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Gruesome Dog Attack Leaves Farmers Counting The Cost

Two and half thousand acres of bleak mountain-side on the Waterford/Tipperary border have been turned into horrific "killing fields" over the past week by at least two rampaging dogs who have killed and seriously injured between one hundred and fifty and two hundred sheep.

Up to thirty members of the Cappoquin and Nire Valley Gun Clubs spent last weekend patrolling more than five square miles of the fog-shrouded Knockmeal-down mountain range between Newcastle in South

Tipperary and Melleray in West Waterford.

They succeeded in shooting dead a half-bred black Labrador last Sunday, but another Labrador, also black in colour, remained at large yesterday amid fears

among the local intensive sheep farming community that still further horror and devastation will be inflicted on their flocks.

The worst effected sheep farmer has been Michael Coyne of Boolahalla, Newcastle, who has had about fifty of his flock mauled to

death with at least as many more so seriously injured that a majority, if not all, of them will have to be put down.

Several other neighbouring sheep farmers on both sides of the Waterford/Tipperary county divide have

Proposed Marine Developments At Ardmore

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State and the Department of Health and Austin Deasy, T.D., announced last week that the Department of the Marine has approved a grant of £45,000 to Waterford County Council towards developments at Ardmore.

Minister O'Shea pointed out that Waterford County Council will contribute up to £40,000 towards the work. The project being grant-aided involves an extension to the slipway and the construction of a boat parking area at Ardmore.

"These improvements will increase the potential of pleasure boating and fishing in the area and will assist in stimulating private tourism," the Minister added. "Safety for boating in the area will significantly improve as a result of these developments."

Mr. O'Shea stated that the County Council will carry out the work. Construction is expected to commence shortly.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

An elderly friend is considering coming here to live. She has a pension from the DSS in the U.K. To help her decide she would like to know what health services and other benefits would she be entitled to?

ANSWER

As she has a DSS pension she would be entitled to a Medical Card under EU Regulations regardless of her means. If she is aged 66 or over she would also be entitled to the Free Services available to pensioners here. These are — Free Travel, Free Electricity, Natural Gas Allowance, T.V. Licence, and Free Telephone Rental if she satisfies the other conditions attached to these benefits. She might also qualify for the Fuel Allowance if she satisfies the means test.

A new edition of the booklet Entitlements for the Over Sixties is now available. This booklet provides a wealth of information on all the benefits available to pensioners. It should be very useful for your friend.

It has information on social welfare benefits and other subjects of relevance to older people. It describes the different old age pensions with information on how to qualify for them. It includes information on health services, nursing homes, housing, income tax, benefits under EU Regulations and the free service and other concessions available to pensioners.

Proposed Garda Station Closures Discounted By Minister

In the wake of a recent bombshell disclosure by a Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council that several of the smaller garda stations throughout the county are to be closed down, the Minister for Justice, Nora Owen has denied that any such plans exist.

At the October meeting of the Council, Cllr. Willie McDonnell said he had it on "influential" information from an utterly reliable source that while some of the existing garda stations, including Lismore, are going to be "upgraded", others face imminent closure. The Tallow based Councillor had urged Council members to vigorously campaign against these proposals.

His claims however were completely discounted by Minister Owen who, in a reply to Deputy Austin Deasy, said that no station, rural or urban, is under threat in Co. Waterford. All of the existing garda stations, she stressed, were 'safe' and none are targeted for closure.

The Minister again refuted Cllr. McDonnell's allegations in a statement to Brian O'Shea TD, Minister of State at the Department of Health, who sought clarification on the matter follow-

ing reports in the local media.

Welcoming Minister Owen's assurance on the matter, Chairman of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said he was particularly pleased with the Minister's speedy reply to the situation which, he said would now bury the talk about closures.

Last months claims of garda station closures had been the source of much concern and anxiety for rural dwellers, particularly the elderly and Cllr. Coffey said he was extremely happy that the Minister had "seen fit to allay those fears and concerns with her categorical assurance that no stations will close".

Now that the question of garda station closures has been cleared, Cllr. Coffey said he will call on Minister Owen and the Garda Commissioner to assign extra garda manpower to stations throughout the county.

"That must be the next move, and the County Council will show the way in campaigning for additional gardaí throughout our county," he added.

DELIGHTED AT ANNOUNCEMENT

Commenting on Minister Owen's announcement, Cllr. McDonnell said that "there is no smoke without fire". "I believe the remarks made by me at our last council meeting were well founded remarks regarding the upgrading of some garda stations and closing others," he said. Cllr. McDonnell claimed that his statement was queried by other sources in the county, without any comment from Department of Justice officials.

However when a Senior Politician raised the matter, the Minister was then obliged to reply and clarified the situation.

The Fine Gael councillor said he was delighted to hear the Minister dispel any confusion on the closure issue as, he said, "it eases the minds of many people". "My remarks," he added, "will no doubt bring pressure on the Minister to have her Department upgrade all Garda Stations and improve the service".

Junior Encyclopaedia

The Snow Leopard

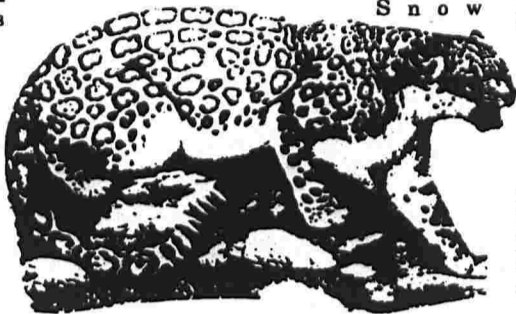
There are 36 species of cat in the wild, one of which is the snow leopard. It is said to be one of the most strikingly beautiful of all cats.

It is related to the common leopard of Africa and Asia, but because its way of life and general appearance are so different from those of other leopards, it is usually regarded as a separate species.

The snow leopard lives in the remote mountainous regions of Central Asia, where, in summer it hunts at altitudes up to 6,000m. (about 19,500ft.)

During the harsh winter weather, it follows the example of its prey and

descends to lower levels of around 1,800 (about 6,000 ft.) It is at this time of year that the snow leopard will attack and kill domestic cattle — or may itself be killed by hunters or herdsman, although generally it will avoid anything to do with humans.



leopards are powerful, agile animals capable of making huge leaps to cross ravines or clear other obstacles.

Usually a solitary creature, it leads a lonely life, wandering the mountains, although the female leopard may be accompanied by cubs. These are born about 100 days after mating takes place, with normally two or three cubs in a litter.

This cat has a head and body length of about 1.2 to 1.5m. (4.5 ft.) with a tail measuring about 90cm. (35.5in.)

The thick fur is about 5cm. (2 in.) long on the back — but almost twice the length on the underparts of the animal. The coat is a soft ash-brown colour with black rosette markings. This long soft coat of fur provides the snow leopard with effective and much-needed protection from the bitterly cold winds encountered by this extremely rare and endangered species.

YOU CAN'T BEAT THE GOLD MEDAL SWIFT

If there was ever an Olympics between human beings and animals, man would be humbled in many of the events.

He would easily be beaten by the antelope, cheetah and horse over 200 metres. And in swimming, penguins are faster.

But who'd win if the Games were between animals and birds?

For sheer speed, the victor should be the spine-tailed swift. In 1951, Russian scientists timed one in level flight at 106mph.

The silver medal would probably go to the pigeon. One was timed at 97mph in a race in Ireland. The Atlantic sailfish would be favourite for the bronze. In Florida one swam 100 metres at a 68mph average.

On form, there would be little to choose between a pronghorn antelope and a cheetah for fourth place. Both can do 60mph.

In 1937, cheetahs ran against greyhounds at Romford dog track in Essex. The cheetahs won easily.

