Council Members Warn Of Massive

Waterford County Council have strongly criticised what they have termed as a "massive invasion" by the travelling community, particularly in the Western end of the county. The recent influx of new age travellers and illegally parked caravans in scenic areas around the county was the subject of a lengthy and at times acrimonious discussion at last Monday's meeting of the Council.

The overwhelming message arising from the meeting was that the majority of rural based public represen-tatives are fed up with the Council's limited powers to deal with the situation and claim that rural Ireland is living in fear as a result of this recent "invasion."

The entire debate was sparked off by the newly published "Task Force" Report on the travelling community which puts forward various recommendations on the needs of travellers,

such as the immediate provision of permanent halting sites for travelling traders, in an effort to give the settled community a deeper insight into the culture and lifestyle these people enjoy.

The report however was given a critical review by many members, including Cllr. Billy Kyne, who stated that by providing sites for travelling tradespeople, the Council would in effect be spending money to subvent people who have left their homes to compete with

local bona fide established traders who pay taxes and rates. "It's beyond belief," he exclaimed.

"SOUL DESTROYING" In the last few months, Cllr. Kyne said, he had seen "young able-bodied men and women" with children,

begging in Grattan Square. "It's soul destroying to see a child singing in a supermarket for money," he said, adding that these children were being severely exploited by their parents.

warned. "It's enough to make people sick, seeing people in the Square begging," he added.

Another flaw in the taskforce report, claimed Cllr. Kyne, was the lack of funding identification to enable local authorities carry out these proposals. All that is put forward in the report, he claimed, is a collection of "pious platitudes" towards the travelling community.

As a more practical solution to control the movement of transients, Cllr. Kyne submitted that a register be drawn up to identify where particular travelling families reside in the main, and their location at any given time.

GRAVE PROBLEM Tallow based Councillor, Willie McDonnell, claimed that in the past 6 to 8 weeks the districts of Tallow and Lismore had been invaded by members of the travel-ling community, "Public houses have to close their doors when travellers are in town and private property owners are living in fear," he declared. "Gardaí are urging people to lock up. and the situation needs to be addressed — it is a "very

grave problem," he said.

Likewise, Cllr. Nora

Flynn, who said she was inundated with complaints about new age travellers, declared that halting site residents should pay rent and water taxes, just like Council tenants.

The Cappoquin publican claimed she had received a telephone call last week telling her to close up her

premises because of a "rampage" in Lismore. RIGHT TO REFUSE

SERVICE Continuing, Cllr. Flynn spoke of her concerns over the proposed legislation by the Minister for Equality and Law Reform, Mervyn Taylor which would effectively scrap business people's right to refuse a service without giving a rea-

Included in the list of recommendations set out in the report is CR 3.1: "that the Equal Status Legislation would prohibit:

- policies and procedures that discriminate against Travellers' culture and iden-

the exclusion of Travellers just because they are Travellers, from the normal benefit of goods, services and facilities;

the segregation of Travellers in the general provision of goods, services and facilities unless this is for reasons of positive action."

Another recommendation outlined in the report is CR5.1 "that Equal Status legislation would clearly identify that neither direct nor indirect discrimination against Travellers could be justified on the grounds of potential financial disadvantage to the provider."

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Jackie Fahey.

IMBALANCED DOCUMENT

Also strongly critical of the Taskforce Report, Cllr. Austin Flynn described the document as being "totally unbalanced" with no reference to travellers responsibilities.

Citing the example of Ballinard beach near the Ballinacourty lighthouse, Cllr. Flynn said a number of New Age Travellers are currently encamped on the site, where, he claimed, they are living in "absolute squalor." "You can't drive down or walk down there," he stressed, "equality has a price tag and that's responsibility.

While supportive of travellers who don't interfere with the environment, Cllr. Flynn said a large number of caravans are illegally parked in grass margins and scenic spots around the county which they have despoiled with debris and rubbish. "If I emptied the boot of my car in Grattan Square, I would be prosecuted, and it's time that the laws of the land should be made equal."

"Respect," he added,

LOCK ON EVERY DOOR

Citing the long, hot summer as a major reason for the influx of travellers, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson warned members that the current situation West of Dungarvan in the Youghal, Tallow and Ballyduff areas is very serious. "There's a lock on every door in rural Ireland," he stressed.

Reechoing Cllr. Kyne's suggestion of a special register to monitor the movement of the travelling community, Cllr. Wilkinson felt however that the task force's recommendation of the provision of halting sites was a definite non-

With regard to the current situation in Ring/Windgap area, where residents are up in arms over an illegal influx of caravans, Cllr. Wright said the travellers were there as there was no other site available.

"It is the responsibility of the Council to provide a halting site. From Passage East to Knockanore, Dungarvan is the only town with a halting site," he further added.

In support of Cllr. Wright, Cllr. Ciaran Ó Riain said travellers were human beings and that the Council should report back to the Department that unless and until finance is received, there's not much the Council can do to alleviate the

current impasse.
HANDS ARE TIED

Responding to the many concerns voiced by members, Acting Co. Manager, Brian McNally, reported that 1995 had been a particularly bad year with regard to the inflow of travellers to the county. This summer, he said, caravans had spread to many areas which had previously remained un-touched by the travelling community.

Fourteen families were camped at Caliso Bay, Ardmore, while only one caravan remained at Goat Island, he disclosed. Plans are currently underway to erect barriers at Caliso Bay which, Mr. McNally claimed, would be an effective method of keeping caravans out.

