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VEC Calls For Rapid Advancement Of Kilmac' Extension

Amid rising fears that the proposed extension to St. Declan's school in Kilmac-thomas will not be realised until 1997, concerned members of the Co. Waterford V.E.C. have called for rapid progress with plans for the extra accommodation.

A design team has already been nominated for the project by the committee which is now waiting on department officials to meet with the selected team.

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UDC Approve £60,000 Deal On Quay Properties

Members of Dungarvan UDC have voted unanimously to dispose of a Council owned property on the seafront at Davitt's Quay/Galwey's Lane.

The derelict corn store, formerly known as "Moloneys" was bought out by Thurles company, Clancy Construction (Drangan) Ltd. for a £60,000 price tag.

The Council owned property and an adjacent derelict building, were put up for sale by public tender jointly by the Urban Council and the locally-based dairy Co-op, Waterford Foods plc.

Both properties are steeped in the history of the town with riots taking place there during the 19th century. They had been used for grain storage purposes by Waterford Foods until their closure almost 10 years ago. In the intervening period they have steadily fallen into dereliction, resulting in the closure of Galwey's Lane to traffic and pedestrians.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

This is my second year on the Back to Work Allowance Scheme. I pay tax and full rate PRSI on the earnings from my job. I am expecting a baby early next year and would like to know if I would be entitled to Maternity Benefit?

ANSWER

To qualify for Maternity Benefit you must satisfy the following PRSI requirements:

- at least 39 weeks PRSI paid in the 12 months immediately before the first day of your maternity leave or
- 39 weeks PRSI paid since you first started working and
- 39 weeks PRSI paid or credited in the relevant tax year

(for a claim made in 1995 this would be the tax year 1993/94).

You have to be in insurable employment immediately before the start of your maternity leave and entitled to resume employment with the same employer at the end of your maternity leave. Your entitlement to the 14 weeks Maternity Benefit will not be affected if you decide not to return to work after the birth.

When you go onto Maternity Benefit you will have to return your Back to Work Allowance book. If you return to work after the birth you should notify the Employment Support Services Section that you have returned to work and your allowance will be restored for the remaining time left on the scheme. If you send them a copy of the birth certificate you will be paid the appropriate increase for the child. (50% in year 2 and 25% in year 3). This scheme has been extended to three years and in the third year you will be paid 25% of your benefit.

Women employed on some of the other schemes such as Community Employment are not eligible for Maternity Benefit because they are not regarded as being in insurable employment. However, they are free to take up other employment while on Community Employment and so, it could technically be possible for such women to qualify for Maternity Benefit on the basis of that employment.

POSITION UNCLEAR

While sanction of a permanent extension to the school has been granted by the Department of Education, it still remains unclear whether a provision will be made for the new wing in 1996.

In a recent statement in the Dáil, Education Minister, Niamh Bhreathnach said the questions of including the project in the 1996 building programme will be considered in the light of the capital available for post primary building projects.

QUICK START POSITION

Speaking at last Monday's committee meeting V.E.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne revealed that a purpose built unit could be provided at a reasonable cost and would be acceptable to Kilmac' principal Sean Ahearn.

While submitting that his main concern was the timescale of the project and how slow the whole procedure would be, Cllr. Kyne

however said he was confident that CEO Kieran Heffernan is on top of the situation. "It's vital that we try to get Kilmac' in a quick start position for the school," he urged. CEO, Mr. Heffernan admitted that when dealing with the Department of Education a lot of 'to-ing and fro-ing' is involved with plans being submitted and considered etc. - all of which takes a great deal of time. Voicing his concern at the dire accommodation crisis, Cllr. Tom Cunningham, who is a member of St. Declan's Parents Council, was anxious that the extension be in place by the start of school term in September '96. In this regard, Cllr. Cunningham suggested that the committee organise a deputation to meet with Minister Bhreathnach. His suggestion however was turned down by Cllr. Kyne who stressed that the main bulk of the work involved in the extension process would be arranged between Mr. Heffernan, the Department and Sean Ahearn.

Junior Encyclopaedia

BATS

There are about 1,000 different types of bat living over the world. Bats are the only furry animal that can fly. By day they rest in dark caves, empty buildings and hollow trees, or hang from branches. While at rest, they clean themselves with their tongues and toes. At night, they fly about looking for food. Grown-up female bats usually have one baby every year which clings to its mother with its teeth. A bats wings are made of very stretchy, thin skin which grows between its bony, long fingers and its tail and legs.

The back feet, with their curved sharp claws, are free for grasping things.

Insect-eating bats have sharp teeth to crunch up their food. After a meal of insects the bat finds some-where to rest. It folds up its wings and hangs by its toes.

At dusk, when it gets hungry again, it goes off in search of more insects.

Bats make high-pitched squeaks to catch flying insects

and to find their way in the dark. At dusk also the fish-eating bat comes out of its hiding place in search of food. He flies slowly above the water, swooping down to catch the tiny fish with his hooked sharp claws.

As soon as he has caught a fish, he lifts it out of the water and puts it in his mouth.

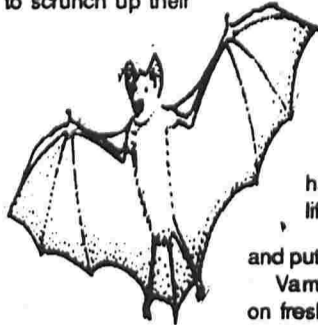
Vampire bats feed only on fresh blood. It attacks an animal while it is asleep — bites into the open skin and laps up the blood with his long tongue.

Flower feeding bats are usu-

ally small with pointed heads and very long tongues. The pollen and nectar in flowers are their favourite foods.

Fruit-eating bats — also known as flying foxes because of their fox-like faces and are quite big. They eat ripe fruit, such as bananas, pineapples, paw-paws and wild figs. These bats are known to fight among each other. They snap with their teeth and lash out with their claws. They also fly out at dusk to feed and spend hours feeding and resting on fruit trees.

Some bats sleep throughout the cold winter months. They hang upside-down and fold their wings round their bodies.