Many dogs can run at 20mph. The fastest is the saluki which has clocked up 40mph.

That's about the speed of a racehorse, ostrich, kangaroo and tuna fish.

Other good competitors are the hawkhead moth (33mph), guano bat (32), sea lion (25), penguin (22), turtle (22) and elephant (20mph).

The African impala would surely strike gold in the long jump, clearing about 40ft. Its main rival, the South African sharp-nosed frog, has jumped 32ft. 3 ins.

Minister Gives John Treacy Key Sports Role

Star athlete, John Treacy of Villierstown has been appointed Chairperson of the Strategy Group on Sport, promoted by Bernard Allen, T.D., Minister for Sport.

The announcement to this key role for Ireland's double World Cross Country Championship gold medal winner (1978/1979) and 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games marathon silver medal winner, is among a number of initiatives being formulated under the direction of the Minister for Sport.

In announcing the Strategy Group on Sport appointments, Mr. Bernard Allen, T.D., Minister for Sport said: "This is an important day for Irish sport. I would

like to thank John Treacy for so willingly taking on the task as Chairperson of the Working Group which I have established to undertake this critically important work for Irish sport".

The new Strategy Group on Sport chairman, John Treacy said: "I am delighted to head up the team to prepare the Strategy Group on Sport document, outlining the objectives and priorities for the future development of sport in Ireland.

"A policy and strategy document is only of value if it can be implemented and applied and we will work closely with the various areas of sport to ensure that the goals and objectives of this document will be attain-

able and of real value to the future development of sport in Ireland.

"I feel very strongly about the economic, social and health impact of sport on the lives of all Irish people and hopefully this policy document will outline to the Government the necessity of funding sport in Ireland".

In the course of its work, the Group will consult widely with the National governing bodies as well as with all agencies involved in sport. also suffered significant losses, and they now genuinely fear that unless the killer Labrador dog roaming the mountainside is quickly caught or shot that dozens more sheep will be mutilated in the coming days.

Michael Coyne's son David, spoke at his home on Tuesday and said the killings and maulings amounted to the worst ever attack on sheep in that area. "The likes of it has never been seen before," he said.

Describing the injuries, David said the legs of some of the sheep had been torn from their bodies. Others had their stomachs gapingly wounded to such an extent that you could look into them. Some of the most seriously injured sheep were still alive when they found them but they had to be put down. Others, he added, died from their injuries.

He, along with his brothers John and Michael, made the first of a number of grim discoveries last Thursday when carrying out a routine check on their flock on the mountain. They first came on two injured sheep and shortly afterwards actually saw the two Labradors attacking others in the flock. They were unarmed however and could do no more than scare the dogs away.

In subsequent days the killings continued with local farmers distressingly finding sheep dead in various glens all over the five

square miles of mountain. Then last Saturday members of the Cappoquin and Nire Valley Gun Clubs joined the fray and on Sunday one of the two Labradors was shot dead.

The dog, which is now at the Coyne family home, hadn't any identification tag however and up to yesterday the ownership had not been established. Cappoquin Gardaí have visited a large number of homes in the area but so far their efforts to confirm ownership of the dog have not been successful.

David Coyne is fullsome in his praise of the endeavours of the gun club members to put the killer dogs out of circulation. "They have been absolutely marvellous and they have the appreciation of every sheep farmer in this area," he said.

Tony Hickey, a member of the Cappoquin Gun Club, told the "Leader" that "sheer panic" had also contributed to the deaths of several of the sheep who had jumped into glens to try and escape from the marauding dogs.

He said that because of very poor weather conditions the gun club members have had to "comb" the mountain, and their job has been made all the more difficult because of the heavy fog which had enveloped the whole area for days.

"Because of the conditions, and the difficulties involved in bringing the dead

sheep down from the mountain, many of them have been left lying where they were killed," Tony Hickey said. "I have witnessed the pitiful sight of farmers bringing dead sheep down the mountain on their backs in the last few days."

He added that he and his gun club colleagues will continue their search of the mountain for as long as the killer dog remains at large.

To make a tragic situation infinitely worse the substantial losses the sheep farmers have incurred cannot be recouped through insurance claims. "Our insurance will not cover our losses which are certain to run into many thousands of pounds", David Coyne said.

He said it would be impossible at this stage to accurately calculate what they have lost in monetary terms, and would only be in a position to make that calculation when they have fully assessed the situation.

Meanwhile a Waterford IFA spokesman said his organisation is "appalled" at the size and severity of the sheep kill in the Newcastle/Melleray area.

In appealing to dog owners to ensure that their animals are properly kept under control especially after dark, he said the sheer savagery involved in this particular sheep kill chillingly highlighted the need for dogs to be kept in by night.

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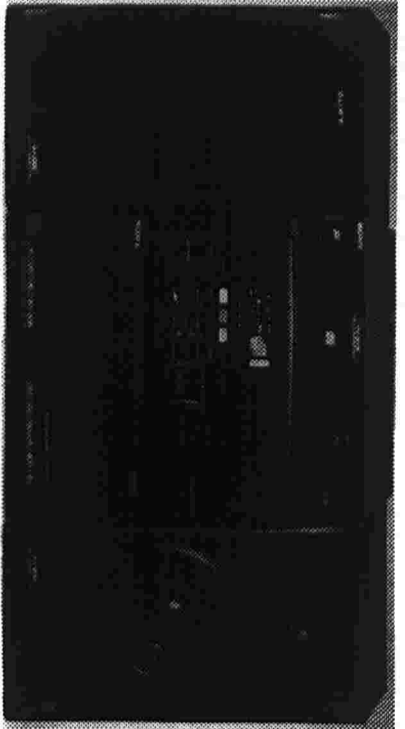
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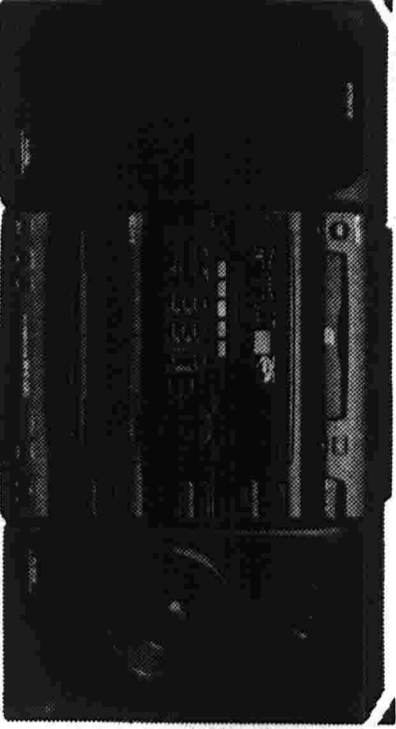
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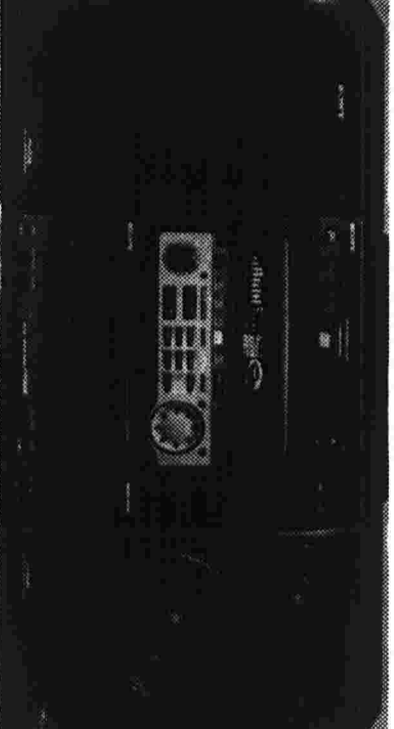
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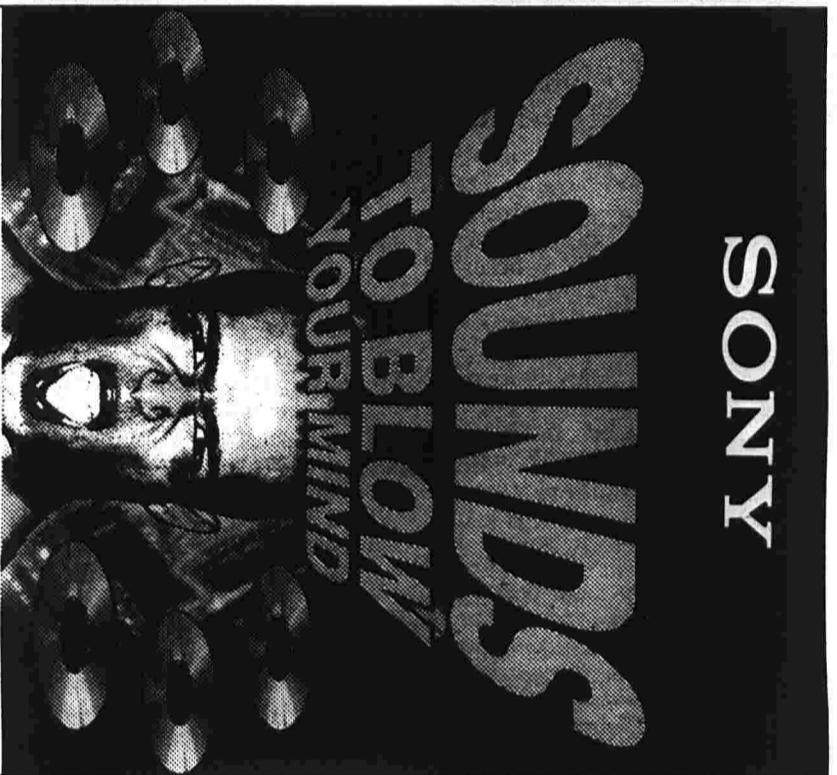
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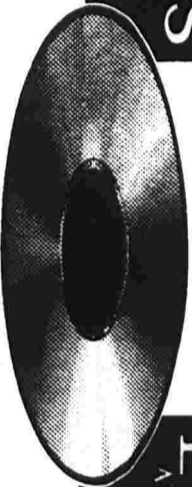


