Local Oyster Growers Receive Emergency Aid Dankara Byaisling

Due to abnormally high seawater temperatures and the hot weather spell experienced over the summer, shellfish producers around the country and particularly in the Dungarvan area have reported a massive increase in the level of oyster mortalities.

Indications are that in excess of 60 million seed from a range of Irish and European hatcheries has been lost in recent months at diverse locations around the coastline. Indeed, some local producers have reported losses of anything up to 100% for their 1995 Pacific (c. gigas) oyster seed in-

Analyses of shellfish samples from a number of the affected areas have ruled out any underlying disease or fish health problem and according to the Marine Department's Fisheries Research Centre, the heavy mortalities can be attributed to the aforementioned exceptionally hot weather and high seawater temperatures which led to a decrease in oxygen in the water.

£300,000 TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Difficulties experienced by oyster producers were outlined to the Minister for the Marine, Eamon Gilmore by the Irish Shellfish Association and the IFA Shellfish Committee last September. Following the meeting, the Marine Department, in conjunction with an Bord Iascaigh Mhara (BIM), undertook a survey of the unprecedented losses around the coast. Their response to this serious situation was the implementation of a £300,000 aid package which has been warmly welcomed by local produc-

The aid package which will be implemented through BIM will assist growers to restock farms and help restore production potential.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION: I am aged 60 and have been self employed since 1976. Prior to that I had been an insured worker and paid stamps. My business has now failed and I have no income. What social welfare benefits am I entitled to? If I managed to get work for odd days could I claim something for the other days?

ANSWER: As a self employed person you would have been insured at class S. This class of PRSI only covers you for Survivor's and Contributory Old Age pensions. If you are available for and actively seeking work you can sign on the employment exchange and be means tested for Unemployment Assistance. You will be asked for accounts/details of your income for the previous year and after allowing for any expected changes an estimate will be made of your income for the coming year. This amount will be assessed against you as means and your rate of assistance will be reduced accordingly. If you disagree with these figures or it turns out that you don't get any work you can ask for a review of your means.

While you are waiting on a decision you could apply for Supplementary Welfare Allowance to the Community Welfare Officer at the local Health Centre. You could also apply for a Medical Card.

The contributions you paid as an employee since 1953 will be combined with your Class S contributions when you reach age 66 and apply for Contributory Old Age Pension or if you have to claim Survivor's Pension. You may already have enough contributions to maintain entitlement to those pensions. However, it would be advisable to write to the Pension Services Office in Sligo and ask them to confirm how you stand regarding these pensions.

If you need further contributions you can then opt in as a voluntary contributor in case you cannot get insurable employment/self employment.

When writing to the Pension Services Office you should quote your date of birth, RSI and old insurance numbes, and maiden name (if married

FINE GAEL EXECUTIVE MEETING

The Lismore District Executive Fine Gael held its meeting recently in Mr. Richie Tobin's Lounge Bar, Ballyduff. It was a memorable evening because of its very large attendance and its constructive debate on many national and local issues. When Mr. John Heneghan, Executive Chairman, finished the meeting at 10.30 p.m. an impromptu social evening followed in which all customers on the premises participated.

This country would be betwould be in the best interest of the Irish people.

Cllr. Nora Flynn spoke on the problem of derelict sites in our towns and also on the problems inherent in the social welfare system. Many people, she said, were in dire need of housing and yet little is being done with the derelict sites in our towns and villages. She said the social welfare system left a lot to be desired as it did not give recipients of social welfare any incentive to work. She called for a more flexible system.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell referred to the new Rural Environment Protection Scheme for farmers. He said that the change announced by the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates, extending the one year to 3 years in which to implement the pro-

The Scientist Who lade Insects

NOBODY was quite sure what scientist Andrew Crosse was up to in his lonely country mansion but people were convinced it was something sinister. His servants had strict instructions never to enter the rooms where he conducted his mysterious experiments. And people on and around his Broomfield. Somerset, estate feared him.

Neighbours and farm workers in the rural 19th century community knew only that Crosse was dabbling with newfangled electricity. They often saw flashes over the Crosse mansion.

People called him the thunder and lightening man, and claimed that devils danced on the wires he had strung around his home.

They concluded he was practising black magic and blamed him for poor harvests and a potato blight.

In fact, Crosse was a genuine seeker after scientific

Even so, one day in 1987 something happened in his laboratory that convinced his neighbours they'd been right all along. And the incident has baffled the world of science ever since.

