On Monday night last, the victorious Waterford Ladies footballers found themselves at the centre of attention in a packed Grattan Square.

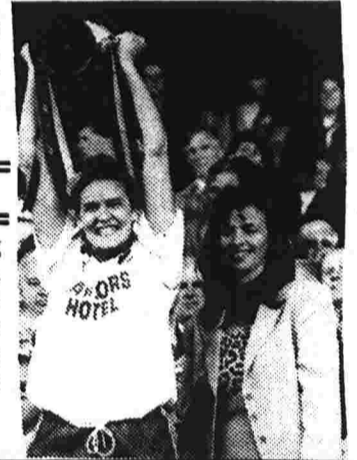

'Beeches' Development Site For Sale

Known locally as 'the Beeches', the former Hackett Estate at O'Connell Street, Dungarvan is currently for sale on the property market as a lucrative building opportunity.

The 1.7 acre site with planning permission for 18 semi-detached houses is a mere 250 yards from the town centre and carries a £120,000 price tag.

Once a densely overgrown site, extensive tree surgery has been carried out over the past few months, allowing passers-by an uninterrupted view of the once stately building known as the Brewery Lodge. Built in 1837 by John Robert Dower, the building has un-

dergone rapid deterioration in recent years and will eventually be demolished to make way for any future development.

APPEAL REJECTED

Although the site is being sold with planning permission for 18 houses, proprietor Richard O'Hanlon of Bishopstown, Lismore, lodged a second planning application with Dungarvan U.D.C. earlier this year for a private estate of 15 houses complete with garages.

An appeal however was later lodged by Elizabeth and Matthew Connolly who reside in the house next door to 'the Beeches' at 'Ravensdale', Shandon. CONTINUED ON PAGE 44

"Celtic Connections" Revived At South East Seminar

A Seminar recently organised by the Waterford Carrefour - Euro Centre in South East Ireland — on behalf of the Dept. of Finance confirmed the level of interest in developing new and existing linkages between South East Ireland and Wales.

The Seminar entitled "Developing Interregional Links between Ireland and Wales" provided an insight into the newly approved European Initiative — INTERREG II — and its relevance to economic development in both regions. The Ferrycarraig Hotel in Wexford was flooded with people from throughout the South East region on the 14th September who went along to determine how this new Programme could be of

benefit to them.

The Programme which covers areas such as tourism development, enterprise networking, education and training, marine environment and emergency planning as well as transport infrastructure is expected to incite many new cross-border projects in the coming years. The recent Seminar certainly revealed the level of potential it holds for this region.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I have children doing Junior and Leaving Certificate examinations next year. My only income is a social welfare payment. Is there any help available with examination fees?

ANSWER

There is provision for reduced fees in cases of hardship. The amount of the reduction is at the discretion of the school authorities and application should be made to the school principal. Hardship may include unemployment, prolonged illness of parents, large family with inadequate means, single parent, more than one member of the family doing exams, etc. The fact that the child or the parents have a medical card does not necessarily entitle you to a reduction in the examination fees. A certain amount of money is allocated each year by the Department of Education to schools and VECs for this purpose.

We understand that the fees system for second level schools is being reviewed by the Department of Education at present and this may result in some changes to the current situation.

Lismore Town Commissioners Meeting

At the commencement of the September meeting, the Chairman Mr. P. Dowd welcomed back the members after the summer break and thanked them for their support at a number of functions held during that time.

PEOPLE OF THE YEAR AWARD

It was unanimously agreed on a proposal of Mr. D. Whelan, seconded by Mrs. M. Ryan that Capt. John Ledingham be nominated for the 1995 people of the year award.

CORRESPONDENCE

In a letter dated 25th July from the County Engineer, in relation to the public lighting at Ferry Lane, it was agreed that the relocation of one of the public lights here has led to a deterioration in lighting here. In addition, the new pole at Sheehan's also came in for criticism as it was felt that it should at least be painted black. Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey again highlighted the need for a new short section of path above the Bank of Ireland. It was agreed on a proposal of Mrs. Morrissey, seconded by Mrs. M. Ryan that the County Engineer be invited to meet the Commissioners.

A letter was also received from the American Ambassador Jean Kennedy Smith thanking the Commissioners for the gift which she received on her recent visit to Lismore.

The Ambassador had met the Commissioners and the essay prize winners in the Library during the recent

launch of a book as part of the 150th anniversary of the Famine.

MOTIONS

The following motions were discussed "that the Commissioners propose the Towers as the site for National Famine Monument. Mr. B. Leddy stated that this motion was as a result of an invitation by the Government's Famine Commemoration Committee to nominate locations suitable for National Monument to the Famines. It was proposed by Mr. B. Leddy, seconded by Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey that the Commissioners nominate the Towers as being a suitable site.

Mr. B. Leddy stated that he had become aware that prospecting licenses had been granted by the Department of Energy to the whole Knockmealdown mountain range. He went on to state that he was anxious that details of such licensees be made known. It was agreed on a proposal of Mr. Leddy, seconded by Mr. J. Roche that the Department be requested to furnish details of licences issued for the Knockmealdown mountains.

INFORMATION ON EMIGRANTS REGISTER

Mr. B. Leddy stated that he had been invited to the 40th

Anniversary Dinner in London, where he hoped to talk on benefits of the Emigrants Register. "That the Commissioners protest against the commencement of nuclear testing by the French Government".

Mr. P. Dowd in proposing this motion stated that everyone was conscious of the effects of Chernobyl and he felt that the Commissioners should protest at the renewed nuclear testing by the French Government in the South Pacific. It was unanimously agreed to write to the French Embassy and the Department of Foreign Affairs.

Mr. P. Dowd and Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey proposed "that the Commissioners suitably acknowledge the achievements of those involved in the Entente Florale".

Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey in proposing that the Commissioners grant a civic reception to the Entente Florale/Tidy Towns committee, stated that the committee had done tremendous work in taking on and winning a category prize in the Entente Florale competition. In addition, it was certain that they had also won some prize in the tidy towns which was due to be announced on the following Monday.

There was unanimous agreement that the work of the committee was of an exceptional nature and warranted a proper reception.

Following further discussion it was agreed that the achievements of this committee should be duly honoured and on a proposal of Mrs. M. Fenton-Morrissey, seconded by Mrs. M. Ryan and resolved that "Lismore Town Commissioners hold a civic reception in recognition of the efforts made by the Entente Florale/Tidy Towns committee in winning a category prize in the Entente Florale Competition and that a framed scroll be presented".

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TIGERS

Tigers are found in many countries in Asia. Some live in jungles and swamps while others live in cold mountain areas. They spend the day sleeping and resting and at night hunt for their food. A grown-up male Tiger is the biggest cat in the world. The female is smaller and lighter than the male and is called a tigress. A tiger's striped coat acts as a very good camouflage. Tiger cubs are born in a den. They are dependant on their mother for the first two months of their life. While the mother goes hunting for food the cubs hide in caves or thick scrub.

A tigress usually has three or four young at a time. At first they drink her milk to make them strong. The father leaves the teaching and rearing of the

cubs to the mother. By the time they are two years old they are expert hunters. Tigers hate being too hot and often sit in shallow water to cool down. They are good swimmers and often catch fish and turtles to eat. In very cold places, tigers grow thicker coats to keep themselves warm. They are usually bigger than the jungle tigers. Their coats are usually paler and with fewer stripes than other tigers. A grown up male has a ruff of long hair around his face.

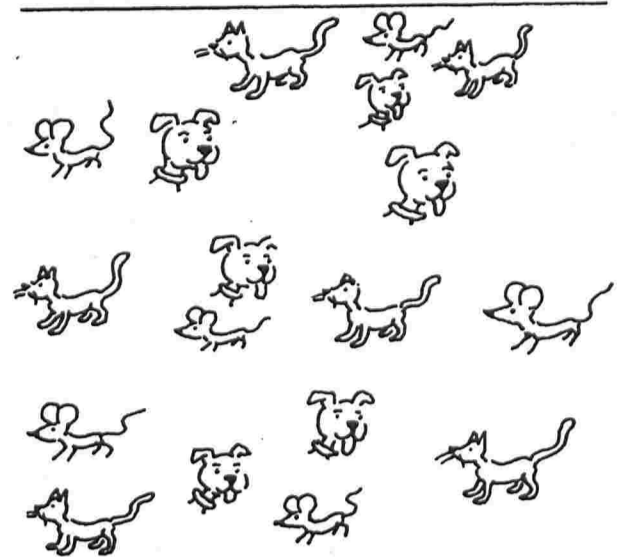
Tigers talk to each other by roaring. A male roars to tell others to keep away while the tigress roars to attract a male or to call her cubs. The large male lives alone on a special large piece of land known as his territory. He marks it by spraying urine over the bushes and trees, and leaves droppings and scrapes

grooves into the ground. This acts as a warning to others to stay away. When he is angry a tiger snarls and twists his ears round to show two white spots and wrinkles up his nose. This is a warning to keep away. The tiger does not bother to chew his food but swallows it in large chunks. Sometimes he eats so much, he does not have to feed again for several days.

