young farmers qualifying between April 6, 1995 and April 5, 1997. The relief will not be subject to clawback.

COMPULSORY DISPOSAL OF CATTLE

In the case of a farmer who has to dispose of his entire cattle herd due to a statutory disease eradication programme; profits arising

from the disposal of the herd will be excluded in calculating income tax purposes for the tax year in which the disposal takes place. These profits will instead be deemed to arise in two equal instalments in each of the next two tax years. In lieu of the normal 25% stock relief, a farmer will be allowed to elect for stock relief of 100% in the two year deferral period. The relief will only apply to the proceeds reinvested in replacement stock.

Backdated — This special treatment will also be backdated to apply to compulsory disposals which took place on or after April 6, 1993. The relief is restricted in that the entire cattle herd has to be disposed of, the only exception is where the disposal is due to brucellosis.

CAPITAL ACQUISITIONS TAX

Capital Acquisitions Tax embraces both tax on gifts and inheritances. A very valuable relief available to farmers is that of Agricultural Relief. Agricultural Relief allows farmers who qualify by meeting stringent conditions, to reduce the value of agricultural assets passing to them.

The first £300,000 of land and buildings may be reduced by 80% in the case of a gift and 65% in the case of an inheritance. This means that £100,000 worth of land and buildings passing to a farmer who may avail of Agricultural Relief is reduced to a taxable value of £20,000 in the case of a gift and £35,000 in the case of an inheritance.

If the market value of land and buildings passing by way of gift or inheritance is in excess of £300,000, the excess value over £300,000 may be reduced in value by 50%. This has been increased from 30%.

Livestock and Machinery — The 1994 Finance Act introduced the concept of allowing a reduction in value of 25% in the value of livestock and machinery by way of gift/inheritance. This relief has been increased to 50%.

COMPULSORY PURCHASE ORDERS

Roll over relief allows a business person/farmer who has a capital gain to reinvest proceeds into other business assets in order to postpone the payment of the capital gains tax bill. If the asset being disposed of is regarded as development land, this relief was not available. The

1995 change is that farmers whose land is acquired under a Compulsory Purchase Order for road building or road widening purposes, will be allowed defer a capital gains tax bill on that proportion of the amount received from the local authority which is reinvested in agricultural land or buildings. This change is to take place from April 6, 1995. It is regrettable that farmers who have disposed of land in previous years will not be allowed this relief. I understand that IFA are making strong representations in this regard.

Value Added Tax — There are no changes proposed in the VAT rates and the flat rate VAT rates and the flat rate VAT refund to unregistered farmers is to remain unchanged at 2.5%.

Residential Property Tax — The changes introduced in the 1994 Finance Act have, to a great extent, been reversed in 1995. The market value threshold at which Residential Property Tax becomes payable is being increased from £75,000 to £94,000 while the income threshold is being increased from £25,000 to £29,000.

VERY HIGH LEVEL OF FREEMARTINISM IN IMPORTED CATTLE

The ICMSA has recommended farmers purchasing imported heifers to ensure that they are not Freemartins. ICMSA have received reports that up to 50 per cent of some batches of imported calves have been confirmed to be Freemartins, with huge losses being incurred by the farmers concerned.

The fact that the level of Freemartinism is up to 20 times more common in imported calves suggests that these non-fertile animals are being dumped on the Irish market.

This is totally unacceptable

and it also raises major questions about the origin of these animals and the disease status of these animals.

Farmers purchasing imported animals should seek guarantees that the animals are not Freemartins and if in doubt a veterinary examination should be carried out by the farmer's vet.

ICMSA is carrying out an assessment of the level of Freemartinism in imported cattle and would welcome farmers who have purchased such animals to contact John Quigley, ICMSA Eastern Organiser (05122303).



HURLING STYLES

Do you think that every county has its own distinctive hurling style? Its own combination of skills and attitudes and approaches to the game which distinguishes it from its rivals? Or that some counties share the same style?