Crosse, it seemed, had accidentally created life.

According to author Peter Haining, Crosse had done something like the notorious Dr. Frankenstein of horror film fame who created his own monster.

In his book, The Man Who Was Frankenstein, Haining tells how, in the middle of an experiment, Crosse noticed strange, tiny objects on an electrified stone.

They grew over the next few days and Crosse noted they were sinister, bristly insects with up to eight legs. Hundreds appeared on the stone during the weeks that followed.

Crosse now accepted, writes Haining, that he had achieved what no man had ever done before — he had created life.

What was most frightening was that his insects proved they could breed.

Another electrical expert, W. H Weeks, was invited to repeat Crosse's experiments. Soon Weeks saw similar insects crawling over his work-table.

But where then came from neither he nor Crosse could say. And it remains a mystery to this day.

Official Opening Of Killineen/Deelish Road

At the November 1994 estimates meeting of Waterford County Council, County Manager Donal Connolly, proposed the provision for community involvement in county roads. The scheme itself was first advertised in the local papers in February 1995 inviting applications from anyone interested in taking part in the proposed scheme. Cllr. Billy Kyne had been involved in a previous attempt to have our road upgraded, and it was he who suggested to us that we should put in an application for the scheme. Cllr. Kyne was of great assistance to us right through the

whole project. In all 31 applications were received by the Council, 12 of which were from the Kilmacthomas area. At that stage it was decided by the Council to divide the £100,000, which was available for these projects, between four electoral areas, Kilmacthomas, Tramore,

Lismore and Dungarvan. At from each family an initial the June meeting the Killineen West/Deelish Project was selected and approved to be the project for the Kilmacthomas area.

Following that decision, a meeting was arranged by Cllr. Oliver Coffey between the residents representative Michael Flynn, the Council Engineers, Tom Lineen B.S.E. and Larry Fraher, Area Engineer. Agreement was reached on the work which had to be carried out, both by the Council and residents. A times scale was also agreed for the completion of the work which the residents had to carry out.

A meeting of all the residents involved was held in early July. It was at this stage that the residents decided to carry out as much as possible of the work themselves. After studying the estimates which were received for the main earth moving work and purchase of material needed, the residents decided to collect

payment of £260 to cover

It was a great boost for the project, when news of a favourable response to our request for funding was received from Coillte. The residents received great assistance from Coillte representatives, Pat Harrington and Ted Murphy. The whole project would never have taken place but for the cooperation received from the two landowners affected by the project. With the kind consent of Jimmy Lynch and Michael Flavin, the project got underway.

A local contractor was employed to do the heavy earth moving. A total of 360 yards of fence had to be removed and dumped. This part of the job took about four days to complete. The replacement railing, a concrete post and rail type, was the next stage to be tackled. This was a back breaking task. In time the railing was completed. A J.C.B. was hired to do some tidying up work. All the small bits and pieces, that had to be looked after were soon completed. The deadline for the completion of the residents work, had been met.

It was now time for the Council to move in and start their work. The main selection of road was strengthened, then two layers of tar and chips were applied. This work was soon completed. Throughout the whole project the weather had remained dry, which made the work that bit easier to get through.



The controversial AIDS story which rocked the town of Dungarvan last September has again resurfaced, this time due to strong local criticism of a certain live RTE broadcast from Dungarvan in which an RTE radio presenter signed off his show from what he termed the "AIDS capital of Ireland".

garding the incident has already been sent to Joe Barry, Director General of RTE from Dungarvan UDC Chairperson, Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

In the letter Cllr. Ryan stated that she had been asked by a number of residents to raise the issue with RTE regarding the reported use of the phrase "AIDS capital of Ireland", by RTE radio presenter Joe Duffy as he signed off from a broadcast during the height of the AIDS story.

'A GIGGLE AND A LAUGH'

The Cathaoirleach's sentiments were reechoed at last week's meeting of Dungarvan UDC by a number of Councillors who also voiced their dissatisfaction at RTE's handling of the story, live from Grattan Square.

Chairman of the South Eastern Health Board, Cllr. Billy Kyne claimed that Joe Duffy had made a "giggle and a laugh" out of the town's predicament. The radio presenter's live interviews on the Square, he said, had trivialised the whole issue of the serious and shocking AIDS revelations by Dungarvan curate Fr. Michael Kennedy.

