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### **ANSWER**

A person going on a career break would remain entitled to certain social welfare benefits for up to 1 or 2 years depending on how late in the tax year they leave work. If you don't start your career break until after you have your 39 weeks of PRSI in this tax year you will be in benefit until the end of 1997.

You would not be entitled to claim Unemployment Benefit as you would not be regarded as being unemployed because your job is still there. If you become ill you could claim sickness benefit and should submit medical certificates to the Department of Social Welfare. You would be entitled to Dental/Optical Benefits for as long as you satisfy the PRSI requirements; this could be up to 1 or 2 years (a person aged 25 years or over needs 260 PRSI contribu-

If you have a gap of two complete tax years in your insurance record, i.e. you have no paid or credited contributions recorded for two consecutive tax years, then you will have to work again for 26 weeks before you will qualify for credited contributions. When you resume employment it could be two years before you will come back into benefit.

Years spent working in the home (from 6 April 1994) caring for a child up to 12 years or for an incapacitated person will be disregarded in calculating the average for pension purposes.

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### Junior Encyclopaedia

### THE CHEETAH

The cheetah is to be found in the grasslands and semi-desert regions of Africa, the Middle East and Southern Asia. It resembles a light-weight and streamlined leopard with its thin, long body, long legs, small head and powerful muscular shoulders.

The cheetah has quite a remarkable 'extending' backbone which functions like a spring when the animal is in full stride. An adult male weights approximately 39-65kg. (86-143lbs.) This cat is best known for its speed, as it is rated the fastest creature on four legs over a compar-

atively short distance of up to half a mile. A speed of 62 mph is quite within the capabilities of the cheetah. It is the only member of the cat family with blunt claws. The reason for this is that the cheetah has to use its claws

when changing direction at high running speeds. It is thought the claws have to also act as brakes.

Up to the age of about six months, cheetahs can climb trees. After that they follow their mother on hunting

expeditions — and with the claws mostly extended and in contact with the ground they soon become blunt.


The female has a litter of between one and eight 10oz. cubs which are born after 95 days gestation.

It is left to the female to bring the young up on her own as

after mating the male has no more to do with the female.

The mother has to go hunting for food, leaving her

cubs very vulnerable to attack from both hyena and jackal, who would kill and eat the cubs. Cubs which reach adulthood may stay with their mother for up to two years before leaving the nest.

# Duck In To Dine

There is a restaurant in the Chinese capital, Peking, which seats 2,000, has a staff of 700 — and serves only duck.

The meal starts with cold savouries made from the duck's liver, wings and feet minced and mixed with duck egg. Then there is duck soup, followed by fried duck heart.

The main course is roast duck in tiny slices inside pancakes, served with a sauce.

The Peking duck is a special variety bred for such meals.

Each duck should be 65 days old when killed and weigh 51/2lb. For the last three weeks of its life, it will have been fed four times a day with a rich mixture of millet, moss and wheat chaff.

Preparation for cooking takes four days. After cleaning, the duck is hung. Then compressed air is forced between the skin and flesh, so that it will become crispy when cooked. Then the outside is brushed with malt sugar and hung to dry for 24 hours.

# Peaceful Demonstration By Liquid Milk Producers

Liquid milk producers from Co. Waterford, Wexford and South Kilkenny converged on Waterford Foods headquarters, Dungarvan last Thursday where they held a peaceful demonstration for an overdue .5p per gallon increase.

Over 100 farmers, representing almost 70% membership of the Waterford & Wexford Liquid Milk Producers Associations, were present at the Main Street venue where they demonstrated for nearly two hours, with loudspeaker and placards.

The event was part of a series of national demonstrations organised by the IFA Liquid Milk Committee Chairman, Gilmer Hamilton, who stated that Ireland's 5,000 liquid milk suppliers are determined not to let the dairies continue their 'foot dragging' on the long overdue price increase.

"Farmers are tired listening to the hollow claims by dairies that they should willingly follow, but not lead a price increase", said Mr. Hamilton. "These statements are now seen by suppliers as a cynical ploy", he added. FEEL DISENCHANTED

His views were shared by Sean O'Keeffe of the Waterford & Wexford Liquid Milk Producers who led the Dungarvan demonstration. Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Mr. O'Keeffe said he hoped the demonstration would achieve positive results and prompt action from Waterford Foods. The group also held a demonstration at the Snowcream bottling plant in Waterford last September.