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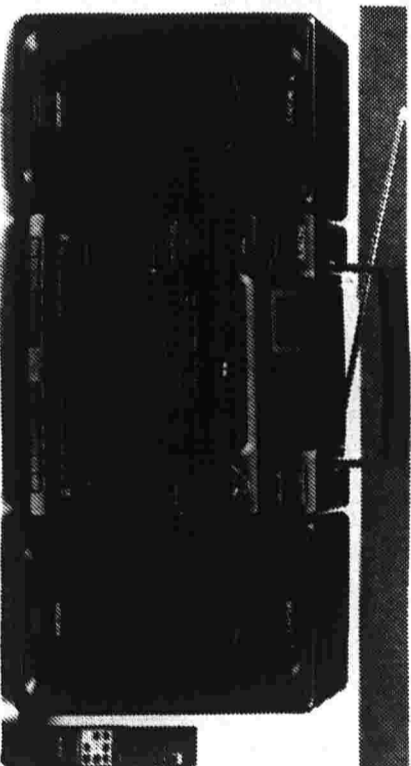
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BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

BRING SANITY TO AGRICULTURE

A farm leader has called on the elected politicians to bring sanity and common sense into "an agricultural scene gone mad." Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, president of the United Farmers Association said that Ivan Yates, Minister for Agriculture, must immediately introduce legislation that will properly control movement of milk quota within the dairy industry. The president said that all milk quota which comes on the market should come under the control of the Department of Agriculture and from there to be allocated on a "need" basis. "Since the advent of quota right up to the present time the major part of all available quota has gone to larger dairy farmers." Successive governments and Ministers have abdicated their duty to bring fair play into the arena. The President said recent moves by Mr. Yates to implement another clawback scheme was just a further "cop-out" and would fool nobody. Many small dairy farmers who he said are trying to hang onto a living from milking cows would very much like to see a print-out of quota allocation by Co-ops over that 12 year period. The United Farmers Association are now calling on Minister Yates to enforce such ideals by law on the milk quota regime.

Members Accused Of 'Penny Pinching' As Council Fails To Strike Rate

the £ from £35.18 to £36.27 and an increase of £5 on domestic water charges to £145, both of which he said are in line with current inflation. These increases, he felt, were the minimum necessary for the Council to provide a reasonable level of service to the public in 1996.

While to many observers, Mr. Connolly's recommendations were viewed as a welcome improvement on the previous rate hikes of 1995, (when members voted increases of £26 on water charges and 50p on refuse collection) his 1996 proposals, however, were the subject of acrimonious debate and lengthy adjournments, so often the characteristics ingredients of Council estimate meetings.

PARTY POLITICS

This year party politics seems to have entered the field with the entire Fianna Fail contingent of the Council voting against Mr. Connolly's proposals. They were joined by Democratic Left's Cllr. Tony Wright and Labour Councillor and Vice-Chairman Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan in a surprise breakaway from his two

party colleagues, to defeat the proposed rate on a 12-11 vote.

Defending his position, Cllr. O'Callaghan said in view of the staggering £14 increase in water charges last year, he would not support a further £5 hike, which he said, would go beyond the inflation rate of 2.4%.

Cllr. Wright's decision however came as no surprise to observers. A long time opponent of service charges, Cllr. Wright made his position very clear on the subject when he described service charges as an 'extortion' on the public.

Co. Waterford currently boasts the highest charge in the country for domestic water, he said. "It's time to cry halt", urged Cllr. Wright, adding that the £1,850,000 total for service charges "be left in the pockets of people who have already paid their fair share."

His proposal however to abolish service charges, failed to obtain a seconder.

SCATHING ATTACK

As the result of the vote was announced, 12 to 11, a shocked silence descended

on the Council Chamber, broken by an angry Cllr. Willie McDonnell (F.G.) who declared it a shame that the Vice Chairman of the Council could not support the Manager's recommendations. "It's a disgrace that we (Fine Gael) be associated with such a party," he vehemently added.

Likewise Council Chairman, Cllr. Oliver Coffey (F.G.) expressed his acute disappointment that Cllr. O'Callaghan could not stand behind the Co. Manager. While the Government alliance parties were thrown into chaos, Fianna Fail members refused to back down on their decision to vote against domestic water charge increases.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey (F.F.) told members that he didn't like having to vote against the proposed estimates but mainly because of the £5 increase in water charges, he could not support the proposals.

"The three parties in Government failed to carry a rate, it's not our responsibility", he stressed. As the verbal onslaughts

continued, Cllr. John Carey (F.G.) said it was the first time he had seen Fianna Fail Council members playing politics, "Fine Gael and the two Labour members did their duty", he added.

'PENNY PINCHING'

Accusing those members who had voted against the proposed rate of 'penny pinching', Co. Manager Mr. Connolly warned that it was "very foolish" of members to vote against a £5 water charge increase. An extra £5 a year, he said, translated into just 10p per week. "It's a joke", he added. "We've a responsibility to the people of Co. Waterford", he stressed, while asking members to reconsider their position.

Following a five minute adjournment, however, there was no change in the deadlock, with members continuing to stick to their guns.

With a second estimates meeting fixed for this Friday, November 17, it remains to be seen whether members can put grievances aside and resolve their differences or whether Waterford Co. Council will go to the brink of dissolution.