"I don't think our national medium (RTE) did the town any favours", he further declared while adding that it was regrettable to see press reports homing in on and tar-

geting certain people. **BRANDED FOR LIFE**

His Labour colleague, Cllr. Lar Hart said he condemned those people who claimed they knew the so-called 'Angel of Death'. The Dungarvan Councillor said he had heard 9 names bandied about as media speculation of the woman's identity intensified. "Those people are now branded for the rest of their lives", he claimed.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan however was unwilling to let the AIDS scandal resurface and said the story should be left die a natural death. "We're none any the wiser on the subject since the last Urban Council meeting", he

FEEDING FRENZY

President of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, John Walsh was interviewed recently on an edition of the RTE Radio 1 programme 'Soundbite' by presenter Brian Farrell. The programme which features a weekly review of the media, focussed this time on Dungarvan in the wake of the media blitz and the general effect on the town of being in the international media hotspot.

Speaking on the programme, Mr. Walsh said he was very concerned about the image of the town in the aftermath of the AIDS scandal. A local retailer in the town, Mr. Walsh said he was bewildered at the audacity of the media and particularly certain foreign press who misled the world on certain aspects of the story. "A feeding frenzy went on...they (media) were chasing shadows...we were very annoyed at the way they brutally

als...it was very unedifying," said Mr. Walsh who said the media didn't interview these people, they interrogated them.

Apart from the foreign media, Mr. Walsh told presenter Brian Farrell that he felt a little let down by the Irish media with such terms as 'AIDS capital of Ireland',

etc. being used.

The Chamber of Commerce and other various agencies, he said have been working hard for a number of years. Last year the town received urban renewal status and was recently given the go ahead from the IDA for the construction of an advance factory which has yet to be filled. While stressing that inward investment is terribly important for Dungarvan, Mr. Walsh claimed that in the wake of the media blitz, potential developers may have second thoughts about investing in the town.

With what he termed 'open season on the clergy', Mr. Walsh said that unfortunately Dungarvan was "the vehicle that was used and one could say abused for this purpose".

Polling Day For Divorce Referendum

Brendan Howlin, T.D., Minister for the Environment has made an order appointing Friday, November 24, 1995 to be the polling day for the referendum to be held on the proposal for the amendment of the Constitution contained in the Fifteenth Amendment of the Constitution (No. 2) Bill, 1995. Polling will take place between the hours of 9 a.m. and 10 p.m.

Every person who is an Irish citizen and is included in the register of electors for a constituency is entitled to vote at the referendum.

Any person who was eligible for inclusion in the register of electors for a constituency on the relevant qualifying date (1 September 1994) but was not registered may apply for entry in the supplement to the regis ter in order to vote at the referendum. Application should be made to the relevant registration authority (County Council or City Corporation) before 9 November.

Electors are reminded that they are likely to be required to produce evidence of identity when they attend to vote. The documents which will be accepted for this purpose will be listed on the polling card to be sent to each elector and on posters which will be displayed at all polling stations.

THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

CATTLE

Winter Feeding: With the first taste of winter, it will soon be time to commence winter feeding. Intensive producers will have the bigger cattle housed to avoid weight loss on bare pastures. Suckler cows, stores and weanlings are often neglected at this time of year, they perform badly or even lose condition. Most suckler cows should be weaned about now, the only exception being late calvers (May/June) or where there is very good pasture.

Weaning reduces the nutrition requirement of the cow considerably, thus saving body condition, or it can save pasture supply by tightening up weaned cows that are in good condition and forcing them to clear off pastures. Where weanlings are left outdoors, feed 1 to

2 kgs. meal per day at grass.

Cow Condition: The target condition score for suckler cows at weaning is 3.0 i.e. well fleshed. Cows that are not up to this level of condition require extra winter feed or will calve down too thin. Thin in turn has implication for breeding performance next year. Supplement scarce pasture with some hay or silage.

Hoose: It is good practice to dose weanlings for hoose (which also covers stomach worms). Respiratory diseases can be aggravated where there is lung

damage due to hoose infection.

Grass Tetany: The change in weather conditions increases the risk of tetany for cows that are still suckling calves. Protection against tetany is provided by feeding magnesium supplements. The most suitable options for suckler cows are:-

(i) A home-made lick made up of 50:50 mixture of molasses and calcined magnesite. The mixture is put in troughs or tubs and left to cows ad lib. It should be stirred well at least once per day as the magnesite settles. In very wet weather, remove accumulated water. When introducing the mixture, start with about 75% molasses in the mixture to get cows accustomed to using the lick. Use a very fine grade of magnesite as it stays in suspension better than coarse grades.