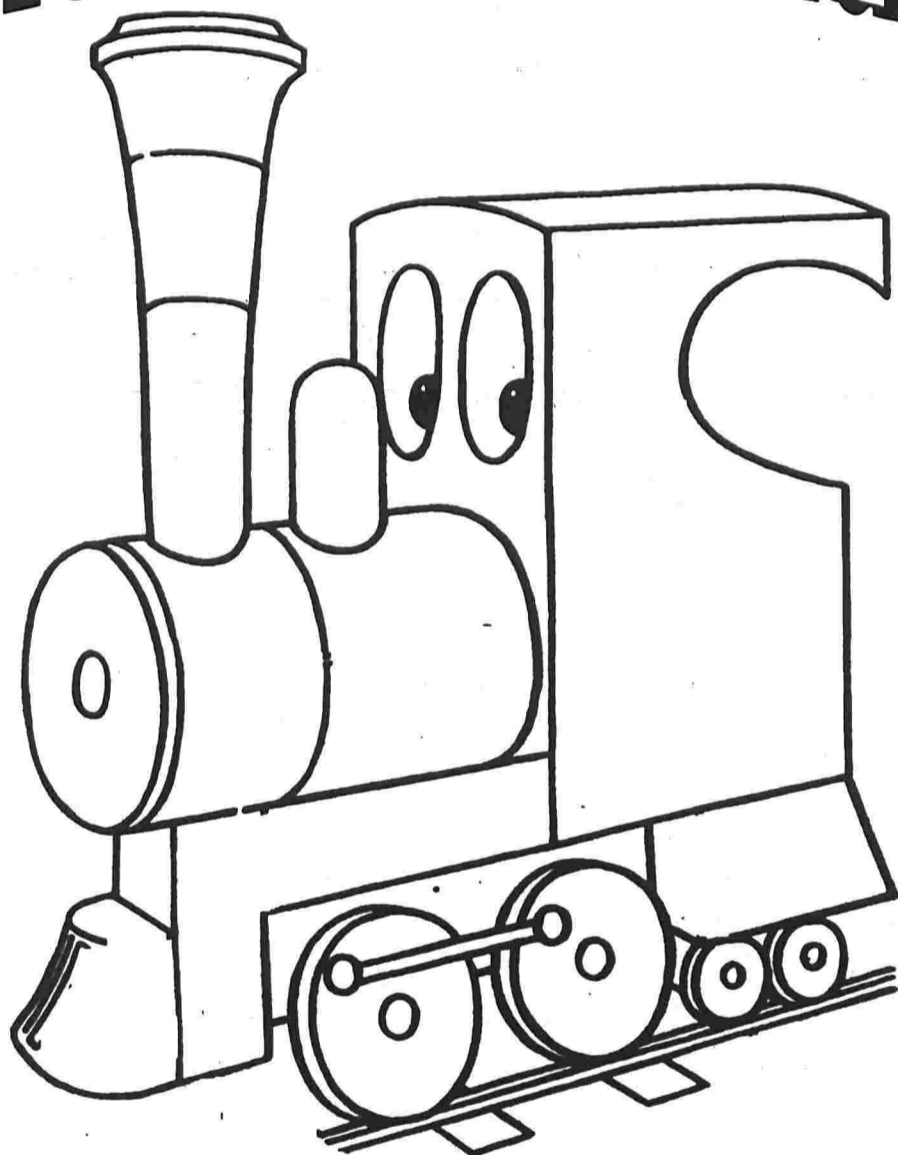


ANIMAL LINES

Why Bears Roll Up The Carpet

Appearances can be deceptive. And this is certainly true in the case of the fierce-looking grizzly bear.

It has a heavy, powerful body and is one of the largest land flesh-eating animals. Yet the bear doesn't really need its enormous strength and eats more vegetables than meat.

According to Susannah Cook in her book *A Closer Look At Bears And Pandas*, the bear's flat-footed run is not fast enough to catch most animals, so it lives on a diet of berries, nuts, fruit, grass, tiny animals, insects and grubs. The first bears lived about 15,000,000 years ago and were no bigger than wolves. Their large size is partly the result of living on a vegetarian diet. When searching for food, a bear marks out its territory as a warning to other bears. It leaves scratch marks high up on trees, which show the size of the animal and scares off smaller rivals.

A bear will also roll up turf like a carpet to feed on insects living underneath.

It also digs holes in the ground with its strong claws, looking for grubs and small rodents. Some hillsides, where bears have dug, look like a major excavation. A hole can be big enough to take a grand piano.

Bears don't travel very far afield, because they need lots of energy to carry their large frames. Their eyesight and hearing are bad, but they do have a good sense of smell that warns them of danger.

Like other meat-eaters, they have small front teeth and huge canine teeth. Bears have also developed flat, crushing teeth for grinding vegetables. Bears seldom acknowledge each other, but they are "talkative" with their young.

A mother bear is patient, but strict, and plays with her cubs or watches them. But if she gets tired of their never-ending activity, she will cuff them or send them up a tree.

Females with cubs are dangerous and will fight to the death to defend them. Unlike most animals, cubs stay with Mum for more than a year.

There are seven species of bear, which include the black, the grizzly and the brown.

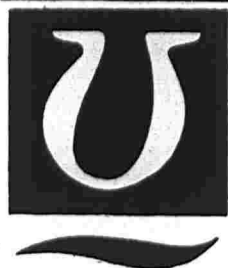
Depending on weather and food supplies, bears usually sleep from October until the spring.

The black bear nests under a tree, the grizzly digs a den and the brown bear sleeps on a bed of moss and twigs.

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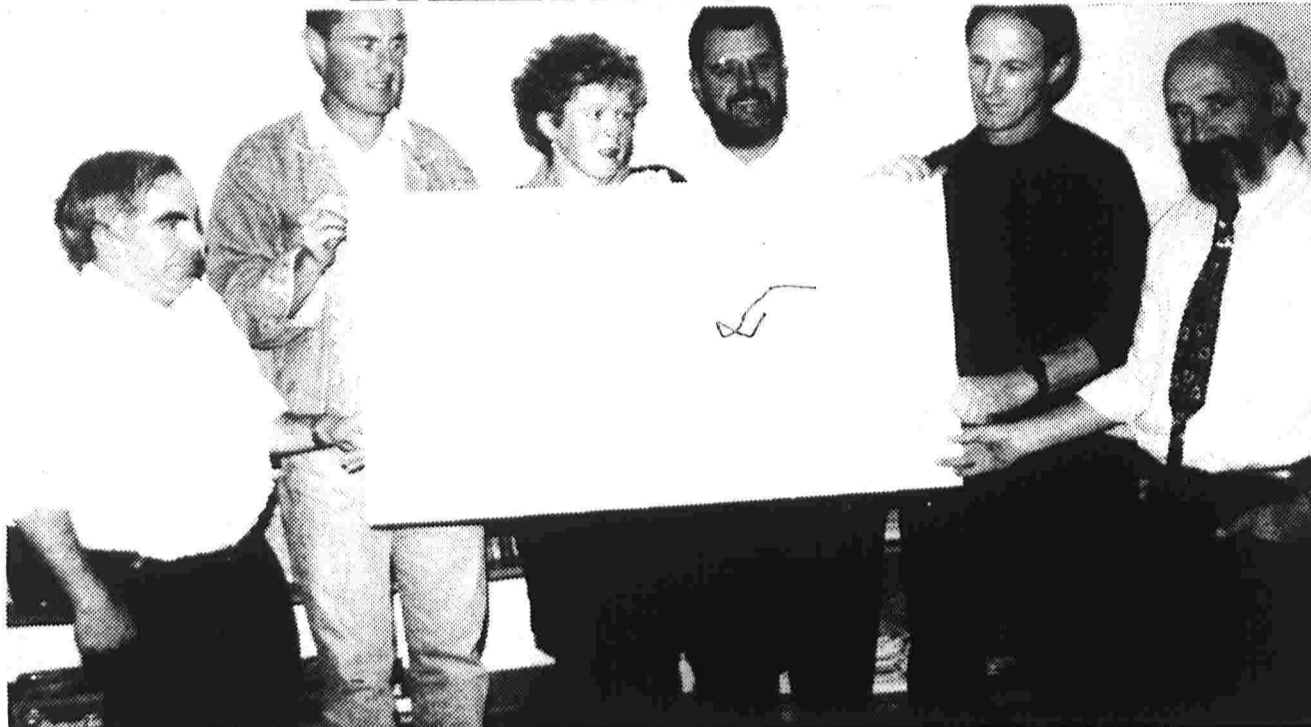

Villierstown Tidy Towns Report

Villierstown scored a total of 183 points in this year's Tidy

Towns competition compared to 179 in 1994. The following is the adjudicator's report (last year's marks in brackets)—

Effort (35) 35 — It was a pleasure to adjudicate Villierstown again this year. The village, as always, looks well with its neatly maintained green areas, maturing trees and shrubs and colourful flower displays. It was also good to note the erection of interpretative panels since the last visit of this particular adjudicator.