Waterford's style, at its best is a very attractive and entertaining one. It combines good ground hurling, speed, neat combined forward play, fine accurate striking and a vigorous approach. An effective mix surely and one which Cork men, Tipp men, Kilkenny men, Wexford men have admired over many years, who have lauded the spectacle produced by a well drilled Deise fifteen. I have happy memories of the warmth of the welcome afforded a Waterford team whenever we played in Croke Park. One Dublin official among others was a confirmed fan of ours. "Tis great to see the white and blue jerseys" he used to say in greeting, "ye don't come up half often enough". When again I wonder?

Tipperary's style was (is), shall we say, rather abrasive. A great Tipp star and a friend of mine Donie Nealon admitted to me once, their backs didn't stand on ceremony but they stood on everything else! Ground hurling was an integral part of Tipp's style and, to my mind, the most powerful and effective aspect of their play in 1987 when they made the great break through after years in the hurling wilderness. That year, and for a couple of years afterwards, they were the best ground strikers in Ireland. Then I noticed a departure from that style with greater emphasis on lift handle, run, pass which I respectfully suggest didn't suit their temperament not bring them success.

I must unashamedly confess to a great regard for the Kilkenny style. Economy of effort, that's what it is. They have a broader range of skills than other counties an muster and are astute readers of play. Nowadays Offaly can be equated with Kilkenny's best because there is no noticeable difference between the types of hurling played by those great neighbours and rivals. One has only to thing back on his year's Leinster final to see how Offaly outplayed Kilkenny at their own game. The assured tackling great vision, title touches, flicks, nudges, calm control, legitimate use of physical presence, awareness, ground striking - all Kilkenny characteristics - were exhibited to perfection by the faithful County. The bigger challenge the more Offaly responded. Donn Cregan has stamped his mark on em - firm discipline and meticulous at-

tention to basic skills like ground hurling - just as Kilkenny man Dermot Healy's influence on them was huge when he first crossed the border and took over some 15 years ago. What both men have done - and Ger Loughnane has achieved it with Clare too - is to come to an appreciation of their own intrinsic worth by the players, get them thinking deeply about their game and seeking to improve every aspect of it. The quickening up process underlines every skill drill and practice. They have learned when to use the hand pass and hurley pass to their advantage (Clare's third goal last Sunday exemplified this with the "Sparrow" driving a fine ground shot to the Galway net) "Showing" for a pass, moving before attempting to play a ball from the hand. Not for them the slavish worship of the asinine "go" where the player in possession seems possessed by demons and goes careering off in the general direction of the opponents goal to indulge his headless chicken instinct. Mind you Clare are still inclined to do a little too much running, carrying the ball straight on and into trouble against good half back lines and only Galway's limitations as a team last Sunday allowed the Banners occasional ill advised sortie to go unpunished. Tighter marking which they can expect from Offaly backs in the All Ireland may force Clare to shoot from further out if they wish to crown this historic year on the first Sunday in September. Wexford always played manly hurling and I had great admiration and affection for their strapping athletic hurlers of the 50's and 60's - the Rackhards, the Morrissey's, the Kehoe's, English, Wheeler and Flood were fine exponents of hurling. From the 70's up to the present day their game has involved into an over-reliance on lifting, running and passing with the ground strike almost completely ignored. The simple option is seldom taken and it would seem that basic skills don't get a high priority. For all their penchant for lifting even that particular skill has often betrayed them. Martin Story's failure to execute it and lift a ball near the Kilkenny goal when the game was theirs with only a minute left set in train a series of swift Kilkenny counter-attacking moves which culminated in D.J. Carey scoring a precious goal to snatch the Leinster Cup from the Model County's grasp. Remember? A simple basic skill, lifting, was all that needed to be done to send Wexford on their way to Croke Park on All Ireland day.

ST. DECLAN'S WAY

The announcement of the opening of St. Declan's Way from Ardmore to Cashel is a big step in the right direction, restoring the old road can't have been easy and great credit is due to everyone involved, not least the landowners who have shown great concern for the heritage entrusted to their care.