(ii) Provide commercial magnesium licks or blocks. These are available at local merchants and Co-Ops., are more expensive but are very convenient.

(iii) A small amount of commercial compound nut or a home-made ration supplement with magnesium is probably the most reliable method of getting magnesium into cows, as each cow gets the required dose. (iv) Dispenser systems are available to provide magnesium in the drinking water.

SHEEP BREEDING

Repeats: 25 to 35% of ewes will usually repeat in any flock. Numbers very much higher than this, can indicate a ram problem - ewes are being served but are not going in lamb. A change of ram is the most likely solution. It is obviously impossible to identify repetats unless the harness crayon or raddle colour has been changed between 2 and 3 weeks after ram introduc-

The mating season should extend to at least 50 days in order to allow 2 repeat opportunities to each ewe. Curtailing breeding to a shorter period will increase the proportion of barren ewes.

Rams: When changing harness crayons or renewing raddle, always check rams for any problems which might reduce libido or impair performance. Loose harnesses are particularly common and can destroy good rams. Lameness and breast sores also frequently occur. Rams found to have any such difficulties should be withdrawn from the flock as they can interfere with the activities of their colleagues.

Ewe Lambs: Should ewe lambs be bred or not? It is a difficult question, now that eligibility for ewe premium is no longer dependent on pregnancy. The biggest objection to breeding on most farms is the prolonging of the lambing season - often up to 4 weeks and well beyond the patience of even the most committed opera-

The compromise might be, well-timed sponging with just one mating opportunity. Ewe lambs sponged three weeks after the commencement of the main flock breeding season would lamb with the last of the mature ewes. It does make more sense than having all those idle ewes around the farm.

Scan ewes at about 50 days. Non-pregnant sheep can be stored over winter.

I.C.M.S.A. NEWS

South East Region Well Represented At A.G.M.

John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South East region said that the area was very well represented at the National A.G.M. of ICMSA held recently.

He outlined below some of the resolutions which were passed at that A.G.M.:

RESOLUTIONS: DAIRYING

1 — In the light of the decision of the European Court on the 4.5% Case, ICMSA should renew its Minister for Ag that he does no EU Commission market supports.

determination to get additional milk quota for Ireland and to vigorously resist any further reduction in quota.

2 — Despite favourable world prices at present, market supports including intervention and export refunds are necessary to protect milk prices in Ireland. ICMSA should continue to put the maximum pressure on the Minister for Agriculture so that he does not allow the EU Commission to reduce market supports.

3 — ICMSA should resist any increase in inspection costs or levies associated with the dairy hygiene regulations.

4 — A dairy farmer with a suckler cow quota should be allowed to expand milk production beyond 25,638 gallons without any loss of suckler cow premium entitlement provided his dairy and suckler enterprise together does not exceed 100 units.

(400 gallons = 1 unit; 1 suckler cow quota = 1 unit).

LIVESTOCK

1 — ICMSA should rigorously pursue the full implementation of the Charter of Rights for Farmers so that farmers benefit from timely payment of all livestock premium and headage payments, simplified application procedures, a proper appeals system and a courteous information service for the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry.

2 — ICMSA should pursue policy changes to guarantee the continued availability of the deseasonalisation premium for Irish livestock farmers.

3 — ICMSA should play an active role in the future development of the Irish livestock industry by pursuing a policy which will allow for a proper balance between market development and competitive prices to farmers.

SHEEP

1 — ICMSA should vigorously pursue the implementation of a top-up mechanism to the ewe premium so as to provide proper income support for Irish sheep farmers.

2 — With a ceiling on ewe numbers the route to increasing farm income is through improving lamb quality. ICMSA should pursue the implementation of a carcase classification scheme which rewards farmers for producing quality lambs.

Yates Must Deliver To Sheep Producers

The Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Ivan Yates, T.D., to account for his lack of delivery of aid to Irish sheep farmers.

French sheep producers are to be compensated for poor prices as a result of the adverse exchange rate movement of the French Franc against Sterling, Lira and Peseta, according to Mr. O'Rourke.