Good luck with your plans for a pathway leading from the picnic area at the quay through to the woodland area together with any other projects you take on in future years. The cross-roads area looks well with its well painted fencing and young trees.

Tidiness (32) 33 — Litter control was excellent, there was no litter in the village during adjudication. Aspects of untidiness are of course, derelict buildings of which you are aware and some weedy areas. Do try to keep roadside edges straightened along their green edge.

Presentation of Buildings (32) 32 — As noted in last year's progress report and acknowledged in your questionnaire, the problem of derelict buildings and absentee owners is a severe problem for the village. However, perhaps the impact of these buildings could be lessened a little if they were, where possible, maintained neatly boarded up and the surrounds kept tidy as a temporary measure.

Other buildings in the village were presented to a mixed standard, quite a few were in need of painting and/or repairs, particularly some residential properties. Both the school and its grounds look well.

Presentation of Natural Amenities (30) 32 — The flowerbed/shrubbery on the commonage is a welcome addition to Villierstown and those responsible are to be commended. Other green areas are presented to a very high standard and young trees are maturing well. Flower displays are an attractive feature of the village also.

Interpretative panels both for the church and for the village and its surrounding areas are an excellent amenity feature and "tell the story" of the village and its important buildings for the visitor. The picnic area and the quay in general was well presented. However, a seat here needs to be repaired.

Presentation of Approach Roads (33) 34 — Approach roads to the village were presented to a very high standard and name plates and other road signs were neatly presented, clean and legible also. All items of street furniture such as telephone kiosks, litter bins and seating were generally well presented. The John Tracey monument was much admired. The water pump feature is very attractive also.

Perhaps an amenity feature could be made of the grassed area which divides the two roads leading down to the quay. Well painted kerbstones on the road leading out to the school are an attractive feature of this road.

Presentation of Residential Areas (17) 17 — Some residential properties on the road out to the school are in need of attention in respect of cleaning and/or painting roadside facades and boundary walls. The overall standard of presentation under this heading remains good.

Sincere congratulations to all the Waterford Ladies and their mentors on a tremendous performance.

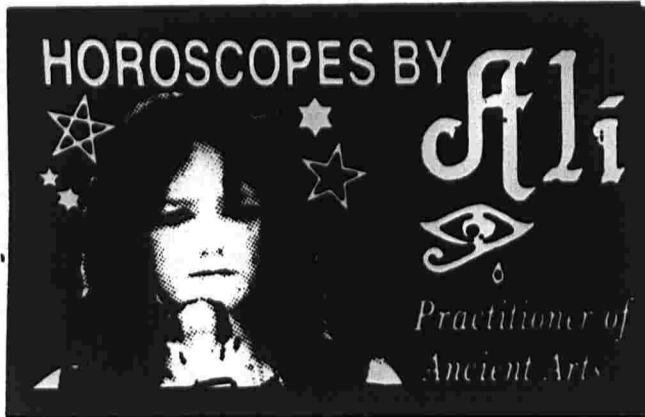
MINI SEVENS

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Building And Repair Time

October tends to bring a seasonal sawing and hammering — it is a favourite time for pre-winter garden repairs and buildings.

The former has to come first but moderate weather also allows scope for larger projects such as a new shed, garage or greenhouse.

The dos and don'ts are:

DON'T buy something too flimsy for the job. If your garden is exposed — and that's one good reason for wanting a greenhouse — then you don't want something that will collapse in a stiff breeze.

Your outbuilding also requires preparation work, which will be wasted if the crowning structure is broken down by wind and simple wear and tear within a couple of years.

BARGAINS

Yes, there are bargains around but check them for strength before buying — spending slightly more may give you a much better deal.

This is particularly true in the case of sheds: a few pounds more buys a proper timber floor and roof rather than chipboard — the latter only needs to be waterlogged once before it starts to disintegrate.

Proper weather boarding rather than fence-style overlap is also worth paying for as it will prolong the shed's life by many years.



Consider galvanised and painted sheet metal structures for their labour-free maintenance, though be aware that they can be lightweight and easily damaged by sharp contact with hastily stored tools or a kicked ball!

DO ensure that the site is free from waterlogging or the base of your new building will become unstable or rotten and the connecting path churned up.

A slight slope is best and unless you plan a greenhouse with an earth floor, should be prepared with a brick or concrete foundation.

PREPARATIONS

DO make proper preparations. The labour-saving way is to lay bricks or pre-cast concrete blocks onto the earth, but many prefer to dig out a foundation, lay hardcore and create a timber frame to take a concrete mix.

Whichever you choose, make sure the foundation is proud of the surrounding earth. In windy situations it is also advisable to attach the building to the foundation.

DO familiarise yourself with the plans before starting and double-check all rectangles and diagonals as you go. Call an electrician if you want power laid on to your shed or garage and ask for a residual current device or circuit-breaker to be included — garden power tools can be deadly.

DO start maintaining your new structure immediately by saturation with a good preservative — three coats is not excessive for a new shed. Creosote is effective, but a modern spirit-based equivalent is probably better and less toxic to surrounding greenery even if it is dearer.

Shed floors can also be protected against condensation and dripping tools by a layer of newspaper or cardboard topped by a resilient layer of lino — your local specialist should be able to sell you a non-garish off-cut for a few pounds.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

GRASS

There is little or no growth at present in most parts of Co. Waterford. Many farmers who are heavily stocked have very little grass and are feeding large quantities of silage. Due to lower stocking rate, many farmers have some grass. These are also feeding silage, at least to the cows, at a rate of something like one bale to 25-30 cows.

The prospects for any significant growth are now rapidly fading. It is now likely that cows will have to be housed earlier than normal. However, the prospects should be very good for keeping young stock out until late in the year.

The options for those farmers who are seriously short of grass or silage are:

- ★ Drying off cows that are giving less than 2 gallons.
- ★ Drying off a larger number of cows where there is a quota and feed problem.
- ★ Selling some stock earlier than usual.
- ★ Buying feed.

When it comes to buying, straights and meal are better value than very expensive silage bales of straw. A mix of two to three good quality straights can be bought at around £130/tonne. This compares in feeding value to brewers grains and superpressed beet pulp at around £30/tonne, or reasonably good quality silage at £20 to £22 per tonne.

In relation to cattle sales, some forward stores rather than beef could be sold if prices are favourable. Also where cattle are finished in late spring, they could be fed extra concentrates and finished in early spring, as soon as they become eligible for the slaughter premium and the 22 month premium.

MEAL FEEDING BEFORE WEANING

Meal feeding before weaning has a two-fold effect:

1. — It improves weaning performance.
 2. — It lessens the bonding between the cow and the calf.
- In most cases meal-feeding can be justified on the improvement in animal performance alone. As grass supply and quality falls, supplementary meal feeding will give a response.

There is now a higher proportion of Continental type cows in suckler herds. These are not noted for milk yields and therefore their calves are more dependent at an earlier stage on alternative feeds. Furthermore, the progeny of such Continental cows are likely to be one quarter bred Continental with very high growth potential and the ability to utilise supplementary feed efficiently.

COW/CALF BONDING

Meal feeding before weaning makes the calf less dependent on the cow, helps reduce the bonding between the cow and the calf, thereby reducing the stress of weaning and ensuring the weaning is less susceptible to disease. Buyers say it is their experience that meal feeding prior to weaning and sale goes a long way to preventing the type of severe health problems that have occurred with purchased weanlings in the past few years.

Meal fed weanlings settle in much faster after purchase than their non-meal fed comrades. Therefore, all weanlings for sale should be creep fed. It will also enhance the response of vaccination by reducing stress levels.

FARM FORESTRY

Farm Forestry can be an attractive option in the following situations:

- ★ On large farms with low livestock densities generating a low family income per hectare.
- ★ On fragmented farms with land some distance from the main farm yard.
- ★ On farms being operated by part-time farmers who require a high financial return to their labour input.
- ★ On farms where the farmer or spouse are earning taxable incomes.
- ★ On marginal land.

Since the CAP reform measures and regulations are complex and impact differently from farm to farm, land owners should seek objective and independent advice and information.

