

Scheme Workers' Access **To Unique Union Branch**

40,000 FAS Community Employment (CE) workers in the Irish workforce. Since the introduction of the Social Employment Scheme in 1985 to combat the rising levels of longterm unemployment, the plight of scheme workers has been acute. Over the course of the decade, hundreds of thousands of Irish people have participated. Nearly every person in the country has family, friends or neighbours who have joined a scheme as a pathway to full employment.

But successive Governments have ignored the gross discrimination of these workers knowing that if their rights were recognised and redressed, the costs would have to be funded. Unions too, have been slow to represent and fight for scheme workers out of fear that viable jobs were being filled by parttime employment schemes. Now some things are changing. Unions, while not accepting schemes as a substitute for full-time work, are recognising that CE workers must develop their own policies, and strategies. The Amalgamated Transport and General Workers' Union has pio-neered a dedicated branch for scheme workers offering the complete and comprehensive range of benefits and services that their other Union members receive including access to their innovative legal services and a

MARGINALISED SCHEME WORKERS

CE workers are low paid, part-time workers who are forced to operate outside of the normal categories of workers protections and benefits. The sad reality is that while CE workers are treated as normal staff in terms of taxation, responsibilities and duties, they are treated as second class cheap labour when it comes to benefits and protections.

Question: What does life cover (mortgage protec-

Answer: In the event of one party dying the mortgage is cleared!

Question: How does property insurance work? Answer: In the event of there being a claim, i.e., fire, storm damage, a sum of money would be paid promptly.

Question: What does an endowment loan mean? Answer: One pays interest only on their mortgage for the duration of the term.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My pension is paid through an insurance company and it is sent to me from their head office in England each month. I presently receive £195 per month after tax and PRSI deductions. As I am over 66 should I be paying PRSI?

ANSWER

The PRSI deduction from your pension is just the two levies, the 1.25% Health Contribution and the 1% Employment and Training Levy. However, you are exempt from paying these levies as your income is less than £178 per week. So, you should advise the insurance company that these PRSI deductions are incorrect. They should record you at the M Class of PRSI and refund you the PRSI deducted since 6th April 1995.

You should check your P60's for 1993 and 1994 to see if the levies were deducted for those years. You would have been exempt if your income was less than £173 per week. If these levies were deducted you can claim a refund by sending copies of your P60's to: Department of Social Welfare, PRSI Refunds Section, O'Connell Bridge House, D'Olier Street, Dublin 2.

How To Take Good Cuttings

Sitting out in the garden on a warm August evening with the chores all done is the pledge that every gardener makes when labouring over the winter digging.



the reality is that there is always something to be done when the gar-

den is at its peak and, in truth, keen gardeners don't mind at all!

One of the most rewarding jobs at this time is taking cuttings, not only because of the satisfaction of growing new plants for next year's pots, boxes, baskets and beds, but also saving money.

To take a cutting from a suitable variety, make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and strip off the lower leaves before neatly firming into a tray or pot of cutting compost.

You don't have to use rooting compost but beware of over-watering and moist conditions — mould and rot can soon set in.

Place the cuttings in a sunny and airy spot and they should soon take.

JOBS TO DO

Apart from this on-going job for the month, there are many other 'pottering' jobs:

Dead-heading — cut away spent blooms on roses, dahlias and chrysanthemums to ensure a constant supply of new buds and blooms.

- Clipping keep hedges neatly trimmed and end the month with a final neat cut before autumn.
- Autumn planting it's depressing to think summer will soon be gone but don't let it put you off preparing sites and locations for autumn planting.
 Non-container grown shrubs and trees will need thorough site work.
- Bulb preparation spring bulbs need to go in soon, so prepare the ground as you lift hippeastrum bulbs and lily bulbs at the end of their flowering season.
- Vegetables planting of brassicas brussels, broccoli and cabbage - should be completed. Onions should also be about ready for lifting and, once thoroughly brushed clean of soil and dried, can be plaited and hung in the kitchen until needed.
- Herbs if you grow your own then start gathering on dry days for bunching and drying by laying in an airing cupboard.

Turning to more major jobs, this is a good time to repair the lawn either by patching or cutting and turning damaged sections or by re-seeding bad sections.

COMPOST

A new lawn can also be seeded providing the area has been broken up, laced with well rotted compost or manure and then raked thoroughly a few weeks before sowing.