"It seems that the French Minister for Agriculture is prepared to pay more than lip service to French sheep producers," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He concluded by calling on Minister Yates to get off the fence and to deliver a compensation package to Irish sheep producers.

Murphy Condemns Refund Cut

Waterford IFA County Chairman, Pat Murphy has strongly condemned the decision of the EU Beef Management Committee to cut export refunds on live cattle by 7.5% and carcass beef by 5%.

Mr. Murphy said that the passive approach of the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates was no longer acceptable in defence of these vital cattle price supports for Irish livestock farmers. He said: "This is the third time since the beginning of September that the EU Commission has cut refunds, with a deafening silence from Minister Yates."

Mr. Murphy said that it was no longer acceptable to allow bureaucrats make the running on beef refunds and strong political intervention by the Minister was now

called for.

The Waterford Chairman said that because of the significent volumes of pre-fixation on beef refunds there was no way processors could justify any reduction in cattle prices at this stage. "Factories are still operating on the higher level of refunds. This situation will pertain until at least the end of the year with processors having prefixed up to 23,000 tonnes of refunds this week."

Mr. Murphy said that the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates will have to call a halt to the continuous onslaught on refunds by the EU Commission. He pointed out that since January, 1994 live refunds have been cut by £9.70/cwt (£116/head) and carcase beef refunds have been cut by over 7p/lb (£55/head).

Preserving Our Uplands

At a conference to Explore the Long-Term Sustainability of Ireland's Uplands which was recently held in U.C.G., a paper entitled "Where Are We Going?" was read by Paddy Phelan, National President, United Farmers Association.

In his paper Mr. Phelan was highly critical of what he termed 'bribery' by Brussels bureaucrats to encourage wholesale planting of trees. He said that for the first time in our history trees are supplanting people and forestry has taken precedence over agriculture. He said that EU policies were aimed at turning Ireland into the playground of Europe with our indigenous people line up to act as beaters, gun bearers and golf caddies.

The Co. Waterford man said the proposal by Minister Ivan Yates to plant one million hectares of marginal land and to encourage tree planting by way of a tax incentive was a kick in the teeth to agriculture and to those who need extra acres to survive.

Mr. Phelan proposed that sheep farmers in overgrazed mountain areas who agreed to set a-side their grazing rights should qualify for a twenty year, tax-free premium, in order to have parity with forestry set-a-side.

Mr. Phelan concluded his paper by emphasising that we all have a duty to preserve our uplands for the economic and recreational benefit of posterity. He stated that afforestation would give us a silent countryside with pockets of isolated people.



Plan That Hedge Now

"Once upon a time every house had a privet hedge . ." Well. not quite, but the privet was a common

sight, thanks to a fastgrowing habit which created a boundary line which could be kept neatly trimmed by decent

Even if it did get a little unruly, a bit of elbow grease would soon lick it into shape.

But the old privet has fallen out of favour. If any variety has leadership now it is leylandii or Leyland Cypress, a hybrid created by man which has all the privet virtues of fast growth and a lack of fussiness

It also looks smarter even when a little overgrown mind you, you need more than shears to keep it properly in check.

And like privet, its popularity could soon see it dumped in favour of next year's model, whatever that might be.

Now is a good time to plan planting a hedge and there are good reasons for having one:

- hedges are efficient noise and wind breaks, yet more resistant to weather damage and rot than
- they are definitly cheaper and easier on the eye
- they round off the edges of a garden and can be especially useful in the gardens of newly-built homes.
- some varieties have thorns and can help keep out intruders.
- deciduous varieties can provide a good shelter and backdrop for flowers - conifers may not be ideal companions to your blooming borders.

When choosing a variety think what height you want your hedge to reach, how fast you want it established and how much clipping it will need - privet needs a little quite often - how much can you afford.

PREPARING

Whatever you choose, start preparing the ground now while the weather is still mild and other garden chores are becoming fewer. It will be worth the effort because a well established hedge will survive for many years.

Evergreens can be planted now while others go in

Varieties to consider are:

YEW — expensive and slow growing but well worth the effort because it will create a magnificent hedge.

HAWTHORN — beat the burglar! An excellent deterrent but it can quickly look scruffy and many people prefer a stout bushy rose variety such as Rugosa which produces flowers and hips as well as thorns.

HOLLY — is another prickly customer but also a friendly one at Christmas time. However it is expensive and slow-growing.