To make use of it requires that you be fit, so it will be interesting to see if it encourages the formation of a "walking" group in the area. Regular use is the best chance we have that roads such as this will remain open rather than backslide into the pages of a text book.

The Affane to Lismore section has been altered for some reason, over and above the restrictions of rivers, fordes, etc. It is signposted along the main road, Cappoquin-Lismore, bypassing the saint's birthplace in Dromroe Upper, in the parish of Cappoquin. If it were routed through Dromroe it would link with Bothar na Naomh, the Saints road and Rian Bo Phádraig, through Bridane to Fountain and perhaps Kilwatermoy. It is hoped that this excursion along the main Cappoquin-Lismore road is no more than a temporary sidetrack and that those responsible for signposting, etc. will, in the interest of accuracy, re-route

the "Way" and restore Magh Sceine in the land of the Scoti, the birthplace of

St. Declan to its rightful place.

Religín Deaglán, the church site in Dromroe, has been cleaned over the last several months and Mass was celebrated on the site for perhaps the first time in ages on Monday, July 24 by Fr. Connie Kelleher, Cappoquin, assisted by Fr. Eamonn Sweeney. Fr. Kelleher gave a very interesting talk on the history of the site in earlier times and the interment of infants, famine victims and freedom fighters over the last 150 years.

During the course of the Mass Fr. Kelleher consecrated the site as a Christian burial place. A single bouquet of flowers was left anonymously on the site — it would be nice to think that whoever left them will feel happier now that the site is a burial site recognised by the Church.

The Mass was attended by approximately 100 neighbours and friends in Dromroe and surrounding areas. After Mass, a workhouse meal to a recipe by Sir Richard Musgrave, Chairman of the Workhouse Committee, was served to remind families of the true nature of the landlords answer to starvation.

Many people have expressed regret that they missed the occasion and if it

would be entirely possible to have Mass there again. Fr. Kelleher, or indeed any priest, would be delighted to hear from you.

The assistance of the landowner, Billy Walsh, Lismore, and Pa Griffin, Bawnmore in sharing his knowledge of the site, has to be acknowledged because without them none of this would have been possible.

Thanks also to Denn's, Carrigeen, for the Barley, Michael Landers for supplying the peas and cooking the meal, Jack and Eileen Geoghegan, Ballyea for providing transport and refreshments, Liam Barry, Tubrid for gateposts, etc., Arthur Butler, Cappoquin (Blacksmith) for the work he did on the gate; the 16th Waterford Scouts, Cappoquin, for the altar and canopy; Berry Walsh, Cappoquin, for amplification, and to everyone who came along on the night — if we have missed anyone, please accept our apologies. Anyone who would like to be involved in the further restoration and maintenance of the old church site are invited to contact Angela or myself.

This group was set up with the intention of producing a photographic record of all the sites known on the Ordnance Survey, Sites and Monuments Record (SMR) of 1988 and adding to that list where possible. The

level of interest shown by people talking about things they knew or their parents/grandparents told them, or by asking for a read of the photocopied accounts of various sites is very encouraging.

Anyone who would like to take their interest a step further (age or physical ability is not a consideration) might like to know that the Department of Archaeology, UCC, would be very keen to hold classes leading to a Certificate in Irish Archaeology, locally. The course covers from the Ice Age to the Medieval. The course is designed so that every topic is covered in non-technical, easy to understand language, with practical demonstrations of flint working, pottery making, etc.

Not everyone will want to go that far, so don't lose interest — it is your memory and experiences which we are attempting to record from folk tales, like the Ghost of Harry Hurton on Carraig a Bhadra in Killahalla to the underground passage you discovered as a child, or the life of the Spalpeens, the Tadghs from the Beara peninsula who migrated here as farm labourers in the early 1940's — how many O'Sullivan's are descendants of those men.