Sow the seed to the recommended density of the mixture you have chosen and then lightly rake the soil over them.

Most seed is treated with bird repellent but foil strips and netting are advisable as added insurance.

WELL BREAD TARTS

We've used crisply baked bread cases in place of the usual pastry, for these tasty egg tartlets.

Ingredients:

6 large slices wholewheat bread'

4 oz (100g) butter

3 eggs, beaten 2 fl oz (50ml) single cream

2 oz (50g) sweetcom 1 tsp (1x5ml spoon) parsley, chopped

Salt and pepper



Method

Cut the bread into 12x6.5 cm (21/2 in) circles. Melt 3 oz (75g) of butter and dip bread circles into it. Use to line greased patty tins, pressing circles well in. Bake at 350°F, 180°C, gas

Mark 4, for 15-20 minutes until the bread has formed crisp golden cases.

Meanwhile melt remaining butter in a saucepan, add cream and beaten eggs and stir until scrambled.

Add the sweetcorn and seasoning just before the egg mixture is cooked. Pile mixture into bread cases and serve hot. Or, allow egg mixture to cool before filling the cases and serve cold.

lieve the problem in the activities and the recent area", said Mr. O'Flynn who added that the commencement of the work would naturally depend on the agreement of the local fishermen.



Respond Housing Development On Stream

Ms. Liz McManus, T.D., Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal has announced that she has approved a proposal, from the voluntary body Respond, under her Department's Rental Subsidy Scheme, to provide 14 dwellings at Riverstown, Tramore.

This Scheme provides 100% capital loans and ongoing subsidy for approved voluntary/non profit housing bodies to assist them in the provision of family-type accommodation for low income households.

The Minister praised the initiative taken by Respond and Waterford County Council in bringing this project to fruition and said that it represents a further example of what is being

achieved through partnership between the voluntary sector and local authorities.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

MAINTAINING MILK YIELDS

Grass Growth has been satisfactory over the past few weeks and cows are milking well. The mid August target for spring-calving cows is slightly under four gallons. Every effort should be made to maintain performance as a lot of valuable milk can be produced over the next

Grazing Height—The post grazing stubble height in paddocks should be about 3" forcing cows to graze much tighter at this stage in the lactation will depress yields too much and result in short lactations. The response to nitrogen is still good for another three weeks.

Meal supplementation, if yields are slipping at about 2 kgs./cow is about the right amount to feed. The economic response from feeding up to 4 kgs. is about break even and even then should only be contemplated by those within the quota.

PLANNING AUTUMN GRASS

Preparation for having good quality grass in September/October must start this week. Paddocks grazed during the last week of August are likely to be those grazed for the last time in late October - early November. If these happen to be your driest, things are ok but if they are your wettest you should try to make the necessary adjustments to your rotation cycle over the next six weeks. All paddocks must get a good grazing (with dry cows, store cattle or sheep) or topping to about 2 1/2".

Spread about 35 - 40 units nitrogen/acre on all paddocks and try to extend the grazing cycle to 35 to 40 days. This extension of the rotation cycle will allow grass to build up but you must resist the temptation of applying too much nitrogen (50 - 60 units) in the hope of producing a lot of grass - this will cause lodging and produce a poor quality sward.

Extending the rotation is not easy on well stocked farms, but options to consider for increasing the grazing areas per cow include disposal of saleable drystock, tightening up on dry cows or ewes, meal feeding finishing cattle, thereby reducing their grazing requirements.

Utilisation—To achieve good utilisation, a roadway and easy access is essential. Subdivision of the normal paddock into three grazings and the use of a back fence will reduce the amount of walking and sward damage. There is a wide range of temporary fencing accessories and quick fit water couplings available in most hardware or co-op stores to make this subdivision easier and to reduce the risk of getting an electric shock on some wet October evenings.

TEMPORARY LEASING OF MILK QUOTA

With cows milking well and milk deliveries running over quota, there is an unprecedented demand for milk quota. Many farmers in the 30000 to 50000 gallon category failed to get quota under the first phase of this year's scheme. Many of these relied on temporary leased quota in previous years and now find themselves very vulnerable.

To take some of the pressure off these, the Minister has decided that producers in the 30000 to 50000 gallon category should have priority in the second phase of the scheme along with those in the under 30000 gallon category. These producers should now apply to their Co-Op.

