Tragic Deaths Two Ardmore The Ardmore The

The small traditional fishing village of Ardmore was dealt a severe blow last weekend with the tragic deaths of two local fishermen who drowned in Ardmore Bay last Friday evening (December 8th).

28 year old Edmond Fitzgerald, Cliff Road, Ardmore and Paul Dunne (30) of Dysart, Ardmore got into difficulties in the bay last Friday before being swept to their deaths from their 25ft fibreglass fishing boat.

First cousins and best friends, the two men left Ardmore pier at 2.30 p.m. last Friday to fish off Ballyquin. They were due to return 2 hours later but the alarm was raised around 6.30 p.m. A comprehensive sea and air search was subsequently mounted. The Youghal lifeboat which put to sea at 7.10 p.m. under helmsman Fergus Hopkins, recovered the body of Paul Dunne at 8.45 p.m. He was found entangled in his own

28 year old Edmond nets just 500 yards from the Ballyquin shoreline, where their boat had earlier been found smashed on the rocks.

Mr. Dunne was pronounced dead after he was cut free from his fishing nets and the search continued for his first cousin, presumed drowned, up to midnight.

Hopes soon faded of finding Edmond Fitzgerald alive and the community's worst fears were realised on Sunday morning when his body was recovered at Glencorran cove. Shortly before 8.30 a.m., local fishermen Jimmy Roche of Clashmore, Tommy Roche, Youghal Bridge and Clashmore publican Mossy Curran found the second victim at high water mark on the beach near Ballyquin.

A COMMUNITY IN GRIEF

It is not yet known how the double tragedy occurred. Both men were popular and well known members of the community and hailed from local and respected families. Many local fishermen believe that the men were swept overboard in the easterly wind and the very strong swell as they were attempting to haul in their nets. Their deaths have cast a dark shadow of sorrow over the entire community - the tragedy made all the more poignant by the proximity of Christmas and the fact that Paul Dunne's wife Claire gave birth to their only child, a daughter just 3 weeks ago.

On Sunday night, the remains of the two men were removed from the Kiely Funeral Home in Dungarvan to St. Declan's Church, Ardmore. The depth of sadness and the enormity of the tragedy which has engulfed the entire area was truly reflected in the thousand strong turn out who packed the Church to capacity. The remains were received by local Parish priest, Canon Daniel O'Connor and curate Fr. Pat Butler.

On Monday morning, there were more agonising scenes of grief as the infant daughter of drowned fisherman Paul Dunne was christened just yards from her father's coffin. Baby Jane was christened at a heart-breaking ceremony which preceded the Mass, by Fr. Butler.

Over two thousand people were present for the funeral of the first cousins, presided over by Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. William Lee. Hundreds more gathered outside St. Declan's Church, no space being available in the crowded Church.

Know Your Rights

I am renting a bedsitter and working. How do I claim tax relief on the rent I pay?

ANSWER

Since 6th April 1995 tax relief is available to all tax payers living in private rented accommodation. There are different amounts of relief for those under 55 and those over 55:

Under 55 - Single: £500, Widowed: £750, Married: £1000.

Over 55 - Single: £1000, Widowed: £1500, Married: £2000.

The relief given is at the standard rate of tax (27%). So, if a single person under 55 claims relief of £500, the value to them will be £135. For those over 55 the relief is at their higher tax rate.

In order to claim the relief get form Rent1 (for over 55s), form Rent2 (for under 55s), at your local tax office. The information required on the form includes the name of the landlord or agent, and the landlord's RSI Number. If you have difficulty getting the information or documentation to support your claim, you should contact your tax office. A receipt for rent paid has to be supplied if requested by the Revenue Commissioners.

Local I.D. Card Scheme To **Curb Underage Drinking**



A new identity card scheme aimed to cut out underage drinking throughout West Waterford was launched recently in the Park hotel by the Waterford County Vintners Association in conjunction with Dungarvan Gardai.

two card system, green for over 18's and a red card for those below the legal 18 years age limit. Identity cards can only be obtained on Saturdays between 4 and 6 p.m. at Dungarvan Garda Station where applicants accompanied by a parent or guardian, will be required to produce a birth certificate, a passport photo and to fill in

This new I.D. scheme will operate in pubs throughout the Dungarvan Garda District, encompassing Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Aglish, Ring and Ballymacarbry.