In a press statement the Association stated that liquid milk producers supply a top quality product for 365 days in every year, to have fresh product available on the market every day.

"This is persistent and demanding work without any seasonal break whatsoever", claims the Association. "Liquid milk is a highly profitable product for the dairies. The suppliers require a fair share of the price and not one which is constantly being eroded in favour of the retail trade".

The Association argue that while creamery milk received a .6p per gallon increase since last April, liquid milk producers received nothing. The doorstep price of liquid milk today is .23p per gallon higher than it was in 1989, yet the producer's price for liquid milk today is .1p per gallon less than it was in



### **Emergency Aid Scheme for Shellfish Growers** (Pacific Oysters and Rope Mussels)

# Taylor Appeals For "Yes" Vote In Divorce Referendum

The Minister for Equality and Law Reform, Mervyn Taylor paid a visit to Co. Waterford last Friday in the run up to the November 24th divorce referendum. The Labour Minister was interviewed live on WLR FM before meeting with Press representatives around the county. His early afternoon visit to the offices of the 'Dungarvan Leader' enlightened this reporter on a number of issues surrounding the proposed legalisation which has caused confusion and controversy among anti-divorce campaigners.

Looking relaxed and at ease despite the media pressures of the past few weeks, the Minister exuded an air of quiet confidence as he explained the 'ins and outs' of the proposed constitutional change.

Himself a happily married man for the past 35 years, Minister Taylor spoke of spiraling marriage breakdown figures and the decreasing number of people entering marriage. Since the coming into effect of the Judicial Separation and Family Law Reform Act, 1989, there have been over 9,500 applications for judicial separation - almost 3,000 separations a year.

For those people living apart from their spouse, leading totally separate lives, for battered wives or for deserted wives and husbands, the Minister said that divorce would give them a chance to make a fresh start, the right to remarry and start a new family life.

Asked what he would say to members of the public who will vote 'No' to divorce in the upcoming referendum, Minister Taylor said he would appeal to them to consider what a 'No' vote means. For those people who are not as fortunate and lucky as others in a happy marriage, he asked if 'No-voters' would deny these people the chance of a fresh start rather than carrying on living in legal

of divorce. Her comments were met with warm applause by all at the meeting. In appealing to the public to vote 'Yes' to divorce, Minister Taylor described it as a compassionate plea. "It's cruel to say to a battered wife or a deserted husband - remain in loneliness," said Minister Taylor, rather than giving them the option of breaking free from what is in every respect a dead

marriage.
IRRETRIEVABLE **BREAKDOWN** 

Stressing that divorce does not cause marital breakdown, the Minister submitted that divorce instead gives legal recognition to those marriages which had ended years ago. Under the terms of the proposed amendment of the constitution, a court may grant a decree of divorce in circumstances where: the couple have lived physically apart from one another for a period of 4 years during the previous five years; there is no reasonable prospect of a reconciliation and proper provision has been made for the spouses and children etc. In this respect the Government's proposal differs from divorce in many other countries where it is available

According to the Labour Minister, divorce is similar to existing legal remedies such as judicial separation in every respect except one - the right to remarry. With regard to social welfare provisions a divorced person will not lose out on his/her entitlements such as widows's and widower's pension; lone parents and deserted wives schemes, family support supplement and prisoner's wife's allowance etc.
QUICK AND EASY

SOLUTION

Responding to claims by Des Hanafin, Chairman of the Anti-Divorce case that the government had drowned the public with "slick misleading advertisements, paid for by themselves," Minister Taylor said the government had put out factual and informational advertisements, which had been carefully drawn up on a 'need to know'

Mr. Hanafin had previously stated that spending "£500,000 of taxpayers' money to manipulate the people into voting the way it wants is the death knell of democracy'

Meanwhile in a recent press statement, the Anti-Divorce campaign disclosed that Northern Ireland has experienced a large increase in marriage breakdown since the introduction of nofault divorce in 1979.

