County Council Finally Agrees On Budget For 1996

BY AISLING CONROY

After weeks of acrimonious discussion, political standoffs and lengthy consideration, Waterford County Council finally came to an eleventh hour decision last Thursday, to accept the County Manager's Estimate of Expenses for 1996.

A mere three days before the statutory deadline for striking a rate, the Council teetered on the brink of abolition with the remote possibility that Co. Waterford could well be governed by a Government-appointed Commissioner.

Having made their protest against service charges and lack of proper local authority funding from central government, Fianna Fáil members were no longer under the stringent party whip and were able to make their own personal vote.

SLIGHT AMENDMENT

At the outset of the meeting held in Lawlor's Hotel, Co. Manager Donal Connolly proposed a slight amendment to the estimates report in that £5,000 be transferred from the provision for higher education grants to set up a County tourism initiative programme next year.

The amendment however did not result in an increase in charges, the proposed rate in the £ remained at CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I have a handicap and cannot take up a normal fulltime job. I am presently getting Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance of £62.50. I need to earn some money but am afraid I'd lose my DPMA if I did as it is means tested. Can you help?

People on DPMA, Disability Benefit or Invalidity Pension, who are registered with the National Rehabilitation Board (NRB), can take up rehabilitative work, provided it is recommended by the NRB, subject to the approval of the relevant Health Board (DPMA) or the Dept. of Social Welfare (Disability/Invalidity Pension). Part-time work (max. 20 hours), FAS training courses or Community Employment Schemes can be done.

In your situation on DPMA you can earn £34.10 and still retain your full DPMA. If you go on a Community Employment Scheme you would get £81.30 on the scheme and retain £15.30 of your DPMA. When the scheme ends you go back on to your original DPMA payment.

In the case of people who are on disability Benefit or Invalidity Pension they would get their full payment but both payments are taxable with other in-

It would be important for you to contact your nearest NRB Centre and register with them. The NRB will help you with information and guidance on planning your future. The NRB has a wide range of services and supports and you should stay in contact with your local NRB Adviser.



Junior Encyclopaedia

HIPPOS

The hippopotamus lives in swamps and rivers in parts of Africa. It spends up to 16 hours a day lazing about in the water. They feed all the time on grass and waterweed.

They are the second largest land animals and can weigh about 4 tons, stand about 5 feet (1.5 metres) high and be almost 14 feet (4.3 metres) long.

A male hippo is called a bull, a female is called a cow, and babies are called calves.

Even though they are so big, hippos can float with their bodies right under the water. This they do to stop insects biting them and to keep cool. They are excellent swimmers and divers also and can stay under the water for up to five minutes. They do not stay out of the water for very long as their skins tend to dry up quickly in the hot sup.

A hippo's nose, eyes and ears are on top of its flat head. It can keep most of its head under the water and still smell and hear very well. A hippo has



very big teeth which are used as powerful weapons.


These animals live in large herds,


the males of which are territorial and use their lower canines in fights during the mating season.

Hippos spend all night looking for food. The bull leads the way, the cows and calves follow. As they walk, the hippos trample down wild tracks. These tracks are called hippo trails and night after night they walk along the same trail in search of things to eat.

Hippos have enormous appetites.
They feed on branches, grass, roots
and leaves and at dawn when
they are full, they waddle back
into the water. Baby hippos are
born in the water and master the
art of swimming when they are
only minutes old.

Hippos love to bask and wallow in muddy pools. They take mud baths to get rid of insects from their skin and to keep themselves cool.


Diamonds On Tap!

County Council Finally Agrees On **Budget For 1996**

£36.27, a 3% increase on last year and a £5 increase in domestic water charges to £145 per annum. These increases, he maintained, were both in line with the rate of inflation and were the minimum increases necessary to provide a reasonable level of service for the County in 1996.





Deal Ends Conflict

South Tipperary/North West Waterford is poised to avail of a £12.5 million rescue package for its health services following ratification of an historic agreement between the South Eastern Health Board and Cashel Hospital Action Committee. The agreement was formally approved of by the S.E.H.B. on last Thursday and by Cashel Hospital Action Committee bringing to an end a bitter conflict over acute hospital services in South Tipperary that has lasted for almost a quarter of a century.

There will be 147 permanent jobs at Our Lady's Complex, Cashel as a result of the agreement, £3.2 million will be invested in Cashel; £4 million in the transfer of surgical facilities from Our Lady's Hospital Cashel to St. Joseph's, Clonmel and £800,000 invested in projects in Tipperary town. Surgeon at Cashel Mr. Paul Farrell who has been at Our Lady's Cashel since 1977 is to transfer to St. Lukes Hospital Kilkenny to a similar post. He will be re-

placed by a second surgeon.