BOX — another traditional favourite producing a dense, evergreen screen which is easily controlled. It is beloved by topiary experts, but declining interest in this strange art form mirrors the declining popularity o

Q: I do a lot of walking and have developed a very painful foot. I've tried all sorts of supports and pads but to no avail. My G.P. referred me to an orthopaedic surgeon who suggest removing part of one of the nerves. Is there an alternative to this? as I feel this is rather drastic.

A: You may have what is called a Norton's neuroma. In this condition, fibrous scar tissue builds up around one of the little nerves in the foot, producing pressure and pain when walking. THe cause is unknown and it usually effects the nerve between the third and fourth toes. It is more common in women. A support pad often relieves the discomfort, but many cases require surgery to remove the thickened area of nerve. If you are still unsure a second opinion before making up your mind often helps.

Q: I've had the same G.P. all my life he's a family friend and we have always got along well. The problem is that I now have difficulty discussing things like contraception with him. How can I change to another G.P. without hurting his feelings.

A: I would think your doctor may have anticipated your difficulties in this area. If he has a partner, you could consult him/her on any issue you find difficult to discuss with your own G.P. or you could always go to a different practice.

However, your doctor's feelings may be hurt if he thought you had a medical need that wasn't met by him because you felt inhibited. If you do change drop him a note to

Q: Our doctor won't give my children antibiotics until they are practically at death's door. Is this standard procedure or should I change doctors?

A: Antibiotics are very powerful, often lifesaving drugs. They are, however only effective against bacteria, not viruses. Since it is often impossible to say whether an infection is viral or bacterial, the doctor may base his decision to prescribe on general factors, such as how ill the child is. Over prescription can cause the bacteria to become resistant to the drugs. Your doctor may be simply being cautious.

Q: My son developed quite bad dandruff and now the entire family have it. We've tried anti-dandruff shampoos and different brushes and combs, but we can't get rid of it!.

A: Seborrhoeic dermatitis seems to be the basic disease in the common variety of dandruff. This is when scales form more readily than normal The shedding of these scales is what you see on your shoulders and in your hair. The rate at which your scalp skin sheds is genetically determined,

Beef Wrapped In **Pastry**

2 tbsp olive oil 1 large onion, peeled and finely chopped 2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed 225g/8oz flat-cap mushrooms, wiped and thinly sliced 3 tbsp pine nuts 4 tbsp fresh chopped parsley 8 (21.5cm/8 /sin) square readyrolled sheets of puff pastry beaten egg for glazing 4 (175g/6oz) fillet steaks Gravy 25g/1oz butter 1 small onion, peeled and thinly sliced 25g/1oz plain flour

300ml//apt beef stock 2 tbsp mushroom ketchup 3-4 tosp dry sherry Steamed baby carrots and thin strips of leeks tossed in butter and thickly sliced sauteed potatoes sprinkled with fresh chopped parsley to serve

METHOD: Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Heat oil in a large pan and add the onion and garlic. Cook for 3-4 minutes until soft. dd mushrooms and cook for a further 3-4 minutes until just soft. Stir in pine nuts and parsley and season well to taste; cook for a further 3 minutes. Cool for ,5 minutes.

Take 4 sheets of pastry and place on 2 nonstick baking sheets. Brush pastry edges with a little egg, place a fillet steak in the centre and top with a quarter of the mushroom mixture. Place remaining sheets of pastry on mushrooms; press edges to seal. Trim with a sharp knife, reserving trimmings. Make a scalloped edge by pushing your index finger between thumb and index finger of your other hand.

Brush parcels with egg. Reroll trimmings and cut out 20 diamond shapes (for leaves) from remaining pastry, then score 'veins' with tip of a knife. Arrange 5 leaves in a flower shape on top of each parcel; brush with egg. Place on a wetted baking sheet and bake for 20 minutes until pastry is risen and golden. To make gravy - melt butter in a large pan. Add onion and fry for 3-4 minutes, until soft. Stir in flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Away from the heat, gradually stir in stock. Return to heat and bring to the boil, stirring, until thickened.

Add mushroom ketchup and sherry and strain through a sieve (discarding onion) into a clean pan. When beef parcels are cooked, arrange on warm serving plates with carrots. leeks and potatoes. Heat through gravy and pour a little over each parcel. Serve with remaining gravy.

