Esat Digifone To Renew Mast Campaign

Esat Digifone, the surprise winner of the second GSM mobile phone licence, is to step up its campaign for planning permission for the erection of a transmission mast in Kilmacthomas.

Previous controversial attempts by Esat to erect such a mast in Currabaha East, next door to "Alaska Park," were met with a backlash of local opposition.

With the second national cellular licence safely under their belts however, Esat will now fancy their chances of securing permission for the GSM base. Indeed, the company has already invested £500,000

on seeking planning permission for sites around the country.

At the moment, the Digifone consortium have five planning applications for masts lodged with Waterford County Council. These applications relate to the erection of a 30 metre transmission mast, cellular antennae, etc., at Sheskin, Carrick-on-Suir; a transmission mast at Barravakeen,

Laghtnafranke, overlooking Clonmel; a mast at Carrandubhderg, Clashmore; the aforementioned mast at Currabaha, Kilmacthomas, and a fifth mast at Ballyscanlon, Tramore.

BEST ALL-ROUND PACKAGE

The recent announcement by Minister for Communi-

cations, Michael Lowry, confirming Esat as winner of the second licence, caused shock waves throughout the industry. Many observers had felt the Motorola-led Persona consortium was the front-runner in the licence bid.

Department officials however said that while all six licence contenders had strengths, Esat Digifone had the best all-round package.

Grave Concern At Plans For Rural Post Offices

Nationwide criticism of An Post's controversial rationalisation programme quashed the proposed downgrading of postal delivery routes in the Mallow postal district earlier this year.

Now, however, a greater threat to rural Ireland's social fabric exists, this time in the form of European Commission proposals to break up An Post's monopoly.

Munster M.E.P. Gerard Collins has expressed grave concern at the implications for the postal service in rural Ireland as a result of the European Commission's plans to deregulate postal services in the European Union. In particular Mr. Collins referred to the key social function provided by post offices in rural Ireland.

CHERRY PICKED BY PRIVATE COMPANIES

In a recent press release, the leader of the Fianna Fail group in the European Parliament stated, "the intention of European Commission to deregulate postal services in order to foster greater competition

has grave implications for the postal service in rural Ireland".

The Commission argues that allowing several postal companies to compete for business will benefit the consumer. Mr. Collins however is of a contrary opinion and believes that this is far too narrow an approach.

"It is clear", he stressed, "that postal companies' primary interest will be in the main urban centres and business districts. It is these areas that will be cherry picked by private companies".

He continued that the private sector will have no interest in competing with An Post's house-to-house delivery for villages and rural areas. By retaining An Post's monopoly on all door-to-door delivery service Mr. Collins claims that customers would then be

guaranteed a universal delivery service to all homes and businesses irrespective of their location. Take away the monopoly, he warned, and you take away the guarantee

of a universal delivery. **INVALUABLE SOCIAL FUNCTION**

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Can you tell me what benefits are available under the Occupational Injury Benefit Scheme?

ANSWER

The following benefits are available under the Occupational Injury Benefit Scheme:

Injury Benefit — This is a weekly payment which can be paid for up to 26 weeks if you are unfit for work due to an accident at work or while travelling directly to or from your work or because you have contracted a disease due to the type of work you do. Practically all employees are covered for this benefit.

Disablement Benefit — This benefit can be paid if you suffer a loss of physical or mental faculty as a result of an occupational accident/disease due to the work you do. You don't have to be unfit for work to claim it. The benefit can be paid by way of a pension or a lump sum. If the extent of disablement is less than 20% a lump sum will generally be paid unless the disablement is expected to last for life when you can opt for either a lump sum or pension. You should claim within three months of the accident/disease or before Injury Benefit stops if you are unfit for work.

Unemployability Supplement — If you are getting Disablement Benefit and you are permanently incapable of work because of the accident/disease and you are not entitled to Disability Benefit you may qualify for Unemployability Supplement. This is a weekly payment which is paid at the same rate as Disability Benefit.

Constance Care Allowance — This payment may be made if you are getting 100% Disablement Benefit and you need someone to help with your personal needs.

Medical Care — This may cover items not covered by the Health Board such as doctors visits and prescriptions, certain surgical appliances, nursing care, travelling expenses (public transport), etc.

Death Benefits — This includes Widows Pension (this is paid at a higher rate (£83.90) than the ordinary pension for widows), Dependent Widowers pension or gratuity, Orphan's Allowance, Dependent Parents Pension, Funeral Grant.

An accident at work should always be reported immediately to your employer even if the accident does not appear to be serious. You can also apply to the Department of Social Welfare for a declaration that the accident was an occupational one.

We wish to join in congratulating Sister Paschal and wishing her many more years of health and happiness. — "Cnoc Dubh."

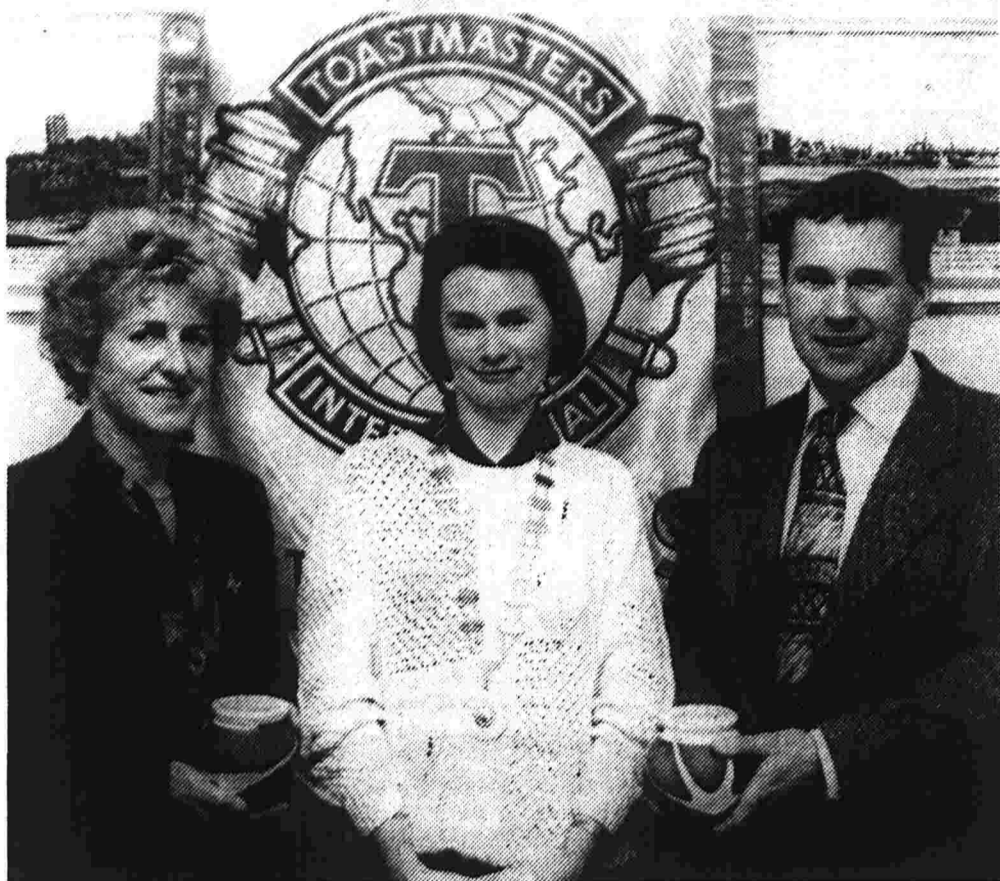

Esat Digifone To Renew Mast Campaign

Comprising Esat Telecom and the Norwegian state phone company Telenor, Esat expects to launch the new mobile phone service at the end of 1996. Coverage will reach 90% within the first year of operations and will eventually reach over 97%.