The Council's hands in the matter are tied however, as both the Gardaí and local authorities have very limited powers when dealing with illegally parked travellers.

Mr. McNally revealed however that after a certain time frame of approximately 30 days, the Council can prosecute the land owners on which the travellers are encamped for allowing them onto the land which of course is not normaily the case.

With regard to the provision of halting sites, Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn revealed that the Council has looked at 14 possible sites, one on the outskirts of Waterford City.

The powerlessness and frustration of members was summed up by Council Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey who said there was not an awful lot the Council can do at this moment but let time play its part.

It's clear however that the old 'laissez-faire' attitude of public representatives towards travellers is gone for good.

Store Vegetables Carefully

When vegetable harvest-time comes round, it makes all your previous hard work seem worthwhile.

But it can still be undone if you fail to store produce carefully.

Rot may set in if you don'T keep it aired and at the right temperature

and you must take precautions against mice and other vermin which can quickly ruin and contaminate it.

As the first line of defence it is advisable to store vegetables under cover and behind wire mesh. After that you need to tailor storage according to your crops and keep checking for and removing 'bad uns' in case they affect others.

Most root crops will be ready to lift by the end of the month and need brushing down to remove earth — the possible source of damp and disease.

CARROTS — should be carefully cleaned and the green tops cut away about half an inch above the crown. Store them in trays of dry peat or sand in dry, cool and frost-free conditions.

BEETROOT — many people like to leave these for harvest when needed, as with parsnips, but they must be protected against early frosts. The best way is to heap straw on top of the soil.

However, if you do want to harvest, make sure they are carefully brushed or washed free of soil before storage in the same way as carrots.

LEEKS AND CELERY — early frost is also a worry with these, so earth them up in their trenches for protection.

BRASSICAS — More durable against a cold snap but broccoli and brussels in exposed parts of the plot can be caught out by strong winds and should be supported.

TOMATOES — cold and wind can also ruin the last of your tomatoes. Harvest now rather than take the risk. Even green fruit can be ripened if you place them in paper bags in a warm place such as the airing cupboard

You'll wait longer if you follow the tradition and line them up on a window sill — warmth ripens rather than sun.

POTATOES — the main harvest of the month is likely to be potatoes and they will still be coming right in October as tops yellow to signify the end of the tubers' growth below ground.

Needless to say, use the fork gingerly to avoid damaging the tubers when lifting and try not to leave any behind to harbour pests for next year's crop.

Lift the tubers in dry conditions too, allowing clinging earth to dry for a few hours before brushing off and storage in a cool, frost-free place.

Lay them out in trays and cover to exclude light — today's ever-plentiful black plastic sacks are useful but jute sacks allow air to circulate more freely.

How To Work Wonders With Your Next Salad



Turn tubs of ready-made salads into a gourmet feast with these unusual ideas

PARADISE MELON

Ingredients:

1 Honeydew melon
2 x 6 oz (175g) tubs celery,
apple and orange salad
2 oz (50g) roasted hazelnuts
2 oz (50g) raisins
2 kiwi fruit, sliced

2 kiwi truit, siic Method

Cut melon in half lengthways, scoop out seeds and discard. Remove flesh using a fruit baller or teaspoon. Mix melon flesh, tubs of salad, hazelnuts and raisins together then spoon back into shells. Decorate with the circles of kiwi fruit.

PINEAPPLE WITH PRAWNS

Ingredients:

1 pineapple

1 mango

4 oz (110g) black grapes 2 x 6 oz (175g) tubs prawn

1 cox apple, sliced and soaked

in lemon juice 1 orange, sliced

Method

Cut pineapple lengthways, leaving leaves attached. Remove the core, cut out the fruit leaving a 1 cm (1/2 in) shell. Cover shells and chill

Dice pineapple, and mix with other fruits. Spoon mixture into the shells. Arrange prawn salad along the middle of each shell

FRENCH SALSD MOULD

Ingredients: 3/4 pt water



2 tbs geletine 4 tbs gelatine 4 tbs cider vinegar 1/2 tsp salt 2 x 8oz (225g) tubs French salad

Method

Bring 1/2 pt water to the boil, sprinkle

Bring 1/2 pt water to the boil, sprinkle on the gelatine and stir until dissolved. Add the vinegar, salt, remaining water and drained liquid from the salads to the gelatine until on the point of setting.

Stir in the French salad, and spoon into a 13/4 pint (1 litre) mould. Cover and refrigerate for 3 hours, or until set.

PORK 'N' RICE

Ingredients:

4 oz (110g) long grain rice 2 x 6oz (175g) tubs spring salad 2 oz (50g) sweetcorn 81/2 oz (235g) smoked pork sausage diced 2 tbs vinaigrette dressing



U.F.A. MEETS MINISTER ON FARM ISSUES

A United Farmers Association delegation consisting of Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry National President, Michael O'Callaghan, National Chairman, Barney Gallagher, National P.R.O., Catherine Beglin, National Secretary, Paddy Boylan, Leinster Vice President and Daniel O'Donnell, Donegal, recently met Jimmy Deenihan, T.D. Minister of State at the Dept. of Agriculture, Food and Forestry. The meeting which took place in Agriculture House covered a broad agenda. On Disadvantaged Areas the Minister gave an assurance that farmers who will be successful under the current appeal will be in a position to benefit from increased payments in 1996. President Phelan put it to Mr. Deenihan that current agricultural policy was creating a new breed of native landlord and that capping and tiering of price supports and headage was the only way to bring equity into the systems. On Rural Renewal Minister Deenihan agreed with the U.F.A. delegation that small farmers should be encouraged to stay on their holdings. The Minister gave the delegation the most up-to-date synopsis of Leader II and recommended a positive approach by everybody in order to achieve the best results for Rural Ireland.