In order to assist farmers who already have a forestry enterprise or who are contemplating the establishment of a forestry enterprise, Teagasc and the Forest Service, Department of Agriculture, Food & Forestry, are organising a series of forestry demonstrations during the month of October.

The Co. Waterford demonstration will take place on Friday, October 6, on a number of sites in the Colligan area from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. This demonstration will provide landowners with an ideal opportunity to obtain information on all aspects of forestry including pruning/thinning.

The levels of Afforestation Grants and Annual Premium Payments make forestry a very attractive enterprise. However, each farmer must carefully assess the economics for his/her particular farm. Advisers with special expertise in this area will be available to provide advice at the demonstration.

All cars should park at Teagasc, Shandon, Dungarvan, any time between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. Bus transport will be provided to and from the demonstration sites.

Booth Advises Livestock Farmers To Sell Fit Cattle Now

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman, Richard Booth, speaking at the National Ploughing Championships in County Laois recently, said that at current market prices cattle farmers should move finished stock as they become fit.

Mr. Booth said "Feeding to finish cattle to sale prior to the end of November makes a lot of sense particularly in the context of boosting our chances to qualify for the 1997 Slaughter Premium."

would have to be matched by an equally positive commitment from meat processors to maintain at their current stable level until the end of the year. Mr. Donovan said that it was very undesirable for producers to attempt to hold cattle over until early 1996. "The negative implications of such a move in terms of Slaughter Premium qualification and market pressure would be very costly for farmers."

Commenting on this, the Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Maurice Donovan said that a positive response from farmers on this issue

In addition Mr. Donovan said that with reduced fodder stocks on farms it makes little sense to attempt to feed animals for more than a minimum period.



FARMING LEADER

Sheep Farmers Need Support

Action must be taken by the Government if sheep farmers are to remain viable, the ICMSA's Sheep Committee Chairman, Eamonn O'Rourke stated. Mr. O'Rourke quoted from the latest Central Statistics Of-

fice figures which showed that one thousand farmers have quit sheep in the last two years. He called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, to deliver a top-up to the ewe premium to support

the incomes of sheep farmers.

"The time has come for the Minister to deliver on the promises he has made to obtain support for the sheep sector. Many sheep farmers and particularly the early lamb producers, sold lamb up to £10 less per head than they received last year for French type carcasses. These losses can only be made good by a direct payment to farmers in the form of a top-up to the ewe premium," said Mr. O'Rourke.

Mr. O'Rourke also called on Minister Yates to seek changes in the quantities of lamb imported into the Community. With the community being less than self-sufficient in lamb, some imports are required but it is the timing of these imports in addition to the quantity that affects the market for domestic lamb, said Mr. O'Rourke.

Particularly for imports of New Zealand lamb, the Minister should seek that the import quota be reduced but also it should be divided evenly throughout the year so that it does not cause serious market disruption at certain times. Traditionally, the EU market has been targeted at Easter and Christmas for New Zealand exports.

Mr. O'Rourke said that unless the Minister delivers support to Irish sheep farmers there will be an exodus from sheep production with job losses at farm and processing levels.

Animal Welfare Council Call

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, has called for the establishment of an Animal Welfare Council in this country.

The Council, he said, would provide for a rational approach to farm animal welfare issues.

Mr. O'Dwyer proposed that the Council members would be drawn from farming, veterinary, research and trade interests. The body could also include a representative of the Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

"Given the economic importance of the livestock sector in Ireland, I believe this proactive approach is justified," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He pointed out that similar Councils have been set up in seven other EU states.

"I believe that a number of campaigns on animal welfare have been run on the basis of perception rather than on the realities of the issues involved.

"Any decisions on the future of animal welfare must be based on facts and reality which hold no threat to Irish livestock producers."

Mr. O'Dwyer said the new Council would act as the authoritative body in relation to the treatment of animals at all stages of their lives.

IFA Achieves Flat Rate Addition Of 2.5% VAT On The Sale Of Thoroughbred Horses Abroad

The Revenue Commissioners and the IFA have agreed that farmers on the flat rate VAT refund system who sell thoroughbred horses at auction abroad within the European Union, will be entitled to receive the 2.5% Flat-Rate VAT Addition on the sale price of their animals.

The move comes following negotiations between the Revenue Commissioners VAT Section and IFA National Horse Committee representative Pat O'Neill.

Information about the agreement reached between IFA and the Revenue has been circulated to auction houses known to sell thoroughbred horses on behalf of Irish breeders.

Mr. O'Neill recommended that farmers covered by the flat-rate VAT refund system, who have recently sold thoroughbred horses at auction, should immediately apply to the auctioneers for the 2.5% Flat-Rate Addition.

CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL IRELAND CHAMPIONS

For all their considerable achievements in football to date far too many Waterford people still don't recognise fully the enormous progress which Ladies football has made in our county and the national recognition that Waterford Ladies footballers have earned for themselves and the Decies. Last Sunday at Croke Park they crushed a good Monaghan team to win Waterford's fourth All Ireland title in five years a feat which is the envy of any other team sporting the Waterford colours and beyond anything they have accomplished since the G.A.A. was founded. They have earned the respect of every other county in Ireland and our warmest congratulations. Not too many years ago Kerry - who else - dominated football including Ladies football as Waterford struggled to establish themselves.

Last Sunday's triumph was made possible by the tireless work of many people. It would be impossible to name them all but to me two men stand out from all the others - Noel Murray and Michael Ryan from Ballymacarbry. Noel could be said to have pioneered ladies football in Waterford and unselfishly invested a tremendous amount of his time and energy in setting up the structures to harness the footballing talents of girls throughout Waterford. His dedication to this end took him all over the county assisting, encouraging and enthusing ladies young as well as mature, all to put us on the ladies football map. Last Sunday gave him immense satisfaction and fulfilment as he watched his team sweep aside Monaghan in their surge to victory. Those white and blue jerseyed girls made Noel and all of us proud of being from Waterford.

Michael Ryan is an extraordinary chap. The effort he puts into a campaign is staggering and watching those fleet-footed girls at the game or on television later in the evening gives some idea of the achievement of a trainer like Michael who had his team super fit, confident and positive. When interviewed after the final he was quick to give all of the credit to his fine team and was lavish in praise of their dedication and dedicated preparation. That was typical of the modest, generous Michael who never seeks the limelight and is eager to share well deserved tributes with his panel and deflect attention from himself. But nobody is in any doubt but that the successes of the last few momentous years stemmed principally from his organisation, motivation and meticulous preparation.

I know Michael for almost thirty years and came to know him particularly well when I became associated with Four-

milewater hurling club in 1969, the year they were enthroned County champions in intermediate hurling at Dungarvan's Fraher field.

The Ryan name figured prominently on that team of strapping men - Michael, Jim, John and P.J. our present county chairman. Michael showed his character in his approach to training. He never missed a session, was never late and carried out all instructions with thoroughness and enthusiasm. He was most responsive at team talks, ever ready to air his views and his contribution, was always intelligent and constructive. His sincerity, honesty and integrity marked him for a successful future in coaching. How fortunate for those girls from his own Ballymacarbry club and from other ladies football clubs in the county that Michael took up the challenge of coaching the Waterford team. And he undertook this onerous task at a time of Kerry supremacy in the game.

This year was a crucial one for Waterford ladies. Last year's All Ireland victory was very hard earned indeed with Monaghan running the winners close. Earlier this year it took a late Catriona Casey match winning point to secure victory in the league over the self-same Monaghan at Fraher field. So Michael's task was to inspire his team to greater heights than ever. This he did superbly for the league final against Mayo, for the Munster final against mighty Kerry, the semi-final against Mayo and the showdown in the All Ireland final with Monaghan. Waterford, all through, reflected Michael's unquenchable spirit and complete commitment.

Thank you Michael. If the award "Waterfordman of the Year" existed I would gladly nominate Michael Ryan for it, confident that this enthusiastic dedicated Deiseman would top the lot.

Mention of Ballymacarbry reminds me of that club's key role in the development of the ladies football. Their love of football was nurtured in the local national school where Georgie Barry (Dungarvan native) and Mrs. O'Gorman prepared them so well for the rigours of football. That school set standards and dominated schools girls football for many years and try as we did in Tallow we could never master them until 1990 when we beat them in the schools final in Abbeyside after a great contest, and not by more than two points. I remember starting training with the girls in September and continuing with it right through the winter and spring until our efforts were rewarded with sweet success. To us it was the equivalent of reaching the summit of Mt. Everest and it gave us a terrific sense of achievement. During their school year I can remember

the style and skill of Geraldine and Martina Ryan, Noirin Walsh (this year's captain), Marie Crotty and Aine Wall among many of those young girls who grew up to become All Ireland stars for their county.

