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Tragic Death Of Local Girl In Australia

The body of 24 year old Jean Elstead, tragically killed in a car crash in Australia last week, will be flown home from Brisbane, via London to Cork at the weekend.

Eldest daughter of Jack and Ann Elstead, Parklane, Abbeyside, Jean was travelling with three others from Darwin to Mackay when the car they were travelling in collided with a large truck around 7.15 p.m. on Tuesday, August 15 last, about 45 km. south of Innisfail.

John O'Brien of Manchester and Jean, who were front seat passengers, were both killed instantly, while the two back seat passengers, Cora Lineen of Duckspool, Abbeyside, Dungarvan and Mary Barrett of Innishannon, Co. Cork, were both admitted to Cairns Base Hospital with serious injuries.

Daughter of Tom and Lily Lineen, Cora (also in her early twenties) is expected home shortly, where she will face further hospitalisation.

A warm, outgoing personality, Jean was educated at Abbeyside NS, the Mercy Convent and later the Presen-

tation Secondary School, Dungarvan. She went on to complete a Secretarial Course at Dungarvan Technical College before working with Kromberg & Schubert in Waterford City for six months. In 1990, she travelled to England where she took up a post with Consolidated Insurances in Richmond. Here she worked for five years before returning home to Dungarvan last March to spend a few days with her family.

Always on the go, Jean was an outgoing young lady who loved travelling and accomplished much in her short, happy lifetime. She visited Brussels, America, the Canaries, Spain, Holland and France and finally last April she received her one year working/holiday visa for Australia.

Travelling to Sydney, Jean met up with Cora Lineen and Mary Barrett who had both been nursing for a few weeks in the country. Jean found work in the accounts department of Sydney University, where she worked for a number of weeks before taking leave of absence to tour Australia.

The three girls later flew to Darwin where they met up with John O'Brien and another male friend named Darren. After they all chipped in to buy a car, **CONTINUED ON PAGE 40**

Creditors In Move To Recover Debts Owed From Collapsed Local Company

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The battle by creditors to recover outstanding debts, reliably understood to be in excess of £300,000 from the Dungarvan construction company, Cyril Healy & Sons Ltd., will be outlined at a special creditors' meeting next month.

The meeting will be held in Garryvoe Hotel in East Cork, at 4 p.m. on Friday, September 15 next and has been convened under Section 266 of the Companies Act 1963-1990.

It is expected that the meeting will determine the total debts owed by the company. The creditors have been requested to submit a detailed Statement setting out their claims against the collapsed company.

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QUESTION

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ANSWER

Additional Voluntary Contributions (AVC's) are a useful way of topping up the benefits from your employer's pension scheme. However, you may only get tax relief on up to 15% of your net reckonable earnings in any one year. The 15% income limit includes your normal superannuation deductions. We understand that where you are assessed separately in each of your employments, the 15% income limit applies to each employment. In effect, you would be treated as two separate individuals.

Apart from the 15% income limit on contributions, there are revenue restrictions on the maximum benefits you may receive from your occupational pension scheme/s. If you have a minimum of 10 years service the maximum pension permitted is two thirds of final salary. As far as we are aware, this restriction would in your case apply separately to each of your pension schemes. The Revenue also require that the employer will have borne not less than one-sixth of the cost of the benefits for each employee, at the normal retirement age.

As the rules are complicated, it would be advisable to check your actual position directly with the Inspector, Retirement Benefits District, Lansdowne House, Lansdowne Road, Dublin 4. Telephone (01) 6689400.

Plant Autumn Bulbs

Now



SPRING bulbs are the curtain raiser for the full performance of summer blooms, but few gardeners look for the possible encore — a display of autumn flowering bulbs.

These can be planted from July/August onwards to extend the run of colour and interest in the garden, complementing the autumnal browns of leaves on trees and shrubs.

Some varieties make good cut flowers to cheer up the house as nights grow longer and temperatures fall.

They all tend to prefer sunny well-drained locations, to withstand the cooler and wetter climate of the autumn.

Perhaps these 'other' bulb varieties are less well known because of the confusing names.

Belladonna Lily and Diamond Lily, for instance, are better known but these natives of South Africa actually belong to the Amaryllis family rather than true Lilies.

The Belladonna produces large pink or creamy trumpet blooms in early autumn after planting four inches deep and a foot apart in a warm spot such as next to a wall. If frost is a threat, pack a good insulating layer of mulch over the bulb.

The 'lily' will then produce spectacular blooms on a stem as high as 18 inches before following up with greenery which can endure through winter before going dormant in early summer.

Diamond Lily, more correctly known as Nerine Bowdenii, is also planted in August and prefers a well-drained site in the warm.

Again, a four-inch depth is recommended but these bulbs can be grouped closely — just four inches apart — to create quite a display with their delicate pink flowers on top of lanky 18-inch stems.

Possibly better known autumn bulbs are the autumn crocuses, though the name can be inaccurate because some are really members of a family called Colchicums.

These have cup-shaped flowers, which are usually pink though the Speciosum variety is known for rich mauve blooms and, more recently, white and lilac coloured hybrids.

Speciosum needs planting before the end of the month, three inches deep and six apart in a well-drained, sunny or lightly shaded site.

When shopping for these attractive flowers, beware of possible confusion with a true crocus, also known for mauve flowers and known as Crocus Speciosus — it likes the same planting, soil and location but can be grouped in clumps and should go in during July.

Also worth checking out is a variety of cyclamen, the hardy miniature known as Hedorifolium, which can be planted beneath shrubs to add interest as their loftier neighbours fade in autumn.

Plant the bulbs in August in shallow holes three inches apart to create a carpet of dark green foliage peppered with graceful curving 'aerials' of blooms.

A Saucy Little Salmon



SALMON WITH HORSE RADISH SAUCE

Poaching fish is easier than most people think — and results in a tender, juicy dish. Here's it's served with a piquant horseradish sauce.