On the T.B. issue the Minister informed the delegation that the current situation was that the vets were not co-operating with rotational testing and that the Department were employing an extra forty vets. Daniel O'Donnell expressed fear of a full scale strike by the I.V.U. and suggested that a regular test once a year should be quite adequate for control of T.B. He again made the case that all reactor animals other than factory-ready cattle returned only 50% or less of their real value to the farmer. The Minister reported that the work was proceeding on his proposed Land Use Policy and that it could be published in the Autumn. The Minister said he was aware of the difficulties that small dairy farmers had in acquiring essential quota and he promised to keep this area under constant review.



While there has been growing concern in Munster over Justice Minister Nora Owen's deployment policy of new garda recruits, there has been no such worries in Dungarvan, where two new garda graduates are set to increase the district's garda

Since March 1994, seven classes of new recruits have graduated from the Garda College in Templemore with just 36 of the 519 new garda members being deployed in

For Dungarvan

Waterford city and Dungarvan each received five force to an acceptable recruits compared to just

four in Cork city, while Clonmel fared best in the province with 7 new recruits since 1994. These figures however are in stark contrast to the massive fig-ure of 373 recruits deployed in Dublin.

Templemore's class of '95 has granted 2 recruits to Dungarvan - Lorraine Kelly of Arklow, Co. Wicklow and Ronan McDonald of Co. Mayo - who both completed phase 4 of their garda training in Dungarvan before returning to Templemore for 6 weeks where they graduated on August 18 last.

Commenting on this latest recruit deployment, Superintendent Pat Quinn of **Dungarvan Garda Station** said he was very pleased with the return of Gardaí Kelly and McDonald to the local district where they have already served with distinction.

At Shandon

a narrow escape on Monday night, August 22 last when their car collided with a horse near the halting site, Shandon, Dungarvan. The incident, which occurred around 10 p.m., was recounted by Touraneena man, Robert Walton who was travelling home in the Kilgobinet direction after collecting his wife and 2 children at the bus stop. The full impact of the animal shattered the windscreen and back windows and smashed in the roof. "The car is a total write-off," he declared, "it's a miracle how we survived."

An animal lover, Mr. Walton told the "Dungarvan

A Touraneena family had Leader" that he was absolutely shocked and devastated as a result of the crash. "My daughter loves horses and pony riding," he said, adding that the dead mare had a foal at foot.

Obviously shocked at how close his family had come to a fatal encounter, Mr. Walton said something will have to be done about the problem of animals on the public highway.

After the accident the Gardai arrived promptly and the entire Walton family was hospitalised overnight with minor cuts and bruises.

Mr. Walton said he wanted to publicise the incident to highlight the potential danger of the Shandon area. "Street lights should be erected," he urged "and the public should be warned of the dangers." Describing the entire area as a "deathtrap," Mr. Walton said he will not let the issue pass until the problem is resolved.

... Dungarvan Gardaí investigations into the accident are continuing.

NEW PROPOSALS

Meanwhile proposals to control wandering horses have been finalised by the Dept. of Agriculture, Food & Forestry. The proposed measures, which represent the culmination of 4 months work within the Department and wide-ranging consultation with interested parties, are set to become new legislation as soon as possible.

These proposals include provisions for the licensing and identification of horses; a ban on the sale of horses to minors; the disposal of horses which have been repeatedly confiscated by local authorities and the recovery in full of confiscation costs and other appropriate penalties.

One of the main advocates of this new legislation is Deputy Austin Deasy who raised the issue on numerous occasions in the Dail.

Deputy Deasy told the "Dungarvan Leader" that he had been promised that the new legislation will be introduced at the forthcoming Dail session which will be held during the coming weeks.

BILLY QUINN - A TRIBUTE

On Tuesday evening August 22nd as I wonderful weather we had been enjoying seemed to have gone for good. Dark menacing clouds scurried across the sky, bringing high winds and rain. That weather persisted all through my journey.

Passing Leamybrien on that lovely drive into Dungarvan, with the Comeragh mountains on the right, the lush grasslands, that are a feature of that part of Waterford on the left, the sea beyond, suddenly as if I had waved a magic wand, the sun appeared. It had begun to set in the west casting a long beam of light across the sea towards Youghal. I knew, that it was a guiding light pointing towards Cork Airport, where one of Dungarvan's favourite sons, was making his final journey home.

Ten o'clock in Dungarvan, groups of people were making their way out to the Cork Road, where they gathered into a large crowd at the Garda Station. Silence now, as the hearse approached, slowed to walking pace as the cortege moved off to St. Mary's Parish Church. It was now 10.30 p.m. The crowds had grown larger, as we arrived I thought of Billy, as he had done so often on the stage, he had drawn his biggest audience yet.

At the church his nephew Fr. Richard was in charge, at the reception of the remains the coffin was shouldered into the beautiful church, which is St. Mary's. By now the church was full, the prayers were said. The entire congregation came to sympathise with Pat, Annette and the family. People whom I had never met before shook my hand saying to me, "we all loved Billsie". I knew they meant what they said. During all the years I have known him he spoke highly of them, his beloved friends from Dungarvan.