The government's decision has transformed Esat into a national operation with the potential to win a significant share of one million mobile customers in Ireland by the turn of the next century.

According to Minister Lowry, the announcement comes as exceptionally good news for consumers as tariffs and prices of mobile phones will fall.

ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY

While stepping up their campaign for the erection of a mast at Currabaha, this time round, Esat officials hope to allay local fears by promising an 'environmentally friendly' approach. The proposed mast would be for the purpose of servicing mobile phone users, both locally and those passing through the area.

As to the whole issue of the possible health hazards associated with transmission masts, the Esat directors have insisted that

there is no conclusive proof that the transmitter would pose any kind of health risk.

'NOT HAPPY'

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader," chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said he was 'not happy' with Esat's proposals for Currabaha. The site, he maintained, was unsuitable for a mast, being high up in the Comeragh mountain range, nearby to the local Alaska Park soccer pitch and overlooking Kilmac' village.

The Council, he said, had been waiting for further information on the five applications from Esat before any decisions are made on the granting of planning permission. Now that the company have secured the second GSM licence however, Cllr. Coffey said decisions will soon have to be made on these applications.

MOUNTING LOCAL OPPOSITION

Chairman of the well known Comeragh Environmental Protection Association (CEPA), Michael Murphy has again voiced his concern at the seeming relentless encroachment of masts throughout the county.

In the case of Currabaha, Mr. Murphy told the "Dungarvan Leader" that there

was mounting local opposition to the proposed Esat mast.

"Profit has to give way to local democracy," he claimed, adding that the company could very well use satellite technology rather than masts in their quest for national mobile phone coverage.

The residents of Kilmacthomas, he stressed, will have to be convinced that the mast would pose no serious health risks or compromise the scenery in any way before supporting Esat's proposal.

"My own concern," said Mr. Murphy, "is that the output from transmission masts will cause health problems down the line."

He urged Esat officials to come and talk to local people and find another way of servicing mobile phone users without the involvement of masts. Otherwise the CEPA Chairman predicted a storm of protest by Kilmacthomas residents who are more determined than ever to keep their countryside 'mast free.'

It remains to be seen what line the County Council will take in this delicate situation and what compromise, if any, Esat are willing to make in order to put local fears at rest.

Minister Confirms £1 Million Kilmac' Extension

Against the backdrop of rising fears that the proposed extension to St. Declan's Community school in Kilmacthomas may not be included in the '96 programme, Education Minister, Niamh Bhreathnach has acknowledged the urgent need for the extension. In reply to a query raised in the Dail by Fianna Fail T.D., Brendan Kenneally, a Department spokesperson said it is hoped to begin the architectural planning of a 1570 sq. metre extension early in November. The Department's planning section projects a long term enrolment of 600 pupil places and additional permanent accommodation will be provided on that basis. The cost of the extension is estimated in excess of £1 million. "I would like to assure the Deputy that the Minister for Education is fully aware of the urgent need for this extension at St. Declan's Community College and she will ensure that every effort is made to commence with the architectural planning of this extension so that the new building may proceed at the earliest opportunity," said the spokesperson.

The long tails of the woolly and spider monkey help them to balance and to grip on to branches.