The phenomenal spread of the game has made the championship a truly national one, so Sunday last's title has added significance. The strength of ladies football in Waterford now must gladden the collective hearts of all associated with it, including National President of the Ladies Football Association, Helen O'Rourke as well as Michael and Noel. The association has now secured sponsorship from A.I.B. of the ladies Gaelic Football championship for the next three years, a clear indication of that company's confidence in the game, in its future and in those who administer it. With Waterford under 16 ladies winning an All Ireland a few weeks ago Monaghan once again providing the opposition) the future looks bright for the men, women and children of Waterford who cherish excellence.

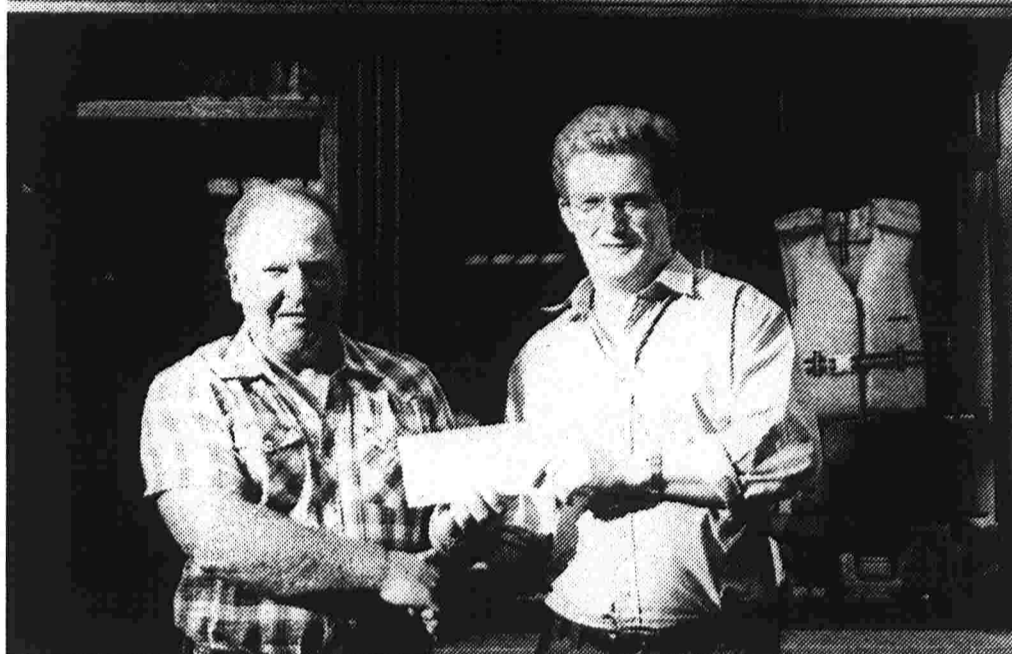

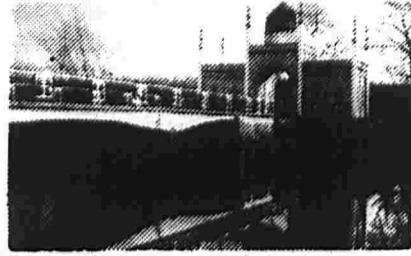
What a pity it doesn't have the same effect on everyone!!

Team captain Oliver Clancy (on right) gives instructions on woodcraft to the scouts (from left) Jimmy Duggan, Garvan Kyne, John Browne, Kevin O'Mahony, Michael Regan and standing, John O'Dea and Jim Cullinan. Oliver Clancy and Jim Cullinan were unavailable for the 1958 team and were replaced by Brian Morrissey and Pat Langan. John Browne was captain of the team and they were again successful in retaining the trophy. That made it four times the 4th Waterford won the trophy in the 1950's as they also had triumphed in 1953 and 1955. It was indeed a golden decade for the village troop.

Cappoquin Tidy Towns Report 1995

Cappoquin was awarded 177 marks in this year's Tidy Towns competition. The following is the adjudicators report, 1994 results in brackets.

EFFORT: 31 (31)

The Cappoquin Tidy Town Committee is to be complimented on the preparation of the work programme for 1995 and we wish them luck in the completion of projects identified. Litter control has improved tremendously since last year.

Your anti-litter campaign and work parties appear to have been successful, well done. It is good to note an agreement with the local authority to purchase and rebuild derelict properties. Well done on your recycling campaign scheme. In the "Coillte" plan for the conversion of the Glenshelane Wood, do include an interpretative panel with direction signs in the town out to the amenity area.

TIDINESS: 25 (23)

The garage/yard located beyond the fire station which features many abandoned car wrecks should be tidied up or screened from public view. As noted above there has been a substantial improvement in litter control since last year. Keep up the good work.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS: 34 (33)

Try to eliminate plastic neon signage such as that featured on the "Toby Jug" premises. Most beer companies now provide more modern non-plastic, non-neon signs. The "Tavern" bar features a very attractive sign. Avoid tiling facade finishes such as that featured on the "Uniacke" premises and an unidentified premises with black tiling which features "Homestead" stickers in the window. The canopy of the "Top" garage could be cleaned. Signage on the Credit Union looks particu-

larly well. The grounds of the Health Centre could be planted with trees and shrubs. Many buildings along the main street of the town are in need of painting, particularly in the area around the Garda station and the fire station. Discourage the use of canopies such as that featured on the "His and Her" hair salon premises. The "Lehanes" garage premises has some fine traditional features which should be retained when being refurbished. Window apertures of the vacant premises beside the Garda station should be boarded up properly and the roof here repaired. Well painted buildings include "Barron" and "The Saddlers".

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES: 31 (29)

Flower displays and hanging baskets in the main street are colourful. Amenity areas beside the fire sta-

tion and the Garda station are maturing beautifully. The rose bed at the grotto at the Clogheen road junction is very attractive. Some consideration might be given to planting wild flower seeds in the dry stone wall along the left hand side of the road on entering from the Clogheen road junction at the grotto. We look forward to the completion of the Bog amenity project. Do provide an interpretative panel for this feature.

PRESENTATION OF APPROACH ROADS: 38 (37)

Approach roads to the town are planted to a very high standard and name plates are visible and well maintained. The "Failte" name plates are a welcome feature. Footpaths and their kerbs throughout are maintained weed free. Most items of street furniture looked well. The grassed area on top of the wall on the left hand side of the road inside the 30 mile speed limit signs on entering from the Lismore road could be planted with low growing, ground cover plants or shrubs. Some

sponsorship plaques on some of the litter bins are rusted and could look better. The new stone wall along one approach road looks remarkably well and is a significant achievement over such a short space of time.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS: 18 (18)

No doubt the gardens of the new dwellings under construction will be landscaped when building work has ceased. Residential properties on entrance from the Clogheen road are very well presented.

No doubt the house under construction here will have its garden landscaped. The residential development beyond has a very nicely landscaped area, however, some boundary walls could be cleaned and/or painted. Rear facades and out houses of dwellings along the main road which can be seen from this residential development are particularly unsightly and need to be cleaned and/or painted. Boundary walls along the main road of the properties are also in need of attention.

Excellent Conditions For Record Breaking MS Cycle To Dublin Spearheaded By Wyley and Murphy

The Dungarvan Branch of Multiple Sclerosis 5th annual sponsored cycle from Dungarvan to Dublin took place on Saturday, September 16. This was a record breaking trip to Dublin in many ways. We had the oldest cyclist in the history of the event, Rory Wyley, and also the youngest in Frank Murphy Jr. participating. We also had the biggest number of cyclists for the event since its foundation, with 24 cyclists.

That means our sponsorship record was also broken. Our bucket collection in Waterford and Kilkenny was also the best on record. The weather conditions were the best we ever had for the cycle. Rumour has it that Tom 'Stylo' Riordan is back in training to enter the history book in next year's event.

The President of the MS Branch, Fr. John Kiely, arrived at the Square at 5.50 a.m. it was still quite dark at the time. The five women cyclists were due to leave the Square at 6 a.m. Fr. John gave them his blessing and off they went on the 140 mile trip to Dublin. Aidan Daly and Alan O'Brien were two busy men at this time with the video camera recording everything for posterity. Frank Murphy and his back up team of Pat Barry, Eamon O'Mairtin and young Johnny Murphy were working like beavers at this stage to have everything loaded on the back of the van — food, drink, spares, etc., for the cyclists when they needed them and to make sure of the smooth progress of the cycle.

Next on the starting line were the 19 men cyclists at 7 a.m. Fr. Kiely also gave them his blessing and off they went to Dublin. It was learned just before 7 a.m. that Pierce Casey of Faha would not be taking part due to an injury he picked up the previous day. This would have been Pierce's fourth trip on the sponsored cycle to Dublin. We wish Pierce a speedy recovery. The MS bus, full of collectors and helpers, left the Square at 7.30 a.m.