PUDDING CHOCOLATE

For the topping: 2oz/50g plain chocolate 2 tbsp double cream For the sponge: 6oz/175g butter 6021759 caster sugar

3 eggs, size 2, beaten 6oz/175g self-raising flour 4oz/100g plain chocolate 2 tbsp milk

For the brandy sauce: 2 tbsp soft brown sugar 2 tbsp caster sugar tbsp cornflour

1/4 pt/150ml milk 1/20z/15g butter 4 tbsp brandy grated zest of 1 orange

Grease a 2pt/1.2 litre pudding basin with butter. To make the topping, melt the chocolate in a bowl over a pan of simmering water. Stir in the cream, then spoon into the pudding basin.

 To make sponge, beat butter and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time. beating wall between each addition, then fold in flour. Melt chocolate in a bowl over a pan of simmering water. Beat in milk, then fold into sponge mixture.

 Spoon the sponge mixture over chocolate in pudding basin. Cover with greaseproof paper, then with foil. and secure with string. Place in a steamer over boiling water, then cover and cook for 2 hrs, topping up water as required.

 To make sauce, place sugar and cornflour in pan. Whisk in milk over a low heat and stir until boiling. Beat in butter, then stir in brandy and orange zest. Turn pudding on to a plate and serve with sauce.







NEW ALL STARS SCHEME

The selection process for the All Stars is to change this year and players will, for the first time, be given a say in the selection.

A roll of players who have this year played inter county hurling and football is being compiled before voting takes place within the next month or so.

Last year the hurling selection was widely criticised because Brian Whelehan of Offaly was overlooked and complaints about the incompetency of the selection group who were media personalities were widespread and there was public demand for change.

Whether or not the new system will be satisfactory, is something that we must wait for. It will mean that players will be voting for other players whom they have not seen in action. Or they will be voting for players whom they have seen, to the exclusion of great players whom they have not seen in action.

My view is that as there is no satisfactory selection process, the scheme will eventually die out and as one who is against the concept of All Stars, I won't complain when it does fade away.

Local Oyster Growers Receive Emergency Aid Package

As part of the package a further £100,000 will be made available for rope mussel producers who have also experienced severe losses

LOCAL LOSSES OF UP TO 100%

Manager of Meitheal Trá na Rinne Teo, Sean Mac Craith told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that the high level of oyster mortalities had set the local shellfish industry back a great deal. Based in Poll A' Phuca, Ring, the company is supplied by over 33 oyster producers in Dungarvan, some of which have been badly affected by seed losses. Indeed he claimed that the local shellfish industry had experienced losses of anything between 50 to 100%.

Delighted with the Minister's aid package, Mr. Mac Craith said the money will be of huge benefit to local affected producers and is in recognition of how important the shellfish industry is to the Irish economy.

Annual production of pacific oysters and rope mussels is currently valued at £4.6 million to the national and local economies and is expected to reach £10.6 million by 1999 with EU and State aid.

YOUNG INDUSTRY Ring native, Caitlín Uí Aodha who is an elected member of the Irish Shellfish Association was also pleased with Minister Gilmore's aid package.

Speaking to the 'Dungar-van Leader' Mrs. Uí Aodha said the shellfish industry is still in its infancy around the coast.

Many young, previously unemployed people she said, have invested in local shellfish production/cultivation and are totally dependent on the industry for their living. In this regard, Mrs Ui Aodha said the oyster seed losses were an awful blow to the industry which had been set back by a massive loss of invest-

While the aid package will not replace all of the seed losses experienced by producers, Mrs. Uf Aodha welcomed the £300,000 allocation and said the packreflected the age government's interest in this potentially lucrative industry.

National Chairman of the IFA Shellfish Association and Managing Director of Dungarvan Shellfish, Jim Harty said he had met with Minister Gilmore and Minister Sean Barrett to discuss the mortalities situation and the industry request for an emergency aid package.

Both Ministers he said, had readily recognised the problem with BIM now handling the distribution of £300,000 for oyster grow-

When applying for the emergency aid, Mr. Harty disclosed that producers will have to produce a tax clearance certificate, import licence from the Department of the Marine and a receipt from the hatchery

Although one of the largest oyster growers in the area, Mr. Harty however said Dunga van shellfish had experienced no seed losses and indeed described 1995 as an excellent year for the growth of mature oysters.

Smaller oyster growers were not so fortunate, claimed Mr. Harty, many experienced a complete wipe out of seeds while others lost over 70% of their stock.