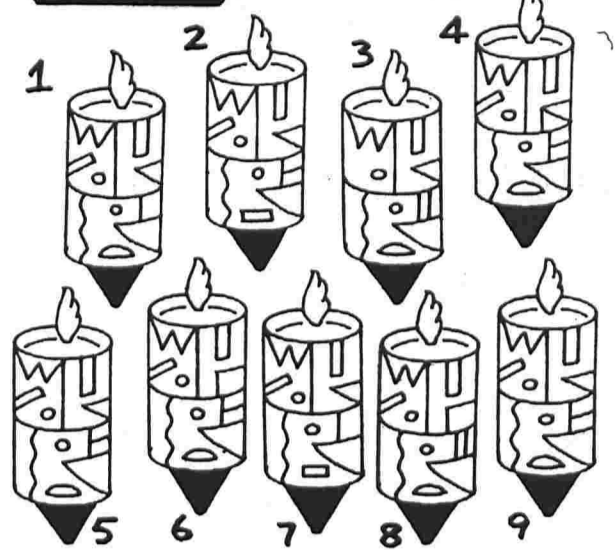

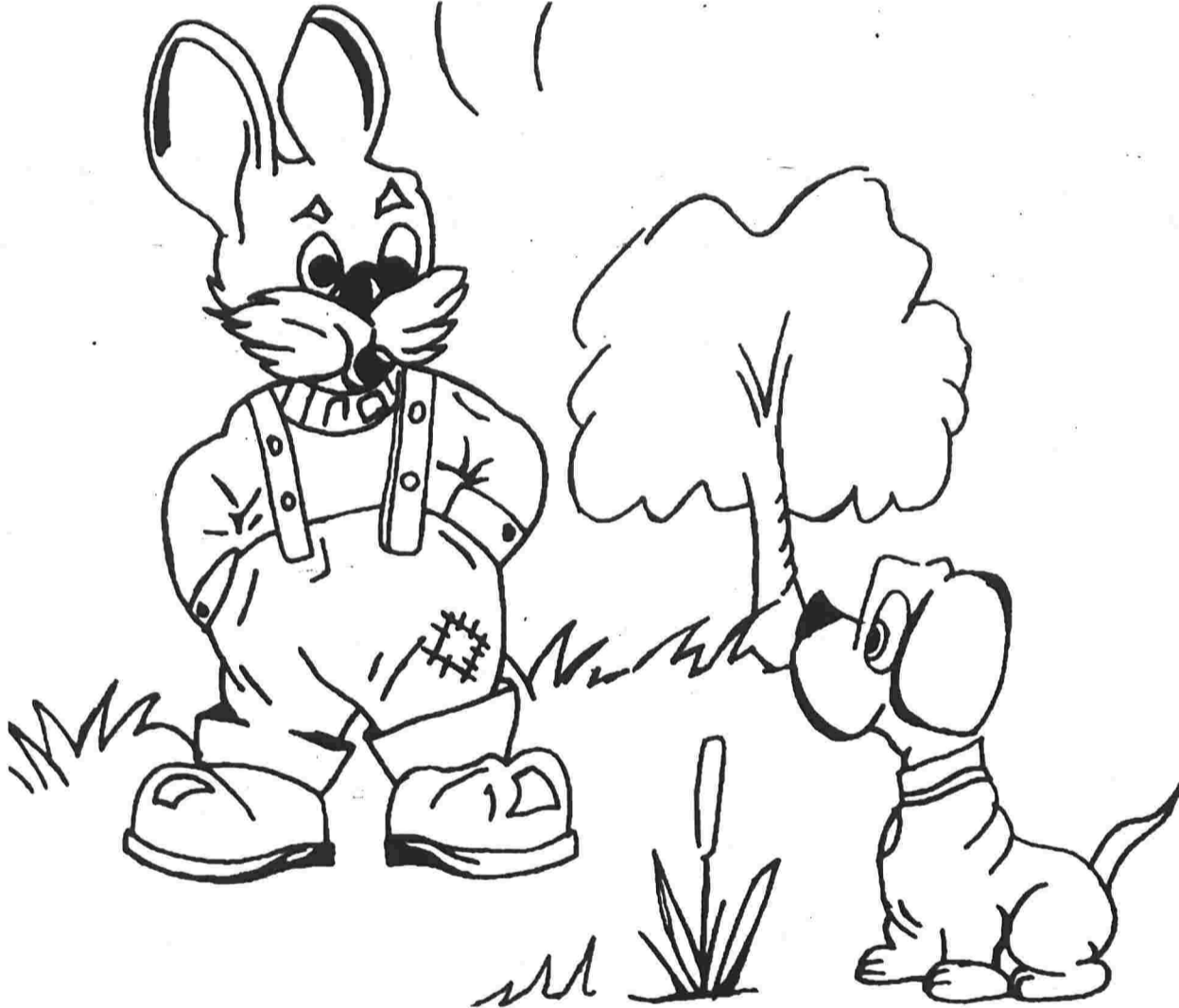

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PLAYING TRICKS WITH BALLOONS

If you have any balloons left over after you have given a party, here are a few tricks which you can perform in front of your friends.

For a cheeky stunt, says Kevin Goldstein-Jackson in *Magic With Everyday Objects*, you need a teacup, a round balloon and a table.

Place the cup on the table and tell your audience that you can pick the cup up without touching it.

Hold the open end of the balloon in your mouth, place it in the cup and blow.

When inflated the balloon will push against the sides of the cup. You lift the cup with it.

Confuse your friends with the blue-to-yellow balloon trick.

You need a round blue balloon, a yellow balloon, a pin and a piece of cloth big enough to cover one balloon.

PLUNGE

Show a blown-up blue balloon. Cover it with the cloth and lift the edge of the cloth nearest to you and plunge the pin into the balloon.

Remove the cloth — and, hey presto, the balloon is now yellow.

To do this trick you first blow up a yellow balloon inside a blue one.

Tie the balloons firmly. Then when you plunge the pin into the outer blue balloon, making sure it doesn't touch the inside yellow balloon, it bursts, revealing the yellow one.

It seems as if the blue balloon has changed colour. For the unburstable balloon trick you need an inflated balloon and a pin. Hand them to your audience for examination.

"MAGIC WORDS"

Then pat the balloon gently and say some "magic words." Now stick the pin into the balloon — it will not burst.

To do this trick you have to conceal a piece of transparent sticky tape on your fingers.

When you pat the balloon, stick the tape on to its surface. The tape will prevent the balloon from bursting.

Dungarvan CBS Enters "Energy Watch" Awards Scheme

Prizes in The Irish Energy Centre's competition are stunning. The national winner receives a Supreme Golden Sun Award, a CD Walkman and a £50 music voucher. The school which submits the winning entry will receive an energy-efficient computer and a crystal trophy.

Awards will also be made in each of four regions. Each regional winner will receive a Golden Sun Award and a CD Walkman. Their school receives a cheque for £500. A Silver Sun Award and £50 gift voucher will be presented to the second-place winner in each region, and their school will receive a cheque for £100. Everyone who enters the awards scheme will be presented with a Bronze Sun Award and there is also a special award for the best entry from an ECO club.

The Energy Watch Awards are a joint initiative of the Irish Energy Centre and ECO, Ireland's national youth environmental organisation. The awards are open to individual transition year students, groups of students (to a maximum of 6) and ECO club members. Schools which need further information should contact Liz Scott at ECO. 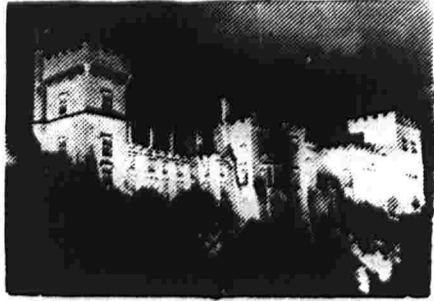

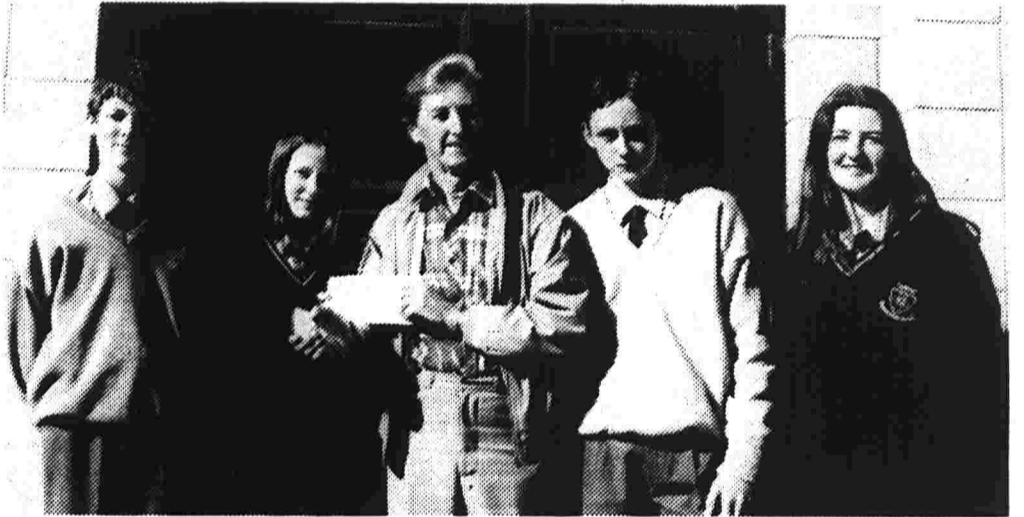

Waterford IFA Business Chief Seeks Investment Incentives For Farmers

Waterford IFA County Chairman, Gerry Murphy has recently demanded a much improved investment environment for farmers to allow them compete in European and World markets and to meet increasingly demanding environment standards for farm production.

Mr. Murphy said: "Irish farmers will face increasing competition for food markets and EU budgetary resources towards the end of the decade as the next round in World Trade negotiations are opened in 1999. This is just three short years from the time the 1966 budget provisions are implemented.

"Farmers are already reinvesting almost a quarter of total farm income on the farm. The impact of not maintaining and increasing this level of investment will be that Irish agriculture will lose competitiveness in the international market place and also exacting environmental standards will not be met."

Mr. Murphy called for a substantial improvement in the investment environment facing Irish farmers. He said: "Retained earnings play a crucial role in on-farm investment. However the income tax code is hostile to reinvestment of retained earnings in the farm

business as funds for reinvestment first taxed at an income tax rate of 48%."

Mr. Murphy outlined the Association's policy in seeking an improved investment environment through the implementation of tax credits for investment of retained earnings and business assets and well focused relief for the purchase of production quotas. He said: "IFA is proposing a new approach to tax relief for on-farm investment which will give farmers the option of either claiming normal capital allowances at 15% per annum or claiming a tax credit on retained profits reinvested in the farm which would result in an effective tax rate of 10% on those reinvested farm profits."