Wednesday morning at 11 a.m. St. Mary's was thronged for the Mass, which, Fr. Richard said, was a celebration of Billsie's life. The beautiful ceremony was bright, joyful and sad. Fr. Richard was celebrant accompanied by Fr. David Gibson, Fr. Gerard Chestnutt, Diocesan Sec., Fr. Gerry McNamara, and Fr. Jim Sullivan, Dungarvan. Reading and prayers of the faithful were read by Billy's son Mark and other members of the family. The

singing of the chosen hymns were beautidrove from Dublin to Dungarvan, the fully preformed by well known singers Libby Flynn accompanied by organist Mrs. Gertie Morrissey.

In his homily, Fr. Richard said of Billsie. "He was a very good actor. His love of people was a joy to behold. Billsie enriched all our lives by knowing him". At the end of this never to be forgotten ceremony, Libby Flynn sang "Bring In The Clowns", one of his favourite songs. When it finished, the entire congregation burst into applause. A recitation or lament was then recited entitled "Farewell To the Fit-Ups", as the touring theatrical companies were called. The final prayers, the blessing of the coffin finished, Billsie's remains were taken to the cemetery at the rear of St. Mary's, to join his mother and father. After the prayers and a decade of the Rosary, Billsie was finally laid to rest. The cemetery looks out on a wonderful setting, of little villages, farms and houses, rolling valleys and hills. Looking at that peaceful scene one couldn't help remembering Billsie in his prime, loving this countryside, when the sounds emanating from that rural setting in those days, was the horse and cart going to the creamery in the early morning, and the elusive sounds of the corncrake.

POSTSCRIPT

Billy Quinn was a star artist, all through his life. His mission in life was to bring happiness to everyone he came in contact with. He succeeded. Despite all he know and they were many, he never forgot, the people of Dungarvan, they were all family to him. The town where a "star" was born seventy years ago, turned out in style to welcome him back home.

He would have been very proud. We are grateful to Fr. Richard and his fellow clergy and those who made the ceremony so great for us all. It was a privilege to have known Billy for 50

years. We will never see his likes again. Fear no more, the heat of the sun, Nor the furious winters rages, Though thy worldly task is done, Home art gone and taken thy wages, Golden lads and girls all must As chimney-sweepers come to dust. May His Soul Reside In Heaven

DUNGARVAN WALKING CLUB

St. Declan's Way In

The sweltering heat of the past number of weeks brought about a change to the planned walk to Knockanaffrin on Sunday, September 20 and instead we were off to Ardmore to walk a section of the beautiful St. Declan's Way which stretches from Ardmore to Cashel covering a total of 94 kilometres.

The walk itself has a long and checkered history stretching back to 350 AD when, it is believed St. Declan came to Ardmore to baptise the people of the area. The modern St. Declan's Way is as faithful as possible in following the route of ancient folklore and highways, following along a track of country lanes, boreens and riverside tracks and it is hard not to feel a deep sense of history as we travelled along and witnessing at first hand the ruins of old raths, churches and the Old Mill at Glenlickey.

We started our walk at Grange along a section known as Bothar na Riolog along a dirt track which took us to the beautiful setting across the River Lickey where, it is reputed one stone close to the river crossing bears the foot print of St. Declan.

Our guides for the walk, Michael and Fintan gave us a full and detailed account of all the historic landmarks along the way with Michael making continuous reference to the excellent map produced by Ardmore Enterprise which details every historic landmark and places of interest along the way. 

Weanling Sales At Dun-garvan Mart Commence On Thursday September 21st

Both Cork Marts and Teagasc are very keen to promote Good Management of Suckler Herds so that weanlings are presented at our marts in the best condition for sale. This will ensure a good supply of quality stock for buyers thus avoiding problems after purchase.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

WEANLING MANAGEMENT

Events that occur around this time of are associated with weaning, transport and sale of weanlings.

Losses - It is reckoned that losses due to poor weight gain, respiratory diseases, veterinary and treatment costs amount to over £20 million in suckler herds or in farms where suckled weanlings are purchased. Buyers say that the good bull weanlings are the more prone to respiratory diseases, probably because they suffer more stress and are more highly disturbed when mixed with other similar animals at marts and new farms.

An average death rate of 2 - 3% has been reported with purchased weanlings with standard veterinary bills of £8 - £10 per head. Losses in animal performance would amount to at least as much again.

Teagasc Campaign — Against this background Teagasc have initiated an intensive advisory campaign, in co-operation with local livestock marts, to address the problems of respiratory diseases, lack of thrive, loss of condition in suckler cows and cow losses due to tetany.

Reducing Stress - Maximum stress is exerted on weanlings that have a change in diet, environment, that are mixed with strange stock and weaned at the same time. This happens when a weanling is taken off the cow and sold at mart. To minimise this stress, do not make all these changes at once.

Ideally, the weanling should be weaned before sale but most suckler producers would be reluctant to do this due to a reduction in thrive and condition post weaning. However, creep feeding can go a long way in breaking the bond between the calf and its dam. Farmers who creep feed find that calves are much less dependent on the cow and are "half weaned" when the cow is taken away.

Creep Feeding — This is a very worthwhile practice. As grass supply is falling in the autumn and as the cow's milk yield drops there is a good response to meal feeding at 1 - 2 kg. meal per head per day. Apart from the straight economic response, animals that are fed will look better at sale. However, a more important aspect could be the reduction of stress at weaning and especially if sold, meal fed weanlings settle much faster when taken to the new farm.