Deasy On Driving Licence Renewals

Fine Gael T.D., Austin Deasy, raised the issue of reminders for driving licence renewals in the Dail recently. Deputy Deasy asked the Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin what plans, if any, he has to issue reminders regarding driving licences when people are taxing their cars in view of the number of people whose licences lapse due to an oversight.

Minister Howlin replied, "while the need to tax motor vehicles arises at least once a year, most driving licences are renewable only one in ten years. It is not feasible under the existing system to issue reminders when licences are expiring. However, a national computerised licensing file is being developed on a phased basis and will be completed in 1999. This will facilitate the issuing of notices to licence holders whose licences are due for renewal."

The Chamber of Commerce has market data which shows that the provision of most household, food, service and equipment requirements are available

locally and at competitive prices. Service levels have been surveyed to be both efficient and sophisticated.

Commenting on the situation pre Christmas when there is a boom in domestic spending John Walsh, President of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce asked that local shops and businesses be given the opportunity to quote before purchasing outside the town.

Mr. Walsh went on to say that every extra million pounds circulating in the local economy guarantees up to 50 full time jobs in Dungarvan. The Chamber of Commerce are anxious to receive feedback on the standard of retail services in the town and will shortly undertake a random household survey in order to get customer ideas on how goods and services can be continually improved.

In the meanwhile the Chamber's motto is "keep your town in business by keeping your business in town".

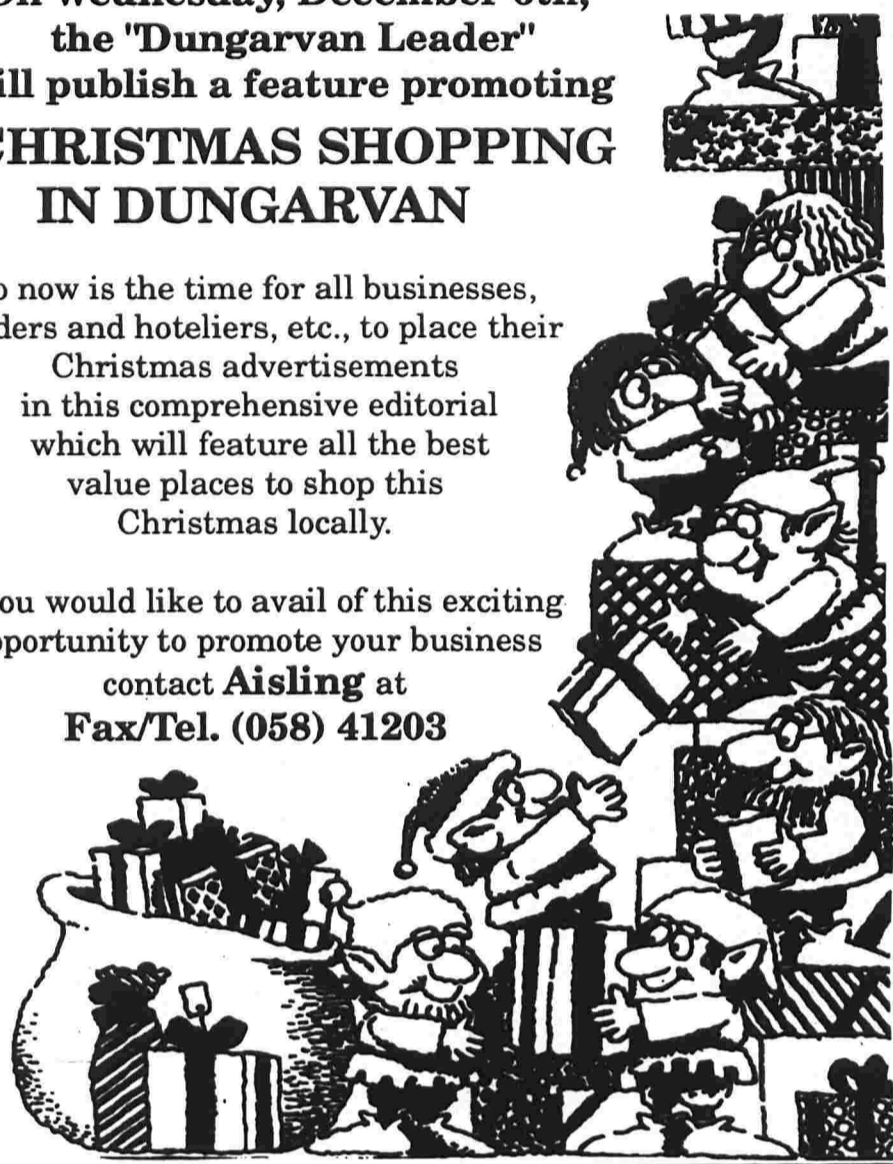

"The Fires Of Midsummer"

Up until twenty years ago children arrived to school clutching pennies for those who were called the poor, starving 'black babies'. The term was inappropriate but well-intentioned and in many ways our sense of horror at the thought of people dying of starvation was more acute in those days than it is now. The warm pennies lovingly rendered were of more value than the hastily written cheque which nowadays numbs our conscience and hinders us from honestly facing up to the issues of justice and equality which need to be tackled in our modern world. The images of famine which the television screen glibly presents to us have in the end only served to desensitize us.

However, there is still one medium which actively engages the feelings and thoughts of the audience and that is the medium of drama. Mary Kearney's new stage play "The Fires Of Midsummer" is one which allows us to empathize with the experiences of a people caught up in the awfulness of what was the Great Famine. By a leap of the imagination she has created a whole community. Little by little we are drawn into their lives and cannot but be

moved as their story unfolds. They did not know they were living on the edge of a precipice.

The play is not a history lesson. It does not take sides. It does no blame. Nor does it offer any easy answers. These people are real, flesh and blood. they will

not fit into any convenient categories to suit the arguments of economists or historians.

WINNING ESSAY

The following is Fearghus de Paor's winning essay—

MY MOST FRIGHTENING EXPERIENCE

It was the start of the summer holidays and unlike most children, I wasn't very excited. The mountains went nearly the whole way around and in the middle was the lake itself.

First of all we ate the picnic, it was delicious. We skimmed stones for a half

an hour and when we got bored we decided to walk up the mountains. It was a tough, steep climb and after a while my cousins sat down for a rest, but I was impatient and kept going on. I was thoroughly enjoying myself and after a few moments I felt I had to sit down.

As I caught my breath I noticed that I was surrounded by a thick cloud of fog. A cold shiver ran down my spine. What if . . . ? No, I couldn't be! I shouted out as loud as I could "Colleen, Eoin, Micheál, where are you?"

come. I could vaguely see a winchman coming slowly towards me. When he was finally at my side he reassured me that I'd be okay. I was tied in a harness and taken slowly up into the air. I shut my eyes tightly until I was safely inside the helicopter. I was pampered and treated like a king the whole way home. I was cold and wet, but I was happy. At last I was free from the deadly mist which had kept me as an overnight prisoner.

Justin Case

It is always good to get the view of others whose opinions we respect on any matter we deem important to us. Sometimes we are so involved or close to the scene that objective assessment fails and our prejudices are reinforced in the absence of critical detached judgement. Thus inherent weaknesses readily discerned by the outsider are never redressed. So I was anxious to know what a hurling lover like Justin McCarthy thought of our Waterford senior hurlers after watching last Sunday week's league match in Dungarvan.

Justin does a weekly hurling column for the Cork Examiner and expresses himself well on his favourite game. He never conceals his passion for hurling and equally, I'm sure, he never expects all of his readers to agree, with all of his opinions, nor should be. "Ní lia duine ná tuairim" the wise old Irish saying reminds us and it is refreshing to read a great hurler's honest opinion of our team in serious competition.