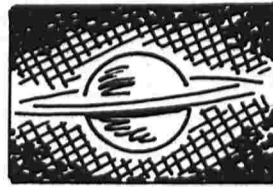

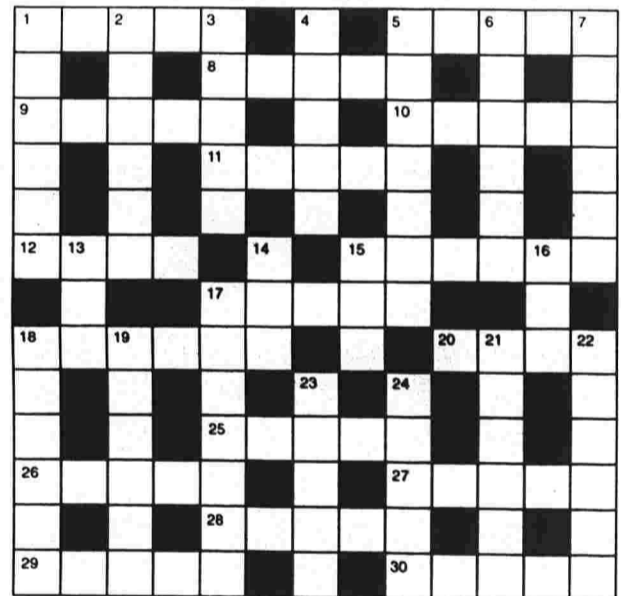

The World Athletics Championships 1995

(By Pacemaker)

Carl Lewis, Leroy Burrell, Colin Jackson, Mark McCoy, Sally Gunnell, Frank O'Meara, Catherina McKiernan — they're all big names in the athletics world and sadly they are probably the biggest names who aren't in action at this year's athletic answer to Féile — the Fifth World Athletic Championships being held this year in the Swedish city of Gothenburg, the fourth European venue to stage the games.

It all started ominously for the Irish team losing national long jump record holder Jonathan Kron who tested positive for a banned substance at last month's Salamanca Grand Prix. After setting a new Irish record of 7.79 metres, the 23-year-old Dubliner volunteered for a dope test not realising that a painkiller he had taken for a leg injury days before was on the banned list. His next action will be in three months time when his suspension ends.

MACHADO MAKES GOOD SATURDAY, AUGUST 5 (DAY 1)

In searing afternoon heat, Portugal took the first gold medal of the World Games thanks to a superb performance from Manuela Machada who held off Romania's Anita Coduno and Italy's Ornella Ferrara to win the women's marathon. It took her a personal best time of 2 hours, 25 minutes and 39 seconds to complete the 26 miles plus course, resulting in suggestions that the course was too short. However long the distance was, it was a performance which continued Portugal's excellent record in the marathon with Machada following in the footsteps of such greats as Carlos Lopez and Rosa Mota.

The men's 100m. lost another medal hope when the USA's Dennis Mitchell pulled up with a hamstring injury in his first round heat, leaving an unlikely pairing of Maurice Greene and Mike Marsh flying the stars and stripes in the event.

Now, compared to her rivals, German women's shot putter Astrid Kumbernuss comes across as being quite willowy — more like a track athlete than those formidably large throwers we've got used to over the last 20 years or so. This fact didn't stop her from winning a shot putt race which she led from start to finish. And what of the Irish? UCD scholar, David Mathews put in an excellent showing in the men's 800m. heats but got edged out into fourth place — we'll hear a lot more from him, that's for sure. Noel Berkeley

took part in a 10,000 semi-final which saw a new championship record of 27:29:06 for Kenya's Josephat Merchat; Berkeley came in well down the field, two minutes later.

BAILEY'S COMET SUNDAY, AUGUST 6 (DAY 2)

Something very unusual happened in the men's 100m. semi-final, athletic's most famous grandad, Linford Christie didn't win — in fact he finished fourth. As Bruny Surin surged to victory the king of sprints, Olympic, World, European and Commonwealth Champion, Christie (have I left anything out?) pulled up just past the line clutching his calf — the hamstring bug claiming another victim. A lesser man would have given in, but not Linford. He lined up for the final, unusually in lane 1, a position he hadn't been slow enough to be in for years.