Ingredients:

2 to 3 cups of water
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 bay leaf
1/2 tsp. salt
5 peppercorns
2 tsp. dill

6 salmon steaks 200-250g (6-7 oz) each

4 tbsps. prepared horseradish
2 cups low calorie sour cream
1/8 tsp dry mustard

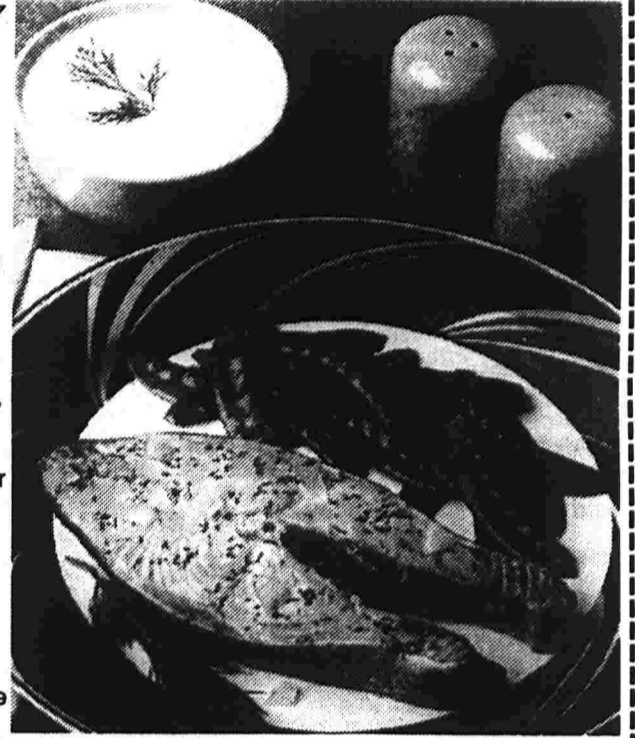
Method

Fill a deep 12 inch diameter frying pan with 2 to 3 cups of water to make 1 inch of liquid. Add the chopped onion, lemon juice, bay leaf, salt, peppercorns and dill and bring to the boil.

Add salmon steaks to liquid and add boiling water to cover, if needed. Cover pan, reduce heat and simmer for 10 to 15 minutes. (Allow 10 minutes per inch of thickness of fish measured at thickest part).

Carefully remove each steak with spatulas and place on warmed plates.

Mix horseradish, sour cream and dry mustard in a small bowl. Serve this mixture on the side with the salmon.



Wine Of The Month

BUBBLING OVER!

There is really nothing that turns heads quite as quickly as the sound of a popping champagne cork. The sound is always a prelude to some sort of celebration — anything from a birthday party to winning motor racing's Grand Prix.

It is no surprise then that champagne is called the king of wines and the wine of kings. And if you are celebrating in that style there is really nothing to beat the real stuff. These are the great wines — no wonder they call them Grande Marque.

Once you are in this company you are in the very top class where the names like Dom Perignon, Mercier, Pol-Roger, Bollinger, Lanson, Laurent-Perrier, Veuve Cliquot, Mumm, Tattinger, Roederer Crystal (de-luxe) and Krug are the sort of names that will bring stars to your eyes — and to anyone around you. And if one name seems to be missing from that list more than any other it is Moët & Chandon which today sells at over twice the rate of its other competitors — no doubt because it produces the champagne that is always number one — Dom Perignon.

The world of champagne revolves in absolute respect for the name of Dom Perignon, a Benedictine monk who is considered the single most famous figure in the history of wine. You would almost face the guillotine if suggesting he didn't put the sparkle in the white wine of the world. At a time of great clerical movement the good monk arrived in the town of Epernay in 1668 as mere Brother Pierre Perignon and devoted himself to improving the still wines of

the area. And then one day he discovered champagne. No doubt he had such a celebration that today the rich green tinted bottle with that squat bottom bearing his name is totally distinctive at all the best occasions. It isn't surprising that there is a great monument to the Dom in Epernay, the recognised home of champagne.

Less than 20 years after the arrival of the Dom, other companies were moving in — among them Claude Moët whose later family associations with Napoleon did them no harm whatsoever. Later they were joined by a son-in-law hence the addition of the name Chandon. Impressive connections brought impressive rewards and their wine was quickly at the top of the market where it has stayed ever since. History, of course, goes a long way to make the story of champagne unusual but so also does the business of making the wine. The grapes used in its making — Pinot Noir, Meunier and Chardonnay — are grown in the most northerly wine producing area in Europe; the weather is not the best and to save the vineyards from frost they often have to light fires and keep them going all night. The grapes are treated with almost reverential care for each bunch. They are not pressed to remove every drop of juice; the first run is the best. The bottles cost more because they have to be so strong; so does the cork. The wine is left for some time, lying on its side during which it gets a neat little shake on an adjustable rack every so often. And eventually the stopper has to be removed so that the bottle can be topped up. It is this attention to every detail that gives champagne its exclusivity.

When you are buying champagne there are a few terms that it is useful to know — Brut or Extra Sec means Extra Dry; Sec or Demi Sec are medium; Rich or Doux (not often seen) are sweet. And there are some details that you should remember too.

There is great pressure inside a champagne bottle so never shake a bottle before opening it otherwise you could well cause an accident to life and limb with a cork that can fly out at over 50 mph. When you are opening a bottle first unravel the wire over the bottle top, all the time keeping your thumb on the cork. Then wrap a towel around it and still holding the cork twist the bottle. Then it is time to celebrate! There should be no such thing as leftovers where champagne is concerned . . . but if it should happen it is possible to save it for another occasion. Spring loaded caps are available which enable champagne to remain drinkable for up to a week after opening, but the champagne must be kept in a refrigerator. However the top advice is drink it while it still bubbles with extravagance.