Justin was a master craftsman with a hurley and I got first hand experience of his deep affection for the game when I met him for the first time in the early seventies at Gormanston College, Co. Meath, on the occasion of the annual national coaching course in hurling. A serious injury incurred the year before prior to the Cork v. Kilkenny All Ireland final when he badly injured his leg in a traffic accident which left him severely handicapped. At that particular time he carried a large plate inserted into his shin to aid the healing process, so walking was difficult not to mind running. If you think that put a stop to Justin's gallop, you're dead wrong. Every day Justin insisted on going through the full panoply of hurling skills, never shirking the hard work (coaching is all hard albeit enjoyable) work. He pushed himself to the limit despite the obvious pain involved.

Every evening after the day's exertions he headed for the pool to ease the pains and refresh his drooping spirit. Early to bed was a must so that his biological batteries would be fully recharged for the following day's renewal of what to him must have been excruciating torture. He was hell bent on taking a full part in our famous seven aside competition, and steeled himself to overcome his disability.

I will always remember his sweaty struggle through the early rounds. When he reached the final his fierce determination and iron will drove him to exhibit all the smooth gracefulness which

was a distinguishing feature of Justin McCarthy's hurling. His silky skills adorned all of his games but at Gormanston I saw Justin the fanatically committed battler who pushed back the frontiers of pain and drove himself on, triumphing over adversity.

So what did Justin think of Portlárige?

He was quite impressed with our first-half display and felt that we fully deserved to go in at half-time with only one point separating us from Cork, having played against the breeze and having taken the game to the Corkmen. He thought, as I do, that Paul Flynn should be placed much nearer goal where with his speed over 15 yards he is a major threat to any defence. Perhaps the selectors wanted to play Michael Hickey in on the square and give him another trial at corner forward. Even so it seems to me that Flynn has the major requirements for a No. 13 or 15: skill, control and pace and should always be selected in his favourite position.

As Justin noted we were on top at midfield and thus ensured a good supply of ball for the forwards. I'm not so sure that it was "good" ball because much of it was lashed in high and to the advantage of Cork backs.

Why aren't players urged to think about the proper use of possession? Maybe, of course, they are but don't carry out game-plan instructions. Johnny Brenner won plenty of the ball, as already noted, but persisted with long high straight centres into the forward line. This suits any worthwhile back-line. There is a mistaken belief that bombing in a succession of high-altitude missiles puts the defence under pressure. Not a bit of it. Remember the 1982 All Ireland a day of howling wind? Cork faced the win in the first half (they always do; I don't quite know why). Kilkenny forwards moved in towards the Cork goal for every one of their puckouts, drawing the Cork defender with them. Noel Skehan placed his puckout to midfield or just beyond it thus allowing Ger Fennelly and the wingers to come to the ball breaking some 70 yards from the Cork goal and secure possession. Which they did time after time. Ger Cunningham's mighty puckouts of the second half were in complete contrast. Ger Henderson, anticipating the long wind assisted puck, retreated to the '21 line and was able to move forward every time to arrive under the high ball and attack it. His opponent hadn't a chance and Ger was star of the defence.

Something similar happened in the 1984 final in Thurles, Damien Martin's puckout ar-

rived regularly on target to allow centre back Johnny Crowley to star and wipe out his immediate opponent, Birmingham of Offaly. No forward unless he has the physical presence and awareness of a top form Christy Heffernan can compete with an intelligent back who ensures that he is always coming forward to the air ball.

Barry Murphy, Cashman and Tony O'Sullivan knew who to play centre forward and what type of supply would benefit the attack. Brian Corcoran tried to fly the ball in diagonally and low. Our full forwards needed low, quick ball. That didn't happen so Denis Walsh and company dominated that area and Waterford starved on the infrequent scraps they received.

Justin though we took the wrong options and didn't play what he called "sensible hurling" and that our half backs and midfielders were "giving ridiculous balls into the forwards". He also thought we lacked team work and needed "a few leaders" who could give inspiration. We had one leader in Damien Byrne but need some throughout the team especially in the forwards where Cork's Corcoran showed the qualities of a genuine leader.

Food for thought from a man who has always admired good hurling and has promoted it from one end of the country to the other. He has a healthy regard for Waterford hurling. He rejoiced in Cork's victory but acknowledges too that "they (Waterford) have no serious problems but they are problems that won't get better, if they are not sorted out quickly". Are we listening? And thinking?

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Time To Re-arrange Things!

Did you ever get this feeling as you sat in the garden during that long hot summer? "The garden looks nice, but those dahlias are in the wrong place — and the lilies are dominating the view to the bottom of the garden and I wish . . ."

Well, now is the time to put those niggles right, whether it be a complete redesign or a rearrangement of a particular area.

Things are fairly dormant at present and exertions such as spadework are easier in cool conditions.

If you are designing from scratch, first decide the size and approximate shape of the lawn, taking into account:

- Use intended — will you want space for children's play?
- how much time have you for gardening? Is it easier to mow a large lawn than tend many beds and borders?
- Will the lawn shape or any paths, make mowing more difficult or damaging to the mower?

If you are coming down on the lazyman's side you may also want to give more space to a patio.

It doesn't have to be paving stones or crazy paving — ornamental brick looks stylish — and enclosed beds or butts can be used to break up hard outlines.

With these major elements decided, draw up a plan but keep things flexible as you add borders and paths and features such as rockeries and ponds — your home computer may have a drawing/graphics package which can help.

The trick is to try curves and odd shapes, particularly if you have a small garden — straight lines and rectangles can give a garden a cramped look.

If you want to get an idea of how shapes might look then put sticks into the ground and mark out by training a hosepipe around them.

Avoid straight concrete paths too as they regiment efforts to create curving bed and border designs: a 'snake' of stepping stones is a better way of taking you around key features.

Create the impression of distance by hiding the ends of the garden behind intruding features such as hedges, bushes, trellises and pergolas.

Don't forget to give height too, using small trees, climbers, hedges or raised rockeries, perhaps making them appear higher by raising their sites.

Once you have your layout you can get on with excavations, paving, step-building and fencing.

You can also make a start with some scenery:

Lawns — Turf can be laid now although it is vulnerable to frost and damage from work elsewhere in the garden. Alternatively, prepare the lawn site and sow seed next spring.

Bulbs — Go for early colour in your new garden by planting spring bulbs.

Trees — Deciduous trees and hedges planted now will enjoy a flying start in the spring.

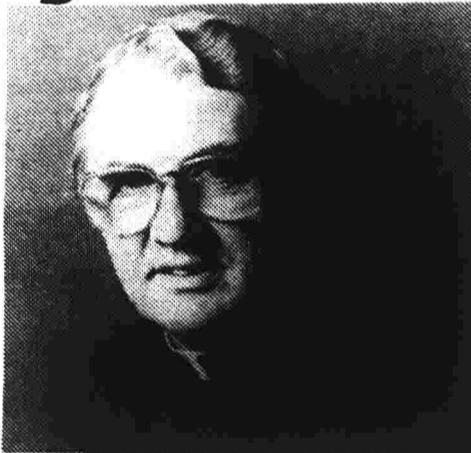

MARTIN QUINLAN

On July 21, 1995, Martin Quinlan of Tallow Hill, Tallow, aged 62 years, died tragically in a car accident on his way to play golf for the Homeless of Dublin.

Earlier this year he became World International Left-handed Golfer of the Year and on August 10 his two sons received the award on his behalf. Last year he was presented with the International Golfer Cup by Don Juan Bourdon in Spain. He was challenged by Princess Brigittass and Queen Sophia for October, but sadly now that is not possible.

He was involved in Youth Endeavour, taking on some youths as apprentices in his Engineering business titled Quinlan Engineering Ltd., run by his two sons and wife.