In the 1991 decider, six men went under ten seconds, today it was just one, 21 year old Donovan Bailey of Canada with a respectable time of 9.97, his compatriot, Bruny Surin second, and surprise package Ado Boldon of Trinidad third. The head-on replay said it all about Christie, he blinked during the race, something he never does. The moment he crossed the line he needed treatment for his injury. End of an era? Don't know, but 10.12 in 100m. for a grandad with a bad leg — not bad!

In only her third race of the year, Gail Devers retained her 100m. hurdles title by inflicting a first defeat of the season on Kazakstan's Olga Shishigina, as former British champion Fiona May, now an Italian, won the women's long jump. Favourites, Jackie Joyner-Kersey and Heike Dreschler finished sixth and ninth respectively.

Marathon supervisor Carl-Gustav Tollemer won on the brink of tears when he said that the athletes should have run an extra lap of the Ullevi Stadium before setting out yesterday. Ireland's Mark Mandy failed to progress to the men's high jump final.

And if you're into omens, when Eamonn Coughlan grabbed gold in the Worlds in 1983 and when Sonia O'Sullivan won silver in 1993, Tony O'Donoghue described the action for RTE making O'Donoghue the only Irish broadcaster ever to commentate Irish success at the World Championships. So, if he'll be commenting on Sonia O'Sullivan later this week . . . ?

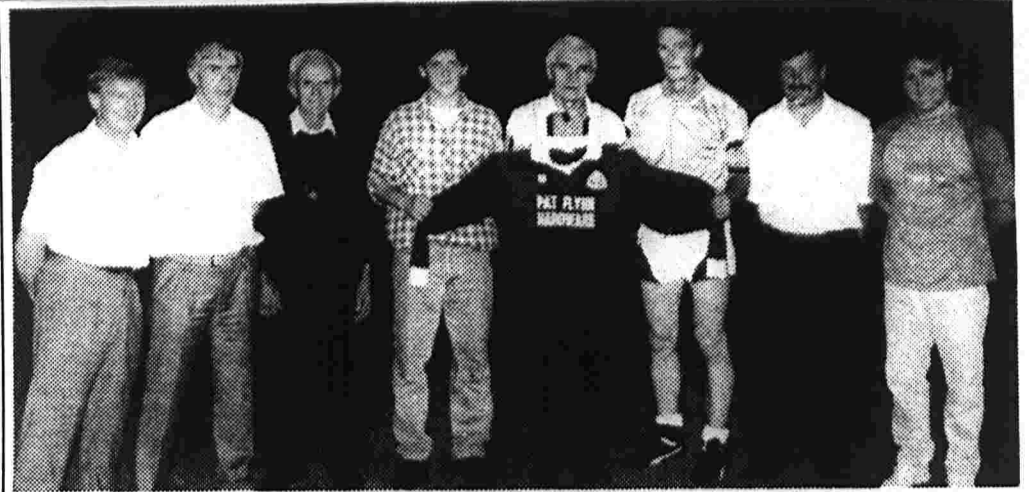

G.A.A. NOTES

BY "COMMENTATOR"

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

P. J. Ryan, chairman presided at last week's meeting of the county board which was held at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan.

MINUTES

Arising out of the minutes of the previous meeting, Con Murphy, Dunhill referred to an accusation made about a member of his club, following the reading of the Disciplinary committee report at the last meeting. He asked if the apology demanded had been offered or was forthcoming. The county chairman said that it was not his responsibility to apologise for a statement in a report from a sub-committee. He said the club concerned were asked to comment on the matter and as far as he was aware, no response had been made from the club. Following some argument on the subject the Dunhill delegate asked if the matter could be raised at the next meeting and the chairman replied in the affirmative.

CORRESPONDENCE

An application from Datai O'Brien, Geraldines club referred to his twelve months suspension following an incident in the county junior hurling final last year. He said that ten months of the term had been served and he requested a remission of the remaining two. The request was granted unanimously.