Local Schools Happy With Leaving Results

After a nerve-racking summer of anxious waiting and uncertainty 66,000 students throughout the country returned to school last Thursday to pick up the dreaded Leaving Certificate exam results.

National results this year were well up in such subjects as English, History, French, Spanish and German as compared with last year's grades. The competition for third level places this year, however, is expected to be extremely competitive with an extra 4,000 students who took the exam this year over last year's figure.

LOW GRADES "A WORRYING DEVELOPMENT"

The increasing number of low grades in Leaving Certificate Ordinary Level papers was described as "a worrying development in the Education System" by The National Youth Council of Ireland.

The Council's Youth Affairs Chairperson, Malcolm Byrne expressing his concern said, "there is a danger that the Education System is creating two separate tiers within the Leaving Certificate Structure. High achieving students appear to be doing better, while the grades of those at the bottom of the academic scale appear to be getting worse".

It may be too early to identify a definite trend, but when almost one quarter of Ordinary Level science students are not getting pass grades we should be getting worried. Proposals in the White Paper on Education to improve the vocational aspect of senior

examinations will have to be implemented without delay", Mr. Byrne added.

The NYCI also called for a major drive to promote the Irish language in the aftermath of a disastrous series of results in which 24% of students sitting Ordinary level papers got either an E, F, or NG grade.

"Irish is our national language. The Education System should play an integral part in fostering and promoting Irish. The decision to remove the book 'Peig' from the Leaving Cert syllabus was a welcome move but there will need to be a major reexamination of the manner in which Irish is taught", Mr. Byrne said.

CLASS OF '95

According to a quick poll of local schools it would appear that County Waterford's class of 1995 have acquitted themselves quite well.

Fr. Pat Moran, principal of St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan, where 110 students sat the leaving certificate said he was very pleased with the results. Overall grades, he said, were well up to the usual high standards of the college particularly among those who sat the French paper.

He reported no dramatic decrease in Irish exam grades and put it down to the influence of the nearby Ring Gaeltacht area. "Those who

worked hard got the results they needed", said Fr. Moran, "and by and large, standards were up on last year, right across the board".

At St. Declan's College, Kilmacthomas, the 60 students who comprised the Class of '95 had every reason to be pleased. School Principal Sean Ahearne said students had done particularly well in French, Economics, Geography and home economics, with straight 'A's being achieved by many hard working students.

Similar sentiments were expressed by Margaret O'Brien, principal of Ard Scoil na nDeise, Dungarvan who was also very pleased with the performance of her 120 students.

"It's difficult to compare the '95 results with other years, as we're dealing with a different cohort of students who all have different abilities," said Mrs. O'Brien. Very happy with this year's English results, she revealed that one Ard Scoil student had attained 7 'A's in honours subjects.

"I would like to hope those students who have worked hard are achieving the best results", she said.

BEST IN 20 YEARS

Speaking to Jim Ryan, principal of the C.B.S., Dungarvan, he said the school had 70 candidates in the leaving cert which was their highest number ever.

"I am delighted with our students results overall, probably the best results we had in the last 20 years. (i.e. during

my time in the school)", said Mr. Ryan. "Our repeat students, without exception, improved significantly on last years grades and our less academic students did really well", he enthused. "Our more academic students performed superbly with a very high proportion of 'A' and 'B' grades in higher level papers".

In conclusion, Mr. Ryan congratulated the members of the teaching staff who had worked so hard with the students and added "well done to our students for reaching such high standards".

ALL PASSED IRISH

53 students sat the examination in the Presentation - C.B.S. secondary schools in Lismore and according to school principal Elma Hayes, a very high proportion achieved honours. "A large percentage will be going on to third level education", she confirmed adding that the Lismore Class of 1995 had achieved excellent results all round.

"The students themselves were very pleased with their results and the teaching staff was well satisfied", she added. Commenting on the reported disastrous series of results in Ordinary level Irish papers experienced nationally, Mrs. Hayes revealed that the school had enjoyed a 100% pass rate in Irish this year.

Meanwhile Orison Carlile, principal of St. Anne's Post Primary School, Cappoquin was also very pleased with his students results. "They performed exceptionally well

and will have the necessary points for their desired courses", he stated. "It is particularly gratifying to see that, unlike the reported national trend, our students scored very well in science subjects. The overall good results are a tribute to the dedication of staff and students and a fitting reward for all their hard work", he declared.

Also pleased with this year's Leaving Exam results was Principal of the Dungarvan Technical College, Pat Buckley, who said he was very pleased with the grades

obtained by his students in all different subjects especially such practical subjects as building construction, drawing, art and engineering.

Together with 30 Leaving cert students, a new feature of the college this year was the 40 plus Post Leaving Cert students who repeated a number of subjects, to improve their overall points.

"Many of these PLC students can now present themselves in Ireland for interview such as in the field of nursing where two honours are required," said Mr. Buckley.

New Chairman Of Waterford Foods

John Dowley has been elected as Chairman of Waterford Co-Operative Society at a meeting of the Board held yesterday, Tuesday 22nd. Mr. Dowley also becomes Chairman of Waterford Foods plc.

Mr. Dowley has been Vice-Chairman of the Board since 1988 and has served as a Member of the Board for the Carrick-on-Suir region from 1969 to 1978 and 1984 to date. He succeeds John Barry who has been Chairman of the Society since 1988 and Chairman of the plc since it was established.

At the Board Officership elections today, William Moore was elected as the new Vice-Chairman. He has been a Member of the Board for the Castletyons region since 1960. A vacancy in the plc Board was also filled by Dermot Horgan, representing the West Waterford region.

Mr. Dowley paid tribute to the outgoing Chairman, John Barry, and complimented him for his hard work and leadership in a period which saw the business treble in size to over £700 million annual turnover and develop strategically in Ireland, Britain and the U.S.A. Mr. Dowley said he was committed to the further development of the group and to growing value for all shareholders in the business.