Mr. Murphy also stressed the need for competitively costed bank finance to help meet investment demands. He said: "IFA has been working to increase the sources of low cost finance for farmers through a range of joint initiatives with the banks. Principally the IFA AIB Farmer Credit line is providing low cost working capital to farmers to help reduce the cost of financing livestock purchases, feed, seed and fertiliser purchases."

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

Further to enquiries to the County Executive, the County Chairman Mr. John Skehan, outlines below the treatment of pension and land rental income for P.R.S.I.

The pension element is regarded as "vocational pension" and the income from the rent of the land is regarded as unearned income.

Both are not subject to PRSI. However, both are subject to income tax and to the Health Levy at 1.25% and Employment Levy at 1%.

Income from deposit interest and from share divi-

dends are also regarded as unearned income and again are treated as above.

However, if the retired farmer earns any income, however small, from another form of employment, then all unearned income is brought back into being subject to the full rates of PRSI.

A retired farmer under the age of 66 years can make voluntary contributions to the PRSI system to qualify for the contributory old age pension, provided he had made at least three years contributions while he was farming.

The rate of contribution for the eligible retired farmer would be £250 per annum.

John Quigley, Area Office with ICMSA in the South East region, outlines the remainder of resolutions passed at the National Annual General Meeting:

Farm Services

1 — ICMSA should pursue a policy on REPS to ensure that the conditions are not so restrictive as to discourage uptake and to ensure that proper compensation is paid where environmental restrictions apply, e.g. degraded areas, natural heritage areas, etc.

2 — ICMSA should continue to negotiate with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry to ensure that all farmers who wish to undertake pollution control

work are provided with the required grant aid and where grant payments are delayed that farmers receive interest payments at the bank lending rate.

Rural Development

1 — ICMSA should vigorously pursue the implementation of its policy on "Land Use and Farm Viability". This covers issues such as planning for forestry, Natural Heritage Areas, taxation and land restructuring, access to milk, suckler cow and ewe quotas, installation aid, long-term leasing of land, division of commonage and the Early Retirement Scheme.

Next week ICMSA notes will cover the Dairy Hygiene Grant — items eligible for grant aid and rates of grant as a percentage of approved cost and quota size.

ICSA Welcome Changes In Ewe Quota

The announcement by Ivan Yates, T.D., Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, of changes in the 1996 Ewe Premium Reserve Quota has been welcomed by ICSA — the Irish Cattle Traders and Stockowners Association.

Jimmy Cosgrave, National Chairman ICSA, said that following recent consultations between Department of Agriculture officials and the ICSA Sheep Committee, he was particularly pleased at the lowering of the qualifying farm income from 50% to 30% of total income which will enable farmers on low incomes to have greater access to quota and to help bring them towards a viable sheep enterprise.

He also said that the new categories will provide opportunities for younger farmers and new entrants to establish themselves in sheep production, as Irish sheep farming needs young, energetic and committed people


IFA Welcomes Extra Ewe Premium Allocation To Small Flock Owners

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray has welcomed the recent announcement by the Minister for Agriculture on the allocation of reserve Ewe Premium rights to particular categories which, he said, were in line with those proposals by the Ewe Premium Review Group of which IFA is a member.

Mr. Gray said that in view of the fact that there were

only an estimated 20,000 rights to be distributed from the reserve, IFA had insisted that these Premium Rights be targeted towards small flock owners and new entrants.



Professionalism

When rugby football, to whom amateurism was sacrosanct, went professional in recent months there was a collective gasp not alone from those within the game but from all who cherished the true amateur ethic with all its unselfishness, commitment and pursuit of excellence for excellence sake. There was fear, too, that playing would cease to be, as it is in all amateur sports, a source of personal uninhibited enjoyment and shared team satisfaction and become a business, a mercenary operation channelled into the greedy hands of a body with no feel for the game or for its ethos. Anxiety was expressed, too, that those thousands who have over many years spent much of themselves in organisation, preparation, support, administration and promotion would now become marginalised and consequently lost to the game.

We in the G.A.A. have some reason to be apprehensive and smugness should not blind us to reality. Professionalism in hurling and football hasn't yet raised its challenging head but I fear that in time, maybe sooner than we think, some of the amateur values that we hold dearest will be questioned. In today's materialistic world a price will be placed on every area of involvement in our association from the Uachtarán's position down to the chap who mows and lines the field or the member who takes the Under 12's for training. This is a daunting scenario which we may be loath to contemplate in so far as we the older members of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael find it alien to our lives' experience and an affront to our many years of unpaid commitment to an association which was the dominant force of our existence. Nevertheless only those who bury their heads in the sand will fail to identify and recognise the trends.

Professionalism in the late twentieth century is a growing thriving reality. Even already an element of this professionalism is present in the G.A.A. The payments authorised for coaching are modest and find general acceptance as necessary and reasonable. Travelling expenses and a coaching find cause no surprise embarrassment any more because all genuine effective coaches perform to a very high standard and operate at a professional level. There is such a dearth of good coaches, however, that many clubs are obliged to engage the services of men whose quali-

fications and achievements fall far short of their unjustified and inflated fees. Those "coaches" bring coaching into disrepute.

In order to compete nowadays many counties seek to employ a coach from outside their county. High profile personalities, whose playing or coaching expertise (or both) won national acclaim, were courted by those counties who sought a return to the heady days celebrated in their county's history. The much acclaimed Mick O'Dwyer went to Kildare having succumbed to the honeyed blandishments of Michael Osborne and his associates. John O'Keefe and Ger Power, two of Kerry's brightest and best, successively took over Limerick and Jack O'Shea, brilliant Kingdom All Star commuted between Leixlip and Castlebar in the interests of Mayo football. In our own county Joe McGrath and Georgie Leahy took turns with coaching our hurlers. Each one of those highly-regarded men failed to achieve his objective, some more dismally than others. Why? On some other occasion, perhaps this question can be tackled. Right now I want to allude to that element of professionalism which was shared by all of them - financial reward. Georgie Leahy was, perhaps, the exception. His expenses were only in accordance with our county's guidelines and I would venture to say that his brief connection with us left him at a net loss.

With the others mentioned the cost - sorry, the word most favoured for it is "expenses" - amounted to large sums of money. How much in each case I haven't a clue. When I broached this subject once to Mick Osborne he smiled and gently reminded me that the matter was between the Supporters Group and Mick O'Dwyer. So you can draw from that any conclusion you wish. One thing is certain: they were well paid. And why not? After all it was their reputations which were on the line and the travelling involved was astronomical. What I find disturbing is that side by side with a willingness by counties to invest heavily in the services of an outside coach, there still persists penny-pinching attitudes of many County Boards where players legitimate expenses are concerned. The blank cheque permitted in the remuneration of some county coaches, and even club

coaches is hard to justify even in this age of professionalism. That simply is not fair to the players. No matter how gifted or charismatic the coach, it is the players who win matches. That significant fact should never be overlooked.

Many of the coaches I named were strong characters, experienced, good thinkers of the game, great motivators. Yet they couldn't achieve the results which they and their county craved - and paid for. Is it that they couldn't get through to the players and elicit an intellectual as well as a physical response from them? Were they unable to establish the essential rapport between player and management? Were they lacking that psychological dimension which is an essential for coaching at this level? Did they fail to make a professional preparation for a task which demands a professional approach.