I.D. cards will be demanded by publicians throughout these area thereby ensuring that no one under 18 will be able to purchase alcoholic drink in any licensed premises in the Dungarvan Garda District.

Officially launching the scheme was Bill Martin, Chairman of the Waterford Vintners Association while also present were Inspector Michael Blake, a driving force behind the new scheme, Superintendent Pat Quinn, Sergeant Michael Lacey and the Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer Eddie Fitzpatrick. Both Sgt. Lacey and Garda Fitzpatrick will have the responsibility of issuing the LD. cards.

In launching the scheme, Mr. Martin stressed that publicians were as anxious as anyone to stamp out underage drinking. "With this new I.D. scheme we can now ask for identification, and I hope that in the Dungarvan area we can sow the seeds to eliminate underage drinking throughout the rest of county Waterford," said the Vintner Chairman.

PEACE OF MIND

Inspector Blake who has been an instrumental force in getting the scheme off the ground, said that as a result of the I.D. cards, "parents can have peace of mind now that they know their teenagers will not be served alcohol."

It's important, he stressed, that people be informed about the dangers of drinking at an early age. "Our approach to alcohol awareness should be a whole community effort" he urged. "Only then will we have a successful means of curbing the problem of underage drink-

The Dungarvan Inspector submitted that off-licence

the scheme and only with their support and the support of publicians, teachers, parents and students alike can the scheme be success-

Speaking on the whole issue of alcohol abuse, Insp. Blake warned that positive measures and the provision of attractive facilities for young people are vital in the battle against underage drinking. There is a need, he claimed, for hotels and clubs to provide alcohol free facilities that would attract young people.

In conclusion, Insp. Blake praised the stand taken by the Vintner's Association against underage drinking as a positive move.

This scheme goes a long way down the road towards protecting our children until they can make rational decisions themselves," he added.

launch, Supt. Pat Quinn described the new scheme as 'a partnership'. The Gardai, he continued, hoped to see young people "storming the station", in their hundreds in the coming Saturdays to participate.

Junior Encyclopaedia

PENGUINS

Penguins cannot fly and their short legs make them awkward on land. If they have to move anywhere fast, they slide on their tummies. Penguins, among all other birds, can swim the fastest. They all live by the sea, in big groups called rookeries. They catch squid and fish to eat when they are hungry. The life span of a penguin is 25-30 years, but whales and sea lions hunt them down and skuas come down from the air and attack the chicks.

We might think there is just one type of penguin, but in fact there are 18 species. Some of the species are Jackass penguins, Rockhopper penguins, Emperor penguins and Gentoo penguins. Pen-guins have thickly-padded oily feathers which keep the water out and keeps them warm. If they feel too hot, they fluff up their feathers and hold out their

Their streamlined body is like that of a torpedo. They 'fly' through the water by using their wings as flippers and can shoot out of the water onto the land and drop safely in one leap.

Penguins habits are more or less the same, but I will write about two of the species:


Rockhopper penguins - These are noisy, small and very playful. They don't live on ice, but on rocky coastlines. Rockhopper penguins are able to climb up the rocks, using their hooked bills and sharp claws. They build their nests in the caves, between the rocks or on clumps of grass. Rockhopper penguins get their name because of their skill in hopping from ledge to ledge. When they meet each other they greet by lifting their bills and squawking.


Emperor penguins — For the winter, these type, group into single file and go to nesting grounds inland. Because they have eaten all summer they have built up a layer of fat and this keeps them warm. Year after year the same pair of penguins mate. The female lays one egg on the ice and then goes back to the sea to


The male minds the egg and keeps it warm. He does this by putting the egg on his feet and covering it with his loose tummy skin. The egg is hidden and pro-tected and the male hardly moves and doesn't eat until the female comes back.

The egg hatches in eight weeks and the mother comes back to look after her chick. The male, then half his weight, goes to get food. The male and female take it in turns to feed the chick. They do this by bringing up partly digested food from their crops or by regurgitating.