According to the anti-divorce lobby, the jump in the divorce rate "is clear evidence that where no-fault divorce is available, more and more people in unhappy marriages will avail of it as a quick and easy solution to their problems. Minister Taylor's response to these comments was that the level of marital breakdowns had almost doubled in Ireland since 1986 even without the introduction of divorce. The Central Statistics Office Labour Force survey of 1986 showed that the marriages of some 38,600 individuals had effectively come to an end at that time, (this covers those who are deserted, those who are legally or otherwise separated, those whose marriages have been annulled and those who been divorced abroad). By 1993 this figure had increased to 75,400 individuals.

Indeed, the Minister pointed out that in case of Italy a predominantly Catholic country - divorce rates there were less than the number of marriage breakdowns in Ireland

### INFORMED DECISION

Ending his flying visit to Dungarvan the Minister, accompanied by Department officials and Alderman Pat Hayes of Waterford City

Corporation, again appealed to the public to make an informed decision on November 24th whether to pretend that marriage exists even where both parties live apart or to help those people who are trapped in irretrievable breakdowns.

LOCAL RESERVATIONS

Not everyone however is willing to answer Minister Taylor's call. The Dungarvan branch of the Anti-Divorce Campaign has expressed serious reservations about the proposed constitutional change.

In a recent press release, the branch pose a number of questions, comparing the divorce experience in Britain and the U.S. The branch asks, "do you think that their societies have been enriched by the divorce experience or that ours will if we follow that path?".

Reflecting a widespread fear, the branch stated that there are many people in Ireland who are having difficulty in their marriages and who fear that the introduction of divorce will present an attractive and simple solution to their partners.

Should the divorce proposal be defeated, the branch admits that some people who are in second relationships and who wish to remarry will be disappointed. In looking at any serious national issue however, the branch stressed that the overall impact on society has to take precedence.

"If divorce could be controlled," the 'anti' lobby argue, "there is no doubt that a majority would favour it for a limited number of good cases. That is not the experience elsewhere however, and hence has to be rejected."
CHECK

REGISTER

Meanwhile the Department of the Environment has urged people to check that their name is on the current register of electors. Those who are not registered will not be entitled to vote at the referendum on 24 November next. If your name has been omitted, but you are eligible to vote, you can apply now to be included in the supplement to the Register. Those wishing to be included in the supplement should apply to Waterford Co. Council before 9th November.

Those wishing to check whether they are entered in the current register may inspect the register at their local Garda station, Post office, Public library, courthouse or local authority office, where application forms for entry in the supplement may also be ob-

# Kilmac' **Farmer Gets Insight Into** European. **Opportunities**

Waterford winner of the five-country 1995 FBD/IFA European Scholarship Tour, John Hobbs of Kilmacthomas was one of 40 farmers drawn from 900 IFA Branch Registrars for their voluntary work in developing the Association's membership. Here he writes of his experience and outlines some of the challenges and opportunities Europe poses for Ireland's food industry.

"The 1995 FBD/IFA European Scholarship took over 40 farmers from every county in the Republic of Ireland through 5 countries to see for ourselves the potential for Irish agricultural produce on the continent. We also observed the different ways in which farmers overcome problems and get the best out of their land and stock on the different terrains of Germany, Luxembourg, Belgium, France and Holland. We looked at the way in which Irish food is marketed on the continent and how An Bord Bia and the Dairy Board are attracting customers and enter-

We also got to the heart of European politics in Brussels and saw the effectiveness and professionalism of IFA's European operation and see the significant influence IFA has on European agricultural policy. Throughout the trip we also got to see the many and varied landscapes and types of farming along the 1700 kilometre route.
FANTASTIC TOUR

"Overall, my impression of the FBD/IFA European Scholarship Tour, was that Europe presents many opportunities and challenges for Irish farmers. I learned that while we consider ourselves to be good farmers with efficient food companies and a clean green image with consumers, this counts for very little in the enormously competitive international food market. Our reliance on exports, our distance from the main markets and the proximity of millions of consumers to continental farmers leaves us at a big disadvantage.

"However, we have the advantages of a top quality product, an ability to adapt to niche markets, and a good sales force abroad. Our biggest job is to maintain and aggressively sell our green image (which every other country also claims) ensure a consistent product for our consumers and have a professional approach with our customers.

Overall it was a fantastic tour. I had the pleasure of spending a week with farmers from every part of Ireland and hearing of their experiences. I would like to take the opportunity to thank FBD and IFA for this trip of a lifetime and allowing me to see what Ireland is up against in Europe and the opportunities and challenges in front of me".