He was always involved with many charities and for Bosnia he was one of the first private businesses to give — and he gave generously.

His steel engineering firm has the franchise to outfit Centra, Super Valu, Londis and some private concerns and colleges, hospitals, Telecom, Telefis Eire-

ann and embassies as far away as Moscow and U.S.A.

Martin was an exceptional man. He studied hard in college and got a gold Fainne ring for Gaelic speaking, which led to a scholarship to An Gaeltacht, leading to Baldonfell and an Engineering degree plus pilotship.

Martin will be sadly missed by all his colleagues, but more especially by his family. He is survived by his wife Elsie, his eldest son Martin and his wife Mary and their

children Graham and Stephen, his younger son Seamus and wife Suzanne and their little boy Seán.

He had everything to live for but God needed him to show St. Peter how to get a birdie or a hole in one!

Martin, we miss you, but rest and care for us from above. Till we see you in the future, slán leat, slán go feól.

Martin is survived by his three sisters Hannah, Bridie and Tessa. His brother Tom has since died. God rest their souls.

In the Youghal Hospital on October 9, Thomas Quinlan of Tallow Hill, Tallow, died after a long illness. Tom, as he was known, was a member of a distinguished family. One of the oldest clans in Ireland, he traced his family back to Magog the grandson of Noah, Princess Scotia and the like, most of this can be verified by Seán Quinlan, Rattoo Museum, Knockpóg, Ballyduff, Co. Kerry.

But Tom made his own name in this world as a Basket Weaver extraordinaire, so much so, that two of his creations are in the White House, Washington DC and a full set of lounge furniture is at Buckingham palace.

Tom could have used on his billheads "By Royal Appointment," but being a gentle, humble type of man, he traced nor cared for any embellishments for the work he so dearly loved to do. His hands were gifted beyond ordinary skills; he could make almost anything, even a dollhouse and all its furniture, St. Brigid's Crosses, cane seats on really old chairs, pony trap seats and much, much more.

Among his clients he had many notable people, Lord Charles Cavendish, Adele and Fred Astaire, Duke and

Duchess of Devonshire, Lord and Lady Keane, Angela Lansbury. Each and everyone received the same treatment and care and consideration. The Technical Colleges courted him to teach his skills to others and many tv programmes invited him, but no one influenced Tom. One year he had a full window display on 5th Avenue, New York.

He was known far and wide, but he remained the gentle soul he always was. His delight and display was his lovely wife Kathleen R.I.P., his five children and eight grandchildren.

Linda, his eldest, now lives in New York, Colin is a Det. Sergeant in Laois, David is a mechanic (own business), Cynthia has a patisserie business and the youngest, Veronica, is now doing basket weaving, so Tom's skills go on. Take your rest Tom and guide us from your new home. Go ndéana Dia trócaire ar an am dílis.

It is hoped that his youngest sister Tessa from Australia, is going to set up a Memorabilia Museum in honour of these gentlemen and the Quinlan Clan at Tallow Hill, Tallow.

Age of Beauty

Hair Removal Waxing

Waxing has become very popular in recent years. It is a quick and easy way of removing large amounts of hair with little discomfort. Leg waxing, under arm and bikini waxing are most popular. But waxing can also be done on the facial area and eyebrows.

Warm or cool wax is usually used on large areas such as the legs. A very thin layer of wax is applied to the leg with a spatula in the direction of the hair growth. Then a fabric or paper strip is placed over the wax and rubbed so



that the wax sticks to it. The fabric is then pulled up against the direction of hair growth and the hairs come with it. Usually after waxing an anti-septic soothing lotion is applied. The skin may appear red and blotchy for a few hours, so it is important not to put any body lotions on or have a hot bath until the following day.

Bikini line, under arm and eyebrow waxing can be done

in the same way. Sometimes hot wax is used on these areas. Hot wax is applied the same as warm wax only there is no need to use a fabric strip to remove the wax. The hot wax is simply allowed to cool and it is then pulled off against the direction of the hair growth. Allergies rarely occur from using wax. The regrowth of hair after waxing is usually fine ended and feels soft in texture. Waxing is relatively low in cost and is done in most beauty salons. It is an easy way of removing large amounts of hair quickly.

FAMILY HEALTH



Q: My husband and I are separated and he now has a four-month old baby with the woman he has set up home. My youngest, who's six has become very sullen and bad-tempered.

She insists on phoning her Dad daily and refuses to settle at night unless he comes over to tuck her in. She also complains about living with me and says she wants to stay with her Dad. This is all very distressing. Should I agree to her demands even though it would break my heart?

A: This problem is not uncommon. Your daughter's behaviour shows that she misses her father and is worried about her place in his affections now that he has a new baby. Try not to take her anger personally. She has to express her feelings to someone with whom she feels safe. She is trying to cope with her jealousy and her hurt at what, in her mind, feels like being left out and replaced by another baby. Giving in to her demands would only increase her anxiety. Instead, you and her father need to talk about how to reassure your daughter that, although you have separated, you have not stopped loving her or caring about her.

Q: I get a pain in my lower abdomen in the middle of the month between my periods. I have been examined and was told that there was nothing wrong, but I still get the pain each month. Is it related to my periods?

A: It certainly is. It's likely to be pain that can occur in

a few women when ovulation occurs, - when one of the two ovaries in the lower abdomen produces its monthly ovum (egg). Its called mittelschmerz pain and, providing its not severe enough to warrant taking pain killing tablets, it should go quickly on its own.

Chef's Corner

Menus for the week

Caramel Shortbread

Preparation: 20 minutes + setting
Cooking: 25-35 minutes
Makes: 16 bars

Shortbread
100g/4oz butter
50g/2oz caster sugar
100g/4oz plain flour, sifted
40g/1 1/2 oz ground almonds

Caramel
175g/6oz butter
75g/3oz caster sugar
3 tsp golden syrup
1 1/2 (397g/14oz) cans condensed milk
Topping
225g/8oz plain chocolate, broken into squares
25g/1oz flaked almonds, toasted
cocoa powder for dusting

- Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line the base of a 20cm/8in square, loose-based cake tin.
- To make the shortbread, put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat together until pale and creamy. Add the sifted flour and ground almonds and mix to form a soft dough.
- Press the dough evenly into the prepared tin. Prick several times with a fork and bake in the preheated oven for 20-25 minutes until pale golden in colour. Leave in tin until cold.
- For the caramel, place all the ingredients in a nonstick, heavy-based saucepan. Slowly bring to the boil and cook over a gentle heat, stirring constantly, for 5-7 minutes until the mixture thickens and turns a pale caramel colour. If it starts to burn, remove from heat, discard burnt bits, stir vigorously to cool slightly then continue to cook until thickened.
- Spread the caramel over the shortbread and leave to set (about 40 minutes). Melt the chocolate squares in a heatproof bowl over a pan of gently simmering water. Spread over the set caramel layer, sprinkle with the flaked almonds and chill until set.
- Remove shortbread from tin. Cut into 16 bars and dust with cocoa powder to serve.