The first reports to come back to the bus were that Ann O'Brien and Dolores Coughlan were the first over the Category 3 climb at the Pike, followed closely by the O'Donnell sisters and Ann Marie O'Brien. Rory Wyley led out the peloton over this climb.

The bus went as far as Carrolls Cross to get ahead of the cyclists to let the video men do some work. John O'Brien also started his commentary from Carrolls Cross to Dublin.

The women went straight through Waterford to keep their time advantage. But we do believe they had a comfort stop between Ballyhale and Mullinavat for 5 minutes. The men arrived in Waterford at 9 a.m. to be

greeted by the Mayor Cllr. Maurice Cummins. The Mayor was introduced to the cyclists, collectors and helpers by Tom Power. The mayor wished all concerned with the cycle a happy and safe trip to Dublin.

Meanwhile, John O'Brien and Seamus Ahearne were speaking on WLR with Eddie Wymberry about the cycle and the MS Branch in Dungarvan. The mayor restarted the cycle at 9.20 a.m. The bucket collection started 9.30 a.m. and finished 11.30 in Waterford. The response from the people of Waterford was very positive.

The bus left Waterford at 11.15 a.m. for Kytlers Inn, Kilkenny. When we arrived at Kytlers Inn the cyclists were finishing their lunch. The men and women cyclists were now together for the first time since they left Dungarvan. All the cyclists left Kilkenny before 1.30 p.m. Pat "The Gunner" Cunningham and Hugh Kerley were at the front of the bunch on the road to Kilkenny. All the women were in their slipstream. Tony O'Sullivan and Liam Connors really looked fresh. The lunch at Kytlers must have worked wonders as all the cyclists were making good time on the road to Kilkenny.

The bucket collectors went to work for two more hours in Kilkenny where they did very well. Frank Murphy and his back up team reported a trouble free day so far. The cyclists arrived in Kilkenny at about 5 p.m. Leading the bunch were the ESB quartet of Jimo Meehan, Pat Veale, Jim Johnson and Michael Clancy. There was great relief when the cyclists reached Kilkenny as they knew they had the heart broken of the trip to Dublin, as only 25 miles remained to be cycled.

It was time to be on the bikes again at 5.30 p.m. to cycle to New Lands Cross to await a gardai escort. The last 25 miles were cycled at a very relaxed pace as time was on the cyclists side. This is also a very dangerous section of the cycle as the traffic is moving quite fast on the Naas dual carriageway. The cyclists need to be very alert at this stage of the cycle. This is where the cyclists with plenty of experience come into play, such as the likes of Ray Kelly, Tony Ryan, Conor

Fitzgerald, Rory Wyley, Michael Motherway and Tony O'Sullivan. They all arrived at New Lands Cross at 7 p.m. to be met by three gardai outriders.

From New Lands Cross to O'Connell Bridge, the cyclists had the freedom of the roads through the city. The gardai were stopping all oncoming traffic, through traffic at traffic lights, etc. It was like the last stage of the Tour de France in Paris with all the excitement and the crowds up for the match.

John O'Brien gave a detailed commentary of the excitement and atmosphere of the closing section of the cycle. Phil Liggott best look after his job with Channel 4 when John is still around! With all the excitement, Rory Wyley worked his way to the top of the bunch to join Ann O'Brien and Frank Murphy Jr., to lead the cyclists into O'Connell Street. This was a great achievement by the 24 cyclists who started when it was dark in Dungarvan and to finish in Dublin at 7.45 p.m.

Age of Beauty

Choosing a Cleanser

When choosing a cleanser it is very important to make the correct choice of product in order to prevent skin irritation: Cleansing preparations are made to suit different skin conditions and to perform different tasks. They are not like ordinary soap as they come in a special form which does not leave the skin taut or alter the PH level. Their purpose is to free the skin of surface oils. As the skin becomes less oily with age, the use of soapless cleansers can cease. Pore grains can also be used on oily skins. The grains contain oatmeal or almond meal, and they are made into a gritty paste on the palm of the hand with a few drops of water and used like an abrasive rub. The paste should be worked into the oily and blocked areas of



the skin and then washed off before it dries. Used correctly pore grains help to prevent formation of blocked pores.

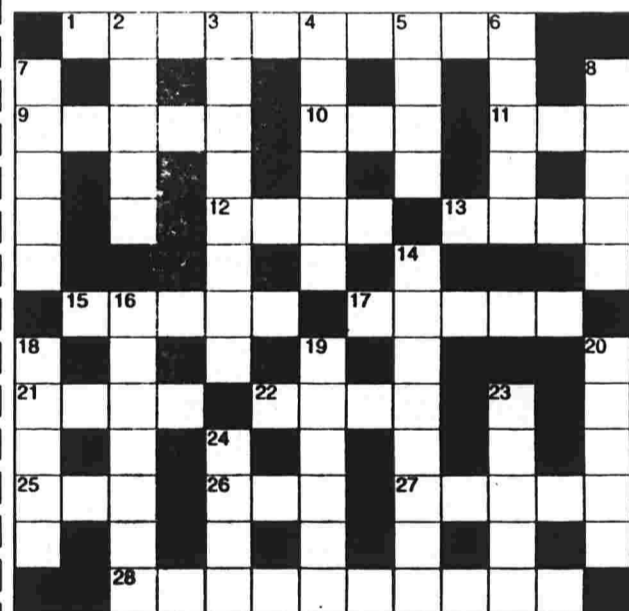

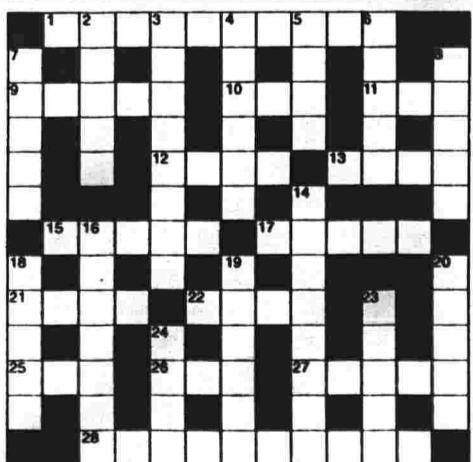

Doctor's Column

Q: I have developed some intensely itchy purple-coloured spots around my wrists and elbows. I'm a teacher and assumed I 'd picked up scabies at my school. I got some treatment from the chemist, but the rash is getting worse.

A: Scabies certainly produces intensely itchy spots around the hands and wrists and being in contact with lots of children does put you at risk. But scabies spots aren't purple.

It sounds as though you may have a skin condition called lichen planus. About half the people who get lichen planus have these itchy areas in their mouth and that can help to diagnose the problem.

We don't know what causes it but it isn't infectious, nor, is it serious - you only need treatment where there are symptoms. A steroid cream should help and your local doctor can prescribe this.

Menus for the week

- 40g/1 1/2oz cocoa powder
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 200g/7oz butter
- 100g/4oz caster sugar
- 100g/4oz white chocolate, roughly chopped
- double cream or custard to serve

- Place the apples and lemon juice in a large pan with the sugar and honey. Toss the apples gently to coat in the honey.

- Cook, covered, over a very gentle heat for 3-4 minutes until the sugar has dissolved and the apples have just softened. Place in a greased 1.4 litre/2 1/2pt ovenproof dish.

- Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Sift the flour, cocoa powder and cinnamon into a large bowl. Add the butter and, using fingertips, rub the butter into the flour until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumb.

- Stir in the sugar and white chocolate and then spoon evenly over apples in the dish.
- Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes until the top is crisp. Serve warm or cold with cream or custard.

Serve drizzled with a little of the remaining strawberry purée and sprinkle with the reserved chopped strawberries.

(1955-1995)

The entire community of Clashmore and surrounding areas were shocked a month ago to learn of the death of Carmel Foley, Coolbagh, Clashmore, at the young age of thirty-nine years. Carmel lost her battle for life on Monday morning, September 4 in St. James's Hospital, Dublin.

Carmel (née Power) was born into the Power family of Coolnacapogue, Tramore, on the 21st September, 1955. Redmond and Carmel have two sons, Redmond Junior (6) and Cormac (4).

Carmel, a woman full of life and vitality, was taken ill in June '94. She was diagnosed as having leukaemia. Having battled and battled through a year with the disease, it was decided that a bone marrow transplant would be necessary. Her brother Willie was deemed to be the most suitable donor. The transplant took place in June this year in the Bone Marrow Transplant Unit of St. James's Hospital, Dublin.

We all had great hope as the operation appeared to be a success and Carmel was preparing to come home to restart normal living. But alas it was not to be, towards the middle of August complications had set in and she had to re-enter hospital.