While their parents are away, the older chicks huddle together to keep warm. The parents and chicks go







You Can Count On A Cactus To Add Up

If there's one thing you can count on, it's a cactus. Or, if that doesn't add up, try a saffron. Both plants can count and do simple sums, says an electronics expert. Dr. Ken Hashimoto, a lie detector expert with the Japanese police, believes that plants react to the human

And, he says, many of them can 'talk' back.

Dr. Hashimoto, 58, of Tokyo, hooked up a cactus to a liedetector machine.

Noticing that the needle moved when he talked to the plant, he tried an experiment.

"I asked it what one plus one was," he says. "I was astounded when the needle on the graph jumped twice in reply.

He tried more tests and claims the cactus could add up to 20. Dr. Hashimoto says a saffron

plant, a form of crocus, can also

He is convinced that plants have feelings and communicate with people.

He has invented a machine which, he says, transforms sounds from plants into vowels which can be heard. Others also claim new discoveries about plants. London electronics engineer, Jeremy Lord, says that house plants make a beautiful flute-like musical sound.

It varies in tone, pitch and rhythm according to their environment and whether they like the person in the room. He has produced a machine for listening to the music of plants, which he calls a "bio-activity translator." It works through an electrode clipped on the leaf of the plant. Begonias are the best, musically-speaking, he

Another talking-point concerns the leaves of the mallow weed. Its leaves, and those of many others, follow the movement of the sun's light, turning towards it as it moves across the sky during the day.

As soon as the sun sets, the mallow weed's leaves turn to face the east, where the sun will rise again in the morn-





This Week Teagasc Says

Dry cows should be gaining weight at a rate that will leave them in good condition, but not too fat at calving. Where silage is good and the cows will be dry for two months or more, they could be restricted if the feeding system is suitable. Dry cows will do quite well on a small feeding space of 6 to 8 inches where they have silage in front of them all the time. But, where silage is restricted, they will need a long feed space of about two feet per cow since they will want to eat when the new silage is supplied.

First calvers need a bit of extra care and feeding and should not be restricted in any situation. Those heifers that milked very well usually dry off in this condition, and these need a bit of meal, especially where the silage is not of top quality.

Many farmers feed some dry cow minerals, or leave out licks or mineral buckets, during the dry period. Many others do nothing at all in this regard. When problems arise later on, some farmers get blood mineral analyses carried out. The majority of blood samples that are analyzed in Grange are low in one or two or all of the important minerals such as Magnesium, Selenium, Iodine

On farms where certain problems exist, such as retained cleanings, too much milk fever, too many difficult calvings, calves weak, dead or die quickly, cows not coming on heat when they should and too many repeating cows, a dry cow mineral should be fed. It can be spread on top of the silage. Many good results have been achieved from dry cow minerals, but it will not solve every fertility problem or anything like it.

PREVENT ENVIRONMENTAL MASTITIS

This is an acute form of mastitis which is the cause of serious loss in some dairy herds. It is associated with wet and soiled bedding. It is best controlled by keeping cows clean and dry.

Soiled passages should be scrapped twice daily.

Cubicles houses should have a good airy atmosphere to prevent condensation and damp bedding.

Cubicles should be re-bedded frequently with dry sawdust, chopped straw or sand.

Tail clipping helps to reduce the spread of disease from passages and cubicles to the udder and from cow to cow. Cows should always calve in a clean pen.

WEANLINGS

The target growth rate for weanlings would be in the order of 0.5 to 0.7 kg. per day, the higher figure for good continental cross male weanlings and those that are younger and lighter at weaning. This represents a gain in weight over the winter of 80 to 110 kgs. per head. Heavy weanlings (over 280 kg.) fed excellent silage to appetite would achieve the target weight. However, most weanlings are fed on moderate quality silage or hay and meal supplementation is necessary to achieve targets.

Indeed Dr. Michael Drennan, Grange, recommends that all weanlings should get about I Kg. of meal/day even on good silage because of the very attractive liveweight response to a low level of meal feeding. For suckled weanlings, it is very worthwhile to feed meal for the first two months after housing while they are adapting to a high roughage diet. After that, if silage is very good and animals are performing well, the meal can be reduced or withdrawn.