Some years ago I spent a long week-end at Coleraine University doing a bit of work. I bumped into an old friend of mine Jimmy Nelson carrying some books under his arm. In answer to the obvious question Jimmy told me that he was engaged in a course on sport psychology preparatory to taking over the Antrim hurlers. I permitted myself a little smile knowing how far removed from shrink-heads and spin-doctors Jimmy was. The more I reflected on it the greater my admiration for a man so far-seeing. A couple of years later he became coach of the Antrim senior hurling team. Whatever the extent of success - and I happen to think he did very well, fully extending Kilkenny, defeating Offaly and getting to a senior hurling All Ireland among other achievements - it is to his credit that he sought to explore every means of preparing himself for his onerous duties. His was a truly professional approach to the task.

Inter county coaches should possess the qualities which those opaque politicians keep on nattering about - openness, transparency and accountability. Also the humility to recognise their limitations and the interdependence of players and coach on one another. They dare not neglect the man-management aspect of their responsibilities. If such preparation is made then for that and for all the hard work they do to a professional standard they should be treated with gratitude and remunerated accordingly.

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Carry On Digging For Victory

DIG for victory! That old wartime slogan can still do good service for gardeners — It is vital to dig and recondition soil after the growing season.

Start now because the weather is not yet cold enough to put you off the job and it also means that winter frosts, biting winds and pounding rainfall will further break up the clods.

By the time the beds are ready for planting, the weather should have left a nice crumbly, easily raked surface.

Nevertheless, you still have a backbreaking job to do now and many Irish gardeners are discovering that longer handles make lighter work of digging and protect gardeners backs.



Long-handled spades are now more common in garden shops and DIY stores and really are a small price to pay for the labour and agony saved.

Hopefully, spent garden material from the summer and autumn has been put to good use on the compost heap where it can rot into excellent organic food, but that material may not yet be ready.

If you have nothing else which is well decomposed, you need to acquire or buy alternatives such as leaf mould, farmyard manure or spent compost from a mushroom farm.

Get the best you can or you devalue the hard work you do with your digging: the main point is to aerate and improve drainage by turning the soil, but you must also feed and condition it with organic material. As this rots further, it also helps drainage and condition.

PLANK OR BOARD

For flower beds you don't really need to turn the soil more than the depth of one spade, particularly if you avoid putting weight onto the earth and damaging its drainage — stand on a stout plank or board as you work.

Use the same trick on the vegetable patch, but you will still need to double-dig: vegetables need to root deeply to ensure good crops so the beds must occasionally be dug to the depth of two spades and compost/manure to ensure good drainage deep down.

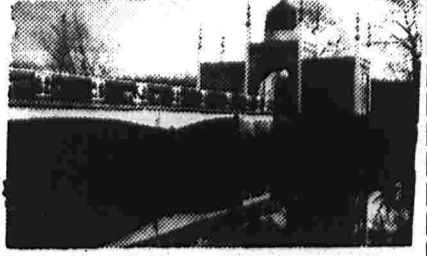
This is particularly important with clay soils, so be prepared for hard work if it is the first time the area has been dug.

Console yourself in the knowledge that it should be easier next time — you can help ensure that by adding a gypsum-based clay soil conditioner.

On the other hand, excessively sandy soil can be helped by spreading clay onto dug soil so that winter can break it down ready for forking in before the next planting.

OUR LOCALITY

(a) Last week we asked our readers where 'An Boithrín Caoch (The Blind Road) was situated. This street is now named 'King Street' - the street where 'Michael Carroll's Motors' is located. King Street Upper and King Street Lower was one street until the building of the railway in 1865 transected it. The turn from King Street into Sexton Street must have been constructed at the time the railway was built.

(b) Cúl a' tSailín - "The back of the (sea) Pond". This is now known as 'Home Rule Street'. It is the

street opposite Strandside South coming from Minnies direction.

(c) Bóthar a' Choileara - "Quarry Lane". It was later called 'Humble Street' and it was a hollow green field opposite where Shears Street is now located. Some of the houses in T. J. Murphy Place are now built on this site. Shears Street was once known as 'Humble Street' after the local landlords the Humble-Nugents whose burial plot is in 'The Clogas' we mentioned last week.

(d) Slate Lane was the home of many of the old Abbeyside families. It was

built opposite the quarry mentioned in (C) above. Again some of the houses in Murphy Place are built on this site. Shears Street is the street to Abbeyside School from the Shell Cottage.

Sensitive Skin

Sensitive skin appears very transparent and blotchy. It may have broken capillaries which are small veins and blood vessels that can be seen beneath the skin. This can be caused when the blood vessels are not elastic enough to handle the flow of blood which flows through them; they consequently stretch and break. Broken capillaries are usually found on the cheek area. If you have sensitive skin you may be prone to allergic reaction from cosmetics and some foods. Therefore it is very important when choosing cosmetics



to make sure they are free from perfumes and alcohol. Dry skin may sometimes be sensitive but does not necessarily react to cosmetics as sensitive skin does. Sensitive skin will redden very easily, even after gentle cleansing. It is important to visit a beauty salon and have a specific treatment for sensitive skin. Broken capillaries can be treated, but not always completely cleared. However, correct treatment of the skin

will help to prevent further damage. Sensitive skin needs to be protected from many factors such as the weather, central heating and open fires. A good moisturiser is needed to help protect the skin. Spicy hot foods should also be avoided if you have sensitive skin. A sensitive skin should always be treated with great care.

1. Avoid cosmetics which contain perfumes and alcohol.
2. Ensure that the skin is adequately protected from extremes of heat and cold.
3. Avoid eating hot spicy foods.

FAMILY HEALTH

Q: As my father-in-law recently had a heart attack, my husband has started thinking about his own health. He had a

check-up, which was fine, but the doctor said he should improve his diet. The advice was fairly straight-forward, but the doctor mentioned magnesium. Where do you find that?

A: The heart muscle requires magnesium. Research suggests that men who don't eat many magnesium-containing foods have a higher risk of heart disease. Good sources are cereals and foods made with flour (especially wholegrain), meat, fish, nuts, beans, green leafy vegetables and mushrooms.

Q: My 12-year-old daughter idolises an older girl at school. She talks about her all the time with her friends and doesn't show any interest in boys. I'm worried about her behaviour, but one of my friends has told me this is normal for a girl her age. Is this true?

A: Your friend is right. Your daughter's crush is quite usual and is particularly common when children go to a single-sex school. Teenagers often have a hero or heroine whom they look up to. This can often be someone of the same sex. However, this doesn't mean that your daughter is sexually attracted to this girl - and even if she is, these crushes generally fade with time. It seems that, like most adolescents, she's not yet confident of her place in the world and is looking for people she can admire or copy. As for her interest in boys, no doubt this will come soon enough, so don't worry about it.

Q: My sister's six-year-old son has just been diagnosed as having a very serious illness. They've decided not to tell him. Do you think this is right?

A: No, although it is understandable. It is probably too painful at the moment for the family to think about the illness and its possible outcome. However, he must have symptoms which alarm and puzzle him. Children are very sensitive to their parents state of mind and he must know something very distressing is afoot. When questions arise, it's always preferable to give children simple explanations which

are compatible with their level of understanding. It might be helpful for the parents to talk to the doctor. He can help them find a simple way of telling their son what is wrong

and possibly what will happen him if, for example, he has to go to hospital. They could ask the doctor to visit and answer any questions their son might have.