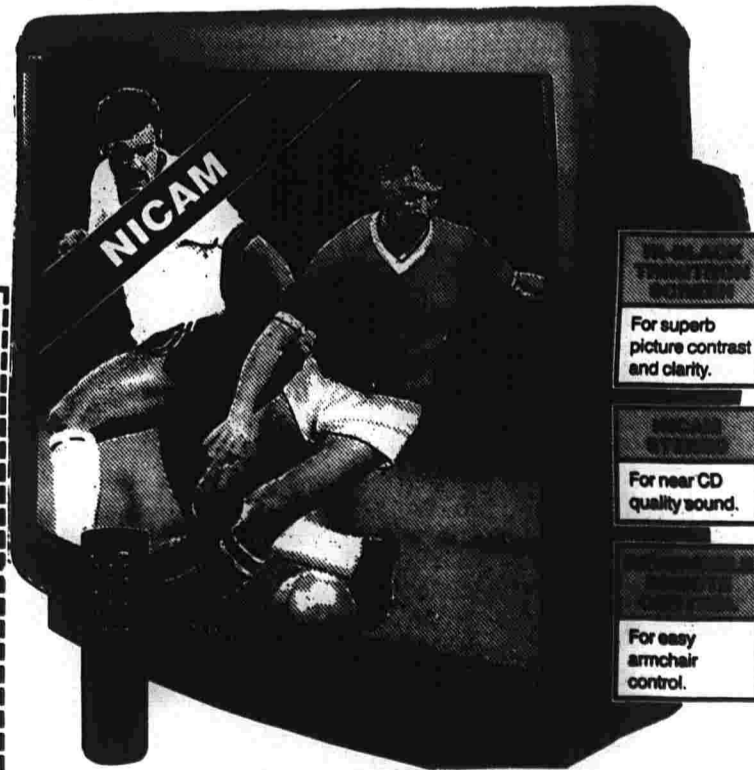
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RECENT DEATHS

In all, Donncha will complete the first ever coastal walk of the whole island.

The grande finale for the 1995 walk takes place in Grattan Square this Saturday at 12 p.m., where Donncha will be greeted by the Dungarvan Brass Band and a champagne reception to add sound and flavour.

Welcoming Donncha's return will be members of Dungarvan U.D.C. together with the people of Dungarvan who are all invited to support this worthy event.

"I find it difficult to understand why some able bodied people can't walk that extra few yards after parking their cars", said Donncha. "As well as raising our target of £100,000 from the walk to support the work of the Association, it will also raise the awareness of the general public to the ongoing abuse of disabled driver parking bays by a majority of people".

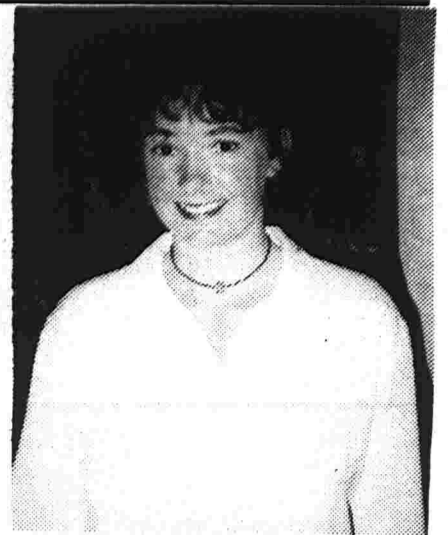

R.S.I. NUMBERS NEEDED FOR GRANTS

Payments of livestock headage and farm grants in excess of £500 will still require an RSI number, the Department of Agriculture has confirmed, after talks with the EU Commission. The provision of an RSI number to qualify for the payments has been the subject of contention among small farmers and a threat-

ened court challenge by the United Farmers Association of which Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbray is President, claims the provision is in contravention of the EU Treaty.

A spokesman for the Department of Agriculture stated that following discussions with the EU Commission, approval has

now been granted for the inclusion of the provision in applications. All payments will be withheld from farmers who fail to supply an RSI number on their applications where the amount involved is over £500.

It is understood that the Irish authorities told the EU Commission that the requirement in relation to tax compliance and submission of an RSI number is consistent with European Union law because headage and farm investment grant schemes are not compulsory for member States.

The Department of Agriculture points out that the level of compliance in the provision of tax clearance and RSI numbers by farmers applying for headage and grants is now very high. The United Farmers Association claim that many farmers have had their 1994 entitlements withheld because they did not supply an RSI number on their applications and the Association's legal advisers are reaching the final stages of preparing a court challenge against the Department over this matter.

166 YEAR OLD CONSERVATORY IN T.V. SERIES

The 166 year old conservatory at Marlfield House, Clonmel, is to feature in a new series on interior design called "Beyond The Hall Door", which will be transmitted on R.T.E. starting on January 10, 1996. The beautiful conservatory with views sloping down to the River Suir and across to the Comeragh Mountains, is normally the haunt of tourists staying in Marlfield House which is owned by County Waterford man Denis English, Baunfaun, Kilmanahan.

On Monday last it was taken over by a camera crew who filmed it for part of a programme about the history of conservatories to be broadcast around the end of February '96.

The Conservatory which measures 45 foot by 60 foot is of particular interest because it was designed by Richard Turner a Dublin man born in 1798 and who died in 1881. He also designed the conservatories at the Botanic Gardens in Dublin, Belfast and Kew in London. Turner was the most famous designer of conservatories between 1820 and 1860, and the Marlfield House conservatory built in 1829, is an example of his early work. This work is still in its original state, including the curved wrought-iron roof which, it was believed at the time the conservatory was built, let in more light than a flat roof.