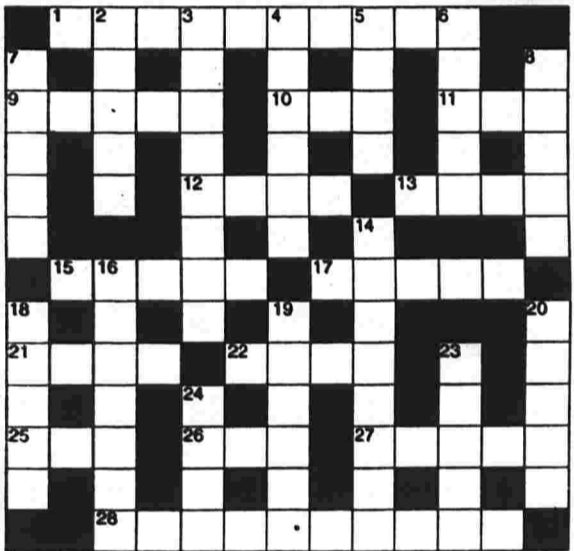

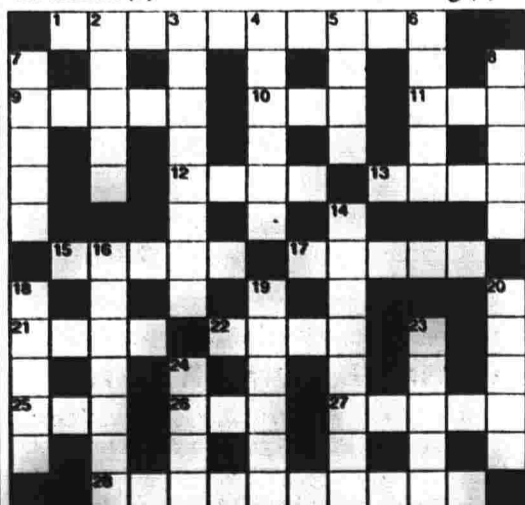

Mustard Pork With Caramelised Shallots

Serves: 4
2 tsp wholegrain mustard
3 tsp sunflower oil
2 tsp honey
1.1kg/2 1/2 lb joint loin of pork, rind removed
700g/1 1/2 lb shallots or baby onions, peeled
75g/3oz raisins
2 tsp white mustard seeds
150ml/1/4 pt cider
600ml/1 pt pork stock
450g/1 lb red-skinned apples, cut into wedges
crusty bread to serve

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. In a small bowl, mix the

mustard with 1 tsp each of the oil and honey and rub over the pork. Heat the remaining oil in a large roasting tin or flameproof casserole dish on the hob. Add the pork and cook for 4-5 minutes until browned all over. Remove and set aside. Add the shallots to the tin and fry for 5-8 minutes until golden. Add the raisins, mustard seeds and remaining honey. Cook for a further 5 minutes then, return to the pork tin or dish. Add the cider and stock and bring to the boil. Cover and cook in the oven for 2 hours, basting the meat and adding the wedges of apple after 1 hour. When cooked, the meat and shallots should be tender. Place the pork, shallots and apple wedges on a warmed platter and serve with crusty bread.

Cherry Cookies

Preparation: 15 mins
Cooking: 10 mins Makes: 20

175g (6oz) butter
75g (3oz) soft brown sugar
45ml (3 tbsp) clear honey
1 egg
100g (4oz) glace cherries
225g (8oz) self-raising flour
100g (4oz) porridge oats
Pinch of salt

METHOD: Preheat the oven to 180°C (350°F, gas 4). Place the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat together until mixture is light and fluffy. Add the clear honey. Cream again until well mixed. Beat in the egg. Chop the cherries into small pieces and fold into the creamed

mixture with the self-raising flour. Reserve 15ml (1 tbsp) porridge oats. Add the remaining oats, along with a pinch of salt, into the creamed mixture and stir to give a stiff consistency. For each cookie, place one heaped tablespoon of the mixture onto an oiled baking sheet. Leave plenty of room between each one to allow the biscuits to spread. Carefully flatten each biscuit slightly with the back of a spoon. Sprinkle the top of each one with the reserved porridge oats. Bake just above the centre of the oven for 10 mins, or until the cookies are lightly golden. Leave on the baking sheet to cool for 5 mins then lift onto a wire rack and cool completely. Store in an airtight container for up to five days.

Household Hints

- Remove nicotine from fingers by rubbing with a dab of acetone on cotton wool.
- If the ticking from your bedside clock prevents you falling asleep, cover the clock with a clear glass bowl. That way you will see the time but won't hear the ticking.
- Remove fish or onion smells on a knife blade by washing first in cold water and then in hot water.
- When listening to the radio while having a bath, protect it from the steam by placing it inside a plastic bag.
- Slip a rubber band over the bristles of your paint brush when doing a job that calls for great precision. This will bind the bristles together and help to give straight lines.

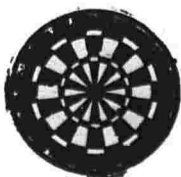

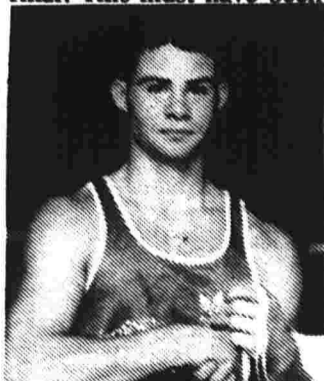
The fight got underway

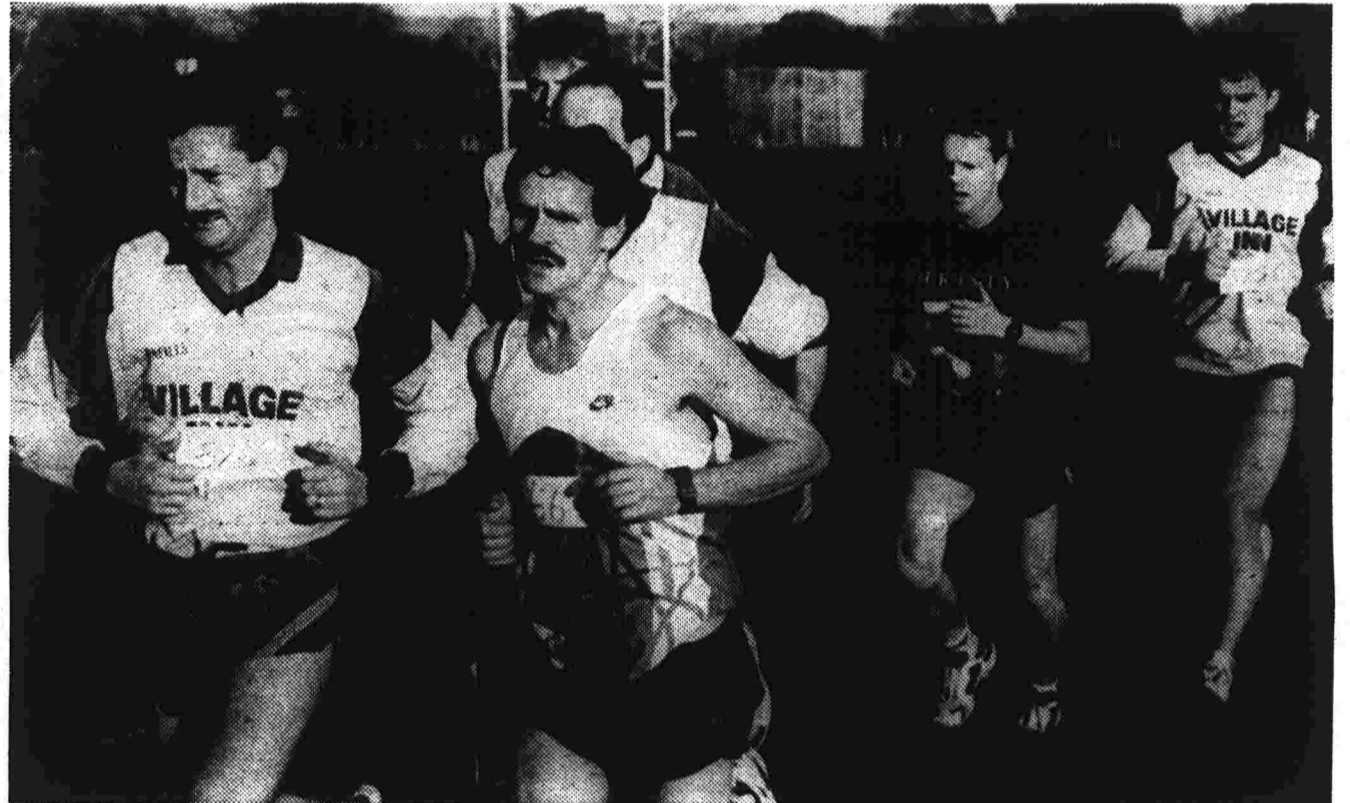

Special chapters are devoted to the achievement of the Ulster counties, Down (1991 and '94), Donegal (1992) and Derry (1993) in winning 4 successive All-Ireland titles in this decade and the history of the game is brought right up to date to include this year's All-Ire-

land final between Dublin and Tyrone. A chapter is devoted also to "the Jason Sherlock Phenomenon", the point being made that Sherlock proved "a godsend" to the GAA.