Vaccination — The other prong of the Teagasc programme is to encourage vaccination of weanlings pre-sale against respiratory diseases, especially the viruses IB, R. P13 and RSV. Producers should consult their vets in relation to the most appropriate drug to use.

Under finished cattle should be kept thrivyear inflict considerable stress on the ing at 0.9 to 1.0 kg a day. Supplementary suckled weanling. The major stress factors feeding will be necessary to achieve this unless grass quality is excellent.

Meal Feeding — Examine finished cattle regularly and sell the ones that are finished. These are only competing for grass with other stock and they may also become overfat. The response to meal feeding at grass can vary a lot. The best response will be got from the higher priced cattle e.g. quality continental crosses. The response could be poor on small fleshy cattle, especially if grass is fairly good.

Where cattle are not fit for the factory, there are a few options:

1. Feed meal at grass and sell as they become fit. This is satisfactory on good dry land but may be a bit awkward if there is a large group of cattle. Feed 2 - 4 kgs a head daily, depending on stock type and grass quality, meal should be introduced gradually, the high rates to be fed to large continental cross cattle.

2. House the heavy cattle and feed silage and concentrates for a period. This may be the best option where grass is scarce or of poor quality, e.g. on a farm where there is plenty of quality silage that is capable of giving a higher rate of gain than the grass. Grazing would then be prolonged for other stock of lower productive requirement e.g. suckler, cow, weanlings.

SILAGE QUALITY

On most farms silage is the key source when planning winter feeding programmes as the level of animal production, the need for purchased concentrates and profits will depend on the amount and quality of silage available. The quality of grass silage can vary quite considerably in terms of preservation and digestibility. Some silages are capable of supporting 0.8 kg a day liveweight gain or 2.5 gallons a day milk yield, while others may not be capable of even supporting the maintenance requirements of livestock.

Silage analysis has a role to play in planning your winter feeding programme with the aim of optimising farm profits. An accurate silage test will help to determine the following:-

- What performance can you expect from animals fed silage?
- What quantity and type of concentrate supplements are required?
- Is there enough silage to meet winter feeding requirements?
- Is it necessary to review grassland management or silage making techniques for next year?

The accuracy of the silage analysis is important because vital management decisions (e.g. supplementation levels) are based on the results.

The IFA President said he was in constant contact with the Department to ensure that all steps are taken to facilitate the orderly marketing of cat-tle in spite of the IVU's strike action on testing.

Referring to a telephone poll published in last week's Farmers' Journal which

showed mixed views on the rotation of TB testing, Mr. Donnelly said he was not surprised by the response given the question that was asked and the massive lobby carried out by IVU on their farmer clients. He said that despite the intense IVU propaganda, only a quarter of the farmer respondents felt the vets had a case on rotation.

The IFA President stressed that the real issue was the establishment of an effective TB eradication scheme, with EU funding, which the IVU

was trying to sabotage yet again. Mr. Donnelly said £15 million of EU funding was at stake in the present industrial action by IVU vets who were blocking reductions in disease levies in pursuit of their own narrow interests.

Mr. Donnelly said "the message coming loud and clear from the IFA grass roots network is the demand for an immediate slashing of the £30 million annual bill in disease levies and real progress against TB."

Substantial Scope From Improved Markets For Higher Pig Prices

Tierney, has said there was definite scope for higher pig prices in current market circumstances. Mr. Tierney pointed out that international markets were short of product and that demand for pig supplies is very strong.

The IFA man said that the UK market was very short of middles and backs and that prices had risen sharply in recent weeks. "Import prices to Ireland for pigmeat products are at an all-time high due to scarcity," he explained.

Mr. Tierney pointed out that the German pig market was also very short of supplies and that the extended spell of warm weather had increased demand for grilling meats. He explained that German pig prices had increased strongly during the past 2 weeks.

Attempts by some Irish slaughterhouses to bring down pig prices are totally at odds with the market reality and should be vigorously

Waterford IFA Pigs & resisted," continued Mr. Pigmeat representative, Ian Tierney. "It is in fact the case that prices should be rising," he said. The Waterford Pigs repre-

sentative explained that pig supplies were tight due to slow thrive and hot weather. "Slaughter weights have fallen but the best advice for producers is to keep moving pigs to reduce stock density and maintain a consistent supply to what should be a very buoyant market," he added.

Mr. Tierney said "the continuing warm weather will unfortunately disimprove sow fertility resulting in smaller litter sizes. This, in turn, will lead to a reduced supply of slaughter pigs next April and May."

"The combination of tight international supplies, slow pig growth in Ireland and huge demand for product in Japan and other markets have together created an opportunity for improved prices which producers are clearly justified in demanding at this time," concluded

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

Mr. John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford Executive of ICMSA, welcomes the public liability premium reduction for farmers. Farmers who erect a farm notice on Occupiers Liability will get a special premium discount on their farm insurance.

PMPA are offering farmers a £30 special discount on their Public Liability cover if they erect the farm notice designed and sponsored by ICMSA. This offer is the first reduction in premium of any type offered by an insurance company as a result

of the new Occupiers Liability Act which was passed by the Dail last June.

ICMSA, who negotiated many improvements to the Bill, succeeded in getting a provision in the Act which allows a farmer to reduce his obligation to visitors if a proper notice is erected at the entrance to the farm. The ICMSA sign was written by the Association's Legal Advisors. It informs visitors to the farm that the farmer excludes his duty of care to visitors as is allowed in law. The effect of the notice is to reduce the likelisuccessfully sued for compensation by a visitor who is injured on the farm.