The EU Commission's White Paper on Agriculture, has huge implications for the entire Irish agriculture sector.

ICMSA will now undertake a detailed examination of the implications of the document and make a considered response in the near future.

Farmers cannot afford to

just reject outright the proposals in the White Paper. We must come up with positive proposals and be involved in shaping a positive future for producers.

As an initial response, ICMSA is concerned about the implications for Ireland, arising from the proposals to leave much more of the day to day running of the Common Agricultural Policy to individual governments of member states, and give them some responsibility for direct income payments to farmers.



Interest Is Growing In An Old Favourite

Interest could be reviving in a former festive flowering star, despite more recent discoveries such as Christmas Cactl and Poinsettia, not to mention forced bulbs.

The old favourite was the carnation, which can create a colourful and elegant — if rather temperamental — indoor display for the winter months.

Our modern fascination with tradition — plus some more practical varieties from the nurserymen is now persuading some gardeners and indoor plant fans to grow these plants for Christmas once

Generally, they don't make good pot plants because they are 'leggy' and need support, though their long stems do make them excellent for cut flowers when grown indoors or in a cool greenhouse.

Even some garden varieties such as Chabaud,

will happily take to potting up and flowering in winter, but there are perpetual flowering varieties available from nurseries.

These specialist varieties usually have large showy blooms and



They are usually sold as rooted cuttings in winter or spring but also sell at a price, as full grown plants in the run-up to Christmas.

Cuttings need special care:

- Snip the tops when they have about 10 good leaf pairs.
- Once side shoots have developed good foliage, stop these too to promote further bushiness and heavy blooming.
- Stagger stopping to ensure steady replacement of blooms.
- Leave just one bud on each shoot to guarantee one large flower rather than several weak ones.
- Pot on steadily as the plant matures but stop when you reach a six-inch pot — this will maintain a free-flowering and compact plant.
- Support the carnations with canes or trellis made of wire or plastic. This will prevent stems buckling under the weight of the heavy blooms.

Your carnations also need special conditions, plenty of air and light, and moist soil.

Beware overwatering and causing stem rot, although you can insure against this by sprinkling limestone chips on the surface to absorb extra dampness likely to ruin the stems.

Carnations are less fussy about temperatures — 45°F at night and 60°F in the day is about right for this time of year - but the location must be free

If all this seems like too much trouble, you can also opt for spray carnations, which are suitable for pots and do not require bud removal.

The drawback is the small though abundant blooms, but they may inspire you to try the 'real

Mr. O'Rourke called on the Minister to seek the extensification premium for Irish sheep farmers as a recognition of the disadvantage suffered by Irish farmers because of the distance from the main EU market. There is no reason why Irish sheep farmers should be discriminated against vis-a-vis cattle farmers who already have an extensification premium.

Mr. O'Rourke also called on the Minister to pursue a reduction in the quality of New Zealand lamb into the Community. In addition the quota should be divided evenly over the year to avoid excessive quantities coming on the market at specific times of the year and depressing market prices.

IFA Says No Basis For Cattle Price Reductions

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has hit out strongly at people talking down cattle prices. He said that this is playing directly into the hands of the factories. Mr. Donovan said that there is no basis for any price reductions this week as the trade is buoyant in the run-up to Christmas.

In relation to export refunds, Mr. Donovan said the factual position is that the meat factories and the live exporters have up to 45,000 tonnes (c.w.e.) of export refunds pre fixed at the higher levels prior to the recent 25% cut and there is no justification for cattle price reductions at this stage.

In addition, Mr. Donovan said that the EU Commission confirmed to IFA last week that they will increase refunds soone rather than later, "IFA has stressed the importance of a full and immediate restoration of both beef and live cattle refunds to the EU Commission."

The Waterford IFA Livestock leader said that 45,000 tonnes of prefixed refunds is equivalent to in excess of 135,000 head of steers and would account for Third Country steer disposals into late February/early March, 1996.

Mr. Donovan said that the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, must deliver on reversing the refund cuts and deliver fast. He said: "There is no time for shadow boxing on this issue."

Increase In Sheep Scab Questioned By

Statement by ICMSA Sheep Committee Chairman, Eamon O'Rourke:

Reports about a rise in the incidence of sheep scab in Ireland have to be questioned in the light of the low number of calls made to the special confidential phone line set up by Junior Agriculture Minister Mr. Jimmy Deenihan, to assist with the reporting of sheep suspected of having the disease.