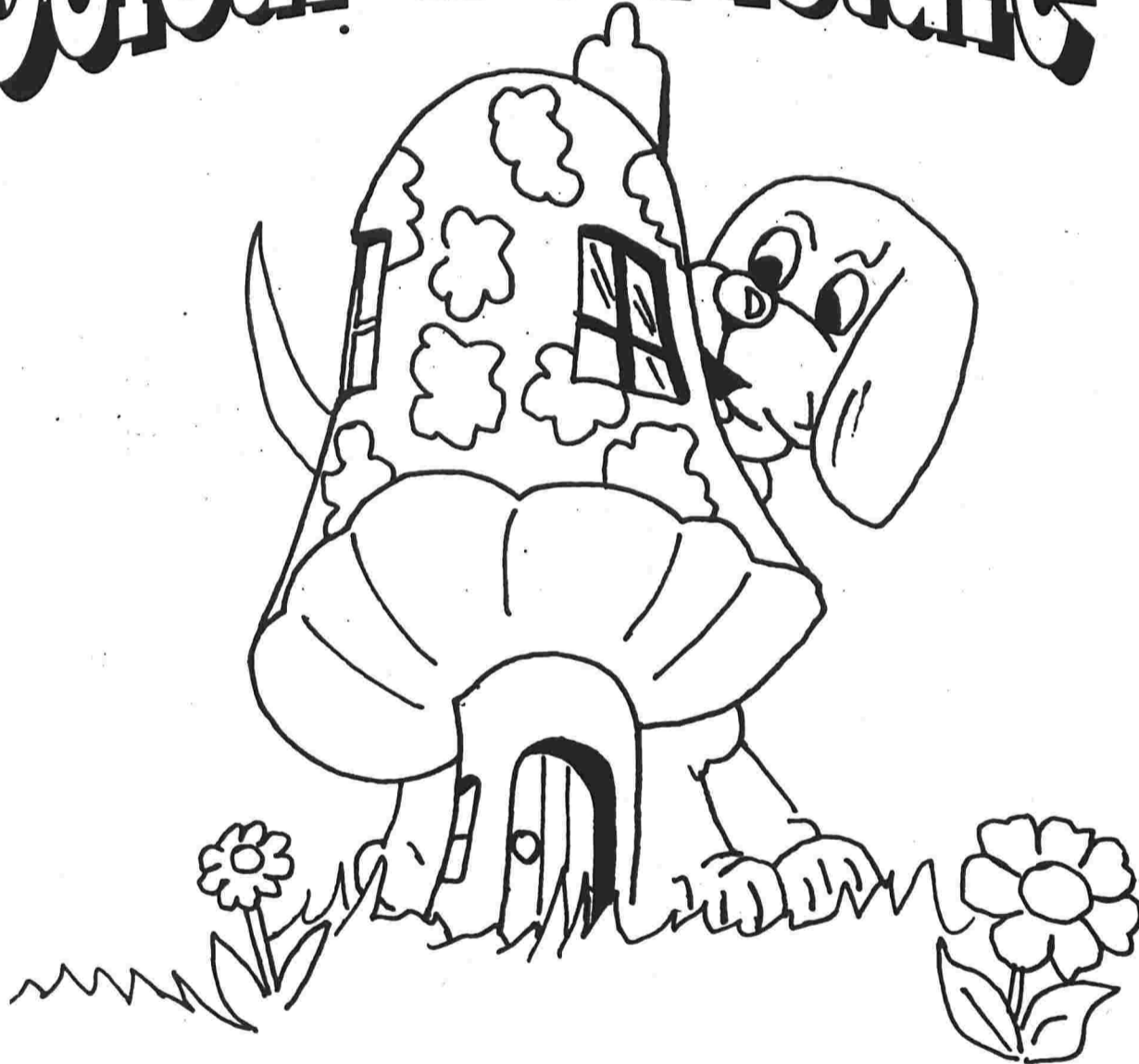

Cricket Balls Knock Scientists For Six

Hundreds of balls found deep below the earth have got scientists in a spin. For they could have been made by prehistoric man — which would mean there was intelligent life on the planet almost 3,000 million years ago.

The balls, from one to four inches across, were found in mineral deposits at the Wonderstone Mine in the Transvaal, South Africa.

An official who cracked several open found that one kind contained a sponge-like substance which quickly powdered when it was touched.

The other type was solid metal, blue with a reddish tint and containing specks of white fibre.

Three neat grooves — like the seam on a cricket ball — ran around the centre of each ball.

They had no irregularities and no known geographical process could have formed them, says Roelf Marx, curator of South Africa's Klerksdorp Museum.

He was amazed when he displayed one of the balls with samples of other rocks. After some months he found that the ball had turned itself round.

Marx couldn't believe it and kept watch. Sure enough, the ball was able to revolve on its axis.

I have no explanation," Marx says. "The sphere baffles everybody. It looks man-made as though cast in a mould."

Geologist Professor Andries Bisschoff says: "From the position in which these things were found, it is likely that they are 2,800 million years old.

I don't know why they revolve on their own axis — nothing in nature could make them do that."

The balls were found in the same layer of the mineral pyrophyllite. They all fit perfectly in the hand, as if they were designed that way.

One theory is that they were primeval missiles. Now scientists are puzzled over why they were needed

Hungry Babies

Sharks, it seems, are even nastier than we might think.

Some turn into cannibals, while still inside their mother.

American shark researcher Stewart Springer discovered this when dissecting a sand tiger he'd caught off Louisiana. As he reached inside the birth canal, he was bitten by a baby shark.

Further work on sharks reveals that one embryo can eat scores of its undeveloped brothers and sisters — which is just as well because sand tigers can each produce as many as 25,000 'eggs' during their life-time. Only the fittest and fiercest are born.

But cannibalism is not confined to the sand tiger shark. The great white, porbeagle, mackerel and mako are other fish in which it's believed such battles take place inside the mother before birth.

Introduction Of Poll Charges "Unwelcome Development"

The Government was given a stern warning recently from within its own ranks to steer clear of implementing any National Road Authority proposals to impose new toll charges on some of the country's road.

Cllr. Tony Wright (Democratic Left) told a meeting of Waterford County Council that the introduction of new toll charges would be an "unwelcome development" and would be as opposed as service charges are nationwide.

"In fact", said Cllr. Wright, "I would regard toll charges in the same way I regard water charges - double taxation".

He warned that if new tolls are introduced it will eventually lead to a situation

where tolls apply on every five-mile stretch of road. "People will even have to pay the cross the bridge from Dungarvan into Abbeyside", he said.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said the ordinary taxpaying people of Ireland will rebel in the face of toll charges. "Where next will it all end", he asked.

Cllr. Wright formally proposed that they call on the Minister for the Environment, and the Government collectively, to oppose the concept of new toll charges on the basis that they represent "double taxation" on an already excessively taxed motoring public.

Cllr. O'Ryan seconded, and the proposal was given unanimous "across the

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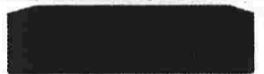


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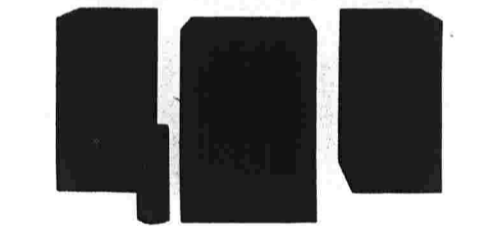
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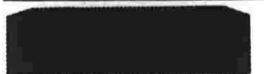


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BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

Impressive Famine Sculpture Unveiled At Waterford Crystal

The Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. O'Higgins, T.D., inaugurated a magnificent Waterford Crystal and natural limestone sculpture which commemorates the 150th anniversary of The Famine at a reception in the Waterford Crystal Visitor Centre last Tuesday.

The monument, which will find its permanent home in the Waterford County Library, Dungarvan, from 1997, will rest in the Waterford Crystal Visitor Centre in the interim.

LIMESTONE PILLAR
Fashioned from natural limestone and inset with engraved Waterford Crystal panels, the sculpture stands 7ft. 2ins. high. Local sculptor Dick Joynt was responsible for the limestone pillars which, in section, is carved in the shape of St. Brigid's Cross and Waterford Crystal master Tom Hayes conceived, designed and made the engraved panels. The monument is unique because it is the first time that natural limestone

has been married to Waterford Crystal in a single work of art.

There are five Waterford Crystal plaques set into the limestone pillar.

The first depicts the Ireland of "Saints and Scholars", showing a monk working on an illuminated manuscript, perhaps the New Testament. This plaque is inscribed with the words "Celtic Vesper" connoting the closing of a chapter. The plaque is etched with the crests of Ireland's four provinces signifying that all-prevading reach of this terrible, awesome and cruel curse.

The second plaque evokes the pain of starvation and portrays a miserable scene

of a woman — wife and mother — scrabbling for a few potatoes to feed the family who watch her piteously.

The third plaque illustrates the brutality of eviction and throws into sharp relief the contribution made by the political and economic factors to the tragedy. The fourth plaque depicts a pitiful emigration scene where the younger, stronger, often more dynamic members of a family were able to escape to new worlds rendering families that were divided by oceans, torn apart by tragedy.

The fifth and final plaque bears a representation, in female form, of the Spirit of

Ireland.

The reception at Waterford Crystal was attended by the Mayor of Waterford, Cllr. Maurice Cummins, the Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey, Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan U.D.C., Cllr. Nuala Ryan and members and staff of both Waterford County Council and Waterford Corporation.

SECOND MAJOR FUNCTION

Speaking at the unveiling ceremony Cllr. Oliver Coffey said the crafting of the limestone sculpture was the second major function organised by Waterford Co. Council to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the famine.

The first event, he said, was the production of a book on the famine in Waterford which has been very well received — the first edition of which is now virtually sold out.

"We are tremendously grateful to Waterford Crystal and in particular Dr. Patrick Galvin and James Foley for their enthusiasm and interest in the production of this appropriate piece," said Cllr. Coffey.

The Council Chairman then went on to thank all the committees around the county who have had their own commemorations by way of open air Masses in famine graveyards. In conclusion, he thanked the County Manager, Donal Connolly, Co. Librarian Donal Brady and Co. Secretary Brian McNally for the amount of work they put into the famine commemorations throughout the county.