The next few weeks were hard on her as she fought with all her might, but finally due to her gradual deterioration, she had to be transferred to the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital. Her husband Redmond, her mother and family and Redmond's family kept constant watch, but the Lord spoke when at 10.30 a.m. on Monday, September 4, He took her home to heaven.

Brilliant Waterford Destroy Monaghan

WATERFORD 4-14 MONAGHAN 1-5

Turning in a display that bordered on perfection, Waterford destroyed Monaghan in the All Ireland senior ladies football final at Croke Park on Sunday last. The attendance of 10,500 spectators were treated to a show of football brilliance and poor Monaghan were blown away by the sheer power, speed and skill of a magnificent Waterford team.

In truth the Northern side were lucky to escape with an eighteen point defeat as Waterford were inches away from scoring another four goals. After last year's close encounter the Decies girls were determined that there was going to be no repeat and the Brendan Martin Cup was safely locked up with the key thrown away when referee Christy Haughey blew the half time whistle.

In thirteen years of involvement with ladies Gaelic football, I have never seen a team so mentally and physically right as Waterford were when Croke Park steward Jim Bannon (a native of Modeligo) knocked on the dressing room door last Sunday afternoon at 3.15 p.m. Fit, eager, hungry with tons of football ability and loads of experience, Monaghan never stood a chance.

In the kick around before the game they were buzzing, everyone wanted the ball. In the parade behind the Artane Boys Band they were like a side on a mission, heads held high, fists clenched, ready in every sense of the word. Whatever chance Monaghan had went when Waterford captain Noirin Walsh won the toss and elected to play with the strong wind that blew down towards the Hill 16 end of

the ground.

The midfield pair of Martina O'Ryan and Olivia Condon began to immediately dominate and Claire Ryan notched the opening point on 40 seconds. Within two minutes Aine Wall landed another from all of forty five yards. Marie Crotty found Geraldine O'Ryan and the Dublin based student nurse kicked the third. Crotty pointed a free.

Waterford were flying and Monaghan's rare attacks were being easily dealt with by a razor sharp Waterford defence, and goalkeeper Anna Lisa Crotty had her easiest afternoon in a long time. Aine Wall took a pass from Olivia Condon and her piledriver flew across the face of the Monaghan goal. Marie Crotty pointed a difficult free in the 11th minute and within thirty seconds Claire Ryan put Aine Wall in for Waterford's 6th point.

Waterford played on the fact that Monaghan lacked tough match practice and the plan to keep the ball moving quickly paid handsome dividends. A sixty second spell effectively decided the 1995 All Ireland final. Monaghan's keeper Ann Gavin saved from Marie Crotty but her clearance went over the side-line on the Hogan Stand side. Martina O'Ryan's well flighted line ball dropped on the edge of the Monaghan square. Full

back Mairead Kelly and Ann Gavin got their calls mixed up and when the ball broke Geraldine O'Ryan flicked it to the net.

Straight from the kick-out Waterford attacked again and corner forward Rebecca Hallaghan drove to the net. Geraldine O'Ryan's pin point pass found Marie Crotty and the white flag waved again. At last Monaghan opened their account when Linda Farrelly pointed a 21 min. free, but Waterford's reply was almost inevitable, Marie Crotty pointed a free.

Olivia Condon tore through the middle, found Aine Wall and her blistering shot went inches over the bar.

The third goal in the 20th minute bore all the trademarks of Waterford football. Martina O'Ryan's long delivery found Claire Ryan, a quick transfer to Geraldine O'Ryan at top speed, four strides and the ball nestled in the Monaghan net. Aine Wall's 29th min. point saw Waterford 3-10 to 0-1 ahead at the interval.

In the dressing room at half time there was a sense of calm. Everybody knew what they had to do, a quick second half score would finish Monaghan. It came in the 1st minute, Olivia Condon ran at the Monaghan defence and lobbed the ball over goalkeeper Ann Gavin to complete a nightmare afternoon

for the Monaghan keeper.

In fairness to the Ulster side they never gave up, Linda Gartland and Jenny Greenan kicked points. Eileen McElvaney added another and Angela Larkin scored a fine goal in the 41st minute. Larkin added another point. The Waterford defence assured control with full back Noirin Walsh sweeping behind effective corner backs Regina Byrne and Cleona Walsh. Sinead Walsh, Siobhan O'Ryan and Julie Torpey upped a gear and Waterford were away again.

When the final whistle blew you'd never think it was Waterford's fourth senior success in five years. The euphoria and enthusiasm was as great as '91. Team captain Noirin Walsh climbed the Hogan Stand to collect the Cup from National President Helen O'Rourke on behalf of a truly magnificent group of players.

Double champions — league and championship winners, they had left no doubt as to their place as the country's premier team,

proud of the jersey.

Every one of the Waterford players were heroines, however the midfield of Olivia Condon and Martina O'Ryan and the half back line of Sinead Walsh, Siobhan O'Ryan and Julie Torpey were something else. The full back line and keeper minded the house and the forwards are streets ahead of anything else in the game, making scores, taking scores or engineering openings, any one of the six are potential match winners.

It was a proud day for Waterford football to see such a quality performance on a big occasion. This team may well

go on to share further success, but they will never play better than October 1, 1995.

Mount Sion And Ballygunner Finish Level After A Bruising Contest

**MOUNT SION 1-8
BALLYGUNNER 1-8**

Someone said to me on the way out that it was the ideal game to give the magnificent new stand in Walsh Park, its baptism of fire. I'm sure that the 5000 crowd who came to Walsh Park on Saturday, have seldom if ever seen a rougher or tougher contest in a hurling county final. All the way, the players in a physical way gave expression to the depth of very keen rivalry which exists between these two clubs. There were occasions when the hurling looked reckless as players on both sides threw caution to the wind in their efforts to gain an initiative that would turn the game in their favour.

There were a couple of occasions when tempers boiled over and one of these resulted in a nasty free for all involving sideline people as well as players. There was a stoppage when Mount Sion goalkeeper (playing brilliantly) was sent off after 20 minutes of the first half and compelling the champions to play with 14 men for the remainder of the game. Following the sending off the mentors moved quickly to reorganise and withdrew Ray McGrath and substituted reserve goalkeeper Trevor Flynn.

The number of people who were moving around on the sideline gave rise to a problem and on one occasion, after an appeal had fallen on deaf ears, the county chairman as well as linesmen with referees and other officials had to assist in clearing the line on the stand side. I'm sure that this problem will be examined by the G.A.C. before the game is refixed.

It was a dull, foggy afternoon and while the gloom may have cooled the atmosphere it certainly did not keep the huge crowd from coming and to me the 5100 capacity stand looked to be full. There were many empty seats in the front, but hundreds were standing on the upper corridor.

There was disappointment when the public address announced a lot of changes from the teams listed on the official programme and up

to a dozen switches had to be noted by programme holders. The players did retain their proper numbers and this helped patrons.

The Thomas Francis Meagher Fife and Drum Band paraded the teams before the game.

PLAY

The game got underway at 5.18 p.m and within a minute John Meaney had pointed from play for Mount Sion. Paul Flynn was awarded a free, but sent it wide. John Meaney pointed a 5th minute free and when Davy Power, moved from full back to centre forward in the reshuffle, pointed from play in the 12th minute the champions led by three points while Ballygunner had yet to open their account.

Their name did go on the scoreboard when Michael O'Mahoney had their first point in the 14th minute and five minutes later, Paul Flynn made it two for the challengers when he sent over from a free. A minute later Philly Flynn was sent off after a foul on his namesake, Paul Flynn. Paul Flynn pointed another free in the 22nd minute and the teams were level. A tremendous point by Stephen Frampton had Ballygunner in front in the 25th minute, but a very well executed goal scored by county minor, Jamie O'Meara after a pass from Ken McGrath, gave Mount Sion the lead. Paul Flynn pointed a 30th minute free and Ken McGrath did likewise to leave the state of play at 1-4 to 0-5 in favour on the champions at halftime. An amazing save by substitute keeper Trevor Flynn from a Michael O'Mahoney drive near the end of this half was applauded all round.