ICMSA has discovered that latest figures show only 17 calls were made to the special phone "hot line" service, reporting alleged sheep scab cases, between October 2 and November 12. This low level of calls gives no indication that there is a growing incidence of sheep scab in the country since the abolition of compulsory dipping of sheep in 1994.

I believe most farmers have taken a responsible attitude to the control of sheep scab and I do not believe there is a significant level of the disease in Ireland. But ICMSA believes there is no room for complacency by farmers or the Department of Agriculture.

The onus is on every farmer to treat this sheep to prevent this awful disease which causes terrible suffering to affected livestock. Farmers should be aware that a significant spread in sheep scab would do untold damage to our image abroad as quality sheep producers.

Department vets should undertake spot checks at meat factories and marts to ensure the disease is kept under control.

Lamb Industry To Halt For Day In Support of **Sheep Farmers**

try's sheep farmers con- ewes in 1992. verged in Dublin last Tuesday, IFA President John Donnelly welcomed the show of support from the industry where lamb export plants had brought brought operations to a halt for the day and lorries joined protesters on the streets of the capital city.

Mr. Donnelly said this support was an indication of how grave the situation had become for Ireland's £300 million sheep industry.

Commenting on the demonstration, Waterford IFA County Chairman declared: "It is no exaggeration to say that the income situation in the sheep sector is at crisis point. Teagasc figures show that over the past 6 years, incomes among sheep farmers have collapsed by a frightening 36%, even before account is taken of this year's unprecedented collapse in lamb prices.

"The consequences have been traumatic. Since 1991 over 5,700 producers have been forced out of sheep farming because of low incomes and the national sheep flock has reduced by a massive 350,000 head from

He explained that when account is taken of this year's Easter lamb price collapse, early lamb producers are facing a halving of their incomes in that period.

Mr. Murphy vowed that the IFA protest march from St. Stephen's Green to the gates of Leinster House, would send the strongest possible message to the Minister for Agriculture and the Government that an EU aid package must be delivered. He said: "IFA is demanding that Minister Yates delivers a package of £8 per head Ewe Premium top-up across the country plus £5.37 head in rural World Premium for producers in Non-Disadvantaged Areas."

Pat Murphy one again thanked the farmers in Co. Waterford who gave up their valuable time to attend the protest and especially farmers who came out in support of sheep farmers. Commenting, he said, the attendance of 10,000 farmers highlights the seriousness of the situation.

Finally, he thanked the agri-business sector for their sponsorship of buses on the day.

"On my honour and with the help of God, I.... promise to do my best and



Keher — Many performers of this important skill have matches he amassed huge tobeen mentioned over the last couple of weeks and some I haven't mentioned include Charlie McCarthy and Philly Grimes, Charlie's style I admired, except on those days when he opposed Waterford! His method was the nearest to Eddie Keher's that I can remember. And I have clear memory of how firmly Charlie stroked the ball; no matter how close the free he hit it so hard, that it was accelerating on its way over the black spot of the crossbar. His lift was like himself in full flight: quick and positive. He was so correct in striking hard because even if he made imperfect contact with the ball the forceful follow through en-

Mention of that follow through always reminds me of my friend and team mate Philly Grimes, R.I.P., whose vast array of hurling skills precluded none that mattered. And when it came to free taking Philly was as fine as we have seen. Philly, of course, was so talented and versatile that he could be played in any position on the field, but generally and most notably he was a midfielder or forward of unrivaled class. In those areas of the field a good free taker was essential if concession of frees by the opposition were to be properly punished. Philly regularly exacted the full price from his opponents for any indiscretion of their's within reach of the posts but up to the 1957 All Ireland he used to lift and almost lob the ball softly over the bar rather than whip

sured that it kept line.

thtrough it. In the All Ireland of 1957 against perennial foes Kilkenny, Philly played a great game. Waterford, on the day, were a superior team to the Cats and were deservedly ahead well into the second half. A midfield weakness and selectorial indecision allowed Kilkenny to rally and with two minutes left they clung on to a one point lead. Waterford were awarded a free some 40 yards from the Kilkenny goal. Philly stood over it, lifted and struck but the ball was only barely scraping over Ollie Walsh's crossbar when Ollie stretched his left arm to snatch move and clear away down field. Nobody really blamed the taker of the free, but Philly himself always regretted not striking firmly and following through fully, as he told me a couple of years later in happier times, when Waterford were crowned champions. Ever afterwards he made certain that like Charlie Mc-Carthy, he propelled his frees

with vigour. With all due respect to all the free takers I've seen- and Seamus Treacy and Eddie Condon and Pat Murphy won admiration on their day - one name I suggest stands out from all of the others - Eddie Keher. I have never seen a better man at the job. Statistics testify to his consistency and the greatness of Keher was in that almost metronom-