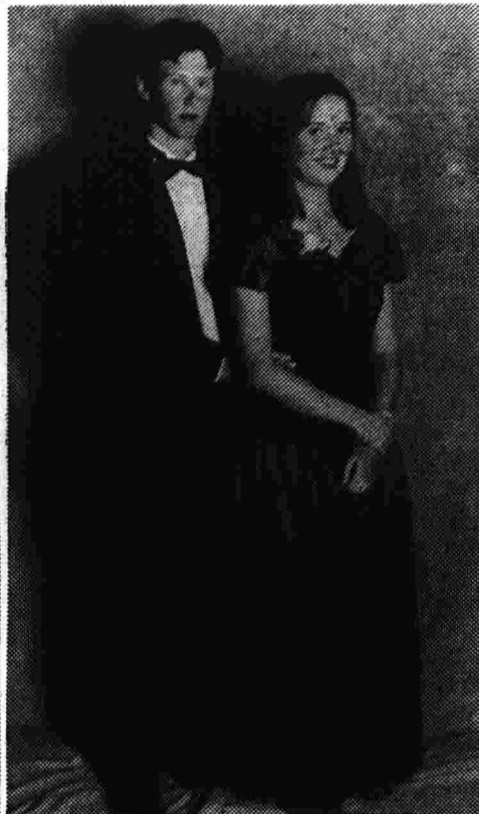

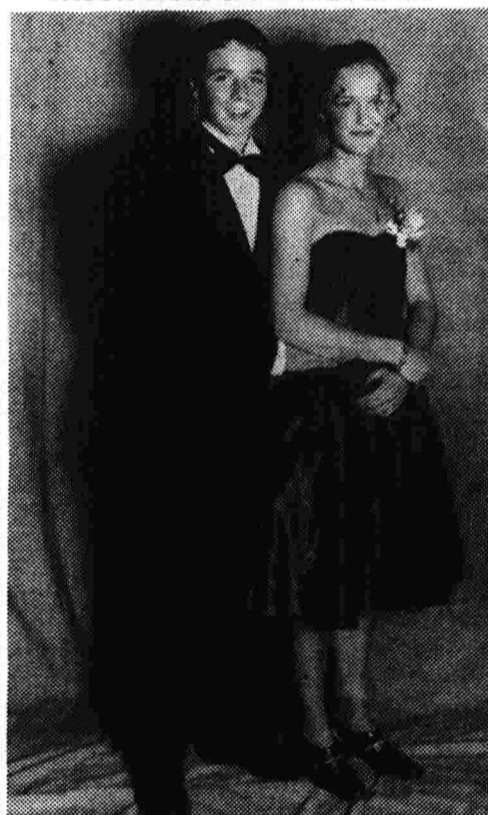

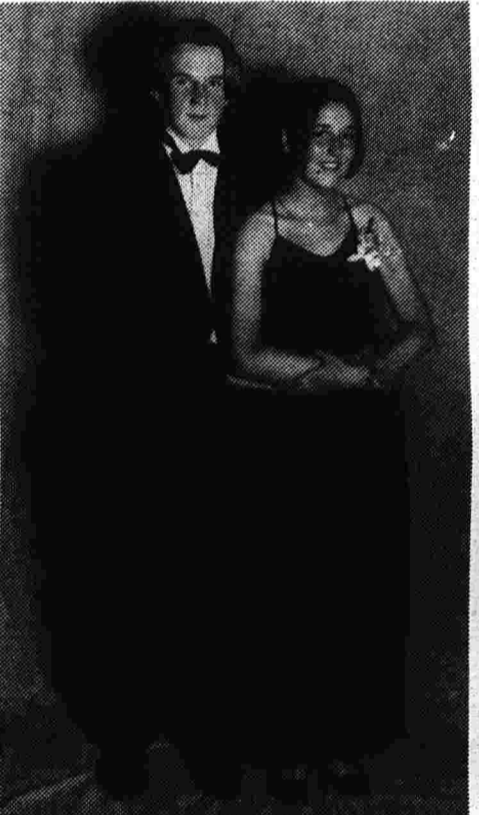

The entire community of Sliabh gCua and in particular the district and parish of Touraneena was saddened when news broke on Wednesday 16th August of the sudden death after a relatively short illness of Mrs. Nellie Power (nee Halley) of Boolavouteen, Ballinamult.

Nellie was wife of Liam and mother of Denise, Brian, Niall and Justin Power and was one of the most charming and popular ladies in the community and in St. Luke's Hospital, Clonmel, where she worked as a nurse.

There was a huge attendance at the funeral in St. Mary's Church, Touraneena on Thursday the 17th. Mass was officiated by Fr. Paddy Hallinan and assisted by Fr. Jim Griffin, Fr. Brendan Crowley, Fr. Frank Lloyd and Fr. Pierce Ahearn.

In his homily Fr. Paddy Hallinan spoke of Nellie's life and her role in the community, from her first job in the Ballinamult post office, her training as a nurse and her years of devoted service in St. Lukes. He spoke of how she crossed the parish from the foot of the Comeraghs to the Knockmeal mountains to find her husband Liam and how they both built a loving home which was a place of peace, welcome and friendship at Boolavouteen. He also spoke of how Nellie generated friendship and rallied friends around her wherever she went and in the earlier days of her sickness when she had to make numerous visits to the Regional Hospital in Cork, her friends were vying with each other as to who would drive her.

Fr. Paddy Hallinan told us how the whole parish rallied to support Nellie and provided a pilgrimage to Lourdes but as in the words of St. Bernadette, "the water of Lourdes were not for her", and also how Nellie in the last 12 months of her life scaled a height of prayer, patience and suffering she didn't think she was capable

of. He said that she bore her illness with such a bright and sparkling countenance that strangers who met her didn't realise the gravity of her illness and people who came to console her went away consoled themselves; that's the kind of person she was.