2ND HALF

Within a minute of the restart, Stephen Frampton supplied Darragh O'Sullivan with a long delivery and the resultant goal gave Ballygunner back the initiative. Shortly after this the sideline explosion occurred and there was some delay. Paul Flynn, from a free put the 'Gunners two points in front in the 43rd minute. Mount Sion substituted Peter Walsh for

Michael Flanagan. Tony Browne, having an outstanding game for the county champions, pointed a free in the 18th minute and shortly afterwards Gary Gater came on for Kevin Ryan. Liam Whitty had a point for Ballygunner and Ken McGrath replied with another. In the 26th minute Gary Gater had a point to leave the sides level again at 1-7 apiece and at this stage the fog was closing in and there were some fears that the game might not finish. Then in the 28th minute Mount Sion, having survived with a man short for forty minutes took the lead when John Meaney pointed a free from near the sideline and it seemed that against the odds, the champions were going to retain the title. Then one minute later, Ballygunner goal scorer Darragh O'Sullivan pointed from play to level the game once more and two minutes later the game ended and there were very few in the crowd who were not satisfied that it was a fair result and that they will have the opportunity of seeing the final all over again. After the final whistle, members of the G.A.C. said they would meet on Monday to fix the replay. The weekend of the 14/15th looks to be the obvious time as it cannot be fixed to clash with the football final on next Sunday and on the weekend of the 22nd/23rd the county will be out in the hurling league. Waterford play Carlow in the football league on the weekend of October 14/15th, so it is likely that one will go ahead on Saturday and the other on Sunday.

This was the lowest scoring final since Tallow defeated Dunhill by 1-7 to 1-6 back in 1980. Also it was the 5th draw county final since 1972, Mount Sion were involved in three of these and won in all cases.

Kilrossanty Engage Rathgormack In Senior And Abbeyside Play Gaultier In Minor

WATERFORD HURLERS TAKE ON NATIONAL LEAGUE CHAMPIONS AT WALSH PARK ON SATURDAY

And the other attractive games listed include the Western intermediate football final involving Faha and Clashmore and several under 21 football 'B' championship games.

It certainly will be one of our busiest weekends and many patrons will be disappointed at having to miss out on some of the action on Saturday, because of an unavoidable clash of fixtures.

KILROSSANTY V. RATHGORMACK

This obviously is the one which is arousing most speculation and patrons from camps as well as thousands of neutrals are predicting a rip-roaring county final that will help to banish the memories of some of the very mediocre fare which has been served up in the championship so far.

In their first outing this year, Kilrossanty lost by 0-10 to 0-5 to their old rivals Stradbally and after this we were all inclined to write them out of the championship. They did not look very impressive when losing by 0-7 to 0-5 against next Sunday's opponents, Rathgormack. But gradually the famed club who are attempting to win their sixteenth county title and their sixth in the past twelve seasons, began to show gradual improvement and more faith in themselves and in the end came through after a splendid game against

Stradbally in the semi final. Rathgormack who have not won a senior football title since 1918, hit the headlines when they were involved in the three-timer against Dungarvan in the 1992 marathon that went to two replays with extra time in both before the men from the North East went out.

A look at the scoring chart for the year will show how impressive Kilrossanty's tally is, but there were games in which their score was remarkably low. But when we go back over their records for the past half a century or so since the Comeragh team came back to football prominence, we find the amazing number of times in which this team has 'lived or died under pressure'.

Their record is extraordinary in that sense.

For instance in the 1938 final they drew with Dungarvan at 1-2 each but lost the replay. The following season they drew with Stradbally at only 0-2 each, but won the replay and their third county title. 1942 was a year that some of their old timers are not likely to forget, as having kicked Stradbally all over the place for 55 minutes, they lost on a score of 1-5 to 1-4. Then there was the famous (or infamous) 1946 final when having drawn with Dungarvan at 0-3 each they failed

to score in the replay and suffered a humiliating 3-3 to 0-0 defeat.

They won the most controversial title in their history back in 1951 on the questionable score of 1-1 to 1-0 for Kill. This was a replay of the game which ended at 1-3 each. In the replay it was alleged that a ball going wide for Kilrossanty was kicked back by a spectator and went into the net.

Clubs like the Brickeys, who lost the final on a score Kilrossanty 1-3 Brickeys 0-5 and Ardmore who came home from the 1964 final after losing against Kilrossanty on a score of 2-3 to 0-8.

Yes, I suppose Kilrossanty were so involved in nailbiting finals and were served by such an array of legendary characters, that one could fill a newspaper about their history.

All that will be of little comfort to the fifteen players who represent them today if Rathgormack bring home the spoils.

Both teams have agreed to publish their teams in good time for the programme and let us hope that they will both do better than the teams in the hurling final last week. Not being in possession of the line out we can only speculate that both teams will line out more or less as they did for their semi final games.

The players may be switched about here and there, but it will look like Andy Kirwan in goal for Kilrossanty with Pat Hayes, Michael Fitzgerald and Tom

Prendergast in the full back line behind a half line of Brian Whelan, Matt Kiely, Brian Kirwan. Dar Mulhearn, Pierrie Whyte are the likely midfield duo and in attack the Comeragh team will have top scorer Jim Maher, Nial O'Connor who scored the two goals which sunk Stradbally in the semi final, Ger Walsh, Roger Power, Kieran Kiely, Pat Barry, Ed Flynn and company to select from.

The story about Rathgormack's record of involvement in G.A.A. affairs is brilliantly told in their history "The Spirit of Rathgormack" and one could sense from the story, that they are a very proud club, despite the fact that they have little to show in the way of senior championships won.

For the past six years they have been up with the best, but didn't have the good luck to go with their efforts at winning a senior championship which has been their ambition since they returned to prominence after winning the county intermediate title in 1984. They had also won the intermediate title in 1974.

Their lineout on Sunday will include quite a number of the players who helped

the club defeat Kilrossanty in the under 21 county final in 1989.

Their lineout if following the selection which narrowly and rather luckily beat St. Saviours in the semi final will read as follows, Pat Fahy in goal, Kevin Power, Declan Power, Ger Power, Dan Crotty, Brendan Curry, Denis Hassett, Martin Power and Billy Murray, Joe and Vinny Murray, Richard Power, Pat Crotty, Tom Dee and Ed. MacPaddin.

THE RESULTS?

If one is to take Kilrossanty's record in county finals — they have won 13 of the last 14 in which they played — then it would be difficult to oppose them. But having played in three finals against Dungarvan with practically all the same players, Rathgormack are quite experienced at this stage also.

One thing is absolutely sure and that is that there will be very little between them at the finish. Rathgormack have already beaten Kilrossanty this year and I have no doubt but they will feel capable of repeating this. I have a feeling that they just might.

UNDER-21 FOOTBALL

The afternoon programme at the Fraher Field begins at 3 p.m. on Saturday with the under-21 football tie involving Ardmore and St. Olivers, both of whom will have quite a number of their minor players in action. The intermediate football final will follow.

At Lismore at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Affane will take on Shamrocks in their under-21 football game and the third match in that championship and which is planned for the weekend, will be played at Cappoquin on Sunday morning at 11.30 a.m. between Brickeys and Ballyduff.

As will be noted from the above figures, the scoring records of both finalists are poor. It will be noted too that in seven of Rathgormack's eight games, a single score could have changed the result.

Kilrossanty's point scoring record poses a serious question about the effectiveness of their scoring machine as five points was their best in three matches and an average of half of these were kicked over by Jim Maher from placed balls.

And it is not to the credit of today's finalists that the final score (0-7 to 0-5) in their meeting in the third round, was the lowest score in all 61 matches of the 1995 county football championship.

In the appeal, Mr. and Mrs. Connolly stated that Mr. O'Hanlon failed to indicate in the site/layout plan, the proper position of an extremely high sycamore tree situated in the eastern boundary of the property. The couple also appealed against the proximity of three proposed houses to their residence. An Bord Pleanála however have rejected this appeal and planning permission

for the construction of fifteen 3 bedroomed houses with garages was subsequently granted to Mr. O'Hanlon.

EXTENSION FOR KILMACKTHOMAS COLLEGE

According to the Minister for Education, Niamh Breathnach T.D., it remains unclear whether a provision will be made for a permanent extension at St. Declan's College, Kilmackthomas in 1996.

Replying to a Dáil question tabled by Deputy Austin Deasy recently, Minister Breathnach said a design team had recently been nominated for the extension project by the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Com-

mittee. When the members of this team have been accepted by the Dept. of Education, the VEC will then be instructed to commence with the architectural planning of the proposed extension.

Minister Breathnach added, "the question of including the project in the 1996 building programme will be considered in due course in the light of the capital available for post primary building projects".

High Failure Rate For Local Driving Tests

Of the 46 Driver Testing Centres in the country, Dungarvan had the second highest failure rate for Goods Vehicles in 1993 (55.7%) and the highest rate for 1994 at 57%. Waterford city was also above the national average in relation to failure for Goods Vehicles while in Clonmel there was only a 33% failure rate for commercial vans and lorries, etc.

The testing for private cars in Dungarvan was

somewhere near the national average in 1994 with a 49% failure rate. Waterford city also recorded a 49% failure rate in private car testing while Clonmel had a slightly higher failure rate at 51% in 1994.

These figures were revealed by the Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin, T.D., following a Dáil question on the subject by Dungarvan-based Deputy, Austin Deasy.

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