Even though the closing date is the 30th September, the sooner applications are sent in, the better as it gives more times to the Co-Op, to follow up any producers unlikely to fill their quota. As the demand will probably exceed supply by up to 2 to 1, each producer has to assess his own situation very carefully.

APPLICATION OF LIME

Some years ago it was estimated by Johnstown Castle, research staff that an annual usage of 2 million tonnes of lime is needed to maintain soil pH levels and bring deficient soils up to the desired level over a period of years. The annual usage has been running at well under 1 million tonnes for several years now.

Lime/Nitrogen Relationship—in grassland, the main benefit of liming is the release of soil nitrogen. Heavy applications of chemical nitrogen fertilisers will mask the effect of soil nitrogen released and therefore the liming effect will not be apparent. At low nitrogen use (30 kgs/.acre) liming could be expected to release about 50 units of nitrogen per acre per year and this will have a similar effect to the application of an additional 50 units

of nitrogen per acre.

Where pH has been brought up to the recommended level, it will not be necessary to relime again for up to ten years, depending on soil type. The extra grass output from the release of soil nitrogen will pay for the cost of liming where the level of chemical nitrogen use is low

or medium up to 160 units/acre.

County Waterford ICMSA

The County Waterford Executive of ICMSA was represented at a recent ICMSA National Council meeting by John Dowley, Tom Hickey and Anne Kirwan. The main items discussed at that meeting were the court's finding of the 4.5% reduction on milk quotas, animal disease programme and ICMSA/ACC Bank loan scheme for milk quota purchase.

The National Council re-

jected the European Court's finding on the ICMSA 4.5% quota case.

ICMSA and ACC Bank have designed a special loan scheme for farmers buying milk quota under the restructuring scheme. The ICMSA/ACC Bank scheme has a very competitive interest rate of 9.25 per cent combined with a delayed repayment of interest and capital for up to one year and nine months.

The President Tom O'Dwyer told the National Council that the loan scheme and the quota subsidy provides the best help todate for farmers wishing to buy quota. Mr. O'Dwyer said that the delay in paying the subsidy for last years scheme caused cash flow problems for many farmers and that ICMSA will be pressing that this does not occur this year.

He continued, "farmers qualifying for the quota subsidy and borrowing over 5 years can opt to make no re-payments during 1995 and 1996 and the first repay-ment will fall due in May 1997. The repayments normally due in 1995 and 1996 will be met by the subsidy which the farmer will assign to the ACC Bank. This means that a farmer will have the benefit of the additional quota for the 1995/96 and the 1996/97 milk quota years without having to make a repayment from his milk cheque. This will be an advantage to farmers who may have existing repayment commitments or who may have to borrow to purchase additional cows to fill the extra quota.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that the ICMSA/ACC Bank scheme is also designed for farmers who purchase quotas but who do not qualify for a subsidy. "Under this loan scheme these farmers may defer repayments until May 1996 and continue to receive the benefit of the 9.25 per cent rate."

Farmers can avail of this loan scheme by contacting their Co-op or local ACC Bank branch.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that he hoped that all the quota will

be allocated under the restructuring scheme within the next few days and that the subsidy scheme applications for this year should be processed early so that payment of the subsidy can be made in 1995.

There was a full discussion on animal disease at the Council meeting and the Council felt that farmers needing a test should not be held up.

Waterford IFA Issues Grading Advice

At the last meeting of the Waterford IFA County Executive, the problem of downgrading of heifers for slaughter was discussed. It emerged that many top quality heifers are being classed by meat factories as cull cows, resulting in losses of up to £100 a head for some farmers.

Waterford IFA County Chairman, Pat Murphy advised farmers that when sending in this type of animal to factories they should accompany them to slaughter to ensure proper grading.

"Should farmers fail to have their animals properly graded, the matter should immediately be brought to the attention of the County Executive", he concluded.

Waterford I.F.A. Dairy Chairman Warns Of Likely Superlevy Fine for 1995/96

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Gerald Curran, said that as announced by the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates, Irish dairy farmers will pay a bill of £4.075m.,ngover-production to the tune of 2.9m gallons. "This is well down on earlier expectations, thanks to strenuous efforts by dairy farmers and coops to minimise the national superlevy exposure," the IFA man said.

It is a significant bill nonetheless, and I do not underestimate the hardship it will create for individual farmers penalised for overproduction. I would like to remind these dairy farmers that IFA negotiated with AIB a low cost finance plan to help them schedule penalty payments over a period of up to 5 years," he said.