Mr. O'Dwyer, the ICMSA President, said that ICMSA are pleased to be associated with PMPA in a joint effort to encourage farmers to erect the sign and so reduce their obligations to visitors who might suffer injury on their farms. Mr. O'Dwyer compiimented PMPA in being the first insurance company to react favourably to the new law on Occupiers Liability. Mr. O'Dwyer said he hoped that the new law would lead to a general reduction in the cost of Public Liability insurance for farms.

Vouchers for the special discount are available at PMPA offices nationwide or from ICMSA. The farm signs are available from ICMSA and can be obtained by contacting officers in the county: John Quigley, Area officer at 051-22303, or head office at 061-314677.

The ICMSA said that it had arranged with the Department that any farmer whose herd was listed for testing but which was not tested because of the dispute between the Department and Vets, can write to their District Veterinary Office (DVO) requesting a herd

Mr. O'Dwyer said that he was pleased that the Department had accepted the ICMSA suggestion that any farmer who writes to the DVO would have his request for a test dealt with. While the Department have an official request form (ER 88A), it would be unreasonable to expect farmers to have to write away for such a form, complete it and return it again before his re-

hood of the farmer being the DVO. Mr. O'Dwyer repeated his view that the Minister must ensure that all requests for such tests are carried out within one

Livestock Charter Will Be Tested In September

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has said that the first real test of the Minister of Agriculture's commitment to farmers in the Charter of Rights will come in September.

Mr. Donovan drew attention to the fact that from September 1, the Department of Agriculture was due to implement morning and afternoon opening hours (9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.) in all local offices instead of morning only opening. In addition the Department was due to begin making advance payments of headage to farmers in September and, according to the Charter, payments are to be completed by the end of October.

"In line with Minister Yates's commitments in the charter of rights, farmers are looking forward to a further improvement in the Department's performance on payment over last year which itself represented a new level of efficiency," Mr. Donovan



Both espoused what might be described as the Modh Dhircach where ground hurling was an important constituent and where a player played the ball quickly, forward rather than indulge in convoluted running and passing stratagems. Jim Cashman, Denis Mulcahy, John Fenton, Jimmy Barry Murphy, John Fitzgibbon, Kevin Hennessey and Tomas Mulcahy. They could run, pass and shoot with aplomb. It was in this era that John Fenton scored that memorable goal against Limerick when he moved the ball forward before powering an unstoppable ground shot past Tommy Quaide. Equal-ly indelibly etched on the memory is John Fitzgibbon's goal against Tipp' in Pairc Ui Chaoimh from three simple ground touches at a time when Kenny Hogan was at his best. One was the product of power, the other subtlety, control and quickness. Johnny Clifford was a great performer as player for Glen Rovers and Cork and as coach to its minor and senior teams afterwards. His own playing style was quintisentially the Cork style of securing possession and getting the sliotar forward to the attack who took the direct option unless badly placed. Their ability (and Johnny's) to strike the ball properly from the ground or from the hand and score gave a huge boost to midfield and backs whose efforts were consequently redoubled to the advantage of the whole team. The morale of defenders crumbles easily if all of their efforts result in the ball coming right back on top of them time after time. I referred a couple of weeks ago to how little ground hurling Cork played in the 1992 All Ireland against Kilkenny. In fact they played virtually none. I can recall only one meaningful ground stroke in that game and that came from the stick of Pat Buck-

spected coaches of those ley in the second half. This game plan which apparently excluded ground striking was a betrayal of the real Cork style. Johnny Clifford was not part of the manage-ment of that particular panel.

When Johnny took over 2 years ago as Cork supremo he made a very bold state-

ment.

He said he expected Cork to become All Ireland champions within 2 years. I'm sure he meant what he said but now his words make his claim a little ridiculous. When Waterford won the 1992 Under 21 national title and our minors reached the final (which they could have won) many euphoric supporters shouted aloud that a senior breakthrough was just around the corner. This very year our county Chairman proudly asserted that a se-nior All Ireland title for Waterford was imminent. This was before we met Tipp in Cork, a team who apparently didn't share his view. One other statement made by the admirable Johnny which gave offence was that any given year Cork would always beat Galway. He never, I'm sure, meant to hurt Galway folk and was 'probably' saying however undiplomatically that Galway's style posed no great problem for the reds. Cork's successes in 1966 and 1990 seemed to indicate his opinion and because Galway could very well have won both of those finals if they hadn't been tied into a too rigid possession system which Cork's positive and direct play coped with successfully. And in all of this Cork made use of all of the important skills. The moved the ball on the ground, lifted and carried it, passed it, caught it in the air (Teddy McCarthy in par-ticular) and used both sides effectively.

Only poor management de-nied Cork in 1992 and Kilkenny of course. Fr. Michael O'Brien was a very keen knowledgeable hurling man with a sound tactical sense. He was a strong

forceful character whose autocratic manner didn't always find rapport will all his panel. That harshness of expression and intolerance of weakness didn't always elicit the desired response from players especially from those of a retiring disposition. His authoritarian manner was needed in 1990 and bore a rich harvest. By 1992 its effectiveness had diminished (he was Canon by then) and Cork's hurling in the final and tactical approach were faulty. Where was the most effective counter to Kilkenny's slickness, quick ground striking? Why place a hurling sor-ceror like John Fitzgibbon at full forward and encourage the lift and handle merchants to loft in the high ball time after time when the low ball, driven forward quickly, would be grist to 'Fitzie's Mill'? Management stood indicted in this instance and for the switches not made and the replacements not used.