# Be Ruthless With Fruit

# **Trees**

Those final leaf falls should be the trigger to think about next year's fruit crop. If you already have fruit trees then be ruthless in cutting away canker and dead wood, which can harbour disease.

After cutting and pruning, always coat exposed sap wood to reduce infection and speed healing — bark grows surprisingly quickly over most wounds.

Apples and pears need brave pruning or you risk sparse and spindly fruit — main shoots can be cut by half of last season's growth and lesser ones by even more.

Aim for a well-spaced tree shape while cutting away inner branches

— which are unlikely to fruit — and criss-crossing branches, wich can cause wounds and infection. Pests and disease will try to ride out winter in the tree's nooks and crannies, so spray with tar oil before



late December — don't forget to cover up, protect your eyes and avoid windy days when spraying.

LIMIT
Up to the end of the year is also a good time to plant fruit trees and shrubs.

March is the true limit, but you might as well make the most of your outlay and labours by giving fruit stock the best chance of survival.

Unless you know which varieties you want, go to a good garden centre or nursey where stock and its characteristics are well labelled and usually selected for garden use — commercial types may be too big.

### **EASY PICKING**

Dwarf types are ideal for training into fans or espaliers against walls and fences. Some are actually available without branches — literally, easy-picking.

Beware stock that has weeds or moss growth on its soil or looks too pot bound. Then plant carefully.

- Dig out slightly more than the depth of the root ball and ensure that the base of the hole is broken up for good drainage.
  - Fork in compost or manure.
- Place the tree in the hole and fill with extracted soil and compost/manure in equal parts so that the trunk is at the same level as it stood in the nursery's pot.
  - Tread down firmly.
- Secure free-standing trees with a stake driven in the ground at 45 degrees and bind together with a wifde plastic or rope tie to reduce cutting into the bark. The tree needs this support against winter winds.
- Trees or shrubs being trained must be supported from the start.
  - Water well if the soil is dry.

You needn't stick to apples and pears. Mild weather lovers such as peach can be grown against sunny south-facing walls.

If space is the problem, they try growing the hybrid loganberry or fussier raspberry.

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### SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD INVITATION **DEVELOPING A POLICY FOR WOMEN'S HEALTH**



Earlier this year the Minister for Health launched a discussion document "Developing a Policy for Women's Health." The Minister's intention is that there should be consultation with as broad a cross section of women's organisations as practical and with other bodies interested in women's health. It is proposed that the consultation should build on the contents of the discussion document and should identify priorities for inclusion in the plan for women's health to be drafted by the Minister and adopted by Government.

The discussion document deals inter alia with, The Objectives of a Women's Health Policy: The Health of Irish Women: Eligibility of Women for Health Services: Health Issues particular to women; Health issues which predominantly affect women: Health issues which affect women differently to men: Access to Health Services for Disadvantaged Women and Consultation and Representation of Women in the Health Services.

The South Eastern Health Board, with the assistance of the National Women's Council, is now commencing the consultative process in its area. Women's organisations, and other bodies interested in womens health, who would like to make a submission are invited to write to the address given below and they will be given guidelines on making submissions.

The Board also intend to hold a number of half day workshops on womens health over the coming weeks. Organisations which would wish to send representatives should write to the address given below, for details. The workshop will be a listening forum with opportunities for those attending to express their views on a policy for womens health. There will be a limited number of places available at the workshops.

Q: My 14 Year old daughter has put on nearly two stone in the past year. She eats a lot anyway, and now binges on crisps a  $\mathbf{n}$ d chocoates. She ays e's s h e unhappy and that's why

she overeats. How can I help her? A: Your concern is justified. This pattern of self-harm is hard to change. First tell your daughter you're worried and you've decided to get some help for her. It's important not to ask whether she wants help. She's doing herself harm and needs parents who will take a firm stand in acting on her behalf. Contact your G.P. He or she can provide a general health check for your daughter and advise where she can get help with her diet. He may be able to refer you to a dietician who can talk to to your daughter about developing healthy eating habits. She also needs practical help with her emotional problems. Don't delay, this is a very serious problem. Start helping your daughter now.