- 3 tbsp golden syrup
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 2 eggs, size 3
- 1 tbsp milk
- 2oz/50g ground almonds
- 5oz/150g plain flour
- 1oz/25g cocoa powder
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- pinch of salt
- 4oz/100g icing sugar plus 2 tsp for dusting

Barbecued Pork

- 1 1/2 lb/800g lean pork shoulder
- Marinade**
- 3 fl oz/85ml whiskey
- 5 fl oz/65ml soy sauce
- 4 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

METHOD: The pork should be boned out and wrapped in netting or tied in shape, with visible fat and skin removed, before weighing. Put into a saucepan, cover with cold water and bring to the boil. Simmer generously for about 50 minutes, skimming off any scum as it rises. Lift the pork into a bowl just large enough to

hold. Remove the netting if necessary. Pierce it all over with a thin skewer. Combine the ingredients for the marinade and pour over the pork. Turn it in the bowl to make sure it is coated in the marinade. Cool, cover and leave overnight, turning it occasionally, in the fridge. Take out in good time to allow it to come to room temperature, drain well. Put the marinade in a saucepan and bring to simmering point on the barbecue. Cook the pork over the barbecue for 20 to 30 minutes, basting it frequently with the hot marinade and turning it over the coals until evenly browned all over. Serve cut in slices, with remaining marinade.

Household Hints

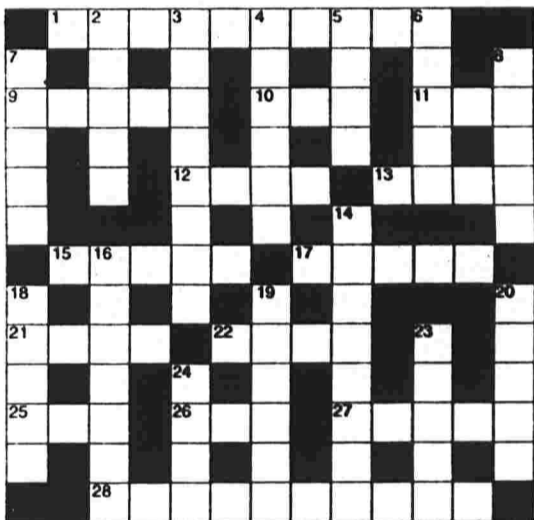
1. Make pork crackling really crisp by rubbing the skin with salt and then oil before placing the joint in the hot oven.
2. Treat deep scratches in wooden furniture by applying a solution of equal parts linseed oil and turpentine substitute, using a child's paint brush.
3. Remove an orange squash stain from a carpet by desolving a dessertspoon of borax in half a pint of warm water. Sponge the stained area, avoiding over-wetting the carpet. Finish with a carpet shampoo.
4. Ease a zip fastener that does not run smoothly by running a pencil lead over the teeth of the closed zip. Repeat a few times and the graphite will act as a lubricant.
5. Wooden and porous stoneware containers are better than metal or glass as salt-cellars as they absorb any dampness. Always store salt in a dry place.

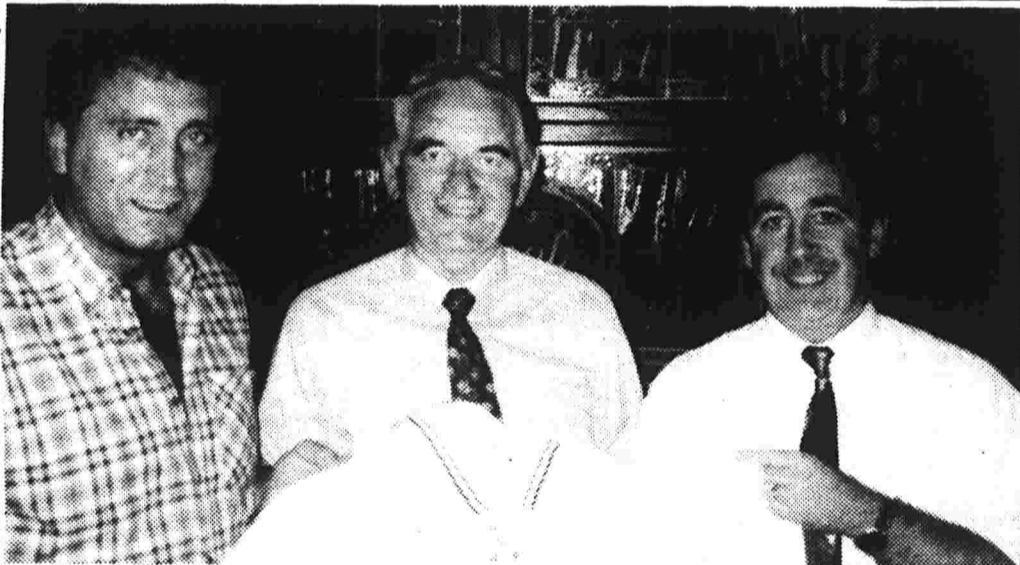
The game was played in glorious Autumn sunshine, and the early exchanges set the pattern for a hard physical encounter where no quarter was asked for, or given, by either side.

The Nenagh Co-op Tournament is the unofficial All-Ireland Under-16 inter-county hurling championship and is played each year in September/October. It plays an important role in identifying and preparing future minor players. Waterford have done well in this tournament in recent years, reaching the semi-final twice. These fine achievements received scant media attention within the county. However, things have reached a new low this year, with media coverage reduced to zero — not even a mention in the weekly Bord na Óg notes in the local newspapers.

I found out that Waterford had played Tipperary in this year's competition from an acquaintance who had seen the result in a Wexford paper. I discovered that Waterford had played Kilkenny from a report broadcast on Kilkenny Radio on their Sunday evening sports programme. Incidentally, that report was much more extensive and detailed than the report on the Waterford senior hurling final broadcast in the corresponding programme on WLR the same day.

Waterford supporters who are interested in these games deserve to be given some information about them — both in advance and afterwards. More importantly, getting selected to play for Waterford should be a big occasion for our young players. It must have an effect when these games are totally ignored within Waterford while getting top coverage in other counties. Is it any wonder that our players buckle under the pressure of big occasions later on when they get so little publicity in their formative years?

WATERFORD MEET CORK IN HURLING LEAGUE AT FRAHER FIELD IN ROUND 3

Ballygunner v. Na Piarsaigh In Munster Club Hurling Replay And Junior Hurling County Final Involving Lismore and Ferrybank At Walsh Park On Saturday

The draw between our respective county champions in Cork on Saturday, produced yet another headache for the county hurling selectors who will likely have to line out without the Ballygunner players for their match against cork in the league on Sunday.

Against All Ireland champions, Clare two weeks ago the selectors were forced to play a number of players who had played club or inter-firms championship on the previous day and because of this our effort was not as good as it might have been. In view of this, it is doubtful if the line-out which is not being decided upon until midweek, will include Fergal Hartley, Stephen Frampton, Paul Flynn or Billy O'Sullivan who certainly cannot be the best for ware after a harrowing game on Saturday.