Cork's 1995 style would have me less than enamoured, if I were a Corkman as would their unwielding management team of 5. No 5 people can operate effectively on a big day given that a match slips quickly by and consultation almost impossible in the heat of battle. Where they achieve success one usually is more equal than the other 4 selectors and tends to dominate thus thrusting upon the hapless 4 the unwelcome role of yesman. This year's Cork team had no clearly identifi-able leaders and lacked an experienced backbone. A team without a hard core of experience is unbalanced and young players despite all their vigour and exuberance are easily dispirited and quickly lose their composure. A Mark Mullins type of centre forward has good qualities but isn't quick enough or direct enough for the position. Will Cork return to the more traditional values in 1996? Let's wait and see.

publications including The Times and The Irish Times.







Early Days Of County Waterford Athletics

As Ireland's Sonia O'Sullivan races to emphatic wins in Gothenburg and Zurich, at home there has been a swift resurgence of public interest in the whole area of

Seeing at first hand how the Cobh girl easily beat the world's top middle distance runners has inspired determination and hope in many budding young Irish ath-

Household names like Ronnie Delaney, Eamonn Coughlan, John Treacy, Frank O'Mara and Ray Flynn have all achieved international acclaim in modern times - but what of the early days and the early heroes? We need look no further than John Joe Barry and Danny Fennessey — two of the best athletes this country has ever produced.

PAT DUNNE RECALLS

A man widely experienced in the field of athletics is Ballysaggart native Pat Dunne who is a veritable hive of information on the subject of early athletics in this county and particularly the glory days of the 1940's.

Former Chairman of Ballysaggart A.C., Pat served as President, Chairman and Secretary of the NACAI Munster Council while also serving as Chairman of the Waterford NACAI Board and Vice-Chairman of the Tipperary County NACAI Board.

His deep love of athletics is evident as he recalls vivid memories of the sporting heroes and characters that shaped the athletics of today in County Waterford.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Pat said the work of the NACAI is similar to many national organisations.

"In its earlier years it catered for people between 16 and 30 mainly, now there are people from 8 to 70 participating in athletic events organised by the association," said Pat.

"About 20,000 active, competing athletes are members of the association as well as other non-participating members. A high proportion of athletes involved are juveniles as one might expect," he added.

Speaking on the club structure of the former National Athletic and Cycling Association, Mr. Dunne said it was closely related to the parish unit.

"I would remind G.A.A. people that it was athletes rather than hurlers and footballers who founded organised athletics in Ireland. The founders of the G.A.A. included Maurice and Pat Davin and Michael Cusack who were all athletes and they were the main lights of the G.A.A. during its early years," said Pat.

Moreover, he continued, the first All Ireland Championship competition, organised in 1884 was not comprised of hurling or football contests but rather athletic championships held in Tramore in 1885. "Perhaps there may be some distant relations of some of the athletes who competed that day now living in Ballysaggart," said Pat.

OFF SHOOT OF G.A.A.

According to Pat, the NACA is more or less an off shoot of the G.A.A. In 1922 when the possibility of Ireland becoming involved in international athletes became a likelihood, the G.A.A. set up the NACA to take over the athletic side of things.

One of the first and most intelligent moves of the NACA, said Pat, was to have Ireland's independent status declared at international level. Michael Collins and Arthur Griffith wired Ireland's application for membership to the International Amateur Athletic Federation as a 32 county entity. The story does not end there however as Ireland's application was accepted until 1934 when the British challenged Ireland's status as a 32 county unity in Stockholm and succeeded in having the country debarred.

A QUESTION OF UNITY

An issue dear to Pat's heart is the whole question of unity in athletics. Talks, he submitted, should be instigated to devise a formula whereby Irish athletics might by united across 32 county lines, on a basis that would be acceptable to the International Amateur Athletic Fed-

"Athletic unity would be of great benefit to Ireland because it would allow economies of scale in the utilisation of the scarce resources that are available in the Island as a whole," claims Pat.

After the Stockholm incident, Ireland refused to compromise and accept a 26 county status until some years later a group called the Amateur Athletic Union of Ireland came into being. This was a body composed mainly of people involved in amateur athletics in Dublin with a few rural branches. According to Pat the Union continued in that capacity until 1957, when an attempt at unity was made. "That attempt failed because the main thrust of it involved the acceptance of the 26 county arrangement," he said.

Recalling the early attempts of a North/South athletic unification, Pat went on to describe how adopted talks were initiated to find a formula acceptable to the IAAF which would involve Ireland being recognised as a 32 county unit. The idea of a British Isles amalgamation was considered but found to be unacceptable. Another plan devised in 1967 to end the impasse proposed that athletes from the Irish Republic would attempt to freeze out N. Ireland athletes from participation in international fixtures. "This was impractical however because Northern Irish people would get around the embargo by going to Scotland and operating from there", revealed Pat.

THE OLD DAYS

Having competed many times at international level, Pat is adamant that athletics is needed more today than ever, and claims that not enough is being done to promote this sport generally.

Praising Sonia O'Sullivan for her vital input into athletics, Pat said she has finally reaped the rewards of her perseverance, training and dedication. "She's a real ambassador for Ireland," he enthused.

Looking back to star athletes of the past, Pat spoke of the famed Danny Fennessy, or 'Donnelly' as he was known. A small dairy farmer in Ballysaggart Danny took care of his old uncle and maintained the small family farm. When competing in athletic events in Waterford City, Danny would have to cycle the 60 miles from Ballysaggart with a bad bicycle on bad roads. On one such occasion, after handmilking the cows in early morning and then cycling to Waterford, Danny competed against college athletes to win the All Ireland Mile Flat. He returned home by bike, tended the cows and later that evening cycled another 8 miles to Araglen.