Free Taking and Eddie ic consistency. In club, tournament, league or championship tals as he smashed in goals and floated over points. Whenever he was missing from the Kilkenny team they suffered. Injured, and unable to field in the 1973 All Ireland clash with Limerick Eddie had to watch as the Shannonsiders emerged victorious. The following year was a repeat meeting of the same sides on the first Sunday of September and this time the Cats had a resounding victory with Eddie scoring something like 2-9, all but 1-2 from frees (including a penalty).

He more than any other man influenced his team's big match results and he was such a consistent performer, that you knew before the throw in that Kilkenny had at least an eight point head start, no matter who provided the opposition. No one from Christy Ring to D. J. Carey (both of whom I came to know and admire) came near Keher as a score taker and although we are firm friends now, and have been for many years, I hated the sight of him in a Kilkenny jersey especially around 1963.

I first came across Eddie in

1959 when he appeared in the black and amber for the All Ireland replay against Waterford. Although still a minor the Kilkenny mentors recognised his exceptional talents and brought him on for this game. He scored that day and I can still see him as he stood over the ball for a 21 yards free late in the game, with the Decies comfortably ahead. A goal was on his mind and we knew it. He lifted cleanly and drove for the corner of the net. Alas for Eddie, just as Brian Corcoran did in the league match in Dungarvan a month ago, his shot went whizzing past our left hand post and wide. He was too young then to have developed the technique that would rattle the net so often afterwards and too inexperienced to know how a penalty (because that was the nearest to a penalty in those days) should be taken. In his subsequent long and illustrious career, spanning three decades (1959 to the seventies) Eddie gave a great deal of thought to free taking and invested a huge amount of his time in perfecting the art, so that he played an enormously important role in the Kilkenny success story of that period, setting new scoring records in the process.

I faced Keher pretty often over the next ten years, but the day that remains etched in my memory, bitter memory, is the All Ireland of 1963 which Kilkenny were fortunate to win by a couple of points. Having sailed through Munster that year achieving a notable victory over a good Tipperary team in the Munster final, there was no lack of confidence in the Waterford camp. We had proved in the League, Oireachtas and championship - all of which we won - that there was no other team in the land better than us. We had met Kilkenny in a challenge game on a June are no perman evening in Kilkenny and al-Rightly so.

though we respected them we knew after that match that we were well capable of beating them, should our sides meet in a final later on in the year.

As with all teams that emanate from the Noreside county their 1963 team had skill and craft but they were short in two or three positions. Johnny McGovern, a cultured wing back, was placed at centre forward, and we all knew that "ní féidir leis and saol capall ráis a dhéanamh d'asal"; donkeys don't win derbies! Johnny was completely underestimated. So, too, were the whole Kilkenny team by most outside of their county. Because of that failure to sense danger the management of the team, or to be more specific the team trainer, failed to prepare Waterford either physically or mentally. We went out stone cold into the final and paid dearly for our collective negligence. In All Ireland terms we were neither physically nor mentally ready for the fray. Besides on the day we were visited by as much ill luck as it is possible to en-

The story of the game is like the average Irish weather forecast - bright (Waterford) spells and showers (of Kilkenny attacks and scores). It was not that we played very badly. In fact we made a fine start and seemed to be justifying the general confidence which had been reposed in the Decies. But to return to Eddie Keher.

From the early minutes when Kilkenny were awarded their first free Keher pointed everything within sight of our posts and by the final whistle he had put over an incredible 14 points from frees as well as three more and a goal from play and despite all of Waterford's good hurling it was the Cats who were purring at the final whistle.

Keher performed another important task that day. Tommy Murphy (Fr. Tommy nowadays, a curate in Callan) and Eddie found time and opportunity to carry out full frontal charge on the Waterford goalie midway through the first half which left him (the goalie) with two fractured ribs. The goalie's distress and obvious, he told the selector that he was injured and couldn't draw his breath, but they took no action. Only when the doctor confirmed at half time that he (the goalie) was unfit to continue was a replacement introduced. Too late. You bet your life that bitter vengeful thoughts exercised the injured man's mind for a couple of painful weeks afterwards.