Mr. Curran also warned

Mr. Curran also warned that the significant overdeliveries in the peak milk production period of April to July 1995 would be very difficult to compensate for later in the quota year. "Concerns that this year's superlevy bill may be worse than last year are very real, as the most recent national figures show that supplies at the end of June outstripped quota by a 4.7%," he said. "I call on all dairy farmers to plan production cautiously to eliminate their own and therefore the national exposure to superlevy penalties this year," he added.

He further called on the Department of Agriculture to establish urgently a Management Information System to allow Irish dairy farmers keep track of their butterfat quota, just as they do of their superlevy quota. "The national maximum level of 3.58% is bound to become increasingly tight, and it is critical for farmers and co-ops to get a handle on their butterfat quota to be able to plan production," he said

Finally the Waterford IFA | added Mr. Heskin.

Dairy Chairman welcomed Minister epositive response to the IFA request that temporary quota be exceptionally made available to those small to medium producers just over 30,000 gallons who normally rely on the scheme, but had been unable to avail of it in the first phase.

"Non-Contract" Malting Barley Worth £20 Per Tonne Premium Over Feed Says IFA Grain Leader

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Grain Committee, Alex Heskin has said that malting barley outside of the IFA agreed contracts with Guinness, Minch Norton, Williams Waller and the Malting Company of Ireland is worth £20/t minimum over feed barley.

Mr. Heskin pointed out that this was due to a very strong world demand for malt, adding that there was great potential for exporting malt from surplus Irish malting barley this season. "In addition total spring malting production in France is now expected to be down 15-20% because of poor yields."

The Waterford IFA Grain Chairman strongly advised farmers growing barley varieties with malting potential to assess the grain potential for malting prior to selling as non-contract premia would be very strong this harvest.

"Already premia of £15/20/T have been offered from a number of buyers," added Mr. Heskin.

IFA Advises Farmers To Ensure Contractors Covered By Insurance

Waterford IFA Industry and Environment Chairman Matt Cunningham has advised farmers to check their insurance policy to ensure they are fully covered when employing contractors for work on their farms. "It is essential, particularly at this very busy time of year, that farmers are aware of the need to insure themselves against accidents to contractors working for specified periods on their farms", he said.

The IFA man said that many farmers were taking advantage of the fine weather to get important building and painting work done on their farms, as well as harvesting fodder and cereals. A farmer taking on contract workers should check his insurance policy to ensure that contract workers and casual labourers are sufficiently covered or make contact with his broker to obtain temporary cover for the duration of the contract. Mr. Cunningham also stressed the importance of being safety conscious at all times, especially working with farm machinery.

"While the pressure is on to get work done while the fine spell lasts, farmers and their families should be extra vigilant about safety and resist the temptation to take risks or short cuts. Farm machinery is the number one cause of all accidents on farms and every effort must be taken to ensure safety precautions, such as guards, are in place and safety procedures are followed."

NEIDIDIDIDIRIDINI LING STYLES

Galway's style over the last 10 years is easily defined and is a reflection of the influence over the Corrib men of their most successful coach, Cyril Farrell whose coaching of Galway teams really began in 1978 when Galway under 21 won the All Ireland. In 1983 he took the maroon minors to All Ireland victory over a Dublin team which featured a giant of a lad called Niall Quinn who was to achieve international fame ever since by using his head rather than his hurley. It was the best of those two teams which backboned the Galway All Ireland champions of 1987 and 1988 final.

Whatever criticism may be made of Cyril's game plan or hurling style - and you and I have as much right to question as the next person - it must never be forgotten that he won his native county a considerable amount of respect and a new status while taking Galway to All Ireland success as well as League Oireachtas and Railway Cup. Galway became a force to be reckoned with and Cyril was an innovator in hurling coaching.