Fr. Hallinan recounted how the final few weeks of her life was a trial of mind over matter as she gathered her strength to play her full role in her daughter Denise's wedding, he said that this wedding will surely be blessed after such blessed efforts of a mother's love. All this was due to Nellie's faith, the faith of our fathers which Nellie lived out throughout her life. "Like a candle that's lit on a window at night, your faith and your conduct cheered us and guided us right".

On behalf of Nellie's family, Fr. Hallinan thanked the entire community for their expressions of sympathy and for their help over the past year, saying that this helping hand was a sign of real Christian love.

In his concluding remarks Fr. Hallinan said that no words could express the loss of Nellie's life but while there was one less lark in the clear air of the dawn over Sliabh gCua, there was one new bright choruser in the Choirs of the Saints.

A guard of honour consisting of nursing staff of St. Lukes Hospital, the local pioneers total abstinence Association, the I.C.A. and Justins's colleagues in the Naomh Brid's Boys Gaelic Football Club was formed as her remains were received and brought to her place of burial in the Power family plot.

A choir led by Teresa Butler and including Sean and Mary Hickey, Kieran McCabe, Annette Whelan, Kitty Kirwan, Ann Ahearn, Helen Ryan and Bridget Webster provided the music and hymns which Nellie loved, in particular Sliabh Geal gCua na Feile, which was a tribute to Nellie.

The readings were performed by Sr. Rita Fennessy

and Nurse Bernie Power. The prayers of the faithful representing the aspiration of the community were read by Ciara Conolly, Mairead Hickey, Seamus Power, Ann Flanagan, Joan O'Brien and the alter gifts which included Nellie's Nurses uniform were brought to the alter by Denis, Brian, Niall, Justin, Sinead and Katie.

At the conclusion of the Mass, Nurse Breda Webster spoke a personal tribute to Nellie on behalf of the nursing profession.

Nellie is survived by her husband Liam, daughter Denise and sons Brian, Niall and Justin, her mother Margaret Hally, her brother Frank Halley, Doon and her sister May Power, Lickoran. May she rest in peace.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

CALVES AT PASTURE

Lack of thrive in calves is very often overlooked, while most of the effort is being put into providing grass for the milking cows. Good calf performance depends on an adequate supply of quality grass and parasite control. The supply of grass involves matching grass growth with the daily requirement of the calves.

As the season moves on, grass growth rates decline but the daily requirements of the calf increases. For example, during the month of August the 'typical' daily dry matter production is about 15 to 18 kg/acre. However, the February born calf will need about 4.5 kg/dry matter per day. This means that the appropriate stocking rate is about 3 to 3.5 calves/acre assuming they utilise 75 to 80%. The comparable figure for last June was about 7 calves/acre as growth rates were higher and calf requirements were 30% less.

Grassland management for calves should concentrate on animal performance rather than output per acre. Grazing calves in front of yearlings will ensure that they get the best of the grass and will contribute to the control of stomach worms. Mid summer is always a time for the build up of lung and stomach worms after dosing always move them to clean pasture like aftergrass, otherwise they get reinfected almost immediately.

FOOT BATHS

Two very common foot problems in dairy herds over the winter period are foot rot and Mortellaro. These conditions are most prevalent in easy feed houses that are overstocked and poorly ventilated. Long passages where the slurry is scraped to one end are not desirable.

Routine foot bathing with three to five per cent formalin, along with good hygiene, will reduce the problems. A good foot bath is essential for this. For most herds a bath eight to ten feet long and two to three feet wide should be adequate. A long narrow bath is better than a short wide one.

The bath should be about four inches deep and metal ones are easier to clean than concrete. They can be located at the exit of the parlour. The best time to use the foot bath is before the housing period rather than to do a fire brigade operation during the winter.

SHEEP

1996 Lamb Crop — The size of your 1996 lamb crop will be decided over the next month or two. Among the factors which will influence the outcome are the ewe breed, her age, her condition and her nutrition. Presuming that ewe breed and age are decided at this stage, condition and nutrition are the influencing factors which are not within the farmers control just now.

Ewe Condition — Ewes which are very thin or very fat produce less eggs than ewes which are in correct condition. They are also more likely to be barren. A large thin ewe would require six weeks of good grass from now to reach the correct condition at mating.

Nutrition — Provide that ewes are not losing weight, nutrition is probably less important than condition. In other words ewes at condition score 3 to 3.5 on a maintenance diet will produce as well as those on a very high plane of nutrition. For ewes however, which are in poorer condition, improved ovulation rates can be achieved by a rising plane of nutrition.

Most ewes are mated in October for lambing in March. That gives producers at least six weeks from now to get ewe condition right. Select thin ewes now and transfer to good grass. By the 1st October they should be in fit condition. Flush all the remainder for two weeks pre-mating.

Rams — Examine rams immediately for condition and general health. Feet, in particular, should be checked and treated if necessary. Severe paring should be avoided as should the use of antibiotics. Feeding about 1.5 lbs. of high protein ration for 3 to 4 weeks before the mating season can help restore condition if necessary. Do not use ewe ration for this purpose as magnesium content may be dangerous for rams.

Early Lambing In Ewes — Ewes mated for early lamb production should be maintained in fairly static body condition for one month after mating. Where possible, avoid stressful operations such as dipping etc. during this period.

STUBBLE TREATMENT

Cultivation of stubble ground should be repeated to encourage further germination and prevent germinated weeds from going to seed.

IFA Deplores IVU's "False Accusations"

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy, has called on the Irish Veterinary Union General Secretary, Pat Brady, to "stop making inflammatory statements and false accusations against IFA."

The Waterford Animal Health Committee Chairman was referring to recent statements by Mr. Brady who accused IFA of "running an extraordinary belligerent and unfair campaign against vets and being "rudderless and unprincipled" on TB. Mr. Murphy deplored the comments by the IVU spokesman and said they were without foundation. "Mr. Brady's disgraceful remarks have brought relations between the IFA and the IVU to an all time low," he said. Mr. Murphy called on the IVU spokesman to refrain from making inflammatory remarks which would only serve to damage relations between farmers and vets.