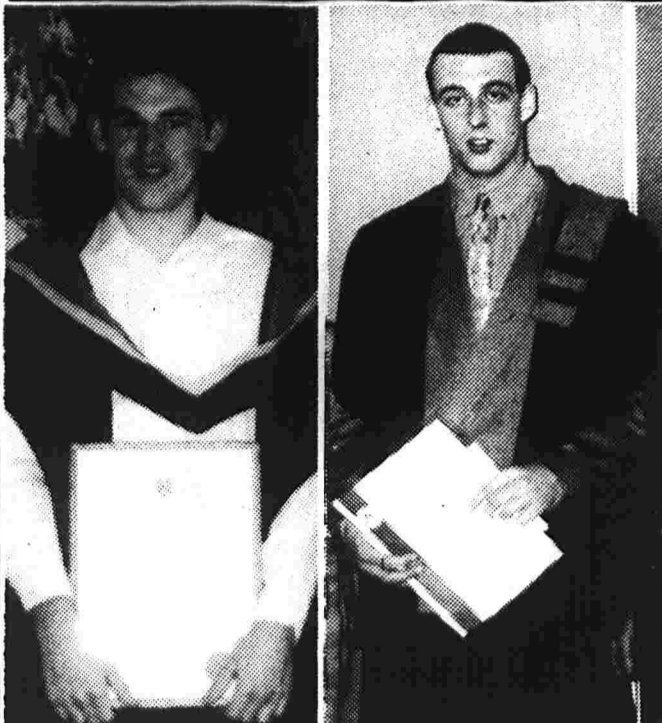

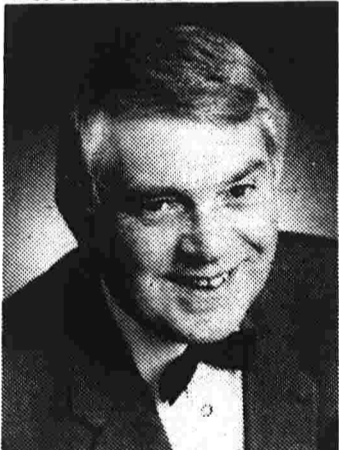

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

DRYING OFF COWS

Late calved cows are continuing to milk well and indeed they need to milk well for a long time yet. But some early calvers are going dry. Milk from cows that are going dry is usually very high in cell count and should not be put into the tank unless the bulk cell count is low. There are usually some extra cases of clinical mastitis around drying off time.

This may be partly due to poor liners. If the liners are more than six months in use, they should be changed for the end of season milking. Billy Meaney of Moorepark says there should not be a long spell of once-a-day milking. If you reduce once-a-day milking you will have less mastitis.

It is easy to dry cows that are giving less than a gallon, their udders might fill up a bit and leak a little but it will stop quickly. Cows that are being dried while giving two to three gallons should get no meal for the last week or two and be put on bare ground or on a small amount of feed, inside in the shed.

Cows should be treated with dry-cow antibiotic after the last milking and identified clearly if they are staying with the others. The well known brands of dry-cow have been tested in Moorepark and found to be effective in reducing about 75% of the infection in young cows and those without very high cell counts.

Farmers, of course, are very anxious to cure the high cell count cows. It has been found in Moorepark that the dry cow antibiotics were less successful with these cows. Research has not shown a double dry cow treatment to be of much benefit. However, a second dry cow antibiotic about a month before calving is often recommended for high cell count cows, as part of an overall cell count reduction programme for a herd.

WEANING SUCKLERS

The date of weaning depends on the condition of the cow and age of calf. Thin cows should be weaned soon in order to prevent any further loss of condition or to allow some recovery before the winter. First calved heifers do not gain weight during the summer to the same extent as mature cows and are consequently at lower body condition score at this stage.

These should be among the first group to be weaned. The second factor to consider in relation to weaning date is the age of the calf, February and March born calves can be weaned now. April and May born calves should be allowed suckle until November if possible.

Another consideration that will be taken into account is the amount of grass available. Where grass is scarce, suckling cows will lose condition. In such cases it is better to wean and feed meal to the weanlings. Spring calving cows should be at condition score 3 at present i.e. well fleshed.

Weaning Procedure
Outdoor weaning is preferable to housing. Select a well sheltered, well fenced field with good grass. Weanlings remain more settled if left in a familiar field at weaning. Therefore, it is better to withdraw the cows and leave the calves undisturbed. If cows are removed over a period there is less disturbance. Start with the thinner cows and those that calve early in the year.

It is good practice to dose weanlings for Hoose (which also covers stomach worms). Respiratory diseases can be aggravated where there is damage to the lungs with hoose.

SHEEP

Scab: It is no longer compulsory to dip sheep against Scab in Ireland. However, serious sheep farmers will continue to dip as before.

Farmers who are dipping will need to be particularly careful with bought-in-sheep. There must be treated on arrival or before mixing with the flock.

Sheep Scab is still a notifiable disease and infected flocks must be dipped in accordance with Department of Agriculture specifications.

Mating Progress: Mid-season flocks targeted towards March lambing are about half way through the breeding season at present, which is a good time to assess progress to date. Where no colour marking is practised of course no assessment is possible, but judging by the incidence of multi-coloured rear ends, throughout the country side, most producers are using some system - at least at the start of the season.

Where flocks are cycling before the introduction of the ram, it is reasonable to expect 90% of the ewes to be mated in 17 days (1 cycle). Where the proportion mated falls significantly below this, there are a few possible reasons:

- (1) Ewes are not yet cycling properly - this is quite possible where there is a lot of hill sheep blood, in the flock.
 - (2) Ram power is lacking - either insufficient ram numbers or some rams are not as interested as they should be.
- If the problem lies with the ewes, it will correct itself over a couple of weeks. If the rams are to blame, then more of different rams are needed.

Co. Waterford Shows It Has Plenty Of Bottle

Dungarvan glass deposits have put the county in second place on the recycling league table with a massive 43% increase in glass recycling for the first half of 1995.

Co. Waterford, who tied with Galway in second place, were just pipped for the top spot by Tipperary where glass deposits are up 45%.

According to Conor Counihan, general manager of Rehab Recycling Partnership, Cork, glass deposits at the county's three bottle banks at Dungarvan, Lismore and Tallow are up from nineteen metric tonnes in the first half of 1994 to 44.5 metric tonnes for the

same period this year. Mr. Counihan also revealed that plans are already in place to add a number of new recycling collection points in the county this year.

Launched in November 1993, the bottle bank at Davitt's Quay in Dungarvan is the county's key collection point with a total of 105,000 bottles and jars deposited in the first half of 1995.

No doubt, the long hot

summer has contributed to the significant increase in the consumption of minerals, wine, beer and other drinks and a commendable 29 tonnes was collected in Dungarvan since January - the major portion of the county's 44.6 total.

"These figures show that a significant number of households in Co. Waterford are now recycling glass", said Mr. Counihan. "They are making a positive contribution to the protection of the environment by preserving precious natural resources and conserving energy".

O'DWYER ATTACKS LOSS OF 65,000 FARMERS

The loss of 65,000 full-time farmers since we joined the EEC cannot be seen as a successful policy on agriculture, ICMSA President Tom O'Dwyer said in his address to the AGM of the Organisation in Limerick recently.

Mr. O'Dwyer said Government and EU policies, as well as 'questionable' treatment of struggling farmers by the National Agricultural Advisory Authority, Teagasc, have dissuaded many young potential farmers from making a living from the land.

Teagasc, he said, had virtually abandoned low output farms to concentrate on directing its highly subsidised advisory services to better off farms. Questions needed to be answered by the Authority on its reasons for abandoning an effective programme aimed at making low output farms viable. The programme, agreed with the ICMSA, was ended long before it could have had a significant widespread effect, said Mr. O'Dwyer.

"Its abandonment was a major blow to the morale of the participants and to those farmers intending to become involved," he declared.

"The policy of Teagasc pitching its services away from those struggling farms most in need, while at the same time making pronouncements on declining farming numbers, is less than satisfactory, to put it mildly. In my opinion it is an approach which requires urgent attention from the highest level," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

The loss of 65,000 full-time farmers since Ireland joined the EEC twenty two years ago could not be seen as a successful outcome to any of the EU or national policies, nor indeed the management of agricultural advisory services in that period.

The £2 million Teagasc budget and the role of the Authority would have to be questioned for not directing attention towards farmers whose livelihoods were dependent on increased advisory services.

Mr O'Dwyer added that many National and EU policies on agriculture were laced with lip-service for the weaker sectors which were little better than useless.

He highlighted weaknesses in the National Forestry Programme, milk quota regime and the Early Retirement Scheme for farmers which he claimed, contributed to both rural depopulation and urban congestion. He believed

there was a sinister objective to permanently withdraw land from food production, thereby making way for increased imports in line with GATT undertakings.