The Farrell style was new and was a radical departure from the more traditional. He had an aversion to ground hurling, didn't acknowledge its importance and based his approach on securing possession and retaining it. His philosophy owed much to Gaelic football and to the Kerry style where running and passing were central elements. He saw no good reason why elements of the Kerry game should not be adapted to hurling. His game plan placed a big emphasis on

solo running and passing interests of public safety until the posts were in sight. Then scoring entered the equation. Hours were spent on perfecting hand-passing movements and interchanging positions and ground hurling got a low priority. In his book "The Right to Win" he lambasts what he calls "the twaddle about ground hurling, as if it's somehow a superior way of doing things. It most patently is not. Yes it had its uses if a player is in a tight corner but it can never be as beneficial as getting a ball into you hand," page

Two points should, I think be made. Nobody with any pretentious to being a student of the game would assert that ground hurling and handling are mutually ex-clusive. We have the evi-dence of every great game over the last half century to support the view that no All Ireland winners won with a team which was lacking in the ability to play the ball on the ground as well as from the hand. And that includes Galway. Wasn't it Noel Lane (with Peter Finnerty the best striker of a ground ball on the Galway team) who clinched victory for his team in the 1987 and 1988 All Ireland finals with goals late in each game from ground shots? Another misconception is that ground hurling means pulling on everything that stirs" as a junior hurling guru I knew used to describe it.

Once before a league match in Laois the county chairman invited the team to "go out and pull and pull until are tired of pulling." Fortunately we ignored that precious advice in the

Santa in the Control of the Control

and survival. What about the flicking or touching on or moving the ball on the ground of which skill Eugene Coughlan over 10 years ago and Kevin Kinahan of todays Offaly team were the masters. They knew well that "in a tight corner" tipping the ball away to allow them the option of lifting was the safest, most controlled and best course of action. And boy could they pass too! Kilkenny or Cork the leaders of hurling's All Ireland roll of honour know only to well the critical importance of controlling the ground ball and striking it. That is precisely what Kevin Hennessey did to a crossing ball in the 1986 All Ireland. He got a stick to it to control it before smashing an unstoppable shot low into the Galway

When Cork and Kilkenny met in the 1992 All Ireland final the game was remarkable for how little Cork played the ball on the ground throughout the game. Yet it was a piece of neat ground play by Kilkenny which clinched the match for them late in the second half when Liam McCarthy fastened on to a breaking ball on the edge of the Cork square, touched it forward on the ground and drove powerfully across Ger Cunningham and into the far corner of the net. That goal came from two simple ground strokes.

I met John Connolly (would you believe on an beach in France where we were both holidaying and hurling) a few years ago. He was quite bothered by the disproportionate amount of training time which Cyril used give to running, soloing and passing to the neglect of striking. He wondered what satisfaction as a hurler a panel member would derive from a training session in summertime when ball striking was relegated in importance and most of the session stressed handling and running. John himself was skilled at lifting, handling and striking but what really troubled him was what he saw as a lack of balance in the training programme. Besides, as John knew the practice of ground striking in training enables

players to confidently perform that skill whenever during a game it was needed. Only players can make that decision, not the management on the line. What is more, only a skillful player can play the ball properly on the ground.

Watching Damien Byrne or Billy O'Sullivan or Stephen Frampton doing a bit of ground hurling during training is a delight they are so accomplished. It is no accident that the same lads are fine strikers from the hand. The player who is master of the ground stroke has no difficulty with any other aspect of the game. Eamonn Cregan, among others, appreciates this and if you recall this year's Leinster final (how could anyone forget it) you saw the fruits of his hurling convictions.

Cyril had exceptionally fast players in Anthony Cunningham, Martin Naughton and Joe Cooney in the 80's and was anxious to utilise their speed in opening up defences. Sadly Anthony couldn't strike from his left side, Martin couldn't (or didn't) from his right and Joe at centre forward wasn't able to double on a ball (an essential for any number 11). Pity these weaknesses weren't addressed over the half dozen years of the players' prime. Then, perhaps, more All Irelands would have been won.

One way or another Cyril Farrell left a deep imprint on Galway hurling. He shaped their style, made them proud of their county and gave them many glory days. He has earned an honoured place in Galway hearts. I get a distinct feeling that Cyril Farrell's second coming in imminent. He'll be back.







The opening weekend of the fifth World games, being held at the remarkable VIIevi Stadium in Gothenburg, produced a number of major talking points, with brash young Canadian, Donovan Bailey generating huge excitement in whipping away the 100m crown from a less than 100% Linford Christie. The new order starts here. The early exchanges also provided this guiz question: which event saw the same 1-2-3 as in 1993? Keep reading, and we'll tell

KING EDWARDS

Monday, August 7 (Day 3)