The Animal Health Chairman stressed "farmers are not responsible for the current situation where IVU members are refusing to test cattle and are causing unnecessary hardship to farm-

ers. Farmers have suffered because of the lack of an effective scheme to eradicate TB and they are still suffering because very little progress has been made in putting an effective scheme in place."

The Waterford Animal Health Committee Chairman said farmers were already paying £30 million per year in disease levies and he insisted they were entitled to the reduction in levies which EU funding would allow. "But, time and time again the IVU has vetoed progress in the scheme and blocked EU funding which could have amounted to £60 million since 1992."

Mr. Murphy said there were many vets who wanted to get on with the job of servicing farmers and IFA had not forgotten those vets. In the negotiations with the Department, IFA had emphasised that the genuine single person practice should not be moved outside of their own working area to test cattle and had stated that all vets must be treated equally in rotation. "It was the IVU's rejection of rotation which led IFA to negotiate the partial privatisation of the TB scheme."

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The County Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Skehan, welcomed ICMSA's statement in putting the onus on the Minister to prevent disruption of cattle sales.

ICMSA want a firm assurance from the Minister for Agriculture that no farmer is prevented from selling his cattle because of the current dispute between the Minister and vets.

The Association President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said that he was particularly concerned for farmers whose herds were listed for testing but the tests had not been carried out because of the vets refusal to carry out rotational testing. Mr. O'Dwyer said that up to three-quarters of the 21,000 herds listed for testing under the third phase of the 1995 scheme have not been tested. The third phase came to an end recently.

"Some of these farmers have already been prevented from selling their cattle because they cannot get a pre-movement test carried out by their own vet when they are listed for a herd test. As we move into the Autumn selling period, most, if not all of these farmers, will be selling cattle," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

Mr. O'Dwyer continued: "The demand from ICMSA is quite clear. The Minister must provide that any farmer seeking a test in order to sell cattle will have his animals tested within a week of requesting the test. This is the normal practice for the farmers where the farmers own vet carries out the testing. The onus is on the Minister to ensure that he arranges for a vet to carry out the testing within one week and failing this the farmers own vet should be allowed to carry out the testing. Farmers cannot be deprived of the right to sell their cattle at a time when they decide to do so."

Farmer's Guide To EU Regulation On Community Plant Variety Rights

The Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry has referred to an EU Council Regulation on Community Plant Variety Rights which has been in force since September 1, 1994.

The purpose of this Regulation is to enable breeders to collect royalties on the varieties they have developed including royalties for the use of farm-saved seed. Until now farm-saved seed

has been exempt from royalty payments.

Farmers retaining a position of their harvest for re-sowing may, under this Regulation, be required to pay the holder of Community Rights a royalty fee. The plant species subject to this Regulation are cereals, fodder plants, oil and fibre plants (not flax) and potatoes. The level of royalty fee will be set by the holder of the Rights and must be "sensibly lower" than that applied on certified seed.

Certain derogations and exemptions to the payment of royalty on farm-saved seed apply. Small farmers, defined under the Regulation as one whose cereal and fodder plant production area does not exceed 15.13 hectares respectively, would be exempted and in the case of potatoes one whose production area (seed/ware) does not exceed 6.3 ha.

Where the seed of Community protected varieties has been saved and planted before September 1, 1994 a derogation from payment of royalty until June 30, 2001 applies.

The application of this Regulation will be by the holders of Community Rights and the Plant Variety Office who will make arrangements to administer these provisions and collect royalty payments.

This Department will be issuing a Guide entitled "Farm Saved Seed, A Farmers' Guide to the new EU Regulation EC/2100/94 on Community Plant Variety Rights" to arable farmers shortly.

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman Calls For Maintenance Of Milk Price Into 1996

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Gerald Curran has said that this year's uninterrupted dairy markets buoyancy has enabled milk processors to widen their margins considerably. "In addition to the 5p passed back to producers this Spring, co-ops have increased their margins by at least 2p — and possibly more — depending on their product portfolio," the IFA man said.

"This has given co-ops a price cushion which will allow them hold milk prices into the April to June 1996 peak production period, even if markets were to weaken next year," he added.

"There is no doubt in my mind that co-ops are finding it much easier to pay 110p per gallon this year than they

did 102p last year," he said.

"The current situation has enabled co-ops to build up profits at the same time as increasing milk prices," he added.

"It had become clear since the beginning of the Summer that no price drop would occur this side of March 1996. Since then, however, the buoyancy of dairy markets has continued unabated and the improved margins are now giving co-ops the opportunity to maintain prices further into 1996 than earlier anticipated," he continued.

"I call on all co-ops to give a clear commitment that they will use these higher margins to the benefit of dairy farmers by maintaining prices into the 1996 peak production period," he concluded.

It can be regarded as a Leaving Cert Plus. The LCVP subjects may be taken at higher or ordinary

level. It provides pupils with opportunities for 3rd level, further education and FAS training courses as well as enhancing the pupils preparation for the world of work either as an employee or in self employment. This programme has run successfully at Dungarvan Technical College for five years. Numbers are limited, so immediate application is advised.

Dungarvan Technical College is delighted to announce that the Department has selected the college as a centre for the Leaving Certificate Applied Programme. The LCAP is largely examined by continuous assessment and course work. Two-thirds of the final result is awarded on work done during the school year, as project and course work.