"With current market prices for farm produce it is easy to draw the conclusion that the effects of CAP Reform and GATT are not serious. This is a wrong conclusion," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

There were plenty of examples of young members of farming families with reasonable sized enterprises turning away from living off the land because they did not trust the future of agriculture.

"Yet farmers and their industry are the hub of the national economy and, if properly treated, could be the springboard to real and sustainable rural development and to reducing national unemployment," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He stressed that nothing would ever endure or produce the same benefits nationally as our tried and trusted main agricultural enterprises and the impact they have on rural viability.

"With 100,000 full-time farmers and as many part timers, with 37,000 directly employed in food processing, and a similar number in the servicing industries, nothing can ever compare in importance," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

FARMING LEADER

Dillon Criticises Yates On Ewe Premium

IFA Munster Vice-President, John Dillon, has come out strongly against remarks by Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, in last week's Farm Exam concerning the on-going crisis facing Irish sheep farmers.

He said that the Minister's "negative and dismissed atti-

tude" towards Ireland's chances of securing an top-up on the Ewe premium was both damaging to our negotiation position and disheartening to the thousands of sheep farmers in Munster who are depending on the £8 per head top-up premium to make ends meet this winter.

Mr. Dillon said, "The Minister's latest remarks are very difficult to understand when he is clearly on record stating that the sheep crisis is his number one priority. Everyone, including his Department and An Bord Bia, recognise the crisis situation facing the sheep industry in this country. Having gone through one of the worst lambing

seasons on record and having suffered very poor market returns all year, sheep farmers need to be confident that their Minister is fighting wholeheartedly on their behalf in Brussels. Without that confidence, the steady drift that we have seen from the sheep farming sector over the past two years will turn into a mass exodus from the industry."

TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

Refereeing — I have on more than one occasion addressed the subject of referees and refereeing; how difficult it is to find referee material; how much under scrutiny that official is from very partisan team officials and supporters and even the uncommitted supporter. To say that it is a thankless task is to state the obvious because the best referee is the one who scarcely merits a mention after the game. He is often perceived by the participants as an intrusion, an encumbrance, a necessary evil. That's only human nature on occasions when motion supersedes calm objective judgement. No team affords itself the luxury of objectivity and the tense atmosphere of an important game - a semi final, final or local derby - derives in part from the fact that the referee's performance sometimes has a big influence on the success or otherwise of a club's whole year's work. Bad decisions, due to the weakness or incompetence of the referee, leave a team and its officials suffering from a sense of betrayal and seething resentment.

Very few who haven't officiated themselves, and even those who have, appreciate the difficulties encountered by a referee. He is responsible for the control of the game. He has to ensure that the playing rules are implemented. He is timekeeper. He must exercise patience and understanding, make due allowance for the rise in temperature which is generated by the teams' commitment and the close physical contact inherent in hurling and football. He is expected to overlook small transgressions at times in the interests of continuity. He must allow commonsense to govern his overall control. He is concerned with the provision of umpires and linesmen and is often at the mercy of their decisions. He is constantly subjected to a barrage from the sidelines which must constitute a huge distraction if nothing worse. He ideally needs to be the fittest man on the field constantly walking, jogging and sprinting for the hour over a very large playing area, 160 yards long by 100 yards wide. The day of the referee in a duffle coat wear-

ing wellington boots operating a remote control system from the middle of the field is long gone, if it was ever acceptable.

I remember two occasions when the referee, well-known and experienced, didn't know all the rules. One game many years ago, involved Tallow and Tramore in an Under 21 football county final. It was quite a windy day with a strong wind tailing diagonally left to right at Walsh Park. Before the game we decided that if we were given use of that wind we would take the kick out after a wide from the right hand side of the goal every time to achieve maximum length. Early on, with the breeze behind us, the goalie retrieved the ball after a wide and placed it on the angle of the square to the right. The whistle blew and the referee gestured insisting that if the ball went wide on one side the kick out must be taken from that side only. That referee - and he officiated at many county finals before that game and subsequently - simply didn't know the rule governing the puck out or kick out which allows the player restarting the game after a wide to kick out from any point of the square, left, right or centre. Any referee should know that. As it happened we won the game.

The second experience was similar, the relevant game this time being a Western junior football final. Again the referee didn't know the rule and insisted on denying us the right under rule to suit ourselves for the kick out. We won that game, too, so with no sour grapes question involved I decided to write to the referee pointing out in the gentlest and most conciliatory terms how taken aback we were with his decision on this kick out matter. There was no reply but when I met him some time later outside Cappoquin Sportsfield before another match he launched a strong verbal attack on me for having "the cheek to dispute his decision".

The point to be made is that we are dependant for the control of our games on referees who no matter how sincerely they undertake their task have no support system, no effective one anyway, which would enable them to develop as referees. There is no effective body

at divisional or county board level to keep them on a progressive basis. The recruiting and training system is inadequate. Who is going to monitor their refereeing? Where is the structure to allow for a critical constructive analysis of their performances? To offer help? To assess fitness? To designate areas of performance needing improvement? To ensure that their knowledge of the playing rules reaches the acceptable standard?

I met Declan Galvin, a new and very promising referee, after he had refereed the Western A final in Under 16 football and complimented him on his handling of the game. He genuinely loves refereeing and is very courteous, sincere and enthusiastic. Does anyone really appreciate his importance to the association to the extent of actively supporting his further development? How in God's name can he improve so that he is capable and confident of handling any game, at the highest level, entrusted to him.

Declan Galvin and his referee colleagues are the serious responsibility of the Divisional and County Boards. We need recruits to refereeing who are of a high calibre and a system in place which will not leave them in lonely isolation. No games can be played without referees and the longer this urgent matter is treated with seeming indifference or neglect the sooner a point will be reached when the playing of our matches is put in jeopardy. Time is running out. Let's have some meaningful action before it is too late.

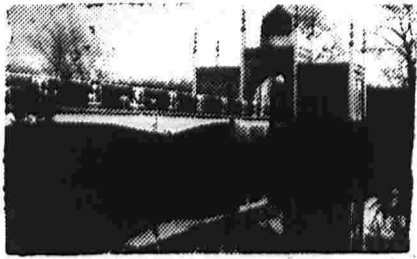

HAVE YOU SEEN THE LITTLE EGRET?

From local historian and author of two very popular books - Youghal's Fading Footsteps and more recently Brave Seamen of Youghal (presently on sale) - Mike Hackett comes the following very interesting piece of information this week. The Little Egret At the Stone-Bridge Lake. On the Youghal side of the stone bridge is a new lake caused by the flooding of part of the slob land over the past few years. This tidal water-park has become a bonanza for the local sea birds like gulls, herons, terns and curlews. Everytime the tide returns to refill the lake it brings with it the small fishlife so eagerly sought by these birds.

The real wonder of this lake is not so much how many native species, can be spotted but how many kinds of foreign birds frequent it. Particularly noticeable last winter were the Brent Geese as they found food and refuge in the Lee of the river bank at this point, where the tributary Young joins the broad gushing Blackwater. Among the other strange visitors last year was a Little Egret (White Heron) and it drew a lot of bird watchers to study and photograph it.

Then just this week in October 1995 the Little Egret can again be seen from the road side at the lake beside the stone bridge as it fishes away on one leg. It is pure white, in the shape of a normal Heron but as white as a swan. A truly beautiful bird.

Little Egrets are mainly found in Africa and Asia as well as the southern regions of France, Portugal and Spain. A migrant bird, it sometimes ventures into Western Europe and in recent years has been seen at the Wexford wild bird sanctuary, at a lake near Skibbereen and, of course, here on the Blackwater. Usually around October-November it takes off to fly south for the winter as far as South-Africa, returning back to Europe, to breed, in March-April.

Last week, a group of specialists arrived from Dublin and set up their tripods on the footpath of the stonebridge and by using their powerful telescopic lenses and cameras were able to photograph the Little Egret from a distance without alarming it.

It makes one wonder do we appreciate what we have or does it take people from Dublin to draw attention to our great wildlife surroundings.

With the passing of John Morrissey, community, county and country have lost a man of exceptional ability, deep sensitivity, remarkable gentleness and genuine understanding. It is only through the course of time that the true loss for the people he loved, admired and helped during his many years, will eventually be realised and with it will come an understanding of what he achieved in his lifetime.