At Athenry, Dr. Tom Nolan feeds 2 kg. meal with good silage to continental cross weanlings until January 1st and then reduces the meal to 1 kg/day. With moderate quality silage, the heavy weanlings should get at least 1 kg. meal/day and light weanlings (under 220 kg.) 2 kg. meal/day. These meal rates need to be increased by 0.5 to 1.0 kg. when feeding low quality silage and aver-

When weanlings are to be sold in spring the above rates can be increased to 1 kg./day as the immediate additional gain can be cashed in at the point of sale.

LICE

There is usually a build up of lice about now on all stock but infestation spreads more easily on housed cattle. The pour-on treatments are the most convenient to use and will control lice for 6 to 8 weeks.

SHEEP: WINTER SHEARING

The three main advantages claimed for winter shearing

Higher birth weight; Lower requirement for house space; Greater ewe comfort due to a reduction in heat

The management of winter shorn ewes requires careful planning to avoid the possibility of cold stress immediately after shearing and before or after turn-out. Shearing should be carried out at least 8 weeks before turnout to grass, ensuring that 12 mm of fleece has grown by that date.



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Christmas Isn't Christmas Without

Christmas simply wouldn't be Christmas without holly.

No other plant has highlighted the festive season so well for so long.

Common holly, with its red berries and attractive shiny green leaves, lives up to its name by being common across Europe and Asia.

But this family of attractive evergreen plants has many more varieties, some with even more attractive foliage to liven the garden all year round as well as be cut for indoor decoration.

Apart from being effective specimen trees, holly can also be planted to create tough and impenetrable hedges as high as 10 feet and able to withstand close-clipping and shaping.

But the holly or llex family's slow growth characteristics do make hedges a rather long term project - even transplanting mature trees can be tricky.

However, the process can be speeded up as much as possible by yearly mulching with well rotted manure or compost around the base of the trees.

Though not particularly fussy about soil, they prefer planting into a mixture of peat and soil and, broadly speaking, prefer clay areas.

They can also cope with any atmosphere, from city smog, to salty coastal air.

Shade is not a problem, though variegated types show their contrasts better in a sunny position.

If you want berries you also need to buy at least one male and one female to plant close to each other - the berries are produced by the female unless you opt for one of the fewer self-fertilising varieties such as JC van Tol.

The same variety is also useful if you want a holly without spines, but if you want a tough hedge to keep burglars and neighbours' dogs at bay then choose the prickly Madame Briot.

If you are more interested in arresting the eye rather than intruders, check the dark green and gold displays by the Golden King and Queen varieties, but don't be confused when buying - the king is the

Moonlight Holly is another eye-catcher, thanks to variegated leaves of yellow and dark gold.

If silver is more to your taste, then seek the attractions of Argentina Marginata or Handsworth New

Other variations include:

Ferox has a carpet of small spines on its crinkly leaves as well as prickly edges.

Bacciflava has beautiful yellow berries.

Mariesli bears black berries but is also a dwarf variety with small attractive leaves - an ideal specimen tree for small gardens or terraces.

But Eddie had his left hand on top with his right hand gripping underneath it. He was swiping away enthusiastically with this grip one Saturday morning on the village green of his native Inistioge when and old man, driving a donkey and cart bearing a solitary churn hove in sight. Observing the lad in action he stopped, "young Keher", he shouted removing the pipe from his mouth, "you're houldin' the stick all wrong. Put your other hand on top and you'll play better". Eddie laughed nervously and resumed his hurling.

Later that evening he told his father about the old timer's advice and his dad suggested that he give it a try. After initial awkwardness he gradually discovered that he had a more fluent, natural swing. And from both sides

He never looked back and continued to grow into the great striker he eventually became. All thanks to the observations of a man who could so easily have been ignored. Eddie told me that story when we met in Kilkenny some years ago on the occasion of a hurling instruction course for teachers. I asked him to come in and tell that story to those on the course. And he did.