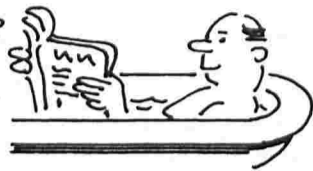

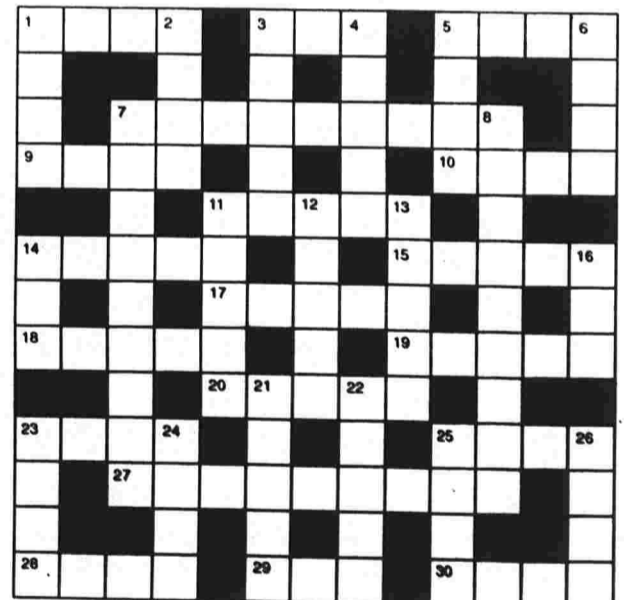

Last week, for instance, against Dungarvan in the Phelan Cup they had a total of 16 wides as against 8 for Dungarvan. Ballinacourty also had 11 points in that game, and the ratio of eleven scores to sixteen wides shows a pattern of their performances so far. They have a better scoring record than Kilrossanty, but this was achieved against much poorer opposition.

In the past couple of weeks, the county team playing in the 'B' All Ireland has been backboned by Kilrossanty's Jim Maher, Mattie Kiely, Michael Fitzgerald, Roger Power and company and with players like Brian Kirwan, Pierre White, Brian Whelan, Tom Prendergast, Nial Connors, Ger Walsh, Pat Hayes, etc.,

added on, they can field a side well capable of withstanding a challenge from most sides.

Ballinacourty are the real underdogs in this one and while they accounted for Sliabh gCua in very decisive fashion two weeks ago, they are now moving into much deeper water and won't get their scores all that easily.

They are unlikely to field a changed side from that

which won them their last game and this will see Tom Cahill in goal with Gavin Breene, Johnnie Shields and John Milligan in the full back line. Paudie Shields, Mark Reynolds and Jonathan Moore are the likely half back line with John McGrath and Benny Landers in the middle of the field. In attack, Michael Cosgrave who is their leading scorer throughout the

championship and notched a total of 2-7 out of the 2-9 against Sliabh gCua, Michael Collins, Michael Enright, Damien Cliffe, Gavin Keane and Pat Cunningham are the likely sextet to be on duty.

I have not doubt that Ballinacourty will try all the way, but I cannot imagine them being the team to qualify for the semi final and a meeting with Stradbally.

Minor Hurling Championship

This championship gave reason for concern recently when it was thought that because of the deferment of the starting date, it might not finish in time for the county finals which are set by the G.A.C.

With great co-operation from clubs and good planning it has been possible to bring them to the closing stages, sooner than expected.

The minor football championships are at the knock-out stages and the hurling is now just as advanced.

In minor hurling 'A' Lismore and Tallow have reached the divisional final and in the 'B' we have the semi-finals with Fourmilewater, Colligan, Ballyduff and Naomh Brid, surviving.

So in the matter of progress, there is no need for concern, but as far as standards are concerned, there is room for concern and we have now reached the stage where something positive must be done about the situation in the 'A' championship, which is becoming something of a disaster. Realistically, it was a competition between two clubs, Lismore and Tallow this year as Dungarvan and Abbeyside just didn't count. In their two matches against Dungarvan and Abbeyside, Lismore scored 19 goals and 38 points (Lismore 10-18 Dungarvan 0-2, Lismore 9-20 Abbeyside 1-3), Dungarvan decided to withdraw at that stage and Abbeyside went on to be well beaten by Tallow in the semi-final.

In the mean time, Dungarvan and Abbeyside played the best hurling seen at under 16 level for some time when they clashed in the divisional semi final and Dungarvan went on to win

Quite a number of players from each side were sent to the line before the match resumed. The referee stated after the game that a full report will be made to the Western Board.

At half-time Kilrossanty led by 2-5 to 1-3 and increased the five point advantage by a further goal midway through the second half. The champions came back at them in the final minutes and closed the gap to a single point.

By all accounts, Ballinacourty are the favourites to win and should this happen a most unique situation will result as Ballinacourty 'A' would then have to meet Ballinacourty 'B' in the quarter final of the junior football championship proper. I don't believe that it has ever happened before that teams from the same club clashed in a championship. It will certainly be very interesting if it happens.

New Coaching Handbook

The programme is due to be launched on to-day, Wednesday in Dublin at centres in all four provinces. In conjunction with the launch a full cover 32 page booklet and a series of 4 full colour posters (English and Irish versions) are also being published. The booklet, entitled "Coaches Handbook", is the most up to date publication on the technique of teaching the skills, etc. of the game of hurling and it is certain to be in great demand by all clubs who have an interest in the promotion of the game at under-age level. The booklet and the back-up posters are available to all clubs who apply now.

Pat Daly, Coaching and Games Development manager and the author, Denis Burns are to be complimented on the excellence of these publications which are certain to make a great impact on the promotion of hurling in schools, etc.

& Sons have been responsible for a large number of private housing and commercial developments throughout the area, including the unfinished private estate on the Waterford/Cork bypass. They also include the new clubhouses at the Dungarvan and West Waterford Golf Clubs and the clubhouse and dressingroom facilities at the Dungarvan GAA Club grounds.

An estimated 80 creditors are owed money from the collapsed company and a special group of local business people have already come together in a concerted effort to save the firm from financial ruin. That attempt however ended in failure.

Next month's meeting may well result in the appointment of a liquidator to the company if the creditors' claims remain unresolved.

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