His generosity, kindness and plain common-sense governed all his dealings with the many organisations and individuals with whom he came in contact, through a very active life, and each can only have benefited from having had John as a member or a friend. If, as Newman defined, a gentleman is one who never gives offence, then John could proudly wear that title.

He had a deep interest in people, witnessed by his legion of friends for whom he had genuine regard and a true Christian attitude. His was a practical Christianity, a desire to help and to serve and to look to the good of his neighbour. Generous and kind, no one was refused when he could help and he never forgot a friend.

"Insofar as you did it to these the least of my children, you did it to me."

He never compromised his principles and was always ready to fight for what was right. He gave example but never offence and in the many organisations to which he contributed, he was regularly called on to solve difficulties which would arise. His simple logic, unfailing good humour and kindly approach were guaranteed to defuse any dispute and these, combined with a natural sense of justice, ensured that the solution was right and the compromise fair.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God."

He delighted in knowledge but never gossip and he never allowed a day to pass without learning something new. Equally, there was always something to learn from John, from his love of nature and his closeness to the land. Sunrise and sunset, the season's change, the birds of the air, the vagaries of the weather, were all a study for him. The lilies of the field had a lesson too and for John, everywhere in nature there was God.

He saw travel as an ongoing education and regularly took the opportunity to visit various members of his family in Australia, Canada and Europe and loved to visit Italy where he returned a number of times.

In his little spare time he read a great deal, enjoyed music and indulged his lifelong hobby of photography which spanned film, stills and slides.

In a society which cherishes land and with which it finds it difficult to part, John and his family dug into their resources free and freely, to secure the needs of the community. Not content with providing the land John went further to raise the money which would see his gift developed for the community. St. Laurence's Hall, St. Laurence's Tennis Club and Ballinroad Soccer Club are just some of the organisations which owe their premises to the Morrissey family.

Through his leadership and inspiration, many of the amenities which the people now enjoy became a reality. Everything was possible with John and his vision for the community was largely brought to fruition. His philosophy was that life for people should always be better and with John's help it often was. He was ever vigilant for where he could do a good turn, ease a pain or relieve distress. He was a good neighbour.

John's vision for his country, of which he was very proud, was neither sterile nor uncompromising and he welcomed change where it was an improvement. He was a member of many organisations over the years and his contribution to their work was a genuine, wholehearted and useful one.

He gave very many years of service to Macra Na Feirme, the N.F.A. and I.F.A.C.; the Pioneer movement which recently presented him with a gold pin for fifty years membership, St. Laurence's Hall and Youth Club, in local politics and as a Peace Commissioner. He also served terms in many other committees.

Integrity was an abiding principle and he treated people with respect and dignity in the meeting room, in the market place and on the street.

A true democrat, he contributed to the political process through all of his adult life and he was proud to work for, and be a member of, his chosen political party. What his generosity, wisdom and simple goodness allowed, facilitated and provided will never be fully appreciated, for his was a placid contribution, quietly done and silently achieved.

Nor was his the language of condemnation or calumny. He gave the benefit of the doubt, there were extenuating circumstances, a reason to make an allowance.

"If I have all the eloquence of men or of angels but speak without love I am simply a gong booming or cymbal clashing."

We will miss John, his wisdom, his good humour and his patience, but most of all we will miss his friendship. We will miss his ability to discuss any subject, his understanding of the cares of the day and his views on a myriad of problems.

He will be missed even more by his family, for whom he was an exemplary husband and father and for whom he worked untiredly and unselfishly all his life. They were his first priority, they will feel the greatest loss. To them we extend our sincere sympathy.

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A Checklist For Winter

October brings good gardening weather — neither too hot or too cool and ideal for brisk activity before the winter chills set in.

Gardeners have to make use of these timely and agreeable conditions to complete their pre-winter 'check list' of chores.

HARVESTING

Harvesting must come first or your efforts of the past few months will be wasted.

Lift and store the last of your potato and carrot crops and keep picking apples and pears as they ripen. Never store produce when damp and always keep it well ventilated and protected from vermin.

Keep checking all produce for mould and decay or 'one rotten apple' could spoil the whole crop.

GERANIUMS

Geranium can survive early frosts but prepare for overwintering now by moving to a frost-free greenhouse or a windowsill indoors. The latter should be sunny but not in a well-heated room.



A shed with a decent window may do, but any lack of light may cause droppd leaves.

Another method is to dig up the plants, shaking off soil, pruning back to six inches high, and cutting off leaves. These 'skeleton' plants are then planted close together in trays of slightly moist peat. Watch for and remove shoots or plants which die but most should survive and revive next spring, ready for re-potting or planting.

FROST PROTECTION

All frost-prone plants should be raised now. Bulbs, tubers and corms should be dried and stored while complete plants are overwintered in a greenhouse or place where frost cannot reach them.

LAWNS

These will need some extra loving care after the drought this year. Firstly, clear leaves and then work over with a spring rake. This will remove what is likely to be an extra-thick layer of 'thatch'-flattened and dead material which prevents moisture getting to the soil and blocks progress by the grass.

Follow-up by spiking or slitting for aeration and feeding with a proprietary phosphates-based lawn mix.

Trim newly-sown lawns at two inches high and again a few weeks later.

HEDGES

Clear out hedge bottoms thoroughly and burn or bag up debris to stop pests and diseases overwintering there and wreaking new havoc next year. Such cleared areas beneath deciduous hedges can also be used to plant snowdrops and primroses for a cheerful start to next spring.

CONIFERS

Plant now to give them a flying start but take care when preparing the site. Thorough planting now will ensure strong and healthy growth for many years.

REPAIRS

Repair all fences, gates, brickwork and paths before winter sets in and adds to the existing damage and makes it harder to remedy.

STORAGE

Many tools and machines will be stored away now for several months. Make sure they are clean, well-oiled and put away carefully and safely. Repair now

Age of Beauty

Oily Skin

Oily skin can often begin at puberty and is caused by a number of different factors. Over secretion of oil from the sebaceous glands, incorrect cleansing, skin hygiene and incorrect diet may all cause oily skin. However, too much oil and grease in the diet does not always worsen or cause oily skin. It can also be linked with medical problems; in such cases a visit to the doctor is essential. Oily skin has open pores, is discoloured and yellow. Its surface often resembles the skin of an orange and will feel thicker than dry or normal skin. It has a shiny surface with a



tendency to blackheads and it is coarse to look at and to feel. Oily skin is more prone to pimples and blemishes but tends to be less prone to wrinkles and fine lines than dry skin. However, when lines and wrinkles do occur they are deeper and more pronounced. Pimples are ducts in the skin which become infected when they are clogged up with dead cells, dirt and oil. Blackheads are clogged follicles and when they are not cleansed properly they can often lead to

pimples which gives the skin a sallow appearance. It is possible for a person with oily skin to wash the face too often. It is often believed that oily skin is dirty and that washing frequently will remove the grease, yet too much washing can actually aggravate an oily skin. Excessive washing will only remove the oil and not the dirt, dead cells and bacteria underneath the skin.

1. Follow a balanced diet to help improve the skin.
2. If you think an oily skin is due to a medical problem consult your doctor.
3. An oily skin should not be washed or any abrasive scrubs used too often as they can aggravate the skin.

FAMILY HEALTH

Q: My children aged nine and three behave very badly on car journeys that last longer than 10 minutes or so. They won't

still in their seats, they argue and even cry. This makes going anywhere a nightmare. Have you any suggestions?

A: What you describe is a fairly common reaction when children of different ages are confined in a small space without guidelines on how to keep themselves occupied, It may be your older child has mixed feelings about the younger sibling joining the family and chooses the car as the place to act out these feelings. Both your children need help in thinking about ways to make the car trips more pleasant for everyone. Talk to your children together and individually about this problem. Get them to try to think of ways to make the time pass more easily. Some families have special games they play during car trips such as I Spy or 20 Questions. Others have special books or tapes that are only for use in the car. Your children will feel more like co-operating if they can help think up ideas.

Q: I was admitted to hospital with excruciating abdominal pain which was diagnosed as pancreatitis. No one told me why this happened or how to prevent it recurring. Can you help?