Time, however, eases aches and heightened passions subside. Eddie and myself became firm friends a couple of years later, and that friendship has endured ever since. I don't know if footballers have that penchant for reconciliation but hurlers rarely harbour a grudge against another player for long. For them, in the words of John F. Kennedy, there are no permanent enemies.

Q. Recently we have found our daughter of six either sitting up in bed wide-eyed or wandering around the upstairs of the house at night. At times it is very eerie and is beginning to worry both my husband and myself.

A. Sleep walking rarely occurs with grownups and is more common with children prior to adolescence. The causes are not completely known; some incident could be playing on the mind.

A visit to your general practitioner is not really necessary, only if it persists then he or she may prescribe a mild sedative. An immediate treatment would be to have a discussion with your daughter to discover what, if anything, might be worrying her. In the meantime, for her own safety secure all windows and doors at night - both downstairs as well as upstairs, as she may be able to nego-tiate the stairs in this state just as good as if she were awake. If you discover her sleep-walking again do not wake her, it will not harm her contrary to a popular myth but it could frighten her and leave her feeling puzzled; simply guide her gently back to her bed, which can normally be achieved without much difficulty.

Q: My young daughter recently had her hearing tested by a medical officer at her school. He told us our daughter's hearing was perfect but didn't ask her at any stage whether or not she could hear - the

results were just read from a graph which was printed out from the machine she used. How does this work?

A: When a sound is received by the brain, a very small muscular reflex steadies the eardrum. By inserting the end of an instrument into the ear so it fits snugly, sounds of different frequencies and powers can be introduced,

and the eardrum reflex can be measured by the instrument. This detects, and prints out, the small pressure changes in the ear. It certainly provides an effective and accurate means of measuring and recording the hearing function and confirms that the moving parts of the ear, as well as the nerves of hearing, are working properly.

Many clubs will go for the status quo and I know that a good number are in favour of a twelve team championship in both codes and played in groups of six.

Whatever the final decision of the County Board on the matter, it is imperative that the championships be so structured as to ensure an early finish. I know that a splendid attempt was made this year to get things fin-ished in good time before the national leagues began, but a number of drawn matches at the knock out stages (as well as in the county final) wrecked our plans here.

Travelling Back In Time

This very interesting publication which was officially launched on Friday night last deals in delightful detail with the life and times of the Affane/Modeligo community over a very long period. The pictorial content of the book has some very rare and interesting pictures which depict the lifestyles of the older generation out in the area.

The sporting and cultural life of the people and the other activities in which they were engaged or involved in down through the years are not forgotten in this lovely publication by author Michael Phelan, who is a very well known GAA personality who wore the county jersey with distinction in the Munster championship several years ago.

We wish Michael every success with the book and hopefully it will be given the support it deserves.

Proposals For Change

In recent times the acceptance of sponsorship — and especially from Guinness Group — the open debate on Rule 21 which relates to the abolition of the ban on allowing British forces and police into the Association, etc., have all been part of the mood of change running through the entire G.A.A.

Now a special group known as the Hurling Development Committee, have come up with new and exciting proposals to bring about badly needed change on the playing front and these will be debated and discussed by clubs and counties throughout the country in the lead up to annual Congress in London in April.

LEAGUE PROGRAMME AND CHAMPIONSHIP

The proposals in this regard are that the hurling league and championship be combined and run off in one calendar year.

The beaten Provincial finalists in Leinster and Munster (senior and minor), contest the All Ireland quarter finals against the winners of Connaught and/or Ulster for a trial two-year period.

Revamped All Ireland intermediate and junior championships be introduced and that Munster be combined with Connaught and Leinster at under 21 level. The programme of league matches would begin with Round One on the first Sunday in March and would be played fortnightly afterwards until the knockout stages are reached. The deadline date for Round 7 would be June 14.

The quarter finals and semi-finals would take place in July, August and the final in October.

The proposals for the championship provide for a start around May 18 with the Provincial finals taking place on the first two weekends in July.

The hurling semi finals (with the minor finals) will take place on different dates and the All Ireland as usual on the first Sunday in September.

The Hurling Committee are agreed that the change would make for a much more streamlined intercounty season and would place far less demands on players while also increasing spectator interest, media profile, gate receipts and sponsorship appeal.

The most of inter county hurling would take place during good weather and damage to playing fields would be reduced considerably.

The revamped league format will make an effective method of championship preparation and will eliminate the need for challenge games, etc.

During the coming weeks and months it will be interesting to hear the views of players, clubs and Board officials on the subject, which is certain to arouse much débate.