This situation will give rise to a lot of speculation about what other players will be given the call up for the visit of the Rebels who held us to an exciting draw in the league when they last visited Dungarvan two years ago.

Since beginning these notes I have been told that the Ballygunner players have informed the selectors that they will be available, if required and if nothing else, this shows spirit and co-operation. Cork may have one or two players in the same boat. They too, are without a point, but they have a match in hand.

When the Waterford team is named, I doubt if it will show much change from the side which lost to Clare after playing very well for 55 minutes. I doubt also if the selectors (who have now been joined by Michael Gaffney of Ballygunner) are going to indulge in a policy of chopping and changing, just for the sake of change. I believe that the following line-out will be very near the mark. Ray Barry will be in goal and will be fronted by Sean Cullinane, Damien Byrne and Eamonn Cullinane. Tony Browne, Fergal Hartley and Stephen Frampton will likely man the three half back line positions. Johnnie Brenner and Tom Fives began at midfield against Clare, but later Gary Gater was introduced and the Mount Sion star may again be called up for duty.

In attack Billy O'Sullivan, Peter Queally, Sean Daly, Michael Hickey, Michael O'Sullivan, Paul Flynn are the likely six players, but Bart Walsh, who came on

against Clare could be among the starters in this one.

Our record against Cork in Dungarvan is reasonably good and here our patrons will be hoping for a victory or at least a share of the points.

Desperately in need of the points, Cork will travel with a strong outfit and go all out to win this one. Things have not been going well for the county hurlers there since they lost to Clare in the first round of the Munster championships by a single point and they feel they badly need a boost. They will feel that this is their chance.

UNDER-21 FOOTBALL

This is now the only remaining championship to be completed in the western division and with the B championship it may be a race against time to get clear before the end of November in order to avoid having a championship held over. A similar situation obtains in the east. However with full co-operation from all clubs the deadline can be met.

Results over the week-end saw Kilgobinet score 5-9 to 0-5 victory over Clashmore and in the east, Rathgormack had a narrow point win 2-7 to 1-9 over St. Mary's and Tramore 3-10 defeating Gaultier 2-6 in their ties on Saturday.

JUNIOR HURLING FINAL

LISMORE V. FERRYBANK

It is as unusual as it is unexpected, that these two sides would clash in the county final this year. Ferrybank, according to observers in the eastern side of the county reckon that Ferrybank should be playing intermediate as they are way above all the other junior teams in the division and this opinion is certainly borne out by their scoring record this year. I haven't seen them play, but having researched their progress and closely examined their scoring feats, I find it easy to understand why they are so highly rated. I cannot ever remember a team averaging a score like 5-11 per match over a seven match campaign. To any opposition their record looks frighten-

ing:-

Ferrybank 6-12 Ballyduff 1-2; Ferrybank 4-10 Butlerstown 3-2; Ferrybank 5-10 Fenor 2-1; Ferrybank 4-10 Tramore 2-3; Ferrybank 4-12 Bonmahon 0-4; Ferrybank 5-12 Passage 2-7; Ferrybank 7-10 Ballyduff 2-7 (eastern final).

With those kind of credentials, our representatives certainly face a daunting task.

'Our record shows that we have climbed mountains before' was the comment of a prominent Lismore man to me when I asked him about their prospects on Saturday. He could be right. They have a very imposing record at junior level. They have won a total of 5 junior hurling county championships, 1924, 1936, 1938, 1940 and 1967. They have won western titles in all those years as well (except 1924 as there were none then) and also in 1957 and this year when they defeated Kilgobinet. Their first county title was won on October 26th 1924 on a score of 9 goals to 2 goals against O'Rourkes at Dungarvan. It was unique in that it produced 11 goals and no points (it must have been like a hockey match). The panel on that historic day was — J. O'Gorman, M. O'Brien, J. O'Brien, J. Doherty, J. O'Brien, M. Ormond, J. Murphy, B. Neville, B. Hogan, J. Heaphy, J. Duggan, J. O'Brien, A. Foley, H. Foley, D. Ormond and J. Hogan. Most of those players went on to win the senior hurling county championship in the following year 1925.

In 1926, Lismore fielded both junior and senior hurling as well as a junior football team. The junior hurlers won the county title, defeating Portlaw in the final. In 1936 Lismore had the unique experience of being involved in another county junior hurling final where no points were scored.

The final was against Clonea and it ended in very controversial circumstances. Clonea were leading by 4 goals to 2 goals for Lismore when John Ryan scored a goal for Lismore. The um-

pire disallowed the goal - then after consultation with the referee the green flag was raised. Clonea refused to continue the game and walked off the field. The final was later awarded to Lismore. Many of the great Lismore players of that era were on that team — Mick Regan, C. Whelan, P. McGrath, M. Coleman and M. Coleman, M. Regan, H. Collins, T. O'Donoghue, Camphire (where the great Bob McGrath came from), T. O'Donoghue, Lismore, P. Moore, M. Landers, J. O'Neill, J. Ryan, J. Ormond, R. O'Connor.

In 1938 Lismore beat St. Stephens on a score of 6-1 to 3-1 (so they were able to score points in county finals). They won the 1940 final when defeating Erin's Own by 5-3 to 2-1. The western champions lost the 1957 county final to the up and coming Ballygunner team on a scoreline of 7-8 to 3-3. The referee on that day was the late Donal (Duck) O'Faolain, R.I.P. In the 1967 county final Lismore reversed the decision against Ballygunner and won by 4-9 to 2-3. That was one of the clubs' best junior sides and I'm sure that many people who recall the names, D. Buckley, D. McGrath, P. Buckley, R. O'Donnell, B. Daly, T. Lineen, G. Daly, M. McGrath, M. Canning, R.I.P., R. Ormond, L. Canning, J. Daly, J. Flynn, J. Geoghegan, J. Crowley, G. Howard will agree with this view. Most of that panel went on to win the intermediate county title two years later, 1969 and then senior on to the present day.

D. Bransfield who played at centre half forward on the 1957 team is the present treasurer of the club.

The team which brought the club their sixth western title this year and who will very likely represent them in the county final on Sunday, was Brendan Landers, Pat Barry, J. J. Duggan, Anthony Whelan, John Whelan, Emmet Quann, Pat Brennan, John Roche and P. J. Coughlan, Robbie O'Sullivan and Sean Prendergast, Ollie O'Dowd, Eamonn

Power, John Begley, Keith Hornibrook.

Their management is Edward Fenton, Johnnie Flynn, trainer and Patsy Quinn. Johnnie Flynn's father John played on the 1967 team. Johnnie has also done great work in training and coaching the local camogie team. The game which will be preceded by the replay of the Munster club match involving Ballygunner and Na Piarsaigh, should be an exciting one, Ferrybank will start hot favourites, but as the man said, Lismore have climbed mountains before. The best of luck to them.

BALLYGUNNER V. NA PIARSAIGH

The clash of the Waterford and Cork county champions on home ground will come as a bonus for supporters in the city area and the replay is certain to attract a very big crowd to Walsh Park.

They will need to play extra time if the sides are again deadlocked at the end of the sixty minutes and this would push the junior final back for half an hour.

The 'Gunners will have a good chance here with a full squad available except Ciaran Cantwell who was sent off early in the second half on Saturday last. Replays are always difficult to fathom out, but here the advantages would seem to be going Ballygunner's way.