"He was an athlete of distinction with a great sense of humour," said Pat, who went on to describe how Danny would run back down the line in the 6 miles cross country team event to offer guidance and encouragement to his fellow team members before returning to front the bunch and win the race. "Never since have I seen any athlete run back down the line during a race to help his friends," said Pat. "If he had the same facilities available to today's athletes such as proper diet, training and running shoes, he would have been one of the greatest

Another sporting hero of that era was the Ballincurry Hare — John Joe Barry, who won minor, junior and senior Tipperary cross country championships as well as junior and senior Munster and All Ireland titles in the 1946 season alone!

Like Fennessey, John Joe lived on a farm with his mother and family. In 1943 he competed in his first sporting meeting in Gortnaghue where he won the 3 miles event. Before the meeting he had to travel to the local creamery, walk 3 miles to and from Mass and then walk the seven miles to Gortnaghue!

John Joe went on to win national championships in England, Scotland and America and on more than one occasion he defeated Horace Ashenfetter who later won a gold medal in the 1952 Olympics.

As in the case of Danny Fennessey, John Joe's career was hindered by the lack of facilities available to athletes in Ireland at that time. Selected to represent Ireland in the Helsinki Olympics, the Ballincurry Hare called it a day, when due to financial difficulties, Ireland was unable to bring him from New York to Dublin to join the rest of the Olympic team.

Barry died earlier this year at the age of seventy but for Pat Dunne his memory and that of the great 'Donnelly' will live on as a shining example to all Co. Waterford

Special Road Repair Programme Announced

In light of the recent £460,000 financial windfall granted by Environment Minister Brendan Howlin, Waterford County Council has drawn up a special restoration programme to tackle the worst hit non national roads.

The extra funding comes as the first installment of a 10 year national programme which was prepared by the Minister to tackle the £750 million backlog created by the county roads crisis nationwide.

As a result of the restoration packages from which the Council expects to benefit over the next decade County Engineer John O'Flynn claims the funding would bring the county's dilapidated infrastructure back up to the high standards of twenty years ago. While the funding has been warmly welcomed by Council members, not a few have pointed out that the £466.000 'extra' was just over the actual amount by which the Council's grant was cut earlier this year (£422,000).

NOT ENOUGH

Congratulating Minister Howlin on this most recent allocation, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain said that at last the problem of county roads was being "taken by the scruff of the neck".

The amount he felt, however, was too small for County Waterford as some back roads he claimed have gone 'beyond repair'. "It's a well known fact that our County roads were never so bad", he added, "£460,000 goes nowhere near meeting the needs of the bye roads".

The Nire Valley councillor also expressed disappointment over the fact that Council members had not been consulted when a special restoration programme was being drawn up.

County Engineer John O'Flynn, however, said the Council had to operate to a strict deadline.

The programme was put together in a hurried fashion", he admitted while adding that he had hoped to conduct a regional survey of the county's worst non-national roads which would qualify for the funding, but was unable to due to the early August closing date.

We'll tackle the worst road first", he promised and then revealed that work under the special restoration programme areas to benefit from this year's funding are Tramore, Kilmacthomas, Lismore and Ardmore where surface dressing, road strengthening and surface restoration works will be carried out.

"The additional allocation is a most welcome intervention in arresting the decline in these roads", said Mr. O'Flynn. "A detailed survey of our regional and county roads has been completed, and this will facilitate the preparation of a 10 year restoration programme prioritised in respect of the as- for funding in 1996.

sessed needs on a county wide basis", he added.

Cappoquin Councillor Nora Flynn, however, also expressed her disappointment at the non-inclusion of members input into the roads programme. "Three-quarters of the country are on holidays in August", she slammed.

A strong advocate of roadside cleaning, Cllr. Flynn said that if drainage along the roads had been maintained all along, then the Council wouldn't need a restoration programme.

Reechoing Cllr. Flynn's sentiments of roadside cleaning, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said he had reservations about a 10 year plan. Large injections of money, he stressed, are needed in the first five years of the pro-

A REFRESHING

Complimenting Minister Howlin on the impact he made on the Health Department, which was his former portfolio, Cllr. Billy Kyne said he had no doubts but that this impact would be matched in his role as Environment Minister. The Council, he urged, should write back to Minister Howlin and thank him for this initial effort in 'straightening' out the regional and county roads. "He is a refreshing change in the Department of the Environment", he said, "and I think local authorities will do well out of him".

While welcoming the additional funding, Cllr. Kyne submitted that it was very important that meaningful work be done with the money and that the increased employment content be maximised.

DEPUTATION REFUSED

At a former meeting of the Council members had agreed to seek a deputation with Minister Howlin to impress upon him the dire situation of the County's regional roads. In a reply to the Council, however, the Minister claimed that in light of the additional funding a deputation would serve no useful

Reacting to the Minister's rerusai, a disa pointed Ciir. Jackie Fahey claimed that Co. Waterford was not getting a fair deal, £422,000 was cut in the Council's Discretionary Grants for non-national roads this year and Cllr. Fahey surmised that this amount was only now being restored to the Council in the guise of additional funding, with conditions attached.

Council Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey, however, said the Council will have to make do with what they've got and hopefully climb higher in the national league table

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