THREE TIMES TO THURLES

A matter that was the source of considerable inconvenience to quite a big number of our supporters who had to travel three times in the same week to Thurles for championship games, was referred to by James Tobin who said it was 'an utter disgrace' on the part of the Munster Council who had the authority to fix our junior hurling and minor football championship games for the same evening, rather than having them on Wednesday evening and Thursday evening, both at Thurles where Waterford had played the minor provincial final three days before. The chairman said that strong representations were made to the council on the matter, but their hands were tied. It was Clare, in fact who would not agree to the charge because a player was getting married.

ADVANCE BOOKING OF SEATS

The meeting approved of an Executive Committee recommendation, to sell 500 seats in the new Walsh Park stand at £500 each for

ten years. This will raise a quarter of a million pounds towards the cost of the redevelopment at the county ground. Also, the meeting gave approval to the proposition to sell 300 seats at Fraher field at £150 each for a period of five years.

CHILDREN IN THE STAND

In the Executive Committee report to the meeting, reference was made to the problem of the control of children in certain sections of the stand. The point was made that children attending games should be under the control of an adult relative, as the board are not liable in respect of injuries in such cases. A proposition that a chief steward be appointed on a certain section of the stand be restricted, are also to be examined.

MEETING OF P.R.O.'S

County P.R.O. Brendan Tobin gave an update on the activities of the Communications Committee and informed the meeting that all the club P.R.O.'s will be brought together on Tuesday August 29th, to be given an update on the progress being made with the publication of the County Year Book 1995.

POC FADA

Jimmy O'Gorman reported on the above event which had been organised by Brendan Tobin and himself and he said it was very successful from their point of view. He thanked the other people who helped in running the event which was won by Michael Beresford, Colligan. The county chairman thanked the eleven competitors who turned up and made the competition very interesting on the night. He congratulated Michael Beresford on winning the Munster final of the event and wished him success in the national final which was due to be played on the Cooley mountains on the August week-end. Waterford Crystal were thanked for their sponsorship of the competition.

COISDE NA PEIL REPORT

This report complained about the decision of the previous county board, that the selectors in all the football grades be elected by the board, rather than by Coisde na Peil as has been the practice for many years. It reported on the success of the summer camps which were being very well run and were attracting bigger numbers than ever. On the matter of finance, they recommended that while the county are badly in need of

finance that the official mileage allowance be reduced from 25 to 15 pence per mile.

Nicholas MacCraith made the point that Coisde na Peil were not entitled to submit reports, as they were no longer in existence, not having been re-elected in accordance with bye-law in March of this year.

HOME AND AWAY

Negotiations are to begin immediately with the other five counties who will be asked to enter into a home and away agreement with Waterford for all championship games (except senior finals). This was given unanimous approval, but delegates stressed that all games involved would have to be for a named venue that would be acceptable. It was accepted that risks are involved, but members felt that what is 'lost on the swings, would be gained on the roundabout' and our home games would bring business to the county.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The county Treasurer, James Walsh gave an up to date account of the financial position of the board. He said it was a mammoth task in trying to match the income of the board, with the expenditure. He was hopeful that the returns from the Golf Classic and from our gates for the remainder of the year, would considerably help to bring down our overdraft. He was critical of Croke Park for being slow to pay our national league money, while at the same time, demanding that All Ireland tickets, etc., be paid for in advance.

The county chairman gave a briefing on meetings with the bank about borrowings for the development work, etc. Again he spoke about the need to reduce our day to day running costs if we are to reduce the overdraft. He said the recent Golf Classic was a great success, thanks to the organisers and the many clubs and firms, who had become involved. A number of delegates whose clubs were not involved, promised a contribution to the Golf Classic fund.

REPORTS

Reports from the various selection committees were read. The senior and Under 21 football committee said that three Munster finals in a row had been reached by the Under 21 footballers and that as a result, the senior teams of the future will benefit. The unavailability of players because of club engagements was men-

tioned. They thanked the board officers, etc. for their assistance and support.