It would be wonderful to see them advance in this championship, because of their embarrassing beating when they played in it, three years ago.

U-21 HURLING COUNTY FINAL

BALLYDUFF V. MOUNT SION

This game has been switched from Walsh Park and will be played at Portlaw. It was programmed as part of a double header with the junior hurling final, but the replay fixture by the Munster Council changed this. Mount Sion, the holders will be warm favourites to beat first-timers, Ballyduff who are the western standard bearers, but I would not bet too much on the outcome of any match

where Ballyduff are concerned as by record and repute they are great battlers and never surrender until the final whistle is blown.

Mount Sion have a splendid record in this grade and will have quite a number of the players who assisted them last year when defeating Lismore in a tremendous county final. WESTERN BOARD MEETING

Paddy Walsh, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Divisional Board and at which there was a fair attendance.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Ballymacarbery branch of the I.C.A. and the East Waterford branch which is based in Portlaw, both wrote to the Board expressing their disappointment that the Divisional Boards played a programme of matches on the Sunday of the ladies football All Ireland. Both branches pointed out that ladies football should be given the same treatment as hurling and football and games should not be scheduled for a date on which the ladies were playing in a final. They pointed out that the senior board gave a free day on the occasion in order to allow patrons to travel.

Most delegates agreed with the principal involved, but it was pointed out that because there was a backlog of fixtures the Board were left with little option but to proceed. It was agreed to take note of the complaints and to do everything possible to avoid a recurrence.

ABANDONED GAME REFIXED

When the referee's report of the abandoned under-21 football game involving Ballyduff and Brickey Rangers was read, the Chairman told the meeting that the Officer Board had considered the report and were recommending that both clubs be fined £50 and warned about their future conduct, with the game to be refixed for Cappoquin on next weekend. Both clubs apologised to the Board.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE SUBMISSION

A letter from the disciplinary committee submitted that the referee's report of the Kilrossanty v. Geraldines junior hurling championship, was a matter for the Board, rather than for the disciplinary committee. The letter further stated that in their opinion, such matters might now be dealt with by the County Board G.A.C. The report had been sent to that committee for investigation.

The letter gave rise to a long discussion and while most of the members felt

that it was not a matter for the Senior Board, several felt that the matter should be dealt with by the full Divisional Board. The Chairman pointed out that it was the decision of a full meeting of the Board that the affair be dealt with by the disciplinary committee. He was satisfied that it had nothing to do with the adult board and he was sending it back to the disciplinary committee with a request that they deal with the report as a matter of urgency.

Sean Lannon and Jimmy Maher, Kilrossanty, said that a player from their club was reported for striking and that that was totally untrue as the player had not done so and was sent off by the referee. They asked why the referee would report a player for striking and not send him off.

Eddie O'Grady, Geraldines, said that his club were anxious that the matter be dealt with as quickly as possible.

A number of players who were reported for rough play, were suspended for the minimum period of two weeks.

MINOR FOOTBALL COMPLAINT

Michael Lyons, Dungarvan, complained about the fixing of this club's minor football championship match for a Tuesday evening which was the night after students had returned to school. He said this was a refixture and wondered why it could not be played on the original date. The Secretary, Anthony Walsh, responded by pointing out that Ballyduff had a number of injuries because they had obliged the Board in playing five or six championship games within 12 days, also, he said that Ballyduff had helped out the Board by coming twice to Dungarvan for their games.

FRAHER FIELD

Nioclás Mac Craith said that clubs should be made aware of the condition of the surface of the pitch at Fraher Field and after such a long dry summer, the grass was not getting a chance to grow because of the tremendous amount of activity. He also referred to the damage done to the shelters provided for the substitutes on the sideline and he said the committee

were aware that the roof of one of the shelters was damaged from being struck with hurleys. He also reported on the new bucket-seating. He said that a tender for the replacement of the netting behind the goals had been accepted, but having the job done was a matter of money. There had been complaints about the condition of the netting.

Greg Fives asked clubs to invite members of the public and firms in their areas to invest in the Deise 500 Club in order to help in saving the large amount of bank interest being paid annually. He reported that the Deise monthly draw was keeping up very well, but that additional revenue was needed also.

This is contrary to general rule and I'm sure that referees are aware of this. There are other areas in which referees could be doing a lot better but I will leave the subject for the time being...

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Grave Concern At Plans For Rural Post Offices

in rural Ireland, Mr. Collins said that post offices and sub-post offices are a point of contact between government and citizens and provide a wide range of services such as pension and social welfare payments, lottery tickets and savings facilities.

"This network forms an integral part of the fabric of rural Ireland and must be respected by the European Commission in any deliberation on the future of the postal services. In addition there is a clear onus on the Irish Government, and the Minister for Transport, Energy and Communications, Michael Lowry in particular, to defend rural post offices and their key role in communities across Ireland", he added.

STRONG CAMPAIGN BY CORPO

Formed in response to An Post's plans to downgrade 17 sub post offices in the Mallow postal district, CORPO (Conserve Our Rural Post Offices) has so far been successful in its campaign and has been instrumental in the reopening of several rural post offices throughout the country.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Neily Lehané, PRO of CORPO also expressed grave concern over the Commission's proposals to privatise postal services.

Serving as a social centre for many rural communities, Mr. Lehané stressed that the rural postal service is a vital national service for Ireland. While generally opposed to the concept of monopolies, the Mallow native however said An Post was an exception to the rule and was vital in keeping rural Ireland intact.

Should the service be privatised, Mr. Lehané predicted serious price differentials between rural and urban areas and a larger emphasis being placed by companies on densely populated towns and cities to the neglect of the smaller rural areas. Added to this the proposed closure of a number of rural Garda stations, spiraling rural crime figures and immigration to urban centres and Mr. Lehané warned of the eventual depopulation of rural Ireland, transformed into a national park.

CORPO has already campaigned strongly against the Brussels proposals, having written to EU Commissioner Pádraig Flynn, An Taoiseach John Bruton and Minister Lowry. "We want a guarantee that the postal service will remain the

same", declared Mr. Leahy. "If necessary, the government should step in and subsidise the service", he further stated. A great believer in democracy, the PRO added that the people of Ireland should have their voice represented in Europe.

LOCAL CONCERN

Having lobbied strongly against the closure of rural post offices since the rationalisation plans were first put forward, Mallow Councillor Willie McDonnell said services in rural areas have been deteriorating over the last 30 years.

A member of Waterford County Council, Cllr. McDonnell declared that services such as railway lines, schools, libraries, garda stations and now post offices were on the decline in rural areas while improving in the urban areas.

"Do the authorities realise that agriculture is our greatest industry and people living in rural areas are the backbone of the Irish people?", he further declared.

Cllr. McDonnell continued that no doubt many more of our post offices would be closed were it not for the backlash against a decision taken to streamline the service. "Our post offices are part of rural living and are vitally important to the people for the service that they provide", he added.

Proposed Health Board Appeals System

Minister for Health, Michael Noonan is currently completing a consideration of an appropriate appeals system for members of the public who are dissatisfied with their treatment by the health boards and the system in general. Replying to a question raised in the Dáil by Deputy Austin Deasy, Minister Noonan said he envisaged that the proposed system will be operated by a separate and independent agency. The system, he said, will cater for appeals against health board decisions in relation to the awarding of medical cards and nursing home subvention payments.

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