A: The pancreas lies in the middle of the abdomen close to the duodenum and gall bladder. Its main functions are to produce digestive enzymes and insulin, which controls carbohydrate metabolism. Acute

pancreatitis can produce severe abdominal and back pain accompanied by profound shock and collapse. The most common cause is gallstones. These can move out of the gall bladder and temporarily block the duct leading from the pancreas. In effect this causes the pancreas to attempt to digest itself. Although

many cases don't appear to have primary cause, viruses, alcohol, injury and certain drugs may be to blame. Your doctors will have checked for these and presumably not found anything. A low-fat diet and avoiding alcohol should help prevent further trouble.

Menus for the week

Lemon And Sultana Cheesecake

Preparation: 20 mins
Cooking: 1 hr 20 mins
Serves: 8

1 large sponge flan case
2oz (50g) unsalted butter
3oz (75g) caster sugar
1lb (450g) curd cheese
3 eggs, beaten
grated rind of 1 lemon
1 tsp (5ml) vanilla essence
1oz (25g) cornflour
5oz (125g) thick Greek yogurt
3oz (75g) sultanas
4 tbsp (60ml) lemon curd
icing sugar to dust

- Using an 8in (20cm) loose-based, spring-clip tin as a guide, cut out a circle

of sponge from flan case.

- Grease and line tin, then press sponge circle into the base. Beat together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add curd cheese and beat well.
- Gradually beat in eggs, then stir in lemon rind, vanilla essence, cornflour, yogurt and sultanas.
- Place the tin on a baking sheet and pour in cheesecake mixture. Spoon lemon curd into a piping bag fitted with a fine nozzle. Pipe lines of lemon curd across top of cheesecake. Drag a skewer through lemon curd at 1in (2.5cm) intervals, alternating the direction.
- Bake at 325°F/175°C/Gas Mark 3 for 1 hr. Turn off heat and leave in oven for 20 mins until firm. Remove from oven then cool. Chill until ready to serve. Remove from tin and dust with icing sugar.

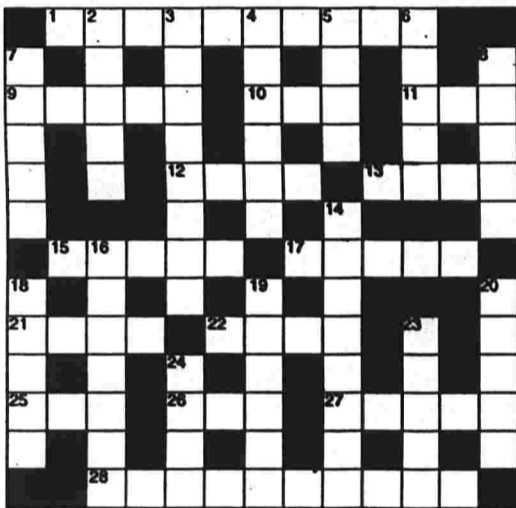

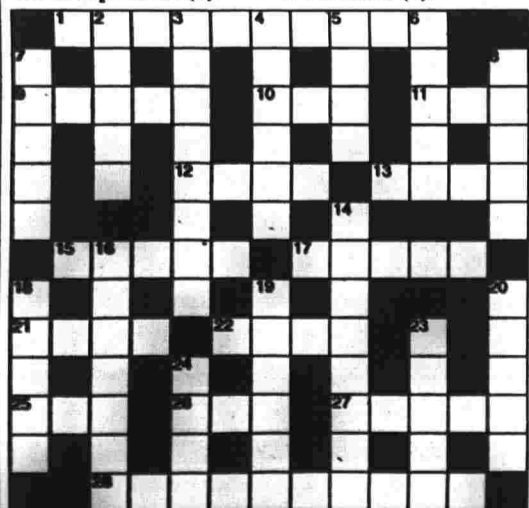

Household Hints

1. Double cream will whip more easily when a tablespoon of milk is added. To make it go even further, gently fold in a stiffly beaten egg-white.
2. Apple peeling is easier if you place the fruit in boiling water for a few minutes before using, the skin almost comes off by itself.
3. Remove damp or greasy marks from suede by rubbing in a little fuller's earth. Leave for approximately an hour and then brush it out.
4. When fur boots or wellingtons are damp on the inside dry them with a hairdryer to save time. If very wet inside stuff with crumpled, warmed newspaper and leave overnight, then use a hairdryer.
5. If vegetables such as turnips, carrots or celery have gone a little soft, stand them in a bowl of cold water overnight. They will be firm and crisp the next morning.
6. Remove nicotine from fingers by rubbing with a dab of acetone on cotton wool.

SALMON STEAKS EN PAPILOTTE

Preparation: 15 minutes
Cooking: 15-20 minutes
Serves: 4

2 tbsp oil
15g/1/2oz butter
2 large oranges
4 (175g/6oz) salmon steaks
6-8 unpeeled prawns
6-8 fresh sprigs of coriander
salad and crusty bread to serve

- Preheat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5. Line a large baking sheet with greaseproof paper.
- Heat oil and butter in a small pan and brush some of the mixture on to the paper.
- Squeeze the juice from one of the oranges and stir into the remaining oil mixture. Dip each salmon steak into the orange oil, turning to coat all over. Place on the prepared baking sheet. Repeat with the prawns.
- Slice remaining orange and place round the fish. Add half the coriander and

- season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- Brush another large piece of greaseproof paper with the orange oil mixture and place over the fish. Secure the edges of the 2 sheets of greaseproof paper by scrunching together, completely enclosing the fish.
- Bake for 15-20 minutes until the fish is tender. Heat the remaining orange oil mixture and place in a small serving bowl. Discard the coriander sprigs and garnish with the remaining coriander. Serve immediately with salad and crusty bread.

In true style he ended his days on a winning note, pipping Richard Mulligan and Jerry Kiernan, both of Cloncliffe Harriers and Steve Cram from Jarrow in England in a sprint for the finish line.

From early on Sunday morning the athletes and supporters were arriving in Waterford by bicycle, by car and by bus and it was obvious that a great day's sport lay ahead. Television and radio crews were busy organising themselves while the race organisation under Frank Quinn, Fintan Walsh and John Walsh equalled that of any major marathon. The ideal weather conditions supplemented these efforts as the entries poured into the city hall with large numbers coming from Dublin, the west of Leinster and from Munster.

Mayoral Reception
The day got off to a good start with the Mayor of Waterford, Mr. M. J. Cummins, meeting John Treacy and his family at the city hall. John, of course, is no stranger to this his old building being made a recipient of the city there in 1979. The attendance included the special guests of the day, Carlos Lopes, Charlie Spedding, Steve Cram, Michael Carruth, Sean Kelly and Eamonn Coughlan along with past and present athletic officials from throughout the county.

Tributes To Treacy
At 1.30 p.m. Fintan Walsh introduced the large attendance to R.T.E.'s George Hamilton who in turn interviewed Steve Cram, Charlie Spedding, Eamonn Coughlan, Michael Carruth and Carlos Lopes, the latter through a Portuguese interpreter. There was a very touching moment at this

stage when the first three finishers from the 1984 Olympic Marathon were presented to the attendance in podium form to sustained applause. The Olympic champion Carlos Lopes made a big impression throughout the day and despite not having a word of English he joined in the spirit of the occasion to the full extent. SENIOR HURLING COUNTY FINAL REPLAY

Record Crowd See Ballygunner Defeat Champions Mount Sion In Thriller

BALLYGUNNER 3-13 MOUNT SION 1-17

If Ballygunner and Mount Sion were determined to wipe out all memories of the unpleasanties which marred the drawn final two weeks earlier, they certainly did so in majestic style before an all time record crowd at sunny Walsh Park on Sunday last and into the bargain they produced a standard of hurling which has not been enjoyed by patrons in this country for a very long time, if ever before.

In fact the feeling all over the ground after the game was that if all our county players applied the same legitimate aggressiveness and fierce determination when wearing the county colours, as was seen here on Sunday, our intercounty record would benefit immeasurably.

This was such a splendid and spectacular contest that all the neutrals in the huge attendance were hoping that there would not be a loser again on this occasion as neither side deserved to lose on the hour's performance.

But it was to be Ballygunners day and having to field without Paul Flynn (and this might have inspired them to fight all the more) and skillful wing back John Lyons, their victory must have been all the more meritorious.

It was, overall, a final that must go an awful long way towards restoring great pride in our county. It was a final that will help restore confidence in our county teams when the players apply themselves to the games, in the same manner. It was a county final that got the county back talking about hurling and about what can be achieved when our potential is maximised.