Two almighty leaps of faith from devout vicar's son Jonathan Edwards propelled him further than any athlete or non athlete - has ever travelled before, not once but twice, in a fascinating contest which was decided in the first round. You could associate Edwards with the activities and excesses which have dragged international athletics through the mud in recent years; a man whose strong Christian beliefs prevented him from competing on Sundays earlier in his career (he later decided that it was very appropriate to use his god given talents of the Sabbath), he nearly didn't make it to Gothenburg. First illness (Epstein Barr Disease) and then self-doubt threatened his future in athletics, but a world record triple jump of 17.98 during a fitness test at Salamanca inspired him to greater things. His opening mark today was clearly a world record before it was even measured. And it was measured three times, twice to make sure there was no mistake and the third to make sure it all sank in. 18.16 metres. The smiley face on the scoreboard to confirm a legal jump was a carbon copy of Edwards. The British champion could have stopped there and then. He didn't. His second jump plunged down at 18.29m - sixty feet and a quarter inch. Another new world record for Jonathan Edwards.

What Gwen Torrence, Merlene Ottey and Irina Privalova were doing in the same women's 100m semi-final isn't clear, but after finishing in the order in the semi, they all went on to finish in the exact same order in the final. The usual controversy, meanwhile, was to be seen in the women's 10k walk, with Finland's Sari Essayah being outrun in the race for bronze. Russian irina Stankia took goid.

GREAT DANE

Tuesday August 8 (Day 4)

When is a Kenyan not a Kenyan? When he's a Dane Wilson Kipketer felt that he would never be able to command a regular place in the Kenvan team, so when a Copenhagen university offered him an electronics scholarship, he grabbed it with both hands and made himself eligible to run for his new country. None of his former Kenyan team-mates managed to make it to the 800m final ironically enough, and Kipketer glided through to take the gold. Ethiopian Haile Gebresilasie retained his 10000m title in a championship record time of 27:12.94, with Olympic champion Khalid Skah in second, and Joseon Machuka in sixth. When Machuka thumped Gebresilasie as they were crossing the line in the World Student Games 5000m in 1992 an incident which lost Machuka his silver medal - it created a new unfriendly rivalry which will be interesting to follow over the next few years. The Bahamas earned their first ever World Games medals today when Troy Kemp won the men's high jump and Pauline Davis finished second behind France's Marie Jo Perec in the women's

And just to tell you briefly the answer to the quiz question earlier, the men's hammer finished in the same order in 1995 as it had in Stuttgart: 1st, A. Abduvaliyev (TJK); 2nd, I. Astapkovich (BLS); 3rd, T. Gecsek (HUN).

MYSTERY MAN TAKES TITLE

Wednesday August 9th (Day 5)

"He's the Jonah Lomu of athletics," said an astonished Roger Black after Michael Johnson destroyed the rest of the field to win the men's 400m title in the second fastest time ever, 43:39 seconds, missing the world record by a tenth of a second. His winning margin of 0.83 seconds over world record holder, Butch Reynolds was the biggest at World or Olympic Games in modern times. Yet, the American is still largely unknown in his own country where in the recent past, stadium announcers have identified him both as Mike Conley and Michael Jackson. Whatever people call him, he is now established as America's top track star. Algeria's Hassiba Boulmerka held off the challenge of Britain's Kelly Holmes to regain the 1500m title which she won in 1991 and then lost in '93. European champion Fernando Ribeiro continued Portugal's excellent champi-

onships by winning the women's 10000m as Ireland's Nick Sweeney failed to qualify by 40 centimetres to qualify for the discus final.

ANE PAIN

Thursday August 10th (Day 6)

Gwen Torrence of the United States surged to victory in the women's 200m final to complete a famous sprint double, and then had her second gold medal of the games (and a second Mercedes) snatched away from her when she was disqualified for running outside of her lane. Torrence, who won the 100m title on Monday was giving a live interview to Australian TV when an official bluntly told her that Merlene Ottey was the champion, not the American. Ottey and Russian Irina Privalova both were credited with the same time, 22.12 secs, streets behind Torrence's 21.77. A war of words erupted from there. "It is a cheating... I don't know if she did it on purpose. I heard she did it in the semi-final" stormed Ottey, with Torrence continuing "A person can't enjoy winning that way. I clearly beat them, I know that deep in my heart". One result not in doubt was Sonia O'Sullivan's emphatic victory in her 5000m semi-final. Policing at the front of affairs for the whole of the race, she pounded in front with 200m to go to leave the others trailing in her wake as she raced to a new championship record of 15:13.88 (considering it was only the second 5000m championship race anyway, it wasn't too hard). Meanwhile, Sinead Delahunty came 13th in her heat. Also we had another world record as Inessa Kravets hopped, skipped and jumped to triple jump gold thanks to a 15.50m mark, beating the previous world best by 41