Q: My 12 year old son has suddenly developed a phobia about dirt and bugs. He's forever washing his hands, checks the crockery before he eats and doesn't even want to ride on the school bus with other children. He says he's not having problems at school and still wants to play with his friends. My husband thinks it's a joke,

but I'm getting very worried.

A: This is not a joke - it's probably the beginning of an emotional illness which needs to be taken seriously. The three of you should make an urgent appointment to go and see your doctor. Ask for an assessment by a consultant in child psychiatry. This is a common condition, but people often cover up and don't admit what a problem it can be. Your son may need help in admitting he is in trouble.

Q: My son's only 10 but snores for hours every night. He shares a room with his younger brother, who can't sleep.

A: Ask your doctor to check for ear, nose and throat infections. Even if there's no obvious cause, your son should snore less as his nasal cavities reach full size. A study of over 1,500 children between the ages of six and 13 showed more than half snored. Occasional snoring was linked with colds, coughs, tonsillitis and smoking by parents. In fact, three-fifths of the habitual snorers

lived with parents who smoked. To overcome the problem of your younger child missing out on sleep, perhaps you could stagger their sleeping times (if a

separate bedroom is out of the question), so your younger child is asleep when the older one goes to

METHOD: Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5. Grease a 20cm/8in-diameter sponge flan tin. Place a circle of greaseproof paper in the base then dust with flour.

heatproof bowl with the 50g/2oz sugar. Set over a pan of simmering water and whisk until thick and creamy and the mixture leaves a trail when the whisk is lifted. Sift in the flour and gently fold in with the orange rind.

Pour into the tin and bake in the preheated oven for 15 minutes until risen and golden. Turn out on to a wire cake rack. Remove lining.

Meanwhile, place the orange juice, 2 thsp sugar and Grand Marnier (if using) in a pan. Warm until sugar has dissolved. Add orange slices and simmer gently for 2-3 minutes.

Remove slices with a slotted spoon, cover and reserve. Spoon the warm syrup over the sponge flan. Leave to cool completely.

To make the filling, sprinkle gelatine on to the lemon juice in a heatproof bowl, leave until spongy. Stand the bowl in a pan of simmering water until the gelatine has dissolved. Cool slightly.

Place the size 2 egg yolk, sugar and lemon rind in a heatproof bowl. Whisk over a pan of simmering water until thick and creamy.

Remove from heat and whisk in the cream. Stir in the gelatine. Whisk the egg white until stiff and fold in. Spoon into the flan case and chill for about 30-35 minutes until Decorate with the set.

The second part of the evening's activities will be the annual Michael C. Nagle Dungarvan five miles cross country championship at 3 p.m. in aid of cancer research. A social evening will be held afterward in Dick Brennan's, The Square.

Terry Fox, a young Canadiin who had his leg amputated because of cancer, died in 1981 during his famous attempt to run across Canada to raise funds for cancer research. Today, annual runs are held in Terry's memory in over 45 countries worldwide, making the Terry Fox Run the world's single biggest fundraising event for cancer

SONIA O'SULLIVAN

Ireland's top class athlete, Sonia O'Sullivan has agreed to lend her support to the Irish Cancer Society by acting as patron for the Terry Fox Run for the third year in succession.

The Irish Cancer Society, the major funder of cancer research in Ireland, introduced the run to this country in 1993 and, to date, the event has raised £270,000 for Irish

cancer research projects. Prof. J. J. Fennelly, Consultant Medical Oncologist and Chairman of the Irish Cancer Society said, "The field of cancer research has changed dramatically over the years and nowhere is this more evident than in the areas of genetics and molecular medicine. Since cancer is a disease with a clear genetic basis, the ability to manipulate or replace genetic material within the cells using gene therapy will have a tremendous impact on the practice of medicine in the future."

Prof. Fennelly stressed the importance of clinical research particularly in evaluating newer types of treatment for patients with cancer. "A most exciting area at the moment lies in evaluating new drugs such as Taxol and Taxotere, which are proving to be of particular value in the treatment of breast, lung and ovarian cancer.

Prof. Fennelly also highlighted the importance of newer agents to prevent the symptoms of treatment such as anti-vomiting drugs.

Over 15,000 people develop

cancer in Ireland every year, however, thanks to cancer research about 50% of those go on to lead normal lives.