There was a tremendous atmosphere about Walsh Park on Sunday. The biggest crowd in our history turned up to enjoy what had been predicted as being a splendid programme with three matches. The curtain-raiser between Kill and St. Mollersans got the crowd into an excited mood and the draw was applauded as a very fair result.

After all the usual preliminaries the game got underway about 5 minutes late.

PLAY

The game was less than 2 minutes old when young Jamie O'Meara had the champions in front with a good point. By the 11th minute Ballygunner had edged in front when wing forward Michael O'Mahoney had the second of his

two points. Tony Carroll, who was Paul Flynn's replacement and excelled as a deputy, placed David Codd who rattled Mount Sion's net for the only goal of the first half and when the half time whistle blew, Ballygunner were in front by a single point, 1-6 to 0-8.

TITANIC BATTLE

The sporting battle which raged excitingly throughout this wonderful second half, could only be described as titanic. By any standards it was titanic and I'm sure that whenever Waterford county senior hurling finals are being previewed in future, the 1995 replay will get a well deserved mention and be described as an example of what is expected.

The champions threw everything they knew into a tremendous second half effort to take control and they certainly looked to have achieved this when they went into a three points lead a couple of minutes into the final quarter. However with just ten minutes remaining, lady luck smiled on the 'Gunners when a 40 metre free by Liam Whitty sneaked its way through a wall of defenders for a goal that changed the trend of the game. John Meaney brought Sion level with a great point, but the game's top scorer Whitty restored 'Gunners lead. Then John Fitzgerald who had been introduced as Ballygunners third substitute crashed home the goal that seemed to put the result out of reach as far as the champions were concerned. But true to their great tradition Mount Sion fought back and it took a great Ray Whitty save to deny them a certain goal, but Whitty's spectacular save was cleared only as far as Mount Sion sub. Roy McGrath who blasted the ball to the net. Only a point separated the teams and when Gary Gater broke through and shot the ball goalwards it looked as if the champions would snatch

victory from the jaws of defeat, but another wonderful save by man-of-the-match, Ray Whitty, denied Mount Sion that little bit of luck that they must have longed for at that precise moment. A minute later it was all over and the wild celebrations of Ballygunners sixth county senior hurling title, broke loose all over the ground and every one of their sixteen players were hailed as a hero, but in truth every one of the 34 players who performed out there, were heroes in their own right. The scenes of great jubilation as County Board chairman P.J. Ryan presented the trophy to victorious team captain Stephen Frampton gave every one present a fair idea of what victory meant to them in this particular year which was very special to them as it coincided with the year in which their founder Jimmy McGinn died.

The Chairman paid tribute to both teams and to the high degree of good sportsmanship that prevailed. He paid tribute to the patrons for their support and expressed the hope that it would continue for many years to come.

RECORD GATE RECEIPTS

The gate receipts of approx. £16,000 were an all time record for this county and it goes to prove how attractive the games are.

In the two hurling finals and the senior football final, the receipts have well exceeded £40,000 (which was the amount paid for Fraher field 23 years ago). It goes to show how times have changed.

County Board Meeting

P. J. Ryan, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the County Board which was held at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan.

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter from the Walsh Park Field Committee recommended to the Board that Danny Murphy, Roanmore Club, be appointed as chief steward at the redeveloped ground. This was unanimously approved. The chairman announced that Greg Fives held a similar appointment in Fraher Field.

REFEREE'S REPORT

The only report before the meeting was from John Hunt who handled the county final drawn game. The recommendations of the GAC who had dealt with the report was a suspension of 2 weeks on Philly Flynn who had been sent off and fines of £250 on Mount Sion and £150 on Ballygunner.

Phil Fanning asked why the fine had been steeper on Mount Sion than on Ballygunner. The chairman replied that among other things, the goalkeeper, who had earlier been sent off, was involved in the sideline fracas.

Ballygunner, through Pat McCarthy, opposed the fine and proposed that it be remitted. This proposition was very heavily defeated.

The report gave rise to a long discussion relative to security at the redeveloped ground. Jim O'Keeffe submitted that the absence of a railing in front of the stand was, to a great extent, responsible for what happened at the drawn final.

Other members submitted that very few, apart from some children, left the stand to become involved. The chairman stated that being aware that there was no railing, the Board had provided additional stewards for the game. He also said that he had been assured that the railing would be in place for the replay. If it was not, additional stewards and/or additional gardai would be on duty.

FR. JIM KIELY TO BE HONOURED

Sliabh gCua/St. Marys Club are to donate a perpetual trophy to commemorate the memory of the late Fr. Jim Kiely, O.S.A., Hammersmith, who was a former player with their club and who played football at all levels from minor to senior with the county. Fr. Kiely, who died some months ago in a London hospital, was noted for his great work on behalf of the poor and the needy in London.

FINANCE

Treasurer, James Walsh gave the monthly update on the financial position of the Board and reported a big improvement, due in the main to excellent gate receipts from recent games. The chairman reiterated that we must continue to work hard at our finances in order to keep our overdraft at acceptable limits. It was his ambition to have the county debt very considerably reduced by the end of the year.

Track suits had been presented to the Camogie Board for the Waterford officials in charge of the All-Ireland final and a letter of thanks was received.

It was unanimously agreed to give a grant to the Ladies Football Board for an amount similar to what was given last year.

CONGRATS' TO COUNTY CHAMPIONS

The chairman on behalf of the board, congratulated Rathgormack who won the long overdue senior football title after 77 years and he complimented Kilrossanty on contributing to a great final.

On behalf of Kilrossanty, Jimmy Maher said his club wished to be associated with the chairman's comments and said that Rathgormack were deserving winners and they did not begrudge them the title after waiting so long.

Congratulations were also extended to Abbeyside on retaining the minor football title and to Fourmilewater who won the 'B' minor hurling. He commiserated with the losers.

TRIBUTES

Before the end of the meeting, the county chairman paid tribute to three former members who had given outstanding service to the county, to their clubs and to the Association generally and who had recently passed away.

He spoke in glowing terms about the service given by Donal Whelan, former Board officer, trustee of the Association, All-Ireland hurler, etc.; Dave Leamy, county selector, trustee of the Association, assistant trainer and masseur to the teams, etc., and Paddy Joe McGrath, former county and Brickey Rangers footballer and county selector.

Sympathy was also expressed with other families who were recently bereaved.

MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Tommy Hennessey reported on the availability of development grants for clubs in the county and he reported that the usual £8,000 per county would be shared among the applicants, depending on properly documented submissions. He told the meeting that development of less than £4,000 would not qualify for a grant. Applications must be with the Secretary of the Council before November 3. Application forms are available from the county secretary.

Jimmy O'Gorman gave details of the Munster Championship fixtures and dates and venues for the provincial club championship.

Having given an outline of the new-style McGrath Cup competition, some members expressed disappointment that Cork and Kerry are to be allowed play in the tournament which will be run in January. Some delegates felt that this tournament, which was organised for competition between the four weaker counties, will no longer hold the interest for counties like Waterford.

Jimmy told the meeting that Munster Council felt that the weaker counties would benefit from competition with top class teams and in this way it would be an advantage.

The draw is — Waterford v. Clare (winners v. Cork), and Tipperary v. Limerick (winners v. Kerry). He also informed the meeting that the county football champions, Rathgormack, will meet Moyne Rovers, Tipperary in the first round of the club championships at a Waterford venue.

YEAR BOOK NEWS

Níoclás MacCraith on behalf of the communications committee said that in the majority of cases the material being submitted by clubs was not satisfactory in that it did not contain information relating to their 1995 activities. Most of the copy being submitted was historical and ignored what the club was doing this year.

He also appealed to the clubs who had not yet submitted articles to do so immediately as the committee had a deadline for sending it to the printers.

From the same committee, PRO Brendan Tobin thanked the clubs who were involved in the championship finals for their splendid co-operation in submitting the details requested for the programmes, which sold very well. He also thanked the advertisers, etc.

SENIOR HURLING REPORT

A report from the senior hurling management gave a brief update on their preparation for the league and the trial (mixed match) played before they met Kilkenny in the first round at Walsh Park. They stated that they looked forward to the appointment of the third county selector when the county final was replayed and also to having all their players available for the remainder of the league.

The county chairman said it was appreciated that the selectors were functioning under great difficulty because players were not available and he appealed to the new champions to ensure that their players would be available to the selectors for the game against the All-Ireland champions, Clare, which takes place on October 22 at Ennis.