The minor football report was a very lengthy document which covered every single phase of activity since this committee took office last year. The very detailed report told of every game played against the various counties, some in the other provinces and said the team were hard done by in the game against Tipperary. The report was critical of the referee and asked that the Munster council delegates take note for future reference. The loss of a player only nine minutes into the replay had been a very severe blow and the report went on to deal with what might have been, had they been able to finish with a full team, as Tipperary went on to win the Munster final.

The Under 21 hurlers reported on their hard luck against Clare in the Munster final and strongly complained about some members of the panel not being available because of their involvement with another county team. They were satisfied that the standard of hurling in this grade, augurs for the future of Waterford hurling.

The county chairman thanked all the outgoing selection committees for their efforts on behalf of the board and gave an assurance to the incoming selectors that the county finals would be played in advance of the start of the national leagues in October.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

The share-out of the national league monies gave Waterford the following:-

Hurling — £20,870; Football £10,161. In addition there was the normal grant of £2,000 from the Church and General sponsorship and £1,500 for winning division 2 of the hurling league.

Disappointment was expressed by delegates when told that the county by county share-out of the Guinness sponsorship money will not amount to much more than £2,000 per county unless a claim is made in cases where special work is being done for hurling development.

From the £450,000 sponsorship, £100,000 will go to the provincial councils, £50,000 for the administration of the sponsorship, £75,000 for the teams who progress in the championship and the remainder for various hurling develop-

ment projects, etc.

OTHER COUNTY BOARD ITEMS

The demands on players for club championship games, was referred to by Paddy Fitzgerald and James Tobin, who judged it to be unfair that a player who plays with the county, is required to play club championship on a night or two afterwards. They said that if a player cannot play with his club for six or seven days before a county game, that consideration should be given to the club when the same player is called upon for duty in the immediate aftermath of the county game. The chairman pointed out the problems associated with the sorting out of this one, but said it would be looked at.

Strong condemnation of the decision to allow Feile to go ahead at Pairc Uí Caoimh on the August week-end, was voiced by James Tobin

who expressed his concern about the worsening drug problem and he was strongly supported by Nicholas MacCraith who described it as a disgrace and against the Association principles.

MINOR

WITHDRAWALS

Concern was expressed by the board chairman, Paddy Walsh over the week-end at the number of withdrawals from the minor hurling championship. Four of the 14 clubs have withdrawn. Stradbally, Ardmore, Dungarvan and Clashmore.

With Dungarvan out of the 'A' championship all that remain are Lismore, Tallow and Abbeyside. All three are involved in the knock-out stage, but realistically, the game between Lismore and Tallow which is scheduled for tonight, is the western final and this game should be treated as the final.

 crucial, also Mr. Gerard Enright, County Enterprise Board, Mr. Michael Power, Waterford Development Partnership and of course Mr. Tom McAuliffe, Area Manager, IDA who has spent a lot of time in Dungarvan over the past twelve months to satisfy himself and senior staff of the IDA that the erection of an Advance Factory was justified in Dungarvan.

Since the Chamber's first Industrial Committee was set up in 1990 an Advance Factory was seen as vital in attracting further industry into Dungarvan. Pressure was kept up by the Chamber and about a year ago the Chamber decided to seek professional help with a view to strengthening our application for an Advance Factory.

John KcKeon and Jerry Kelly of Strategic Management Services, conducted a series of seminars with the Chamber of Commerce, the County Enterprise Board and Waterford Develop-

ment Partnership participating. An in-depth analysis of the local economy was carried out. Strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats were exhaustively analysed and a strategy to attract inward investment to Dungarvan was adopted.

An economic profile of Dungarvan and its environs has been drawn up to be included in an attractive brochure for the perusal of potential investors.

A fixed line of communication between the partners and the IDA has been established and a number of site visits per year has been agreed with the IDA.

Also, a panel is being set up from which appropriate expertise can be drawn as required to meet potential investors who may visit the area.

The successful application for this Advance Factory underlines the effectiveness of co-operation between various bodies with the single purpose of promoting the economic well-being of our town.