Eddie's commitment to regular practice ensured that self-confidence was never lacking. He used to go down to the pitch with his son Eamonn plus half a dozen slio-tars. There for an hour he systematically carried out a schedule. He started with the easiest frees - from the 21 and right in front of the goal and then moved right and left of that spot to gradually nar-row the angle. After this, the frees were from further out from the goal, again starting from the centre followed by right, of that position. On match days he always spent time in the forenoon preparing for what he would be required to do a few hours later. No wonder he was such a deadly marksman.

another working day in the body on the sea shore. The lives of the Ardmore fishing community. With no major storms forecast two local fishermen Edmond Fitzgerald and Paul Dunne set about their normal chore, to haul their nets just off Ardmore Bay.

As darkness fell and the fishing duo failed to report home from their fishing trip, the emergency services both local and national were alerted and an all out search began. When some of the wreck from the men's boat was washed ashore their worst fears were confirmed, something tragic had happened. Within hours of beginning the search a body later identified as Paul Dunne was found, as the search was scaled down for the night and all hopes of finding Edmond Fitzgerald alive faded.

From first light the search continued throughout Saturday, the local community and friends stood by the Fitzgerald family supporting them in their anguish. Again darkness fell on another day and the waiting continued for the Fitzgerald family who had little left to hope for except to find their son's body and give him peaceful

The Sunday morning search commenced at day break and all the prayers were answered when three local men Jimmy Roche, Tommy Roche and Mossie

Friday December 8th vet cated Edmond Fitzgerald waiting was over but the most heartbreaking task of identifying her only son was undertaken by Mrs. Maisie Fitzgerald.

Once again Ardmore was living through the nightmare of twelve years previous when again two fishermen Liam Lincoln and Tommy Morrissey members of this small Ardmore fishing fraternity - which consists of about twenty fishermen in all - lost their lives in a simi-

lar situation. Both Paul Dunne and Edmond Fitzgerald, who were first cousins and had been inseparable friends throughout their lives were members of families steeped in fishing traditions. Both have fished those waters from a young age and had a deep knowledge of the sea and the tides. They both loved the sea, how cruel that those who loved her most should become victims of her anger.

On Sunday evening people from Ardmore, Grange and the surrounding areas came in their thousands, numbed and shocked by the events of recent days, to support the Dunne and Fitzgerald families in their grief as the bodies of both men were welcomed home to St. Declan's Church, by Fr. Pat Butler. The remains were met and blessed and the prayers were recited by Fr. Butler assisted by Fr. Gerard O'Connor, Clashmore and Curran from Clashmore lo- Fr. O'Leary from Bal-

On Monday again the village of Ardmore came to a stand still as Bishop William Lee concelebrated Mass. In life Paul and Edmond were inseparable and in death both were laid to rest, side by side in the new cemetery at Monea, Ard-

Edmond Fitzgerald was the only son of Maisie and Mick Fitzgerald and he had two sisters Mary Murray and Catherine Fitzgerald.

Paul Dunne was a member of a large family and he was predeceased by his father Michael Dunne, a well known cabinet maker in this area. He was married to Claire and just a few weeks ago the couple celebrated the birth of their infant daughter Jane who was christened on Monday morning prior to her fathers burial. Paul is also survived by his mother Mrs. Peggie Dunne, his brother Philip, Michael, Eamonn and Pat, his sisters Catherine, Bernie, Angela, April and Valerie.

To both families we extend our deepest and heartfelt sympathy.

2 large carrots, peeled and cut into thin sticks 1 (2.5cm/1in) piece fresh

METHOD: Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas mark 4. Cut out four 30cm/12in squares of greaseproof paper. Place a fillet of fish in the middle of each piece of greaseproof paper. Mix the spring onions, peppers, carrots and ginger, then use to cover the fish. Sprinkle with the lemon and lime juices. Season well with salt and freshly ground pepper. Bring together the edges of the greaseproof paper and fold to make a parcel. Place the parcels on a baking sheet and bake in the preheated oven for 30-35 minutes until the fish just flakes and the vegetables are tender but crisp. Garnish with slices of lemon and line and serve immediately with the salad.