He said he had made a similar appeal to the new football champions, Rathgormack to have their players available for the game against Carlow.

COISDE NA PEIL

In reply to a question by Coisde na Peil delegate, Declan Barron, the chairman said that the present Coisde would remain in office until March next year when the new committee would be appointed.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The matter of the county disciplinary committee's investigation into the sideline problems which erupted in November last during the playing of the under-21 'B' football final, was again under discussion at the meeting when Clashmore chairman, Dan Leahy said that as far as his club was concerned, there appeared to have been a misinterpretation of a statement by their clubman at the hearing by the committee and he wished on behalf of the club to apologise for any embarrassment caused. There was no intentions at any time to cause offence to anyone.

It was pointed out that when the referee's report of the game was received, the matter was sent to the disciplinary committee for investigation. When the report came before the meeting it stated that a former officer of the Board was responsible for allowing or letting people into the sideline on the occasion. The report was adopted and subsequently a member present asked that the official involved be named. When the report was returned it stated that the person involved was the recently retired county chairman.

This was vehemently challenged and there was evidence given by Declan Barron, Ardmore, that on the day the chairman, arriving late, came into the sideline unaccompanied.

It was again returned to the disciplinary committee who were asked to note the evidence submitted by Declan Barron. There was no further submission by that committee because the chairman was indisposed for some months.

On Monday night then when Dan Leahy clarified the matter (it was the Clashmore clubman at the first hearing that allegedly told that a former officer was responsible) a long and acrimonious argument took place. The former chairman demanded an apology from the Board and some delegates supported him.

A proposition by Jimmy O'Gorman to the effect that the Board had nothing to apologise for, was also supported.

Some delegates felt that the apology from the Clashmore Club was sufficient.

In the end the matter was referred back to the disciplinary committee.

APPOINTMENT OF MINOR HURLING SELECTOR

na nÓg expressed disappointment that the County Board had decided to change the system of appointment of the minor hurling selectors and that the Juvenile Board no longer had an input into the selection of mentors.

John Kiely, county hurling officer, speaking in support, said that the arrangement whereby the Juvenile Board were given the right to nominate, had worked very well since 1990 and the county had enjoyed a splendid measure of success from it.

Paddy Fitzgerald supported and said the idea of giving the Juvenile Board an input meant that there could be consistency from under-12 selectors all the way up, etc.

The chairman said it was a decision of the open County Board to have the minor selectors appointed in the same manner as the county selectors for the other teams.

Following further discussion, the chairman said that he would meet the Bord na nÓg officers and discuss the matter with them.

County Hurlers Take On All Ireland Champions At Ennis

Rathgormack Play Tipperary Champions Moyné Rovers At Walsh Park

Patrons are certainly given quite a choice over the coming weekend and whether they opt for Dungarvan, Walsh Park or Ennis, they are almost assured of good fare as all the listed matches will provide first class contests.

CUSACK PARK ENNIS

When Kerry defeated us in the first round of the Munster championship at Walsh Park two years ago we felt humiliated and embarrassed at the result. How much more embarrassed would we have felt if we had been the All Ireland champions at the time? If you can answer that one, you will have a fair idea of how humiliated and devastated the All Ireland champions, Clare, must have felt two weeks ago when in their first match since winning the title, they were defeated by Kerry in round one of the National League.

I have no doubt but that the champions will go all out to avenge that defeat on Waterford as we happen to be next in line to meet the 1995 kingpins of hurling.

Here Clare will play their first match in front of their massive home support and they know only too well that if they are beaten here by Waterford, people (as well as the media I'm sure) will begin to label them as

'flash in the pan' champions. The Bannermen have far, far too much at stake to allow themselves to be beaten by Waterford, whom they defeated decisively in the league semi-final at Thurles earlier this year.

The team to represent us in Cusack Park was not selected at the time of writing but with the county final, finally out of the way, it is reasonable to suppose that the county players from Mount Sion and Ballygunner will be available to the selectors. With Tony Browne, Brian Greene, Gary Gater, Paraigh Fanning, Paul Flynn, Stephen Frampton, Fergal Hartley, Billy O'Sullivan, John Meaney, etc., available we would certainly be able to field a much stronger team than that which we fielded against Kilkenny at Walsh Park in the first round.

I was told by a Clare official over the weekend that Brian Lohan, full back and possibly Frank Lohan with at least four others will be missing from their side, but they will have reliable replacements who will be

anxious to prove themselves worthy of being retained.

The official explanation for the defeat by Kerry in the first round which came from the Clare camp, is that the team are tired — a reaction to the year long training — and it will take them quite some time before they are back to normal. This, they say, is only one of the cost factors associated with winning an All Ireland title.

In spite of all this, the home side will be clear favourites to account for Waterford as we can be very sure that they will go all out to avoid a further embarrassment to their ego.

I.F. FINAL REPLAY

Faha and Clashmore clubs will renew their rivalry at Fraher Field on Sunday next when they clash in the replay of their very exciting drawn match at the same venue two weeks ago.

This will be their third meeting in the same championship and in their two games to date they have played a draw.

In the draw on Saturday week last, Clashmore

looked to me to have been the side who 'blew' their chances of winning, particularly when Faha lost their centre half back Kevin Lonergan through injury at the end of the first half.

I don't know if the under-21 player is recovered. If he is he will increase Faha's chance of winning. Another noticeable fact about the drawn final was that Faha's schemer-in-chief, Kieran Power, was held scoreless for the first time this year. I cannot see that happening again.

From experience we know that replays seldom follow the pattern of drawn matches and it will not surprise here if both adopt different tactics and avail of the experience gained when they ended up on level terms two weeks ago.

As I have already written, I judged that Clashmore wasted more chances than did Faha and in the expectation that this will not be repeated, I give the vote to them.

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UDC Approve £60,000 Deal On Quay Properties

ties and it is hoped that Clancy Construction will bring about a total revitalisation of the rundown harbour area.

The Co. Tipperary company have carried out similar construction projects in Thurles and the quays in Clonmel. They propose to provide 30 apartments, 3 town houses, office and commercial/retail units on the ground floor and 20 car parking spaces at the rear.

The property is located within an area that is included under Dungarvan's urban renewal designation, thereby allowing Clancy Construction major tax allowances and remissions should the project be completed by July 31, 1997.

SIMILAR PROPOSALS
In a report circulated to members at last Monday's UDC meeting, County Manager, Donal Connolly disclosed that following the advertising of the quay properties, it was all down to a choice of three parties. Each interested developer was then invited to make a formal presentation of their proposals before a selection committee made up of Council officials and Waterford Foods personnel. One group however withdrew their proposal prior to the presentation.

In his report, Mr. Connolly states that both of the remaining proposals were similar as to the purchase price offered. Both proposals also provided for commercial/retail development on the ground floor and apartments on the upper floors with town houses at the upper end of Galway's Lane. "Both presentations were of a very high quality and clearly both of the applicants had given the proposal very serious consideration," said Mr. Connolly, who strongly recommended the disposal of the property to Clancy Construction.

INVESTMENT RECOVERED
Acquired by the Urban Council in 1990 for a total

cost of £50,000, Cllr. Tony Wright said he was in support of the disposal as the Council would recover their initial investment. "It's a snip for the people who bought it," claimed Cllr. Wright, who described the Thurles company's proposal as "much improved" on the situation the Council faced 12 months ago.

Last year much controversy and dissension surrounded the disposal of this site to a consortium of local businessmen, namely Harbour Development Ltd.

The company intended to convert the building into a complex of upmarket apartments, while providing 600 square feet of office accommodation to the Council free of charge for a period of 25 years. Vehemently opposed to this proposal from the onset, Cllr. Wright now seems to have found a more favourable proposal for the Council's lucratively located building. "It's important that some move be made under the urban renewal scheme, particularly in the Quay area," he added.

BEST OPPORTUNITY
Responding to a number of queries raised by Cllr. Wright, Mr. Connolly said he hoped to spend the £60,000 in infrastructure in the urban area. Neither of the two derelict buildings would have fetched as much, he said, if they had been sold separately, being more attractive as a package.

In all, he described the deal as the best opportunity the Council has of unloading the building while also getting a profitable return.

Also supporting the disposal of the property to Clancy Construction, Cllr. Damien Dillon said he had watched those particular buildings deteriorate over the last 20 years.

"I hope it's a successful development for Clancy Construction and I hope they make money from it," he said, "if it's successful for them, it's successful for the town."

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