BATTEN DOWN THE HATCHES

Friday August 11th (Day 7)

k m Batten emerged from out of the shadows to pip tellow American Tonya Buford by one hundredth of a second to which he women's 400m hurdles final in a new world me of 52.61 seconds beating Sally Gunneil's old 0.13 of a second. With the Americans now taking control all it needed now to contirm it was another amazing oursi of speed from Michael Johnson. He duly obliged. taking the 200m crown in 19.79 seconds beating defending champion Frankie Fredricks and the rest into distant oblivion. Fredrick's clocked 20.12, well behind the new championship record; and a new games mark of 8:04.16 dangerously close to the world record) was set as Kenyan Moses Kiptanui won the 3000m steeplechase. Ukrainian Sergey Bubka won his fifth world pole vault title as both Mark Carroll, third in the 5000m semi-final, and Niall Bruton, second in his 1500m semi, made certain of further Irish representation on Sunday with two superb performances.

Saturday August 12th (Day 8)

Sonia O'Sullivan can now list "5000m World Champion" to her ever growing list of achievements thanks to a perfect race which saw her take gold, breaking her own championship record in the process. A period of 14 minutes, 46.47 seconds passed between the starting gun and the Cobh athlete crossing the finishing line in first place. It was a tight race up until the final 200 metres when O'Sullivan broke away from new 10000 metres champion Fernanda Ribeiro of Portugal to race home in emphatic style. But it almost went horribly wrong for her, when after half a dozen laps, she stumbled over the leg of a dejected long jumper (Koukodimos of Greece being favourite) who had walked out onto the track in the same manner that a hedgehog walks out onto a motorway. Luckily, Sonia kept her rhythm to take Ireland's first World championship gold since Eamonn Coughlan in 1983. Immediately after her popular victory, she celebrated with the official mascot, received congratulations from fans of many nationalities, got hugged by her dad. But what incident do you thing many people focused in on? That alleged "snub to her country" where she removed an Irish flag that someone draped on her shoulders. Would you be perfectly happy if someone had placed some very heavy cloth on you after you had run three miles in sweltering heat? Elsewhere, Spain's Martin Fiz won the men's marathon, Cuba's Ivan Pedroso took the long jump and Allen Johnson came from nowhere to earn the 110m hurdles crown.

COMEBACK **QUEENS RULE**

Sunday August 13th (Day 9)

The final day saw a scintillating final lap from Algerian Noureddine Morceli which earned him his third 1500m title n a row with a speedy 3:33.73; the man's a marvel. Another man successfully defending his position was 5000m champion Ishmail Kirui of Kenya, the 20 year old held off Morocco's Boulami and Sghir and fellow Kenyan Kororia in a bunch finish. The Irish pair of Niall Bruton (1500m) and Mark Carroll (5000m) failed to shine today, but they are names for the future. The women's 800m was won by Cuban Ana Quirot; a great achievement considering how two years ago she received severe burns and lost her baby as a result of a domestic fire at her home. Another comeback queen, Stefka Kostadinova of Bulgaria, earned her first Worlds medal sine 1987 in winning the High Jump. So, there ends the fifth World Championships - roll on the Atlanta Olympics!

In Saturday's final the Kim McDonald managed Sonia displayed a continuing maturity in her running before unleashing a sprinting effort from three hundred metres out to win by over two seconds from Ribeiro in 14 mins. 46 secs., with the surprise runner of the race Aohra Quaziz from Morocco claiming the bronze medal.

Sonia O'Sullivan has a three pronged career ambition. She wants European, World and Olympic success. To-date two of these desires have been achieved and though is a long time in athletics, an injury free Sonia should fulfil her ambitions in the Atlanta Olympics in 1996. Maith a chailín!

On the first day of the championships, the lap counter mistakenly left the lady marathon runners one lap short. On the last day of these World Championships and in front of millions of tv viewers, the bellringer, who obviously hadn't checked his equipment, saw his bell disintegrate in front of his eyes as the men's 5000 metres final was reaching its thrilling climax.

The word around Dungarvan on Monday morning was that in all the years of athletics at the Friary College that this never happened to the resident lap counter and bell ringer there and that the IAAF would be doing very well if they acquired the services of this local official for the Atlanta Olympic Games in 1996!