Household Hints

1. Avoid tearful eyes when peeling onions by soaking them beforehand or peel them under cold running water.

2. When painting indoors, pull an old pair of socks over your shoes. This will protect the shoes and the socks may be used to wipe up any splashes on the floor.

Preparation: 20 minutes Cooking: approx 1 hour Makes: 16 triangles

225g/8oz no-need-to-soak dried apricots, chopped 150ml/'/4pt orange juice

Crumble: 175g/6oz plain flour, sifted 175g/6oz porridge oats 225g/8oz butter, chilled and cubed

175g/6oz demerara sugar 75g/3oz coconut chips icing sugar for dusting

· Put the apricots and orange juice in a pan. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer gently for

minutes until softened. Cool.

Preheat oven to 180oC/350oF/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line the base of an 18 x 28cm/7 x 11in baking tin, at least 2.5cm/lin deep.

 Put the flour and porridge oats in a large bowl. Using your fingertips, rub in the cubed butter until it is evenly distributed throughout the mixture. Stir in the sugar.

• For the base, spoon half the mixture into the prepared tin and press down evenly with the back of a spoon.

 Stir the coconut into the remaining flour and oat mixture. Spread the apricots in an even layer over the base then evenly sprinkle with the remaining crumble mixture.

 Bake in the preheated oven for about 1 hour until golden. Cool slightly, then cut into 16 triangles and dust with icing sugar. Lift out of the tin with a palette knife. The triangles can be served warm or cold, but take care if lifting out when warm as they are very crumbly.

Q. I thought I'd developed arthritis in my hips, but my X-Ray showed that I have Paget's disease of the pelvis. What is this?

A. This is a fairly common condition the cause of which is unknown. The bone cells become hyperactive, resulting in thickened bone. The pelvis, spine, and skull are most commonly affected. When symptoms occur, they may well mimic the pain of osteoarthritis - aching and stiffness in the affected areas. Paget's disease may also speed up osteoarthritis, especially in the hips. Long bones affected by Paget's may become deformed, but the most common complication is fracture because the bones are weakened. Treatment is usually confined to drugs to minimise pain and stiffness, although surgery may be needed. Occasionally, it may require drugs to modify calcium movement.

Q. My wife recently returned from Eastern Europe and was very ill with a high fever and She int pains. diagnosed as having What is Brucellosis. this?



ism Brucella, which is picked up from a variety of animal sources. The likeliest source in your wife's case would be drinking unpasteurised milk. The initial illness is not dissimilar to a very bad flu, with a fever, headache, malaise, joint and muscle pain. It is diagnosed by tests which will either find the organism itself or antibodies to Brucella in the serum or other body fluids. Antibiotics, analgesics and sometimes steroids will help reduce symptoms. Brucellosis is notorious for its tendency to recur, causing repeated episodes of general ill health. These aren't usually as severe as the initial attack but are still debilitating.

Q. I read recently that boys who are overly close to their mothers are more likely to become homosexual. My seven-year-old son and I have a very close, warm relationship and enjoy each others company. Now I'm starting to have doubts and wonder If I should get him to do "normal" things that other boys o his age do.

A. Boys who are close to their mothers, in the way that you describe, are at a great advantage on the road to leading a successful adult life. Let your son develop his own interests and friends from the secure base you give him. The causes of homosexuality are still not well understood. Rest assured, they don't tend to

ATGWU — 27th Annual Biennial Meeting of the **Dungarvan Branch**

At the 27th Biennial meeting of the 3/87 Dungarvan Branch of the ATGWU held at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan last the Chairman, Michael Spillane in his address stated that the highlight of the past two years had been the £1 million settlement which had been reached in the Irish Leathers (in receivership) Pension Scheme Legal Case and he paid a warm tribute to all those who had worked so hard since 1985 to bring about this very satisfactory outcome.

In a wide ranging and comprehensive report the Unions District Officer, Tony Mansfield stated that there was an urgent need to attract a new industry to Dungarvan as at the end of October last there was total of 1,179 people signing on the live register as unemployed in Dungarvan. Mr. Mansfield advised that despite the difficult economic climate prevailing that the total membership of the 3/87 Branch was holding very well.