Smith argues that while the GAA would not welcome Jason-mania at every ground on every big occasion and even at training sessions, it certainly needs more players in the Jason Sherlock mould who will inspire emerging under-age players to emulate them. And not just in the Dublin colours but in the colours of other counties as well.

Down 1960-'61, Kerry 1978-'82 and Dublin 1976-'77 are named as the three greatest teams of the modern era with the ultimate accolade going to Kerry.

No GAA follower will want to be without this book, which is illustrated with 32 pages of the finest action pictures. It represents outstanding value at only £8.95 and an ideal Christmas gift.

Hurlers Take On Tipp. In Thurles In League

U-21 Hurling County Final At Portlaw

Waterford and Tipperary renew rivalry at Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday next when the counties meet in round 4 of the National League in what will be the final outing for both counties before Christmas.

It goes without saying that Waterford will travel more in hope than in confidence because of their form at the moment. Three defeats by Kilkenny, Clare and Cork have left us in an almost impossible situation as far as remaining in Div. One is concerned and to have a chance of avoiding relegation to Div. Two, we would need to win our three remaining games after Thurles. These will be against Kerry, Galway and Offaly — all after Christmas.

In the championship first round match in Cork this year, we were very close to Tipperary for almost 60 of the 70 minutes, before our effort began to fall asunder. They were unquestionably the fitter team — they had been preparing for the Munster championship for months, while Waterford were taken up with the league and obviously were focused on other things up to a few short weeks before our Munster championship game in Cork.

The why's and wherefore's of that game matter nothing now and the result here will depend on how the teams perform on Sunday. Everything points to the fact that Tipperary are a better team and have a more talented panel of players to choose from. This will make them warm favourites.

The Premier county team got off to a disappointing start to the league when they went down by six points to Offaly. However they won their next two matches even though they may have been poked with luck against Galway when an injury time goal won them a two points victory. Whatever about luck, they now have 4 points and a further 2 here would save them from any possible threat of relegation and bring them very close to qualifying for the knockout stages.

Tipperary will have Raymond, Declan and Aidan Ryan, Colum Bonner, Pat

Fox, Tommy Dunne, Billy Carroll, etc., all of whom are showing very good form already this year.

In the matter of points, the game does not seem to be all important to us, but there is prestige at stake and I know that a win here — unexpected though it is — would please the players and mentors no end. The satisfaction of beating Tipperary would compensate for a lot of disappointments since last June and it would boost our morale and very likely inspire the panel for the games to come in the New Year.

We certainly can afford to adopt a much more relaxed approach to the game than was required for the Pairc Uí Caoimh game and this in itself should be helpful in helping them play to their potential.

We certainly have a lot more than we seem to be giving at the moment, so who knows, but if the players — all the players — face up to this challenge with the proper attitude, they might find that Tipperary are not unbeatable.

The team will not be selected until midweek, but is unlikely to show any changes from the team which lined out against Cork.

Ray Barry will be named as goalie and I'm sure that Damien Byrne who played well (apart from one big mistake) against Cork will be at full back. Sean Cullinane will be in one corner and Ger Harris may be in the other although no one will be surprised if Jimmy Beresford is placed in here.

Tony Browne, Fergal Hartley and Stephen Frampton will unlikely be touched and remain as the half back line. Johnnie Brenner played well for most of the game at centre field against Cork, while Tom Fives did hit some good balls without having a great game. Michael O'Sullivan, Michael Hickey, Paul Flynn, Peter Queally, Sean Daly and probably Gary Gater will be favoured for the forward division. Billy O'Sullivan is

unlikely to be available for this game as he may be out of the country.

Generally the forwards were the big disappointment in the game against Cork, and this will be their opportunity to make up for that.

We are going up there as outsiders — no one will dispute that — and everyone must look as Tipperary as favourites to take the points, but I would not completely discount our chances. In similar circumstances before, we have surprised.

UNDER-21 HURLING REPLAY

I don't know how the Western champions, Ballyduff, are going to fare in this replay, but if they reproduce the same spirit and commitment as they did when they drew with the champions, Mount Sion, two weeks ago, they must have a chance of taking their first county title in this grade.

Their performance in Portlaw two weeks ago must surely give them great confidence which is always a necessary ingredient when lining out against the title-laden Monastery side. A victory for Ballyduff would give a tremendous boost to the club who have done some very commendable work at underage level over the past few years. Mount

Sion are always hard to beat and have a very good record in replays, even though this did not hold good in the replayed senior county final this year. Mount Sion will be favourites.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL COUNTY FINAL

The Western champions, Lismore, will certainly be hoping to do a lot better than when losing so heavily to Ferrybank in the hurling counterpart two weeks ago.

For a few years Lismore have been a force in football here in the West and while at least a couple of their victories, particularly against Emmetts in the divisional final and Tallow in the semi-final, they are quite a formidable group of footballers when they put their minds down to the job in hand.

The club have a respectable record of county football titles in the senior grade, but this relates to the early part of the century. Their six senior titles were won in 1899, 1900, 1901, 1902 (4-in-a-row), 1908 and 1911. In fact in 1911 the club completed the senior/junior football double after their juniors won the inaugural junior title. Also they have 3 Western junior football titles won in 1939,

1993 and 1995. They have also won football titles in every grade from minor down to under 14. The early championships won would have been for teams of 17 aside. When they won the divisional title in 1993, they lost to De La Salle by 2-12 to 1-6 in the final at Cappoquin. This year their victory over Emmetts was won on a very impressive scoreline of 1-16 to 1-6.

The team is captained by Brendan Ormond whose father Billy played hurling and football in the black and amber colours for very many years.

The Lismore team for the final will include Keith Hornibrook, Seamus Prendergast, F. Power, Ml. O'Sullivan, Ml. Hickey, Barney and Paul Prendergast, Brendan Ormond, Sean Daly, P. Quinn, Dan Shanahan, Alan Dunne, Kieran O'Gorman, Brendan Landers, etc and having disposed of the best that the division had to offer on their way to the final, they must be well fancied to take their first title in junior football in recent years.

Gaultier will be fielding their second string team. This group of players were held together, despite the demands for the release of some to help the senior team in the championship. Their policy seems to have paid off well. In the east final against

De La Salle, Gaultier looked quite impressive and certainly won't be easily disposed of. Still, I think that Lismore are good enough to survive.

New Style McGrath Cup

This new-style competition will be played in January and this year both Cork and Kerry will be eligible following an extraordinary Munster Council decision last month.

The quarter finals involving Waterford, Clare, Tipperary and Limerick will be played on January 14 and the winners will line out against Cork/Kerry on the following Sunday, January 21.

The final will take place a week later and the competition this time is to give the Munster selectors an opportunity of seeing players in action before naming their team for the Railway Cup first round.