New sections were organised and people who called to their office at 35 O'Connell Street or phoned, could be assured of confidentiality at all times.

EU DIRECTIVE ON WORKING TIMES

Mr. Mansfield advised that it is most disappointing for low paid workers in Ireland that the government appears to have put off the phasing in of 4 weeks annual leave entitlements as proposed under the EU Directive on Working Time until 1999 and once again Ireland's acceptance of EU social legislation is in stark contract to

our acceptance of other EU policies.

Also Mr. Mansfield went on to state that under the terms of the current national agreement, the "Programme for Competitiveness and Work" in respect of Joint Labour Committees which set legally binding minimum rates of pay in various industries, clause 1.123 stated

"Improvements have been made to the operation of the Joint Labour Committee system over recent years through up-dating the legislation, strengthening the Labour inspectorate and computerising its activities. These improvements will be kept under review, including their impact on competitiveness, in consultation with

the social partners, as appropriate, over the period of the programme. In particular, steps will be taken to ensure that the minimum pay rates set by Employment Regulation Orders are enforced."

Unfortunately we have yet to see any positive signs of such enforcement as exampled by the appalling low rates of pay which are being paid in certain employments which are supposed to be governed by the Joint Labour Committees legally binding minimum rates of pay.

UNDER 21 FOOTBALL 'B' FINAL

Ballyduff Run Out Deserving Champions

BALLYDUFF 3-11 DUNHILL/FENOR 0-4

It was the final county championship game of the 1995 season and for Ballyduff who had played championship hurling or football non-stop for seven week-ends, it was their final chance of taking a county title this year.

They did win the game and they certainly did it in style with a top class performance from start to finish. It was obvious from the moment of the throw in that the Villager's were not going to let this one get away and as the second half got underway, the result became very obvious as the western champions, Ballyduff were outstandingly the better team and had benefited from their weeks of nonstop activity. For the Ballyduff team it was, to a great extent, a triumph of consistency as back in 1988 when the same panel of players were in the under 14 grade, they won the county double and again, three years ago they did themselves proud at minor level. Now they have every reason for expecting to progress in football at adult grade. The side which represented them here on Sunday saw just a couple of changes from the side which won them the divisional title on the previous weekend. There were positional changes.

Throughout the second

half, Dunhill/Fenor had two players sent off, but this should not give the impression that this was a dirty game. Far from it, it was a most sporting final, with just a momentary flare up in the final ten minutes and after which Stephen O'Sullivan was given marching orders. It was difficult to understand why the player was sent off as from the Press box there was no obvious transgression.

In the 6th minute Brendan Hannon opened the scoring with a Ballyduff point from a free and a minute later Alan Martin hit the upright with a rocket like strike and it rebounded into play. John Twomey pointed another Ballyduff free in the 10th min. and the western champions were three points up when the same player, John Twomey had the first score from play in the game in the 12th min. Just at the end of the first quarter David Burns had a point from play for Dunhill/Fenor, but Patrick Molumphy replied with a splendid point from play only a minute later. Alan Martin and David Burns exchanged points and while Ballyduff were well in control at this stage they were not gaining much on the scoreboard until Alan Martin's 22nd minute goal which was by any standards a great effort, aided by a number of colleagues. It put the state of play at 1-5 to 0-2 and things were beginning to look very bleak for the eastern team. However towards the end of the half, they began to show improvement and scored two good points from play without reply from Ballyduff to leave the halftime score at 1-5 to 0-4.

TOOK OVER

In the second half Ballyduff took over almost completely and added a further 2-6 without reply from the eastern champions. Early points by Kevin Barry, Brendan Hannon, Michael Molumphy and Tom Feeney gave them an eight points lead before John Twomey had the side's second goal which was achieved as a result of a penalty when substitute Liam Fennelly was brought down in the small square. Twomey took the kick which hit the upright and rebounded, only to be met again by the taker who made no mistake. Following this the Dunhill/Fenor captain and full back, David Power was sent off. Further scores by Alan Martin, Brendan Hannon and a goal by Alan Martin in the 29th minute brought the winners total to 3-11 as against 0-4 for the eastern team.
